Gridley Thumbs and Roots

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - I cannot rave enough about Pineapple Sage. In the spring it comes out of cold weather dormancy and its' leaves smell just like pineapple when you brush against them. Then at the end of October it is covered with crimson flowers that the hummingbirds fight over and the bees

swarm. Mine is spectacular this year. The Black and Blue salvia has gotten its' second wind and the blooms are intensely blue-purple with light green leaves. They tend to get leggy and I start cutting them back but I'm always glad when I keep some so they can look wonderful at the end of October before they die back. Mine are intermixed with Hot Lips salvia, red and white looking great with the blue-purple. If you love perennials all of these are a "must" in the flower garden. They attract the hummingbirds, bees, and many other tiny pollinators. Hot Lips will bloom year around here. I do cut it back so it doesn't get too woody and the growth for

next year is young and fresh. The other autumn blooming perennial that cannot be ignored is aster. These are nothing like the annual asters you see in every big box store. They tend to be bushy with small leaves and they become completely covered with lavender, cream, blue, white blooms. Aromatic Aster blooms the end of September but another one called Skyscraper Aster lives up to its' name and is tall and willowy as well as covered with hundreds of flowers. It is just starting to bloom and sometimes it will still be blooming at Thanksgiving. If you don't have perennials in your garden these are a few that would be worth planting. ★

Last week I was at the church constructing a small wooden bridge on the stage with a group of boys for the church play. Dr. Beau Hunter had just countersunk the last screw into a 4 x 4, then he stepped back and said "now I think we should be able to do something really artistic with the top of that 4 x 4 and a Saws All".

No one else understood what he meant. So I looked at him and said, "Beau, clearly we're from Gridley, the words doing something artistic and a Saws All tool totally makes sense to you and

I. The rest of them don't get it."

Halloween is over, now we move toward the fastest two months of the year. Starting tomorrow everybody gets ready for Thanksgiving, then after Thanksgiving, all of the Christmas things start appearing in the stores and then - the next thing you know another year starts. For some reason, life defies the space-time continuum in November and December - and it seems like there are only 37 seconds in every minute of the day.

Not only is the payload in the trailer getting a good shaking, he explained, you are also having your kidneys and other innards thrown about.

It makes sense, but we don't think it helps the safety factor on poor, old, two lane 99E, our immediate problem, but now it looks like we'll have to press for improvement of I-5 too ... Give the truck drivers a faster smooth road and reduce traffic on 99E.

Wednesday Tom finally got around to correcting our spelling... the drink is DAIQUIRI, not what we have been spelling.

Gridley's PTA Halloween carnival started over 20 years ago and has been acclaimed as a positive activity. It has given the younger generation something to do and cut down considerably on the mischief that used to plague the town. ★

Looking Back

The following are stories that appeared in the Gridley Herald 25, 50, 75, 100 and 125 years ago:

25 Years Ago (1993)
"Gridley Resurrects Prison Controversy"

A 3-2 vote by the Gridley City Council authorized City Administrator Jack Slota to revive a controversial study to determine whether a state prison should be located in this area. When the issue was on the front burner 2 years before, Councilman Tom Sanford spent time conducting a study of potential impacts that a state prison could have on the Butte County District Attorney's Office and Superior Courts. Sanford states that he "for one, came to the conclusion it is not the appropriate kind of businesses to dominate the community of Gridley." At that time a door-to-door survey of Gridley residents found that 79% were opposed to locating a prison here. The issue was revived by the council as an effort to encourage economic growth and provide local employment opportunities that paid above minimum wage levels. Slota pointed out that prison employee salaries average \$41,000 a year. The California Department of Corrections has indicated it is still interested in locating a facility in this area, the type of which would employ between 830 and 1,200 full-time employees with the total payroll reaching up to \$49 million. The prison would attract additional business that are expected to employ 400-600 persons. The study for the proposed prison will kick off in late January - February of next year.

50 Years Ago (1968)
"Live Oak High School Burglarized"

Over \$350.00 was taken and irreparable damage was done to the safe when Live Oak High School was broken into. Custodian Walter Satterfield called the police when he arrive at the school Thursday morning and found the door open. An investigation by the Live Oak police determined that the burglar had gained entry by forcing a skylight window located above the conference room open and then knocking a hole through the wall into the school office. The thieves used a crow bar to pry open the door to the safe, a method called

"the hammer and peel." Mrs. Betty Bridges, office secretary, estimates that \$373.43 was taken. Costs for repairing the walls and replacing the safe will far exceed the amount of cash lost, school authorities said.

75 Years Ago (1943)
"Rare Opportunity for Free Examination."

Gridley people are urged to take advantage of a free fluoroscope examination of the chest being provided by the Butte County Tuberculosis association. Dr. Ellis Sox from the state department of public health emphasized that adults between the ages of 20 and 50 should take advantage of the opportunity as young school children undergo skin testing in schools to determine exposure to the disease. Examinations of men for the armed services during the past three years showed that out of 11,000,000 examined, 50,000 had tuberculosis. Tuberculosis is not an inherited disease and is contracted through contact with those who carry the disease. A specialist will conduct the examination and if there is even the slightest suspicion of infection, a chest x-ray will be advised.

100 Years Ago (1918)
"Aviator Stuck Here Overnight"

Three machines from Mather Field flew over Gridley Sunday and later in the day when they were bound south towards home base, one of their pilots was forced to land because his gasoline supply gave out. He landed on the field out at the Faris place. Deputy Sheriff T.C. Moore stood guard over the plane overnight while the pilot slept at the ranch house. He was on his way the next morning after a delivery of fuel arrived.

125 Years Ago (1893)
"Shipping of Goods"

During the month of October there were shipped from Gridley fifty carloads of wheat, four of hogs, five of calves, four of sheep and two of grapes.

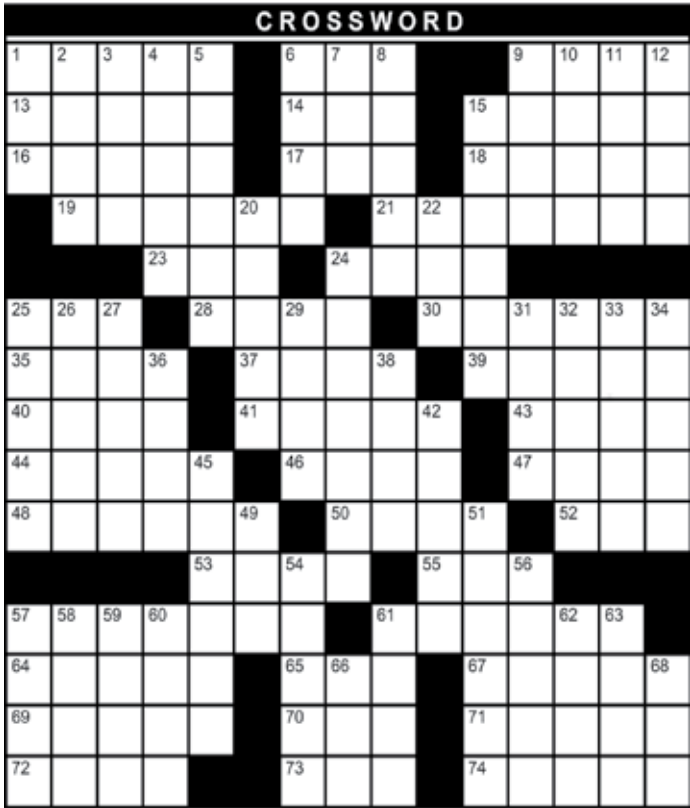

Butte County Walnut Buying Period Announced

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - Butte County Agricultural Commissioner Louie Mendoza Jr. recently announced that November 5, 2018 will be the beginning of the "walnut buying period" to allow the purchasing of walnuts by non-processing buyers, pursuant to the Butte County Nut Theft Ordinance. This period will begin at the conclusion of the Chandler Walnut harvest, and is set in consultation with a committee of walnut growers.

Walnuts are the highest valued agricultural commodity in Butte County. According to the Butte County 2017 Crop Report there was close to 50,000 harvested acres in Butte County with a market value of \$255 million. "The walnut industry has been vulnerable to theft, the Nut Theft Ordinance is intended to deter such activities," stated Mendoza.

The Butte County Board of Supervisors adopted the revised Nut Theft Ordinance in 2014. In addition to establishing the buying period, the ordinance also provides requirements for the transportation and identification of walnuts.

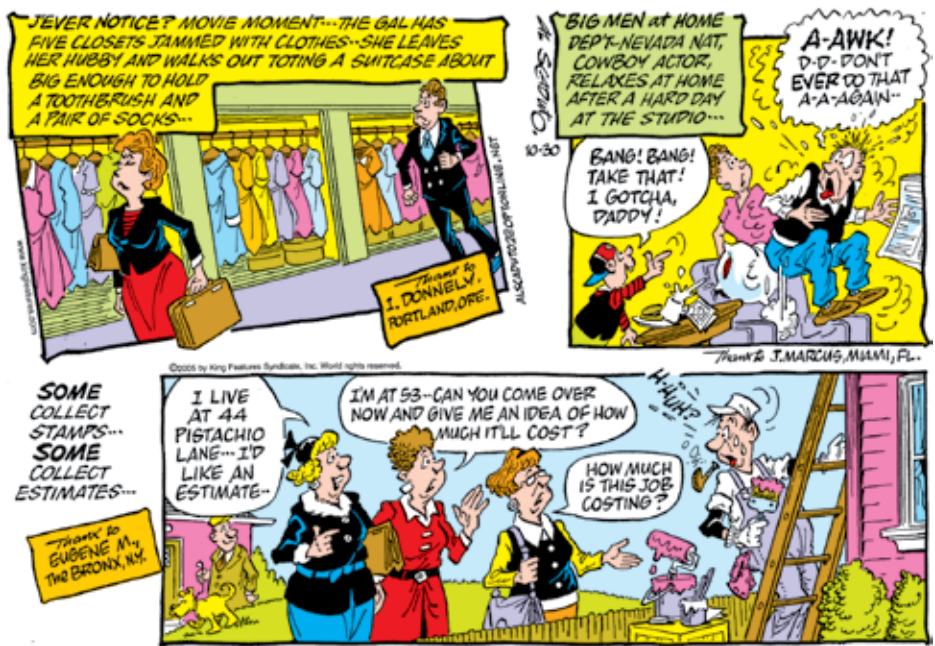

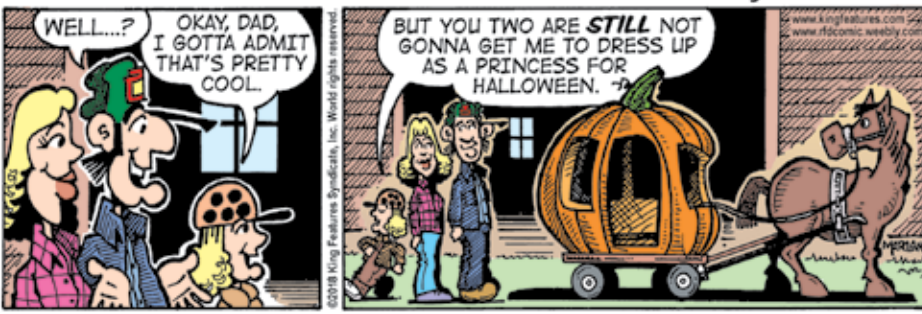

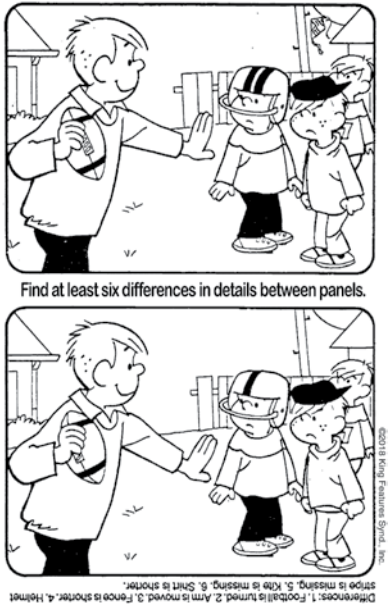

The first decision Dunning had to make was whether or not to have surgery on the throwing shoulder he injured, knowing that moving forward with the operation would wash out the rest of his junior campaign.

Dunning elected to have the surgery, which was done last Oct. 4.

Thus commenced a long, tedious rehab process that involved a lot of non-glamorous hours in the weight room and physical therapy.

But when the time came

to answer the bell for the 2018 season, Dunning was more than ready.

And the stats so far in 2018 bear that out in a big way.

Dunning's athleticism at the quarterback position has the Bulldogs well-positioned to make a run at the CIF Northern Section Division 3 playoffs. Gridley opened the second half of the season last Friday night at home with a 35-20 loss to BVL rival Sutter and is now 3-3 on the 2018 season (0-1 BVL).

So far in 2018, through the first five games, Dunning has helped lead the Bulldog offense to 258.3 rushing yards per contest. He's called his own number 2 in the huddle 78 times, good for 629 yards and nine TDs. He's completed 52-of-78 passes for 683

yards with four TDs and two interceptions.

Dunning, one of the Bulldogs' co-captains, doesn't put much stock in the personal numbers, though.

"I'm more interested in our team goals," Dunning said after a recent practice.

Those include challenging for the BVL title and making a deep run in the playoffs.

It was those goals — not individual numbers or personal glory — that made all that offseason rehab work worth it, Dunning said.

"I knew that if I put in the work, it was going to pay off," Dunning said.

Second-year Gridley head coach Matt Kemmis said Dunning's example of perseverance and dealing with adversity has been a good one for his teammates. ★

Election Preview

Number of state, local issues face voters next week

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Next Tuesday's general election will present area voters with a number of local and state offices and issues to decide.

In Live Oak, Gridley and Biggs, voters will choose their City Councils.

A total of six candidates are vying for two council seats in Gridley. Incumbents Ray Borges, a retired contractor, and Vice Mayor Bruce Johnson, a local business owner, are being challenged by welfare fraud investigator Todd Farr, Beverly Miles, and retired residents Marge Tidwell and Robert Wise.

In Live Oak, meanwhile, there are three council openings and just one incumbent running. Incumbent Jason Banks, the city's current vice mayor, is joined on the ballot by John P. Brown, Jeramy Chapdelaine, Rick L. Dais, Luis Hernandez, Nancy Santana, J.R. Thiara and Bob Woten.

Council members Diane Hodges and Steve Alvarado elected not to stand for re-election.

And in Biggs, there are four candidates for two open seats. Brian Bassett and John Busch join incumbents James T. Sheppard and Mayor Angela Thompson on the ballot.

Sutter County residents, meanwhile, will pick a new sheriff to replace retiring Sheriff J. Paul Parker. Yuba County Sheriff's Captain Brandon Barnes and Yuba City Police Sergeant Dennis Hauck advanced from the June primary to face off in next Tuesday's runoff.

Just one local measure is on the ballot in Sutter County, a \$4.5 million bond issue in the Woodland Joint Unified School District.

Meanwhile, voters statewide will vote on a number of ballot propositions:

- Proposition 1 would authorize \$4 billion in general obligation bonds to be used for housing-related programs for veterans;
- Proposition 2 would authorize the state to use revenue from Proposition 63 (2004)—a 1 percent tax on income above \$1 million for mental health services—on \$2 billion in revenue bonds for homelessness prevention housing for persons in need of mental health services;
- Proposition 3 would authorize \$8.877 billion in general obligation bonds for water infrastructure, groundwater supplies and storage, surface water storage and dam repairs, watershed and fisheries improvements, and habitat protection and restoration;
- Proposition 4 would authorize \$1.5 billion in bonds for the construction, expansion, renovation, and equipping of children's hospitals in California;
- Proposition 5, if approved, would amend Proposition 13 (1978) to allow homebuyers who are age 55 or older or severely disabled to transfer their tax assessments, with a possible adjustment, from their prior home to their new home, no matter (a) the new home's market value; (b) the new home's location in the state; or (c) the buyer's number of moves;
- Proposition 6, if approved, would *repeal fuel tax increases and vehicle fees that were enacted in 2017, including the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (RRAA) and *require majority voter approval (via ballot propositions) for the California State Legislature to impose, increase, or extend fuel taxes or vehicle fees in the future.
- Proposition 7, if approved, would allow the California State Legislature to (1) change the dates and times of the daylight saving time (DST) period, as consistent with federal law, by a two-thirds vote and (2) establish permanent, year-round DST in California by a two-thirds vote if federal law is changed to allow for permanent DST.
- Proposition 8, if approved, would require dialysis clinics to issue refunds to patients or patients' payers for revenue above 115 percent of the average cost of dialysis treatment in California plus healthcare improvement costs, such as staff training and patient counseling.
- Proposition 10, if approved, would allow local governments to adopt rent control on any type of rental housing, thus repealing the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act.
- Proposition 11, if approved, would allow ambulance providers to require workers to remain on-call during breaks paid at their regular rate; requiring employers to provide additional training for EMTs and paramedics; and requiring employers to provide EMTs and paramedics with some paid mental health services.
- Proposition 12, if approved, would establish minimum space requirements based on square feet for calves raised for veal, breeding pigs, and egg-laying hens and ban the sale of (a) veal from calves, (b) pork from breeding pigs, and (c) eggs from hens when the animals are confined to areas below minimum square-foot requirements. ★
