Infection Control a must at Orchard Hospital

The Medical Staff at Orchard Hospital purchased three Ultraviolet Light Decontamination Devices that will be used both at the hospital and the Medical Specialty Center.

The devices will be used in patient rooms and other areas following manual cleaning and decontamination by Environmental Services Staff, Surgery Staff and other places where infectious patients may have been.

One device will be used at the Medical Specialty Center to be used in the waiting room at night once all patients have gone. The others will be used at the hospital in the surgery department to prevent against post operative infections and for hospital isolation and infectious cases.

The size of the room to be decontaminated constitutes how long the treatment should last in the area to assure infections are not acquired in the hospital or Medical Specialty Center.

Inservice training is mandatory for Environmental Services Staff as they work with medical staff to understand how long the device should be in place as each micronism is different.

Scholarships are sometimes available for the program but "Angie" is raising the money all on her own visiting local businesses a dollar at a time.


The cost to compete is \$199 and Angie is raising funds to be able to attend trips to the State Capital and Disneyland with other contestants also.

The following are stories that appeared in the Gridley Herald 25, 50, 75, 100 and 125 years ago:

25 Years Ago (1992)
"Locals Unhappy with new Phone Book."

The new 1992 Pacific Bell phone book reads "more ads, more information, more help", but many locals are saying just the opposite. The new books white pages, which contain resident and business phone numbers are no longer broken up into cities, but have every number in Butte County under one 205 pages listing. According to the supervisor at the office handling the phone books, they had only received a few complaints from the surround areas at this point, but delivery of the phone book to all areas had not been completed, and that unfortunately, they expect more complaints to roll in.

50 Years Ago (1967)
"Near Miss"

Harold Whiting and David Stenzel, Gridley young men, narrowly escaped serious injury and death Saturday morning at about 1:30 a.m. when they were run down by Southern Pacific passenger train No.13 at the Hazel Street crossing. The men escaped the car which was pitched across the tracks in such a way that it's wheels were spinning when it landed. City trustees have written Southern Pacific about the need for

some kind of warning devices and the need for them to be installed at the crossing.

75 Years Ago (1942)
"142 Sign Up for Night Instruction at High School."

Enrollment in a special evening class at the Gridley High School indicated a widespread interest in the defense program. Twenty five persons signed up for home nursing instruction, taught by Mrs. B. Talbot, 22 expressed preference for nutrition classwork, taught by Miss Adeline Eager, and 95 persons crowded in to enroll for the first aid workshop taught by Dr. Hollis Carey. Twenty two of the persons joining the First aid instruction classes intend to join the Motor Corps while a second group of 10 want to become first aid instructors themselves.

100 Years Ago (1917)
"Trustees Decide to Purchase Land for Park."

City trustees came to the decision to purchase 1.62 acres of land adjoining the present city park, at a price of \$475 per acre. The land will be added to the park and will make it the largest city park in the northern part of the state.

125 Years Ago (1892)
"Rifle Practice"

At the rifle range, the Chico Rifle Association held their monthly medal shoot. L.W. Brooks captured the first medal and W.J. Costar the second.

Sacramento FBI Teen Academy applications available

This unique opportunity is open to all high school juniors attending any school—public, private, and home school—in the 34-counties the field office serves. The application package is available for download now.

Students selected to participate will spend an entire day at FBI Sacramento field office headquarters in Roseville on Friday, April 7, 2017. Applying and attending the FBI Teen Academy program is free; however, families are responsible for travel to and from the class.

The FBI Teen Academy is a unique opportunity for any student—regardless of career interest—who is curious about the FBI, what the FBI investigates, and how it serves the community. FBI Teen Academy participants engage in activities and discussions about what the FBI does and current topics relative to FBI investigations. Activities may include discussions about cyber safety, terrorism, active shooter situations, and color of law and civil rights investigations; participation in simulated evidence response team and bomb techs scenarios; and frank conversations about online communication and staying safe in an always-connected world.

Man dies when deputies arrive

At approximately 5 a.m., on January 12, 2017, the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) received a call from a man reporting his father, Marc Chiasson Sr., 65, who had serious physical and mental health issues, had stopped taking his medication and was making statements about wanting to die. BCSO Deputies Vong Vang and Randall Cooper responded to Chiasson's residence on Cox Lane, in Oroville to conduct a welfare check.

Upon arrival, deputies spoke to the reporting party and determined the elder Chiasson was inside the residence. The reporting party advised that prior to the deputies' arrival Chiasson had been attempting to get a shotgun from a locked safe and was making statements indicating he was intent upon committing suicide. Chiasson became irate when deputies entered the residence, stating he didn't need assistance. He was cursing at the deputies and demanding they leave. Deputies determined Chiasson was in need of a psychological evaluation and due to his agitated state the use of handcuffs would be appropriate for the transport to the hospital.

As the deputies were applying the handcuffs, Chiasson stiffened his arms and struggled briefly to prevent the deputies from handcuffing him. The deputies were quickly able to gain control of Chiasson, and apply the handcuffs by utilizing a wrist lock control hold. No other physical force was used to take Chiasson into custody. Deputies began to walk Chiasson out of the residence; however, as he was walking he began to drag his feet and appeared to be having difficulty walking. Deputies put Chiasson in the back seat of a patrol car, where he then laid down and became unresponsive. Concerned for Chiasson's well-being, deputies checked his vital signs and determined he had a pulse and was still breathing, but was unresponsive. Deputies radioed dispatch and requested immediate response from fire/medical personnel. As the deputies continued to monitor Chiasson, they noted he had no pulse and his eyes would not react to light. Deputies immediately removed him from the patrol car, removed the handcuffs, and began CPR. Deputies performed CPR for 12 minutes. When fire and medical personnel arrived on scene the life-saving efforts continued. Ultimately, it was determined Chiasson could not be revived and he was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Due to the fact that this death occurred immediately after Chiasson was taken into custody, BCSO contacted the Butte County District Attorney's Office and requested they conduct an independent investigation into the circumstances of the incident. The investigation included interviews with responding deputies, as well as family members who were present. Investigators also reviewed body camera footage recording the life-saving efforts undertaken by the deputies. All information obtained from those sources is consistent with details as described above, and there is nothing to suggest that deputies did anything to contribute to Chiasson's death.

The investigation further revealed that Chiasson had a number of medical issues, which will be examined as part of a scheduled autopsy. The autopsy is being conducted by the Sacramento County Coroner's Office. The completion of the investigation is pending the final results of the autopsy and the examination of Chiasson's medical history. Further status updates about the investigation will be released by the Butte County District Attorney's Office.

Sheriff Honea said, "This is an unfortunate incident for everyone involved. My heart goes out to the family of Mr. Chiasson for their loss, and to my deputies who went to extraordinary lengths to save Mr. Chiasson's life, but still experienced his death first hand."

Butte County in local emergency due to storms

A Local Emergency caused by recent storms has been proclaimed for Butte County. The proclamation was executed by the County Chief Administrative Officer, Paul Hahn and the Board of Supervisors will consider an item during the Board Meeting on January 24, 2017 to ratify the proclamation. The County executed the proclamation in response to substantial damage caused to County roads from heavy rain and flooding, as well as heavy winds which caused downed trees.

Proclaiming a Local Emergency due to the recent storms allows the County to access more resources to better assist with costs to fix local roads and assist residents affected by rising water levels and flooding. The full level of assistance for County roads and local residents still remains to be determined. For now, the County is focused on assessing the damage to County roads, such as the lane erosion on Centerville Road and the shifting of a portion of Oro-Quincy Hwy above Brush Creek. The County is also assessing damages to local residents whose properties were damaged during the recent storms.

Reduce Your Risk of Stroke

Since 1989, May has been designated as National Stroke Awareness Month. Stroke happens when blood flow to part of the brain is interrupted.

Fortunately, perhaps due to increased awareness, stroke death rates dropped 35 percent between 1998 and 2008. However, every year, stroke still kills more than 133,000 people in the U.S., and is a leading cause of serious, long-term adult disability.

Stroke occurs slightly more frequently in women than men, and African-Americans have an increased risk for the disease.

Some things you can do to lessen your risk of stroke are: control blood pressure and cholesterol levels, don't smoke, limit alcohol consumption, eat a healthy diet, and exercise regularly.

There are warning signs of a stroke, and acting quickly when stroke is suspected is critical. The National Stroke Association suggests the FAST test when stroke is suspected:

Face. Ask the person to smile. Note if one side of the face droops. Arms. Ask the person to raise both arms. See if one drifts downward.

Speech. Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence. Listen for slurred speech.

Time. If you observe any of these signs, call 911 immediately. Learn more about the disease and its prevention and treatment at www.Stroke.org.

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PG&E launches \$500 Rebate for electric vehicle drivers

The County encourages residents who are cleaning up green and wood debris to take it to a compost facility in their community instead of bringing it to the Neal Road Recycling and Waste Facility (Neal Road Facility) where it must be put in the landfill rather than recycled due to recent changes.

The Neal Road Facility stopped accepting green and wood waste for recycling on December 1, 2016 after the closure of several biomass energy plants left the facility without an outlet for the material.

Green and wood waste has a beneficial use as source material for compost. Compost and green waste collection facilities accepting green and wood waste are available in Chico, Oroville, Paradise, and the Gridley, Biggs communities. Taking this waste to a local facility can save a trip out to Neal Road and keep this material out of the landfill.
