SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The annual vote to elect a new Chair and Vice Chair of the Board of Supervisors was held Tuesday, January 10, 2023. This year's elected Chair is Supervisor Rich Desmond of District 3, and Patrick Kennedy of District 2 was elected Vice Chair.

"I am honored and ready to serve as the 2023 Chair of the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors," said Desmond. "As I look to the year ahead, I know we have a great deal to accomplish, and I look forward to working collaboratively with my fellow Supervisors, county staff, residents and our community partners to address the many issues facing the communities

and people we serve."

In addition to electing a new Chair and Vice Chair, three County Supervisors were sworn in for four-year terms.

This sworn in at the event were Phil Serna, First Supervisorial District with the Oath Administered by Ashley Soltani; Patrick Kennedy, Second Supervisorial District, with the Oath Administered by Maurice Reed; Patrick Hume, Fifth Supervisorial District: with the Oath Administered by retiring supervisor Don Nottoli.

The Board Chair responsibilities include the following: Presides over the Board meetings; the Vice Chairperson assumes the role in the Chairperson's absence or inability to act. If the Chair and Vice Chair are absent or unable to preside, the members present will select

a member present to act as temporary Chairperson.

Responsibilities also include: Acts on procedural matters or questions; Recognizes a member of the board desiring to speak on an item; Is entitled to vote on all matters before the Board, participate in discussion relating to any matter, make motions without relinquishing the Chair, and second any motion without relinquishing the Chair.

The Board Chair sits on other boards or commissions as a representative of the County of Sacramento and is the point of contact for questions from the public regarding the meetings (i.e., coordination of resolutions or presentations and general questions not specific to a district, etc.).

The Chair and Vice Chair serve annual terms in each capacity. ★

CalVCB Offers Resources, for Human Trafficking Victims

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Victim Compensation Board (CalVCB) is promoting national Human Trafficking Prevention Month with a social media campaign and reminders about the support available for survivors.

Three years ago, CalVCB began authorizing income loss compensation for victims of sex and labor trafficking as a result of Assembly Bill 629, which took effect on Jan. 1, 2020. In that time, CalVCB has approved 590 human trafficking claims and paid victims \$4,445,861 in lost wages.

"Sex and labor trafficking victims face many challenges as they try to rebuild their lives," said CalVCB Executive Office Lynda Gledhill. "CalVCB can help by compensating for lost income or other expenses, such as mental health counseling, caused by the trauma of being trafficked."

To help bring awareness to the problem and make victims aware of the support and resources available, CalVCB launched a social media campaign and created a media toolkit for others to use.

Human trafficking is the practice of enslaving people for labor, sexual activity, or commercial sexual exploitation. Human trafficking can occur within a country or trans-nationally and does not necessarily involve the movement of the victim from one place to another.

Human trafficking is considered the world's third-largest criminal enterprise, after drug dealing and arms trafficking. An estimated 12.8 percent of all human trafficking cases in the United States in 2021 came from California, according to the National Human Trafficking Hotline.

In an effort to bring attention to this national and global problem, in 2007 the U.S. Senate designated January 11 as a National Day of Human Trafficking Awareness. In 2010, President Barack Obama proclaimed January as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month.

In addition to income loss compensation, which covers up to \$20,000 for a two-year period, CalVCB can reimburse survivors for other expenses caused by human trafficking, including medical, dental, and mental health treatment, home security and relocation.

State Fast-tracks Groundwater Recharge Pilot Project to Capture Flood Waters

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Department of Water Resources (DWR) is partnering with the State Water Resources Control Board to fast-track efforts to capture flood waters to recharge groundwater basins. Water captured during extreme wet periods such as the one California is now experiencing will be stored in groundwater basins for use during dry periods.

Governor Newsom's "California Water Supply Strategy, Adapting to a Hotter, Drier Future" calls on DWR and the State Water Board to work with local agencies to significantly expand the State's ability to capture water from winter storms and adapt to more extreme weather patterns caused by climate change. DWR and the board are working together to expedite the

regulatory steps necessary to store significant rainfall and excess water underground, while still ensuring protections for the environment and other water users as required in State law.

"The State is capturing more water supply by accelerating groundwater recharge permitting and projects that mitigate the impacts of prolonged drought and support long-term sustainable groundwater management," said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. "Projects that capture available precipitation, stormwater, or floodwaters to recharge depleted groundwater basins need to be ready to capture high flows when they are available during each wet season, typically October through April in California."

The State's efforts reached a milestone January 6 when the State

Water Board approved a six-month permit that will enable multiple landowners to divert excess flows from Mariposa creek near the City of Merced to recharge a key groundwater basin. The Merced Project permit, the first approved under a new pilot regulatory assistance program, is expected to pave the way for future projects to allow water from wet-weather storms to be captured and diverted. The permit will cover multiple diversions by multiple landowners in a coordinated fashion managed by a groundwater sustainability agency.

The pilot program began in August 2022 with an application from the Merced Irrigation District and the Merced Irrigation-Urban Groundwater Sustainability Agency to divert and store water from the Mariposa creek. The permit application

authorizes diversion of up to 10,000 acre-feet of water from the creek during periods of high flows that would otherwise likely flow through the system. The Merced Subbasin is one of 21 basins in the state of California identified as Critically Overdrafted by DWR.

"The review process for these permits is complex and must consider impacts to the environment and existing water rights, including those dependent on specific Delta conditions and state and federal water project requirements," said State Water Board Chair Joaquin Esquivel. "In acknowledgement of this complexity, we have streamlined the process so we issue them in a timely way and help local agencies succeed in capturing stormwater for recharge and bringing stressed

UC Davis Health Improving Eye Care for People with Diabetes

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Diabetes affects 34.2 million people in the United States. Diabetic retinopathy, a diabetes complication that affects blood vessels in the eye, is the leading cause of blindness in adults. Early detection and treatment are critical to prevent vision loss but fewer than 50% of the 3.2 million Californians with diabetes undergo their recommended yearly eye screening. Glenn Yiu, a professor of ophthalmology at UC Davis Health, hopes to increase that number significantly.

The UC Office of the President announced Yiu received a \$2 million grant to lead an interdisciplinary program, the Collaborative UC Teleophthalmology Initiative, or CUTI. The project, part of UCOP Multicampus Research Programs & Initiatives, is in partnership with medical centers at UC San Diego, UC San Francisco and UC Los Angeles. CUTI builds on a screening program Yiu launched at UC Davis Health in 2018. The goal is to expand eye care access for diabetics, particularly for underserved populations. The project will utilize digital medical equipment for teleophthalmology or "remote" ophthalmology.

How Teleophthalmology can be used for Screenings

A key feature of the CUTI program is integrating digital eye screenings into routine care at primary care facilities or clinics for patients with diabetes. The screening is simple and just requires the patient to look into a special camera. Known as a fundus camera or retinal camera, the machine takes high-resolution images of the interior of the eye. The images can detect changes that may signal diabetic retinopathy and other eye conditions. After the digital image is

taken at the primary care office or clinic, the results are sent to an off-site eye care provider for evaluation and diagnosis.

will work with community clinics and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs) to reach underserved members of the community.

community clinics, such as Clinica Tepati and Paul Hom Asian Clinic, that provide care in Sacramento's inner-city neighborhoods. UC Davis

awareness and acceptance of telehealth. He thinks this technology can reduce in-person health visits and improve access and adherence to preventative eye care.

The interdisciplinary CUTI team includes members from the four different UC campuses with expertise in public health, clinical informatics, and health economics who can address obstacles in clinical workflow, technology integration, and financial sustainability.

The retinal images taken during the four-year study will be collected in a centralized repository for research using artificial intelligence. Artificial intelligence may be able to identify eye diseases and predict the risk of cardiovascular events and strokes simply from images of the eye's interior.

"The introduction of artificial intelligence is another exciting development in teleophthalmology," Yiu said. "The incorporation of AI for automated image interpretation allows for faster and more sensitive diagnosis of early eye disease."

Remote diabetic eye screening is already available at UC Davis primary clinics in Midtown, Folsom, Elk Grove, and the Lawrence E. Ellison Ambulatory Care Center. Yiu and his team believe that remote eye imaging may be used in the future to screen for other eye conditions such as glaucoma and age-related macular degeneration (AMD). Over the four-year program, they hope to spread the word to improve awareness about preventative eye care.

"We are excited to start this project and hope to find a way to scale it up for all of California. Our long-term goal is to make it easy for people with diabetes to get their annual eye screening, so we can help people avoid preventable blindness." ★

Since launching a separate pilot teleophthalmology program at UC Davis in 2018, Yiu has improved diabetic eye screening rates by more than 15%, helping to make UC Davis Health one of the top performers in the country.

Screening for Underserved Patients

In addition to eye screenings at primary care facilities at UC health systems, the program

Health is also working with Communicare Health Care Centers, a FQHC, to provide remote diabetic eye screening to rural areas of California's Central Valley. The region has limited eye care access. UC San Diego and UC San Francisco will also be engaging with community clinics in addition to primary care centers.

Training and Identifying Barriers

Because eye screenings are not a routine part of primary care, the program will train health care providers and identify the barriers that prevent the widespread adoption of remote eye screening. Yiu noted that the COVID-19 pandemic increased

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Pioneer Daughter's Legacy

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - A descendant of one of Carmichael's earliest families, Doris Graves Chez died recently at the age of 92.

Doris rode a creaking school bus over bumpy roads to Carmichael's first school. She and her pony Bluebell galloped through almond groves where suburbs now spread. Her classmates included kids whose family names adorned local streets. "It was great growing up in a rural town and knowing so many fine people," she said.

The country girl later studied at Stanford University, married college sweetheart Joe Chez and raised three daughters. For almost two decades, she served the Sacramento County Department of Voter Registration and Elections. A dedicated wife, mom and volunteer, her legacy includes many historical snapshots of pioneer days. Graves' family albums recall farmers' toil; their celebrations, tragedies and an indefatigable optimism for their frontier town.

The colony was four years old when Doris's grandfather Fred Graves brought his family from South Dakota in 1913. Doris's father (then 16) traveled in the same freight wagon as the Graves' work horses. Fred purchased 100 Carmichael acres, bounded by Marconi and Kenneth Avenues. He pronounced the burgeoning colony a "land of opportunity, where everything grows."

Family lore would become a passion for his granddaughter. "She did a thorough job archiving pictures and documentation," says Doris's eldest child, Karen Chez. "Her efforts mean we can always go back to those early days. Mom preserved a treasure for generations to come."

One remarkable document is a 1914 letter from Fred Graves to his brother in South Dakota. He brags about the February sunshine that brought his peas to flower while Mid-West farms lay under snow.

Here (including original spelling) are excerpts from the 108-year-old missive.

"Dear Brother; We are having lovely weather here now and vegetation is growing very rapidly, I have just finished my barn, and we

will live in it for a while until we can get the trees planted... we are pleased to think we are here and we all like it very much, the Almond trees are in full bloom and is a very pretty sight, the land that is not cultivated is covered with very beautiful flowers, this is certainly the most beautiful country I ever saw... if you ever expect to come to this country to buy land, I really think that now is the time... land is advancing in price all the time...

I sold two of my tracts to Mr. Sears of Sioux City last week for \$225 an acre, I could have sold them several times for that... I disliked to sell them but could not handle so much, as three (10 acre tracts) is about all I shall be able to plant to trees now... thirty acres into fruit will make a man some good money... we expect to put out three acres of Tomatoes and two acres of watermelons... tomatoes will sell for about \$9 a ton... there is lots of land being planted to trees this season... 200 acres within sight of our place...

Next week we will start to plant peaches and pears... also our home orchard, strawberries, logan berries, raspberries, black berries... We have our tomatoe seeds planted and they are coming up nicely...

"There is not a location within a radius of 50 miles... that compares with this and the land is being bought up fast... I would like to have you see this country this season ... and I think you could make a trip out here for less than \$100 including all expences...

"Give my kind regards to the folks and tell Anna that if she was here she would be putting in all the time in the garden she wanted to, for this is a great country for garden stuff..."

Two years later, farmer Fred died in a dynamite explosion. Like many Carmichael pioneers, he blasted hard pan to plant his orchards. Accidents were common. Though Doris was not born until 1930, she learned how the tragedy affected her kin. "My father (not yet 20), took over the care of his mother and two sisters," she said. "His sisters got jobs. In 1918, he was drafted for WW I. He couldn't return till 1919. He then farmed the land. The family survived some very hard years."

In time, Bayard graves

established a plumbing business, served on the Carmichael School board and was one of Carmichael Park Board's first directors. Sierra View Funeral Chapel now stands on part of his farm.

Recalled Doris: "My father was a volunteer fireman and when WW II came, he was an air raid warden. Some evenings, we'd sit out on the front lawn and watch the planes from McClellan or Mather fly over. The school bus stop was right in front of our house. Our large lawn made a perfect ball field, so we often gathered there early, before school. We swam in the American River and had picnics by the old pump house. We knew everyone for miles around."

Says her daughter Karen: "Mom had a blast growing up in Carmichael. She treasured her ancestors and taught us to value their stories. She had a way or fast-forwarding the past: in her teens, a snake scared her horse Bluebell. Mom was thrown. She was hurt and terrified. But she had to get back on that horse or she couldn't get home. I was in a car accident as a teenager. I was scared to drive again. Mom said: 'you must get back on the horse.'

"Once, mom invited relatives to Carmichael Park for a reunion. She told us how her father helped prepare the land for that park. Whenever we drove around, she told us who used to live each house; whose farm used to be where.

"Our mother knew all about Carmichael its people. She was a font of knowledge. We're grateful she loved sharing what she knew."

State Budget Must Get Back to Basics

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday January 10, 2023, the Governor unveiled his \$297 billion budget proposal. Vice Chair of the Assembly Budget Committee Vince Fong (R-Central Valley) issued the following statement:

“Californians are demanding real results, not more political headlines.

“Californians continue to persevere as they face a weakening economy, inflation, and an affordability crisis, rising costs of energy, and now the consequences of a lack of needed water infrastructure investments. When Mother Nature blesses

us with rain, we need to save the water, instead of dumping it out to the ocean.

“Families are rightfully frustrated as they are tired of paying more and getting less.

“The Governor’s rhetoric does not match reality. Facing a \$22 billion deficit, Governor Newsom’s budget continues his misguided habit to overspend with little accountability. Newsom’s budget again fails to adequately build water storage and conveyance infrastructure to store water and move it across the state. And this budget framework perpetuates ill-conceived energy policies that will stifle needed affordable and reliable energy supplies when Californians are demanding relief.”★

Proposed Budget is Not Sustainable

California Senate Republicans Press Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Senate Budget Vice Chair, Senator Roger Niello (R-Fair Oaks) and Senate Minority Leader Brian W. Jones (R-San Diego) react to the announcement of Governor Newsom’s 2023-24 proposed budget today.

“California’s assumption of unending higher revenue, combined with overspending on misguided priorities, led the state down the path to the deficit we have today. And this is in contrast to other states that are considering tax rebates at this same time,” said Senator Niello.

“Republicans fought to fill the Rainy-Day Fund, and we applaud today’s commitment to not tap into it. Recent on-going spending by the governor must be re-evaluated. The governor continues to celebrate how much he spends, but California has yet to see the results.

“California is not on a sustainable path. The state must take pause and address the real needs of Californians such as homelessness, public safety, wildfires, water storage, and education. Republicans look forward to working with our colleagues on the other side of the aisle towards a more live-able

California.”

Senate Minority Leader Jones said, “The California Senate Republican Caucus is pleased that Governor Newsom listened to our calls and is not planning on tapping into reserves. We are disappointed, but not surprised, by the governor breaking his promise to pay down our unemployment insurance debt, instead he leaves small businesses to bear the brunt of the state’s failures with a tax increase.

“Our caucus stands ready with practical solutions to the many problems plaguing Californians. We are eager to work with our colleagues across the aisle on fixing California and spending smarter instead of spending more.”

Earlier, California Senate Minority Caucus Chair, Senator Janet Nguyen (R-Huntington Beach) released the following video statement prior to Governor Newsom’s budget proposal announcement:

“Drive down the street,” said Senator Nguyen. “Turn on the news. Go to the gas pump. There are harsh realities facing Californians up and down this state. Taxpayers cannot afford more empty promises and failures. We want results.”★

Blood Supply Sinks to Lowest Level in a Year

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The blood supply for about 900 hospitals nationwide recently dipped to its lowest level in a year at Vitalant, triggering a blood emergency for the nonprofit blood services provider. Eligible donors of all blood types, especially type O, are needed now to schedule an appointment and donate in the days and weeks ahead to prevent delays for patients who need transfusions.

Changes in the way people work, live, and play since the start of the pandemic created lasting challenges to maintaining an adequate blood supply. As many people continue to work remotely, blood donations at business-hosted blood drives are down by 50% in 2022 from 2019, a decline of 90,000 donations. Overall, the number of people donating with Vitalant has dropped about 20% in the last three years, while patients’ needs remain strong.

Mitzy Edgecomb, Vitalant’s west division vice president, reports, “The frequency of emergency blood shortages is a grave concern for all of us. Because blood is perishable with no artificial substitute, the blood supply must be constantly replenished. Despite extraordinary outreach efforts in the last few months, blood inventory continues to be dangerously low.”★

Vitalant notes that new donors and those who haven’t donated recently are critical to end blood shortages and help our blood supply return to more stable, pre-pandemic levels.

In addition to societal shifts, recent blood drive cancellations forced by severe winter weather and illnesses have compounded the shortage. Blizzards, rain/wind/flooding and extreme cold caused more than 2,000 donations to go uncollected in December and early January.

Donors of every blood type are critical to ending this shortage and maintaining an adequate supply. The need is most acute for type O blood and platelets. Type O-positive is the most transfused blood type while O-negative can help patients of any blood type. Donated platelets, which often help cancer patients, must be used within a week.

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A Cornerstone of Modern Medicine is on the Brink of Collapse

Roughly a century after the first antibiotics revolutionized medicine, the development pipeline for these critical drugs is on the brink of collapse.

Without policies to reinvigorate research into newer, more potent antibiotics, the world may soon face another global public health crisis as devastating as COVID-19.

According to an analysis in The Lancet, more than 1.2 million people died from drug-resistant bacteria in 2019. By 2050, these superbugs could kill as many as 10 million people each year.

Since the discovery of the first marketed antibacterials in the early 1900s, these wonder-drugs have become indispensable. By the end of the 20th century, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration had approved 135 new drugs that kill bacteria or inhibit their growth.

These included breakthroughs such as penicillin-like drugs and medicines like erythromycin. These drugs made it possible to treat many infections, like pneumonia and strep throat.

But in recent decades, new antibacterials have become alarmingly rare. In the past 35 years, the FDA has approved just one antibacterial drug with a novel way to kill target pathogens.

This slowdown in antibacterial innovation is in stark contrast to new superbugs that are increasingly resistant to today's therapies. Absent a global effort to develop more new and novel antibiotics, antimicrobial resistance could undo much of modern medicine as we know it.

If today's antibiotics stop working, routine medical procedures, such as cesarean sections and hip replacements — not to mention open-heart surgery — could become impossibly dangerous.

Yet the chief obstacles to antibiotic development are economic, not scientific. It costs on average \$1.58 billion to develop a new antibiotic. And since antibiotics should be used judiciously to preserve their effectiveness, it's exceedingly challenging for research firms to recoup costs through traditional sales models.

As a result, investors aren't funding antibacterial research adequately. Over

the last decade, venture capital funding for U.S. antibacterial development amounted to \$1.6 billion, compared with \$26.5 billion for oncology. Biotech startups drive the vast majority of antibacterial research and development. Small companies discovered more than 80% of antibacterial treatments in clinical trials. But so great are the market challenges that many of these businesses fail — even when their drugs succeed.

Take the biopharmaceutical firm Achaogen, which earned FDA approval for its antibiotic plazomicin in 2018. The next year, the company filed for bankruptcy.

From the scientific standpoint, the prospects for new antibacterials look distinctly promising. Between 2011 and 2020, antibacterial drugs starting early clinical trials had a 16.3% likelihood of reaching FDA approval. That's more than double the 7.9% success rate across all diseases.

With the right financial incentives, the biopharmaceutical sector is more than capable of building a pipeline for antibacterial drugs that can meet the challenge of antimicrobial resistance.

Thankfully, there are policy reforms pending in Congress that could fix the broken antibiotics market. The Pioneering Antimicrobial Subscriptions to End Upsurging Resistance (PASTEUR) Act would establish a subscription-like model for new antimicrobials that treat the most pressing resistant threats. It would ensure availability of new products, while providing a predictable return on investment for biopharmaceutical firms that is tied to the drug's value to public health, not the volume sold.

Another proposal known as the Developing an Innovative Strategy for Antimicrobial Resistant Microorganisms (DISARM) Act would enable appropriate access to newer antibiotics by modernizing how Medicare reimburses these drugs.

These are the two most important steps policymakers can take to address a public health crisis that is threatening our very existence.

Californians' Patience on Homelessness Wears Thin

Last week, a viral video showed the owner of a San Francisco art gallery using a water hose to spray a homeless woman camped outside the doorway of his business.

The gallery owner, Collier Gwin, semi-apologized later, telling a television interviewer, "I totally understand what an awful thing that is to do, but I also understand what an awful thing it is to leave her on the streets."

Gwin said he and other business owners complained to police about her blocking the sidewalks and business entrances. Efforts had been made to help her get off the streets, but nothing has worked.

"We called the police. There must be at least 25 calls to police," Gwin said. "It's two days in a homeless shelter, it's two days in jail, and then they drop them right back on the street."

Finally, after the woman once again refused to move, in frustration Gwin sprayed her down.

Gwin obviously did the wrong thing, but the incident dramatized the frustration that millions of Californians feel about the squalid encampments of homeless people that have become the defining feature of urban California.

Gov. Gavin Newsom

acknowledged the growing resentment as he introduced his new state budget last week. "People have just had it," he told reporters. "They want the encampments cleaned up."

"People are dying on the streets all across this state," Newsom said. "The encampments, we've got to clean them up, we've got to take ownership, we've got to take responsibility."

In the last two state budgets, Newsom and the Legislature have committed \$17.5 billion for housing and services to the estimated 170,000 homeless Californians — about \$100,000 each. However, as Newsom's new budget acknowledges, "Despite unprecedented resources from the state and record numbers of people being served by the homelessness response system, the population of unhoused individuals grows faster than the population exiting homelessness."

The new budget adds several more billion dollars, but suggests that local governments are still not doing enough — a theme that Newsom has pursued in recent months.

Last year, he rejected all of the plans that local governments had submitted, saying they fell well short of actually making real progress on reducing the upward trend. After a showdown meeting with local officials, he agreed to release more state aid.

"The first iteration of these plans made clear that more ambition is required — and more direction from the state is necessary," the budget declares. "Accordingly, the administration plans to

work with the Legislature this year to advance homeless accountability legislation."

The budget suggests that cities failing to meet their state quotas for zoning land for new housing might lose state financing for homelessness programs.

"If we can't clean up the encampments and address what's happening chronically on our streets, I'm going to be hard-pressed to make a case to the Legislature to provide them one dollar more," Newsom told reporters.

That threat doesn't sit well with local government officials. The League of California Cities issued a sharp reaction, saying, "one-time investments will not solve the crisis" and adding, "We need ongoing state funding and a coordinated approach with clearly defined roles and responsibilities for all levels of government that supports long-term solutions."

The exchanges suggest there is still no consensus on what combination of actions would have a visible impact and all of the politicians involved are engaged in some blame-shifting as the voting public's patience with the squalor wears thin.

Newsom knows that if the crisis is not resolved, it will leave an indelible mark on his governorship and haunt whatever future political career moves he might make.

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SBA Positioned to Swiftly Assist GOP Statement on Budget Proposal

California Businesses and Residents Affected by the Statewide Winter Storm

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Low-interest federal disaster loans are now available to California businesses and residents as a result of President Biden's major disaster declaration, U.S. Small Business Administration's Administrator Isabella Casillas Guzman announced.

The declaration covers Merced, Sacramento and Santa Cruz counties as a result of severe winter storms, flooding, landslides, and mudslides that began Dec. 27, 2022.

"With President Biden's declaration, SBA is working closely with FEMA and our state and local officials on the ground to deliver expedient disaster recovery loans and support that will aid Californians impacted by these severe and devastating winter storms, flooding and mudslides," said Administrator Guzman. "My heartfelt condolences go out to the families who have lost loved ones, and I urge affected residents to stay safe and heed the guidance of local emergency officials. As the state faces continued rainfall and heightened risks of flooding and mudslides, the SBA is committed to providing the full breadth of our resources to help small businesses and communities recover and rebuild stronger than before."

Businesses of all sizes and private nonprofit organizations may borrow up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business assets. SBA can also lend additional funds

to businesses and homeowners to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future.

For small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small businesses engaged in aquaculture and most private nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic injury assistance is available to businesses regardless of any property damage.

Disaster loans up to \$200,000 are available to homeowners to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate. Homeowners and renters are eligible for up to \$40,000 to repair or replace damaged or destroyed personal property.

Interest rates can be as low as 3.305 percent for businesses, 2.375 percent for private nonprofit organizations and 2.313 percent for homeowners and renters with terms up to 30 years. Loan amounts and terms are set by SBA and are based on each applicant's financial condition.

To be considered for all forms of disaster assistance, survivors must first contact the Federal Emergency Management Agency at www.disasterassistance.gov. As soon as Federal-State Disaster Recovery Centers open throughout the affected area, SBA will provide one-on-one assistance to disaster loan applicants. Additional information and details on the location of disaster recovery centers is available by calling the SBA Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955. ★

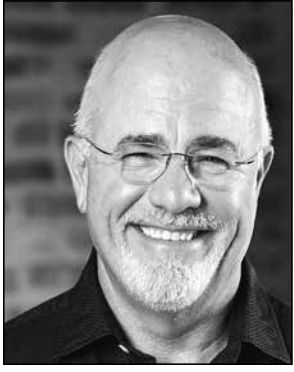

Dear Dave,

I am on Baby Step 2, and I started a YouTube channel earlier this year that led to a new opportunity to make additional income. I try on and review clothing, and I'm paid \$30 for each clip that's anywhere from 30 seconds to two minutes long. Right now, I have about 1,000 viewers. This requires me to buy items from several brands. I usually return the items when I'm through filming, but I'm currently funding this with a credit card I only use for this project. I only pay the minimum each month until I get the refund, so at any given time there can be up to \$4,000 on the card in rotation. I make about \$86,000 at my normal job, so is this an okay way to fund my project and chalk it up as a business expense?

Dear Amber,

You're taking a risk here,

from a business perspective, by playing around with \$4,000 in debt to make \$30 a pop. That's inordinate. And you shouldn't be paying for the clothes in the first place. These brands should be giving you clothes to review – that you keep – for the marketing exposure, but I'm not sure you've got enough eyeballs on you yet to justify them giving you the clothes for free.

Basically, it sounds like you're trying to put yourself in a position to be an influencer. And the way influencers get paid is by monetizing eyeballs. Obviously, YouTube and other platforms will pay you if you can get the eyeballs. But 1,000 viewers really aren't a lot these days. You're getting there, though, and I'm glad you're working at it and trying to make things happen.

You make good money, Amber. I want you to set aside \$2,000 or \$3,000 for this business, maybe out of the business income, and prime the pump one time. By that, I mean open a separate checking account that's for your clothing exchange process only. Here's the

thing, let's say you bought \$1,000 worth of stuff from one of these companies, and they suddenly decide they're not taking it back. You just ate that \$1,000. And guess what else? Now, you really have credit card debt.

There are three things you can always be sure of in business. One, it's going to cost twice as much as you think it will. Two, it's going to take twice as long as you think it will. And three, you are not the exception to these things. While we're at it, add this to the list of stuff you can always be sure of – you'll never find me advising or endorsing credit card debt!

Newsom Rewrites State History

Newsom blames GOP and Right for issues plaguing state, ignoring complete Democrat control

California Governor Gavin Newsom was sworn in Friday (January 6, 2023) for a second term.

With the state suffering under a plague of hundreds of thousands of homeless drug addicts living on the streets, a serious spike in violent crime and theft, highest-in-the-nation taxes and cost of living, failing public schools, a state-created water shortage, and hundreds of thousands of California businesses and residents fleeing to friendlier states, Newsom made his second inaugural speech all about him – and he attacked the toothless GOP in this Democrat one-party state.

“Time has done its usual trick on me,” Newsom said.

“It says it has been four years since I stood in the shadow of this Capitol and delivered my first inaugural address.”

“Four years, disaster and plague, they bend the clock in strange ways,” Newsom said. *(doesn't he know that he was governor these past 4 years during disaster and plague?)*

“In nearly 30 years in politics, I have had the opportunity to see this process firsthand, learning as we go, and etching these learnings on the consciousness of a country that perhaps hasn't yet caught up,” Newsom said. “When we started issuing same-sex marriage licenses in San Francisco in 2004, it felt as if history moved at light-speed, in the right direction, decades of advocacy culminating in that beautiful Winter of Love.”

(Newsom started issuing same-sex marriage licenses as Mayor of San Francisco in violation of state law. A few months later, the California Supreme Court ruled unanimously that Mayor Newsom, and the City and County of San Francisco had exceeded its authority and violated state law by issuing the marriage

licenses.)

Newsom played a victim of the Covid time period, in denial of his decisions to lock down school children and businesses, force vaccines on millions of Californians, and mask the population indoors and outdoors, while he went about his life unmasked, attending events and parties, and while his children attended private school:

“It feels like both a flash, and an eternity.

“In the longest hours of my first term, trying to plot a course through pandemic, wildfire, mass shootings, and social unrest ... I found myself looking backward, as much as I was looking forward.

Newsom took us on a journey back in time to his childhood, omitting the omnipotent presence of the Getty family in his life, while lamenting victimhood because of his divorced parents:

“I recalled the late-1970s, when I was 10 or 11 years old, a child of divorce and dyslexia, trying to find my bearings.”

“I was a kid, traveling back and forth across the Golden Gate Bridge, between the two very different lives of my mother and father.”

“I couldn't read, and was looking for any way to ditch classes. I'd fake stomach aches and dizziness. I'd bite down on the thermometer in the nurse's office trying to make the temperature rise past 100.”

He also perpetuated the gross fabrication of a January 6th “insurrection” on the U.S. Capitol two years ago:

“...there are still forces in America that want to take the nation backward. We saw that two years ago, on this day, when the unthinkable happened at a place most Americans assumed was invincible,” Newsom said. “An insurrectionist mob ransacking a sacred pillar of our democracy, violently clashing with sworn officers upholding the rule of law. Just like the brave men

and women whose heroism we inscribe, here on our own Peace Officers' Memorial.”

“Since that terrible day, we've wrestled with what those events say about us as a country. The ugliness that overflowed on January 6th, 2021, was in fact decades in the making. Fomented by people who have a very different vision of America's future. Red state politicians, and the media empire behind them, selling regression as progress, oppression as freedom. And as we know too well, there is nothing original about their demagoguery. All across the nation, anxiety about social change has awakened long-dormant authoritarian impulses. Calling into question what America is to become, freer and fairer ... or reverting to a darker past.”

Newsom callously laid-out California's cruel, evil history, full of bigotry, genocide, discrimination, and homophobia, omitting a few crucial details:

“California's statehood, after all, was also sealed with a brutal genocide against native people.” *(Newsom is cherry-picking history to serve his own political positions. The Spanish colonization of the Americas began in 1493. The Spanish Empire expanded across the Caribbean Islands, South America, most of Central America, and much of North America, but was not confined to California.)*

“Let's not forget, the Chinatown I visited as a boy is a remnant of the bigotry of agitator Denis Kearney, and the Chinese Exclusion Act of the 1880s.” *(Newsom omitted that Kearney was anti-capitalist, and was elected president of the Workingmen's labor Union. Kearney was arrested twice for using incendiary language and inciting a riot.)*

“Tens of thousands of Japanese Americans were interned right here during World War II.” *(Newsom omitted that the Japanese*

internment took place after an executive order by Democrat President Franklin Roosevelt.)

What a contrast of Gov. Newsom's speech to his nemesis Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis, who wowed the people of the Sunshine State with his praise, accolades and appreciation:

“Freedom lives here, in our great Sunshine State of Florida!” DeSantis said.

“It lives in the courage of those who patrol the streets and keep our communities safe, it lives in the industry of those who work long hours to earn a living and raise their families, it lives in the dedication of those who teach our children, it lives in the determination of those who grow our food, it lives in the wisdom of our senior citizens, it lives in the dreams of the historic number of families who have moved from thousands of miles away because they saw Florida as the land of liberty and the land of sanity.”

While Gov. Newsom wagged his finger at oppressive California and its residents, Gov. DeSantis uplifted his people, thanking them while recognizing that “Florida has led the way in preserving what the father of our country called the ‘sacred fire of liberty.’”

Liberty is something we are in short supply of in California under Gov. Newsom and the Democrat supermajority.

The rest of Gov. Newsom's speech was directed to a wider audience – the nation, as he pretends he's not running for President in 2024:

Newsom played the game of “I know you are, but what am I?” described by the Urban Dictionary as, “quite simply the most retarded comeback someone makes when they've completely lost the argument. This statement signifies that the argument has gone to a completely immature level.”

He continued attacking the right, GOP, and red states:

“They silence speech, fire

teachers, kidnap migrants, subjugate women, attack the Special Olympics, and even demonize Mickey Mouse.”

“All camouflaged under a hijacking of the word ‘freedom.’”

“But what they really want is more control – intrusive government, command over your most intimate decisions – when to have a family, how you raise your kids, how you love.”

That last statement is really rich coming from the Governor who still clings to his Covid State of Emergency powers three years after the order, and ruling by fiat, locked down 40 million people during Covid, issued more than 70 executive orders containing 561 provisions, and killed off half of the businesses in the state.

Evan Symon with the Globe spoke with Washington-based analyst and speechwriter Craig Haddock after Newsom's inauguration speech on Friday who said:

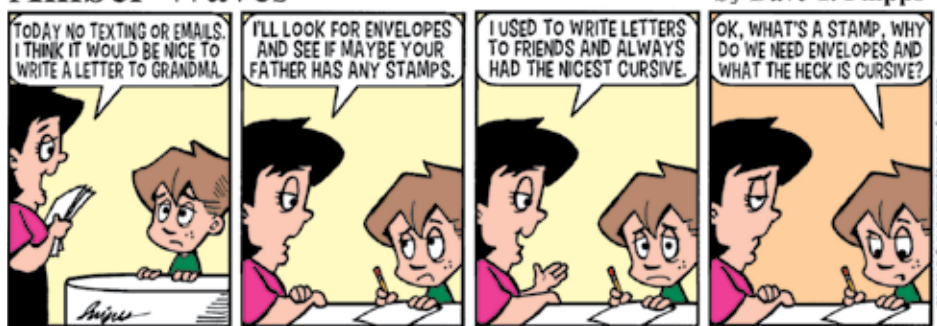
“I mean, let's begin with the whole tone of the speech. Usually what people go for, especially in reelection speeches, is to promote unity and working together. Governor Newsom just destroyed any hope of bipartisanship by going after the GOP. If he is looking at a presidential run in the future, these are just further nails in that coffin. Any good leader will at least throw out a few brownie points at the other party. I mean, even [Florida Governor] Ron DeSantis has. Newsom just didn't.”

“Even worse, he kind of praised the division between the two parties over and over again, and made the whole situation black and white. He lumped pretty much everyone against him with extremists and those that broke into the Capitol on January 6th. I mean, it's no coincidence of the inauguration speech date. He wanted that and pretty much said “Democrats good, Republicans bad.” ★

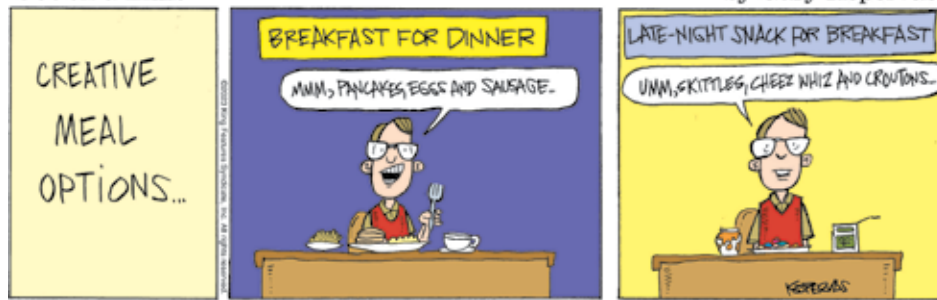

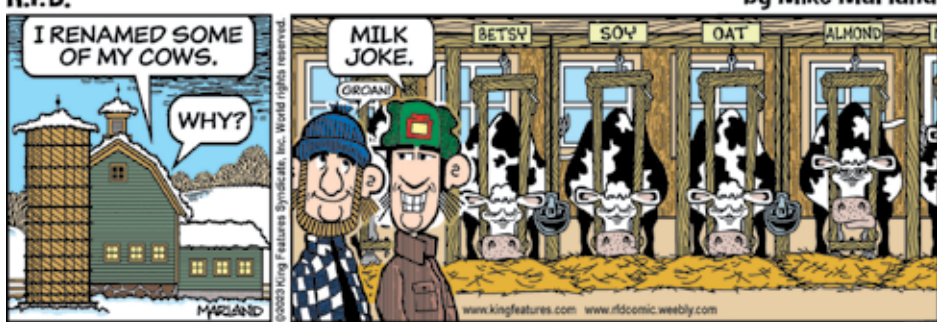
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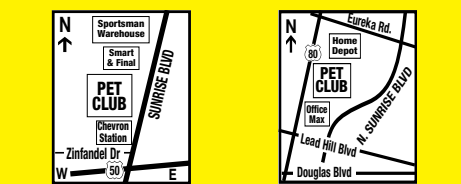


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State Fast-tracks Groundwater Recharge Pilot Project to Capture Flood Waters

groundwater basins into balance.”

Since 2016, the State Water Board has approved 20 temporary permits. Currently there are five applications pending, with two more projected to be approved next week. The remaining three are going through a public noticing process.

The Merced Project’s permit includes multiple points of diversion. Diversions will be directed to a number of agricultural fields to support groundwater recharge consistent with the Merced Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Plan. Water diverted for recharge purposes will be applied to working agricultural lands only, and water stored will be accounted for in the upcoming growing season as the first irrigation water to be pumped from the aquifers.

“Merced Irrigation District is excited to partner with DWR supporting GSAs with this crucial pilot project intended to help groundwater basins become sustainable by turning potential flood waters into groundwater recharge opportunities,” said Hicham Eltal, Deputy General Manager, Merced Irrigation District. “The project is intended to show that the subsidence being experienced in part of the Merced Groundwater Basin along the San Joaquin River can be addressed while simultaneously reducing recurring flood events from local creeks tributary to the San Joaquin River. The goal is that this effort paves

the way for acquiring temporary permits to divert flood flows by GSAs throughout the State to help groundwater basins reach sustainability.”

As part of the Newsom’s Administration water supply strategy, the State is looking to expand groundwater recharge by at least 500,000 acre-feet in potential capacity. By expediting groundwater recharge projects, the State can help local agencies prepare now to take advantage of future heavy precipitation events. Early pilot project efforts, like the Merced Project, will demonstrate the feasibility of capturing available high flows for groundwater recharge while minimizing flood risks, and provide insight to support further streamlining of this process.

Groundwater basins serve as the state’s water savings account and are intended to provide a reliable water source when we have less rain and snowmelt. As weather patterns have become more variable and extreme from the effects of climate change, resulting in more frequent and consequential droughts and high flow events, replenishment of depleted groundwater basins is an essential part of California’s long-term water resilience and drought mitigation efforts. Significant expansion of groundwater recharge projects such as the Merced Project will be required to support environment, agricultural uses, and ability to withstand future droughts. ★

Shelter/Weather Respite for Unhoused

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County has moved its evacuation shelter/weather respite for unhoused guests to Cal Expo (1600 Exposition Blvd., Building 8) as of Thursday, Jan. 12.

This location has cots, blankets, water, and snacks for guests, as well as crates for pets.

In addition to serving as an evacuation center, Cal Expo is welcoming unhoused individuals in search of weather respite from throughout the County through partnerships with the City of Sacramento, 2-1-1 Sacramento, and community-based outreach organizations

Additional locations will be opened as needed.

The County of Sacramento activated its motel voucher weather respite program ahead of the original storm on New Year’s

Eve and is currently sheltering more than 350 people.

In addition, the County increased capacity at its North A Shelter on Dec. 31 and will welcome new guests as beds are vacated. This location will accommodate pets.

The Outreach and Engagement Center (3615 Auburn Blvd.) opened as a 24-hour weather respite center as of Wednesday, Jan. 4. Walk-ups are accepted, and families and pets are welcome.

The North Fifth shelter lobby (700 North Fifth St.) is operating from 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. It also will accept walk-ups. (Please note that North Fifth is for adults only and is unable to accommodate pets.)

People can use SacRT light rail and buses for free to go to and from any weather-respite location. The SacRT light rail station at Watt/I-80 station connects to bus Route 1, which has a stop near the City’s OEC. ★

How to Report Property Damage

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Severe storms have caused widespread damage, flooding, and power outages across the Sacramento region. The Sacramento County Office of Emergency Services (OES) needs help from residents who sustained property damage in assessing the full extent of storm damage. These reports will be used to determine when and where a Local Assistance Center (LAC) may be established.

A LAC is activated following major disasters to support residents and businesses that have suffered disaster-related losses or damages. It provides recovery direction, assistance and resources to residents when recovering from a disaster.

Before the LAC can be stood up, a

decision must be made regarding location. This will be determined based on where the most storm damage occurred. To report damage to homes or businesses within Sacramento County go to, <https://report-ca-sacramento.orion-central.com/>. All information will be sent to OES and reported to State and Federal emergency response agencies. This is not the same as a report for insurance.

County OES is coordinating with all local partners to collect public property damage assessments and are preparing to deploy assessment teams to identify and document areas impacted by storm damage.

To report downed trees on public property and roads, call 311 or go to <https://311.saccounty.gov/>. You can also report flooded roads to 311. ★

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
