

BDOG Big Deal for Local Causes

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Local non-profits were big winners in the May 6 Big Day of Giving. Many achieved support that surpassed their hopes.

Choreographed by the Sacramento Region Community Foundation, the 24-hour giveathon this year helped 718 organizations and raised a record \$13.4 million. Since the 2013 inception of this annual appeal, public philanthropy has helped Sacramento, Yolo, El Dorado and Placer County charities to the tune of \$78 million.

Effie Yeaw Nature Center's total—almost \$70,000—exceeded last year's results by \$3000. Administered by the American River Natural History Association, Effie Yeaw programs are funded solely through donor

support. The Center was hard-hit when the pandemic cancelled most income-generating programs. "We were thrilled the community stepped up," said ARNHA president Laurie Weir. "Our membership has increased, and we saw more generosity from businesses and corporations." The center's BDOG appeal was boosted by large donations from Carmichael's Clark, Kennedy, Getz, Ahders and Halnan families.

Carmichael Parks Foundation set a goal of \$20,000 and topped that dream by more than \$5000. This total includes a \$10,000 gift from the Borman family. Two BDOG incentive prizes also rewarded the group. "Our supporters set alarms and gave online between 4 and 5 am," explained president Sue Boucher. "In that hour, we raised \$4008 and

got an Early Dog Prize of \$500." The Foundation provides park beautification and youth program scholarships.

Eighty donors gave the Carmichael Kiwanis Club \$18,377. "Over (pandemic) years, we've had to cancel fundraisers," said Kiwanian Virginia Stone. "BDOG results allow us to continue community giving until our fundraising gets back to normal."

Kids helping Kids is a student-run nonprofit at Del Campo High School. The teenagers' total \$1167 for children in need included a check from Supervisor Rich Desmond. District 3's leader also gave to Effie Yeaw Nature Center, Carmichael HART, Carmichael Parks Foundation, the California Aerospace Museum, Fair Oaks Rotary and Sacramento Fine Arts Center—among other regional gifts.

New Wine, Spirits Bottle Recycling Bill Clears

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Senate voted on May 25, 2022, unanimously to approve legislation written by Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins, D-San Diego, and co-written by Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, to add wine and distilled spirits bottles to California's recycling program.

"I am really pleased that so many of our Senate colleagues recognized the importance of this common sense bill that benefits our environment and consumers," Sen. Dodd said. "With SB 1013 we can increase the recycling rates of millions of bottles that would otherwise wind up in our landfills or be illegally discarded. I look forward to seeing this bill with all its benefits for California pass the Assembly and be signed by Gov. Newsom."

"SB 1013 is historic change that is 40 years in the making," Pro Tem Atkins said. "I want to commend the wine industry, distilled spirits industry, environmental advocates, and other groups who have come together to support this landmark proposal. We will continue working with stakeholders as the bill moves through the Assembly to make sure remaining concerns are addressed, and then, hopefully, 2022 will be the year we can pop a cork and celebrate this overdue improvement to California's recycling law."

The California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act, established in 1986, encourages consumers to recycle beverage containers by requiring them to pay a deposit for eligible bottles. According to a 2019 report, curbside programs received approximately \$172 million from the so-called Bottle Bill in 2017, including \$15 million that is annually provided from the Beverage Container Recycling Fund.

Although the program includes beer, it does not include wine or spirits. It is estimated that California generates more than 500 million wine and spirits bottles each year, with less than 30% being recycled and over 300 million wine and spirits bottles going into landfills. Under Senate Bill 1013, wine and spirits bottles would be added to the program, leading to more recycling, increased business for recycling centers and reduced processing costs. The expansion would also cut greenhouse gas emissions

'The Greatest Del Campo Team in History'

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Following one swing of the bat, the Del Campo High School varsity baseball team found itself trailing 2-0 to top-seeded Vanden in the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division III Championship game.

For the Cougars (29-5, 13-2 Capital Athletic League), this was just another day at the office. Nearly all season long, Del Campo responded each time its opponents' scored, including Wednesday night

at Sacramento City College's Union Stadium. The "Cardiac" Cougars scored two runs in the fourth and eighth innings, respectively, en route to the team's first section title since 2018, winning 4-2 in eight innings.

"This is the greatest Del Campo team in history," said coach Kevin Dawidczik. "I know there's a lot of teams maybe that would contest that because of the great teams we've had. I'm not saying the greatest talented team ever in Del Campo. But we're 29-5, we're the Division III section champions and we're going

to the NorCal Finals."

Del Campo came into the final series of the regular season against Christian Brothers (8-18, 6-9) on May 2 needing a sweep to clinch the Capital Athletic League (CAL) Championship, and the team did exactly that.

Led by Dawidczik, the Cougars parlayed a 3-2 walk-off win in the first game into a dominant series sweep of the Falcons, concluding on May 6. Trailing by one run with three outs remaining and a league

title essentially on the line, the “Cardiac” Cougars answered as they have all season, scoring twice in the last half inning to secure the series opener. Del Campo won game two 11-1 and game three 11-4 to clinch the CAL title.

The No. 2 seeded Cougars rolled through the first two rounds of single-elimination postseason play at home, defeating No. 15 Florin (17-11, 11-4 Greater Sacramento) 11-1 on May 10 and No. 10 Ponderosa (18-13, 11-7 Foothill Valley) 11-4 two days later.

The semifinals of the 2022 CIF SJS D3 Baseball Playoffs are where tempers began to flare, and not between players. Del Campo faced off against No. 6 Buhach Colony (24-9, 9-3 Central California) of Atwater in a best of three series. Game one was played at Del Campo on May 16.

Both teams scored once in the fourth inning. The Thunder thought they retook the lead on a solo home run in the top of the fifth. However, the base runner failed to step on first base. Dawidczik noticed the mistake and had his defense tag first base before bringing it to the umpires’ attention. Buhach Colony was called out, subsequently angering the team’s coach Joseph Medeiros and fans that traveled over 120 miles to attend the game.

Frustrations temporarily subsided as the game continued. Each team scored one run in the sixth, keeping the game deadlocked. Del Campo won the game in the bottom of the seventh inning on a walk off hit by senior infielder Tyler Moore to score junior outfielder Luke Tuter. The call at the plate was close, but umpire A.J. Spina ruled Tuter safe, immediately drawing Medeiros out of his dugout to contest the call.

The decision was upheld and the Cougars were victorious in game one, 3-2. Unfortunately, tempers began to flare in the parking lot postgame between the game’s officials and Buhach

Colony fans. In a video obtained by The Sacramento Bee, one of the fans is seen attempting to hit an umpire, leading to a brief physical altercation.

Following the incident, the CIF SJS initially ruled that Del Campo had to forfeit game one and the two remaining games would be played at neutral sites, rather than at Buhach Colony for game two and back in Fair Oaks for a potential third game. The CIF SJS made this ruling due to the Cougars having an “extra” batting practice session during school hours, as most of the team has physical education as their last class of the day. However, Dawidczik said he offered Medeiros and his team the same opportunity, therefore it was not an unfair advantage.

Following peaceful protests and appeals from the Del Campo community, the initial decision was overruled by the CIF. Subsequently, the Cougar’s game one win was restored, and the remaining two games were set to be played at the team’s home ballparks. The Thunder stormed back in game two, winning decisively 8-0 behind a no-hitter from senior pitcher Cooper Lanz.

It all came down to game three on Friday, May 20 with a spot in the section title game on the line. Del Campo opened the scoring with two runs in the bottom of the third inning and then added on one more in the fourth to get out to a 3-0 lead. Buhach Colony hit a two-run homer in the fifth inning, but their comeback attempt fell just short. Del Campo held on for the 3-2 win to advance to the CIF SJS D3 Baseball Championship game.

The Cougars took on No. 1 Vanden (29-5, 13-2 Monticello Empire) of Fairfield on Wednesday, May 25 at Sac City in the section title game. The Vikings, who were attempting to complete the rare 3-peat by winning section titles in football, basketball and baseball all the same year, took a 2-0 lead after the first inning. Senior designated

hitter Jake Tranchina blasted a two-run bomb to right field to give his team the early lead.

“We didn’t make the pitch we wanted to, I’ll tell you that much,” Dawidczik said. “But we turned the page and just made sure that we didn’t give up any more runs.”

Wednesday’s game shaped up to be a pitcher’s duel between Del Campo senior Hayden Hughes and Vanden senior Erick Diez. Each team had runners in scoring position in the next two innings but failed to bring the runners home. In the fourth inning, the Cougars got on the scoreboard.

With two outs, Del Campo got consecutive hits from seniors, catcher Logan McCord and third baseman Thomas Martinez. McCord scored on the double hit by Martinez. Junior infielder Robbie Perry tied the game with a single over Vanden third baseman Tyler James’ glove into left field, to score pinch runner, junior outfielder Tyler Walton.

Things appeared to be extremely grim for Del Campo in the bottom of the seventh inning as the first two Vanden hitters reached base on an error and a fielder’s choice, respectively, leading to Hughes being pulled from the game. With their season on the line, Dawidczik called upon senior and Sacramento State commit Jordan Jacobson to pitch and attempt to keep the game knotted at two.

“Jordan has been our guy for four years. He’s played in a section title game in 2019 so he knows what it takes to get the ball in certain tough situations,” Dawidczik said. “We just wanted to make sure that if we were going to lose, we were going to lose knowing that we had our next best guy out on the mound.”

Jacobson recorded the first out on a fielder’s choice, getting the lead runner at third base. The next batter popped out. The third and final out came on an emphatic punchout, as Jacobson got James to strike out swinging, leading to the large crowd of Del

Campo fans erupting with excitement as the game headed to extra innings. The Vikings were 90 feet from victory, as they left runners stranded on second and third base.

“Honestly, my mind was blank,” Jacobson said. “I had so much adrenaline going through my body. I was just so pumped up I literally had no thoughts in my head. The only thing I was thinking of is just find my spot and throw it as hard as I can. I had no doubt within myself. I had full confidence within myself and my defense.”

The “Cardiac” Cougars didn’t take long to score in the top of the eighth. After one out, McCord singled to left field and nearly advanced to second base after a Vanden error. In the next at bat, Martinez singled to right field as McCord advanced into scoring position. The Vikings attempted to throw McCord out at third, but the ball went out of play, allowing the runners to advance one base.

Senior outfielder Surreal Haro stepped up to the plate next and hit a double down the left field line to score the pinch runner Tuter and give his team an insurance run with a 4-2 lead.

“I had a lot of adrenaline going, I had to slow it down, so I did our little thing we do and just take a deep breath and slow it down,” Haro said. “I knew they were throwing me outside every time I went up so that’s what I had (with) my approach. They threw me an outside fastball (and I) drove it down the line to score that extra run.”

Martinez came on to pitch for Jacobson in the bottom half of the inning to close the game, and that’s exactly what he did. In the biggest game of the season, Dawidczik relied on three seniors to make or break it on the mound. It’s safe to say they made it.

Hughes pitched 6+ innings and allowed five hits, two earned runs, one walk and one stolen base with five strikeouts on 94 pitches. Jacobson earned the win by tossing one inning and allowing one

walk with one strikeout. Martinez earned the save by allowing one hit in one inning pitched.

Del Campo was led to the win offensively by it’s seniors as well. Martinez and McCord were each perfect at the plate, reaching base in all four appearances. Martinez recorded three hits (one double), one run scored, one RBI and one walk. McCord tallied two hits and two runs.

Following all the adversity the team has faced this season, on and off the field, the Cougars were able to rejoice and rush the field. For the first time since 2018 and the second time under Dawidczik, Del Campo is the CIF SJS D3 Champions.

“Me and the other seniors, we’ve been talking about this day since freshman year,” Jacobson said. “For this to finally happen, it’s just so surreal. (It) just puts a cherry on top to my high school career going into Sac State so that’s huge. Our season, we’re 29-5, we had a great season. We battled every game and we competed.”

For the fifth time in school history, the Cougars are section champions along with the teams from 1985, 1995, 2013 and 2018. The icing on the cake is that with the win, Del Campo was able to avenge it’s 9-8 loss to Vanden on March 8 in the third game of the season, which was the Cougars’ first loss. Del Campo has also won 16 of its last 17 games and gone 25-2 since beginning the season 4-3 overall.

“I’ve been talking about this since eighth grade when they won it last,” Haro said. “I’ve been dreaming of this since I came to this school, so it’s exciting.”


It was announced on Monday by the CIF that the Cougars will be moved up to Division I for the NorCal Baseball Championship. Del Campo is the No. 8 seed and played at five-time North Coast Section Champion De La Salle, who is the No. 1 seed. The Cougars played the Spartans in Concord on Tuesday afternoon. ★

Memorial Day Recalls Heroes BDOG Big Deal for Local Causes

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - War veterans and supporters stood firm during Carmichael Memorial Day Observances on Monday. The community tradition continued in its 20th year at the Earl J. Koobs Nature Area.

Though Memorial and Veterans Day visits were limited during two pandemic years, attendance swelled to normal numbers on Monday. More than 200 supporters – including Gold Star families, Kiwanis Club members and Boy Scouts—gathered for the service. Others watched a live-stream report on Facebook.

The crowd joined former USO

entertainer Miss Delta in “When Johnny Comes Marching Home Again.” Rock guitarist Todd Morgan led “This Land is Your Land.” Boy Scout bugler Edward Stach and Ray Cheever played Taps.

With the ringing of a bell, 15 heroes immortalized by a Koobs Nature Area plaque were named. The young men attended Carmichael’s La Sierra High School and died serving in Vietnam. They are: Robert D. Anderson, Mark W. Burchard, Robert S. Byner, Jerry Cowser, Kenneth R. Escott, Gary R. Field, Herbert Frenzell, Frank Thornburg, Ralph Guarienti, Larry H. Morford, Thomas C. Pigg, Randall B. Rainville, Kim Richins, Jeffrey Tharaldson and Robert A. Willis. ★

Nature lovers opened wallets wide. Placer Land Trust’s appeal yielded \$202,500. The American River Conservancy (El Dorado County) was enriched by \$39,600. The American River Parkway Foundation and Save the American River Association gained \$19,233 and \$11,000 respectively. Soil Born Farms—a Rancho Cordova enterprise that promotes sustainable food production—harvested \$22,000.

Yolo Food Bank achieved a record total of almost \$370,000. Orangevale/Fair Oaks Food Bank gained more than \$7,500. Carmichael’s Homeless Assistance Resources Team (HART) was aided by \$2200. Fair Oaks Rotarians raised \$8566.

Top regional beneficiaries included The Salvation Army (\$389,000); ACC Senior Services (more than \$296,000); Sacramento SPCA (\$203,000); Sacramento Food Bank (\$202,000).

Cap Radio topped the cultural leaderboard at more than \$212,500; the B Street Theatre raised \$157,200. Crocker Art Museum collected almost \$106,000. Patrons applauded

Fair Oaks Theater Festival’s appeal with \$13,000 in gifts. In North Highlands, California Aerospace Museum was refueled with a \$25,300 in support.

Children’s charities traditionally compel big BDOG responses. Kiwanis Family House banked almost \$132,000; Shriners Hospitals easily topped a \$100,000 goal; Sacramento Children’s Home collected over \$141,000.

“People responded to need,” confirmed Sacramento Region Community Foundation CEO Linda Beech Cutler. “This year we were concerned about inflation affecting people’s ability to give. But donors seem to realize that non-profits are critical. BDOG aims to make philanthropy possible for everyone, so we were delighted by 30,652 donations. Many were from first-time givers, with sums of between \$15 and \$50. Small amounts make a huge difference.”

by almost 200,000 tons of carbon dioxide while reducing litter of wine and spirits containers, a visible and dangerous component of urban litter pollution.

SB1013 is supported by a number of groups including Californians Against Waste, Heal the Bay, California Association of Local Conservation Corps, Monterey Regional Waste Management District, National Stewardship Action Council, Northern California Recycling Association,

California Teamsters Public Affairs Council, The 5 Gyres Institute, the Plastic Pollution Coalition and Zero Waste USA. It has no formal opposition.

It passed the Senate with unanimous, bipartisan support. It heads next to the Assembly.

Homicide Investigation on Late Night Party at Manzanita Avenue

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - On Saturday, May 28, 2022, at approximately 1:15 a.m., the Sacramento County Sheriff’s Office Communications Center received several separate calls regarding a shooting that occurred at

an apartment complex located on the 4400 block of Manzanita Avenue. The callers advised there was a large party at the location, and someone was lying on the ground after being shot.

Deputies responded to the complex and located a juvenile male suffering from at least one gunshot wound. Metro Fire pronounced the subject deceased at the scene.

Homicide Detectives and Crime Scene investigators responded to the scene, interviewed many witnesses and gathered evidence. No suspect or further information is available at this time.

The identity of the shooting victim will be released by the Sacramento County Coroner’s Office after identification and

notification of next of kin.



SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The 25th Annual Optimist High School Boys' Volleyball All-Star games are set for June 5, 2022.

Newsom, Legislators Given Stark Budget Warning

The Capitol is agog about Gov. Gavin Newsom's declaration that California will have a nearly \$100 billion budget surplus.

"You've never seen a number like this," Newsom told reporters as he unveiled his revised 2022-23 budget proposal.

Nearly half of the surplus must, by law, go to schools. The governor and legislative leaders are now busily negotiating how to spend the other \$52 billion. They agree on giving a big chunk of it back to Californians but are arguing over how much and who will get the checks and/or cash cards.

However, the Legislature's own budget advisor, Gabe Petek, is warning the politicians that they should be very careful because the budget could be in big trouble in the years ahead. If they ignore his advice, there could be a fiscal meltdown of epic proportions.

Petek believes that the governor's revenue estimates — on which the huge surplus estimate is based — could be too optimistic because he ignores a very real threat of recession. Petek also faults the governor's budget for ignoring long-term effects

of the Gann Limit, a constitutional provision that imposes tight controls on revenue windfalls.

"Although predicting the next recession is impossible," Petek says in a report released on Tuesday, "economic indicators currently suggest a heightened risk of recession within two years. Past recessions — with the exception of the one induced by the pandemic — have resulted in cumulative revenue losses of tens of billions of dollars. In two recent recessions, in fact, total revenue losses were around \$100 billion."

"Under our estimates of revenue and spending in the out-years, the state would have a very narrow operating deficit in 2023-24, a small operating surplus in 2024-25, and a larger operating deficit in 2025-26," Petek says.

Although Newsom's budget makes passing reference to the possibility of recession, it assumes that the state's recovery from the pandemic-caused downturn will continue to be strong, and thus will generate a strong flow of revenues.

Petek reserves his sharpest criticism, however, for the budget's lack of a plan to cope with the effects of the Gann Limit. Once the calculated limit is reached, any revenue beyond that point must be either returned to taxpayers or spent on a few exempt categories.

"These requirements would far exceed the state's narrow operating surpluses — and would compound operating deficits," Petek notes, adding that without corrective action "the state likely would have

significant budget shortfalls in the out-years."

As drafted, Newsom's budget avoids triggering the Gann Limit in 2022-23 by clever accounting, but Petek warns that it's likely to hit home within the next few years, forcing Newsom — assuming he's re-elected this year — and the Legislature to reduce spending on other programs to meet Gann Limit requirements.

Although Newsom and legislative leaders have indicated they may ask voters to repeal or modify the Gann Limit's stringent requirements, "In the meantime, we strongly caution the Legislature against passing a budget with a structural deficit stemming from unaddressed State Spending Limit (Gann Limit) requirements," Petek says.

He suggests that one way to make the budget more resilient to both recession and Gann Limit requirements is to devote more of the surplus to reserves, which would mean spending less of it on things that the governor and legislators want, such as a massive election year give-back of cash to voters.

"Economic indicators point to a recession on the horizon within the next two years, not three-to-four years from now," Petek warns. "The state has a \$52 billion surplus this year — now is the time to prepare for these looming budget problems."



Senator Pan Joins Public Health Advocates for the PublicHERO Initiative

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - State Senator and Health Committee chair Dr. Richard Pan joined California Can't Wait, a coalition of public health officials, local public health leaders, frontline workers, and health equity advocates for a virtual press conference urging Governor Newsom and state lawmakers to dedicate a small fraction of the state's \$97 billion budget surplus to one-time Public Health Equity Readiness Opportunity (PublicHERO) initiative investments. The public health and equity advocates said on top of boosting the state's annual commitment to core, local public health services, California must dedicate one-time funds to recruit, retain, educate and train the next generation of public health workers to respond to existing and emerging public health threats.

"I want to thank Governor Newsom for his commitment for \$300M annually for public health departments for ensuring that we build our public health infrastructure. With the emergence of a suspected case of monkeypox in Sacramento County from an individual who recently returned from traveling abroad in Europe, it is a good reminder of the critical work that our public health and medical professionals do daily to keep our community safe and healthy from infectious

diseases," said Dr. Richard Pan, California State Senator and Chair of the Senate Committee on Health. "Beyond the \$300M the Governor is proposing, we need to also help shore up our existing workforce. Well-funded and fully staffed public health departments equipped with necessary viral surveillance and testing tools help us quickly identify emerging health threats, and isolate infectious individuals, helping protect life and treat people resulting in the best possible health outcomes."

The California Can't Wait Coalition stressed the urgency to rebuild California's local public health workforce after the pandemic exposed how a decade of disinvestment in local public health departments left them understaffed, under-resourced and underprepared to protect and save lives. Historic underfunding coupled with stress, burnout, and harassment during the pandemic has had a significant impact on the public health workforce and is projected to cause additional public health workers to leave their field. In fact, the recent de Beaumont Foundation and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey of nearly 45,000 state and local public health workers found that:

More than half of public health employees report at least one symptom of post-traumatic stress disorder; Many public

health workers, especially executives, report bullying, threats, and harassment; and, nearly 1 in 3 public health employees say they are considering leaving their organization within the next year

On a call with news reporters today, Kim Saruwatari, Public Health Director of Riverside County, said her county has been unable to hire a public health lab director, preventing an expansion of crucial public health services to protect the health and well being of their communities.

"We do not have enough qualified public health lab directors to meet the demand that exists today let alone when we look forward to our aging workforce that may be retiring and moving on," said Kim Saruwatari, CHEAC President and Riverside County Public Health Director. "Our public health labs are critical and often unknown to the public. They play a critical role in our day to day operations and emergency response. We have to be able to recruit and retain lab directors, public health microbiologists, public health nurses, and all of our public health positions so we can protect and serve the public."

Dr. Karen Relucio, President of the Health Officers Association of California and Public Health Officer in Napa County said California is experiencing an exodus of public health staff that has gutted local public health and must dedicate resources in development

of our public health workforce pipeline.

"Sixty-two local public health officials in California's cities and counties have left their positions since the start of the pandemic. This includes 21 health officers, 20 agency directors, and 21 local health department directors," said Dr. Karen Relucio, Public Health Officer in Napa County. "This great resignation has affected more than just senior leadership and has gutted the public health workforce from top to bottom. In order to sustain public health operations, it is more important than ever to invest in public health workforce pipelines and workforce development to attract future public health staff and future public health leaders and to retain the staff that we have."

Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California said the Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey demonstrates why California must invest in the PublicHERO initiative.

"Nearly 1 in 3 public health employees say they are considering leaving their organization within the next year. This highlights why we need our PublicHERO initiative," said Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California. "We continue to call on state lawmakers and Governor Newsom to dedicate resources to our Public HERO

Initiative to develop our workforce pipeline to ensure local public health departments have the capacity to respond to public health threats and deliver on the promise of health equity."

The news conference took place a day after Sacramento County officials announced the first suspected case of monkeypox in California. Officials emphasized that while the disease presents a low risk to the public at this time, Sacramento County's swift response and work to educate the public illustrates why a robust public health workforce is essential. Public health response including testing and contract tracing as new communicable disease threats emerge keeps Californians safe.

In 2021, the California Can't Wait coalition successfully advocated for \$300 million in ongoing state funding to rebuild California's decimated public health infrastructure, a commitment that was kept in Governor Newsom's May Revision budget proposal this month. As scientists expect COVID-19 to become endemic and with the clear need to address the social determinants of health that led COVID to have such devastating impacts on communities of color, it's clear California must do more. The PublicHERO initiative would support the SMARTER plan to stay ready for future waves of COVID-19 and build the diverse pipeline of public health workers needed to address health disparities. ★

3. **Criminal Order:** If none of the orders includes a no-contact order, a domestic violence protective order issued in a criminal case takes precedence in enforcement over any conflicting civil court order. Any nonconflicting terms of the civil restraining order remain in effect and enforceable.

4. **Family, Juvenile, or Civil Order:** If more than one family, juvenile, or other civil restraining or protective order has been issued, the one that was issued last must be enforced.

SCPH Investigating Travel-Related Monkeypox Case

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Division of Public Health is investigating a case of monkeypox virus related to travel in Europe. Confirmation testing from CDC and CDPH is pending. Based on symptoms and preliminary testing, monkeypox confirmation is likely.

The patient is isolating at home and is not in contact with any other people. Risk to the general public is very minimal. The individual under investigation recently traveled to areas in Europe where cases of monkeypox have been confirmed.

Transmission of monkeypox virus occurs when a person comes into contact with the virus from an animal, human, or materials contaminated with the virus. The virus enters the body through broken skin (even if not visible), respiratory tract, or the mucous membranes (eyes, nose, or mouth). Respiratory droplets generally cannot travel more than a few feet, so prolonged face-to-face contact is required. Monkeypox is an extremely rare diagnosis

in the United States.

“This case appears to be related to recent travel to Europe,” said Dr. Olivia Kasiryre, Sacramento County Public Health Officer. “Public Health is working with CDPH to conduct contact tracing, and risk to the general public is extremely low.”

Monkeypox does not occur naturally in the United States and cases in the US are very rare. US cases are related to international travel or importing animals from areas where the disease is more common.

Symptoms of Monkeypox include fever, headache, muscle aches, backache, swollen lymph nodes, chills and exhaustion. Within 1-3 days (sometimes longer) after the appearance of fever, the patient develops a rash, often beginning on the face and then spreading to other parts of the body. The incubation period (time from infection to symptoms) for monkeypox is usually 7-14 days but can range from 5-21 days. The illness typically lasts for 2-4 weeks.

Man Pleads Guilty to COVID Relief Fraud, Embezzlement and Unemployment Fraud

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Aaron Ashcraft, 42, of Sacramento, pleaded guilty to one count of wire fraud and one count of bank fraud in a scheme to defraud the Paycheck Protection Program of over \$1.2 million in COVID-19 relief loans guaranteed by the Small Business Administration (SBA) under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, U.S. Attorney Phillip A. Talbert announced.

According to court documents, Ashcraft carried out the fraud scheme between May 2020 and April 2021. As part of his scheme, Ashcraft submitted to SBA-approved lenders at least seven fraudulent Paycheck Protection Program loan applications in the names of purported businesses. In the applications, Ashcraft falsely represented that each of the purported businesses had employees and monthly payroll expenses. To support the Paycheck Protection Program loan applications, Ashcraft submitted fabricated records including Internal Revenue Service forms, checking account statements, and payroll summaries. In total, Ashcraft requested over \$1.2 million in Paycheck Protection Program loans and obtained approximately \$920,000.

In addition to Paycheck Protection Program fraud, Ashcraft admitted that, from September 2017 through June 2020, he embezzled at least approximately

\$780,000 from his former employer – a street-sweeping company in Sacramento. Ashcraft held multiple positions at the company, including chief financial officer. As chief financial officer, Ashcraft had access to the company’s business credit card accounts. Without authorization, Ashcraft used those accounts to pay for personal expenses.

Finally, Ashcraft admitted to defrauding the Maine Department of Labor. According to his plea agreement, in July 2020, Ashcraft applied for Pandemic Unemployment Assistance, falsely claiming that he lived in Maine and was unable to work due to COVID-19. To support his application, Ashcraft submitted falsified IRS forms in which he represented that, in 2019, he operated a business in Maine that received over \$160,000 in income and made a net profit of over \$66,000. In total, Ashcraft fraudulently obtained unemployment compensation of over \$58,000.

As part of his plea agreement, Ashcraft agreed to pay restitution as follows:

A total of \$919,598 to three SBA-approved lenders; \$45,979 to the SBA; \$779,832 to his former employer; and \$58,050 to the Maine Department of Labor.

U.S. District Judge Kimberly J. Mueller is scheduled to sentence Ashcraft on Aug. 22, 2022. He faces up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine for wire fraud and up to 30 years in prison and a \$1 million fine for bank fraud. ★



Dave Ramsey Says

I'm Not Doing That

Dear Dave,
 My wife and I are empty nesters, and our house is too big for just the two of us now. We talked about selling the house and moving into an apartment in a multi-use development with retail and restaurants that we go to several times a week. Then, in a year or so, buying a smaller house when housing prices go back down. How do you feel about this idea?
 – Ephram

Dear Ephram,
 I like the idea of downsizing. My wife and I did the same kind of thing recently. But at this point,

I'd say there's about a 99% chance the housing market is not going down. It has gone down two times in the last 100 years – way back during the 1930s and again in 2008. And the market snapped back fairly fast after 2008.

I don't think the price of housing is going to go down at all anytime soon. I do believe the housing market's rate of increase will slow down, but that still kind of defeats your premise of renting until then. I wouldn't be opposed to you two buying a different property in the same area and just moving in, but I'm not going to tell you to go rent something right now. That would put you in a hole with the rental amount, plus the fact that housing prices are probably going to continue to rise, even if not at the pace they've risen recently. In other words, if you

rent, you're going to lose money two different ways – with the rental amount and home prices continuing to increase. Buying high and selling high isn't such a big deal. But buying high, and later buying higher after renting? No, I'm not doing that.
