CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - The Carmichael 4th of July Parade, which draws an average of 7000 attendees each year, will not be held this year. The Carmichael Elks Lodge has been its host and organizer since 1959, but Elks Lodge Secretary Jim Warrick said, "The COVID-19 closure of county buildings and offices made the permits required for large crowds

inaccessible during the shutdown, making the timing unfortunate."

Warrick said that county permits for large social gatherings require at least one month of prior approval, and the decision needed to be made during the uncertain time the county was in shutdown. With the extra-cautionary concern of many local and state institutions to give the approval to large public gatherings, and their necessary social distancing, the Elks Lodge decided not to press on.

"Because the parade is such an important holiday event in Carmichael, and the state was

starting to reopen, a lot of people had been inquiring about whether or not the 4th of July Parade would be held," said Warrick. "But now, during the distinct reopening phases, things keep changing on a daily basis, and the best and safest thing we can do is plan for the future. These things, like the virus, happen and they are not to blame. For us it was mainly a timing issue."

Protecting Sacramento County Seniors

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - COVID-19 has profoundly impacted all of our lives. As we isolate from those closest to us – family, friends, neighbors and colleagues – for older people living in the community or in long-term care settings, the trials are even greater. Social isolation is one of the greatest risk factors for elder abuse.

In California, elder abuse is significantly underreported. For every case of elder or dependent adult abuse known to agencies, 24 are unknown. June is observed as National Elder and Dependent Adult Abuse Awareness Month, a state-wide effort to increase awareness of elder and dependent adult abuse and to increase reporting of suspected abuse, not only in the month of June but all year long.

There are numerous forms of maltreatment and abuse, such as: physical, sexual, emotional and financial abuse, as well as neglect and abandonment. Elder and dependent adult abuse does not discriminate. Any adult 65 years and older or an adult between the ages of 18 to 65 that requires extra care due to physical or mental limitations can be a victim.

"Social isolation can be difficult for seniors even in the best of times," said Ruth MacKenzie. "We have to help our seniors feel connected especially during COVID-19 and make sure they have access to available local services so they can stay healthy and safe. Staying connected, phoning older adults, checking on an older neighbor, writing a card or letter, can all be positive steps to ensure public safety and social justice."

Seniors are in the highest risk for severe complications from COVID-19, during this challenging time, Sacramento County APS wants to emphasize that there are resources that are available in this time of need and uncertainty.

Sacramento County has a 24-hour hotline for reporting abuse of older adults and disabled adults who may be physically or financially abused, neglected or exploited. The local APS number is (916) 874-9377. To report suspected abuse of an elder in a nursing home, residential care facility for the elderly or assisted living facility, contact the State CRISIS line: 1-800-231-4024. To report abuse in all long-term care facilities, call: Ombudsman Services of Northern California at (916) 376-8910. ★

District Attorney Announces Crime Lab Youth Shadow Days

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert announces open registration for the 3rd Annual Crime Lab Youth Shadow Days. This program is being offered virtually for the first time this year.

The Crime Lab Youth Shadow Day was launched in 2018, and quickly exceeded capacity. A second day was added to meet the high demand, resulting in a total of 120 student participants from approximately 50 high schools across the county.

Participating students will visit the District Attorney's Crime Lab virtually and meet criminalists who are experts in the various fields of forensic science and crime scene investigations (CSI). They are provided a virtual learning experience

in several areas including blood spatter analysis, bullet trajectory, trace evidence, firearms and tool comparison, and drug analysis.

There will be two virtual Crime Lab Youth Shadow Days this year:

WHEN: Friday, July 17,

OR Friday, July 24, 2020 ~ 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.

WHERE: Virtually – broadcasted live from the District Attorney's Crime Lab

The program is open to current Sacramento County high school students. Priority will be

given to senior high school students.

Students will need to submit completed registration forms and a signed permission slip, which can be downloaded at www.sacda.org.

The deadline to apply is July 10, 2020. Space is limited to 60 students each day and on a first come, first served basis. Please register early.

DA Anne Marie Schubert states, "Our goal with all of our youth programs is to engage and educate our youth as well as inspire them to pursue a career in the criminal justice field, including forensic science which is a critical factor in most criminal cases. I am pleased we are able to continue this program virtually – keeping students, our staff and their families healthy and safe in this time of social distancing."

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Northern California's three major fireworks distributors - TNT, Phantom and Discount Fireworks Superstore - are going big this season in hopes to release the inner Uncle Sam and Lady Liberty from within a population feeling blue over a topsy-turvy world dealing with a pandemic and pandemonium.

Believing that the joy of fireworks will help shake the blues by adding red and white in honor of America's 244th birthday, these

companies are rolling out a record 24 new fireworks in the Golden State this season - nearly double the previous mark. The 2020 freshman class also includes one new limited-edition assortment, and never has there been more buy one get one free and mix and match deals to woo buyers.

That's a lot of shapes, sizes, colors and prices among the rookie lineup, and while variety usually bodes well for fundraising non-profits running the stands, perplexed consumers will ponder the obvious questions: What's new? What's loud? What's unique?

How long does it last? What gives me the most bang for my buck?

Help has arrived. Our annual and unbiased fireworks buyers guide has reviews of the new items and the very best of the returning rest. For the 19th year, new fireworks are graded on a 5-star scale, judged on performance, duration, distinctiveness and value.

Promotions are noted where applicable. Every Phantom firework this season is a buy one get one; the freebie can be the same item or any firework of like or lesser price. TNT is countering with its own mix and match deals

plus limited-edition items in commemoration of the company's centennial anniversary of selling fireworks. DFS, which TNT took over in California last year, save for a handful of locations up in the Redwood Coast, tends to have lower prices overall and a wider range of brands.

A star-spangled shoutout to the Sacramento Fire Department for cooperation with this season's test. Special thanks to Fire Marshal Jason Lee and Capt. Keith Wade.

NEW FOR 2020



CENTENNIAL FOUNTAIN XL (TNT), \$60 - Burn time is shorter than most 500-gram finales at this price point, but this special-edition fountain proves that duration is sometimes overrated. Wows with a mesmerizing mélange of effects and medley of transitions - droplets to fish to crackle to birthday cake to a shock-and-awe eruption. Here for this season only. 80 seconds. ★★★★★

COLORAMA (DFS), \$52.99 - Pretty droplets of gold, orange, green and red, and a strong crackling finish aren't enough to compensate for slow tube-to-tube transitions and an uneven performance. 110 seconds. ★★★

CAPTAIN NUCLEAR FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$49.99 FOR TWO - Decent crackling sparks mixed with pearls, chrysanthemums, multi-colored glitter and flowers build to a less than satisfying climax. 80 seconds. ★★

LIVING THE DREAM (TNT), \$49.99 - Like ordering TNT's exquisitely named Wild Side (see Best of the Rest) and saying, "make it a double." 500 grams get you two awesome minutes of super-charged crackles, though at a dear price. 120 seconds. ★★★★★

FIERY MEADOW FLOWER FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$49.99 FOR TWO - Proving that hybrid fireworks often make for big crowd pleasers is this combo fountain-wheel featuring titanium crackles and spinning finale. On a smooth surface, the centrifugal force makes this unique rookie rotate. 68 seconds. ★★★★★

FLOWER PATCH KIDS (TNT), \$40 FOR TWO - The first few seconds are absolutely gorgeous with deep red droplets that produce the prettiest start of any California firework. The rest of the flowers in this patch aren't nearly as beautiful. 77 seconds. ★★

TAKE A HIT (TNT), \$40 FOR TWO - Love the rarely seen lavender droplets and nice palms, but this batter got two bases on a bloop single and error. 75 seconds. ★★

JUNGLE FLOWER (TNT), \$39.99 - The intense crackle and vivid colors are pleasing. Just wished it had a more exciting overall and longer performance for the price. 49 seconds. ★★

PINK ICE (TNT), \$30 FOR TWO - Nice to see pink, but blink and you miss it. And what's with the 10-second delay between tubes? 26 seconds. ★

REVOLUTION (TNT), \$30 FOR TWO - You say you want a revolution? Not sure even Paul and Ringo would want this disappointingly short newcomer despite loud three whistles and crackling pink and blue sparks. 34 seconds. ★★

WAR FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$29.99 FOR TWO - Colors change with each stage of fiery crackles. Great duration and intensity. 82 seconds. ★★★★★

FLOWER POT FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$29.99 FOR TWO - Low-noise fountain enralls with multicolored droplets against a near-constant shower of silver glitter. Use of blob-producing nitrocellulose reduces burn time. Worth it. 52 seconds. ★★★★★



TNT TORCH (TNT), \$24.99 - Judge this mundane-looking firework by its cover and you'll miss out on beautiful - no, *beguiling* - shimmering golden stars reminiscent of cones from the early '70s. This pyro's pyrotechnic earns "Best New Firework" honors. 72 seconds. ★★★★★

COSMIC VELOCITY FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99 FOR TWO - Intense crackling fountain with pretty reds and greens, but needs BOGO promo to offset fleeting duration. 52 seconds. ★★

GALACTIC RADIANCE FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99 FOR TWO - Sub-minute burn time isn't cool, but rest of this colorful crackle-crazy fountain is. 46 seconds. ★★

ELECTRIC MANIPULATION FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99 FOR TWO - What's dubbed as a "silky blue explosion" in the second half makes up for an unimpressive opening of standard crackles and colors. 53 seconds. ★★

SAVAGE FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99 FOR TWO - While there's titanium crackle fountains more savage than this, newcomer satisfies with various spark types of red, white, gold, silver and green. 70 seconds. ★★★★★

SPARKLE BERRY (TNT), \$19.99 - Cavalcade of color changes to crackling frenzy after a piercing whistle at the 40-second mark. 65 seconds. ★★

FLARING STARS FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$15.99 FOR TWO - Virtually noiseless beauty featuring swarming fish effect in red, gold and green. Shorter version of Phantom's late great Flying Stars. 54 seconds. ★★★★★

OLD GLORY (DFS), \$15.38 FOR TWO - Veteran TNT fountain debuts in California rebranded as a Freedom item. Colorful and crackly, but there's better out there. 49 seconds. ★★

TOXIC BARREL (TNT), \$12.99 - Green toxic sludge blobs and loud crackles make this a freaky rookie sensation even with the fleeting duration. It's your "Best New Firework" runner-up. 45 seconds. ★★★★★

CENTENNIAL FOUNTAIN (TNT), \$12 - Good height, crackle, color and burn time for the price. Bummer it's only here for TNT's 100th anniversary of fireworks sales. 77 seconds. ★★★★★

KOOL KAT (TNT), \$9 FOR TWO - Billed as a new firework, it's actually a rewrap of Cool Breeze that debuted last season and is being sold at closeout prices. 43 seconds. ★

TORNADO GROUND SPINNER (PHANTOM), \$3.99 FOR TWO PACKAGES OF 6 - Spinning novelty sounds like fun, but if using the Enhanced Fujita Scale for tornadoes, this cyclone gets a rating of EF0. Buy a pack of ground bloom flowers instead. 3 seconds. ★

ALSO NEW FOR 2020 ... CENTENNIAL ASSORTMENT (TNT), \$110.99 - The only new state-approved assortment this season features 15 respectable fountains named after oldies but goodies and clad in retro labels. Limited-time item commemorates the 100th year of fireworks sold by the Alabama-based company that would become TNT. Best in the box: Big Bomb, Freedom, Red Devil and Ace fountains. ★★★★★

SMUD Receives State Leadership in Clean Energy Award

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - SMUD announced that it has received a State Leadership in Clean Energy award for its first-of-a-kind Energy StorageShares program from the Clean Energy State Alliance for its advancement in clean energy technology solutions.

SMUD's Energy StorageShares program is an innovative program that enables eligible commercial customers to make an up-front investment in battery storage in exchange for an on-bill credit for a 10-year term. SMUD bundles the investments with its own capital and installs battery storage in a high-value location that provides significant grid benefits.

The bill credit reflects the demand charge savings the customer would have received from an on-site battery. The program provides guaranteed savings to the customer without impacting their business operations, creating maintenance obligations, or requiring physical space at their business for a battery system. The economies of scale significantly reduce the cost of battery energy storage, as it is much less expensive to install a large battery system than to install multiple smaller batteries. The program benefits all SMUD customers by reducing demand on the grid and using battery storage to address the locational needs of the entire electrical grid. "We are excited to have developed a program that offers benefits to our customers and enhances our grid at the same time," said Rachel Huang, director of Energy Strategy, Research and Development. "A program like this lets us partner with our customers to move towards a carbon-free economy."

Electrify America LLC is the largest open DC fast charging network in the U.S. and is investing \$2 billion over 10 years in Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) infrastructure, education and access.

Electrify America was the first company to take advantage of the program and invested \$1.3 million to reduce demand charges and help advance electric vehicle infrastructure deployment. Demand charges are presently the largest operating cost barrier to public EV infrastructure deployment, representing up to 80 percent of a given electricity bill. The program's first utility-scale battery will be a 4-megawatt battery deployed in a grid constrained area in 2021. In addition to the grid benefit, the battery will also provide an opportunity for education and training for SMUD and non-SMUD employees to further workforce development advancement in emerging low-carbon technologies.

SMUD was one of six companies to receive the award from a panel of independent judges.

"There is tremendous clean energy leadership and creativity taking place at the state level," said CESA Executive Director Warren Leon. "The 2020 State Leadership in Clean Energy Award winners are tackling major clean energy challenges, including bringing the benefits of clean energy to low- and moderate-income communities, paving the way for large-scale offshore wind development, reducing emissions in the agricultural sector, and developing new business models for emerging technologies like energy storage."

Once Again the Budget Prolongs State's Financial Problems

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Legislature passed its version of the state budget, a framework that increases taxes and relies on subsidies from the federal government. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), Vice Chairman of the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee, issued the following statement:

"This budget does not solve the state's financial problems." It prolongs

the crisis, thereby, delaying and deepening the economic pain for Californians, especially those in need of state services."

"We need to cut spending now. It is irresponsible to give schools and recipients of state programs false hope that the federal government (i.e. federal taxpayers) will bail out the State of California.

"Employers - especially small businesses - have had to bear the brunt of this pandemic. Businesses are finally re-opening, many at

limited capacity. Under this budget, there is another \$4 billion in taxes heaped upon them for next year. How can they afford to stay open?"

Elected to the State Senate in January 2013, Senator Nielsen represents the Fourth Senate District, which includes the counties of Butte, Colusa, Glenn, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Tehama and Yuba. SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On June 17, 2020 at approximately 8:55 pm, The California Highway Patrol (CHP) received a call of a vehicle vs. a

CHP motorcycle officer on I-80 Eastbound at the Watt Avenue overcrossing. Other CHP units responded to the traffic collision and discovered a Chevrolet S-10 Extreme had collided with Officer Arroyo's, ID 19090 CHP patrol motorcycle. Officer Arroyo was immediately taken to a nearby hospital for major injuries sustained in the collision. The solo driver of the Chevrolet (Ulises Emmanuel Briones-Rodriguez, age 36, out of Sacramento) fully cooperated with CHP investigators and was subsequently arrested for suspicion of driving under the influence of alcohol.

The cause of the collision is still under investigation. Prior to the collision, Officer Arroyo was running a traffic break for a hazard on the freeway in the area. Officer Arroyo sustained major injuries as a result of the collision, however is in stable and alert condition while he recovers.

USE ONLY SAFE & SANE FIREWORKS

Because of risk of fire danger, please only use those fireworks that have been certified as "safe and sane" when celebrating this year's Independence Day.

Dangerous illegal fireworks like aerial shells and other flying devices pose a significant fire hazard, potentially allowing sparks to fall onto roofs and dry brush. If you are aware about illegal fireworks being used, please call the Sheriff via the non-emergency number 916-874-5115 or if an

emergency situation exists dial 911.

Penalties for possessing illegal fireworks start with five days in county jail – and the sanctions increase if the fireworks were actually used, or if child endangerment occurred.

Even "safe and sane" fireworks can pose a hazard if abused or not exercised with good judgment. Fire officials advise that you should set off fireworks far from dry grass or vegetation, and soak used fireworks in water.

PARKWAY ALCOHOL BAN

This Fourth of July there will be a complete ban on alcohol consumption and possession both on land and in the water within the American River Parkway between Hazel and Watt avenues. An exception exists for Ancil Hoffman Golf Course in Carmichael.

In past years summer holidays had become major problems along the American River making the parkway less of a family friendly outing because of fights, public nudity, profanity and littering. The Board of Supervisors restored decorum beginning with the 2006 Labor

Day weekend and the ban is also applicable for Memorial Day weekend.

Since the restriction has taken effect, families I have talked to have expressed appreciation for making these holidays once again a time for everyone to enjoy the American River Parkway.

PROTECT YOUR PETS

Please remember fireworks can be very stressful for your pet possibly causing fear and anxiety.

Sadly, the volume of missing pets significantly increases during the Fourth of July holiday. Leaving a pet outside unattended even in a fenced yard or on a chain can lead to disastrous consequences. In their fear, pets who normally would not leave the yard may escape and become lost, or become entangled in their chain, risking injury or death.

And please make sure your pets are wearing identification tags so if they become lost, they can be returned home promptly.

Fatal Traffic Collision on I-5 Southbound South of Powerline Road

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On June 19, 2020 at approximately 12:37 am, The California Highway Patrol (CHP) received a call of a wrong way driver traveling northbound in the southbound lanes of I-5, south of Powerline Road. At approximately 12:42 am, the wrong way driver collided with another vehicle traveling on I-5 southbound just south of Powerline Road. CHP units responded to the traffic collision and discovered a Honda Accord was traveling on I-5 southbound when it collided head on with the wrong way vehicle (Subaru Outback) just south of Powerline Road. The 60 year-old male driver of the Honda Accord, from

Beiber, California, and the 49 year-old male driver of the Subaru Outback, from Sonoma, California, were pronounced deceased at the scene of the collision. Price Controls Would Prevent COVID-19 Medicine

America's biopharmaceutical industry dwarfs most other economic sectors. It's one of our nation's single biggest job creators, supporting close to a million positions across the country. And its products save countless lives each year.

Yet for some reason, politicians in both parties seem determined to snuff it out by imposing crippling price

controls on medicines. That would be a disaster for employees and patients alike.

The industry has been an economic behemoth for decades. It contributes more to GDP than the agricultural and utility industries combined. The total value of the goods and services directly produced by drug firms totaled \$560 billion in 2017, according to a new report from TEconomy Partners. And after factoring in the output from drug companies' vendors and other partners, that figure exceeds \$1.1 trillion.

The industry also generates millions of high-paying jobs. Drug companies directly employed more than 811,000 Americans and indirectly supported over 3 million others in 2017. A

third of those jobs are coveted science, technology, engineering, and math positions – the occupations of the future. And average compensation in the industry exceeded \$126,500 per worker in 2017. That's more than twice the U.S. private sector average of \$60,700.

Of course, the industry isn't just an economic powerhouse. It's also the global leader in medical innovation, producing half of the world's new medicines. Right now, U.S. researchers are working on more than 4,500 new drugs.

Despite these successes, drug development remains an expensive and risky venture. The White House Council of Economic Advisors estimates the cost of developing a single new drug at \$2 billion. Firms

generally dedicate 15 to 20 percent of their revenues to drug development.

But now, some lawmakers want to weaken the industry responsible for this economic growth and medical innovation. The recent drug pricing bill passed by the House, H.R. 3, would empower the government to cap the price of 250 common brand-name drugs. The prices could not exceed 120 percent of the average prices paid in six other developed countries with government-dominated health systems, including Canada, France, and the United Kingdom.

These price controls would reduce drug companies' revenues by \$1 trillion over 10 years, according to the Congressional Budget Office. Based on the Council of Economic Advisors'

assumptions, that means firms will devote roughly \$200 billion less to research and development, resulting in 100 fewer new drugs over the next decade.

Meanwhile, the Senate Finance Committee is pushing its own price control bill. The legislation would bar companies from raising prices faster than the rate of inflation. And it would effectively levy taxes on drug companies by increasing their cost-sharing liability in Medicare's prescription drug benefit. All told, the bill would cost biopharmaceutical firms \$100 billion over the next 10 years.

Once these price controls, taxes, and other penalties begin depleting their revenue, firms will curtail research and development – and thus lay off American

workers. According to a recent poll, 45 percent of drug firms said that "significant" reductions in research and development could force immediate job cuts and facility closures.

Let's hope our leaders in Washington reconsider proposals that would cripple one of America's largest and most innovative industries – and leave patients without the lifesaving drugs they need.
