CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - The 42nd annual food festival at Carmichael's Congregation Beth Shalom promises fine Jewish cooking on Sunday, September 15.

A fall tradition in Arden/Carmichael, the event is held in and outside the synagogue. Food may be preordered, purchased to

eat on site or taken home.

Lox and bagel breakfasts are a draw for early birds. Lunch includes matzo ball soups and stuffed cabbage rolls. Culinary booths will also offer falafels, pitas, hummus, kosher hot dogs and barbecued brisket. Pastries, coffee cakes and kosher babka are much anticipated desserts. While many of the promised treats are prepared locally, other are shipped from famous Jewish delis in Los Angeles, Berkeley and Oakland.

A bakery section offers specialty breads. Food may be pre-ordered, eaten on site or taken home. Sales start at 9 am and continue till 3pm.

Nonprofit Operation Provides Backpacks for 7,800 Area School Children

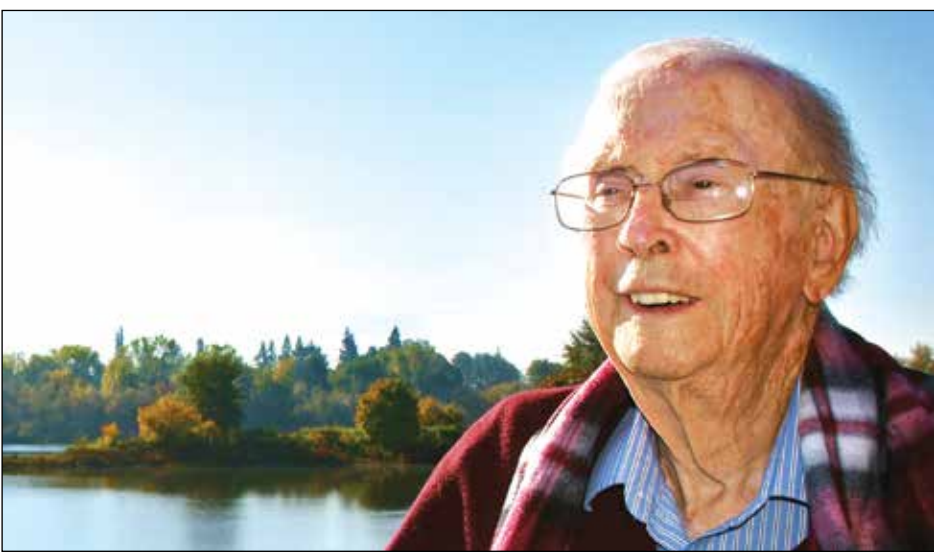
River Icon Peter Hayes Dies

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Career journalist and sage of the American River, Peter Hayes died of natural causes last week. He was 93.

After childhood years in Vancouver, Canada, he and his family emigrated to Seattle. Hayes graduated in journalism from the University of Washington and took a job with United Press. Working at its Anchorage bureau, he met and married an Anchorage

Arden Hills Locals Qualify for U.S. Open

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - JMG Tennis at Arden Hills is proud to announce

two rising star tennis players from their program - Jenson (JT) Brooksby and Katie Volynets - are competing on an international level in the U.S. Open.

In the U.S. Open

qualification first round, Brooksby (age 18) beat Kaichi Uchida (ranked #256) in straight sets then went on to beat Yuichi Sugita of Japan (ranked #134) in a hard fought

second round match. Then, Jenson qualified for the main draw by defeating Pedro Martinez (ranked #153). After qualifying, Jenson had the biggest win of his career by defeating Thomas Berdych in the first round of the U.S. Open. Berdych is currently ranked #101 in the world and is a former top five player. Jenson trains with JMG Tennis Academy and has been with Arden Hills since 2013. He is the number one high school recruit in the country and has committed to play for Baylor University.

Katie Volynets (age 17), who has been training with JMG Tennis at Arden Hills for the past six months, recently won the Girls 18s

'Green Lights Initiative': Seeing the Light on Bulb Disposal

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Recycling at home or work has become part of our daily routine, but one ubiquitous device that still raises questions over disposal is light bulbs. Do they go out with the normal trash? Get tossed in recycling containers? Do you save them for the next neighborhood e-waste event? The answers aren't easy, thanks in part to new technologies to Thomas Edison's illuminating invention along with society's growing environmental concerns.

A 60-day initiative to help raise awareness on how citizens and companies can properly recycle lighting devices launched on Aug. 20. The Green Lights Initiative is sponsored by LEDtronics, one of the largest U.S.-based manufacturers of LED products, and whose lighting has put a shine on Sacramento from a downtown comic book store to the passenger trains that roll through the downtown and Roseville stations.

Besides donating to Keep America Beautiful with a check purposely dated Nov. 15 to coincide with America Recycles Day, the Torrance, Calif.-based company is taking to social media, print and electronic media to get the word out. New and long-time supporters of proper lighting disposal will be urged to sign an online petition at Change.org.

"When my light bulbs

burn out, where do I put them?" Being in the lighting business for nearly 40 years, we get that question a lot," said Shaan Lodhie, LEDtronics' chief operating officer. "Our company makes only LEDs, which are safe to dispose of in trash bins because they contain no hazardous chemicals. But that's not necessarily the right option for environmental, safety and other reasons. When it comes to CFL and fluorescent bulbs, both of which contain small amounts of mercury, chucking them in the trashcan or with the recycling isn't wise for

intensified reasons." LEDtronics' donation to Keep America Beautiful will help the non-profit with its mission to "inspire and educate people to take action every day to improve and beautify their community environment."

Tips on Disposing Light Bulbs

When a real light bulb goes out, how great it would be if an imaginary light bulb appeared over your head to signal a bright idea for what to do next. With so many types of lighting on the market, even a single home or business

can have multiple ways to illuminate. Materials being shared through the Green Lights Initiative include a "how to" on properly disposing and recycling the most common types of light bulbs. Here's a summary of tips by lighting category:

CFL and fluorescent - Small amounts of the toxic chemical mercury make these bulbs harmful to your health and environment. Simply tossing them in the trash is unwise, and in some circumstances unlawful. Because broken CFL and fluorescent bulbs are damaging to the environment if they enter landfills or the

water supply, more stringent and rigorous steps are required to dispose. A local home improvement store or recycling center might be able to take this work - and the bulbs - off your hands;

LED - Safe as it is to dispose of LEDs in trash bins due to an absence of toxic chemicals, recycling them is still the best option from an environmental and safety perspective. Better than tossing them in your recycling container, locate a recycling center that accepts LEDs, which contain reusable components;

Incandescent and halogen - Like LEDs, these types

typically contain no toxic chemicals. Disposing them in a trashcan or recycling bin is one solution, but a better one is handing them over to a recycling center. Because glass in incandescents and halogens shatters easily, wrapping the bulbs in recyclable packaging materials is also smart.

County Supervisor Susan Peters Announces Upcoming Retirement

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - County Supervisor Susan Peters last week told the Carmichael Chamber of Commerce she will not seek re-election next year. After 16 years of service to Sacramento County's District 3, months of rumors preceded her announcement. At least six hopefuls have thrown hats in the ring for her seat.

Peters has more than 14 months yet to serve. She'll sit long hours on the Board; attend town halls; give speeches and cut her quota of ribbons. Future ground-breakings include the beginning of Phase 3 of Fair Oaks corridor improvements in Carmichael this fall.

Bowing away was carefully considered. "Sixteen years is enough for anyone," she considers. "In this job, you should exit on a high note to avoid burning out - so residents still get the attention they deserve. I also want to leave District 3 in good hands. I brought several people onto commissions and watched to see who seemed capable and interested in doing the job." Former CHP officer Rich Desmond emerged as her pick. "When I first met Rich 18 months ago," says Peters, "I thought he might be the guy. He's proven it through his work on the Carmichael Community Planning Advisory Council. His background in law enforcement also is a plus. Public safety is a priority for residents."

Achievements will shine among her retiring

memories. "We've built four new parks for Carmichael," she considers. "A foundation's been formed to raise money for district parks. Effie Yeaw Nature Center has developed into a public/private partnership that's brought many enhancements. We've instituted quarterly town halls to help residents learn about issues that affect them. Fair Oaks Boulevard is looking beautiful. The new Carmichael Property and Business Improvement District (PBID) will improve the business area. When I first came into office, Carmichael people said: bring us more restaurants. Well, the Milagro Centre has answered that."

Glittering memories will include igniting Christmas tree lights - with a loyal succession of schnauzer dogs as company for the 20-year widow. Peters opened the Swanston

Community Center; she saw the stunning transformation of McClellan Air Force Base and the opening of Sacramento International Airport's Terminal B. To the relief of countless motorists, Hazel Avenue (Fair Oaks) improvements were completed.

The Supervisor spoke at a glorious homecoming for Carmichael heroes who saved a French train from terrorism. She broke ground for trails and buildings and learned to graciously decline ceremonial tools as gifts ("You end up with a garage full of shovels, otherwise,"). On a never-to-be-repeated impulse, she volunteered for a police canine demonstration. Despite protective padding, the attack numbed her arm for days. Fair Oaks Cemetery and Patriots Park ceremonies for those who died in

service touched her heart. "When a parent cries on your shoulder for a lost son or daughter, you never forget it," she says. For every problem tackled, plenty more will challenge her remaining term. "I'll continue to work on measures to address homelessness," she promises. It's a problem all over California... a never-ending challenge that the next Supervisor will also have to wrestle with. The interesting thing about being a Supervisor is that something different comes up every day.

"You can't fix every problem. But you do your best."

Supervisor Peters will hold public meetings at Mission Oaks Community Center on October 10 and at Swanston Community Center on October 17. Both presentations will start at 6 pm and offer roadwork updates. ★

Daily News reporter Carol Lou Tippit. The couple raised three daughters and ended up in Sacramento, where Hayes served as the Sacramento Union editor for four years. He also took up fishing on the American River. "Too often I was disappointed," he recalls of angling attempts. "I began paying more attention to the birds and the trees and the swift-flowing river. I eventually became a certified nature lover."

Nature essays for the Union were a natural progression. His observations were recycled in the American River Natural History Association's "Acorn" newsletter and eventually collated, with photographs, in a tome he called "An American River Almanac." It became a nature study resource and evergreen fundraiser for ARNHA. Re-published in hard cover in 2014, the opus was reinvented as a classic edition. Hayes' theme never changed. Watching the seasonal moods of the river parkway was his passion.

His essays were love songs. Despite years of hard news reporting, Hayes was able to eulogize nature as an innocent. "Pale pink blossoms presage the juicy sweetness of wild blackberries," he observed, are "a reminder of what the Maudis and pioneers knew, that the best of life is free." He described July as "the cool caress of an ocean breeze that has made its way up the river." A wild flower path is a place "to let the mind slip into neutral,

forgetting about the price of gasoline and other day-to-day irritants."

His beloved Carol Lou died in 1998 and as Hayes' mobility declined, visiting favorite riverside haunts became tougher. The American River Parkway nevertheless remained his delight. "It's like going to a surprise party," considered the aging pilgrim. "I never know what kind of wild world I'm entering."

Three years ago, Hayes moved into Eskaton Village, Carmichael. "One of the unknowns was how dad could continue as a writer," recalls his daughter Debbie Kenngett. "My daughter suggested he should do a regular blog about this new chapter of his life. After she explained what a blog was, he took the idea and ran with it." Hayes authored "Notes From Pete" till his death; the 100th e-pistle reached his friends a few weeks ago. "That blog fulfilled him," confirms his daughter. "It made him feel like a writer again. Dad's friends adored his powers of observation; his humor and his appreciation for everyone and everything he saw."

A man of faith, Hayes was a long-time member of Arcade's Grace Presbyterian church. But his greater cathedral was outdoors. "His thoughts were never far from the river he loved," says his daughter. "Nature inspired my father; it brought him peace. Wherever his soul is now, people who love him want to feel he's somewhere on his beautiful river." ★

or **PSPS** is a precautionary safety measure that may proactively turn off power lines when extreme fire danger conditions are forecast. We will do this to reduce wildfire risks and keep our customers safe.

What criteria does PG&E consider when calling a PSPS?

No single factor will initiate a Public Safety Power Shutoff as each situation is unique. The factors we generally consider include:

- A Red Flag Warning declared by the National Weather Service
- Forecasts of strong winds and wind gusts
- Low humidity levels
- Critically dry vegetation that could fuel a wildfire
- And on-the-ground, real-time observations from PG&E field crews

In the interest of public safety, we continue to update and refine our criteria and protocols on an ongoing basis.

How will I know if a PSPS has been called in my neighborhood?

Because extreme weather threats can change quickly, our goal is to provide notice through phone calls, emails and text messages to customers 48 hours in advance, again at 24 hours and again just prior to turning off the power for safety.

Updates will also be shared through social media, local news, radio and pge.com until the time power is restored. To receive important outage alerts, update your contact information at pge.com/mywildfirealerts.

How can I prepare for a PSPS?

We advise you to think in advance about your family's needs and how you might be impacted in the event of a power shutoff — or for any emergency.

- Do you have a personal safety plan for all members of your family, including pets?
- If you own a generator, is it ready to operate safely?
- Do you know how to open your garage door manually?
- Do you have cash and a full tank of gas, in the event ATMs and gas stations are unavailable?
- Are your mobile phones fully charged?

Flores currently holds the position of the Chief Deputy Agricultural Commissioner/Sealer of Weights and Measures and has been the interim Agricultural Commissioner/Sealer of Weights and Measures since March 2019. As the interim Agricultural Commissioner/Sealer of Weights and Measures, she is responsible for the leadership and direction of all enforcement programs, services,

activities and budget of the department.

"For the last 13 years, I've had a passion for promoting the agricultural industry and promoting consumer and business protection through our Weights and Measures programs. I am very excited for the opportunity to serve the County, its residents, and its agricultural industry as the Sacramento County Agricultural Commissioner and Sealer of Weights and Measures" said Flores.

New County-Level Data Sheds Light On Super Commuters

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The number of American workers who bear through commute times of 90 minutes or more each way grew by 32% from 2005 to 2017. This is more than triple the 9% growth rate for workers with commutes shorter than 90 minutes. In a new report, we present county-level data on these "super commuters" that sheds new light on this fast-growing population.

Recent increases in super commuting are often attributed to middle-class workers in superstar cities being priced out to far-flung exurbs. However, county-level

data shows that super commuting is also common among low-income workers who rely on public transit, as well as blue-collar workers in certain pockets of rural America.

Some key takeaways: 4.3% of workers who live in El Dorado County are super commuters, the highest rate in the Sacramento metro. Yolo County has the metro's lowest super commuter share at 2.7%. Nationally, 2.9% of workers are super commuters.

Among workers in the Sacramento metro who rely on public transit, 14.8% are super commuters, compared to 3.7% of those who commute by car. ★

The New York Times Should Stop Whining

The New York Times, an organization devoted to gathering and publishing information, doesn't want people to gather or publish information inconvenient to it.

A group of Trump-supporting operatives has been finding and archiving old social media postings of Times employees and other journalists for use in the ongoing brawl between the president and the press.

There's no indication that this is dumpster diving rather than an effort to scour readily available sources for stupid, embarrassing or offensive things that journalists have said publicly under their own power.

The Times broke the news of the campaign in an alarmed-sounding report. It related that "the material publicized so far, while in some cases stripped of context or presented in misleading ways, has proved authentic, and much of it has been professionally harmful to its targets."

It's not clear what makes

this different from what happens in our public life ... every ... single ... day. Headhunting based on past offenses, real and imagined, is the norm, indeed one of the left's favored forms of ideological combat.

Nonetheless, the press and its progressive allies act as though the First Amendment is being endangered if journalists apologize for past things they've written or -- depending on the decisions of their own organizations -- get cashiered for them.

"The goal of this campaign is clearly to intimidate journalists from doing their job," thundered Times publisher A.G. Sulzberger.

A spokesman for CNN went further, saying that when government officials, "and those working on their behalf, threaten and retaliate against reporters as a means of suppression, it's a clear abandonment of democracy for something very dangerous."

This is the usual hysteria yoked to the usual foggy thinking. The First Amendment is an important protection of press freedom. Yet nothing in it protects members of the press from criticism, let alone criticism over things they have written. Such criticisms are exercises of free speech in response to other exercises of free speech -- i.e., public debate.

If the Times and others don't like the weaponization of foolhardy and untoward

social media postings, they can start pushing back against it across the board.

The left-wing organization Media Matters for America exists to publicize (allegedly) controversial statements by conservative media figures toward the end of getting them fired or ushered off the air. If recirculating the past tweets of employees of liberal news organizations is undemocratic, why isn't the work of Media Matters also dangerously authoritarian?

The Times may say that it won't be "intimidated" by pressure over past postings, but it has readily surrendered to such pressure from the left. The paper pulled the plug on its hiring of tech writer Quinn Norton last year when it emerged that she had tweeted offensive terms about gays and blacks, albeit sardonically.

The hounding of conservatives isn't considered beyond the pale; it's considered sport. Much of the left would be rendered practically mute if it weren't braying for people to be fired.

I think it's a bad idea for either side to rummage through old social media postings and writings looking for firing offenses. But the rules of this game were established by the left long ago. It should either change them -- or stop whining.
