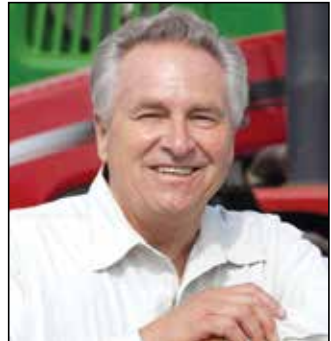

Coaching Gifted Students; Taking Bow After Bow

Nice Work, If You Can Get It - And Mr. S Has Shown Them How!

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - With apologies to George Gershwin, the above sums up the long career of educator Ed ("Mr. S") Santillanes (65), who will bow out as El Camino High School drama coach in June. After directing 16 shows, his retirement will follow a farewell production of "Nice Work If You Can Get It." The musical comedy opens March 1 and runs until March 10 at the school.

Santillanes' swan song is also the final show to be presented in El Camino's "cafetorium." Though divas Jessica Chastain and Kate

Levering began brilliant careers hoofing around its makeshift stage, better things lie ahead. From next year, school productions will rejoice in an \$11 million arts center. The coach's exit might seem like poor timing, but he voices no regrets. "I've loved working with my drama students," he says. "Their enthusiasm is inspiring, and we've had a good run together. The new center will be great for them but I'm ready to retire."

Staging "Nice Work" -- with a cast of 22 plus orchestra and 15 production staffers -- guarantees stress. "As an actor and director, I am used to what you must give up," he says. "But students have all kinds of pressures -- homework,

family obligations -- it's hard to keep them all together. Keeping them off their cell phones at rehearsals is the hardest part. The choreographer and I are used to high anxiety."

Santillanes began acting at Hollywood High School in his own teen years. Drama was his forte and -- while later teaching at Bella Vista High (Fair Oaks) and Winston Churchill Middle School (Carmichael) -- he moonlighted in Shakespearian productions. He joined El Camino High's faculty 27 years ago, teaching English and running school radio and TV programs. Six years ago, he took over the drama gig and directed such plays as Agatha Christie's

Republicans Submit Petitions Demanding New Water Storage

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Today, Republican members of the California Legislature delivered a wagon-load of petitions to the California Water Commission calling for the immediate approval of funding for Sites and Temperance Flat reservoirs. The more than 4,000 petitions were signed by Californians from all corners of the state in response to recent reports that the commission is blocking the construction of badly needed surface water storage, even as another drought is looming.

"Four years ago, California voters overwhelmingly approved a \$7 billion water bond on the promise of new surface storage projects," said Assembly Republican Leader Brian Dahle (Bieber). "Our government has made a habit of selling the voters a false bill of goods. It is long past time that our government starts keeping its promises."

In 2014, Californians approved Proposition 1, a water bond that included \$2.7 billion for investments in new reservoirs. The proposition tasked the California Water Commission with allocating the storage funding. Recently, the commission issued a report that could jeopardize the funding for important storage projects like Sites Reservoir and Temperance Flat.

"The lack of urgency from bureaucrats at the water commission is putting Californians' livelihoods in danger," said Assemblyman Frank Bigelow (R-O'Neals) in a recent Sacramento Bee op-ed. "If we are hit with another drought, the commission will be responsible."

If built, Temperance Flat Reservoir could hold 423 billion gallons of water northeast of Fresno. Sites Reservoir could hold 586 billion gallons in Colusa County.

California Needs Greater, More Targeted Financial Aid Investments

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - A new report released today by The Institute for College Access & Success (TICAS) documents clear agreement among higher education experts that college affordability challenges have a wide range of negative implications for California students, and low-income and underrepresented students in particular. *Unpacking California College Affordability: Experts Weigh in on Strengths, Challenges, and Implications* summarizes interviews with 22 experts representing a broad array of experiences and perspectives.

"There is resounding consensus that unaffordable college costs are holding students back," said Debbie Cochrane, vice president at TICAS. "Experts agree that greater and more targeted investments in financial aid are needed to close inequities in our system and help students from all backgrounds graduate from college."

The 22 individuals interviewed include experts throughout the state of California, including student and institutional representatives from public and nonprofit colleges, independent research and policy organizations, and the state legislature and administration. They all agreed that affordability challenges contribute to inequities in college enrollment, completion, and student debt burdens. Data show that low-income students and students of color, in California and nationally, are less likely to enroll in or complete college and more likely to have borrowed for college.

All 22 experts recognized that existing state financial aid programs do a much better job supporting students' ability to pay for tuition than other college costs, and agreed that improving college affordability in California requires

better supporting lower income students' ability to pay for non-tuition costs such as housing, food, transportation, and textbooks. According to the California Student Aid Commission, students' non-tuition costs of college often exceed \$19,000 a year.

Most experts identified community college students as a population particularly impacted by unaffordable college costs. Many specifically highlighted how critical it is for the state to better support college affordability for nontraditional and underserved students, including older and returning students, former foster youth, and first-generation students.

The expert voices chronicled throughout the report corroborate other forms of evidence about the locus and scope of college affordability challenges. As TICAS has previously documented, low-income students face particularly high college cost burdens, including at community colleges despite low tuition charges, and are most likely to graduate from college with debt.

"While important incremental improvements to California's state financial aid have been made in recent years, much work remains to ensure that state financial aid policy supports equitable student attainment," said Cochrane.

In addition to the need for better targeted financial aid investments, many experts underscored the need to reduce the complexity of the financial aid system and address other barriers to timely college completion, such as lengthy developmental education requirements or the lack of availability of needed coursework. While the report is geared to California policymakers, experts also emphasized the need for improved federal policy and greater investments in targeted need-based scholarships and public higher education. ★

USC Rossier/Pace Poll: California Voters Support New Public School Accountability Efforts

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Launched in March 2017, the California School Dashboard is an online tool that shows how schools are performing according to the various indicators that comprise the state's education accountability system.

State education leaders hoped the dashboard would better inform parents as well as improve equity in schools. Some organizations panned the system when it debuted, with one calling it "more confusing than practical."

Yet a new USC Rossier/PACE poll finds that a majority of voters who have heard of the system had a positive impression, and among parent voters, 72 percent said they had a positive impression of the dashboard. Majorities of all respondents also said they thought the dashboard captured the most important measures of school quality, that it was easy to understand and that it was an effective means to communicate outcomes.

"Innovation takes time, but our schools will keep facing the same inequities unless we're willing to take some risks, and California is taking some risks," said Karen Symms Gallagher, dean of the USC Rossier School of Education. "It's clear that parents are willing to give their support to a system designed to make school quality transparent and accessible, and it's important for state leaders to keep refining the dashboard if they want to build on that support."

The results come from the sixth annual edition of the USC Rossier/PACE poll, a partnership of the USC Rossier School of Education and Policy Analysis for California Education (PACE), a university-affiliated, non-partisan research center.

Polling firms Tulchin Research and Moore Information conducted the survey of 2,500 registered California voters online from January 21-28. USC Rossier professors Julie Marsh and Morgan Polikoff, as well as Associate Professor David Quinn designed the questions with PACE executive director David N. Plank and the polling firms.

School accountability measures

Respondents were somewhat split on how they felt toward using multiple measures in school accountability. While most states under the federal Every Student Succeeds Act now give single overall performance ratings to schools, California opted to offer several ratings, for things like absenteeism, suspension rates and graduation rates. Overall respondents were, by a slim majority, more supportive of using multiple measures than parents, a majority of whom preferred a simple overall grade.

"It may be that parents feel more pressure to actually make decisions about schools for their children, and that's why they'd like to have a

simple overall grade of some kind," Polikoff said.

School quality

Views toward public schools are trending negative. Forty-three percent of respondents said that California's public schools have gotten worse over the past few years, up from 39 percent in August 2016; a plurality of voters (44 percent) would give California's public schools an overall grade of 'C.'

When schools perform well, 68 percent of voters said that teachers deserved the most credit—the only group to get a majority of support; fewer voters (30 percent) would blame teachers if schools were failing.

More good news for teachers: 91 percent of parents gave their local public school teachers a passing grade.

State funding

Asked a variety of ways-and given information on what percentage of the state budget is spent on education, and spending amounts per pupil—a majority of voters also said that the state should spend more on its public schools.

"Public opinion appears to align with broader calls from district leaders throughout the state who report struggling with rising costs related to pensions and special education and deep concerns about adequacy of funding," Marsh said.

Charter schools

While voters wavered on whether California should have more or fewer charter schools based on perceived political support for them by President Donald Trump or former President Barack Obama, a quarter of respondents said that the state has "about the right amount of charter schools." ★

 “Mousetrap” and Noel Coward’s “Blythe Spirit.” His musicals have included “Kiss Me Kate,” “Fiddler on the Roof” and “The Sound of Music.”

As a final effort, “Nice Work” produces unique challenges. A recovering alcoholic and 27-years sober, Mr. S had to coach leading man Adam Severeid to act tipsy in the title number. “It’s hard to direct a teenager to seem drunk,” he admits. “They haven’t the experience -- or if they have, they don’t want to admit it. In this case, I told Adam to watch Fred Astaire’s famous drunken dance with Marjorie Reynolds in ‘Holiday Inn.’ If there’s any such

thing as a graceful drunk, Astaire was it.”

Another challenge was finding circa 1930s costumes. While the school prop box contained tuxes and gowns, they were more disco than Prohibition. “Out of the blue, a lovely Carmichael lady offered her late husband’s tuxes,” says the director. “He was a bandleader and kept dozens of dinner jackets. She also donated her own evening gowns for the girls. The cast was thrilled to look so authentic and elegant.”

A free-standing tub for a bathroom scene posed another prop dilemma. “In the end,” confides Santillanes, “we painted a horse trough white. We stuck it on casters, so it can roll round. It’s

not quite what we wanted but it works.” Such a prop segues neatly to the director’s next step: retirement. Santillanes owns horses and a Fair Oaks horse property. On his bucket-list is riding in a cattle drive near the Nevada border this year.

Coaching equines after coaching teenagers seems a quantum leap. “Like teenagers, horses can be temperamental,” considers the thespian/equestrian. “But they don’t talk back. And in the stables, you don’t have to contend with cell phones.”

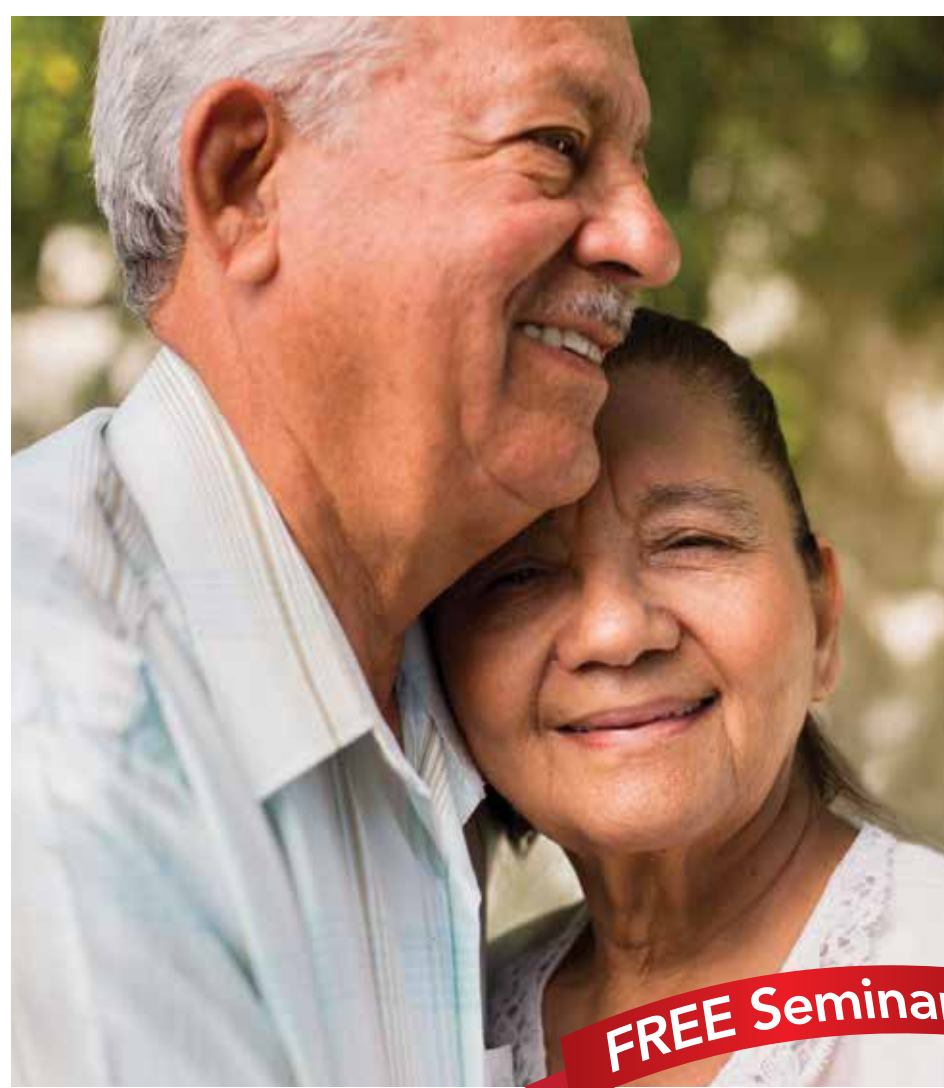

Senator Gaines Introduces Bill to Help Families Save for College

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Senator Ted Gaines (R-El Dorado) today announced Senate Bill 1218, legislation that will help families save money for college by making contributions to 529 plans tax deductible in California.

"The cost to send kids to college has skyrocketed over the past several decades. Students who work, receive scholarships and/or financial aid, and get help from their parents still manage to graduate with tens of thousands of dollars racked up in student loans," said Senator Gaines. "My hope is that by allowing the ability to deduct 529 contributions, it will increase savings and decrease the amount needed in student loans."

A 529 savings plan is an investment account meant for

college tuition and other higher-education costs. The plans are usually sponsored by states and offer various benefits. Many states give the account owner full or partial state income tax deductions for their contributions to the state's 529 plans. California is currently one of only nine states that do not offer a state income tax deduction or tax credit for contributions to the state's 529 college savings plan.

Senate Bill 1218 will make contributions to 529 plans of up to \$20,000 per year tax deductible in California. This limit will be adjusted each year for inflation.

For reference, tuition and related costs (books, living expenses, etc.) at both the University of California and California State University systems have tripled over the last

15 years. The average cost for one year at a California State University is approximately \$25,000. The average cost for one year at a University of California is nearly \$35,000.

To attend the private University of Southern California, tuition alone will cost more than \$50,000 per year. Data from The Institute for College Access & Success shows that the average borrower from California has \$22,191 worth of student loan debt that still needs to be paid.

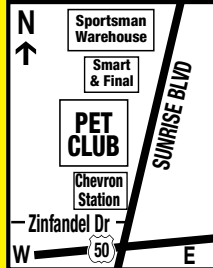

Rejecting the Cloudy Logic of EPA Ozone Rules

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The Environmental Protection Agency just missed a court-ordered deadline to announce which regions of the country are complying with an Obama-era ozone rule. The agency says it needs more time to make that determination.

Green activists are livid. The Environmental Defense Fund accused the agency of "allowing vulnerable communities to suffer the consequences of polluted air while Administrator Pruitt stalls."

Ozone is the main ingredient in smog. So one might assume that the nation's city dwellers are struggling to breathe. Only the activists' rhetoric is breathless, though. Ozone levels have dropped by a third since 1980.

This precipitous drop didn't stop the Obama administration from issuing a strict new ozone rule in 2015. The regulation requires states to limit ground-level ozone concentrations to 70 parts per billion. Previous standards issued in 2008 had set acceptable ozone levels at 75 ppb. States are poised to waste billions adhering to these new rules -- all to address a problem that has been getting better for a decades

Regulators are working with states to ease the compliance burden as much as possible. But the EPA can't

nix the regulation on its own. Only Congress can do so.

The new regulations aren't needed. The United States has already slashed air pollution dramatically. Since 1970, levels of six common air pollutants have dropped by an average of 70 percent across the nation, even as economic output jumped over 240 percent. Levels of carbon monoxide alone have fallen by 84 percent since 1990, while lead concentrations have dropped by 85 percent.

The 2015 regulation, known as the National Ambient Air Quality Standards for Ozone, would create an immense compliance burden on many regions of the country. In roughly 180 counties, ozone levels still exceed the 2008 requirement of 75 ppb. The new 2015 standard would move the goalposts. More than 958 counties -- roughly one-third of all counties -- could be classified as "nonattainment" areas if the standard is changed to 70 ppb.

They'll face severe penalties for failing to meet the new standards. The federal government can freeze funding for transportation projects. And it can force factories and other buildings in nonattainment areas to install expensive emission reduction technologies.

As a result, local economies would pay a significant price. In 2015, the EPA claimed that

compliance would cost states, excluding California, \$1.4 billion by 2025.

The actual costs will likely be far higher. As recently as 2011, the agency calculated the annual cost of meeting the 70 ppb standard at between \$19 and 25 billion. An analysis from the economic consulting firm NERA estimates that new ozone standards could cost the economy \$270 billion annually between now and 2040.

Why would federal regulators choose to ignore the crippling costs associated with their rules? Because they're required to. The Clean Air Act prohibits the EPA from considering costs when determining air-quality standards.

Congress knows the updated ozone rules will devastate the economy. This summer, the House passed the Ozone Standards Implementation Act of 2017 to delay the 2015 standards. It's now up to the Senate to do the same.

Over the last few decades, America has made extraordinary progress in ridding the air of harmful pollutants -- including ozone. Imposing draconian ozone standards -- at immense economic cost -- is irrational and irresponsible.

Another Budget Deal Bites the Dust

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Back in September I wrote about our "ethically challenged" democratic system. I said, "We are caught in a downward, self-destructive [debt] spiral."

If you doubted me then, those doubts should have exploded last week. Congressional leaders agreed to increase federal spending by nearly \$300 billion above the already-rising limits stipulated by the Budget Control Act of 2011, and President Donald Trump signed the deal into law last Friday morning.

We've seen this picture before: Congress and the White House feel a twinge of conscience, enact a law to end deficit spending, and struggle to adhere to it for a few years. Inevitably, though, political pressures to spend more become too great, the floodgates of federal spending are opened wider, and the anti-deficit law is swept away.

Following are several earlier versions of this process:

- 1) Congress passed Public Law #95-435, The Bretton Woods Agreement Act, on October 10, 1978. Intended originally to amend the U.S. Treasury's collaborations with the International Monetary Fund, Congress added Section 7. It explicitly states, "Beginning with fiscal year 1981, the total budget outlays of the Federal Government shall not exceed its receipts." Voilà! End of deficits, right? Alas, if only... The actual federal government deficit for FY 1981 was nearly \$79 billion. That was the last year until 1997 that the federal deficit was less than \$100 billion.
- 2) Congress tried to legislate itself into fiscal responsibility again in the mid-1980s. It passed the verbosely named

"Gramm-Rudman-Hollings Balance Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985," followed by the "Balance Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Reaffirmation Act of 1987." As already noted, those long-abandoned laws never succeeded in getting annual federal deficits below \$100 billion.

3) The Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 (alternatively known as the "Deficit Reduction Act of 1993") is sometimes given credit for the four-year interlude from red ink in FYs 1998-2001. (Actually, there were only two small on-budget surpluses in those years. In the other two years, the "surplus" appeared only by adding the Social Security surplus to the regular federal budget.) However, it wasn't the 1993 act that achieved a short-lived reprieve from massive deficits. Instead, it was a one-time, never-to-be-repeated "perfect storm" of confluent events that I have explained elsewhere.

4) Another anti-deficit law was the plainly labeled Deficit Reduction Act of 2005. Although the federal deficit did decrease for three years after the passage of this law, bottoming out at \$160 billion in FY 2007, the financial crisis that started that year blew that law to smithereens as federal spending and deficits skyrocketed to as high as \$1.4 trillion in FY 2009 (the year of the Obama "stimulus" plan).

5) The 2011 law that last week's law supersedes did not even pretend to be working toward a balanced budget. It had the more modest goal of reducing annual deficits. Yes, the growth of federal spending slowed for a few years after FY 2011, and with the slow but steady economic

recovery, federal revenues increased enough to reduce deficits. The deficit bottomed out at \$438 billion in FY 2015. Now, with last week's law, both parties have consented to burgeoning deficits that could soon approach \$1 trillion again.

The lessons are clear:
First, no law, or even constitution, has the power to thwart the will of a people who don't want to abide by that law.

Second, the political reality is that deficits are here to stay—at least, unless the financial system (and possibly the political system) blow up from the accumulating financial stress, although as hyper-indebted Japan has shown, such an absurd situation can persist for a surprisingly long time.

Third, neither of the two major parties can be counted on for fiscal responsibility. Democrats believe that the government should oversee economic activity, and so there is no limit to what they want to spend. Some Republicans understand there are economic and ethical reasons for limiting government spending, but ever since the Nixon presidency over 40 years ago, they've learned that the American electorate has no stomach for "austerity" or "belt-tightening." Thus, when push comes to shove, their political survival instinct kicks in and enough Republicans will cave to public pressure and give the voters what they want—more spending and the large deficits that go with it.

Given those partisan dynamics, red ink is here to stay and the mountain of national debt will continue to grow.

Lessons Learned from Oroville Disaster

Sunday, February 12, 2017 was a day many of us will forever remember.

I was working on our property when an aide called to inform me that the integrity of the Oroville Dam Spillway was compromised that an estimated 30-foot wall of water was about to uncontrollably rush out of the spillway, and that Butte County Sheriff Kory Honea had called for a mandatory evacuation.

Knowing Sheriff Honea to be a measured person, I knew he would not call for such an order without strong evidence. He must have weighed all the factors in his thoughts and deliberation.

Immediately, I contacted him to offer my full support.

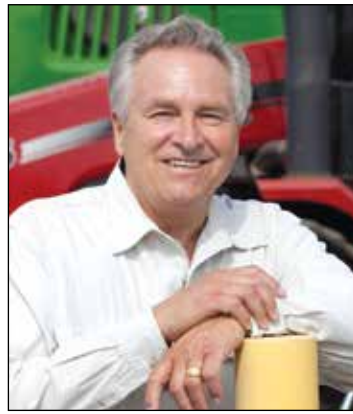
Soon thereafter, nearly 200,000 people of the North State, from Plumas Lake to Oroville, quickly loaded their treasured possessions and pets and evacuated via congested highways.

Despite heavy traffic, residents – no doubt fearing the unknown and dealing with anxiety – evacuated without chaos.

Law enforcement officials and volunteers directed citizens to where they needed to go. Hundreds of first responders assisted and transported those who were most vulnerable. Residents of neighboring regions opened their homes to displaced families.

In this time of high stress and unease, the citizens of our region held their heads high and acted admirably.

Over the next few days, Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) and I visited residents at the evacuation centers. We talked and shared cookies

and donuts with our friends and neighbors.

Between the visits, I called the Governor's Office and the director of the Department of Water Resources (DWR) for status updates.

After this alarming incident, thousands of workers from Kiewit Corporation and its subsidiaries descended onto Oroville to make the necessary repairs to the spillway. Their hard work is greatly appreciated.

But there's more to be done.

A year later, sediment and debris from the spillway disaster still clog the channels of the Feather River and are strewn along the riverbanks. This disregard for the environment forced Butte County, the City of Oroville and local jurisdictions to file lawsuits against the state. Penalties can be as high as \$51 billion.

At the state level, I have held many meetings in my office to discuss repair and communication efforts with state officials and community members. My staff and I continue to work with Sutter Butte Flood Control Agency to get funding to shore up the levees.

Along with Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale), the Oroville Strong Coalition, Assemblyman Gallagher and I travelled to Washington, DC

to lobby federal officials. Our request to have the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) delay the license renewal is pending.

This disaster has united our community. We are now stronger than ever.

On the one-year anniversary of the evacuation, community members and leaders, businesses, and public officials affected by the order gathered on the steps of the Capitol to commemorate the event and call for efforts to prevent any similar disaster in the future.

In the coming year, we will continue to encourage the Governor to sign Assembly Bill 1270 (Gallagher), a measure to require more thorough dam inspections which I shepherded in the Senate.

I will continue my efforts to push for \$100 million in state funding for flood control efforts and to clean up the Feather River system.

It is also my goal to have DWR include our community in their decision making process. We want a seat at the table when DWR decides to either send more water to Los Angeles or hold back water, among the other decisions they make.

That's why I authored Senate Bill 955. This measure would create a citizens advisory commission for Oroville Dam and the Feather River system. This commission would allow for participation by the residents who are directly affected by the dam's operations and strategic plans.

With the strength and support of the community, I am optimistic that we will achieve these goals for the safety of our people and the prosperity of our local economy. ★

Defendant Sentenced for Attempted Murder in Drug Deal

The Honorable Timothy Frawley sentenced Damien Tardy to 32 years to life in prison. On July 26, 2017, a jury convicted Tardy of attempted murder. The jury also found true the allegations that Tardy intentionally discharged a firearm causing great bodily injury, and that the offense was committed willfully, deliberately and with premeditation.

Shortly after midnight on August 2, 2016, the victim met Tardy at a South Sacramento motel to purchase heroin. When the victim determined the heroin was poor quality, he went back to the motel to get his money back. The men then drove to the north area of Sacramento and purchased better quality heroin. After they sat in the car for a few minutes, Tardy said he had to get something out of the trunk and exited the car. When the victim exited the car, Tardy drew a gun and fired two shots, striking the victim in his head and neck. The victim fell to the ground and tried to crawl away from Tardy, who then fired several additional shots. The victim was struck twice in his torso and leg. Police were called to the scene and the victim was transported to a hospital where, after undergoing several surgeries, he survived.

Sarkis Varpetyan pled no contest to felony insurance fraud. The Honorable Geoffrey Goodman sentenced Varpetyan to 180 days in county jail, 3 years formal probation and ordered him to pay \$43,527.83 in restitution (\$5,485.86 to Farmers Insurance and \$38,041.97 to State Farm).

On May 21, 2015, Varpetyan was driving on Sunrise Boulevard when he suddenly hit his brakes for no reason, causing the car behind him to rear-end Varpetyan's vehicle. Several witnesses stated that it appeared Varpetyan intentionally caused the accident. On June 11, 2015, Varpetyan filed an insurance claim stating he had come to a stop because of traffic and was not liable for the accident. The claim was ultimately denied based on the witness statements and the CHP report that found Varpetyan to be at fault for the accident.

This case was prosecuted by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office Insurance Fraud Unit. ★

Defendant Convicted of Multiple Child Sexual Assault Charges

DATE: February 13, 2018

CASE: Richard Craig Torres (Case #07F10409)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Catrina Skor, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

Richard Craig Torres was convicted by a jury of 18 counts of forcible lewd act upon a child, one count of lewd act upon a child and one count of forcible rape.

Torres sexually assaulted the female victim on a regular basis over the course of one year, starting in June 2005 when the victim was 13 years old. In May 2007, the victim disclosed the sexual abuse to her mother. In November 2007, Torres was notified about a warrant for his arrest. The next day, he fled to Mexico, where he lived under an alias for 7 years. In December 2014, the FBI received information about Torres' whereabouts, which ultimately led to his apprehension. In August 2015, Torres was extradited back to the United States to face charges.

Torres faces a maximum sentence of 160 years in prison. Sentencing is set for March 23, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 39 before the Honorable David Abbott.

Chiropractor Pleads to Felony Practicing Medicine without License, Grand Theft

CASE: Anthony Johnson (Case #16FE015230)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney David Brown, Consumer & Environmental Protection Division

James Joseph Martin pled guilty to three counts of practicing medicine without a license, four counts of grand theft by false pretenses and misdemeanor charges of illegally using 'MD' and 'physician' in advertisements.

Martin regularly appeared on a local television program, Sac & Co. His infomercials were designed to look like an interview. Martin, a licensed chiropractor, portrayed himself as a functional neurologist who practiced metabolic or pastoral medicine, specializing in treating conditions of the thyroid, neuropathy and other health conditions. Many of Martin's patients thought he was a medical doctor. Some patients paid thousands of dollars for his treatment, which primarily consisted of Martin prescribing over the counter supplements and then selling them at a significant mark up.

Martin will be sentenced to 1 year in jail and ordered to pay restitution to all victims named in the complaint. Additionally, he will be on felony probation for 5 years, required to surrender his chiropractic license and prohibited from portraying himself as someone who practices functional or pastoral medicine.

Sentencing is set for May 29, 2018, at 8:30 a.m. in Department 62 before the Honorable Patrick Marlette. ★

Your retirement, your money

Dear Dave,
 I've been following your plan, and I'm ready to start investing. Do employer contributions count toward the 15 percent you recommend putting into retirement?
 - Brenda

Dear Brenda,
 Investing 15 percent of your income in retirement accounts is Baby Step 4 of my plan. That means you've already paid off all your debt, except for your home, and you've increased your \$1,000 beginner's emergency fund to a fully-funded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses. Way to go!
 I want you to control your destiny, so employer contributions do not count toward the 15 percent I recommend setting aside for retirement. The first thing you should put money into is a matching retirement account. If

you've got access to a 401(k) — and your employer offers a match — you should do that up to the match before anything else.

It's nice if your company will match up to a certain point, but chances are that will still mean you've got some work to do. To make up the remainder, you could look at a Roth IRA. Then if the Roth, plus what you invested previously to get the match doesn't equal 15 percent, you could see about a 403(b) or go back to your 401(k) to complete the 15 percent.

You're doing great, Brenda. Keep up the good work!

Dear Dave,
 My mother wants everything, except for her home, left to my brother and I when she dies. She would like her long-time boyfriend to have her house. We don't have a problem with this, but it has not been written into her will. Her mind is still sound, so does she need to officially update the will?
 - Dawn

Dear Dawn,
 Yes, the will needs to be changed to reflect her wishes where the house is concerned. Since she's still able to make decisions independently, the will should be legally updated to reflect exactly what she wants to have happen with every piece of her estate.

It's fine if she wants to give her boyfriend the house. It's your mom's will, and her estate, so she can do pretty much whatever she wants. She could also leave what's called a life estate that says her boyfriend gets use of the home while he's alive. Technically, in this kind of situation the house would be left to you, but he would legally have use of it during his life. Upon his death, the home could then revert to you or your brother.

Trump Administration Works to Give Relief to Americans Facing High Premiums, Fewer Choices

Proposed Rule to Allow Short-Term, Limited-Duration Insurance for Longer Periods Providing Increased Choice at a Lower Cost

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- In direct response to President Trump's October 2017 Executive Order, the Departments of Health and Human Services (HHS), Labor, and the Treasury (the Departments) issued a proposed rule today that is intended to increase competition, choice, and access to lower-cost healthcare options for Americans. The rule proposes to expand the availability of short-term, limited-duration health insurance by allowing consumers to buy plans providing coverage for any period of less than 12 months, rather than the current maximum period of less than three months. The proposed rule, if finalized, will provide additional options to Americans who cannot afford to pay the costs of soaring healthcare premiums or do not have access to healthcare choices that meet their needs under current law.

"Americans need more choices in health insurance so they can find coverage that meets their needs," said Health and Human Services Secretary Alex Azar. "The status quo is failing too many Americans who face skyrocketing costs and fewer and fewer choices. The Trump Administration is taking action so individuals and

families have access to quality, affordable healthcare that works for them."

Short-term, limited-duration insurance, which is not required to comply with federal requirements for individual health insurance coverage, is designed to provide temporary coverage for individuals transitioning between healthcare policies, such as an individual in between jobs, or a student taking a semester off from school. Access to these plans has become increasingly important as premiums have more than doubled - PDF between 2013 and 2017 in health plans on the Federal Health Insurance Exchange. And half of the counties in America have only one insurance carrier to choose from.

"Americans who find themselves between jobs or simply can't afford coverage because prices are too high will be helped by President Trump's Healthcare for All Executive Order," said Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) Administrator Seema Verma. "In a market that is experiencing double-digit rate increases, allowing short-term, limited-duration insurance to cover longer periods gives Americans options and could be the difference between someone getting coverage or going without coverage at all."

This announcement builds

on the President's October 2017 Executive Order 13813, "Promoting Healthcare Choice and Competition Across the United States," which directs the Departments to consider proposing regulations or revising guidance to expand the availability of short-term, limited-duration insurance and allow it to cover longer periods. The Departments published a final rule in 2016, which restricted short-term, limited-duration insurance to less than three months. Key stakeholders, including state regulators, have expressed concerns that the current limit could cause harm to some consumers, limit consumer options, and have little positive impact on the risk pools in the long run. Today's proposed rule would address these concerns by reverting to the previous definition of short-term, limited-duration insurance which permits coverage for nearly a full 12 months.

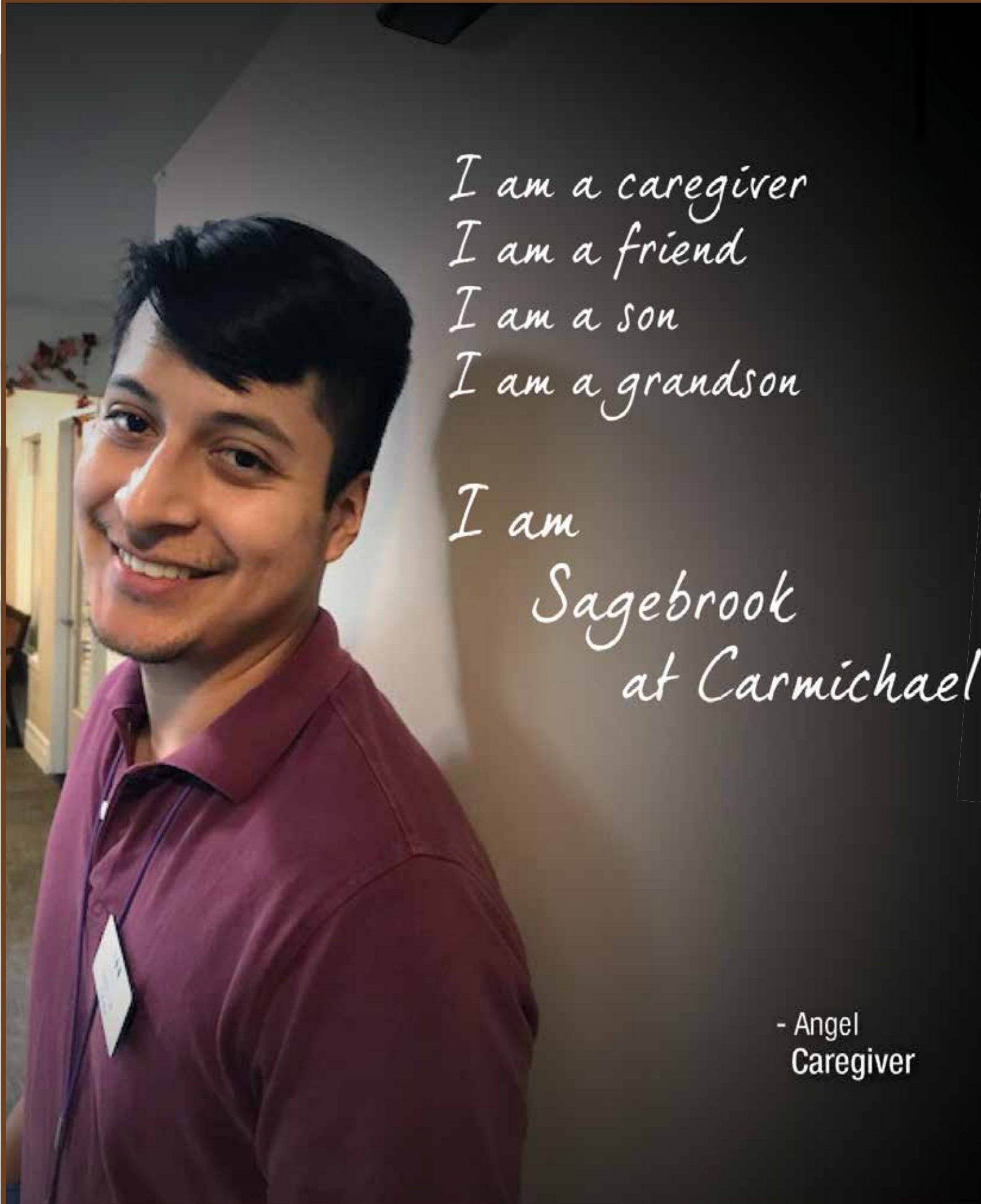
