CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Now in its seventh year operating as a non-profit, the Effie Yeaw Nature Center is preparing for its “Art Where the Wild Things Are” fundraiser with new patronage. As honorary chair, Inside Magazine publisher Cecily Hastings follows such luminaries as Marcy Friedman, Congresswoman Doris Matsui Russ Solomon and Greg Kondos.

Administered by the American River Natural History Association, the facility and its preserve welcome more than 90,000 visitors per year. “The Center has a special history in this community” notes Effie Yeaw Fund Developer Betty Cooper. “Caring

supporters keep us open and available for future generations.” A portion of funds raised on June 10 will provide free nature enrichment programs for schools that could not otherwise afford them.

The Sacramento Fine Arts Center is a vital gala partner and an art show that supports the fundraiser offers work from throughout Sacramento. Jurists are artists William Ishmael and Merle Axelrad, and Verge Center representative Paulette Trainor.

Celebrity artists contributing this year include Jian Wang, David Peterson, Gregory Kondos, Maria Winkler and Terry Pappas. The celebrated landscapist Earl Boley will be remembered with several American River canvases donated by his widow, Susan Leith. Eric Johnson of KLM Auctions will wield

the auction gavel and KCRA’s Edie Lambert will emcee.

Silent auctions will offer other award-winning work. From May 16, these can be viewed in an “Art Where the Wild Things Are” exhibition at the Fine Arts Center (Gibbons Drive), Carmichael. For the first time, this year’s selections include several photo entries.

A sunset supper and beverages are part of the \$90 per person admission.

“Criminal Justice
Shadow Day”**

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County high school students are encouraged to register for the 3rd Annual “Criminal Justice Shadow Day.” This unique program gives high school students an opportunity to job shadow professionals from various criminal justice agencies.

Based on the area of interest, students will be paired with prosecuting attorneys, defense attorneys, probation officers, law enforcement officers, investigators and judges to get a first-hand look at the criminal justice process and the different roles within the system. There will also be a presentation on crime scene investigations (CSI), evidence collection, and forensic science used to solve crimes.

This year’s Criminal Justice Shadow Day will be held from 8 a.m. - 2 p.m., Friday, June 16, at the Board of Supervisors’ Chambers in the Sacramento County Administration Building located at 700 H Street, Sacramento.

The program is open to current Sacramento County high school students (incoming 9th graders through 12th graders). Students will need to submit completed registration forms and a signed permission slip, which can be downloaded at www.sacda.org. The deadline to register is June 9, 2017.

Space is limited and on a first come, first served basis.

DA Anne Marie Schubert states, “Since its launch in 2015, close to 200 students from 56 schools across Sacramento County have participated in the Criminal Justice Shadow Day. The success of the program is a result of the partnerships we have with our criminal justice colleagues, and our shared commitment to engage with our youth and inspire them to pursue careers in the justice system.”

The Criminal Justice Shadow Day is one of several DA youth programs designed to increase understanding and build positive relationships between youth and members of the criminal justice system.

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Society For The Blind to Compete in National Fitness Challenge

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

Sacramento nonprofit Society for the Blind is one of 13 groups across the nation – and one of only three in California – that are competing in the United States Association of Blind Athletes' and Anthem Blue Cross Foundation's fifth annual National Fitness Challenge. Society for the Blind and its competitors will provide more than 300 blind and visually impaired youth and adults with an opportunity to increase their physical fitness levels and live healthier, more active lives. Other California participants are Junior Blind in Los Angeles and Lighthouse for the Blind and Visually Impaired in the Bay Area.

"We are pleased to again partner with USABA to help break down barriers, and leverage technology to help those with vision impairments enjoy the physical and emotional benefits of exercise," said Brian Ternan, president of Anthem Blue Cross. "Together, we want to ensure that those with visual impairments are not denied the opportunity to lead an active life and have the opportunity to avoid the health risks that come from a sedentary lifestyle."

Research has consistently shown that individuals who participate in regular physical activity to improve their health have higher energy levels, a lower risk of health-related diseases, improved psychological health, and lower rates of depression and anxiety. Because of the many barriers and misconceptions about their abilities, approximately 70 percent of the nearly 56,000 children and youth who are blind and visually impaired in the United States do not participate in even a limited physical education curriculum.

When the National Fitness Challenge kicked off in Sacramento this spring, participants who signed up with Society for the Blind had a number of physically challenging activities to look forward to. In efforts to increase participants' levels and step counts, staff at Society for the Blind will be working with

dance instructors, personal trainers, judo instructors and more. In addition to raising their overall physical activity, participants will also become more aware of opportunities in their community.

"Society for the Blind is honored and excited to again be a part of the National Fitness Challenge," said Shari Roeseler, executive director. "This partnership with USABA and Anthem raises awareness and, more importantly, participation of people with vision loss in health and fitness activities. We look forward to friendly challenges among our fellow participating agencies as we increase the physical fitness and overall health and wellness of our participants."

For more than 60 years, Society for the Blind has created innovative ways to empower individuals living with low vision or blindness to discover, develop and achieve their full potential. Society for the Blind has grown from a dedicated group of volunteers that included the Lions Clubs of America to a nationally recognized agency and the only comprehensive rehabilitative teaching center that provides services for a 27-county region of northern California. The nonprofit provides low-vision eye care, life and job skills training, mentorship, and access to tools to maintain independence for 6,000 youth, adults and seniors experiencing vision loss each year. Since its founding in 1976, USABA, a community-based organization of the United States Olympic Committee, has reached more than 100,000 blind individuals. The organization has emerged as more than just a world-class trainer of blind athletes, it has become a champion of the abilities of Americans who are legally blind with a mission to enhance the lives of blind and visually impaired people by providing the opportunity for participation in sports and physical activity. Heart of Policing, A Heart of Art

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - An old concrete water tank has provided canvas for American River College students to create a mural saluting Sacramento police history. The work graces a museum at the Sheriff's training academy in Carmichael. Top brass recently joined mural artists to dedicate the finished project.

Seen every day by Sheriff's recruits, "The heart of police work" mural is a 45-foot bouquet of Americana. Volunteer museum director Sharon Telles last year approached American River College Professor Sarah Solis Mattson for ideas to

illuminate her museum's bleak surrounds. "She created a special mural curriculum for her art students," explained Telles. "I told them our department's history. The came up with great ideas."

Aged from 20 to 65, the artists toiled through five summer and winter months. Their panorama contains historic landmarks and milestones: Sutter's Fort; Sacramento's Gold Rush explosion; the railroads and river transport are represented. A bearded, horse-mounted figure dignifies lawmen who risked lives to police the wildest of Wild West towns.

Sacramento's infamous portable gallows - loaned to other counties during decades of use - occupies a sober

segment. Fair Oaks Village's 1906 Murphy-Scott building is an antique background for a squad car. State and national emblems abound: quails, poppies -- even a bald eagle -- are wildlife vignettes. A US flag and Sheriff's badge crown the work. Symbolizing police humanity, a uniformed officer hold hands with two children. One is black; one white.

"The students exceeded my vision for the mural," approves Telles. "Their hard work will be an inspiration to the young recruits who train at this academy."

In past years summer holiday weekends had become major problems along the American River due to excessive alcohol consumption making the parkway less of a family friendly outing because of fights, public nudity, profanity and littering.

Besides Memorial Day weekend, the restriction is also applicable for the holiday weekends of Independence Day as well as Labor Day.

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

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
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Vettes & Vets: The American Muscle Car Show

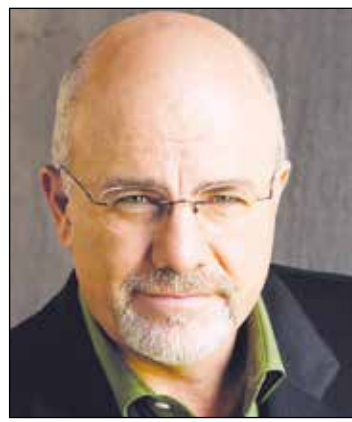

Midlife adjustments?

My husband and I are in our 50s, and we have just \$12,000 to pay off before we're debt-free. We've paid off almost \$70,000 in debt in the last two years. We would like to buy a house soon, but we know we also need an emergency fund. It would take us almost a year to build up an emergency fund, so should we make adjustments to the Baby Steps since we're getting older?

Dear Dawn,

No! It shouldn't take you two a year to build up an emergency fund considering the rate at which you've been paying off debt. You need a fully funded emergency fund or three to six months of expenses set aside before you start saving for a down payment on a home.

You've been making great progress, and you obviously have a good income to be able to pay off debt that quickly. Maybe in your case you could lean a little more toward the three-month

side with your emergency fund before you start saving for a house. Then, after you're all moved in, you could revisit the emergency fund and beef it up to six months.

Just stay on course and stick with the plan, Dawn. Fifty isn't old. You two have plenty of time to get your finances in order, find a great home, and look forward to many great years ahead!

Intent to Execute a Quitclaim Grant Deed to the Arcade Creek Recreation and Park District

WHEREAS, the Los Rios Community College District is the owner of real property located at American River College, in the City of Sacramento, County of Sacramento, State of California, and further identified in the attached Exhibit "A"; and

WHEREAS, in 2013, the District was approached by the Arcade Creek Recreation and Park District to quitclaim its interest in slightly more than three acre situated in the Arcade Creek bed, or on the east side of the creek bed adjacent to the Arcade Creek Recreation and Park District (Recreation and Park District) land to extend its hiking trail to the east side of Arcade Creek, and then over the creek to District property on the west side of the creek; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees determined that the identified parcels were not needed for school classrooms and quitclaiming the property to the Recreation and Park District served the interests of both districts, American River College and the community; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees approved the resolution quitclaiming the property to the Recreation and Park District on April 10, 2013; and

WHEREAS, it has become clear that to complete the project, the Recreation and Park District needs an additional approximately 7,538 square feet of District property as described in the attached Exhibit "A" and as consideration for this transfer the Recreation and Park District has agreed to defend, indemnify and hold the District harmless from any claims arising out of this property, including claims made by third parties under the Americans with Disabilities Act; and

WHEREAS, granting a Quitclaim Deed is to the District's benefit, and it will not adversely affect the District in any respect; and

WHEREAS, Education Code, section 81430 provides that "the governing board of any community college district may sell, exchange, grant to or quitclaim all or any of its interest in, or may lease for a term not exceeding 99 years, to the federal government or its agencies, to the state, or to any county, city and county, city or special district, or to any other school district, any real property belonging to the district and which is not or will not at the time of delivery of title or possession be needed for school classroom buildings by the district owning it, as provided in this article"; and

WHEREAS, the District is required by Education Code, section 81432 to declare its intention in a resolution authorizing such action, and to publish such resolution in a newspaper published in the District and having a general circulation published no less than once a week for three weeks prior to the making of the consummation of the transaction: Now, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees declares its intention to grant a quitclaim deed of the property described in the attached Exhibit "A" containing approximately 7,538 square feet to the Arcade Creek Recreation and Park District for the purpose of allowing the Recreation and Park District to extend its hiking trail to the east side of Arcade Creek, and then over the creek to District property on the west side of the creek.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT that a copy of this resolution be published as required by Education Code, section 81432.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT upon completion of the publication as required by Education Code, section 81432, the Chancellor or designee is authorized to execute the quitclaim deed to Arcade Creek Recreation and Park District described herein.

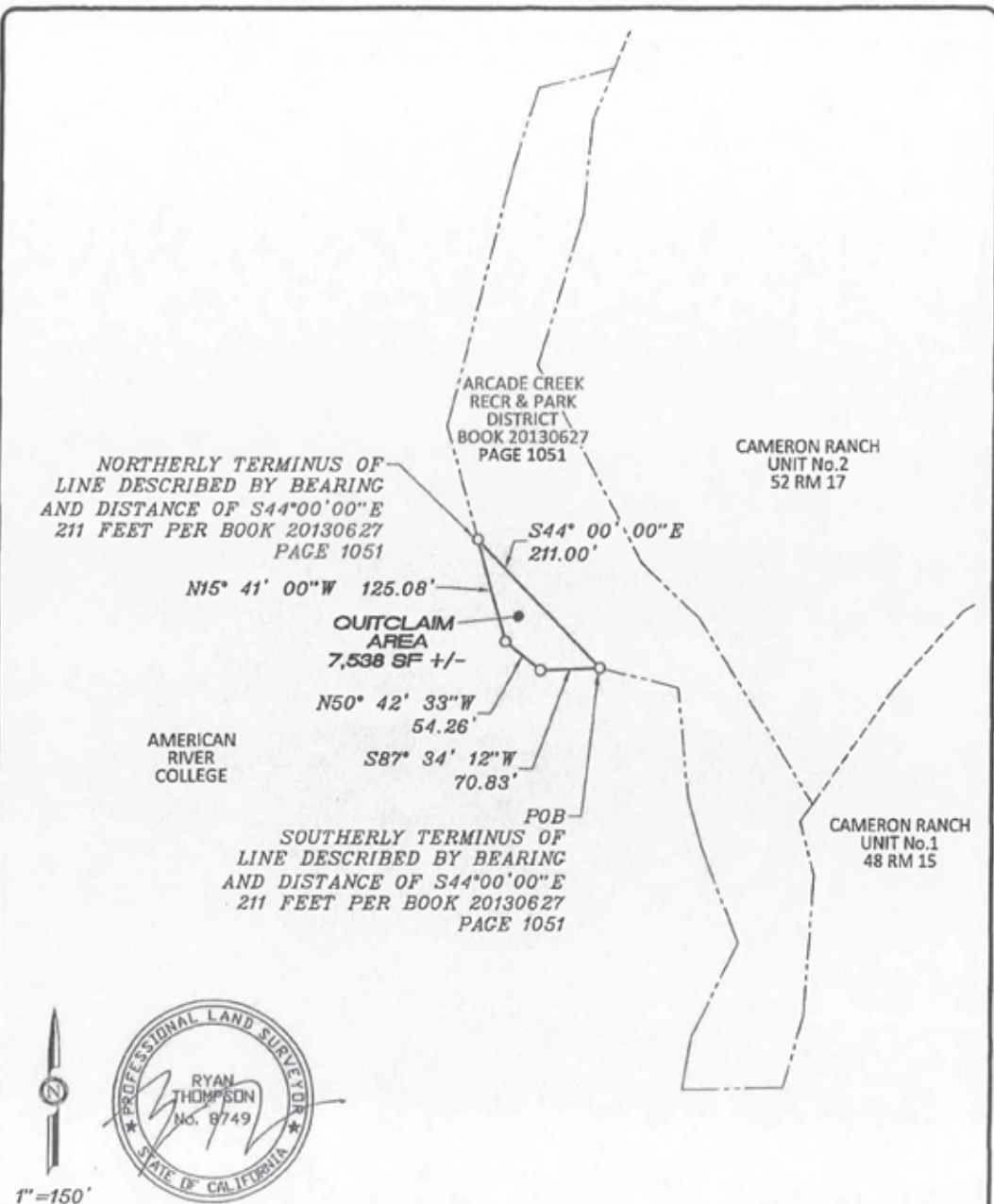

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CRUSH LIFE: Inspiration From the Field



Our Wounded Warriors can still take a big swing at life.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - I have been playing America's game ever since I was 3 years old. I love the smell of a stadium hot dog, fresh cut grass, and the sound of a ball when it hits the bat. Baseball is my sport. I enjoy it on and off the field, and I can truly say it is the most beautiful sport around. I've been blessed with the speed to run from home to first base in under 4.5 seconds; that's 90 feet! While I feel lucky to have such talent, I must admit I rarely consider what it would be like not to have these abilities.

I recently had the opportunity to spend a day with the Wounded Warriors Amputee Softball Team who is made up of some incredibly brave people...true heroes! Not just because they served in the

United States military, but because they are amazing, inspiring, and all around brave souls. These men and women were wounded in combat; some lost their arms, some lost their legs... but they never lost their will to succeed!

My dad has been active duty for over ten years now, and I have watched him deploy twice and come back home safely. I never once thought about my dad losing an arm or a leg. I admit feeling like he is indestructible, sort of assuming he would be okay. But the truth is, when a soldier goes to war they are risking their life: there is no guarantee they will be safe.

These warriors went to war just like my dad but they were injured, injured bad. I honestly didn't know what I was getting into meeting this team. I had never met anyone who lost an arm or leg, and I was a little

nervous at first. I kept thinking to myself "What if I offend them with my questions?" I sure didn't want to do that.

But as I watched these men and women play ball, I realized we share a love of the game. Their bases may not be

90 feet apart, but who cares?! These athletes are doing exactly what I do when I lace up my cleats and hit the field: they are playing the best game around: baseball!

I sat down with two of the players, Cody and Josh, to ask

them some questions about their past, and I as in awe by their stories. These athletes were just doing their job, the job they were trained to do, and then the unthinkable happened. They could have given up, but instead they found the courage and the drive to keep on going. They found a new cause to fight for, and refused to let anything get in their way.

Whether they believe it or not they are still heroes, every time they take the field or saddle up to the plate. These athletes get out on that ball field and run, dive for balls, scale the wall for that winning catch, and play their hearts out over and over again. I am sure they must be in pain from time to time, must occasionally stumble on their new legs, but they never give up.

By refusing to drop their glove to the ground and quit a game, they send a powerful message about never giving up in life.

I will leave you with something one of the players, Nick, told me, something that will stick with me for the rest of my life. Nick is amazing, his story is so inspiring—this hero has been through more than most of us will ever go through in our lifetime, and he still carries a smile on his face and lives life to the fullest. I asked all the players to sign my jersey, and along with his signature Nick added something special: his personal motto.

I hope it will inspire you as it does me, "Crush Life!"

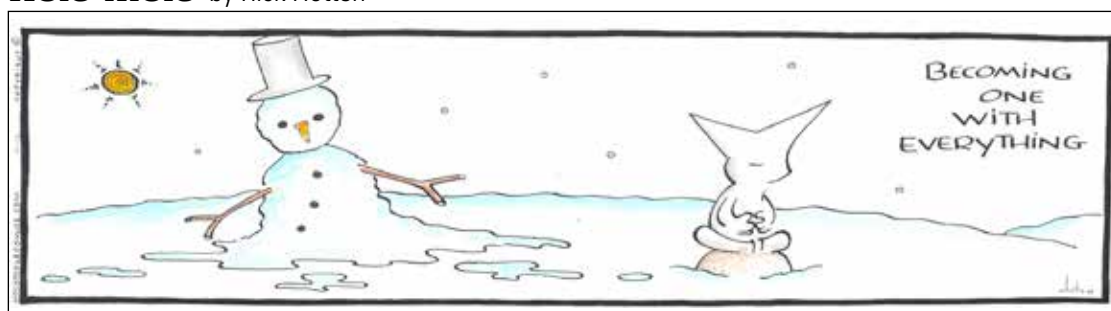

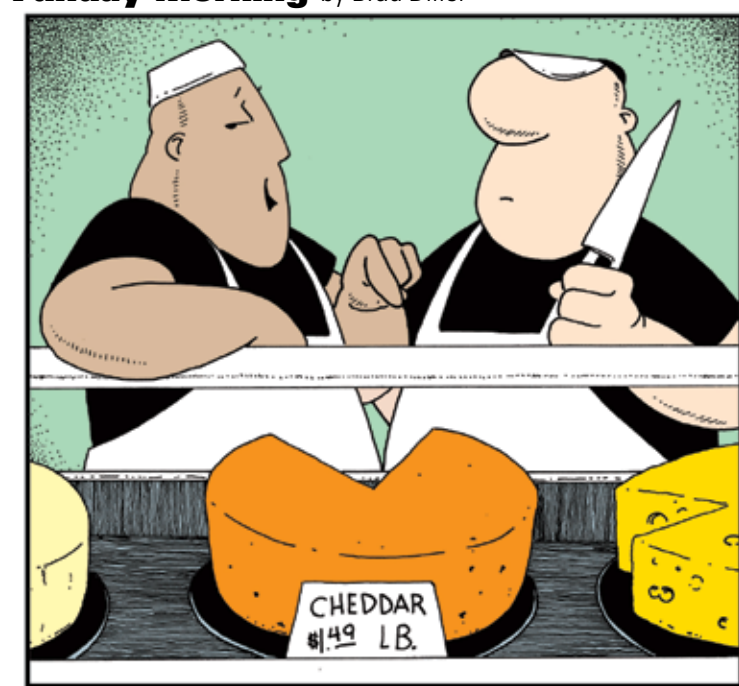

Top Border Cop: The Sanders Drug-Importation Bill Keeps Me Awake At Night

A 24-year-old woman recently crossed the Mexican border in Nogales, Arizona on foot, pushing an inconspicuous stroller. In addition to her two young children, it carried five pounds of fentanyl, a deadly opioid 50 times more powerful than heroin. Law enforcement intercepted the drug shipment this time. But many other packages get through, with fatal consequences.

As a recently retired 25 year public servant and former police chief of Nogales, I have seen firsthand the fentanyl crisis and the human carnage it wreaks. So it's with deep concern that I read about Sen. Bernie Sanders' bill to open the U.S. pharmaceutical market to foreign prescription medications.

The legislation, which would allow Americans to buy medicines directly from overseas suppliers, is intended to cut drug costs, since drugs from abroad are often cheaper than those in the United States. While well-intentioned, the legislation would increase the flow of illegal narcotics and counterfeit drugs laced with fentanyl into the United States. Local law enforcement, already strained by narco traffickers, would find their time and their resources spread perilously thin.

Police nationwide are struggling to address an opioid crisis so severe that it's dramatically increased mortality rates for middle-aged, white Americans. Addicts face a double peril as Mexican cartels often lace prescription opioids with fentanyl.

"They think they're taking oxy, but they're actually taking fentanyl, and it's lights out," one Drug Enforcement Administration special agent recently said. In metro Phoenix alone, 32 people in the past two years died after taking counterfeit OxyContin pills laced with fentanyl that came from Mexico. And in 2014, the number of fentanyl-related deaths nationwide more than doubled in a single year to 4,200.

In the past few years, we've lost firefighters and college grads, senior citizens and avid outdoorsmen, to fentanyl that was brought across the border. I've seen the corpses and stood in front of the grieving families. Their preventable and untimely deaths have haunted me on the clock and off.

If the Sanders drug importation bill is passed, the dead may soon include patients who thought they were taking legitimate drugs for legal purposes. Right now, the United States has the safest prescription-drug supply chain on the planet because of the Food and Drug Administration's restrictions on

foreign-drug importation. Most medicines are produced domestically. The ones that aren't made in America are imported via closely monitored supply chains, to ensure that foreigners can't purposely or unwittingly ship fake drugs to Americans.

If we get rid of those protections and allow foreigners to ship medicines directly to Americans, bad actors will seize the chance to profit, even if it kills people.

Under the proposed bill, packages of medicines would come into the country largely unmonitored – and it is likely that many illicit drugs would slip in through the cracks. With the FDA unable to weed out fake and contaminated medicines from legitimate pills, responsibility will fall to local law enforcement.

But, the proposed legislation would put law enforcement in a no-win situation. We don't have the resources or the manpower to take on more responsibility. Innocent patients will die from counterfeit medications after taking what they think are legitimate prescription pills.

The Sanders bill is intended to save lives and help patients afford medications. But every way I look at it, this legislation will cost lives.

Defendant Convicted of Two Robberies

DATE: May 5, 2017
CASE: Pierre Cleveland (Case #15F05965)
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Kristen Andersen, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

Pierre Cleveland was convicted by jury of two counts of robbery for two separate robberies which took place in September 2015. The jury also found that he used a gun during the course of the first robbery and was a felon in possession of a firearm.

On September 7, 2015 Cleveland went into a Chevron station on 4700 Florin Road with a firearm and robbed the sole employee. He stole money from the register and after the victim refused to get on the ground, he shot the firearm off two times before fleeing the scene. On September 29, 2015, Cleveland went to the Florin Shopping Center located at 6005 Florin Road. He robbed the victim of \$5,600.00 in cash. The victim had just withdrawn the money from the US Bank and was about to get in his car when Cleveland struck him over the head and stole his money. Cleveland then fled the scene in a car that was waiting for him in the Sears parking lot. Officers were able to locate Cleveland in a nearby parking lot after the license plate of the fleeing vehicle was obtained. Cleveland was detained by law enforcement and was found to have half of the victim's money and the gun from the first robbery on his person. Cleveland faces a maximum sentence of 27 years and 8 months in state prison. Sentencing is set for June 2, 2017 at 10:00 a.m. in Department 40 before the Honorable Raoul Thorbourne.

Defendant Convicted of Kidnapping & Assault with Intent to Commit Rape

DATE: May 9, 2017
CASE: Thomas Chavez (Case #15F04824)
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Maria Wilson, Adult Sexual Assault Unit

Thomas Chavez was convicted by a Sacramento Superior Court judge of kidnapping and assault with the intent to commit rape.

On August 6, 2015, at approximately midnight, a woman was walking down Stockton Boulevard when Chavez pulled up behind her in his car. He jumped out of his car, grabbed her from behind, held an ice pick to her neck and forced her into his car. Chavez drove behind a nearby store to an isolated area. Fortunately, CHP officers who were nearby observed Chavez drive behind the store and went to investigate. The officers shined their light into the vehicle and heard the woman screaming for help. Chavez was arrested soon after.

The Honorable Laurel White found Chavez guilty of kidnapping and assault to commit rape. In addition, the court found Chavez had suffered prior convictions for sexual assault in 1988. Chavez faces a sentence of 30 years to life in state prison. Sentencing is set for June 2, 2017 at 9:00 a.m. in Dept 10.

Defendant Convicted for North Highlands Party Shooting

DATE: May 12, 2017
CASE: Ira Johnson (Case #15F04234)
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Jeff Hightower, Homicide Unit

Ira Johnson was convicted by a jury for the second-degree murder of Rogelio Gastelum, and two counts of attempted murder. The jury also found true allegations that Johnson personally discharged a firearm causing death or great bodily injury.

On July 12, 2015, Ira Johnson and his friends attended a party in North Highlands. When asked to leave, the group started a fight. Johnson and another unidentified man pulled out guns and fired multiple shots into the crowd of partygoers, killing Rogelio Gastelum. Two other victims were shot, but survived their injuries.

Johnson faces a maximum sentence of 59 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for July 21, 2017, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 41 before the Honorable Helena Gweon.

Defendant Convicted for Murder by Lying in Wait

DATE: May 12, 2017
CASE: Timothy Varmall (Case #15F01019)
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Omar Singh, Homicide Unit

The Honorable Michael Bowman found Timothy Varmall guilty of the first-degree murder of Smurti Patel. Judge Bowman also found true the allegations that Varmall was personally armed and committed the murder by means of lying in wait.

Between September 2014 and February 2015, Timothy Varmall followed Smurti Patel and planned "coincidental" run-ins with her to make her think favorably of him. His purpose during those months was to find the best opportunity to kill Ms. Patel. On February 9, 2015, Varmall stalked Ms. Patel and followed her onto a light rail train. As they exited, Ms. Patel spotted Varmall and agreed to walk with him. As they walked across a dark lot, Varmall stabbed Ms. Patel seven times. Varmall fled the area while Ms. Patel staggered across the street to a restaurant, where medics were called to the scene. Ms. Patel died from her wounds on February 13, 2015. Varmall confided in one of Ms. Patel's friends that he murdered her because he was romantically interested in Ms. Patel and she rejected him.

The Court also found true that Varmall suffered two prior strike convictions for purposes of the Three Strikes Law. In 1994, Varmall was convicted of sexual penetration with a foreign object and forced oral copulation.

Varmall faces a maximum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for June 9, 2017, at 10:30 a.m. in Department 20 before the Honorable Michael Bowman. ★

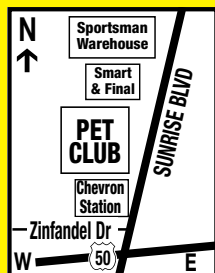
