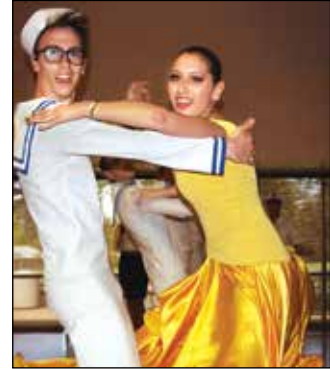

## The Stars Come Out in Carmichael

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - Carmichael Chamber of Commerce has proclaimed Good Day Sacramento's powerhouse anchor Tina Macuha Carmichael Person of the Year. A recent awards dinner saw Macuha, three business people, a junior activist, a stalwart volunteer and a local non-profit honored. Arden Hills Resort hosted the sold-out fundraiser.

Beyond her high-profile career, Macuha's victory over breast cancer and support for others in fighting the disease earned ovations. "I will always help in some way, when it comes to breast cancer," she confirmed in accepting the award. Congressman Ami Bera, Senator Jim Nielson, Assemblyman Ken Cooley and Supervisor Susan Peters added legislative commendations to the honoree's laurels.

Armed with a massive bouquet, the broadcast veteran won hearts by citing the many local businesses - particularly eateries - she regularly patronizes. "I was raised in Carmichael; I support Carmichael," boasted Macuha. Her dinner date was 24-year-old daughter Carina; other supporters included a media constellation. Good Day Sacramento staffers Marianne McClary, Laura Skirde, Julissa Ortiz - plus KFBK hosts Kitty O'Neal and Sheriff John McGinness - were among Macuha's cheering section.

Additional honorees ranged in age from 12 years to nearly 90.

The event's Junior Hero category recognized Cameron Dax. Now 12 years old, precocious philanthropist staged his first food drive six years ago. Three local food banks enjoy support from his efforts.

Local businesses were also recognized: Leatherby's Family Creamery patriarch David Leatherby accepted Businessman of the Year award on behalf of five generations of absent and present kin. Nurse and company owner Angela Sehr (Advanced Home Health and Hospice) is Businesswoman of the Year. Aegis of Carmichael general manager Layla Seiler became Young Professional of 2017. Octogenarian community volunteer Artie Van Winkle was cheered for years of service to the Chamber and many other non-profits. The Sacramento Fine Arts Center - whose projects champion arts and assist other community causes -- is Non-Profit of the Year.

To start putting his "retirement" plan together, Winter attended the second annual Small Business Resources Workshop March 24 at the Carmichael Park Club House,

# Steinberg Talks Homelessness, Economy, Education at Chamber Luncheon

- Seemingly aware of the long-standing perception by some that Sacramento County's outlying communities often receive a smaller share of both attention and services, Sacramento Mayor Darrell Steinberg served as the guest speaker Tuesday at the Carmichael Chamber of Commerce monthly luncheon at Christ Community Church, where he delivered a three-pronged platform for change that included the elimination of what he called "artificial boundaries" between the city proper and its neighboring communities.

The former state senator, elected in June of 2016 to serve as the city's 56th mayor, said Sacramento's tradition of operating as a "government city" is at odds with his broad-range goals, which include addressing homelessness, ramping up the region's economic base and bolstering education.

"I want to put a point of emphasis on what I believe to be an undeniable fact that we are a single region," said Steinberg, just after jokingly referring to himself as the "Out-of-Town Mayor." "Our challenges and our problems know no artificial boundaries," he said.

Steinberg said being in local government affords a new opportunity to put his issues of concern into action and track his progress more closely.

"I focus on three things," Steinberg said, beginning with economic diversification, which he says has already begun and involves selling the city as, not just a government town and region, but one that is evolving rapidly as an arts and entertainment destination.

"Sacramento, and Carmichael

and our greater region have long-been known as a government town," Steinberg said. "But our future lies not just in being the center of public service, but in building a highway to private sector economy."

Steinberg indicated a priority to expand the programs offered at U.C. Davis to create jobs and further educational opportunities. "We need to bring U.C. Davis across the river and we need to be partners in research and entrepreneurial activity and economic growth," he said. As for tech jobs and the economy, he added that he's been courting

companies and entities across the bay area and beyond in an effort to expand the city's economic base.

"We need jobs," said Steinberg. "The only way we're going we're going to afford to do the things that I want to do is to build a highway to a tax base that is sustainable and to define and declare our own destiny. And so I'm constantly selling the city."

Next on his list was homelessness. Steinberg said he will be working to expand the County Board of Supervisors' recent bid to create roughly 1,755 housing

units for homeless individuals and extending the existing network of mental health and substance abuse programs for the county's homeless population, which is now tipping the 3,500 mark.

"We must tackle the homeless problem in our city and in our region in a more effective and systemic way," said Steinberg. "And by the way, not only is that issue a humanitarian issue first and foremost, but it also has an undeniable connection to our business climate everywhere we go." He said the issue is no longer a Sacramento center issue, but one of deep concern across the county, adding that "the numbers validate the fact that this is an issue that is getting worse, not better."

He said the county was failing to provide enough emergency shelter to meet the demands to service the roughly 3,500 people estimated to be living on the streets each night. Existing programs and more housing are needed to make a dent. As State Senator, Steinberg authored a measure, Prop. 63, which taxes earnings over \$1 million at 1 percent. He said that program is currently generating \$2 billion a year for funding of mental health, case management and substance abuse programs for the homeless, but needs back up in the way of sufficient affordable housing.

"We know it works, but what we lack is the inventory and the capacity to help more people with what we know works," Steinberg said.

Steinberg also said funding for these programs must be renewable in order to avoid a cycle of homelessness going forward and to protect those "living on the edge" of homeless "so they don't become homeless."

"Our goal needs to be to get at

least 2,000 homeless people off the streets now" Steinberg said, adding "I don't know what the end result of all these efforts will be, but I'm very confident that, while we won't cure this, we can make it much better. And we at least ought to do our very best," he said.

Finally, Steinberg announced the city has received \$2 million in funding thus far to support an internship program for 1,000 area high school juniors. The program, set to begin this summer, will provide eight weeks of paid training for students in a partnership with local employers. Steinberg did not say how those 1,000 students would be selected, but added that the program provides a critical pathway for getting graduates into the workforce.

"We need to begin educating and training our young people for these jobs of the future," said Steinberg. "For many young people, being exposed to the workforce is transformational in terms of their life direction."

When questions came from the audience, it was clear the growing issue of homelessness remains a top concern among business leaders and residents alike. One of the individuals who spoke directly to Mayor

Steinberg's plans for addressing the issue was Fred Rivas, now a partner at a Folsom-based electrical company, but also a recovering addict who was once himself homeless.

"Jobs are key," said Rivas. "They are not just a hand out, but a hand up."

When asked if there was any room for homeless individuals in need of a job in his high school workforce internship program, Steinberg agreed that having a job was an important part of "reclaiming life," but said the funding this time around was earmarked for the student internship program only. "Not in the first (pot) of money, but subsequently," he said.

Steinberg was asked about the viability of code changes to allow for the legalization of tiny home communities as an affordable option for housing the area's homeless, similar to models up-and-running in other states and an idea he said he supported.

"The one thing about tiny homes is that you can get them on line faster," said Steinberg. "We can't afford to wait three to four years. These are human beings."

After the event, Steinberg addressed the growing concern by communities pondering the impact of the legalization of marijuana. He said regulation and oversight of the tax benefits from the sale of marijuana must be channeled into city services to support enforcement of the laws and the related impact of drug addiction.

"We need to regulate it very strongly," said Steinberg. "It's a significant revenue opportunity for city services, but as the industry develops we need to make sure that those revenues are used for law enforcement and drug treatment and other things." ★

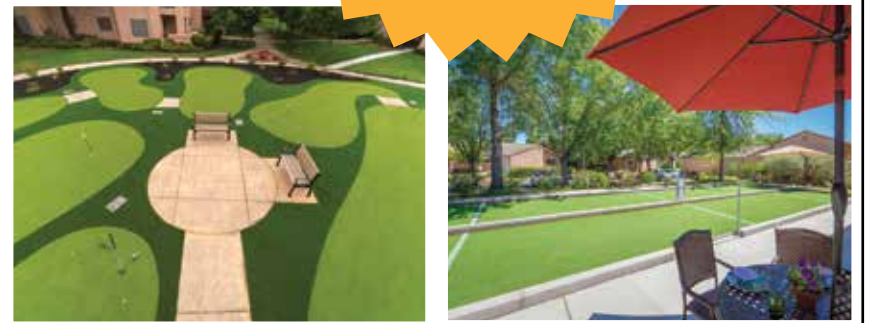

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Dancers from Provo High School (UT) will favor Mission Oaks Community Center audiences with routines that have made them state ballroom champions many times over. Ending a tour of performances in several California cities, the free event kicks off 11 am on Friday, April 7.

An 18-year tradition at Provo High, the student tour crowns competition and fundraising efforts. The teenagers pay two-thirds of the tour cost themselves.

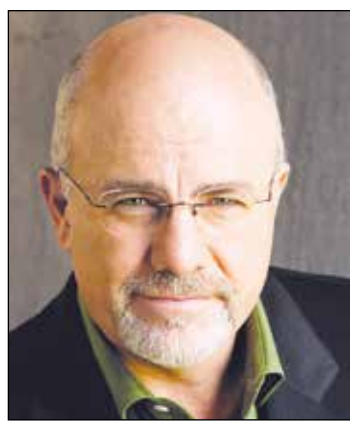

### Teens and checkbooks

Dear Dave,

My daughter is 15, and she's had jobs around the house and been on commission and the envelope system for years. She's very good about saving and not spending on silly things. We recently opened a checking account for her, and I was wondering what bills you think we should assign for her to pay on her own?

Dear Suzanne,

This sounds a lot like we did with our kids. She's obviously bright and motivated, so the first thing you do is explain to her the seriousness and responsibility associated with a checking account. The next step is for her to balance the checkbook with you looking over her shoulder.

Do this with her for several months, while you keep one on the account, too. After that, I want her to do it alone and show you her work. Her balance should match yours and the one at the bank.

## New California Law Puts Charge in Lead-Acid Battery Sales

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Beginning April 1, 2017, sales of lead-acid batteries will be subject to two \$1 fees. Manufacturers will pay a \$1 fee for every lead-acid battery sold to a retailer, wholesaler, distributor, or other person for retail sale in California. Consumers will pay a \$1 fee on each purchase of a replacement lead-acid battery.

As signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown, the Lead-Acid Battery Recycling Act of 2016 requires retailers to register, collect, and remit the fee to the Board of Equalization (BOE); and manufacturers to register and remit the fee to the BOE. Manufacturers who are considered retailers are required

to collect the \$1 California battery fee as well as pay the \$1 manufacturer battery fee. Retailers who purchase and import lead-acid batteries from a manufacturer who is not subject to the jurisdiction of California must pay the \$1 manufacturer battery fee.

A lead-acid battery – the type commonly found in vehicles – is any battery that weighs more than five kilograms (11 pounds), is composed primarily of both lead and sulfuric acid, and has a capacity of six or more volts. Retailers will charge a refundable deposit, subject to sales tax, when a consumer purchases a replacement lead-acid battery and does not simultaneously

provide a used lead-acid battery to the dealer.

The fee is expected to generate \$26 million annually. Revenues collected will be deposited into the Lead-Acid Battery Cleanup Fund, where they will be used to investigate, evaluate, clean up, remediate, remove, monitor, or otherwise respond to any area in the state that may have been contaminated by the operation of a lead-acid battery recycling facility.

Beginning April 1, 2022, manufacturers will no longer be required to collect and remit the \$1 fee. Instead, consumers will pay a \$2 fee upon purchase of a replacement lead-acid battery. ★

# Intelligence Reports Reveal Russia's Secret War against America's Fracking Industry

Recent intelligence reports show Russia is interested in influencing more than just America's elections. Russian President Vladimir Putin and his cronies have taken aim at undermining the U.S. energy industry.

Buried within the U.S. intelligence community's report on Russian activities in the presidential election is evidence the Kremlin is financing and choreographing anti-fracking propaganda in the United States. By targeting fracking, Putin hopes to increase oil and gas prices, destabilize the U.S. economy and threaten America's energy independence.

Fracking, or hydraulic fracturing, is a drilling technique in which water and sand are pumped through rock at high pressure to release deposits of oil and natural gas.

Thanks to new technologies which make the process more efficient and environmentally friendly, fracking supports 4.3 million jobs and generates half a trillion dollars in economic benefit to the United States annually. Natural gas prices have dropped in half, saving American families \$200 a year on average.

Fracking is the major reason why the country is on pace to become completely energy independent by 2020. America relies on fracking to produce more than 1.5 billion barrels of oil yearly -- over half of total

U.S. oil output.

Russia sees all this as a threat.

The Russian government, relying heavily on energy exports for revenues, is concerned "about the impact of fracking and U.S. gas production on the global energy market. "Increased U.S. gas exports create "potential challenges" for the profitability of Russia's state-owned oil and gas monopoly.

In response to America's growing fracking industry, RT, Russia's government-funded international media outlet, aired a slew of dubious attacks against fracking -- ramming 62 anti-fracking television stories down viewers' throats in seven months.

This isn't the first time Russia has been accused of anti-fracking

activism.

In 2014, intelligence information led then-NATO secretary general to conclude Moscow conspired with environmental groups to block fracking activities in Romania, Lithuania and Bulgaria.

A U.S. Senate report found the Sea Change Foundation funneled over \$43 million to environmental causes, financing anti-fracking organizations like the League of Conservation Voters and the Sierra Club. The foundation is heavily funded by a Bermuda-based shell corporation with direct ties to Putin and Russian oil interests.

Russia's propaganda and money funneled to America's most extreme environmental outfits explains why anti-fracking attacks

continue even though science confirmed fracking poses no public health threat.

The EPA could "not find evidence that [fracking] led to widespread, systemic impacts on drinking water resources."

The U.S. Geological Survey and the Groundwater Protection Council found fracking caused no groundwater contamination. A three-year study at the University of Cincinnati found fracking had no impact on local water supplies.

Fracking created millions of jobs, spurred the economy and created a path to energy independence -- without posing a risk to people or the environment.

It seems the only folks left attacking fracking are puppets

of the anti-science, anti-American Russian propaganda machine. They hope lies about fracking can weaken the United States, dry up the supply of oil and gas, drive up energy costs and force European countries to pour money into Putin's coffers.

As the U.S. intelligence report proves, Russia is willing to go to great lengths to destroy America's fracking industry. But the United States should stand firm against this threat. The battle over fracking is one fight America can't afford to lose.

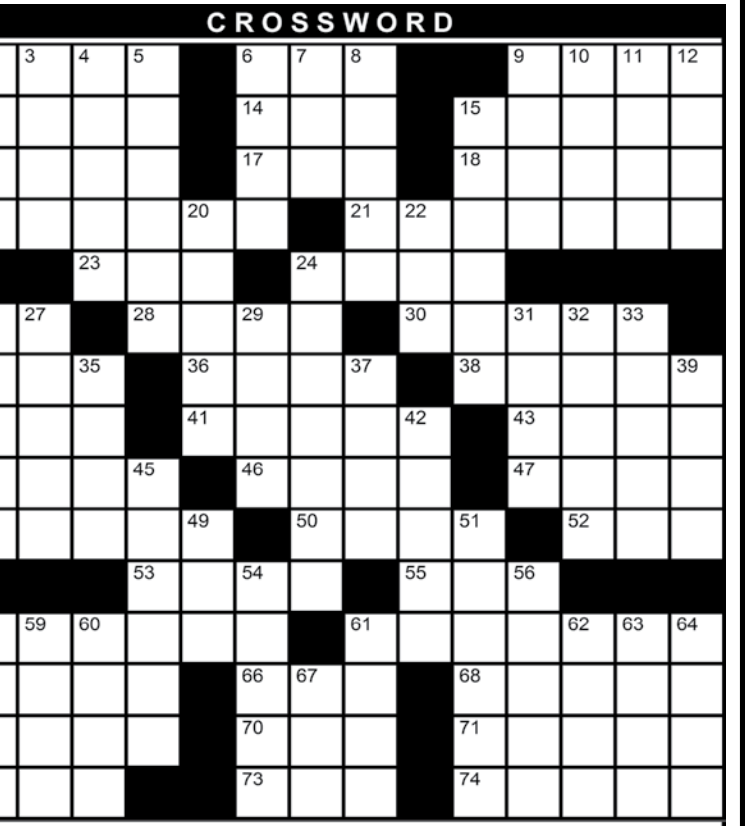
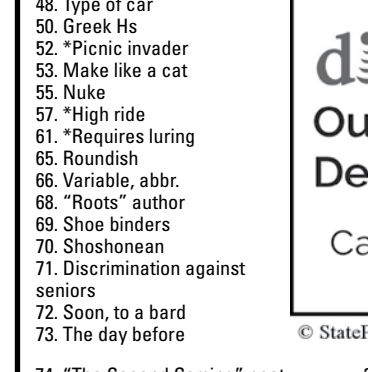

# Small Business Workshop Offers Vital Resources

owners gathered to collect resources from county, state and federal officials about how to get help for everything from obtaining small business “micro” loans and tax help support, to the bidding process for county and federal contracts and how to get support for women- or minority owned companies, or those in underserved areas.

“I’m not retired yet, but when I do get there, I intend to launch my own company doing what I’ve always done,” said Winter, who plans to start up a mobile automotive performance service. One of the key questions on his mind at the workshop was how to get clearance to operate outside his resident city of Citrus Heights. He got that, and much more. “I didn’t realize how many resources there are out there for small companies,” said Winter.

The Small Business Resource Workshop was presented by State Assemblyman Ken Cooley, who kicked-off the event with an energetic push for supporting small businesses, saying they play a key role in driving the economic engine of all communities. “Dollars get spent. You put money in the pockets of employees, who then spend that money in their community, and that’s how communities grow,” Cooley said.

Perhaps one of the most daunting and oft-misunderstood agencies governing laws pertaining to small businesses is the State Board of Equalization, the state’s main governing agency over business tax reporting and licensing. To help demystify some of the issues was David Nelson, who told attendees that many entrepreneurs who set out on their own don’t always reach out to his agency for available help, often leading to

their unnecessary failure.

“We don’t want anyone going out of business because they didn’t know about the resources available to them,” Nelson said.

In addition to providing free, online sellers permit applications, Nelson explained that the board of equalization can guide small business owners through the process of correctly reporting sales, even if they don’t have any, how to craft a solid business plan for potential funding or grant opportunities, and options for creating a financial roadmap for success.

“We are not in the business of justifying how much you do, but reporting what you do,” said Nelson.

Joe McClure, district director of the Small Business Administration (SBA) office in Sacramento explained how his agency works to secure micro

and small business loans for start-ups of all sizes and focus, and then he cautioned borrowers about defaulting on an SBA loan. “If you don’t pay it back,

we will find you,” McClure said.

For women and minority owned small business owners, and those from underserved communities, Deboarh Lowe Muramoto from California Capital Financial Development Corp. was on hand to discuss how her agency secured more than \$30 million contracts last year for small businesses. In addition, the center provided roughly 200,000 hours of counseling to existing and would-be business owners, and served more than 3,500 in its bilingual training programs, she said.

One of the most important things a small business owner can do, Muramoto told the crowd, is learn how to effectively represent themselves in their community.

“We also offer classes in advocacy,” Muramoto said. “Advocating for yourself as a small business is critical.” ★

# Legislation to Ban Sale of Nitrous Oxide Unanimously Passes First Committee

Senator Jim Nielsen’s Measure – SB 631 – Will Help Save Young Lives

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - After hearing heartbreaking stories of a mother’s grief over the loss of her daughter and a young man who suffered spinal cord degeneration and was confined to a wheelchair, both due to nitrous oxide abuse, members of the Senate Public Safety Committee unanimously passed Senator Jim Nielsen’s (R-Tehama) measure to prohibit smoke shops and head shops from selling these “whippits.”

“There is no legitimate reason for smoke shops to sell nitrous oxide,” said Senator Jim Nielsen. “Young people buy and inhale this gas to get ‘high’ because they mistakenly believe it is a ‘safe’ substance.”

Mary Anne Rand, mother of Camille Rand who was killed in a fatal car accident by a driver who was believed to be high on nitrous oxide, said, “My daughter’s life was cut short at the age of 26. I hope Senator Nielsen’s bill becomes law to reduce the chance of any other parent suffering the loss of their child.”

Nitrous oxide use is difficult to prove because it does not

stay in a user’s bloodstream for long.

Ms. Rand added, “Because deaths and injuries are just ‘believed to be attributable to’ I am afraid the extent of the problem is underreported and not statistically available.”

Specifically, Senate Bill 631, if passed and signed into law, would prohibit smoke and head shops from selling nitrous oxide.

According to the National Institute on Drug Abuse recreational use of nitrous oxide can lead to “death from lack of oxygen to the brain, altered perception and motor coordination, loss of sensation, limb spasms, blackouts caused by blood pressure changes, and depression of heart muscles functioning.”

“My concern about whippits, and the damage they cause to the central nervous system, led me to reach out to Senator Nielsen and share my story. I view the abuse of this substance as a public health hazard,” said Mr. Patrick O’Brien, father of a 20-year-old whose spinal cord degenerated and was confined to a wheelchair.

Senate Bill 631 passed the Senate Public Safety Committee unanimously. It will now move onto the Senate Committee on Business, Professions and Economic Development for its consideration.

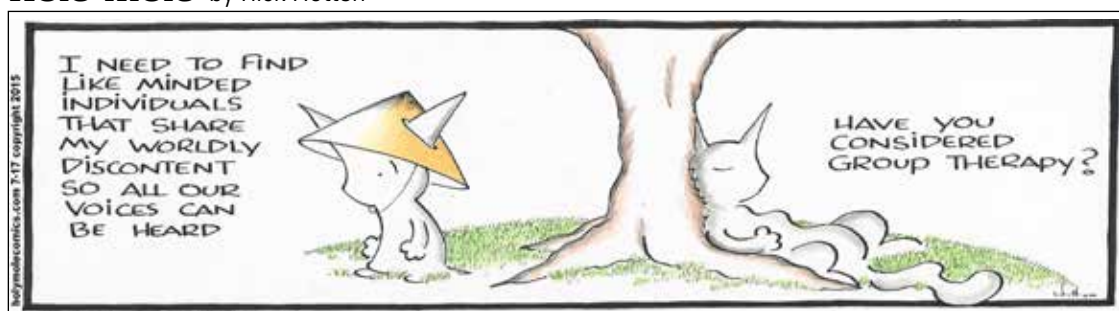

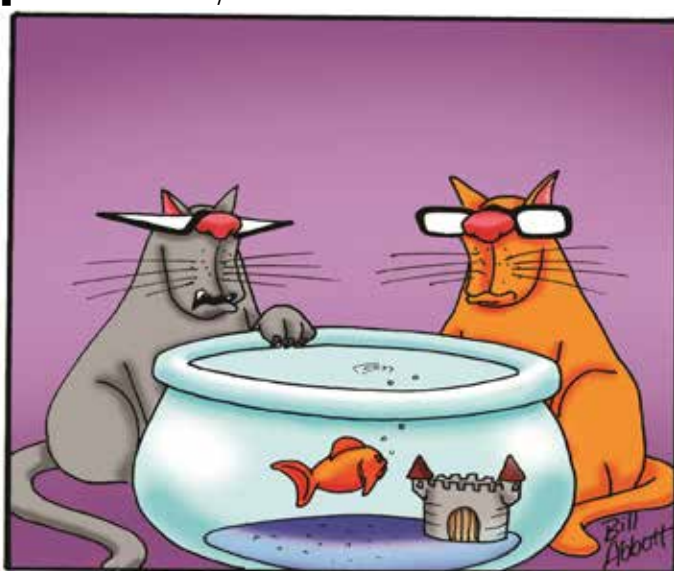

The March 8, Wikileaks dump of over 9,000 emails, a dump reportedly far larger and worse than the Edward Snowden revelations in 2013. A dump disclosing potential spying of Americans by their own television sets, whether on or off, or by their automobiles. Sophisticated cyber technology “beyond what Snowden could have imagined,” capable of spying leaving the footprint of other countries so our government remains undetected. The power to blackmail the powerful of either political party is in the hands of the “Deep State.” And reportedly, the 9,000 documents are but 1% of what Wikileaks has received by whistle blowers within the National Security Agency (NSA).

No one is exempt, not even President Donald Trump. One warrant allowed the spying of Trump Tower during the latter part of the Trump campaign and a second the Trump server itself, the first reportedly authorized by the FISA Court—a largely secret court where intelligence organizations CIA, FBI and etc. request spying authority. Since 1979 only 12 requests were denied out of 38,169 made. The judges almost never turn down the intelligence community. The second, by the FBI authorized by someone higher, some have suggested President Barack Obama.

As serious as this is, it is not new. Some remember CIA spying on the U.S. Senate Intelligence Committee led by Democrat Committee Chairperson Dianne Feinstein just three years ago this month. In this scandal, the

CIA acknowledged that it “had secretly searched Senate computer files related to an investigation of the agency’s Bush-era harsh interrogation program.” The Senate was investigating them and was about to release its incriminating findings. Their admission that they lied for several months when accused of having done this and their apology to the senators to whom they had spied, does not make such acceptable.

Nor did they disclose who directed them to spy on the Senate in the first place? This wasn’t just any group of U.S., it was the Senate Intelligence Committee, charged with overseeing all spying sponsored by our government. In effect, the CIA was spying on its congressional boss.

But Wikileaks dumps and spying on a presidential candidate or the US Senate are extreme examples of the power of the “Deep State.” What of their power to spy, and potentially blackmail our elected officials, or you?

We have known for years of the government’s secret surveillance network, code named “Stellar Wind,” that intercepts, deciphers, analyzes, and stores “vast swaths of the world’s communications as they zap down from satellites and zip through the underground and undersea cables of international, foreign, and domestic networks... Flowing through its servers and routers and stored in near-bottomless databases.” Stored are “all forms of communication, including the complete contents of private emails, cell phone calls, and Google searches, as well as all sorts of personal data trails—parking receipts, travel itineraries, bookstore purchases, and other digital “pocket litter” (James Bamford, “The NSA Is Building the Country’s Biggest Spy Center. Watch What You Say,” Wired, Mar. 15, 2012) Edward Snowden documentation revealed their “intercepting 200 million text messages every day worldwide through a program called Dishfire” (Lorenzo Franceschi-Bicchieri, “The 10 Biggest Revelations from Edward Snowden’s Leaks,” Mashable, Jun. 05, 2014).

So where is your sensitive information stored? Launched in 2004 under the George W. Bush Administration, but vastly expanded under Barack Obama, the National Security Agency

Bluffdale, Utah facility houses all electronic information in the world. It is designed to hold a Yottabyte of information. A yottabyte is 1,000 zettabytes (the number 1 followed by 24 zeros -- 1,000,000,000,000,000,000,000,000). The philosophy is that the “more data, the more telephone calls, the more email, the more encrypted data that you have—the more patterns that you’re likely to discover.”

The NSA Oak Ridge facility houses the super computer, installed in 2006, capable of finding patterns and printing them out in milliseconds in a process code named “Brute Force.” The “goal was to advance computer speed a thousand fold, creating a machine that could execute a quadrillion operations a second, known as a Petaflop—the computer equivalent of breaking the land speed record.” With upgrades the computer, called “jaguar for its speed, it clocked in at 1.75 petaflops, officially becoming the world’s fastest computer in 2009,” is housed in Building 5300. There “318 scientists, computer engineers, and other staff work in secret on the cryptanalytic applications of high-speed computing and other classified projects” (Cryptome, “NSA Decryption Multipurpose Research Facility,” March 16, 2012).

Resistance to this invasion of privacy was massive resulting in the termination of the Patriot Act whose authority was used to justify bulk collections. It was replaced in 2015 by the USA Freedom Act, which required telephone companies to collect the metadata instead and store it at their expense. The NSA may still access (and does) the information with approval of the secret FISA Court if the government maintains there is a reasonable suspicion that the phone data of a target is relevant to a terror investigation. Reportedly this is why Trump Tower was under surveillance the closing weeks of the Trump presidential campaign.

Thus, Sutter’s Fort essentially became California’s first shopping mall. A score of merchants operated at the Fort, a sampling of which included Brannan and Co. general store; Hensley, Reading and Co. hardware store; Priest, Lee and Co. mining equipment; Peter Burnett, lawyer and real estate firm; Joseph Wadleigh, tinsmith and even a newspaper known as the Placer Times.

Faire three-day event and amid a lively shopping atmosphere, Fort visitors can watch artisans create pioneer goods for sale such as clothing, housewares, toys, beads and knives. Guests will also have the opportunity to make their own crafts, haggle with traders, hammer square nail and enjoy demonstrations of black powder weapons periodically throughout the day. In addition to the interactive opportunities, guests can also shop for artisan made hand-crafted items that make for treasured keepsakes, gifts and collectibles.

## Sacramento County DA Reports



### Gang Members Convicted for Fatally Stabbing Father; Defendant Sentenced for Multiple Child Molestation Charges, Rape Gang Member Sentenced for Possession of Firearm

**DATE:** March 16, 2017  
**CASE:** Sebastian Flores Torres & Jose Guadalupe Salazar (Case #14F01794)

**PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Shelly McGill, Gangs & Hate Crimes Unit

Sebastian Flores Torres and Jose Guadalupe Salazar were convicted by a jury of the second-degree murder of Shannon Gregg and two counts of assault with a deadly weapon. The jury also found true that the defendants committed the crimes for the benefit of a criminal street gang, the Howe Park Sureños.

On March 12, 2014, a juvenile gang member belonging to the same gang as defendants Sebastian Flores Torres and Jose Guadalupe Salazar got into a verbal altercation with a group of juveniles near the intersection of Bell and Alta Arden. The juvenile gang member fled the scene and told defendants Torres and Salazar about the altercation. That same juvenile along with two other minors and defendants Torres and Salazar drove back to the scene of the altercation and discovered the group of juveniles now standing in the front yard of a nearby home. As the five gang members began to approach the group, the homeowner, Shannon Gregg, came out of the house in an attempt to prevent a physical altercation. The gang members began assaulting the individuals in the front yard. Mr. Gregg and an adult friend attempted to help fend off the attack. Mr. Gregg, his adult friend, and one of the minors standing in the front yard were stabbed, in the course of the assault. Witnesses varied as to whether defendant Torres or defendant Salazar was the individual wielding the knife. Mr. Gregg, who was the father of one of the juveniles in his front yard, died from a stab wound to his heart. The other two victims survived the stabbing.

The defendants face a maximum sentence of 26 years and 8 months to life in prison. Sentencing is set for April 28, 2017, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 28 before the Honorable James McFetridge.

**DATE:** March 23, 2017  
**CASE:** Steven Ramos (Case # 13F05434)  
**PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Jeff Harry, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit  
The Honorable Michael Sweet sentenced

Steven Ramos to 46 years and 4 months in prison. On October 17, 2016, a jury convicted Ramos of 22 counts of child molestation charges, forcible rape, and attempted forcible rape.

In the mid-90s, Ramos began molesting two girls when they were 5 and 6 years old. In 1997, the victims disclosed the sexual abuse to El Dorado County law enforcement and charges were filed against Ramos. Due to outside pressure, both victims recanted their disclosures to law enforcement nearly a year after initially disclosing. Charges were then dropped against Ramos.

Ramos began abusing both victims again and continued to do so until the victims were 16 years old. In 2012, when the victims were then in their early 20s, they reported to law enforcement the years of continued sexual abuse at the hands of Ramos. Their motivation to report was to prevent Ramos from sexually assaulting other potential victims.

**CASE:** Thomas Salaam (Case #15F06107)  
**PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Kristen Andersen, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

The Honorable Steve White sentenced Thomas Salaam to 15 years in prison. On August 5, 2016, a jury convicted Salaam of being a felon in possession of a firearm and found that the crime was committed for the benefit of a criminal street gang. The jury also found true that Salaam has a prior serious felony or strike conviction.

In September of 2015, Salaam was involved in a gang fight which was captured on video. Several days later, Salaam was in a car with another validated gang member when rival gang members shot at their car. On October 1, 2015, Salaam was a passenger in vehicle that was pulled over by officers. When officers conducted a parole search of the vehicle, they located a loaded firearm underneath a sweatshirt in the backseat of the car. The firearm had a 26 round drum magazine attached to it with an additional loaded magazine placed next to it.

Salaam has a prior 2014 strike conviction for robbery while armed with a firearm. ★

# Ganned if You Do, Ganned if You Don't



Commentary by Senator Ted Gaines

From the same governor who brought you the illegal fire tax now comes a plan to blow the top off California's spending cap and leave taxpayers on the hook for tens of billions in extra taxes. It's a bad idea that fractures the faith between citizens and government and spells trouble for California's fiscal future. With California's runaway spending, it's hard to believe the state even has an expenditure limit. But in 1979, a year after signing off on the revolutionary Prop. 13, voters passed Proposition 4, implementing the "Gann Limit," which would peg California's state spending to the 1978-79 level and only let it grow adjusted for inflation and population. State revenues above the voter-approved limit actually had to be refunded to taxpayers, an event that would cause panic attacks in today's money-hungry capitol. In 1986-87, a boon year for tax revenues, the state issued more than one billion dollars

in rebates to relieved taxpayers who finally had some protection from an insatiable Sacramento.

Alas, it was too good to go on forever. Proposition 111 in 1990 defanged the Gann Limit, weakening its terms, and it now rarely factors into budgeting decisions.

But, weak as it is, it's still on the books, and there is no ceiling too high for the Democrats when it comes to government spending. Governor Brown's new budget proposal is straining against even the wilted Gann Limit, and he's going to do something about it.

Is he going to cut spending? Is he going to refund taxpayers? Or is he going to manipulate the budget to carve out more room to spend?

If you went with manipulate, I've got a job in the California Department of Finance for you.

Brown proposes taking \$22 billion off the Gann Limit books this year. The money would not be accounted for as state spending or as local spending, as required in the original Proposition. For Gann Limit purposes it would just disappear, like the hopes of fiscal conservatives all around the state, if his scheme is successful.

In essence, he would open up an avenue for another \$22 billion in spending by reclassifying the current \$22 billion. He would not spend less, he would not adhere to the even the watered-down mandates of the 1979 Gann Limit reform, he would just trick his way around the spending cap.

Try this sort of deception on

your tax return to see how the state normally views creative exemptions of the sort they are practicing now.

Spending is taxes. The two can't be separated, and Governor Brown's bad-faith end-run around the Gann Limit guarantees a heavier load for California taxpayers and a California perpetually stretched to its fiscal limit.

I have a novel idea: Live up to the law. If taxpayers deserve rebates, give them rebates! Don't twist and distort or outright ignore the law just because it lets taxpayers keep more of their money. They earned it in the first place; it's not a gift that a benevolent government doles out.

If the state is bringing in too much money and spending too much, get rid of the illegal fire tax or cut the Vehicle License Fee. Cut tax rates! That would put more money back in people's pockets without putting the government in the way as a rebate middleman.

The Gann Limit has been little more than a rumor for decades, but it is a rule passed by the people to protect them from just the kind of spending excess proposed by Governor Brown. It's a sad commentary on our state, but when it comes to raising your taxes, rules seem made to be broken.

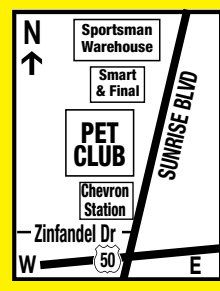
