Illegal Pharmaceuticals, Counterfeit Goods Seized in Area Search

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

The California Attorney General's Tax Recovery and Criminal Enforcement (TRaCE) Task Force served seven search warrants in the capital region turning up hundreds of boxes of foreign pharmaceuticals and thousands of articles of suspected counterfeit clothing.

U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), the California Department of Public Health's Food and Drug Branch, Franchise Tax Board, and Department of Justice eCrime Unit assisted in the June 21, 2016 operation that involved more than 50 agents and investigators.

"The trafficking of counterfeit goods poses a triple threat," said Ryan Spradlin, the special agent in charge who oversees HSI operations throughout northern California. "Such activities

deliver shoddy and often dangerous goods into the economy, rob Americans of good-paying jobs, and generate proceeds that are often funneled back into other criminal enterprises. HSI will continue to work with its enforcement partners to combat the distribution of counterfeit products, like those seized in Sacramento yesterday, that could put unwitting consumers at risk."

"This action was a big blow to the underground economy in Northern California, and that makes yesterday's raid a win for our whole state," said Board of Equalization Chairwoman Fiona Ma, whose district includes West Sacramento, one of the communities where the raids occurred. "I want to thank the hardworking agents and investigators who spent months of painstaking work in shutting down these illegal operations."

"Illegal activities hurt

legitimate businesses and inflict unfair costs on law-abiding Californians," said Board of Equalization Member George Runner. "Law enforcement deserves a huge thank you for their ongoing efforts to fight the underground economy."

This warrant follows months of investigation into the sale of illegal foreign prescription and over-the-counter pharmaceuticals and counterfeit clothing by a couple and their adult son. Inside the family's homes and three area businesses - Fashion Moda in North Highlands, Victoria's Health Products in Citrus Heights, and Elena's Health Products in West Sacramento - investigators discovered and confiscated the foreign pharmaceuticals, clothing, and more than \$10,000 in cash.

The Tax Recovery and Criminal Enforcement Task Force (TRaCE) is comprised

of public officials from the California Department of Justice, Board of Equalization, Franchise Tax Board, Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, Employment Development Department, Department of Motor Vehicles, Federal Bureau of Investigation, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations, and the Santa Ana Police Department.

The mission of the TRaCE Task Force is to combat organized elements of the underground economy engaged in the manufacture, importation, distribution, and sale of pirated intellectual property, and other economic crimes resulting in the evasion of business, payroll and/or income taxes. Gasoline Tax Reduced Before July 4 Weekend

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California State Board of Equalization (BOE) announces that the state excise tax on gasoline will drop by 2.2 cents per gallon on July 1, 2016. This will lower the excise tax rate from 30 cents to 27.8 cents per gallon for the 2016-17 fiscal year, effective July 1, 2016, through June 30, 2017.

"Californians have another reason to celebrate during Independence Day weekend," said BOE Member Runner. "This gas tax rate cut comes right on time for those hitting the road during the holiday."

The Board approved the 2.2-cent tax rate reduction at its February 2016 meeting. The Board has been tasked with adjusting the excise tax rate on gasoline since 2010, when two pieces of legislation (AB x8 6 and SB 70, collectively known as the fuel tax swap) took

Tale of Two Rallies

In 1978, I stood in line for six hours to be among the first to ride the Colossus at Magic Mountain amusement park. In 1980, I arrived to an Orange County cinema six hours early to be the first to see "The Empire Strikes Back." In 1984, on a movie set near Hollywood, waiting six hours beside a talent trailer scored me an autograph from Clint Eastwood.

So when it was announced that Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton were coming to Sacramento to hold political rallies last month, I knew exactly how early I'd need to get in line. If six hours was the sweet spot for a roller-coaster, sci-fi movie and A-list celebrity, then that strategy to optimize a bucket list experience should be sound for the Republican and Democratic presidential candidates. And it was. For Trump's rally at the Sacramento Jet Center and Clinton's at Sacramento City College, I was among the first 25 regular people to brave the elements – near-100-degree heat, profane protesters, line-cutters, etcetera – in hopes of getting as close as possible to the next president of the United States.

Considering how polarizing the two candidates are, it could very well be that my youngest son and I were the only people outside some of the local media and police to attend both rallies. Doing so guaranteed seeing a future president, and being able to share the dual experience with my youngest voting in his first major election was beyond special. My wife, a social studies teacher at Gold River Discovery Center, was bummed to miss Trump's Wednesday rally due to commitments, but she did make Clinton's Sunday event.

Having attended both, and making observations while wiling away the hours in both lines, I feel qualified to do a compare and contrast of the two political rallies. With no bias, here are my takeaways:

Crowd
Trump: Estimated at 9,600. Standing in the scorching sun caused one person to pass out.

Clinton: Estimated at 1,500. Two people needed medical attention inside the sweltering gym.

Punctuality
Trump: The Republican candidate spoke 15 minutes early.

Clinton: Clinton took to the stage 70 minutes late. No one, including the tardy Democratic candidate, offered an apology.

Protesters
Trump: Dozens of dissenters showed up at Trump's, screaming accusations of bigotry. One guy wearing a hate-mongering sandwich board walked up and down alongside the lengthy cue with megaphones that amplified recorded messages that called Trump's supporters "idiots and a**holes." I heard a little girl, one of many young children in line, ask her mom, "What is that man saying?" I never heard a discouraging word from a Trump backer; the only hate came from those professing love. A young woman held up

a sign that read, without asterisks, "F**k Trump – Vote for Hillary."

Clinton: One man quietly held signs saying "BILLARY IS A FRAUD" and "STILL LIKE OIL WARS?" No pro-Trump protesters were spotted.

Warm-Up Speakers
Trump: Former Congressman Doug Ose and Scott O'Grady, the U.S. Air Force pilot who was shot down over war-torn Bosnia and survived by hiding alone in the woods for seven days in June of 1995 before being saved by American forces.

Clinton: Congresspeople Doris Matsui and John Garamendi, Sacramento Mayor Kevin Johnson and his successor, Darrell Steinberg. A new graduate of St. Francis High School, a private institution with yearly tuition of \$17,000, declared Clinton as "the voice of the little people" before telling the audience that she's bound for Santa Clara University, where tuition is \$43,000. Service Employees International Union Local 1000 President Yvonne Walker also spoke, telling the mixed-gender crowd, "If you want to get things done, always go with a woman."



Dozens of dissenters showed up at Trump's, screaming accusations of bigotry. One guy wearing a hate-mongering sandwich board walked up and down alongside the lengthy queue with megaphones that amplified recorded messages.

As supporters went wild, I imagined the barbs Trump would get if he ever said, "If you want to get things done, always go with a man." Last I checked Clinton hadn't disavowed Walker's sexist comment and no men's group has asked for the union leader's resignation.

Patriotism
Trump: An advance speaker led the crowd in the Pledge of Allegiance, which the thousands did to a large American flag hung especially for the event on the inside back wall of the hangar. Live and recorded patriotic music played for hours before Trump's dramatic arrival by personal jet.

Clinton: No Pledge of Allegiance, no patriotic music, but Mayor Johnson led the crowd in a chant: "... One state, no sweat; two states all set; three states she's our bet; California, better yet!"

Veteran Support
Trump: Two rows of seats at the very front were reserved for veterans. Waiting for them on their chairs were a Trump sign and T-shirt. Once seated, they were offered cold water by volunteers. During the rally they were also recognized for their service.

Clinton: Clinton asked if any veterans were in the crowd and four raised their hand.

Posters
Trump: Besides what was held up by the confrontational and oftentimes vulgar anti-Trump protesters, seen among the crowd were posters that read, "LATINOS 4 TRUMP" and "FBI INDICT CROOKED HILLARY."

Clinton: Homemade signs were not allowed per Hillary for America rules on the invitation and at the door. However, dozens of campaign-made posters written in red, white and blue paint were handed out by Clinton's staff to members of the crowd standing on risers behind the stage. Campaign staff seemed to match each poster to a desired demographic; e.g., an "I'M WITH HER!" sign went to a man, another reading "RISE TOGETHER" went to a woman. Two young girls behind the podium, perfectly positioned for the cameras, were handed a poster that said "FIGHTING FOR US." Moments later a staffer took that sign away from the girls and gave it to a man three rows up. Based on how choreographed the sign distribution and people placing were, I wouldn't be surprised if someone was concerned about children condoning any type of "fighting."

Despite the hours of investment and standing like veal calves with virtually no mobilization once inside the baking venues, I'd do it all again. And with Clinton's double-digit lead narrowing in the California polls, chances are good that both major candidates will return to the Sacramento area before the November general election. When they do, the sparks will surely fly and I'll be there to see them six hours early. ★

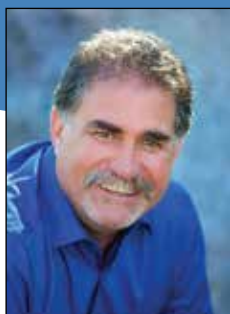

This One is on Me

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Deputy Justin Chaussee aims to make community life a little brighter – one cup at a time. Every morning for over a year, the North Area cop has stopped at Starbucks (Madison and Manzanita) before his early shift. Paying for his coffee, he also comps the next drive-through customer.

Though he seldom meets the beneficiaries, he has an empathy for early risers.

“We’re not all morning people” explains the 30-year-old. “Sometimes buying coffee is your first interaction of the day. I like to think I’m helping to get

someone’s day off on the right foot.” Chaussee learned beverage benevolence from a civilian brother-in-law. “He always paid for the next person’s cup,” he says. “I thought it was a cool thing. Plenty of people do it. Sometimes, when I’m off-duty, a stranger picks up my coffee. It always makes my day.”

Behind Chaussee’s department vehicle last month, actor/DJ Walter Delmar wondered if he might be ticketed for texting in the drive-through. “When I got my latte, the Starbucks employee said the cop had paid for it,” recalls the appreciative customer. “I was dumbfounded.”

Confessed coffee addict Chaussee prefers his own

morning cup strong and black. But he springs for designer brews without complaint. “They don’t cost me much more,” he shrugs. “But one time, the guy behind me was buying a whole carafe – that was \$14. I didn’t mind -- it’s not like that happens every day.”

The 10-year officer feels his gesture reflects the human side of police outreach. “Concern for people is among our department’s visions and values,” explains the father of two. “I’ve lived in this area for 11 years; I have a vested interest in our community. If something I do make someone’s morning better, that makes me happy, too.” ★

Sacramento County DA Reports



Defendant Convicted of Attempted Rape, Assault, Robbery of Elderly Woman; Defendant Convicted for Series of Rapes; Defendant Sentenced for 3-Month Crime Spree

DATE: March 30, 2016 **CASE:** Carlton Beard
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Matt Chisholm, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit

The Honorable Richard Sueyoshi sentenced Carlton Beard to 15 years in prison. On February 24, 2016, a jury convicted Beard of two counts of forcible rape.

On July 17, 2015, the victim rented a motel room for Beard, who was homeless at the time. He asked the victim to help him rent a room so he did not have to sleep on the streets. After checking into the room, Beard forcibly raped the victim two times.

DATE: April 22, 2016 **CASE:** Mitchell Leahy
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Megan Eixenberger, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

The Honorable Donald Currier sentenced 35-year-old Mitchell Leahy to 17 years, 4 months in prison. On March 14, 2016, a jury convicted Leahy of first-degree robbery with use of a firearm, first-degree burglary, and grand theft of a firearm.

On August 29, 2013, Ryan Yarbrough returned to his Folsom home and saw that his sliding glass door had been taken off the tracks. Mr. Yarbrough discovered he was missing a .45 caliber semi-automatic handgun, a .40 caliber semi-automatic firearm, and his grandfather's retirement ring from the Oakland Police Department. Fingerprints lifted from the sliding glass door matched Leahy.

On September 2, 2013, Vickie Lovingood returned to her Orangevale home and noticed her French doors were open. When she entered one of the bedrooms, she saw a man rummaging through her dresser drawers. He was also holding one of her tote bags that appeared to be full of items. When confronted, the man reached towards his waistband and pulled out a gun. Mrs. Lovingood backed away and the man fled. Fingerprints lifted from the French doors matched Leahy.

On October 25, 2013, Mrs. Lovingood contacted the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department to report a man she saw in a news report of a burglary in Granite Bay looked like the man she saw in her house. The Granite Bay burglary took place on October 23, 2013. A 14-year-old girl was home alone at the time and called 911 when she realized a man was attempting to enter the house through a sliding glass door. Leahy was located nearby. Detectives found burglary tools, a firearm, jewelry and other property belonging to multiple victims in his truck.

DATE: June 24, 2016 **CASE:** Joseph McKeever
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Bruce Chang, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit

Joseph McKeever was convicted by a jury of

attempted rape, assault to commit rape during the commission of a residential burglary, and home invasion robbery. The jury also found true the crimes were committed against an elderly victim.

McKeever saw the 72-year-old victim walking her dog in the Foothill Farms area of Sacramento. He followed the victim to her home and forced his way into her residence. When the victim tried to escape, McKeever punched her in the face, grabbed her arms, and threw her on the ground. McKeever then got on top of the victim, choked her, and sexually assaulted her. McKeever also took \$900 in cash from her purse.

When McKeever's mother recognized a composite sketch she saw on the news as her son, she called the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department to report her son was the suspect.

McKeever faces a maximum potential sentence of 14 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for August 19, 2016, at 10:00 a.m. in Department 41 before the Honorable Helena Gweon.

DATE: June 24, 2016 **CASE:** Jose Gomez-Garcia
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Matthew Chisholm, Adult Sexual Assault Prosecution Unit

Jose Gomez-Garcia was convicted by a jury of six felony counts of forcible rape, two felony counts of forcible sodomy, and one felony count of forcible oral copulation. The jury also found true a multiple victim enhancement on eight counts.

From June 2002 to October 2002, Gomez-Garcia raped three women by force. Each victim was taken to a deserted warehouse parking lot and violently raped. Two of the victims were sodomized. Gomez-Garcia controlled each victim by grabbing them around the neck and making threats. All three victims immediately reported the sexual assaults to law enforcement. DNA recovered from each of the victims was analyzed by the District Attorney's Crime Lab. The three cases were linked to each other, but not to a suspect.

In 2004, Gomez-Garcia was arrested for illegal re-entry after deportation, which resulted in a federal felony conviction. While in custody, federal authorities collected Gomez-Garcia's DNA. In 2010, there was a DNA hit to Gomez-Garcia, who by that time had been deported to Mexico. Extradition proceedings were initiated and he was returned to Sacramento in 2014 to face these charges.

Gomez-Garcia has a prior 1998 strike conviction for shooting into an inhabited dwelling.

He faces a maximum potential sentence of 261 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for August 18, 2016, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 24 before the Honorable Shelleyanne Chang. ★

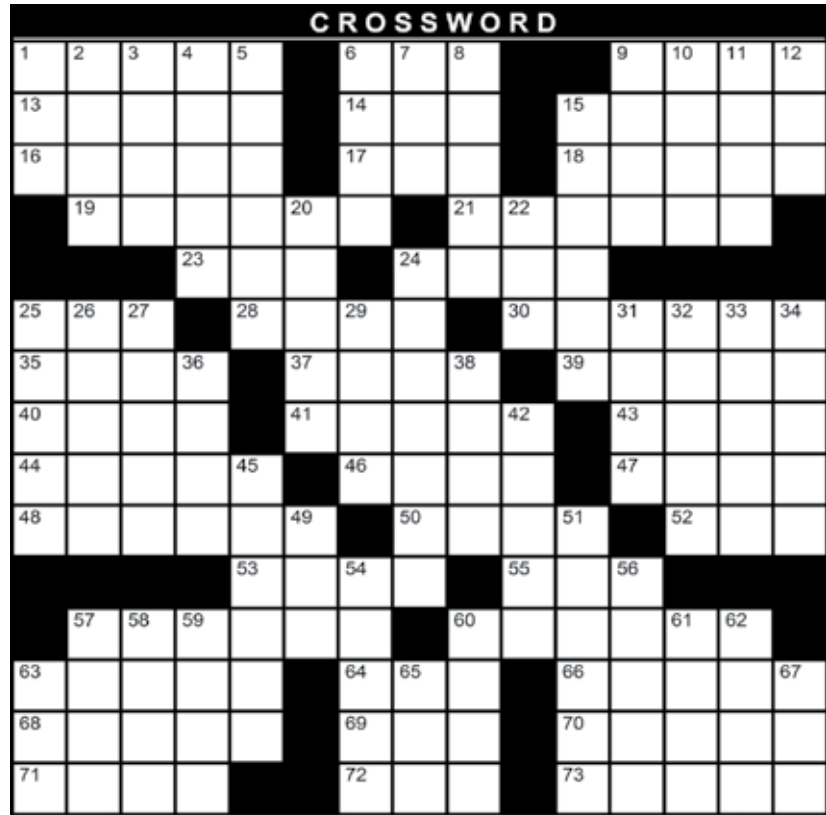

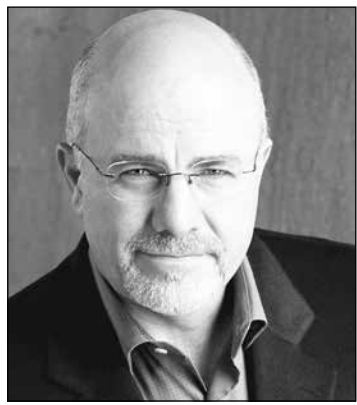

A RESOLUTION OF INTENTION TO CONTINUE TO LEVY ASSESSMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2016–17, PRELIMINARILY APPROVING THE ENGINEER'S REPORT AND PROVIDING NOTICE OF HEARING OF THE MISSION OAKS RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICT PARKS AND RECREATION MAINTENANCE AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District, Parks and Recreation Maintenance and Improvement District was authorized by an assessment ballot proceeding conducted in 2006 and approved by 68.78% of the weighted ballots returned by property owners, and such assessments were levied by the Advisory Board of Directors by Resolution No. 2006-04 passed on May 2, 2006; and

WHEREAS, on March 8, 2016 by Resolution No. 2016-02, the Board ordered the preparation of an Engineer's Report for the Parks and Recreation Maintenance and Improvement District (the "District") for fiscal year 2016-17; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to said Resolution, the Engineer's Report was prepared by SCI Consulting Group, Engineer of Work, in accordance with 22565, et. seq., of the Streets and Highways Code (the "Report") and Article XIIIID of the California Constitution; and

WHEREAS, said Engineer's Report was filed with the Secretary of the Board of Directors and the Board of Directors has reviewed the Report and wishes to take certain actions relative to said Report.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Advisory Board of Directors of the Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District ("Board"), that:

SECTION 1. The Report for the "Parks and Recreation Maintenance and Improvement District", on file with the Secretary of the Board, has been duly considered by the Board of Directors and is hereby deemed sufficient and approved. The Report shall stand as the Engineer's Report for all subsequent proceedings under, and pursuant to, the foregoing resolution.

SECTION 2. It is the intention of this Board to continue to levy and collect assessments within the District for fiscal year 2016–17. Within the District, the existing and proposed improvements ("Improvements") are generally described as the installation, maintenance and servicing of public facilities, including but not limited to, landscaping, sprinkler systems, park grounds, park facilities, landscape corridors, ground cover, shrubs and trees, street frontages, playground equipment and hardcourt areas, senior and community centers, drainage systems, lighting, fencing, entry monuments, basketball courts, tennis courts, running tracks, swimming pools, other recreational facilities, security guards, graffiti removal and repainting, and labor, materials, supplies, utilities and equipment, as applicable, for property owned and maintained by the Mission Oaks Recreation and Park District. Installation means the construction of recreational improvements, including, but not limited to, land preparation, such as grading, leveling, cutting and filling, sod, landscaping, irrigation systems, sidewalks and drainage, lights, playground equipment, play courts, recreational facilities and public restrooms. Maintenance means the furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation and servicing of said improvements, including repair, removal, or replacement of all or part of any improvement; providing for the life, growth, health and beauty of landscaping; and cleaning, sandblasting and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti. Servicing means the furnishing of electric current or energy for the operation or lighting of any improvements, and water for irrigation of any landscaping or the maintenance of any other improvements.

SECTION 3. The District consists of the lots and parcels shown on the assessment diagram of the District on file with the Secretary of the Board, and reference is hereby made to such map for further particulars.

SECTION 4. Reference is hereby made to the Report for a full and detailed description of the Improvements, the boundaries of the District and the proposed assessments upon assessable lots and parcels of land within the District. The Engineer's Report identifies all parcels which will have a special benefit conferred upon them and upon which an assessment will be imposed.

SECTION 5. The assessment is subject to an annual adjustment tied to the Consumer Price Index-U for the San Francisco Bay Area as of December of each succeeding year (the "CPI"), with a maximum annual adjustment not to exceed 3%. Any change in the CPI in excess of 3% shall be cumulatively reserved as the "Unused CPI" and shall be used to increase the maximum authorized assessment rate in years in which the CPI is less than 3%. The maximum authorized assessment rate is equal to the maximum assessment rate in the first fiscal year the assessment was levied adjusted annually by the minimum of 1) 3% or 2) the change in the CPI plus any Unused CPI as described above.

The change in the CPI from December 2014 to December 2015 was 3.17%. Therefore, the maximum authorized assessment rate for fiscal year 2016-17 is increased by 3.00% which equates to \$49.82 per single family equivalent benefit unit. The estimate of cost and budget in the Engineer's Report proposes assessments for fiscal year 2016-17 at the maximum rate of \$49.82.

SECTION 6. The public hearing shall be held, before this Board at Mission Oaks Community Center, located at 4701 Gibbons Drive, Carmichael, California 95608 as follows: on Tuesday, July 12, 2016 at the hour of 6:00 p.m. for the purpose of this Board's determination whether the public interest, convenience and necessity require the improvements and this Board's final action upon the Report and the assessments therein. The Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to cause a notice of the hearing to be given by publishing a notice once, at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing above specified, in a newspaper circulated in the District.

Gas Tax Reduced Before July 4 Weekend

effect. The Board sets the rate annually so that over a three-year period, no more or less revenue is collected under the fuel tax swap than would have been collected under the prior gasoline tax structure. The excise tax on gasoline goes to the State Transportation Fund for the construction and maintenance of public roads and mass transit.

Although Californians will pay less in state excise tax on gasoline starting July 1st, this may not necessarily translate to lower overall prices at the

pump. According to the United States Energy Information Administration, factors such as crude oil prices, refining costs, and distribution and marketing costs also affect gasoline prices. Crude oil prices—which are affected by worldwide economic growth, regional economies, supply and demand—are the largest component of United States gasoline prices, as explained in the latest issue of BOE's Economic Perspective.

The latest issue also highlights the strong relationship between U.S. gas prices and

California gas prices, and California's gas price is one of the biggest components in setting the excise tax rate annually. U.S. gas prices have declined 37 percent from June 2014 to May 2016, and California's gasoline excise tax rate has decreased every year since fiscal year 2013-14. Gasoline purchases in California also have increased, with the latest data showing that gasoline consumption for the fourth quarter of 2015 was the highest since 2007. ★

3) WHAT IS THE VALUE OF MY COMPANY? The value of a company is important because it is the basis for determining the “cost” of the new capital when seeking equity additions to the capital structure. Simply explained, a company with a \$1 million valuation and no debt seeking a new capital of \$1 million would be worth \$2 million after the investment. The old owners would own 50% of the new \$2 million company (for their contribution of the old company with a \$1 million value), while the new investors would also own 50% interest for their contribution of \$1 million cash.

4) WHO MIGHT BE INTERESTED IN INVESTING IN MY COMPANY? As the amount of the funds needed increases, you will be required to access an increasingly sophisticated investor seeking maximum return for assuming the risk of a new venture. Family and friends are typically the first group sought by business owners seeking capital. They are less discriminating than professional investors, and are more likely to invest due to the relationship than the economics of the business proposal. On the other hand, family investors bring their own set of problems, including the possibility of strained relations if the investment fails.

1) HOW MUCH CAPITAL DO I NEED? Although many resources provide information on starting a business with little or no money in the bank, remember that if something sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Don't be misled by the popular literature. Having little or no capital is a primary reason why businesses fail.

2) HOW DO I RAISE NEW CAPITAL? The most common source of startup capital is the business owner him or herself in the form of credit card advances, home equity loans, and loans from family members. Federal and state governments sponsor numerous subsidized loans and grants for startups through the Small Business Administration and its counterparts on the state level.

5) WHAT ARE MY LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES TO POTENTIAL INVESTORS? Generally, business owners seeking funds from individual investors are required to provide forms and specific factual information in understandable language to potential investors so they have the ability to evaluate the investment and determine whether it is right for them. Offerings and continued legal obligations of companies to their investor owner are regulated through the US Securities Act of 1933 and the Securities Exchange Act of 1934.

6) HOW DO I NEGOTIATE A WIN-WIN AGREEMENT? A funding event, whether for a startup or an ongoing operation, involves two parties: the investor and the company. In some cases there is a single investor; in others, multiple investors. In the latter case, such as a crowdfunding event, the investors participate as a unit, each sharing a portion of the same investment. In some cases, funding is take-it-or-leave-it; in others, there is intense negotiation. In each case, the parties strive to reach an agreement that accomplishes their respective goals.

A child, we've watched grow up in our little town of Woodland, Washington, graduated from college and we were invited to the party held in her honor. There was a young couple I was drawn to because of their nine-month-old baby named Camilla. They were so kind to spend some time with us “in English,” when most were enjoying their native language, which I totally understand. Generally

I don't write about parties we attend, but this morning as I sat down to my computer, I couldn't get this young father out of my mind.

The couple just moved up to Washington from San Jose, California a month ago. The man had worked for one of the construction companies that built the Apple headquarters. He moved to Washington mainly because of the baby and the cost of living in California. He got a job right away (with benefits) and the cost for a two bedroom apartment in Washington turned out to be half what a one bedroom apartment was in California. This man was so grateful for everything, his work, his country (he's a US citizen), his wife and his baby that he was close to bliss speaking about them. I had to know more, as I had Camilla's attention with my sparkly bracelet.

He told us he never dreamed he'd leave his job in California even though it didn't pay that much. He'd worked for the company, without benefits, for 15 years, since he was a young boy. What caught my heart about this man (and the Mexican culture in general) was his love of family. His child transformed him in ways he wasn't expecting. With her birth he suddenly was a completely different man. He had such compassion as a father and you could feel the love oozing out of his pores. After nine months, he still was amazed at what this child had done to him.

Oh if we could keep that enthusiasm over the years as we raise our children. I remember when my son Michael was five-years-old saying to his Aunt Peggy as she gushed over her newborn, “I wonder when she's going to figure out it's just going to grow up to be a regular kid?”

ALIEN INVASION PACKS A BIG WALLOP FOR “INDEPENDENCE DAY”

to the modern generation of cocky flyboys. You know right away that they'll play a pivotal role in a climactic battle.

One of them is the son of Will Smith's character, the brash, hot-tempered Dylan Hiller (Jessie T. Usher), who happens to have a major beef with hot-shot fellow pilot and former best friend Jake Morrison (Liam Hemsworth).

Meanwhile, Jake's girlfriend is none other than the feisty, pretty daughter (Maika Monroe) of former President Whitmore, and because she's also a trained fighter pilot her role is more than just window-dressing.

Jake's co-pilot Charlie (Travis Tope) is smitten with Chinese pilot Rain Lao (Angelababy), the daughter of the stern high-ranking military officer Commander Jiang (Chin Han).

Combat missions may provide Charlie the chance to swoon over the attractive fellow soldier, but his primary role seems to be exchanging wisecracks with Jake so that much needed comic relief is introduced during the midst of tense action scenes.

While the young may be the bright future of intergalactic warfare, the aging veterans of the first alien war still have major roles. Jeff Goldblum returns as scientist David Levinson, and his meddling father (Judd Hirsch) saves a busload of kids.

As another alien attack is imminent, the only saving grace is that the military leaders have adapted alien technology into their weapons systems. But then, the aliens, under the command of a Queen living in a fortified hive, are even more sophisticated in warfare.

Devastation to Earth is inevitable given that the alien warship now looming in the skies is 3,000 miles wide, a virtual floating continent capable of wiping out entire cities with an ease that even Godzilla would envy.

When not lifting cities into the air only to drop them back down elsewhere, the massive alien spaceship busies itself

with drilling to the Earth's center in order to tap into the vital power source of the molten core.

The interesting thing about the aliens is that they are hideous-looking creatures, even more horrific than what might have emanated from the fevered mind of surrealist artist H.R. Giger had he been inclined to expand on the work he did for the “Alien” franchise.

Moviegoers aren't coming to “Independence Day: Resurgence” to admire the set design or the artistic creation of the alien creatures. Action is what is needed, and that's what director Roland Emmerich is committed to delivering.

There's nothing particularly bright or intellectually stimulating about this sequel, but then, who really cares?

It's all about the thrills of global destruction, and boy, there is plenty of that with entire cities destroyed in the full glory of spectacular visual effects.

“Independence Day: Resurgence” is a rousing salute to fighting back to repel the alien invaders. This is action-fueled summer blockbuster entertainment as it is meant to be: simple fun with lots of thrills, explosions and excitement. ★

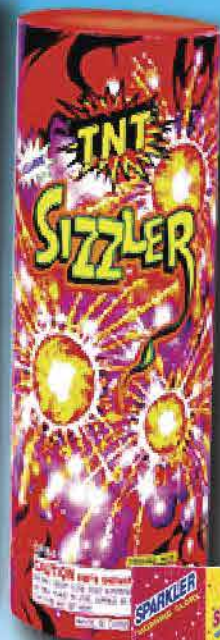
