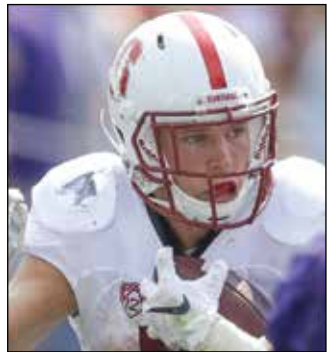

## Off to Work We Go

### VIPS Break Ground for Second Corridor Phase

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - The \$6.5 million second part of Fair Oaks Boulevard's improvement broke ground last week. In coming weeks, construction workers will continue upgrades for Carmichael's main artery. In stages, the work will take about two years. Traffic headaches are likely during construction.

"Yes, there will be some delays," said project engineer Steve White. "We'll

maintain two open traffic lanes in each direction during peak hours. Off-peak we'll have one lane open both ways. But these improvements are long overdue. I believe people will like the results."

#### Street upgrades will include:

- Bike lanes, landscaped medians and sidewalks from Landis to Shirley.
- Signal modification at intersections of Grant Ave and Engle.



- New traffic signals at Fair Oaks and Landis.
- New sidewalks on the south side of Grant, adjacent to Carmichael Park.
- Burial of overhead utilities.
- New road surfaces.

## Suspect Opens Fire at Officers in Carmichael

### Officers Fire Back and Suspect Declared Deceased at Scene

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - Earlier this afternoon, a man exchanged gunfire with deputies and was killed, according to Sheriff Scott Jones. At a press conference, Sheriff Jones described

the events that led up to the shooting.

According to Jones, a deputy was making a routine traffic stop at Winding Way and Manzanita Avenue for expired registration when the car fled. The deputy gave chase, and shortly after, the driver of the vehicle pulled over and the single passenger got out of the vehicle and surrendered.

Now in the vehicle by himself, the suspect took off again, driving recklessly before stopping near Garfield and Cypress, angling the vehicle, and opening fire on officers.

The officer immediately returned fire and the suspect was hit. Injured, the suspect attempted to move toward his dropped gun and was shot and

killed. No officers were injured. "At some point, it appears that there was some calculation involved in 'how am I going to get out of this?' and his [the suspect's] decision was in that not to continue to pursue, but to stop

and try to kill the officers while there was only one unit behind him," said Sheriff Jones. "So it's incredibly fortunate. This could have ended far more tragically and this press conference could have been far different."

After the shooting, officers found a second handgun sticking out of the suspect's pants. The fire department arrived and the suspect was declared deceased on-scene.

As per standard protocol, all involved officers have been placed on paid leave. It is not known at this time what, if any,

involvement the passenger had in the events. At this point, the identity of the suspect is not known.

"My sense is that the reason that he was being stopped in the suspect's mind was different than the reason he was being stopped in the officer's mind. You can be pulling over someone for a routine traffic stop, but the person who's being stopped might know something far more sinister or far more malicious that he has been involved in or wanted for," said Jones. ★

## California Survey Sees Lower Rate of Illegal Tobacco Sales to Minors in 2015

*Rates Still Remain High in Specialized Tobacco Retail Outlets*

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Director and State Public Health Officer Dr. Karen Smith announced that a survey has found that the California rate of illegal tobacco sales to minors has decreased. According to the 2015 Youth Tobacco Purchase Survey, illegal tobacco sales to minors at retail outlets occurred at a rate of 7.6 percent, compared to last year's rate of 9 percent.

When the state first started monitoring illegal sales of tobacco in 1997, teens participating in the survey were able to buy tobacco products during 21.7 percent of tobacco purchase attempts.

"For seven consecutive years, the rate of illegal tobacco sales to minors has remained under 10 percent. However, the Healthy People 2020 target is to reduce this to 5 percent or less, which indicates that California still has room for considerable progress. I'm concerned that too many stores, especially certain types such as tobacco-only stores and

convenience stores, are willing to illegally sell tobacco products to youth," Smith said.

Notably, stores specializing in the sale of tobacco products, commonly known as tobacco-only stores, had the highest illegal sales rate, with 14.8 percent in 2015. Other stores with high rates of illegal tobacco sales include:

- Convenience stores without gas (9.5 percent)
- Convenience stores that sell gasoline (8.8 percent)
- Less common retail outlets, such as discount and gift stores, gas stations without convenience stores, and car washes (8.6 percent)

The difference between the rate of sales at non-traditional tobacco retail stores and the rate at more traditional retailers continues to narrow, and is only separated by 0.2 percentage points (7.7 percent vs. 7.5 percent, respectively). Supermarkets and drug stores/pharmacies had the lowest rate of

illegal sales at 3.9 percent and 0 percent, respectively.

This annual survey of illegal sales of cigarettes to minors is conducted to gauge the rate of illegal tobacco sales across California and to comply with the Stop Tobacco Access to Kids Enforcement (STAKE) Act. All U.S. states and territories are required to assess their rate of illegal sales of tobacco to youth, pursuant to the Federal Synar Amendment. Besides conducting the annual survey, the California Department of Public Health, Food and Drug Branch, conducts ongoing illegal sales compliance checks. The survey of 733 stores throughout the state is conducted by monitoring more than 100 youth who are sent to retail outlets to attempt to purchase tobacco products. California retailers caught selling tobacco products to minors during these enforcement operations may be subject to fines up to \$6,000 for repeated violations.

Phase 2 continues a massive corridor project formulated through county and community collaboration. Supervisor Susan Peters described the main street vision as "a declaration by the community that Carmichael (would) advance Fair Oaks Boulevard into the future." A vibrant town center, Peters said, would provide a foundation to encourage economic development.

Finished in 2013, Phase 1 improved safety and traffic flow at the Marconi/Fair Oaks intersection. Beautification included giant palm trees, landscaped medians and stone obelisk monuments. "Our obelisks are so

pretty," said Peters. "Now even McDonalds has put one up."

Near Grant and Engle, two more monuments will continue the statuary. In keeping with the main street name, oak saplings will dot new medians. Carmichael Park frontage beautification will include meandering walkways. A riverside interlude will enhance the Great Wall corner; here design will reflect artist Hugh Gorman's landmark mural. River stones and a gravel mosaic will form a dry creek bed and shrubs will echo American River Parkway vegetation. Shade trees will include valley oak and red maple.

"Undergrounding" of power and telephone lines, Peters said,

will dramatically enhance boulevard appearance and remove obstacles challenging pedestrians. Utility burial is first on the Phase 2 agenda. Road resurfacing, medians, and sidewalk building will come next; landscaping is the final stage.

Teichert Construction will execute most aspects of Phase 2. Phase 3, scheduled to complete improvements between Marconi and Landis, will begin in 2017. The project is funded by the Federal Regional Surface Transportation Program, the State Transportation Improvement Program, and development fees. ## Could You Have an Abandoned Well on Your Property?

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)**

- While most never think about it, improperly sealed or abandoned wells pose significant risks to our groundwater quality and are a very real safety hazard for children, adults, and small animals.

With these concerns in mind, Sacramento County's Environmental Management Department (EMD) is continuing its survey program to identify hundreds of these wells to help ensure that they are properly secured or destroyed.

"We find wells on vacant lots, farmland, and backyards in the suburbs," said Val Siebal, Director of EMD. "People don't realize that runoff water from these wells carries pollutants that flow directly into our groundwater. It's important that we find them and properly seal them."

Environmental Management has identified approximately 600 potentially unsecured abandoned wells in the south area of the county alone. These wells can be found on any type of property, even residential homes. Often the wells are forgotten and lost in the tangle of weeds or brush, where an opening as small as eight inches can entrap small children and animals such as dogs. Your help is needed to find all abandoned wells to ensure they are secure and safe.

Sacramento County relies on groundwater to supply approximately half of its water needs. Due to deterioration or lack of maintenance, many abandoned wells are a source of runoff water carrying bacteria, sediment, fertilizer,

pesticides, and other pollutants that flow directly down into our groundwater. Many contaminants are not visible just from looking at the water and consumers may not know their drinking water is unsafe. It is essential for groundwater quality that steps are taken now to help ensure there is a safe water supply for county residents, businesses, and farms.

Children, animals, and even adults can fall into abandoned wells causing injury or death. Open pit wells and large-diameter drilled wells are particularly hazardous and often are hundreds of feet deep. It is easy to miss a well opening and a small child or animal may become trapped inside.

Merely capping an abandoned well or filling it with concrete is not enough to prevent it from becoming a problem. Plugging materials must be strong, durable, and free of contaminants. Effective well-plugging requires experience

and knowledge of well construction materials and methods. EMD can assist by safeguarding that the proper materials are used and the contractor is trained and knowledgeable.

"Our objective is to get the wells into compliance; either make them active again, deactivate them if they will be used again, or properly destroy them," Siebal said. "Within the next three years, working with property owners, we want to identify all the abandoned wells and target the most dangerous as high priorities for closure. We're sending postcards to property owners now and will make follow-up appointments with the owners."

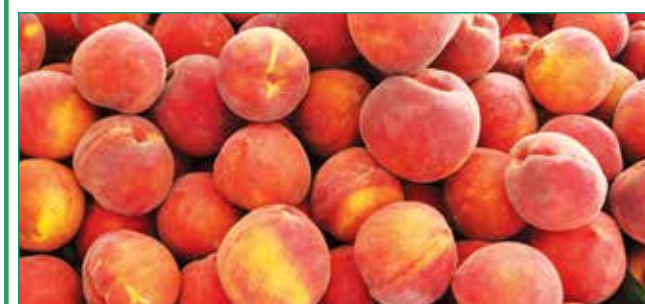

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - Authors Susan Maxwell Skinner and Toni Christman will join forces on November 7th to present fascinating tales linking two Central Valley towns.

Photojournalist and archivist Susan Maxwell Skinner—whose historical research and writing is well-known to readers of this newspaper—will discuss Carmichael's past and the riveting life of its founder—a man pivotal to California history. During a career that included oil-drilling, real estate wheel-dealing, and politics, Daniel Carmichael acquired part of the old San Juan Mexican land grant.

**PICKS OF THE WEEK**



Amy Schumer, Bill Hader in "Trainwreck" Universal Pictures

**"Terminator Genisys"** (PG-13) - In the post-robot-apocalypse, human resistance leader John Connor (Jason Clark) sends his trusted comrade Kyle (Jai Courtney) back to 1980s to protect his mother from the machines. But what's this?! The time-travel thingy done messed up, landing Kyle in an alternate timeline in the year 2017, where Sarah Connor (Emilia Clark) has already befriended the Terminator from T-2. Also, a new app called Genisys will connect all of our data and devices, opening the door for machine takeover. That's as much plot as can be coherently explained in this four-car pile-up of a time-travel movie.

There are just so many Terminators. Putting the current-era "Ah-nuld" next to a computer-recreation of him in his prime 1980s form may not have been such a good idea. Back then, the Terminator was an ice-cold killer who could give you chills with a one-liner. Now the cybernetic assassin is more of a good-natured old pal, joking about what a tough guy he was and still kinda is.

**"Trainwreck"** (R) - Comedian Amy Schumer stars in her first leading-role in this raunchy romantic comedy that knowingly goes against rom-com trends. Schumer's character gets the traditionally male role of being the over-the-top-but-likable slob saddled with immature ideas about love and commitment. She ends up having real feelings for a surgeon played by Bill Hader. He's got the role of being there for the protagonist as they hilariously

struggle to grow up and be in a healthy relationship -- usually the woman's job in this formula. Lebron James surprises everyone with his scenes (not cameos) as Hader's friend and confidant. It's the best Judd Apatow-ish comedy out there, but Schumer shines as she should. Hader is really hitting his mark with easy-going comedy and just the right amount of drama at just the right times. The ending doesn't really support the rest of the film, but it's an overall victory for people who want more perspectives in major comedies.

**"Mr. Holmes"** (PG) - Long after the height of his crime-solving career, the brilliant detective Sherlock Holmes (Ian McKellen) returns to England to find that the popular stories of his exploits are all wrong. Now in his 90s, Holmes tends to his bees and worries over his diminishing mental powers. Never truly able to retire, Holmes gets caught up in one more mystery with the help of a curious and observant young boy (Milo Parker). This isn't the fists-of-fury Sherlock of Robert Downey Jr., nor is it the fast-talking defective detective played by Benedict Cumberbatch. McKellen shows audiences a new angle on the familiar hero.

**"Selfless"** (R) - Damien (Ben Kingsley) is a mega-rich Manhattan mogul whose days are numbered thanks to cancer. Damien hears of a way for the rich and powerful to cheat death by transferring their consciousness into a younger, healthier, more attractive body. So for the rest of the movie, Damien has Ryan Reynolds' body. While he was assured that the transplant bodies were grown in a vat, Damien suspects that might not be true while also realizing just how selfish he was with his first life. Sadly, the deeper ideas about identity and morality never go anywhere, and we get lukewarm action sequences instead.

## Deer Wars: Coming Soon to a Suburb Near You



With ample food sources and no natural predators, suburban areas—your backyard—have a lot to offer deer. Hungry deer will eat just about any type of foliage, but there are some plants that don't appeal to them, such as French marigolds, foxglove, boxwood, ornamental grasses, and rosemary. - When you think of deer, do you envision a shy doe hiding beneath forest foliage? Or perhaps you imagine a buck bounding through a field along a quiet country road. The reality of where deer like to live is much closer to home than you think. Humans aren't the only species that thrive in suburbia. Today, more deer live in close proximity to humans than ever before in our country's history.

"Hunting has reduced deer densities in large, wooded open space areas across the country over the past decade," says Dr. Scott C. Williams of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station. "Many deer remain, however, and are now largely concentrated in residential areas where they have abundant ornamental plants to browse and where little or no hunting occurs."

With ample food sources and no natural predators, suburban areas—your backyard—have a lot to offer deer. Deer are extremely adaptive and, living in close proximity to humans, they have learned to associate people with

food. Many will learn the habits of humans in their area, and adjust their browsing times accordingly to munch on residential landscapes while people are not around, or asleep.

Nationally, deer cause millions of dollars in damage by devouring residential landscapes and through vehicle collisions. Estimates range around \$1 billion, annually, including damage to property, crops, and timber. Problems aren't just linked to a high number of deer in an area. Even just one or two in an area can cause significant damage; a single deer can consume a ton and a half of vegetation per year.

If you've seen signs of deer damage around your home, you'll need to combat the problem to keep deer away from your lawn, trees, shrubs, and garden. Options include:

- Physical barriers—Although sometimes unsightly, high fences can keep deer out, but with many suburbs and homeowners associations placing restrictions on fence height, you may not be allowed to

build a fence high enough to be effective.

- Deer-resistant plantings—Hungry deer will eat just about any type of foliage, but there are some plants that don't appeal to them, such as French marigolds, foxglove, boxwood, ornamental grasses, and rosemary. Incorporating these plants throughout your landscape might help deter some invasive deer.

- Motion deterrents—Deer are skittish around unexpected motion, so windsocks positioned near your garden might deter deer from dining there. You may also try motion-sensing sprinklers, lights, or even a radio to startle deer away. If these deterrents occasionally work, you'll need to reposition them so deer don't become acclimated to them.

However, the most effective deterrent to keep deer out of suburban areas is a scent-aversion repellent, according to Williams. "Our research has proven that this kind of repellent works to protect plants from damage by deer and other animals." Test results are available online at [www.bobbex.com/ct-ag-partial-study](http://www.bobbex.com/ct-ag-partial-study).

Deer rely heavily on their sense of smell for feeding, so using a scent-aversion repellent like Bobbex Deer can be an effective, long-lasting, and safe way to keep deer away from your home and landscape. 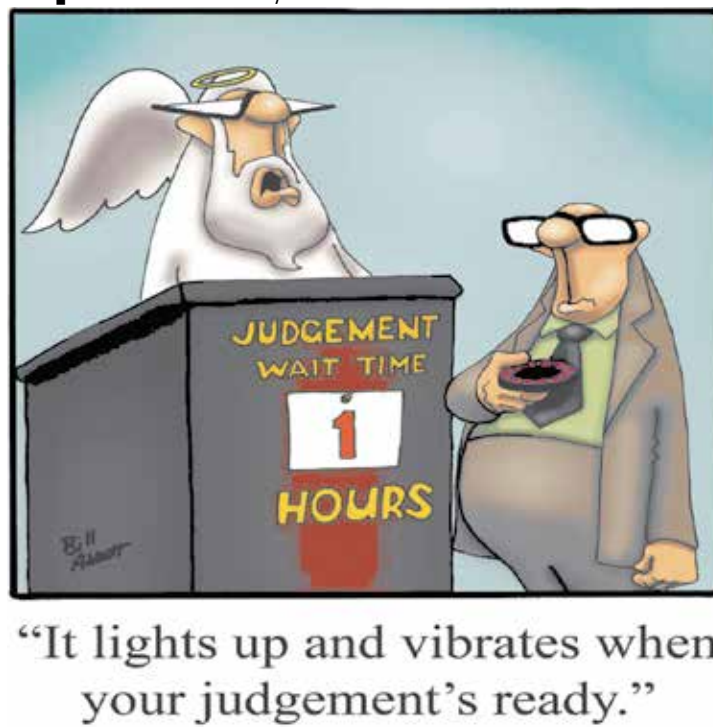

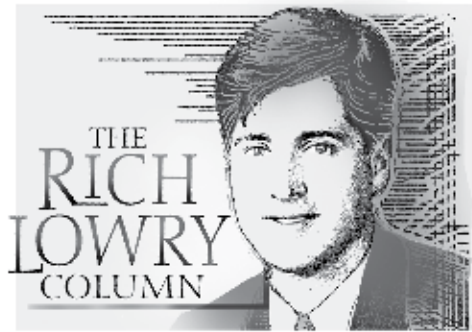
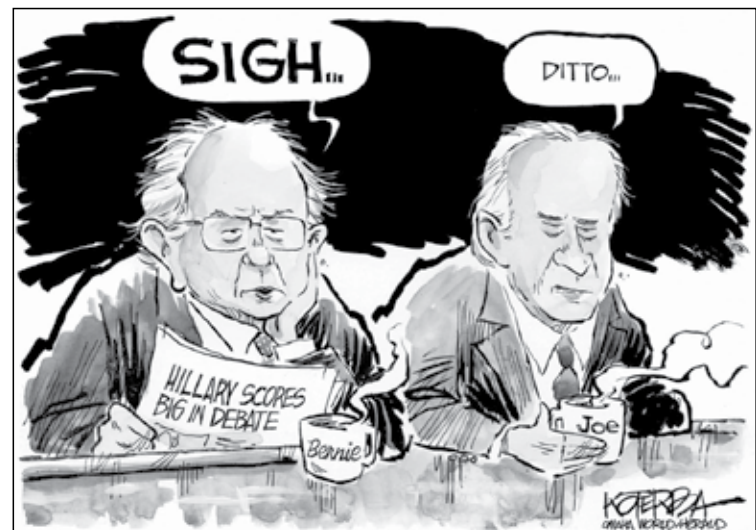

**Bernie's Foolish Crush on Sweden**

Scandinavia is the American left's Shangri-La. It is the land of social democracy and of all good things. It is the answer to any objection that new welfare benefits can't be adopted here: *But look how well they work in Sweden.*

Bernie Sanders reverted to this article of faith when challenged over his socialism at the recent Democratic debate. He invited America to sit at the knee of Scandinavia. "I think we should look to countries like Denmark, like Sweden and Norway," he said, "and learn from what they have accomplished for their working people."

There are a couple of things wrong with the left's romance with these countries, as Swedish analyst Nima Sanandaji notes in a recent monograph. It doesn't fully appreciate the sources of Nordic success, or how Scandinavia has turned away from the socialism so

alluring to its international admirers. The first thing to know is that Scandinavia is inhabited by Scandinavians, a hardworking, responsible people who have had high levels of social trust and cohesion for a very long time. These are splendid qualities. As Sanandaji points out, Scandinavia already had high life expectancy and other health indicators before it expanded its welfare state, and already had more equal societies.

No one remembers, but Scandinavia wasn't always a watchword for social democracy. Indeed, Sweden was such a free-market success story that Republicans should be citing it in their debates. It started as a poor country in the late 19th century, then achieved takeoff under a dynamic capitalist system into the middle of the 20th century. Its boom coincided with the time when its taxes were lower than in the U.S. and the rest of Europe.

When Bernie Sanders and his ilk hold up Scandinavia as an exemplar, they are really thinking of a couple of decades beginning in the early 1970s when Sweden and others got their full Sanders on.

In Sweden, the effective marginal tax rate topped 100 percent in some circumstances. There is a reason that IKEA founder Ingvar Kamprad fled the country in 1973. Sweden instituted a scheme to confiscate corporate profits and hand them over to labor

unions. The idea was, in the words of a Swedish economist, to have "a market economy without individual capitalists and entrepreneurs."

This was about as logical as it sounded -- and delivered predictable results. The socialist golden years weren't so golden for economic performance. Entrepreneurship plummeted. Job creation and wages sputtered.

The Scandinavian story the past few decades has been a turn against socialism. Taxes have fallen, and markets have been liberalized. Kamprad returned to Sweden.

If no one will mistake these countries for Texas, they allow enough economic openness to stay vibrant. "Scandinavian countries," Sanandaji writes, "compensate for high taxes and labor market rigidities by following liberal policies in other areas, such as business freedom and openness to trade." Denmark, of all places, is ranked 11th on The Heritage Foundation's index of economic freedom, right above the United States.

Nothing will undermine the left's faith in the Scandinavian model, but Bernie Sanders could learn a thing or two from the reformers in the countries that he so admires.

**DEAR PAW'S CORNER:** A local pet charity is going to hold a Halloween-themed pet walk, where participants bring their dogs in costume to parade along a local street. My question is, do these kinds of charity events really help pets in need? They just seem like chichi see-and-be-seen social gatherings without any real purpose. -- Dan in Long Beach, California

**DEAR DAN:** Charity events can do a tremendous amount of good for pets in need. Besides donations of food, blankets and other items, most shelters and nonprofits need cold hard cash in order to function. These events can raise quite a bit of money.

Many pet owners join in walks like these just for fun, and I think that's fine. They're proud of their pet and want to show it off, and it's a great chance to socialize (as long as the dogs can handle large crowds).

However, if you're also con-

cerned about how your donation will be used, it doesn't hurt to do some research first. What exactly does the charity support? (Some fund pet rescues or local shelters; others advocate for seniors and their pets, and so on.) How much of its funding goes directly to the cause being supported?

You can find the answer through watchdog groups like Charity Navigator ([www.charitynavigator.org/](http://www.charitynavigator.org/)), Guidestar ([www.guidestar.org/Home.aspx](http://www.guidestar.org/Home.aspx)) or the Wise Giving Alliance ([www.give.org/](http://www.give.org/)). You also can check an approved nonprofit's 990 tax forms from the IRS to see how efficiently donations are used.

If you're still skeptical, save those funds and donate them directly to your local shelter, where you can ask someone how that money is used, and it generally travels the shortest path toward helping animals in need.

## Believe It If You Want

It was just a few weeks before spring training preceding the 1969 baseball season when Frank McGraw returned to his high school to participate in an alumni basketball game. Little did anyone realize that what was about to transpire would be a lead-in to an eventual turning point in baseball lore.

Better known as Tug, McGraw had been up and down from the minor leagues over his first three seasons with the New York Mets, but unbeknownst to him or anyone else, he was on the cusp of greatness.

That fateful day --- January 10, 1969, before a sparse gathering at tiny Memorial Center Gym at St. Vincent's High School in Vallejo, Ca., --- was to be a day that would fuel McGraw's remarkable Major League Baseball career. It was the final alumni game for boys' basketball at the old school, that was transitioning to an all-girls school the next year, as a new high school for boys was being constructed --- the end of an era for the Saints, but the beginning of a new one for McGraw and the Mets.

Not nearly as proficient on the basketball court as he was on the pitcher's mound, McGraw was in for a long night. The 6' 0" lefty was matched up on the floor against a lean, long-armed, 6' 1" leaping point guard that could deal and shoot a little bit over the top. It was a clear mismatch, since there were no fastballs, curveballs or screwballs involved.

The two players went after it in spirited, good-natured fashion for much of the game. McGraw managed to score just a pair of field goals and two free throws, while his counterpart scored 11 points and set up his teammates time and again for a lopsided 69-42 victory over the former Hilltoppers.

McGraw (father of country singer Tim McGraw) grew increasingly flustered and

frustrated throughout the game. As hard as he tried, he just wasn't able to get much accomplished on the floor against the quick-handed, slashing guard of the Saints, and could be heard grumbling and muttering something to himself repetitiously all the while.

After the final horn sounded, the players gathered on court to shake hands and congratulate one another. When Tug and his nemesis for the night met, the lanky victor just had to ask, "Mr. McGraw, I couldn't help noticing you were mumbling something out there during the game. What was that?"

McGraw paused. He took a long, deep breath and his chest welled up with a sudden fortitude. He looked the youngster in the eyes with a soul-piercing sincerity and calmly, but firmly, said, "Ya Gotta Believe. Ya Gotta Believe."

Going forward, McGraw would keep his personal mantra close to the vest...for a while; about four years.

As the 1969 MLB season unfolded, McGraw's previously woeful Mets evolved into the Miracle Mets. A National League expansion team in 1962 (losing 120 games), the Mets had been a perennial bottom-feeder until their Amazin' Mets season, when they rose from the depths to go 82-39 to bypass the Chicago Cubs and finish first in the East at 100-62 in the first year of division playoffs. The Mets beat Atlanta in a three-game sweep to advance to their first World Series and defeated Baltimore in five games. McGraw came into his own as that season progressed, finishing 9-3 with 12 saves and a 2.24 ERA.

Famously, the Mets would return to the Fall Classic in 1973. The team was mired in last place in the East that season in late August when a clubhouse meeting was called. His competitive

fires roaring deep inside and sensing similar frustrations to those he had felt so long ago on an inconsequential night on the hardwood, McGraw interrupted the proceedings and stirred things up with a sudden outburst... "Ya Gotta Believe!" he cried out. As any baseball fan worth a worn out resin bag should know, that call became a rallying cry for those Mets.

The Mets went 27-12 down the stretch to take the division with a mere 82 wins. They clinched it with a McGraw save against the Cubs. Tug believed and went 5-0 with 12 saves and a 0.88 ERA over the final five weeks. With Willie Mays on the roster in his final season and Yogi Berra managing the troops, McGraw got the save over the Cincinnati Reds to clinch the NL pennant and the Shea Stadium scoreboard read, "Well you better believe." But the mighty Oakland A's dynasty of that era beat the Mets in a seven-game World Series.

The Mets won it all in 1986 and now they are back again after dealing more misery to the Cubs. The Cubs just don't believe, because of the Curse of the Goat. The Cubs won back-to-back Series, but haven't won again since 1908. As the story goes, the Chicago owner, named Murphy, would not allow a fan to bring his goat, named Murphy, to a game at Wrigley Field and the fan cursed the Cubs forevermore. The Cubs faced the Mets this year in the playoffs and a guy named (Daniel) Murphy was unbelievable for New York. He homered in six straight playoff games, including all four in a sweep over Chicago for which he received the NLCS MVP Award.

The Mets meet repeat American League champion Kansas City in this year's World Series. Which team believes in itself more? The one that wins, of course ★



## Dare to Live Without Limits Being Understood

Effective communication is essential to successfully interacting with others. We often take for granted that people know what we mean. Although we assume we are being understood, not enough effort is made to verify that this is actually the case.

Are you understood when communicating with others? When your thoughts, intentions, or ideas are misunderstood, numerous problems result. Time is wasted, mistakes are made, feelings are hurt, your intentions are misinterpreted, or people get the wrong idea.

You can be misunderstood when making a point or when responding to what someone else said or wrote. In order to be understood, you have to know what are the desired end results you would like. If your goal is vague or your thoughts disorganized, you won't be able to communicate in a clear, easily understood manner.

In order to be understood, you must understand and adapt to your audience. You have to adjust your communication approach to overcome any barriers. Obstacles may exist because of: age, gender, background, experiences, education, occupation, assumptions, prejudices, stereotypes, attention level, language, culture, mindset, attitude, or emotional state.

The speed of your speech and vocabulary level should be such that your message is easily discernable. Don't overwhelm your listener. Invite questions. Watch for, and be receptive to signs that your listener wants to respond or ask questions.

Keep it simple and to the point. Avoid complex or verbose communications. Don't wander by including lots of disjointed or irrelevant topics.

In communications, less is more. People have a limited attention span. Taking an inordinate amount of time to get to the essence of what you seek to convey will lose your audience.

As you are speaking, watch the reaction of your recipient. If they don't exhibit the response you expect, or look confused, ask questions to determine the reason for the misunderstanding and make corrections before proceeding.

Communicating while you are angry or upset is easily misunderstood. You will say things you may later regret. Give yourself adequate time to calm down before speaking or writing. Failing to take this approach results in aggravating situations and creating additional problems.

Pay attention to your voice inflection. It can change your intended meaning. If you are distracted, your inflection may not be what you intended. Additionally, when you have an important message to convey, make sure thoughts are focused.

If you use humor, make sure it's appropriate to the situation and doesn't offend anyone.

Whereas it's OK to poke fun at yourself, don't do it to others. You may not mean anything offensive, but many people don't react well to being joked about.

A friendly, positive attitude

makes your message easier to understand. When someone thinks you have a negative message, they get defensive and won't be receptive to what you are trying to convey.

Using questions to get your point across is very effective. It encourages more listener participation than simply making statements. It holds their attention and allows them to feel they are part of a conversation rather than just being lectured to.

Adapt to your audience. Be clear and concise. Ask open ended questions to verify that you have been understood. Don't just ask yes or no questions such as, "Did you understand me?"

Being understood is a two way process. You have to deliver a clear, easily understood message and your audience must interpret it correctly. When people have no idea of what you said, nothing has been accomplished.

As the deliverer of a message, it's your responsibility to ensure it's understandable. Don't become offended if your message is not readily understood. Learn from each experience how to improve.

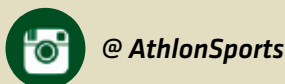
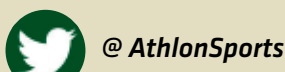

**108** Two of the American Athletic Conference's best offenses were on display Friday night. Memphis and Tulsa combined for 108 points in the Tigers' 66-42 victory, which was the highest-scoring FBS game in 2015.

**7.4** Vanderbilt has held its last two opponents to a 7.4 percent conversion rate on third down. Two weeks ago, South Carolina converted 2-of-13, and Missouri went 0-of-14 last Saturday against the Commodores.

HEISMAN RACE

**1. Leonard Fournette, RB, LSU** Fournette enjoyed another productive outing, rushing for 150 yards on 26 carries in the Tigers' 48-20 win over WKU. He did, however, fail to have a carry of at least 25 yards for the first time this season.

**2. Trevone Boykin, QB, TCU** The Horned Frogs had the week off. Boykin ranks second nationally with 425.6 total yards per game and is second in the nation in yards per pass attempt (10.2).

**3. Derrick Henry, RB, Alabama** Henry rushed for 143 yards on 28 carries and two touchdowns – including the game-winner with 2:24 remaining – to lead Alabama to a 19-14 win over Tennessee.



**4. Christian McCaffrey, RB, Stanford** McCaffrey was brilliant in the Cardinal's 31-14 win over Washington, rushing for 109 yards and one touchdown and catching five passes for 112 yards and a score. He ranks first in the nation with 259.7 all-purpose yards per game.

**5. Dalvin Cook, RB, Florida State** Cook was held to 82 yards and one TD on 17 carries as the Seminoles fell from the ranks of the unbeaten with a 22-16 loss at Georgia Tech. He still ranks second nationally in rushing (148.1 ypg) and is averaging 8.2 yards per carry.

Owls on the big stage

Temple hosts Notre Dame in the biggest game in school history

NOTRE DAME AT TEMPLE

Temple is nationally ranked for the first time since 1979 thanks to a 7-0 start highlighted by a Week 1 victory over Penn State. The Owls also have two decent road wins, at Cincinnati and East Carolina, but their four other wins have come against some of the worst teams in the nation — UMass, Charlotte, Tulane. Notre Dame clearly will be the best team Temple has played to date. The Fighting Irish have one loss, by two points at Clemson, and have wins over Texas, Virginia, Georgia Tech, Navy and USC on their résumé. Temple has been getting it done with the top defense, at least statistically, in the AAC, but it must be noted that the Owls allowed 557 yards to Cincinnati, 438 to UMass and 378 to East Carolina. Notre Dame features more firepower than any of those three teams. *Notre Dame 31-17*

STANFORD AT WASHINGTON STATE

Washington State, which lost at home to Portland State in Week 1, is playing meaningful games in the second half of the season for the first time in the Mike Leach era. The Cougars have won three straight Pac-12 games, including two on the road (Oregon and Arizona) and actually control their own destiny in the Pac-12 North. Tough tests await, however, starting with this week's visit from Stanford — another team that suffered a puzzling Week 1 defeat (at Northwestern). Since returning to the West Coast, the Cardinal have played as well as any team in the nation, reeling off six straight wins in very impressive fashion. Running back Christian McCaffrey has played his way into the Heisman discussion, and his team looks to be a legitimate contender to win the national title. *Stanford 37-21*

NORTH CAROLINA AT PITTSBURGH (THURSDAY)

The most important game in the ACC Coastal Division to date pits two of the most surprising teams in the nation. North Carolina has won six straight since losing to South Carolina in Week 1. The Tar Heels, as usual, are scoring a bunch of points, but the story in Chapel Hill has been the improvement of the defense under new coordinator Gene Chizik. Through seven games, UNC is allowing 350.0 yards per game and 4.9 yards per play, down from 497.8 and 6.5 last season. Will Muschamp (Auburn) and John Chavis (Texas A&M) were the two most celebrated defensive coordinator hires in the offseason, but Chizik has had the biggest impact. Pittsburgh has quietly jumped out to a 6-1 start (4-0 in the league) under first-year coach Pat Narduzzi. The Panthers' four league wins, however, have come by an average of 4.3 points, and their four victims have a combined four ACC wins. *North Carolina 31-21*

FLORIDA VS. GEORGIA (JACKSONVILLE)

Nothing will be official, but the SEC East title is basically on the line Saturday in Jacksonville. Florida is 4-1 in the league, with its lone loss by seven points at LSU. Even in defeat, Treon Harris passed his first test in his first start after Will Grier's suspension, throwing for 271 yards and two TDs and, most important, no interceptions. With a strong defense and potent running game, Florida can still be a very good team if Harris takes care of the ball. Georgia's once-promising season has taken several wrong turns in the past month. The offense has played well in only one SEC game, a 52-20 victory over South Carolina. The Bulldogs scored only two offensive touchdowns against both Vanderbilt (a win) and Tennessee (a loss); they scored only one TD against Alabama, and that was on an 83-yard run with the Tide holding a 38-3 lead; and then, two weeks ago, they were held without a TD in a 9-6 win over Missouri. The point? Georgia's offense is not very good right now. *Florida 27-17*

OLE MISS AT AUBURN

Left for dead after losing by 13 points to Memphis two weeks ago, Ole Miss is back in play in the SEC West after a surprisingly easy 23-3 win over Texas A&M on Saturday night. The Rebels, who have been decimated by injuries in recent weeks, outgained the usually potent Aggies 471-to-192 and were never threatened. Now Ole Miss controls its own destiny, thanks to an early season win at Alabama.

Auburn, picked by many (including *Athlon Sports*) to earn a spot in the College Football Playoff, appears headed toward a last-place finish in the SEC West. The Tigers dropped to 1-3 in the league with a 54-46 loss in four overtimes at Arkansas, and they still have games at Texas A&M and vs. Georgia and Alabama. *Ole Miss 31-21*

OKLAHOMA STATE AT TEXAS TECH

Oklahoma State is flying about as far under the radar as possible for a Power 5 team that has yet to lose a game this late in the season. The reason is pretty clear: a lack of quality wins. The Pokes are 4-0 in the Big 12, with three of the wins coming against teams that are a combined 0-11 in the league (West Virginia, Kansas State and Kansas) and the other over Texas by three points. This might be a really good team, but it's hard to get too excited at this point. Texas Tech is a very predictable 2-3 in the Big 12, with wins over the league's two worst teams (Iowa State and Kansas) and losses to the three best teams (TCU, Baylor and OU). The Red Raiders will have an opportunity down the stretch to make a move in the league standings. *Texas Tech 44-37*

PRIME TIME PLAYERS

In a battle of highly regarded West Coast quarterbacks, UCLA true freshman **Josh Rosen** outdueled Cal's Jared Coff, throwing for 399 yards with three touchdowns and no interceptions in the Bruins' impressive 40-24 win over the Golden Bears on Thursday. ... NC State running back **Matthew Dayes** rushed for a career-high 205 yards (on only 16 carries) and scored two touchdowns in the Wolfpack's 35-17 win at Wake

Forest. ... USC sophomore **Juju Smith-Schuster** caught eight passes for 143 yards and a TD to lead USC to a 42-24 win over Utah at the L.A. Coliseum. ... Freshman linebacker **Cameron Smith** was the star of the USC defense, intercepting three passes, including a 54-yard return for a score in the second quarter. ... Oklahoma's **Samaje Perine** had his most productive game of the season, rushing for 201 yards and four

touchdowns in the Sooners' 63-27 win over Texas Tech. Perine, who rushed for 1,713 yards as a true freshman, has topped the 100-yard mark only twice in 2015. ... **Tyler Ervin** became the first player to rush for at least 250 yards two times this season after running for 263 yards on 36 carries in San Jose State's 31-21 win over New Mexico. In late September, the senior rushed for 300 yards against Fresno State. ...

**Connor Cook** threw for 398 yards with four touchdowns and no interceptions in Michigan State's 52-26 win over Indiana. ... USF quarterback **Quenton Flowers** rushed for 201 yards and three touchdowns and added 97 yards passing to help the Bulls top SMU 38-14. ... **Dak Prescott** competed 25-of-35 passes for 348 yards, rushed for 117 yards and accounted for six total touchdowns in Mississippi State's 42-16 win

STOCK REPORT

**▲** Washington State has played its way into the Pac-12 title race by winning three straight league games for the first time since 2003. The Cougars, who are 3-1 in the Pac-12 after a 45-42 win at Arizona, host Stanford (5-0 in the league) on Saturday in the biggest game of the Mike Leach era.

**▼** After showing signs of life in recent weeks — a five-point loss at Florida State followed by a 10-point win over Virginia Tech — Miami hit rock bottom with a 58-0 loss at home to Clemson. It was the worst defeat in the history of a program that claimed five national titles between 1983-2001. Head coach Al Golden was fired on Sunday.

**▲** Colorado snapped a 14-game losing streak in Pac-12 play with a 17-13 win over Oregon State in Corvallis. The Buffs, who are 4-4, likely will need to win seven games to become bowl-eligible because they play 13 games in the regular season. They could qualify with a 6-7 mark if not all bowl slots are filled.

**▼** Texas A&M's offense was held to 192 total yards, by far its worst effort of the season, and the Aggies failed to score a touchdown in a surprisingly one-sided 23-3 loss at Ole Miss. Sophomore quarterback Kyle Allen completed only 12 passes and averaged a paltry 2.6 yards on his 34 attempts.

## Recent cases of interest



**CASE:** Alex Bruno  
**PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Morgan Gire, Gangs & Hate Crimes Unit

The Honorable Marjorie Koller sentenced Alex Bruno to 61 years to life in prison. On June 26, 2015, a jury convicted Bruno of two counts of attempted murder, each with enhancements for causing great bodily injury and discharging a firearm causing great bodily injury.

In September 2012, Nick Stevenson was at a family birthday party at their south Sacramento home. Alex Bruno disliked the Stevenson family and went to the house to get his girlfriend, who was at the party. As Bruno and his girlfriend pulled away from the house in their car, Bruno fired shots through the rear window. Mr. Stevenson was struck in the abdomen, critically injuring him. A 16-year-old friend of the family was struck in the back and seriously injured as he turned to run away from the gunfire.

The car Bruno was driving was recovered a week later. The District Attorney's Laboratory of Forensic Services matched broken glass found inside the door frame of the car to the glass left at the scene. Witnesses were initially reluctant to identify the shooter, but ultimately came forward to identify Bruno, who remained at large for several months before his arrest.

**CASE:** Monica Njoku & Monterio Roberts

**PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Thomas Asker, Homicide Unit  
 Forty-five-year-old Monica Njoku and 43-year-old Monterio Roberts were convicted by jury of second-degree murder. The jury also found true a use of a deadly weapon allegation for Roberts.

Monica Njoku owned a house, which she rented out to single parents with dependents. On November 16, 2014, she demanded one of her tenants and the tenant's baby leave the house immediately. Another tenant, Edward White, protested and told Njoku she had to give the tenant at least a 3-day notice, which

led to a heated argument. Njoku called her brother, Monterio Roberts, and her sister-in-law to come to the house. Roberts threatened Mr. White and Njoku began harassing the female tenant. When Mr. White called 911, Njoku locked Mr. White's 2-year-old son out of the house. Roberts then pulled out a switch blade knife and attacked Mr. White. Njoku and her sister-in-law then jumped into the fight. Mr. White was stabbed three times in the torso. He died at the hospital from internal bleeding.

Roberts faces a sentence of 16 years to life in prison. Njoku faces of sentence of 15 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for January 8, 2016, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 16 before the Honorable Marjorie Koller.

**CASE:** William Joseph Dexter  
**PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Tate Davis, Domestic Violence Unit

The Honorable Richard Couzens sentenced 18-year-old William Joseph Dexter to 7 years in prison. On September 21, 2015, Dexter pled no contest to robbery with great bodily injury.

On July 2, 2015, a 73-year-old female victim went to the Raley's supermarket. A teenage girl approached her in the parking lot and asked if she would give her a ride to her grandfather's house. The victim agreed, but she needed to pick up her prescriptions first.

When the victim came back out to the parking lot, Dexter had joined the teen. The victim drove the pair through several nearby neighborhoods due to confusing directions from Dexter and his accomplice. The two also asked her to drive them to multiple houses.

During the drive, Dexter beat the victim with a crowbar, striking her numerous times on the head, arm, and hand causing great bodily injury. When the victim crashed the car, they stole her phone and ran from the scene. The victim suffered head injuries requiring 13 staples and a serious hand injury. ★
