CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - After April deluges, different kinds of umbrellas will open over Carmichael Park on Saturday, May 16th.

Painted parasols will make the park a shady place for sunny people. The "Shades of Carmichael" festival will parade 80 huge hand-painted umbrellas throughout clearings that parallel Fair Oaks Boulevard. Last staged in 2006, the event attracted visitors from as far as China. "Shades" is a fundraiser presented by the Sacramento Fine Arts Center and Carmichael Park District.

Festivalgoers are guaranteed good value from a day in the park. The parasol parade includes children's activities, vendors, food trucks, live music, and live artists—painting in plein air. Though the event is free, all umbrellas are for sale; silent auction bids begin at \$65. A live auction will offer celebrity artist contributions at 1:30 p.m. Says artist and event organizer David Peterson: "Sacramento people love their gardens. They also love art in their gardens. You can sit under one of our umbrellas and enjoy an ambiance that's different from a picture just hanging on a wall."

Early birds may preview and pre-bid on exhibits from May 12th through the 15th at the Sacramento Fine Arts Center, 5330B Gibbons Drive in Carmichael. A

meet-the-artists event is planned for 5:30 p.m. on May 15th. Festival co-sponsors are Lind Brothers Funeral Home and Carmichael Ace Hardware. For more information, call (916) 971-3713. ★



SMUD Invites Public Input on Proposed Rate Action

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) Board of Directors is holding public workshops and a public hearing to discuss proposed rate changes to begin in January 2016.

The Chief Executive Officer and General Manager's Report & Recommendation on Rates and Services (Report)—released by SMUD CEO and General Manager Arlen Orchard—outlines a proposed rate increase of 2.5% in both 2016 and 2017 for all customers. The drivers for this revenue requirement are increased costs to meet renewable contracts as well as increases for materials and for operations and maintenance including commodities.

If the action is approved, SMUD customers would continue to enjoy some of the lowest electricity rates in California. In fact, while most utilities in the state have implemented rate increases every year, SMUD's increases have been the lowest in terms of percentage and actual cost.

SMUD is busy communicating with SMUD customers through many channels including neighborhood associations, community meetings, local chambers, and other planned gatherings. Board of Directors' workshops and a public hearing will be held for customers to attend and exchange information.

Also included in the Report is a proposed optional time of use (TOU) Residential Rate, which would better align the pricing of SMUD's electric service with the actual cost of its delivery. All SMUD business customers have already been transitioned to TOU rates. Some residential customers (about 300) are also on a TOU rate. In January 2016, a new TOU rate would be available to those customers and would also be available on a voluntary basis for solar customers (about 6,800) and electric vehicle customers (about 500). The new TOU rate would be available in January 2017 to all residential customers on an optional basis.

This gradual transition to TOU rates allows time to educate and communicate with customers, and to develop new tools that customers can use to compare rate choices, while providing a TOU choice for customers that is closer to what could be proposed as a default rate design in 2018.

SMUD needs to align the market cost of power with the prices customers pay for their energy.

Students Win DOE's 25th National Science Bowl

Successful Competition Highlights Importance of Investing in Next Generation of Leaders in Science

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Students from Mira Loma High School in Sacramento, CA, won the 2015 U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) National Science Bowl (NSB) in Washington D.C., the school's fifth championship. This year's championship team in the middle school competition is Fort Settlement Middle School from Sugar Land, TX.

"I congratulate this year's National Science Bowl Champions, as well as all of the finalists, for advancing through this rigorous and prestigious academic tournament," said Secretary of Energy Ernest

Moniz. "The students participating in the 25th annual competition represent our nation's future scientists and engineers who will help sustain America's scientific and technological competitiveness in the 21st century."

Altogether, about 9,000 high school students and 5,300 middle school students from all 50 U.S. States, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands participated in this year's regional competitions.

In the high school competition, Mira Loma High School defeated Thomas

Jefferson High School for Science and Technology from Alexandria, VA, by correctly answering a question about a gene-editing technology developed by DOE's Joint Genome Institute. The members of the winning high school team are Daniel Shen, Arvind Sundararajan, Jack Gurev, Roger Yu, and Claire Burch, and they are coached by James Hill.

The top two high school teams emerged victorious from a field of 68 high school regional champions who came to D.C. to compete in the National Science Bowl Finals.

For winning the national championship, Mira Loma High School will receive a nine-day, all-expense paid science trip to Alaska. While on the trip, the students will take day trips that provide learning opportunities about glaciology, marine and avian biology, geology, and plate tectonics. They will explore the Copper River Delta, known for its highly prized stocks and prolific runs of wild salmon; experience the mystical appeal of old-growth hemlock and spruce while hiking through the Chugach National Forest; white-water raft

Local Artist Hugh Gorman Is Subject of Short Film

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Celebrated local artist Hugh Gorman is the subject of a new, short documentary, which closed out the Sacramento Film Festival on Sunday, May 3rd. In the film, Producer-Director Chris McKee shows how Gorman's life in Fair Oaks and Carmichael has become interwoven into his public murals and mosaics.

"Hugh's mind is constantly jumping back and forth across time, connecting the past to the present, and celebrating what was best to him about life for the future," says McKee. "He was very inspirational to interview. I could have made five shorts about him!"

Indeed, the film splits into a braided narrative, exploring multiple locations around town about a minute in, drawing connections with the repeating landmarks and motifs of Gorman's work, primarily along the American River—hence, the film's title: *Hugh Gorman: Artist of the American River*.

As Gorman describes the wild and carefree 70s, he does not reflect the gentrification, the governance, or the celebration of California's gold rush we see around Sacramento, but it's certainly a time that's had a strong influence on the local music and arts scene.

"You know this was a frontier town! You go across the river and that was it," Gorman says in the film. "We never wore clothes when we swam. And actually, where [we lived] it was all rung by houses, and so the middle was pretty private. ... We were just literally free spirits."

The lifestyle has served him well, judging by how healthy he looks at 70 and the numerous works the local towns have commissioned him to produce over the years. Fly Kites with Caution

SMUD Offers Helpful Kite Flying Safety Tips

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

With just a little practice and a breeze, anyone can launch a kite with ease. Kite flying is a fun and easy hobby, but before flying any kite it’s important to be safe because kites and electricity don’t mix. The Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD) offers these simple safety tips to help make kite flying a safe experience:

Build or buy kites made of wood or plastic. Only use cloth

for the tail.

Fly kites in wide, open areas away from power lines.

Only use cotton, linen, or nylon string. Never use metallic thread, wire, or wire reinforced string as they can cause a fire, serious injury, or death if they come in contact with energized electrical equipment.

Only fly kites in dry weather. When kite string gets wet, it is a stronger conductor of electricity.

If a kite gets caught in

electrical lines or falls into a substation, leave it there. Do not touch any part of the kite or string and keep everyone away. To have a SMUD employee come out to safely retrieve a kite caught in power lines or equipment, call 1-888-742-SMUD (7683).

PICKS OF THE WEEK



Julianne Moore in "Still Alice"

"Still Alice" (PG-13) - At the height of her career, Dr. Alice Howland - an accomplished professor of communication - stumbles over her words during a lecture. In time, Alice (Julianne Moore) loses more words and gets lost during her routine runs. While still physically healthy, she is diagnosed with early-onset Alzheimer's disease. Alice's husband (Alec Baldwin) and three adult children (Hunter Parrish, Kate Bosworth and Kristen Stewart) must stand by as her memory and intellect fade.

The film manages to capture the drama and pain of the experience without giving in to melodramatic tear-jerking. There is a satisfying presence of human compassion and love, but nothing is sugar-coated. This type of illness drama comes off as Oscar-bait, but Moore gives a performance that deserves recognition.

"Blackhat" (R) - In this recent international-techno-computer-thriller, we are asked to suspend disbelief as Chris Hemsworth ("Thor") is called upon to save the world because he is The Greatest Hacker in the World. So Thor is a computer geek in this one, but a hunky, stoic computer geek who also is as tough as any Liam

Neeson character. Hemsworth's mission is to stop a bad-guy hacker (they're called "blackhats") who started his cyber-crime spree by blowing up a nuclear reactor.

Director Michael Mann sure can do atmospheric thrillers (like "Heat" and "Collateral"), but this one just can't make it on style alone. Though it's punctuated by some stunning action sequences, a lot of the run is just muddled plot points covered by scenes of people typing and pointing at indecipherable symbols on computer screens.

"Mortdecai" (R) - Johnny Depp mimes and ponces his way around the world as a mustachioed art dealer, the latest in Depp's long line of whimsical weirdos who garner half-hearted favor from audiences. Charles Mortdecai (Depp) is an Englishman with upper-crusty affectations, and a big problem with back taxes. To save his status, Mortdecai has to go on a madcap misadventure to track down a high-value painting. To his credit, Depp commits to his shtick. Unfortunately, the wackiness isn't so charming, and the jokes seem to get funnier the more they are repeated.

"The Cobbler" (PG-13) - Max (Adam Sandler) is an apathetic cobbler who gets all literal when he walks in other people's shoes. When he uses a magic machine to repair somebody's shoes, Max can become that person (or a physical duplicate of that person) just by trying on their shoes. The experience teaches him to care about his community, but it also lets him act like an amoral jerk by committing crimes as other people. Sandler seems to be trying a little harder here, but the rest of the movie is too safe to be funny and too sugary to be dramatic.

Water Rates Increase 104%

From Jim Baker:

Recently all customers of the Carmichael Water District received a seven page Proposition 218 titled NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED NEW / INCREASED WATER RATES.

On page four of this notice the last paragraph with the heading How Much Will My Water Bill Be tells you that a typical HOME served by the district has a 1" water meter and uses about 35 CCF / UNITS of water during a two-month billing cycle.

On page five of this notice is a chart that shows the current and proposed rates for a 1" meter in great detail. This chart shows the customer that if they use the typical 35 CCF / UNITS of water,

their proposed increase is 13.4% and will cost \$115.48.

There are no charts to show other HOME OWNERS with different size meters how their current and proposed rates will be affected. Perhaps there was not enough room to include other charts or maybe it was a simple mistake, I do not know.

The following figures, based on the same 35 CCF / UNITS of water used in a two-month billing cycle, may explain the omission. A ¾" meter will see a REDUCTION of 14.3% and pay \$85.28. A 1 ½" meter will see an INCREASE of 60% and pay \$176.77. A 2" meter will see an INCREASE of 60% and pay \$176.77. A 2" meter will see an INCREASE of 104%

and pay \$243.66.

These cost variations are justified (?) on page four, paragraph two and says "The proposed bimonthly service charges are proportional to the cost of service because the rate increases with meter size, which is a reflection of POTENTIAL demand that the customer COULD place on the water system at any given time.

The annual cost, BEFORE ANY WATER IS USED BY CUSTOMERS, is ¾" meter - \$264.54; 1" meter - \$404.34; 1 ½" meter - \$753.78; 2" meter - \$1,173.12.

Potential and could should be replaced with actual. ★

Practical Bipartisan Solutions

Over the last few years, we've seen major divisions in Congress across party lines. Therefore, I think it's important to highlight the small strides of bipartisanship and cooperation made with the recent passage of the sustainable growth rate fix (SGR), which brought both sides of the aisle together for comprehensive legislation.

From the moment Rep. Ami Bera joined Congress, he has been at the forefront of this new

wave of legislators stepping across party lines. In fact, few know that he's been working with Rep. Congress needs more leaders like Rep. Bera and Rep. Barr who are willing to step forward, look beyond party lines and lead the way to a future of practical bipartisan solutions.

Reject the Trans-Pacific Partnership

To the Editor:

Both the procedure and the content of the proposed Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) are flawed and should be rejected.

The "Fast-Track" procedure advocated by the President Obama and the Republican congressional leadership would allow the President to negotiate an agreement which could not be amended, but merely given a yes or no vote in Congress. This was the attitude taken by President Wilson with the Versailles Treaty (he insisted his Senate

supporters vote against an amended treaty) and it led to a flawed treaty which was rejected by the Senate.

At best, Fast-Track will lead to congressional disapproval. Much worse is the possibility that it might pass with the support of congressmen who believe that a flawed agreement may be better than no agreement at all, and who fear being demonized as "obstructionists" if they defend the interests of the United States and its workers.

Supporters of TPP claim that it will increase US exports, draw

foreign investment, and create jobs. We have heard that before, e.g. with NAFTA. According to a fact sheet of the US Trade Representative, the countries covered by the TPP already have invested \$620 billion in the US. Will they continue such investment if they can more easily export what they produce at home?

TPP is a surrender of US sovereignty and US interests. Congress should vote against both Fast-Track and TPP.

It's Nothing to Talk About

So, what do you want to talk about? The bout? There's really not much to talk about. Besides, you've come to the wrong place. For all we care, what happened in Vegas can stay in Vegas.

To all of you suckers who coughed up a hard-earned hundred bucks for the privilege of watching the Floyd Mayweather-Manny Pacquiao welterweight fight Saturday night --- touted as "The Fight of the Century" --- congratulations, you just dropped a "Benjamin," not counting whatever wagers you might have made on the side, on what is now known as "The Dullest Fight of the Century." Good thing for fans of boxing that the century is just a few years in.

For fans of sports in general, it must have felt as though they were taking a pounding themselves from all of the sports media outlets, that dished out a relentless barrage of pre-fight analysis that infiltrated all other sporting events for weeks. The boxing talk was unavoidable and tiresome. In the end, it was a unanimous decision that, as one radio caller put it simply, "It wasn't worth the hype."

With many more desirable options from which to choose over the busy weekend, we decided to ignore the thing altogether and wait for the results and reviews to come in later. There was a hint of what was to come: a neighbor was hosting a "fight party," but there wasn't much noise coming from there.

The very same sources that had pumped up interest in the mega fight between the Domestic Abuser and the National Hero were forced into a corner and had to admit their disappointment in the aftermath of Mayweather's methodical victory.

On ESPN's Mike & Mike radio show in the morning, Mike Golic said, "It provided me zero entertainment." Along with partner Mike Greenberg, the pair referred to the shenanigans and the seedy underbelly of the boxing industry.

On KNBR's morning show, the fight made the "Bum-Babies List" and evoked such remarks as, "The fight stunk. The whole thing is a circus." The Associated Press reported the fight "...wasn't the best. Far from it, with long periods where both fighters fought cautiously, looking for an edge."

Everybody should have known that the match was nothing to get too excited about, even though the theater featured elements of the past (Mayweather's long history of serial domestic abuse that included jail time) and the future (Pacquiao's ambitions of post-career politics in the Philippines). Mayweather's past was downplayed through the excitement surrounding the big event. Many people insisted on separating Mayweather, the technical, defense-minded, undefeated (48-0) champion in the ring, from Mayweather, the offensive woman-beater outside the ring, although, of course, he is one and the same person.

There were several preferable choices for spending your allotment of sporting time and dollars, rather than wasting it on that boxing craziness. You could have followed the NFL Draft and fantasized about unlikely near-future successes for your Forty Niners or Raiders (though the Raiders' No. 4 pick of

Alabama wide receiver Amari Cooper could mean that the Raiders could surpass their threshold of four wins). You could have

watched your San Francisco Giants reassert themselves while sweeping three games from AL MVP Mike Trout and the L. A. Angels at picturesque AT&T Park, and witnessed the continued revitalization of fan-favorite Tim Lincecum. You could have been highly entertained by a classic first-round, NBA playoff Game 7 heavyweight battle won by the L.A. Clippers over defending champion San Antonio on a last-second shot by Chris Paul, 111-109. "You could not ask for a better playoff game than the one you just saw," said TNT host Ernie Johnson, after a game featuring 16 ties and 31 lead changes, including 12 in the fourth quarter.

You could have continued to be amazed by MVP Steph Curry and the Golden State Warriors, as they won their second-round opener over the Memphis Grizzlies for their fifth straight playoff win. You could have put money down on the favorite in the Kentucky Derby, and held your breath while American Pharoah held off two challengers down the stretch.

Sadly, most of the focus was on the fight. Afterward, Mayweather was satisfied to have reached his intended goal --- one that so many might recognize --- to make a lot of money and don't get hurt. He and Pacquiao combined to cash in for around \$300 million. Those celebrities that paid \$40,000 and up for ringside seats, and all of you pay-per-view subscribers out there helped to line their pockets, instead of saving your money to spend it on your mothers or the mothers of your children. Your money was not well-spent on the richest and most boring fight in history.

In closing, as we said, if you came here to talk boxing, you came to the wrong place. Damn. ★

Improving Educational Outcomes for Foster Youth

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Tens of thousands of California children in foster care are closer to improved educational opportunities after the Assembly Education Committee unanimously approved AB 854. The legislation authored by Assemblymember Shirley Weber, Ph.D., will grant foster children living with relatives access to supplemental educational services provided through the state's Foster Youth Services (FYS) Program. The bill is sponsored by FosterEd: California, an initiative of the National Center for Youth Law.

Currently FYS uses a narrow eligibility definition based on placement to exclude more than two-thirds of California's estimated 60,000 children in foster care. Dr. Weber's legislation would adopt the more expansive definition of foster children used in the state's groundbreaking Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) for

education. The expanded definition includes foster children living in non-institutional foster care settings such as those living with relatives.

Addressing her fellow committee members before the vote, Dr. Weber said, "Currently under LCFF we try to serve all foster youth. Under Foster Youth Services they only provide services for kids who are not in the homes of their relatives. And we want to encourage young people to be placed with relatives because that provides a better sense of stability for the children. But if they are placed with relatives they don't get all of the services they need." AB 854 is intended to correct this problem.

Students in foster care are one of the most vulnerable and academically underserved student groups in California schools. A recent statewide study found that foster youth had the lowest graduation rate and highest

dropout rate of any student group in the state.

"The foster youth achievement gap is a tragedy," said FosterEd: California Policy Manager Melissa San Miguel. "With the committee's action today we are one step closer to additional supports for students and educators that will close that gap."

Foster students change placements frequently, which can often lead to changing schools. Death as a Taxable Event

Prepare for the rise of the landed nobility. Democracy as we've known it was nice while it lasted, but House Republicans have signaled the beginning of its end with a vote to repeal the estate tax.

Or so you would believe, based on the hysterics on the left over the proposed end of a minor, inefficient tax that is evidently the fragile keystone of our system of government and way of life.

"Repealing the estate tax will surely sow the seeds of a permanent aristocracy in this country," according to Rep. Jim McDermott of Washington. His colleague, Rep. Ron Kind of Wisconsin, denounced the rise of "a caste system where birth equals

outcome." The unhinged reaction to the House vote -- the Senate won't pass repeal, and President Barack Obama would veto it if it got to his desk -- is based on the Democrats' profound worry that someone, somewhere, might be passing on wealth to his or her heirs.

That they consider this a bizarre, threatening act that should be restrained as much as possible by the force of government speaks to their disconnection from human nature, not to say basic justice.

From time immemorial people have sought to better their lot in life, in part to provide for their children and grandchildren. By any reasonable standard, this is a praiseworthy and unselfish motivation.

Democrats look at such an elemental human act and see, firstly, a dastardly blow for wealth inequality (because not everyone is blessed with such parents and grandparents), and, secondly, a taxable event. The estate tax is the vehicle for these impulses.

At 40 percent, the U.S. has the fourth-highest marginal tax rate on estates of any developed country. But the exemption is high, \$5,430,000, to keep from ensnaring families who have built successful businesses and farms. This means the revenue haul is relatively insignificant.

The utility of the estate tax is really as a symbolic totem of the redistribution of assets that the left considers ill-gotten gains.

Dana Milbank of The Washington Post huffs that reducing the bite of the estate tax, "does little to prevent a permanent aristocracy from growing -- and abolishing it entirely turns democracy into kleptocracy." A kleptocracy? That is the corrupt rule of a self-serving elite. In this case, the alleged corruption consists of families keeping their own wealth within the family.

Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Mich., has said that repealing the death tax means "helping the wealthiest people." Helping. Is it really such untoward assistance to allow you to control to whom your wealth goes upon your death?

Most Americans would answer "no," which is why the estate tax is persistently unpopular even though its reach is relatively small. Liberals tend to be puzzled by public opinion on this question. "Like it or not," blogger Kevin Drum has written, "I think that most people simply have an instinctive feeling that you should be able to bequeath your money to whoever you want."

Of course they do. It takes a peculiar ideology indeed to think the opposite and to consider someone's death as an occasion to strike a blow for social justice.

Here, Kitty Kitty!

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: How did cats get the nickname "Kitty?" - Evelyn in Orlando

DEAR EVELYN: Good question! It seems like everyone summons their cat using "Here, kitty kitty," or calls their cat "Kitty" when they're not addressing it by name. So where did this common name come from?

It likely stems from "kitten," the name for a young cat. This English word dates back to the Middle Ages and describes the offspring of domesticated cats and some smaller wildcats. (Offspring of lions, for example, are called "cubs.")

There are other names for cats, of course. There's the scientific term for housecats, "felis catus" (which sounds a lot like a Harry Potter incantation). There's the general term for all cats, "felines," which includes big cats like tigers and lions, as well as wildcats and lynx and so on. And then there's the other common name for

housecats, which is "pussy-cats." Fully grown male cats that haven't been neutered are called "toms," and fully grown female cats who haven't been spayed are known as "queens." (And they know it, too!)

So, why do we often call full-grown cats "kitty"? I think it's because we humans tend to see even grown domestic housecats as cute, small animals -- even though adult cats can be stone-cold killers of small birds, lizards and other creatures outdoors (which is another good reason to keep your cat indoors).

What's interesting is how most domesticated cats will respond to a call of "Here, kitty kitty." That's likely because the phrase is so frequently used in Western countries, that most cats have heard it many times throughout their lives.

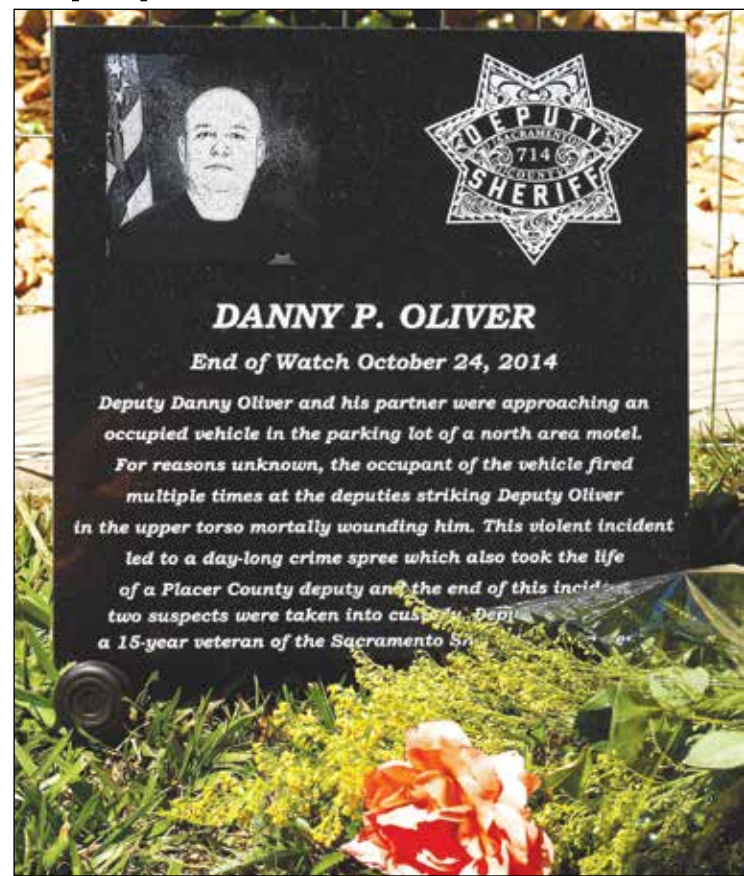

Deputy Honored in Memorial Garden

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Last week, a new name joined those of 16 fallen heroes at a little-known Carmichael memorial.

The private ceremony was one of several Sacramento events honoring Deputy Danny P. Oliver. The 47-year-old father of two died during a criminal incident that spread from Arden/Carmichael to Placer County last October. Oliver was shot as he and another officer investigated activity in a motel parking lot. The suspect and a female companion then fled to Auburn. En route, they car-jacked two vehicles, shooting and injuring one car owner. Near Interstate 80, the male suspect fired on two Placer County officers. One, Investigator Michael Davis, died from his wounds.

At the time of his death, 15-year Sheriff's Department veteran Oliver served with the Problem Oriented Police team in the North Area Division. "We hold Danny Oliver in a place of honor and distinction in the department and in the community," said Sheriff Scott Jones. "He will never be forgotten."

Surmounted by a "Lasting Peace" rose tree, Oliver's plaque joins tributes to 16 other officers in the Sheriff's Academy Memorial Rose Garden, located at 100 River Walk Way in Carmichael. Establishing the garden in 1988, then Sacramento Sheriff Glen Craig philosophized: "Just as a rose brings pleasure, (we should) observe the thorns and be ever mindful of dangers facing peace officers." Deputies who died in service to Sacramento County since the 1800s each have a rose bush and a plaque in the star-shaped plot. ★

Hundreds Rally for AB 311, Bill Fails in Assembly

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- On April 27th, multitudes of people gathered at the north steps of the Capitol to rally for the passage of Assembly Bill 311. Among the speakers were Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Gerber) and Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Nicolaus), who is the author of AB 311.

Assemblyman Gallagher spoke of how important this bill is to many Californians. He also referenced the legislation that helped to expedite the building of the Kings arena. "There's a lot of talk about water being the lifeblood of California," said Gallagher. "Let's prove it by getting this vital funding allocated to Sites Reservoir and Temperance Flat and by passing AB 311 today and showing all Californians that we value water just as much as we do professional sports."

Assembly Republican Leader

Kristin Olsen (Modesto) said, "If we want to prevent future dire situations related to drought that will inevitably hit California again, then we have to work together today to build the storage capacity that we so desperately need in order to increase water supply and provide it to all our communities."

An attendee of the rally, who wished to remain anonymous, said his concern about the lack of water in California is what made him support the bill. So what does he think will help the drought? "Building more dams, more reservoirs," he said. A common theme among attendees was that most wanted to see action as soon as possible.

However, just hours after the rally, the bill was rejected by the Assembly committee. On Twitter, people voiced their opinions about the bill. "As a conservationist, raft guide & hunter, I support conservation & river protection, but #CADems block sensible #Water

infrastructure," tweeted Twitter user @tabberg. On the other end of the spectrum, Twitter user @krislevtwombly tweeted in response to Kristin Olsen's plea to pass the bill, "Thx4urEfforts #cawater supply but :(about

#ab311 rush dam projects. All CA wild spaces r sacred. Don't drown them. Lost4evr."

The day after the bill's rejection, Governor Jerry Brown announced that his administration would authorize expediting environmental reviews of certain water projects. Gallagher responded to the news with a statement: "Unlike Assembly Democrats who voted down AB 311 yesterday, the Governor clearly sees the need to streamline the environmental review process for vital water supply projects. I am also encouraged by his statement that he will 'explore legislative changes that can speed up delivery of critical water supply projects.' I will be reaching out to Governor Brown and stand ready to work on such legislative changes so we can get critical projects like Sites Reservoir and Temperance Flat off the ground quickly."

Prescribed Burning Projects Discontinued

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The American River Ranger District on the Tahoe National Forest will discontinue implementation of most planned prescribed burning projects effective immediately. Persistent dry and warm weather and an early onset of spring/summer forest fuel moisture levels have increased the risk of exceeding desired prescribed fire intensity and fuel consumption targets

beyond acceptable levels. The Forest Service will resume prescribed burning if conditions become favorable and will continue to reduce dense stands of trees and brush using mechanical thinning and hand removal of vegetation. All of these methods are important tools in reducing the size and frequency of high intensity wildfires and promote forest health. For more information, call
