# Who Let the Dogs In?

Off-Leash Facility a Hit with Hounds

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - It's been a long ume coming. But in Carmichael Park recently, every dog had its day.

After 14 years of campaigning and planning, Canine Corral Association and Park District representatives dedicated new canine facilities. No sooner was the ribbon snipped than 80 excited dogs and owners paraded into the play areas. Unleashed, four-legged decorum went to the dogs. Ecstatic canines caroused in a wordless kinship known only to mutt-kind. Plastic bags at hand, owners were well behaved, too. "Good owners make for good dogs," approved Canine Corral volunteer Joan Lutz. "They clean up. They respect others people's pets. They support projects that benefit us all—like this."

Carmichael Park Administrator Tarry Smith first noted the pristine state of amenities and told patrons to treasure that memory. "It'll never look this good again," he predicted. "We'll keep up with maintenance, but after all, up to 4000 dogs per month will be using it."

In response to a petition circulated by activist Laverne Shell, Carmichael Park District provided the area's first off-leash park in 2000. Greatly used in dry months, the area became a winter mud paddy and potential health hazard. Visionaries campaigned for a landscaped corral with walking paths and dog-wash stations. Separately fenced enclosures would allow petite pooches to carouse apart from boisterous, large breeds. Proper drainage

# Like the Weather, Capitol Growth Cools Off in Q4

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Customer service, sales, manufacturing, and drivers are in high demand among Sacramento's top employers in October, November, and December. Making, storing, distributing, and selling products is driving hiring in the next Quarter. Truck drivers able to pass background, DMV, and drug tests can find work with bottling plants, regional distribution centers, materials suppliers, local delivery, and manufacturers.

Pacific Staffing has discovered

that a robust hiring market in the last Quarter has maintained its pace into the last three months of 2014 among the region's top companies. One difference noted is the change in motivation for hiring as learned from direct phone contacts with regional companies between August 21 and September 12, 2014.

While seventy percent (70%) of top employers surveyed say they will hire in Q4, growth hiring among those firms has fallen from Q3 levels. The Pacific Staffing Survey shows more Sacramento employers will seek applicants for attrition to replace openings in the existing workforce in October, November, and December than for continuing expansion.

Sacramento regional employers say forty-eight percent (48%) of Q4 hiring is motivated by the need for attrition. Hiring for replacements dropped slightly, from fifty percent (50%) in Q3, while employers motivated to hire for growing the workforce has fallen further as forty-three (43%) will

hire for growth in the last three months of 2014. While growth hiring has dropped by seven percent (7%) from last quarter it remains at a higher level than recent years for this Quarter.

Skills Demand?

Seasonal hiring was noted by eight percent (8%) of firms, and every retailer surveyed is hiring for the next three months indicating a likely increase in holiday help in stores. Drivers remain in short supply, as companies also sought sales, customer service, manufacturing,

warehouse and general office help Finding qualified applicants and retention of workers trailed only concerns about increasing benefit costs for employees for open enrollments in this Quarter.

The demand among all companies for degreed professionals in information technology, software development, mobile networking and other proprietary technical skills like construction estimators is ongoing. Another shortage noted was for construction trades Continued on Page 4

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Fullline grocery stores that have not previously participated in the California Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program will be able to apply for authorization to participate beginning today it was announced by Dr. Ron Chapman, California Department of Public Health (CDPH) director and state health officer.

"This positive step will help improve availability and access for the 1.4 million women, infants and children who participate in the California WIC program," said Dr. Chapman.

To address rising food costs in the California WIC program, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in 2012 continued a moratorium on the addition of new vendors into the program so that CDPH and

USDA could develop and implement strategies to contain costs and ensure program integrity. Today, USDA notified CDPH by letter that the moratorium can now be lifted for the additional

In June, USDA partially lifted the moratorium to include additional locations for stores that already had a master contract with the WIC program. Since that time, 167 stores have been added to the program. It is estimated that an additional 100 stores will be added statewide in this second

"USDA and CDPH continue to work together to ensure the strategies now in place are effective in containing food costs and comply with federal regulations and mandates," said Dr. Chapman.

The moratorium to add the

remaining vendors will be lifted by USDA in a third phase at a later date. California currently has approximately 4,400 authorized stores that participate in the WIC program.

California WIC provides access to healthy supplemental foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support, and referrals to healthcare and community services for the infants, children and pregnant or post-partum women it serves. WIC spends approximately \$86 million each month on food.

At the federal level, WIC is administered by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), and California's WIC Program is administered at the state level by CDPH.








Sacramento Region, CA (MPG) - El Camino Football played at American Canyon High School (ACHS) on Friday. The junior varsity team took to the field first with clear skies at kickoff. As the second quarter commenced so did the rain; lightning interrupted the game with 57 seconds left in the second quarter. The game was delayed an hour for the safety of the players and the fans.

The game continued with the Eagles cautious, and the ACHS

Wolves defense was able to hold the Eagle offense to only three plays before punting it off. The Eagle defense then took the field holding ACHS to six plays before the Wolves were able get it in the end zone. Anxious for a chance at redemption, the Eagle offense got the ball back and matched the eight points the Wolves had put on the board. The well-matched teams continued to battle back and forth. The Eagle offense seemed to be gaining ground on the ACHS defense but struggled to complete a series without a penalty or a fumble. Eagle fullback Jaquez Drake was

the evening's workhorse, carrying the ball 16 times totaling 102 yards and averaging 6.4 yards per carry. On defense, senior Tyrin Bolding had five solo tackles and one assist, followed closely by junior Ty Harkleload who claimed four solo tackles and two assists.

In the end, the Eagles were unable to seal the deal, losing to ACHS 28-21. "We beat ourselves..." stated Coach Adam Reinking after the game, who's looking to have a strong comeback against Vista Del Lago for this Friday's game.

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - October 11th is earmarked as the second annual "Beautify Carmichael Day."

Chamber of Commerce director Cathryn Snow will again head the town tidy-up. Her project encourages merchants and residents to take pride in their own territory. Based at the tennis court end of Carmichael Park, clean-up leaders will assign a multitude of projects between 9 and 11 a.m. Volunteers need only bring gloves.

"Our corridor and shopping centers are being beautified but another vital step is simply to pull weeds and pick up trash," says activist Snow. "It's good for the community; visitors form impressions from residential streets."

Carmichael housekeeping is a goal shared by Supervisor Susan Peters, whose staff has assisted project planning. The Department of Transportation will also advise on landscaping problems. With sponsorship from Lawnman landscaping, a 2013 beautification effort replanted a problematic triangle at Fair Oaks Boulevard and Manzanita Avenue. "This year, we have a budget from a yard sale we did in May," Snow reports. Three businesses have been awarded grants to upgrade street frontages. The local Home Depot has donated bark to aid these makeovers. Promoters also hope citizens will roll up sleeves on October 11. Says Snow: "Apartment dwellers can band together to pull weeds. Home owners can tidy frontages. If you live near a vacant lot, call the owners and have them clean it up."

"Most Carmichael people are proud of our community," she considers. "We want to encourage others to live and do business here. Prettier neighborhoods enhance property values and keep small





#### Congress Should Vote on ISIS

We have as close to a national consensus as possible in the war against ISIS. Polls show the public wants strong measures. Practically everyone on the political spectrum says the terror group should be destroyed, even Elizabeth Warren and Rand Paul. President Barack Obama has given a prime-time speech committing the country to a yearslong war.

And yet Congress can't bring itself to vote to authorize military action. President Obama doesn't want to ask for an authorization, and Congress doesn't want to be asked. Who says that no one can get along in Washington? When it comes to evading democratic accountability, the consensus is broad and deep.

The advantages of an authorization are

obvious. It would be an unmistakable statement of national will. It would communicate to our allies seriousness. It would put everyone on record, making it harder for finger-in-thewind members of Congress to bail out.

Even more obvious is the alliance of convenience between President Obama and Congress to avoid a vote (except on the more limited mission of arming and training Syrian rebels).

So the president rummages around his desk drawers searching for a legal basis for his war, while Congress mumbles and looks at its shoes. Such are the exertions of the nation's political branches as they embark on a long fight against an enemy of the United States.

Even if it is unauthorized, the war against ISIS is not illegal. The president has the inherent authority as commander in chief to act against a threat to the United States. and Americans have been killed by ISIS.

The problem is that under the War Powers Resolution -- a fetish of the left Congress must authorize military action 60 days after it is undertaken. So, unless the administration wants to openly defy the resolution, it would still need congressional authorization.


It prefers, then, to argue that the war has already been authorized. It is relying primarily on the 2001 authorization against those who "planned, authorized, committed, or aided" the Sept. 11 attacks, or "harbored" those who did. This has been taken as a broad mandate to hit al-Qaida or al-Qaida-allied groups. Its application to ISIS is dubious, though. ISIS didn't commit 9/11, and it is fighting al-Qaida rather than being allied with it.


As backup, the administration says the 2002 authorization for the Iraq War still applies. This, too, is tenuous. The regime that constituted that threat is long gone.

It wasn't long ago that President Obama was a scold about how important it was for Congress to authorize military interventions. It wasn't long ago that his administration considered the 2001 and 2002 authorizations dated and overly broad, and talked of their repeal. Now, he is happy to sidestep Congress by any legalistic parsing necessary.

Just because the president doesn't want to push for an authorization doesn't mean Congress has to stand by the sidelines. Yet that is where it is happy to be. The fight against ISIS will be accompanied by fiery denunciations of the group's barbarism and ringing statements of resolve. It will include everything, it seems, but a congressional vote of authorization. How pathetic.



# **Burn Barrel Starts Fire, Damages Arden Area Home**

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Burn Barrel Starts Fire, Causing Significant Damage to Arden Area Home

Shortly after 8 a.m. on Tuesday, September 30th, Metro Fire crews were dispatched to the 4100 block of Hancock Drive for report of a fence and garage fire. The fire, which started in a burn barrel alongside the home, quickly spread from the fence to the garage and attic. A neighbor noticed the fire and after alerting the resident, began using a garden hose in an attempt to slow the spread.

Upon arrival, firefighters aggressively attacked the fire while ventilating the structure, containing the fire to roughly 30% of the home. No firefighters or civilians were injured in the fire, and damage is estimated to



be \$150,000.

Metro Fire reminds residents that burn barrels are considered open-burning, and are therefore not allowed within Sacramento County.

- Thirty years ago this month, the California State Library launched California Library Literacy Services to provide tutoring to adults who need help improving their reading skills. Today, these programs enable 10,000 tutors to help 22,000 students at more than 800 libraries and other locations across the

At the same time, Sacramento Public Library became one of the first libraries in the state to offer Adult Literacy Services.

Sacramento Public Library is proud that one of our Adult Literacy students, Steve Tafoya, has become one of the faces of a statewide campaign to publicize this important work. California

Library Literacy Services has produced a video about Tafoya's story. "People who can read, they just take that for granted," Tafoya says in the video. "It just comes natural. But for me, it's different. I always wanted that."

A 13-year Army veteran who

achieved the rank of sergeant, Tafoya first walked through the doors of the Southgate Library in February 2012. He met Library supervisor Christy Aguirre, who referred him to Adult Literacy Services. After many hours of dedicated work with tutor Anna Ramirez, he now reads so well that he's in his fourth semester of classes at Sacramento City College.

Tafoya, Aguirre and Sacramento Public Library director Rivkah K. Sass also appear in a second video promoting statewide literacy services. "We're a nation of second chances," said Sass. "The library is the place to provide that second chance."

Some important statistics about literacy needs:

adults need literacy help, including more than 4 million Californians, according to the nonprofit ProLiteracy.

The most recent National Assessment of Adult Literacy found that 13 percent of adults in Sacramento County—more than 140,000 people—lack basic literacy skills. ★



# Sacramento County DA Reports



Recent cases of interest

CASE: Jorge Martinez, Alfonso Carrillo & Christopher Aguirre (09/26/14)
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Molly Steber, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Steve White sentenced Jorge Martinez to 72 years and 4 months in prison, Alfonso Carrillo to 37 years and 8 months in prison and Christopher Aguirre to 15 years in prison.

On July 11, 2014, a jury convicted Martinez of 9 counts of robbery, assault with a firearm, felony evading an officer, being armed with a firearm, and the use and discharging of a firearm. Carrillo was convicted of 7 counts of robbery, assault with a firearm, assault likely to produce great bodily injury, being armed and personal use of a firearm. Aguirre was convicted of 5 counts of robbery, assault with a firearm, assault likely to produce great bodily injury and dissuading a witness. Aguirre also pled to a separate assault charge for shanking an inmate after returning to the county jail after closing arguments.

The three admitted Sureños gang members went on a crime spree from mid December 2011 to early January 2012. They robbed several fast food restaurants, a U-Haul and several telephone stores. They shot one of the employees in the leg before leaving the store. In all, there were 13 victims and one of the victims was robbed while working at his job on two separate days.

CASE: Curtis Holford (09/26/14)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Nancy Cochrane, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Patrick Marlette sentenced Curtis Holford to 53 years to life in prison. On August 15, 2014, a jury convicted Holford of two counts of sexual assault against a child under the age of 14.

Holford was in Avenal State Prison serving a sentence for possession of child pornography. While in prison, he obtained a cell phone and began corresponding with the mother of the victim who was four years old. Holford convinced the mother to perform sexual acts with her son, which she did and then sent photographs to Holford.

The mother disclosed some information to the child's counselor, which led to an immediate investigation by the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department. While Holford was corresponding with the mother, authorities at the prison were contacted by the Sheriff's Department and a corrections sergeant found Holford in possession of the cell phone.

The mother is currently serving time after pleading no contest to conspiracy to molest her child. She was sentenced to 20 years in prison. Her name is not being released in order to protect the privacy of the child victim.

CASE: Jefferson Cortez (09/26/14)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Kimberly Macy, DUI Vertical Prosecution Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Michael Sweet sentenced Jefferson Cortez to 15 years to life in prison. On August 27, 2014, Cortez pled no contest to second-degree murder, driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs causing injury and possession of methamphetamines.


At approximately 1:30 a.m. on June 20, 2013, Cortez was seen driving on Del Paso Blvd. at a high rate of speed with no headlights on. He then drove onto I-5 going northbound. A witness then saw Cortez's car barreling down the highway at 85-90 mph going the wrong way, driving southbound on I-5 in the northbound lanes. At least four other witnesses, in four separate vehicles, reported Cortez's car coming at them with the headlights on doing nothing to alter his path, forcing them to swerve out of the way to avoid being hit.

Once Cortez neared the Arena Blvd. exit, he was travelling with his lights off and drove toward a Ford Explorer, crashing into it. Upon impact, Cortez's car became airborne and crashed into a Toyota Corolla. The driver of the Corolla died immediately. The five occupants of the Explorer suffered injuries including gashes; head, neck, shoulder and hip pain; bumps, scrapes, and several bruises.

Cortez was taken to the hospital for treatment. It was determined that he was under the influence of a stimulant and cannabis. A sample of his blood showed 0.12 mg/L of methamphetamine. When officers searched his car, they found a glass pipe and a baggie with a white substance. The substance was tested by the District Attorney's Laboratory of Forensics Services and was found to be 3.21 grams of methamphetamine.

This case was prosecuted by the Sacramento County District Attorney's DUI Vertical Prosecution Unit, funded by the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.





#### PICKS OF THE WEEK



Tom Cruise in "Edge of Tomorrow"

"Edge of Tomorrow" (PG-13) --Tom Cruise gets ripped apart by space aliens and resurrected over and over again until he gets it right. In this unfortunate futuristic setting, a powerful alien army is spreading over Earth. Cruise plays a military officer who's more of a spokesman than a rifleman -- until he mouths off and gets sent to the front line. He doesn't last long in combat, but whenever he dies, he just wakes up at the beginning of the day. Using his Groundhog Day power, Cruise does a little better each time.

The whole time, I wished I was the one with the video-game controller, and not watching somebody else play. The upside is that the movie looks like a game worth playing. The core gimmick of the movie is used to good effect, generating a rhythm of intense action.

"A Million Ways to Die in the West" (R) -- This Western parody shows that people didn't need epic gunfights and wild horse chases to die spectacularly in the Wild West, there were plenty of awful ways to die a humiliating and mundane death. Seth McFarlane, the creator of TV's "Family Guy" and the raunchy buddy-comedy "Ted," wrote, directed and stars in this rambling spoof. An A-list cast fills in the township where lowbrow jokes blow around like tumbleweed --

Charlize Theron, Amanda Seyfreid, Neil Patrick Harris and Liam Neeson.

Like much of MacFarlane's work, the humor gives you a clear idea that a smart guy is writing the dumbest and grossest jokes he can get away with. While not every joke is a winner, the movie makes up in volume. However, the rapid-fire raunchy humor can wear on some audiences.

"Obvious Child" (R) -- Donna (Jenny Slate) tells her embarrassingly personal jokes in a tight stand-up club with a little audience. She's honest and awkward and refreshingly funny. However, her jokes about her relationship finally push her boyfriend to dump her, triggering a downward swing for Donna. In a subsequent one-night stand, Donna and her partner are both too drunk to figure out a condom. Later, when Donna realizes she's pregnant, the all too sweet-as-pie guy from her one-night stand starts to court her. This is the first starring role for Slate, who had a short stint on "Saturday Night Live," and she shows an astounding talent for balancing the heavy with the light.

"The Grand Seduction" (PG-13) -- Don't expect rays of white-hot seduction to emanate from your screen as Brendan Gleeson turns up the charm in this small-town dramedy. In an itty-bitty fishing village in a far-flung piece of coastal Canada, fishing is restricted and the townspeople have set their hopes on a oil company setting up a new factory. Trouble is, the company won't build unless the town has at least one doctor in its population, and the town has none. Gleeson plays the town's acting mayor, tasked with wooing a visiting young doctor (Taylor Kitcsh) into taking up residence.



THE HISTORY CHANNEL







# Dare to Live Without Limits

Acting in Haste

by Bryan Golden

In hindsight, it's easy to tell when you acted in haste. Looking back, you can clearly see you acted too soon. For one reason or another, you have regrets. How many times have you told yourself, "Darn, I shouldn't have acted so fast?"

Learn from your past experiences. You have at least a few instances where the consequences of acting in haste are burned into your mind. Acting in haste happens occasionally for everyone. For some, it becomes a habit. With awareness, preparation, and planning, acting in haste is preventable.

Acting in haste ranges from saying something you regret to making a decision that has adverse long term consequences. Examine those times you acted in haste. What were the underlying causes? Was it anger, impatience, ignorance, impulsiveness, pressure from others, fear of criticism, or some other cause?

Regretting something you said happens when you speak before thinking, react out of anger, or jump to conclusions. Whenever you are angry or upset, allow some time to pass before addressing pertinent issues. Taking even a few minutes to calm down works wonders. It provides a chance to think and put things into perspective.

Whatever you say can not be recalled. Other people will always remember when vou say something you wish they would forget. Waiting and thinking before speaking works every time it's tried. Next time you feel compelled to blurt something out, stop, wait, and think before speaking.

Being angry or upset clouds your judgment. Decisions made in this state are error prone. When you are in this frame of mind, you feel an overwhelming desire to act immediately. Resist the urge. With consistent practice, you can condition yourself to refrain from making decisions when you feel this way.

Your mind erroneously perceives these emotions as requiring emergency action. Perhaps this is rooted in our evolutionary fight or flight mechanism which kept us safe in the face of immediate danger. It takes determination to override you innate drive for immediate action.

Acting in haste also occurs when you feel rushed to make a decision. This emanates from a perceived deadline, either internally or externally imposed. Although there are situations where time is of the essence, they are usually the exception.

There is a tendency is to wait until just before a deadline to act. Procrastination puts you up against a deadline where there was originally plenty of time. Make decisions while there is still time to fully asses your best course of action.

Acting without thinking is acting in haste. Take time to analyze various options. If you need additional information, make sure you turn to a knowledgeable and reliable source. You want more than

just an opinion, you want feedback from someone who has pertinent expertise.

Many well meaning people are filled with misinformation. What worked for someone else may not be appropriate for you. Each person has their own unique circumstances. Take time to evaluate all information as it relates to your situation.

Any action you take should make sense for you. Acting because of peer pressure is not necessarily in your best interest. Acting to avoid criticism isn't a good idea either. It's your life and you are the only one who has to live with the consequences of

Listen to your intuition. If a particular course of action doesn't feel right you must understand why. If hesitation is based on fear, is the fear warranted? Perhaps taking a particular course of action will produce a result you don't really want. Any action you take should be compatible with your morals and goals.

Acting in haste creates more problems than it solves. Before taking action, be aware, think, analyze, and assess your various alternatives.






