Alumni Celebrate 100 Years of Arden Middle School

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - A school that began with 20 kids under an oak tree on Watt Avenue is among San Juan School District's most venerable facilities. More than 200 Arden Middle School supporters recently marked its 100-year milestone.

The school's birthday event was celebrated with a concert by 30 Arden Middle School alumni musicians. Former students were boosted by three generations of band instructors, under the baton of recently retired teacher (and former Arden pupil) Rick Baker. His predecessor Wayne Reimers (80) joined current band director (and former student) Whitney Disney in the woodwind section. Selections represented many decades: from the 1930s hit In the Mood to a medley of Abba songs and themes from Pirates of the Caribbean.

Among the oldest attendees was nonagenarian teacher Don Homer, who taught physical education from 1954 to 1988. Tene Pritchard headed girls P.E. classes from '59 to '93; Wayne Reimers instructed in music from '61 t0 '88; Rocky Rothschiller was a popular sports coach and zoology teacher from '66 to '93. Sam Nakahara conducted woodshop from '66 to '91. A 1949 student, Joseph Myhren, was one of three generations of his family to attend the school. Other 1940s alumni included Carolyn McGregor, Doug McGregor and Gordon McGregor; Karen Breashears, Ken Allen, Gavlord Moulds, Ken Raymond, Chris Peterson and Jacque Wright.

Politician Doug Ose, a volunteer parking lot director after his Congressional terms, was another face from the past.

The earliest Arden classes were for farmers' children. During lessons, their horses grazed beside a school so isolated that the principal's house, known as "the teacherage," was the only home in Arden Park. Accommodating the post-war baby boom, so many new schools were built that by 1970,

the San Juan Unified School District was among the largest in California.

Current student Arden Middle School enrolment is 950. Its \$5.5 million centennial project will add a gymnasium/multi-purpose facility to campus. Another reunion event will dedicate this building by spring of

The once rural school has gained statewide distinction in science, music, and sports. "But our most important role was to prepare responsible citizens to raise families and support our community," said 36-year school secretary Bonnie Reynolds. "It was great to have current and alumni musicians play together. Many former students took pics of our old year books for brothers and sisters who could not attend. I loved seeing them share stories of their school days."

Home Burglaries on the Rise

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Attention Residents!

Sheriff's Detectives are looking for help in identifying male juveniles who they believe are responsible for a rash of home burglaries in the Northeast part of Sacramento County since late June until as recently as last weekend.

I received reports that these burglars may have begun their spree in the Wilhaggin-Del Dayo area striking primarily on Friday nights or during the weekend. According to the Sheriff's Department, between the hours of 8 p.m. and 3 a.m. residents are being awakened in response to their front doors being broken or other similar method of forced entry. After obtaining recent private surveillance video from a homeowner, Sheriff Detectives believe the same suspects are responsible for victimizing numerous residents. In the video, two suspects (who appear to be teenagers) can be seen driving up to the home in a dark colored SUV, then attempt to break into the residence by kicking the front door repeatedly.

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Be Money Smart USA's new venture, a program that helps veterans start their own businesses, got a recent funding boost with a county fair themed gala. The event was hosted by the Armor Mini Storage facility on Auburn Boulevard.

Fair Oaks EcoHousing Receives Planning Approval for New Neighborhood

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Fair Oaks EcoHousing received unanimous approval from the Fair Oaks Community Planning Council (CPAC) on September 3, 2014, by a vote of six to zero. Following Design Review by Sacramento County in September, the project will be reviewed by the Sacramento County Planning Commission. Move-in dates are projected for summer 2016.

Local residents submitted their planning application to Sacramento County on July 21st to request approval of their design for a new environmentally friendly neighborhood on New York Avenue in Fair Oaks. A group of nine families have been working with architect and international cohousing expert, Charles Durrett, on the design of their community.

The 30 new homes will range in size from two-bedroom flats to four-bedroom townhomes, along with extensive community facilities and garden areas. The new community is unique in that it is being initiated by a group of local families that seek to live in a more socially and environmentally sustainable neighborhood than what traditional developers have been building in the Sacramento Suburbs.

Fair Oaks EcoHousing was inspired by other cohousing neighborhoods that have built around the country over the last two decades, including Southside Park in downtown Sacramento, Nevada City Cohousing, and Wolf Creek Lodge, a recently completed community designed for active adults in Grass Valley.

The Club House typically includes a dining room, kitchen, workshop space, children's playroom, guest rooms, and lounge. It is the heart of the neighborhood for a variety of other activities. Cars are parked on the periphery of the site, making the neighborhood more pedestrian-friendly and kid-safe. What are cohousing neighborhoods?

Cohousing neighborhoods are composed of privately-owned homes clustered around shared open space and extensive common facilities. The Club House typically includes a dining room, kitchen, workshop space, children's playroom, guest rooms, and lounge. It is the heart of the neighborhood for a variety of other activities. Cars are parked on the periphery of the site,

making the neighborhood more pedestrian-friendly and kid-safe. Future residents are involved in the design and development so that it reflects their needs and priorities, creating a truly custom neighborhood.

Environmental sustainability is a core value in these neighborhoods with smaller homes, green building attributes, and renewable energy systems made possible by combined efforts and shared resources. On-site activities and companionship enable

residents to socialize close to home and reduce their need to drive as much for day-to-day activities. The Fair Oaks property offers close proximity to the American River Parkway and its miles of bike paths, as well as Fair Oaks Village, Banister Park, the Sacramento Waldorf School, and the Rudolph Steiner College. Cohousing provides social, environmental, and economic benefits for a more sustainable lifestyle.

Local Residents initiate their own Neighborhood

Fair Oaks resident Marty Maskall has been looking to create such a community since she first saw Southside Park in downtown Sacramento. Marty says, "I have lived in this area for 23 years and I want to stay here, but I'm tired of the isolation and maintenance of my single-family home. I love the multigenerational nature of these communities." Carmichael resident Ivan Greene has been looking for a friendly neighborhood with substantial gardening space. Ivan says, "As a single person, I want to connect with my neighbors. I'm excited about the large garden and orchard area." Sacramento residents Linda and Frank Tanforan are looking to downsize and move into a safe and convenient neighborhood. Linda says, "I want to spend my retirement years in a friendly community with people of all ages."





Obama's Foreign Policy **Collapse**

President Barack Obama's stated goal in the fight against the Islamic State, aka ISIS, is to reduce it to a "manageable problem."

What this means, he hasn't spelled out in great specificity. Presumably fewer beheadings. A slower pace of Western recruiting. Fewer genocidal threats against embattled minorities. A downgrading of the caliphate to a mini-state, or merely a large swath of territory in Syria and Iraq.

The evil of ISIS has stirred nearly everyone around President Obama to ringing statements of resolve. Vice President Joe Biden says, "We will follow them to the gates of hell." The president himself? He says it will be "degraded to the point where it is no longer the kind of Syria necessarily vindicate a rigorously

factor that we've seen it being over the last several months."

Put to the rhythms of Winston Churchill's famous call to arms in Parliament in June 1940, the Obama posture is, "We shall degrade you, we shall lessen you as a factor, we shall make you manageable, we shall hope that the attention of this great continental nation ... turns to something else soon."

What we have been witnessing the past few weeks is the intellectual collapse of Obama's foreign policy, accompanied by its rapid political unraveling. When Al Franken is ripping you for lacking a strategy against ISIS in Syria, you have a problem.

The hoary hawkish cliches about the stakes in Iraq -- repeated over and over again by Sens. John McCain and Lindsey Graham through the years -- have proved correct. In 2007, McCain argued that if we failed in Iraq, "these people will try to follow us home and the region will erupt to a point where we may have to come back or we will be combating what is now, to a large degree, al-Qaida."

And so it is that seven years later, we are bombing Iraq as we battle an offshoot of al-Qaida amid fears that the terrorists will attack us here at home.

It is not that the latest events in Iraq and

McCainite foreign policy. You can believe ISIS must be defeated and still think that the Iraq War was a mistake and McCain and his allies are too recklessly interventionist. But events have vindicated the surge that devastated the forerunner of ISIS and demonstrated the folly of Obama's total pullout from Iraq.

The political worm has turned so completely that even Sen. Rand Paul of Kentucky, the strictest of noninterventionists, now supports war in Iraq and Syria.

The most prominent figure who is out of step with this new zeitgeist is President Obama. He explained recently that things aren't as bad as they seem because social media is amplifying events. He has gone from blaming Bush to blaming Instagram. It's another evasion by a president who wants to avoid speaking too forthrightly about the threat of ISIS, lest he commit himself to the forceful action necessary to defeat it.

When the only tool you have is a hammer, President Obama has said of President Bush's alleged approach to the world, every problem looks like a nail. By the same token, when the only tool you have is retreat, every problem looks "manageable."

Sacramento Region Continues Impressive Water Use Reductions in August 14 Agencies Cut Water Use by 20 Percent or More

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Customers at 14 Sacramentoarea agencies (listed below) reduced water use by 20 percent or more in August compared to the same period last year, according to an analysis by the Regional Water Authority (RWA), which represents water providers in Sacramento, Placer, El Dorado, and Yolo counties. The findings come from a review of August water use data submitted to RWA and the State Water Resources Control Board.

"Residents have been spectacular in their water use reductions," said RWA Water Efficiency Program Manager Amy Talbot. "August is typically one of the hottest months of the year, which makes the temptation to ramp up sprinklers hard to resist. But the data shows that residents have made a serious commitment to preserving our limited resources during the severe dry conditions."

Overall, the region averaged a 21 percent reduction in August, and is averaging a 19 percent reduction from January through August 2014, compared to the same timeframe last year, RWA's analysis found.

"As we move into fall and winter, it will be important for residents to continue conserving water," Talbot said. "Even normal or above-average the effects of three dry years. We're in this for the long haul."

One action that residents can take immediately is to reduce sprinkler times by at least two minutes per zone. "Fall is prime time for overwatering landscapes," Talbot said. "Shorter days and cooler temperatures reduce the water demands of lawn, trees, shrubs and plants, so it's time to dial back sprinklers," Talbot said.

New Drought

Resources Available

The Regional Water Authority has launched a revamped Web site at BeWaterSmart.info to provide additional drought information and tips for reducing water use.

The site includes a new sprinkler scheduling tool that allows visitors to enter information about their landscape (such as plant materials, soil type and sun exposure) and receive a custom watering schedule based upon the weather and local watering restrictions.

Other features include brief videos about low-tech solutions for determining when and how much to water your landscape, as well as how to fortify and maintain your landscape while reducing water use. Both the sprinkler scheduling tool and

CASE: Delina Williams (09/19/14)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Sheri Greco, Homicide Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Raoul Thorbourne sentenced Delina Williams to 26 years to life in prison. On July 11, 2014, a jury convicted Williams for the first-degree murder of 27-year-old Jessica Brock. The jury also found true that Williams personally used a knife.

On October 24, 2011, Williams stabbed Ms. Brock to death in her apartment. Williams took Ms. Brock's vehicle and attempted to use her credit card to buy gas. When Ms. Brock's body was discovered in her apartment more than a week later, she had in excess of 50 stab wounds to her head, neck, chest and back.

CASE: Elpidio Tellez (09/18/14)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Eric Kindall, Homicide Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that Elpidio Tellez was convicted by jury of seconddegree murder and a gun use allegation. Tellez was also convicted of being a felon in possession of a gun with a prior and buying or receiving stolen property.

On November 7, 2012, Tellez shot and killed Jessie Nunez outside of the Monte Carlo nightclub on 15th and S Street. After witnesses described a suspicious car driving away from the scene, a Sacramento police officer found the car abandoned a few blocks from the nightclub. The Sacramento Police Department began an immediate search by helicopter and K9 officer. Tellez was arrested outside of the search perimeter on an outstanding warrant and was later connected

Tellez faces a potential maximum sentence of 40 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for November 21, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. in Department 17 before the Honorable Ernest Sawtelle.

CASE: Jeffry Cook (09/18/14)

Today, in Sacramento Superior Court case 13HC00724, District Attorney Jan Scully filed a motion to vacate the granting of a Habeas Corpus petition on convicted cop killer Jeffry Cook who murdered Officer Ronald Chelius in 1979.

On November 8, 2013, Governor Jerry Brown overturned the decision of a parole board granting a parole date to Mr. Cook. In response, Jeffry Cook filed a Writ of Habeas Corpus in Sacramento Superior Court, which was granted on July 3, 2014. District Attorney Scully and the victim's son were not notified that Mr. Cook had filed the writ or that the Court had taken it under consideration. Today's motion was filed on the grounds the Court failed to notify the District Attorney of the writ as is required by Penal Code section 1475, and the District Attorney was not given any opportunity to notify the victim's son pursuant to Marsy's Law of the hearing on the Habeas Corpus petition.

Mr. Cook was released on parole on September 16, 2014, pursuant to the granting of the Habeas

The District Attorney's motion to vacate is scheduled to be heard on October 24, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. in Department 40 of the Sacramento Superior Court.

PICKS OF THE WEEK



Scarlett Johanssen in "Chef"

"Transformers: Age of Extinction"
(PG-13) -- Michael Bay returns to the bang-bang-kaboom style of filmmaking with this fourth installment of the toy-inspired blockbuster series. Mark Wahlberg (Shia Labeouf is nowhere to be seen) plays a hardworking inventor in rural Texas. He finds a truck that is more than meets the eye. He also has a very pretty teenage daughter who is fond of jean shorts (Nicola Peltz). Did I mention that Optimus Prime charges into battle mounted on a robot T-Rex and wielding a giant sword?

Since it's the fourth movie in a series about explosions, you'd think there would be little left to say. Bay didn't think so: This one clocks in at almost three hours of run time. Most folks don't have the fortitude and focus to hang with the Autobots for that long.

"Chef" (R) -- Carl Casper (Jon Favreau) wants to bring real flavor into the menu at the upper-crust Los Angeles restaurant where he's a chef. His stubborn and suffocating boss (Dustin Hoffman) won't let the creative juices flow. After a conflict that boils over onto Twitter, Carl calls it quits with the restaurant. Upset, unemployed and reviled in LA, he takes his friend (John Leguizamo) back to Miami with him to start all over at the street-level: selling fresh fare from a junky old food truck.

The movie pours on the heart and humor, garnishes it with a good soundtrack, and serves it up with an appealing cast: Sofia Vergara, Scarlett Johanssen, plus appearances by Oliver Platt and Robert Downey Jr. Some have complained that the final product is too sweet, but it's a refreshing and invigorating meal nonetheless, especially for those of us who just really like food.

"Are You Here" (R) -- A smarmy, easygoing local weatherman, Steve (Owen Wilson), is a bit of a jerk but a very loyal friend. His best bud, Ben (Zach Galifinakis), has real psychological issues, and Steve's always there for him. When Ben's father dies, he leaves the bulk of his estate to Ben, much to the chagrin of his uptight sister (Amy Poehler). Ben has to prove to the courts that he has the mental togetherness to keep his inheritance, and everybody else has to face who they really are. This is the second movie from Matthew Weiner, the creator of TV's acclaimed "Mad Men." Unfortunately, this film lacks the sensibilities and allure that make Weiner's TV endeavor so sharp.

"Third Person" (R) -- Liam Neeson stars as a wounded and somber author trying to deal with his problems through layers of fiction. He's just one of a crowd of big names playing sad characters with vaguely intersecting lives. Olivia Wilde plays his wild young love interest, Kim Basinger plays his cynical ex-wife, and then there's Mila Kunis and James Franco in separate storylines in different cities. Some thematic threads (sort of) connect the characters, but it's not enough to make you think or feel anything special about what's going on. You get the feeling that with all the melodrama scattered through the script, the movie was too depressed to get its act together.





First Set of Vehicle Regulation Permits Required for Autonomous Vehicle Testing

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Today's regulations only address California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) announced that the regulations governing how manufacturers can test autonomous vehicles on California roads went into effect today, September 16, 2014.

The regulations set rules for autonomous vehicle testing, insurance, registration, and reporting by manufacturers.

manufacturer testing requirements; they do not address rules for operation of autonomous vehicles by the public. Rules governing public operation of autonomous vehicles are currently being developed by DMV.

"Autonomous vehicles are the future of transportation. The potential safety and mobility benefits are enormous," said Jean Shiomoto, DMV Director, "Testing on public roads is one step to developing this technology, and the DMV is excited in facilitating the advancement of autonomous vehicles in California."

DMV developed the autonomous vehicle testing regulations as mandated by Senate Bill 1298 (Vehicle Code Section 38750). Under the new

regulations, vehicle manufacturers must obtain a testing permit from the DMV and comply with permit requirements when testing autonomous vehicles on California roads. DMV requirements for manufacturer testing include: Manufacturer must register the test vehicle with DMV; Manufacturer must have completed previous autonomous vehicle testing under controlled

conditions; Manufacturer uses qualified test drivers who complete a training program and obey all provisions of the Vehicle Code; Manufacturer test drivers sit in the driver seat and are capable of immediately taking control of the vehicle; Manufacturer reports to DMV any accident involving a test vehicle or any situation where the autonomous technology disengages during

operation; Manufacturer maintains \$5 million insurance or surety bond.

Eskaton Educates Senior Community on How to "Stand Tall, Don't Fall"

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - Sitting in Carmichael Park on any given day you may see a child fall. Mom will rush over, brush the child off, kiss the boo boo and send him back out to the jungle gym. On the sidewalk you might see his grandmother moving slowly with the help of a walker, trying her hardest not to trip and fall. If she does fall, there is no easy way to bounce back like the

According to statistics, within the last year an older adult you know has fallen. In fact, for every three people over 65 years old, one of them has taken a tumble – whether they told you about it or not. In Carmichael, nearly 11,000 people are over the age of 65 and 3,363 of them live alone. That means roughly 3,600 people will take a spill this year, and about 1,200 might not have anyone there to pick them up. Falls are the leading cause of death for people over 65.

Personal Emergency Response Systems (PERS), also known as medical alert devices, if worn properly, can help minimize the consequences of a fall. Ouicker access to help increases the likelihood of continued independence. But the best way to maintain independence is to know what services are available and how and when to take advantage of them.

"Stand tall, don't fall," was Eskaton's motto this year

Environmental factors, such as improving lighting and removing clutter, can also reduce the risk of a fall. Keeping the mind sharp and eliminating the worry of falling may also help prevent falls. main contributor to falls because it can limit a senior's activity, which has a negative impact on the person's physical condition.

October 5th Nature Fest Woos Wildlife

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) -

Archimedes the owl, Spirit the bald eagle, an elk named Tule, and a lynx with the moniker of Mukluk, will journey to Carmichael's Effie Yeaw Nature Center on Sunday, October 5th.

Their sagas, along with those of bats, snakes, Radar the raccoon, and various raptors, will enlighten visitors during the Nature Center's annual Nature Fest event. The celebrity presenter will be Gabe Kerschner, a regular guest of NBC's Tonight Show. Kerschner runs Wild Things Inc., an animal sanctuary in Placer County. He and 60 species of rescued animals offer school programs geared to educate and entertain.

Nature Fest supporters will view a regional cast of Kerschner's menagerie: an elk, a rattlesnake, a raccoon, and a lynx. The bald eagle is Alaskan, and with a 6.5 wingspan, it is larger than those normally found in California.

The 2014 Nature Fest will be a homecoming for another wild ambassador; Kerschner's great horned owl was rescued six years ago at American River College. "He broke a wing falling from a nest in the oaks on campus," says the naturalist. "We figured he must be an extra wise owl; he went to college. So we called him Archimedes." Kerschner's talks promote serious issues, but punch lines fly thick and fast. "A laugh keeps interest going," he says. "You want people to experience a full range of emotions; it makes learning memorable."

Out of town critters are not the only educators billed for the 2014 Nature Fest. Effic Yeaw resident birds will interact with visitors. As a bracing Game of Thrones touch, West Coast Falconry handlers will send raptors flying over the heads of seated crowds.

The Ancil Hoffman Park facility is also a resource for Native American studies. Nature Fest demonstrations will include fine basketry and abalone pendant-making. Children's crafts and walks through the 80-acre wildlife preserve are supervised activities during the Nature Fest event. Food will be available for purchase.

The fundraiser runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Admission is \$5 for visitors aged 13 and up, and free for children. For more information, visit www.sacnaturefest. com or call (916) 489-4918.

TEDMED 2014: 'The time for thinkers has come'

Well over a century before anyone had ever heard of TEDMED, an annual confab of movers and shakers deeply interested in making the world a better, healthier place to live, religious reformer and health care maverick Mary Baker Eddy proclaimed, "The time for thinkers has come." Thankfully that time is still here and continues to generate ever more exciting advancements in human understanding, particularly within the field of health.

Certainly there was a lot of thinking going on at this year's conference, held last week in both San Francisco and Washington, D.C. The program included sessions ranging from "Turn it Upside Down," where speakers addressed insights that flip-flop beliefs and question standard operating procedures in health and medicine, to "Don't You Dare Talk About This," which tackled issues that people are reluctant to discuss publicly or even acknowledge as problems.

But something else that came up often, if indirectly, is what Eddy once referred to as "the cold conventionality of materialism," a now outdated, even burdensome mode of thinking that she saw as "crumbling away."

It's interesting that she would have made this observation when



she did, a time when, according to renowned mind-body physician Dr. Larry Dossey, the prevailing view was that health and illness were entirely physical in nature. In fact, says Dossey, it wasn't until after World War II that "Physicians began to realize, based on scientific evidence, that disease has a 'psychosomatic' aspect: that emotions and feelings can influence the body's functions."

Eddy's own research took this idea even further, convincing her that it wasn't so much the human consciousness or brain but a singular divine Mind that ultimately governs every aspect of our health – mental, emotional, physical and otherwise.

Sounds like she would have fit right in with all those free-thinking, free-wheeling TEDMED folks, whether or not they agree with her conclusions.

The most exciting thing about this conference was that it included so many people (upward of 100,000 in 100 countries, if you count those watching via live streaming) who are willing to think out-of-the-box about a subject that impacts every one of us - not just doctors and scientists but techno-geeks, artists, musicians and business leaders as well, all of whom recognize that the ideas that have the greatest impact on health and medicine aren't confined to any one field of endeavor or period of history.

Which brings us back to the contributions of Mary Baker Eddy, an experimenter in homeopathy and a church pastor who was bold enough and far-seeing enough to dig deeper into what she was learning and put to the test the idea that a better understanding of the all-encompassing divine Principle she called God is sufficient to restore and maintain our health.

Even if this is something not many are willing to admit, it is at least worth thinking about. ★




