SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

The California Capital Airshow (CCA), presented by Sacramento County, recently announced the addition of Chip Yates, founder and CEO of Flight of the cation to push the current limits Century, Inc. (www.flightofthecentury.com), and his ongoing mission to 'make science cool' as he attempts to break his current world speed record of 202 miles per hour in an electric airplane in front of the crowd at Mather Airport on Saturday, October 5, 2013.

"I want to be an example to teens, to inspire them. I'm someone that is using my STEM education to go out and change the world while doing something really cool; they can too," said Chip Yates. "The realm of science, technology, engineering and math are gateways for kids to not only learn but to truly explore all of the opportunities available to them. If you can dream it, you can build it and I'm living proof of that."

At only 13 years old, Yates was destined to utilize his eduof technology. He saved \$50.00 and convinced his parents to invest an additional \$50.00 in order to buy and rebuild his first motorcycle. Since then, Yates has become a highly dynamic and proven leader who is recognized worldwide as an electric vehicle pioneer and green technology innovator.

Yates quickly set his sights on aviation and adapted his water-cooled 258 horsepower electric motor and controller system to an aircraft designed by Burt Rutan (famed aerospace engineer, best known for the design of SpaceShipOne, the Virgin Atlantic GlobalFlyer, and Voyager); but Yates had one earned his pilot's license in two months and had only 58 hours when he flew on July 18, 2012 where he established a world speed record for electric pow-

ered aircraft of 202 mph. "We're thrilled and honored to have Chip Yates at this year's Airshow," said Darcy Brewer, executive director of the California Capital Airshow. "Chip truly embodies what it means to follow your dreams. Kids of all ages will not only get to see Chip fly and attempt to break a world record, but they'll also get the chance to meet him, talk to him and ask him questions. He'll be at the show both days and will be part of a featured exhibit. It's going to be an

Sacramento County Budget in the Black

Special Sacramento **County Report**

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -

Following years of reductions, Sacramento County's fiscal outlook is looking up for the second year in a row. After reconciling accounts and making adjustments to June's \$3.6 billion dollar proposed budget, the County is in the black. Savings from controlling expenditures have contributed to a surplus of \$32.5 million that is available to augment critical services and pay past debt.

"I'm happy to report that we have discretionary funds to invest in our community and to address the Board's service priorities," said County Executive Bradley J. Hudson. "Because the departments held the line on expenses we're beginning to recover from the impact of the "Great Recession."

Of the \$3.6 billion, less than a half billion is actually discretionary, and we can decide how to spend it, Hudson added. "I am recommending the resources be allocated across a variety of programs to optimize the use of the funds, while paying back loans and building up our contingency funds. Many of these programs were cut to the bone during the recession and had to be restored."

Of the \$32.5 million that is available, some of the recommended changes include:

- Contingency Funds: \$2.2 M
- Loan Repayment: \$11.7M • Sheriff: \$4.9 M
- Investment in services, including parks, code enforcement, supervision of drug offenders, District Attorney, Public Health to address communicable diseases and Animal Care: \$4.5 M

• Health and Human Services to backfill state budget cuts: \$6.5 M

"We're not out of the woods yet," Hudson added. "The next few years will continue to be rocky as the economy continues its slow recovery." Ongoing fiscal challenges include increased pension costs, negotiated salary and benefit obligations, repaying \$59 million in past internal borrowing, and replacing funding taken by the State for the Affordable Care Act, said Hudson. "We also need to backfill about \$21 million in one-time resources used to balance previous budgets."

"It's important to take the long view, and we're going to need four to five percent annual growth in discretionary revenue over the next five years to stay fiscally healthy; last year's growth was less than one percent," Hudson added. "We'll continue to focus on streamlining services, increasing efficiency through the use of technology and holding down costs."

The budget hearing will be on Tuesday, September 10, beginning at 2 p.m., and will feature presentations form the County Executive, Sherriff and other departments. The hearings are held in the Board of Supervisor Chambers at 700 H Street and are open to the public. They may also be watched live on Metro Cable Channel 14.

The Board of Supervisors approved the budget on September 10, 2013.

Assembly Select Committee Pursues Revitalizing Established Communities

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Wednesday, August 28, Assemblyman Ken Cooley chaired the first hearing of the Assembly Select Committee on Community and Neighborhood Development. The ten member, bi-partisan committee heard from policy and administrative experts who spoke about the impacts of suburban sprawl on our metropolitan areas, and funding needs to help revitalize our aging communities.

"As metropolitan areas grow, it's important that we do not forget about the needs of our older communities, and help keep them desirable places to live that can attract jobs and private sector investment," said Cooley. "We moved to our neighborhood because we liked what was there. Now, some of our older areas are faced with quality of life challenges that stand as barriers to community revitalization."

During the hearing, Bill Fulton, Planning Director for the City of San Diego and past Mayor of Ventura, noted that infrastructure and amenities in communities that most people would consider newer are nearing 20 years old.

"State infrastructure bonds and redevelopment funds have helped aging communities improve themselves, but are becoming more difficult to get," Fulton said. "Community facilities, like parks and libraries, need to meet certain expectations

in order to make older communities desirable. Without funding to maintain and revitalize them, they often fall below that level of what the community wants."

Juan Matute, Director of the UCLA Local Climate Change Initiative, highlighted the challenges older cities and first tier suburbs face with a greater need for community development funding and fewer tools to stay competitive with new neighborhood developments.

Matute presented a recent paper highlighting that financial tools in the local government toolkit have evolved across the last 40 years and concluding the tools currently in the toolkit have not kept up with today's desire for more compact, less auto-dependent communities.

The loss of redevelopment agencies in California in 2012 removed a vital tool from local governments' toolkit. Although some tools still remain-including general obligation bonds,

infrastructure financing districts and assessment districts—local governments in California lack a dependable financing mechanism that can be consistently used for infill, infrastructure, and redevelopment.

"People want to see their neighborhoods improved, and aging communities are depending on us to figure out a solution to shape the next half-century of revitalization for established communities," said Cooley. "I think we realize that not every tool is good for every community. We have to set politics aside and give California's cities and counties the financing tools they need to attract private investors and spur the redevelopment that's good for them."

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Every year in Sacramento County hundreds of students are expelled from school because of involvement in on-campus violence. In order for these students to be readmitted to their schools, especially in cases reaching the court system, they must successfully complete a sanctioned violence prevention program. Project SAVE (Safe Alternatives and Violence

Education) is one such program.

The mission of Project SAVE, operated by the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE), is to reduce youth violence and weapons possession through strong partnerships with local agencies. The mission emphasizes that weapons possession and violent behavior are unacceptable, especially on school grounds. Since 1998, Project SAVE has served more than 2,500 young people in Sacramento County. Nine out of ten participants remain violence-free after participating in the program.

The 11th Annual Project SAVE Golf Tournament is scheduled

for Monday, September 23, 2013 at the Valley Hi Country Club, in Elk Grove. Check-in will begin at 8:00 a.m. and the "shotgun" start will begin at 9:00 a.m. This annual fundraiser is the main source of funding for this model community project that has been proven to prevent and reduce youth violence and bullying behaviors.

Area Restaurants Sign On To California Food **Literacy Center's EatSMART Campaign**

September campaign to raise funds during Food Literacy Month

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Nearly five-dozen Sacramentoarea restaurants have come together to help fight childhood obesity this September through California Food Literacy Center's EatSMART fundraising campaign. The campaign, which takes place during Food Literacy Month, adds a voluntary dollar to every restaurant ticket to help children across the region learn food literacy - understanding the impact of food on our health, community and the

environment. "This type of campaign has been wildly successful in cities like London and San Francisco, and we are excited to gather Sacramentans together to ensure our children eat smart," said Peg Tomlinson-Poswall, chair, California Food Literacy Center. "I can't think of another time when this many Sacramento-area restaurants have banded together for a single cause."

Participating restaurants are not being asked to donate food or money. They will place a card on each table alerting patrons that a voluntary dollar can be added to their bill. Whether the ticket is for a table of 10 or two people, one dollar will be added to fight childhood obesity. 100 percent of the donation will be given to California Food Literacy Center. "Our customers' health is important to us, but we know that 25 percent of people in general don't eat the recommended amount of fruits and vegetables," said Kurt Spataro, executive chef at Paragary Restaurant Group, the first to sign on to the campaign. "California Food Literacy Center has a singular vision to

excited to be part of it." Some restaurants are taking the campaign a step further. Instead of asking patrons to donate, the Firehouse Restaurant and Ten22 will be donating \$1 for every table in September. Ella is donating \$1 per entrée purchased in September. The owner of Brooksfield Restaurant is donating 50 cents for every table through September and also joined California Food Literacy Center's Kids' Simply Recipes Contest committee, another Food Literacy Month activity.

Proceeds will benefit California Food Literacy Center, which teaches local K-5 children basic cooking skills, nutrition, fruit and vegetable appreciation, food budgets and more while introducing children to healthy, sustainable snacks that taste good. The nonprofit also trains community members as Food Literacy Advocates in its 10-week Food Literacy Academy to teach more children in the community.

"We've been running our nonprofit on a shoestring budget, reaching 2,400 kids this year on only \$40,000," said Amber Stott, founding executive director of California Food Literacy Center. "We need to triple that amount by the end of the year to continue our existing programs, expand to more schools and hire a full-time teacher and volunteer coordinator. We're grateful to all the Sacramentoarea restaurants and community members who understand that the time to do something about childhood obesity is now. Our

Last year, Assemblymember Roger Dickinson authored ACR-161, a resolution sponsored by the California Food Literacy Center, to declare September Food Literacy Month in California and to raise awareness about food literacy on the state level. This year's Food Literacy Month will include the EatSMART restaurant campaign, Kids' Simply Recipes Contest, Food Literacy Fairs in Woodland and Sacramento, Veggie of the Year contest, an online fundraiser for California Food Literacy Center and several events in partnership with Sacramento's Farm-to-Fork Week. California Food Literacy Center was established in July 2011 to educate and inspire lowincome children to eat healthy food. Students learn fruit and vegetable appreciation, how to read nutrition labels, basic cooking skills and environmental impacts of their food choices. The nonprofit also runs the Food Literacy Academy, which trains community members as food literacy teachers. To date, the nonprofit has 60 active volunteers and serves 2,400 kids annually. After just three months of food literacy education, 70 percent of students request the foods they have tasted in class, including broccoli, celery and oranges. Ninety-two percent of K-1st grade students say healthy food tastes good, and 88 percent of children understand how to read a nutrition label. Local Food Safety Stars

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -

There's more to running a restaurant or food facility than cooking delicious meals. "Safetyfirst" must be a daily practice for all food-related businesses. On September 10, in recognition of National Food Safety Education Month, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors honored several area businesses for their outstanding food safety records.

One of the winners, Wenelli's Pizza, serves old-fashioned pizza in the Arden-Arcade area. Co-owners Shelly Tyler and Wendy Williams, best friends for 30 years, founded the restaurant more than 20 years ago.

"We do all of our safety training in-house," said Shelly Tyler, "so we're very proud to receive this award for our restaurant and our employees."

Each September, the County's Environmental Management Department (EMD) issues Awards of Excellence certificates to food facilities that had no major violations noted during its last three consecutive health inspections.

EMD selected a food establishment from each supervisorial district to receive their certificate at Tuesday's Board of Supervisors meeting (view winners):

CDPH Warns Consumers Not to Eat Santos Rewadi Sugar Candy Imported From India

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Dr. Ron Chapman, director of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and state health officer, today warned consumers not to eat Santos Rewadi Sugar candy, batch number 12/030, imported from India after tests conducted by CDPH found the product contained levels of lead that exceeded the state's standards. Consumers in possession of the candy should discard it immediately.

Recent analysis of this candy by CDPH determined that Santos Rewadi Sugar candy, batch number 12/030, contained as much as 0.22 parts per million (ppm)

of lead. California considers candies with lead levels in excess of 0.10 ppm to be contaminated.

Santos Rewadi Sugar candy, imported and distributed by Santos Inc., San Leandro, California, has initiated a voluntary recall. CDPH is currently working with the distributor to ensure that the contaminated candies are removed from the marketplace. Santos Rewadi Sugar candy product is sold in a seven-ounce (200g) package that is clear with a green and yellow border on each side with a red and white top banner that displays the brand name "Santos" written in yellow, and includes a

picture of an elephant. The bottom of the package displays the name, weight and "product of India" in a yellow rectangle and red banner.

Pregnant women and parents of children who may have eaten this candy should consult their physician or health care provider to determine if medical testing is needed. Consumers who find this candy for sale should call the CDPH Complaint Hotline at 1-800-495-3232. For more information about lead poisoning, contact your county childhood lead poisoning prevention program or public health department.

Sacramento County DA Reports

Recent cases of interest

CASE: Leslie McCulley (09/12/13)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Tate Davis, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that Leslie McCulley was convicted by jury of four felonies, including aiding and abetting premeditated and deliberate attempted murder, aiding and abetting reckless evasion of peace officers, felon in possession of a gun, and possession of a stolen car. The jury also found true gun

On May 18, 2012, McCulley and Lucus Webb were spotted by Sacramento police officers driving a stolen car in the Land Park area. Webb was armed with a stolen .357 caliber revolver. When officers attempted a vehicle stop, Webb began driving at a high rate of speed and a chase ensued throughout Land Park and Hollywood Park. Part of the chase went through the St. Roberts Elementary school campus. Webb drove up to 70 mph through a small playground area with over 80 elementary school children on the playground. At one point, McCulley used the gun and shot out a passenger side window. The police disengaged the chase several times out of public safety concerns, but eventually located the abandoned car with McCulley and Webb nearby. Officer Randy Van Dusen and K9 Officer Bodie were called to the scene. They chased Webb into a residential yard where Webb shot Bodie point blank in the face, shattering his jaw and paw. Webb then shot at Officer Van Dusen, narrowly missing him. Officer Van Dusen returned fire, killing Webb. McCulley was quickly apprehended.

She later admitted she knew of Webb's intent to kill an officer. She also encouraged Webb to kill an officer. McCulley has a criminal history in Butte County dating back to 2008, including felony drug possession and drug possession for sale charges. McCulley had also given a statement in a 2010 Butte County case where she admitted that she wanted to shoot a cop.

Deputy District Attorney Tate Davis states, "The Sacramento Police Department did a remarkable job responding to and investigating this case. Specifically, Officer Randy Van Dusen and Bodie deserve special recognition for their excellent police work and bravery.

Sentencing is set for October 11, 2013 at 10:00 a.m. in Department 10 before the Honorable Greta Curtis

CASE: Andrew Jeffries, Robert Haven & Wendy Fong (09/11/13)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Hilary Bagley-Franzoia, Homicide Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that Sacramaniac gang member Andrew Jeffries and co-defendants Robert Haven and Wendy Fong were convicted by jury of first degree murder and the special circumstance of lying in wait in the execution style murder of Anthony Ortega.

Jeffries, a meth dealer, believed he was betrayed by Mr. Ortega and the mother of his children. On March 28, 2012, Jeffries and Haven lured Mr. Ortega to drive with them to a remote area in north Sacramento on the ruse of finding a car to steal. Once Mr. Ortega exited the vehicle, he was shot in the back and then in the head with Jeffries' .357 revolver. Fong had provided ammunition and loaned her vehicle to Jeffries as part of the murder plan. The trio had attempted to kill Mr. Ortega at least twice the week prior to the murder.

Three other criminal cases were joined in the murder case, including a domestic violence charge against Jeffries and a charge of producing false documents. After the murder, the trio had prepared and submitted a false recantation to the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office hoping that Jeffries' domestic violence case

Deputy District Attorney Hilary Bagley-Franzoia noted, "Sacramento Sheriff's Detectives Tom McCue, Stan Swisher, Jeff Wallace and District Attorney Investigator Kirk Campbell remained tenacious and resolute in bringing this case to a successful end with appropriate verdicts.'

All three defendants face a sentence of life without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for October 11, 2013 at 10:00 a.m. in Department 41 before the Honorable Helena Gweon.

CASE: Laurence Harris (09/10/13)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney David Brown, State Targeted Offenses Program

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that a jury found true the allegation that Laurence Harris is a Sexually Violent Predator (SVP). The Honorable Gerrit Wood ordered Harris to be committed to the custody of the California Department of State Hospitals for an indeterminate period of time in confinement and treatment. In 1972 in Los Angeles County, Harris sexually assaulted and viciously attacked a woman in her apartment

with an ice pick. As a result, he was convicted of residential burglary and personally inflicting great bodily injury upon the victim. Harris served five years in a state hospital and was released in 1978. In the 1990s, Harris was living in Sacramento and was employed as a psychiatric nurse for the Sacramento Mental Health Center where he met and befriended a female patient. After the patient was discharged from the hospital, she agreed to go on a date with Harris. Harris sexually assaulted her. Approximately 10 days later, he sexually assaulted a separate patient in her room while she was in a heavily medicated state. Harris was convicted of sexually assaulting both women and received a 14 year prison sentence.

After serving his prison sentence and before he was to be released into the community, the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office filed a petition to have Harris declared a Sexually Violent Predator under California law. The law is aimed at protecting society from, and providing treatment for, that small but extremely dangerous group of sexually violent predators who have diagnosable mental disorders and who are determined to be unsafe if released into the community.

Deputy District Attorney David Brown commented, "I would like to thank the jury for their time and hard work. Their verdict helps ensure that Sacramento is protected from this individual engaging in future violent sexual offenses."



Wealthy, But Not Spoiled

Dear Dave,

How do you make sure you don't spoil your child when you're wealthy?

- Ryan

Dear Ryan,

this will sound I know mean to some people, but you simply explain to them that *they* are not wealthy.

I remember a time years ago, after we'd gone broke, that we managed to scrimp and save and finally had a little bit of wealth. We bought a nice car and my son piped up from the back seat, all smug and satisfied, "We're doing pretty good, huh?" I'll admit it was kind of funny, but it was also a teachable moment. I looked at him and said, "I'm doing pretty good, but you're broke!" That was a pretty consistent message around the Ramsey household as the kids were growing up. If you're not working and making yourown way, you've got nothing.

The second thing is we taught them, from a very young age, was to work. That can start with simple things like kids cleaning up their rooms or doing the dishes after dinner. It should carry over to the teenage years as well. Every able-bodied child should be working and earning money, whether it's their own entrepreneurial idea, at a store in the mall or babysitting.

Dave Says

The third thing we did was based in our faith. As evangelical Christians, we taught our kids that we don't really own anything. It all belongs to God, and one of our jobs is to wisely manage the things He entrusts to us. The first rule is to take care of your own household—the important stuff. After that, it's okay to have some nice things, but it's not all about pleasure. It's also about giving and extraordinary levels of generosity.

Teach them to work. Teach them to be givers. And gently remind them once in a while that they've got nothing until they go out and earn it. - Dave

A Rough Lesson

Dear Dave,

My dad opened a credit card account in his name a few years ago to help with my college bills, and he made me an authorized user. Now he's delinquent on the card and I'm receiving collection calls and notices. Do I owe the credit card company money? - Steve

Dear Steve,


No, an authorized user is not liable. The account is in your dad's name, and you didn't sign anything. He's the one legally responsible for the money owed.

I want you to be careful, though. Lots of credit card companies will badger people and use all kinds of pressure and guilt trips to try to collect money from people who don't owe them anything. They just want their money, and they really don't care who writes the check.

Get them to remove you as an authorized user today. Send them a letter demanding this via certified mail, return receipt requested, so you'll have proof. Also, make sure they understand that you'll sue them for about \$10 million if they don't comply immediately. You shouldn't be reported to the credit bureaus for any of this, but companies can report just about anything—even inaccurate information—to the bureaus

You have rights as a consumer, and you are not legally liable for credit card debt when you're just an authorized user. But make sure you check your credit report regularly in the future. Some of these companies make a habit of repeatedly downloading misinformation to the bureaus in an effort to bother and bully people into paying debts they don't owe! - Dave



Congressman Bera Calls for Investment in Sacramento County Infrastructure

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Congressman Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-7) called for investment in Sacramento County infrastructure recently, after touring several local transportation projects with representatives from the Sacramento County Department of Transportation (SACDOT), the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG), Operating Engineers Local 3, and Laborers Local 185. The tour featured recently completed, active, and planned transportation projects near or along Highway 50 in the Rancho Cordova area.

"Our infrastructure in Sacramento County is in dire need of improvement," said Bera. "In our region, nearly 3.4 million trips are made over structurally deficient bridges every single day and the deteriorating state of the levees is also extremely serious. These improvements need to be made, but not only will they keep our families safe, they will also put Californians back to work and reinvigorate our economy."

Bera highlighted the Partnership to Build America Act of 2013 (HR 2084), as a smart way to make these kinds of needed infrastructure upgrades. A bipartisan bill Bera has co-sponsored, the Partnership to Build America Act, would help pay for our fast-deteriorating infrastructure

like roads, bridges, and levees, without increasing the nation's debt or raising taxes. Instead, it gives companies that bring foreign earnings back to America a tax savings if they invest in a new, U.S. infrastructure fund. If passed, it would create significant American jobs in the short-term and help U.S. competitiveness in the long-term.



Conservation Corps Opens Exam for Center Managers

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Those interested in management positions with the innovative California Conservation Corps should consider applying for the CCC's upcoming Conservation Administrator II exam.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA -Average retail gasoline prices in Sacramento have risen 12.6 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.93/g yesterday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 720 gas outlets in Sacramento. This compares with the national average that has fallen 4.5 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.54/g, according to gasoline price web-

site GasBuddy.com.

For a second consecutive year, Regional Parks will be adding rangers to its force to assure public safety and maintain the parks. Two rangers were added last year and four new positions have been approved by the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors bringing the total count of rangers

to twenty. "Regional Parks has done a great job during the tough economic times and taken every opportunity to maintain service levels and generate revenue where possible," stated County Executive Bradley J. Hudson. "

Rangers patrol 15,000 acres including 32 recreation areas.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Adding these new rangers "allows us to have more patrol resources in the American River Parkway and provides additional response services to the many other recreation areas we manage," stated Jeff Leatherman, Regional Parks Director.

> "Having a ranger presence is critical to public safety and is a high priority issue for the many runners, cyclists and recreationalists who frequent the parks. We will use the additional resources to address ongoing community concerns including illegal camping, off leash dogs and trail safety."

Regional Parks Rangers have full peace officer authority under the California Health and Safety

Codes and are accredited law enforcement personnel through the Peace Officer Standards and Training certification.

New Rangers can be recent graduates from accredited training facilities or those with prior peace officer experience. Rangers enforce the laws applicable to Regional Parks, specific County ordinances, and California Vehicle, Penal and Health & Safety Codes within all County Regional Parks.




