Major Renovation Project Underway for Sutter's Fort Historic Central Building

CA – (MPG) Recognized on the National Register of Historic Places and once the largest building in California when it was built in 1840, the 6,500-square foot historic Central Building at Sutter's Fort State Historic Park is currently undergoing important renovations. The first phase of the California State Parks' "Sutter's Fort Roof Rehabilitation and Seismic Stabilization" project includes a new roof and wall reinforcements for stabilization to make the roof less susceptible to damage caused by high winds or earthquakes. This initial phase is expected to be completed by mid-September.

Originally known as "Casa Grande," the prized historic structure was the first permanent structure built in the Central Valley. The multi-use building was a central focal point of western migration before the Gold Rush, was a key military position in the Mexican-American War and was also the first commercial building near the gold fields after gold was discovered. Early on, the historic building operated as the general store and also housed the offices of John Sutter, the clerk and the doctor. It

SACRAMENTO REGION, also operated as an entertainment hub with a parlor and dining hall. Then, in August of 1846 through the winter of 1847, it was the headquarters of the U.S. Army during the Mexican-American War. In 1848, the historic structure became a miner's dormitory on the third floor, a boarding house on the second, and a bar, bowling alley and card room in the basement.

The cost for the first phase of renovations is \$295,000 and is made possible by Proposition 84 that was passed in 2006. Proposition 84 set aside resources for the Department of Parks and Recreation to develop, acquire, interpret, restore and rehabilitate the state park system and its natural, historical, and visitor serving resources. The top priority for this portion of the bond measure was for the restoration, rehabilitation and improvement of the existing state park system lands and facilities. The cost and timing of the second phase have not yet been determined but will include the stabilization of the lower portion of the walls, the restoration of the damaged walls and a new coat of whitewash.

While Sutter's Fort State Historic Park remains open seven-days-aweek for visitors, only the Central Building will not be available for self-guided tours during active construction periods. Once re-opened, Fort visitors will be able to go back in time and tour inside that historic building to see how the offices of John Sutter, the doctor and the clerk would have looked in 1846.

Sutter's Fort State Historic Park is operated by California State Parks with financial assistance from the nonprofit Friends of Sutter's Fort. Sutter's Fort State Historic Park is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Located in midtown Sacramento on L Street between 26th and 28th Streets, the Fort offers monthly "Hands on History" activities and special events throughout the year. Established in 1839 by Swiss immigrant John Augustus Sutter, Sutter's Fort was at the center of a flourishing agricultural empire named New Helvetia (New Switzerland.) This empire established Sacramento's earliest settlement and the first European settlement in California's Central Valley. For more information, call (916) 445-4422 or visitwww.suttersfort.org



Sacramento County DA Reports Recent cases of interest

CASE: Gurpreet Gosal (08/09/13)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Anthony Ortiz, Homicide Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Greta Curtis Fall sentenced Gurpreet Gosal to 35 years to life in prison. On June 24, 2013, a jury convicted Gosal of second degree murder. The jury also found true the use and discharge gun enhancements.

In August 2008, Gosal shot and killed Parmjit Singh during a Sikh sports festival held at the Sikh temple on Bradshaw Road.

CASE: Domonick Williams (08/08/13)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Jeff Harry, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Domonick Williams was convicted by jury of a felony charge of child endangerment. The jury also found true the enhancement that Williams personally inflicted great bodily injury on a child under the age of 5 years old. Williams has a prior strike conviction from 2006 for first degree burglary and a one year prison prior for that same conviction.

On April 18, 2011, Williams placed his two-and-a-half-year-old son Iziah in a bathtub of hot water because he defecated in his underwear. As a result, the child sustained second degree burns to his buttocks and a third degree burn to his upper left foot, which eventually required skin graft surgery. After Williams injured his son, he never sought medical attention for him. Williams' girlfriend finally called 911 more than 24 hours later and the child was taken to UC Davis Medical Center and then transferred to Shriners Hospital.

Williams faces a sentence of 23 years in prison. Sentencing is set for September 6, 2013 at 9:00 a.m. in Department 17 before the Honorable Ernest Sawtelle.

CASE: David Savala, Pebbles Savala, & Omar Mosqueda (08/08/13)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Morgan Gire, Gangs & Hate Crimes Unit

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that David Savala and Pebbles Savala were convicted by jury of aggravated kidnapping for the purpose of financial gain and felony assault. Omar Mosqueda was convicted of kidnapping and felony assault.

On July 4, 2012, the defendants lured the 14-year-old victim to Pebbles Savala's home for a party. Once there, all three defendants and others at the house beat the victim and then threw her out of the house. As she was walking home, the defendants followed her down the street and threw her into David Savala's van. They then drove her to the Watt Avenue and Longview Drive area and threatened to make her work as a prostitute. The defendants then returned to the house and kept the victim there for another 26 hours until she was finally allowed to leave

David and Pebbles Savala face sentences of life in prison. The defendants will be sentenced on September 13, 2013 in Department 33 before the Honorable Michael Savage.

Deputy District Attorney Allison Dunham stated, "This is a fair resolution of the case based upon the facts and circumstances. The victim and her family can move forward with their lives and be proud that they had the courage to report the abuse to the Sacramento Diocese and law enforcement."





Buying a House with 403(b) Money

Dear Dave, Should I take advantage of a

403(b) withdrawal in order to buy a house? - Bryan

Dear Bryan,

I wouldn't do that because it really doesn't accomplish anything. The only money you can take out is what you've put in, and any growth you've experienced has to stay in there. Basically, it's a retirement plan, and I wouldn't monkey around with retirement money to buy a home.

My advice is to make sure you're debt-free and you have three to six months of expenses set aside in an emergency fund. Once you've taken care of those issues, you can pile up a bunch of cash in a money market account toward the purchase of a home. You won't earn a lot of money, but it's a safe place to park your cash when you're saving up for a big purchase.

When it comes to saving and investing, I'm a big fan of mutual funds. The problem in this scenario is that if you start sticking money in mutual funds, then the market is down when you're ready to buy, you could've lost some money. That's not the route I'd want to go if I'm in your shoes, Bryan. I'd forego the opportunity to make money in order to keep it safe for this goal.

What Term Does He Need? Dear Dave,

I'm 24 years old, and I have a wife and child. We've been following your plan, and I'm about to buy life insurance. Should I get a 20- or 30-year term policy? - Derek

Dear Derek,

I think the big question is how long will you need this life insurance. If you and your wife are planning on having more kids in the next 10 years, I'd suggest a 30-year policy. That could put you in a situation of being 34 years old with a new baby. That's not old by any means, but your wife will need 20 years' worth of coverage if this happens, because you'd want the kids grown and out of the house before the insurance term runs out.

But that's just one of your financial goals at this point. You also want to be debt-free. And you need to ask yourself some other questions. Are you going to have your house paid for 15 years from now? I sure hope you didn't take out more than a 15-year mortgage. Are your kids going to be grown and gone by then? Are you going to have a big pile of money in the bank by then? In other words, where are you going to be at the end of the term?


If 15 years from now you have \$700,000 in your retirement account, your house is paid for, and the kids are out on their own, then, if you die, your wife will be fine, financially speaking. But at that time, if you still have kids in the house and your home isn't paid off, then you'd probably need a 20year policy.

That's how I would look at it. How much longer are you going to need life insurance? - Dave







On School Accountability, Reauthorize Don't Neutralize

Twelve years ago, in an act of bipartisanship that now seems impossible to imagine, the Senate and House passed historic legislation reforming American education. The No Child Left Behind (NCLB) bill was championed by President George W. Bush and supported by a nine-toone ratio, including votes from Democrats Nancy Pelosi, Harry Reid, and the late Ted Kennedy, as well as Republicans Mitch McConnell and John Boehner. NCLB was the latest iteration of a national commitment to provide a better education for our nation's children.

NCLB was transformative for schools and life-changing for students, particularly poor and minority students, whose achievement increased. It set national goals for America's schools. It required states to test students' knowledge of reading and math annually, and expected that all students would be at grade level in these subjects by 2014. And, when schools didn't make enough progress towards meeting that ambitious goal, there were funding changes and opportunities for students to get immediate help.

NCLB marked the beginning of a new era of accountability in American education. It was an ambitious attempt to jumpstart student achievement within a global economy, and much needed given decades of stagnant achievement.

NCLB is also not perfect - no legislation ever is. There is clear interest in updating the law. Three different proposals for new legislation are under discussion in the House and Senate. And, 39 states and DC have designed new systems by receiving waivers from the Education Department. These actions could be promising developments. Instead, the actions are jeopardizing and potentially neutralizing the foundational principles of accountability.

These waiver-based systems exempt public schools from accountability standards that took decades to establish. Never before has such an important piece of legislation, with such broad and deep bipartisan backing, been so swiftly dismantled. If this trend isn't redirected, our public education system could suffer an unnecessary setback in the effort to improve student performance.

It's no secret that America's students lag far behind those of many other developed nations. The George W. Bush Institute recently released a "Global Report Card" providing a district-by-district account of how American students stack up against their counterparts abroad. The results show just how far we need to go.

Just take Portland, Oregon, a state that received a waiver. Portland has an international mathematics score of 47 percent. That means that more than half the students in the international group perform better than the average Portland student. If you limit that comparison to Portland's closest international competitor, the Canadians do even better.

These poor results were corroborated in two reports released in December by the National Center for Education Statistics. According to those studies, U.S. students ranked well below countries like Singapore in science. Countries such as Russia and Hong Kong, meanwhile, bested us in eighthgrade reading.

Oddly, as our international performance stagnates with some schools failing to live up to the goals set by NCLB, the response by the federal government and some states has been to lower expectations and lessen accountability.

Each state receiving a waiver or hoping for a more relaxed accountability system in a waiver or new law still has students - more than a few - who cannot read as well as their peers and struggle to master math.

The negative impact wrought by waivers can't be overstated. A dangerous precedent is being set: if you can't live up to agreedupon standards, you get a pass. And, while most congressional watchers do not expect the current proposals to make it to the President's desk, some proposals focus on the wrong issues - control instead of achievement, minutia instead of high expectations. How can meaningful education reform ever take hold if teachers and administrators don't believe meaningful federal policies will actually be enforced?

In this current environment, there are foreboding signs. Eleven states are not meeting the most basic graduation rate reporting requirements, according to a new report from the Alliance for Excellent Education.

We have examples of states dramatically relaxing educational standards in response to the waiver opportunity. In Wisconsin, for instance, a mere 50 percent of students will be required to read at grade level by 2017.

Lawmakers should act and move to improve NCLB. Recognizing its flaws and acting to rectify them is a far more responsible course of action than nullifying the policy's most crucial components and putting our children at greater risk.

Preserving a strong system of comprehensive accountability in American schools is a national imperative.

The global economy grows fiercer by the day. Our students need to be equipped with the high quality education they'll need to land the jobs of the future. Lowering expectations, waiving expectations, and fighting for control takes this country back to the days before accountability. Allowing schools and educators to continue to fail to meet even basic achievement expectations is not what has made this country great and is not the pathway to a better future.

Medicaid Proven A Failure

State legislators across the country are wrestling with whether to expand Medicaid, with the bulk of the funding to come from the federal government, thanks to Obamacare.

Thus far, a substantial number of states have rebuffed the feds' offer -- or are leaning that way. They're right to do so. The states and the federal government have spent trillions on the program -but new data show that Medicaid beneficiaries' health is not getting any better.

Those new data come from Oregon. In 2008, the state inadvertently became a laboratory for testing the efficacy of its Medicaid program. Oregon had funds to add 10,000 patients to the program, but 90,000 met eligibility guidelines. State officials came up with a novel solution -- a lottery that would randomly select qualified applicants.

The lottery afforded researchers a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to conduct a large-scale study comparing adults newly enrolled in Medicaid with a control group who remained uninsured. Their work, based on two years' worth of data, was recently published in the New England Journal of Medicine.

The data after year one seemed promising. The lottery winners used more health services and got more preventive care, including cholesterol screenings, flu shots, and mammograms.

But the Oregon study looked at more than just health usage after year two. It also examined health outcomes. The researchers measured enrollees' blood pressure, cholesterol, and blood sugar levels. These metrics are risk factors for stroke, heart disease, and diabetes -- all of which can be managed or prevented with early intervention.

The results? Although Medicaid patients used 35 percent more health services, the coverage appeared to have no effect on blood pressure, high cholesterol or elevated blood sugar. In the researchers' words, "Medicaid coverage generated no significant improvements in measured physical health outcomes in the first two years."

With "no significant improvements" in health outcomes, it's hard to see how being on Medicaid is any better than being uninsured.

The behavior of many Oregonians who actually qualified for Medicaid suggests as much. Some 40 percent of those who won the Medicaid lottery -- and thus could have received free coverage -- didn't bother to enroll.

Previous studies have found that Medicaid patients actually fare worse than those with private insurance -- or even those without insurance. A 2010 study of 900,000 surgical cases, for instance, found that Medicaid patients had the longest hospital stays, the highest total hospital costs, and the highest risk of death. And according to a report published in the journal Cancer, Medicaid patients with the publication's namesake disease are two to three times more likely to die than other patients.

A 2011 study found that Medicaid patients were 8.1 percent less likely to be alive ten years after a lung transplant, compared to those with private insurance and those without insurance.

Obamacare was premised on the idea that extending access to preventive care would save money and lives. The Oregon study is the latest to throw cold water on those claims.

Yet come 2014, Obamacare will consign another 12 million Americans to the Medicaid rolls. They may not be able to get care, as the program's low reimbursement rates discourage doctors from seeing its beneficiaries. According to one recent study, just 43 percent of healthcare providers accept Medicaid.

The dramatic expansion of Medicaid will pose a staggering cost to taxpayers, who will have to shoulder an additional \$640 billion in spending over the next decade. States already spend more on Medicaid than on education, and the program's costs are rapidly squeezing out other public priorities.

Of course, all that spending may ease the financial burden that Medicaid patients face. New enrollees in Oregon saw their outof-pocket costs decrease by \$215 a year. But to realize those "savings," they consumed \$1,172 more in care per person per year than the average uninsured individual.

Spending a thousand dollars to save a couple hundred makes no sense -- especially when all that money doesn't buy any



improvements in patient health.

Our leaders must chart a course for health reform that's based on hard evidence -- not wishful thinking. The data from Oregon prove that Medicaid's expensive status quo doesn't deliver for those it covers. Obamacare's expansion of the program would only doubledown on this failed approach.

The AMC TV network is a basic cable channel that got its start as American Movie Classics, airing films largely made before the 1950s and in their uncut and original color formats

While still adhering to its primary mission to run classic movies, AMC initiated a major shift in programming in 2007 with the successful launch of the original series Mad Men, a period piece about the freewheeling advertising world of New York during the 1960s

Soon after Mad Men made its mark as one of the best cable TV dramas, AMC struck gold for a second time with Breaking Bad, the explosive story of a high school chemistry teacher who adapted all too easily to a life of crime.

Speaking to a recent gathering of the nation's TV critics, writer, producer and director Vince Gilligan explained that the main character of Breaking Bad was once glibly described as taking Mr. Chips and turning him into Scarface.

Devoted fans of Breaking Bad are well aware of this construct, that Bryan Cranston's milqueto ast Walter White, a teacher facing the worst mid-life crisis ever, turns bad. Dying of lung cancer, Walter exploits his knowledge of chemistry to embark on a volatile criminal enterprise.

The final eight episodes of Breaking Bad are just getting started during the month of August, leading to the inevitable conclusion that the sun is beginning to set on Walter's tenuous drug empire as the world around him unravels.

Whatever is happening during the finale for "Breaking Bad" is not being revealed here, not only because we don't know but it would spoil the fun. One can only sense

Meanwhile, AMC is launching a new series during August, which itself will be limited by a ten-episode run. Low Winter Sun is based on the 2006 award-winning British two-part mini-series of the same name written by Simon Donald.

The premise of Low Winter Sun is incredibly compelling. A homicide detective, played by Mark Strong, is coerced by a fellow officer into killing another detective, albeit a corrupt individual.

Strong's Frank Agnew is a Detroit investigator who becomes assigned to investigate the murder he committed. Looking over his shoulder is David Costabile's Simon Boyd, a dogged Internal Affairs officer trying to root out police corruption.


Strong is the right man for the job of the conflicted cop, primarily because the British actor reprises the same role of the Detective Agnew from Scotland's Edinburgh, a city of urban decay somewhat like Detroit.

Low Winter Sun makes great use of the rotting landscape of modern Detroit, where many neighborhoods in the urban core resemble a post-apocalyptic vision you might suspect came from a cheesy science-fiction movie.

Regrettably, decades of corruption and inept political leadership (the twin pillars of a failed metropolis) have rendered Detroit an unfortunate wasteland, which oddly enough makes the city attractive, at least, for filmmaking of crime stories.

Also starring with Mark Strong is Lennie James as Detective Joe Geddes. Together, these two mismatched officers are part of the big story of murder, deception, revenge and corruption in a world where the line between cops and criminals is blurred.




