

Linking Parks Gets Go-ahead

CARMICHAEL, CA – (MPG) Four recently approved projects are checks on the bucket list for Carmichael Recreation and Park District Administrator Jack Harrison. After seven years, Harrison (70) retires this month. In his tenure, Harrison oversaw development of Patriots, O'Donnell and Jan Parks. His parting victory is achieving the okay for other pressing community needs:

linking Jensen Gardens (Fair Oaks Blvd) to park land at Sutter Ave. The walkway, a footbridge, improved street access and parking has a \$100,000 price tag. In the tradition of recent park developments, half of the cost - in cash or services - will be contributed by neighbors and project supporters. Their fundraising has so far realized \$43,000. While the concept of joining Sutter and Jensen reserves was long ago conceived, earlier visions required subdivision for funding. Pared down designs and cost-sharing mean current plans require no land sacrifice. Breaking ground next spring, the project's initial phase establishes 1000 feet of wheelchair-friendly trails. These will cross gentle slopes shaded by mature trees and provide access to Jensen's botanical displays. The two parks combine over 18 halcyon acres (plus communal plots for green-thumbers at the Sutter Ave entrance).

Costlier additions such as playgrounds and picnic areas await flusher times. Says Jack Harrison: "We always wanted to keep the properties intact but we lacked finances to develop them. Carmichael is blessed by mature sites with lots of trees; we needn't do much more than make these areas accessible and safe. Upkeep is minimal. Partnering with neighbors increases community appreciation for a park." Harrison was equally pleased that the 2013-14 park budget allows upgrades for Carmichael's main street reserve. In tune with ongoing Fair Oaks Blvd beautification, the "Great Wall of Carmichael" frontage of Carmichael Park will be tarted up with new landscaping and a water feature. The sad specter of the Grant Ave's disused swimming pool is now gone. Grassed over, the

area will soon be reemployed for children's soccer. Improvements to the off-leash dog park near North Avenue are in train. "It's a heavily-used area that needs new drainage, irrigation and turf," said Harrison. "Once again, partnering (with the Carmichael canine Corral Association) makes the project feasible. "It's a delight to have projects completed – or funded — before I retire," said Harrison. "We've had great board directors, dedicated staff and helpful neighbors. My family has been part of Carmichael for 40 years. Parks will be part of my retirement. My granddaughters enjoy Jan and O'Donnell. And before this year is out, I'll probably take an allotment at Sutter Community and start growing vegetables."

These Kids Are Not Throw-aways

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA- (MPG) Twenty-one years clean and sober, Greg Scott, Founder/CEO of Juveniles at Risk (JAR), tells kids, "If I can do it, so can you." Born in Brooklyn, New York, Scott spent a few of his early years in Washington, D.C., where his father was involved in riots after Martin Luther King's assassination. "He came home with three pin-striped suits. It was my first experience of feeling ashamed of my father. It was looting because he was angry, but he still stole. As a child, I never felt right about that."

The family relocated to Oakland when he was ten. "I had my first experience with white people, not knowing how to integrate and process it. When I had my first joint at age 13, I thought, "This is the solution to life.""

In high school, he snorted cocaine, smoked weed, and took acid. "But, my grades were good, and I played sports."

He spent two years at Alameda Junior College in the era of social civil unrest. "How's an African-American make it in our society? A lot hasn't changed – it's about money.

"I got hold of rock cocaine, and for the next six years, I was off and running, ending up homeless on the streets of Los Angeles, 5th and Main, which is as low as you can get. I was in 'cardboard city,' right next to the junkie who was shooting up

cocaine, while I was smoking it. The best I could do was panhandle on the streets."

Through support, he pulled himself up, and worked through the addictions. During the first ten years of sobriety, he worked various jobs, but felt something was missing. "I didn't feel like I had any value. What really set me on the journey was listening to Deepak Chopra and Wayne Dyer."

While working as Director of Sales at the Sacramento Observer, he learned that 32% of children were failing in the Sacramento area. "I did a little investigation, and discovered it was closer to 55%." He knew intuitively he could help, but wasn't sure how to go about it. When he learned that the percentage was actually 90%, he knew he had to act.

He approached the Sacramento Unified School District about creating a recovery program, who advised it would require a GED program inclusion. He presented his idea during a meeting at which he was the only African-American present. He suggested twenty kids to try the program.

"Their response was, 'I think we can find twenty of our throwaways.""

JAR, a non-profit organization, began in 2002 at Lemon Hill. "The District put the kids program into an adult school."

The plan was for Scott to lecture the kids, motivate them to learn, and send them into the classroom. Unfortunately, the two union teachers assigned for the educational aspect of the program wanted no part of it, and immediately suspended six kids.

"I was able to convince those teachers to supervise me, so I could be the teacher and the program."

That meant he needed to refresh his knowledge on all basic subjects.



New Book by Edric Cane Seeks to Redefine what it Means to Know Math

CARMICHAEL, CA-(MPG) Leaders in all fields of life in the United States see in our deficiencies in math education an existential threat to the economic well-being and international standing of the nation. Typically, most community colleges spend valuable resources teaching remedial classes on elementary and middle school topics. It is with those topics, in the early grades, that the gaps begin, where children fail to connect with mathematics, where too many children lose ground and lose hope.

Basing teaching strategies on intuition allows students to give their full acquiescence to the truths of mathematics and accept mathematics as an emanation of their own thinking processes and mental patterns. So the approach presented in Teaching to Intuition, and the quite original strategies that implement it, make for more knowledge, not less, more understanding, and a greater ability to recognize in the outside world circumstances that can be analyzed and enlightened by the tool of mathematics. It makes for students who willingly accept that mathematics is an integral part of their mental make up, just because it makes sense. The hope is that it dramatically increases the pool of students willing and able to fully participate in a world shaped by science and technology.

The book is addressed to all educators who teach those elementary and middle school topics, either because they teach in those grades or because they teach the topics as remedial material in high schools and colleges. It is addressed to educators and policy makers concerned about the vast gap between the needs of our nation in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (the STEM disciplines) and the significant proportion of those who have no chance of entering

those fields because they have never learned to connect with the tool of mathematics. Readers may also include parents actively involved and concerned with the education of their children.

Teaching to Intuition is written in a down to earth, conversational style, using examples taken from topics of mathematics that all citizens should want to master. It is however an ambitious book, as it takes an issue that most agree upon—the significant gap in mathematical competence between the needs and the reality --- and proposes solutions that go to the heart of the problem, not by doing what we have always done a little bit better, but by doing it differently.

Teaching to Intuition comes at a time when, nationwide, Common Core Standards seek to put significantly greater emphasis on the constant interaction between mathematical knowledge and the real world it helps us understand and influence. Edric Cane's new book hopes to be part of the discussions and changes that those Standards will generate.

Author Edric Cane has a Ph.D. from the University of Michigan and spent two years as a Besse Scholar at Oxford University, England. He taught math at a school with 95 percent minorities in the Los Angeles Unified School District. Other teaching posts were in Europe, Africa, Oberlin College in Ohio and Occidental College in Los Angeles. He also wrote the book "Making Friends with Numbers.

CARMICHAEL, CA – (MPG) Community leaders and citizens attacked Governor Jerry Brown's "realignment" bill (AB 109) at a recent public forum.

A former Chairman of the State Parole Board, Senator Jim Nielson sponsored the meeting. The 2011 bill, he said, "Turned the criminal justice system upside down. I doubt any worse legislation has been passed in California history." Governor's Brown's scheme

is the state's response to Federal Court oversight to reduce prison overcrowding and fix inmate health services. Realignment allows some State felons to serve in County facilities that are ill-designed for lengthy incarceration. "The Governor dumped the problem on counties," contended Nielson. "The Supreme Court did not order Realignment. Californians are not benefiting; not only is crime up, so are taxes." Nearly 120 Arden/Carmichael/

Fair Oaks residents packed the Carmichael Park Club House to hear Neilson urge a public campaign for AB 109 repeal.

"Realignment provisions changed penalties and parole supervision for tens of thousands of felons," said Nielson. "We are all in danger."

Cash-strapped counties have become responsible for prisoner health. Fresno and Riverside now face inmate law suits for inadequate services.

Nielson warned that the law can result in early release and decreased parole supervision for such felons as drug dealers, murderers and child predators. "Due to jail overcrowding, some counties have not incarcerated parole violators," he said. "Some (violators) have committed horrific crimes."

Sacrament Sheriff Scott Jones, District Attorney Jan Scully, Supervisors Susan Peters and Roberta MacGlashan joined the discussion.

Explained D.A. Scully: "Shifting responsibility to the county means that what was already deficient is now overwhelmed. "We used to provide a revolving door to prison for dirt bags. We are now hand cuffed. Offenders should be given consequences that scare them. With a maximum of 90 days (allowed for County jail incarceration) consequences aren't there. The bill never took the safety of citizens or crime victims into account. It has made life easier for offenders."

The impact of criminal justice realignment is among likely issues for Supervisor Susan Peter's Community meeting on May 15. Sheriff Scott Jones will join the 7:30 a.m. forum at Fair Oaks Water District (10326 Fair Oaks Blvd).Anyone may attend.



The Fair Oaks Cemetery District and the Memorial Day Ceremony Committee are finalizing plans for one of the most popular and inspiring Memorial Day ceremonies in the area.

The Fifteenth Annual Memorial Day and Avenue of Flags Ceremony will be held Saturday, May 25, at the Fair Oaks Cemetery, located at 7780 Olive Street, Fair Oaks. The formal ceremonies start at 10 AM.

This year's theme is to honor "Our National Cemeteries", with the emphasis on Hawaii's Punch Bowl. The Punch Bowl is a cemetery located in Honolulu, Hawaii that serves as a memorial to those men and women who served in the U.S. Armed Forces.



Essential Expenses

Dear Dave,

I'm following your plan, and currently I have \$14,000 in my emergency fund. What are essentials for three to six months of expenses?

- Brian

Dear Brian,

Basically, you should ask yourself this question: What would it take to operate my household for a month? There are several different things that could be classified as "essentials," but if you take those things and multiply the number by three, four, five or six, you'll see how much money you need to have a fully loaded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses. This is Baby Step 3 in my plan.

Some people get really technical about exactly how many months of expenses they need to save in this range. And that's okay. You can take a little time to evaluate things before moving on to Baby Step 4, which is investing 15 percent of your household income into Roth IRAs and other pre-tax retirement plans.

Believe me, it's a great feeling to have a big pile of cash sitting there just for a rainy day. You don't want to go nuts and make it so big that you sacrifice retirement or other important aspects

of your life, but after a point you shouldn't be too concerned whether you have three months or six months of expenses—or somewhere in between—saved just for emergencies.

Having a nice emergency fund, along with no debt, creates a wonderful sense of financial peace!

She Stole His Identity

Dear Dave.

If a wife takes out a credit card in her husband's name without his knowledge, and they get divorced, can the husband claim identity theft? - Nancy

Dear Nancy,

Absolutely! Unless they have power of attorney, anytime someone opens an account in a name other than their own, they have stolen an identity. Being married to someone doesn't give you the right to sign their name to a document.

I knew a guy in the real estate business years ago who was doing a lot of property deals under his own name.

Occasionally, the title company would require his wife's signature, and he would sign her name on the papers himself. Sometimes he signed her name after calling her up and explaining what was happening, and she was okay with the situation. Then, he signed some papers she didn't know about, and it came back to bite him. He was charged with criminal fraud!


You cannot legally sign your spouse's name without first having power of attorney privileges. If you do, it's called identity theft. It's a crime anytime you lie to get money.



PARKWAY ALCOHOL BAN

This Memorial Day weekend there will be a complete ban on alcohol consumption and possession both on land and in the water within the American River Parkway between Hazel and Watt avenues. An exception exists for Ancil Hoffman Golf Course.

In past years holiday weekends had become major problems along the American River making the parkway less of a family friendly outing because of fights, public nudity, profanity and littering. The problem was very apparent Fourth of July in 2006 when hundreds of rafters and partygoers consuming excessive amounts of alcohol created what one observer called a "chaotic scene" along a portion of the parkway - one person filmed the goings-on and posted a video on myspace.com depicting half naked women and men wrestling in the mud.

The Board of Supervisors restored decorum beginning with the 2006 Labor Day weekend and the ban is also applicable for the holiday weekends of Independence Day as well as Memorial Day.

Since the restriction has taken effect, families I have talked to have expressed appreciation for making these holiday weekends once again a time for everyone to enjoy the American River Parkway.

"Some of my kids couldn't read, and some of my kids were gifted. Some of them were getting beaten, all of them were smoking weed, and some had mental health issues."

He obtained county funding to hire professional counselors. JAR now operates in the Pocket area, but will be relocating to Power Inn Road.

The program works with ages 11 to 26. The kids are usually referred from schools.

"It's scary, because some 12-yearolds look like perfect backpack kids, and they're smoking more weed than some of my 19-year-olds.

"They are with us during suspension time, so they aren't sitting at home, doing absolutely nothing. We perform some one-on-one counseling, and then help them with their homework. When suspension ends, we offer an after-school program to help get their grades back up, and off alcohol and drugs, if they're using. "It can be a challenge living in our community. You go down four or five different streets, and you're looking at four or five different gangs. Around the 22nd or 23rd of each month, they're running out of food. Every Friday, I provide a breakfast. I hope one day to be able to provide breakfast and lunch every day of the week. How do you study if you're hungry?

"I could have 60 kids in a classroom, all different gangs, and could do a lecture, and no problem." When City Hall informed him security was required, "I had fights every day, because I was telling them now that they were bad."

Scott pays United Christian Center to transport the kids from and to JAR. "With this 'limousine service' the kids realize we'll give them the best, if they're willing to do the work."

A Mother's Love Raises **One Big Happy Family**

Nick, Tom, David, Dennis, Gerry, Regina, Lorna, Mary, Paul, Maggie and Don. Eleven children. Forty-plus grandchildren, and more great grandchildren I am still trying to count. Yes, Catholic.

Margaret G. Scholl was born in 1923.

Her mother died when she was 11, and her father passed the following year, of a broken heart. She was adopted within the family around Vallejo. The home she grew up in is now seen by passers by on I-80. That home still stands and serves as a minimuseum and office, having been recently restored by the new owners.

She had plans on becoming a nun. Then she met my dad!

Her brother "Uncle Jimmy" and sister "Aunt Lorraine" were such a big part of our family lives. Every year we rotated hosting our holiday dinners together. One would host Thanksgiving, the next Christmas. The following year someone else would take their turn. We shared big tables, kid's tables, "performances" and lots of jokes and laughs.

We were raised at 445 Jefferson Street on the corner of Delaware. Built somewhere in the early 1880's, my dad and mom bought it for around \$10,000. We lived there for 47 years.

Everybody came to our house. My mom made it so inviting and enjoyable, other kids wanted to come and stay over. There were times my dad thought she had adopted four or five kids when he wasn't looking.

Our yard was surrounded by nearly a dozen fruit trees. Plum, cherry, apricot, lemon, pomegranate, walnut, and almond. Our team challenge was picking, cleaning and canning that fruit each summer. Later, the realization came it was for our survival

not knowing the discipline comas good as the pancakes, scraming my way. Homeschooling the bled eggs and hot chocolate. rest of the year meant a lot more

My mom had a great strategy for our visit to Disneyland - plaid shirts, all the same color. She figured were there were four or five kids all wearing the exact same outfit it would be easier to keep an eye on them. I think I wore those plaid shirts to school for about five years!

Halloween was always safe back then. We could go out for hours, collecting enough candy for a three month stupor. I am sure now that it helped keep us pre-occupied while mom and dad tried to figure out just what they were going to do for Christmas. How and where did they hide all

home safely. I remember as children sitting out on our street corner late into the night looking up at the moon and really wanting them home safe. I remember my dad going out to the backyard to cry when the news came over that President Kennedy was shot and killed. I remember all of us watching man's first step on the moon. I remember watching Hank Aaron's 715th home run to pass Babe Ruth. One black and white TV, kids huddled together watching it for our limit of two hours a night.

As the years went by, my mom asked my dad for one thing, a color TV so she could watch the Rose Parade in color and not

front half of the house, shoulder-high bushes surrounding the outside of our lot, the large lawn, many roses, lilies, gladiolas, and it brought a peacefulness when you could sit outside under a tree and enjoy it all.

I remember our long talks when I was a teenager on religion, spirit, and right and wrong. My selfish detours, being what they were; those long talks gave me the way and the desire to come back to a deep and abiding faith.

My mom had some great friends; Alice Lambro, Mary Young, Rose Wright, Lily Theissen to name a few. Longtime family friends included

written some of the guidelines. They wrote back admitting she was correct.

Mom was chosen the Grand Marshall years ago for the hometown Fourth of July parade. Dozens of family members showed up and took up a good part of the stands, giving her a standing ovation. All she wanted was something cold to drink.

My mom went to church everyday. She took Holy Communion to the sick parishioners who could not attend mass. Now, others are bringing it to her in her final days of comfort.

Some of the lessons we learned from our parents were about holding it together and trusting the Lord in tough times. We learned about caring for others when they really need you. We learned what "You'll find a way" really meant. I learned how lucky I am for having the parents and family I was blessed with in this life



tuna casserole, chicken and dumplings, fruit pies, stew in the crock pot. Nobody was starving.

All homework had to be done at the kitchen table right after school, before any games were played or TV watched.

Our back yard was about the size of a small baseball diamond, with the two-story house in left field serving as our "Monster". Anything hit off the house was a fair ball; over the house was a homerun. A family of pull-hitters. We played until mom yelled "dinner's ready". The next words were always "game over!"

Praying before every meal, we learned to appreciate the food, but more so my mom and dad's hard work to make it possible.

No meat on Fridays? Those were the days. "But mom, can we still have your meatloaf? There's hardly any meat in it!"

And then, there was the fine art of sneaking cookies from the cookie jar.

Mom wrote our chores on the black board in the kitchen. It was a long list, shared by everyone taking up a bed. She didn't send us a text hoping someone would notice.

Every week we said the rosary together, on our knees, around the living room floor. It taught us prayer, discipline, and the understanding of pain and patience. It also taught us that prayer matters.

We learned things the right way. Everybody worked. "You don't work, you don't eat". Respect. You DO NOT talk back to your parents. Take care of what you have. "Fix what you have before buying something new". And, of course the one I heard often, "Wait until your father gets home!"

Getting kicked out of kindergarten, (I still say I was innocent) meant the long walk home holding my mom's hand,
