Using Hearts and Feet to Fight Cancer

CARMICHAEL will go around the clock in the battle against cancer when the seventh annual American Cancer Society Relay For Life® of Carmichael gets underway with teams of residents gathering at Gibbons Park on August 4, 2012 at 9:00a.m.

Relay For Life events are held overnight as individuals and teams camp out at an athletic track, park or other gathering area, with the goal of keeping at least one team member on the track or pathway at all times throughout the evening. Teams do most of their fundraising prior to the event, but some teams also hold creative fundraisers at their camp sites during Relay. Relay brings together friends, families, businesses, hospitals, schools, faith-based groups . . people from all walks of life – all aimed at furthering the American Cancer Society's efforts to save lives by helping people stay well, by helping them get well, by finding cures and by fighting back.

Local volunteers are a huge part of a nationwide effort to save lives from cancer, but additional people are needed for the progress to continue. Plans are under way for the Society's annual fundraiser, Relay For Life®, which will be held at Gibbons Park on August 4-5, 2012.

Many of the participants are cancer survivors, which serves as a reminder that Carmichael is not immune to this disease and that by participating in Relay, we are joining with the American Cancer Society's efforts to create a world with less cancer and more birthdays.

Funds raised at Relay For Life of Carmichael are enabling the American Cancer Society to impact the lives of those touched by cancer within the community. The money raised at Relay enables the American Cancer Society to deliver on its mission of helping people stay well, helping people get well, finding cures and fighting back against the disease.

Relay For Life's Luminaria Ceremony takes place after sundown, honoring the community's cancer survivors and remembering those lost to the disease. Participants will circle a track that is surrounded with glowing luminaria that bear the name of someone who has battled cancer.

Veterans Get Help to Transition to Civilian Workforce

SACRAMENTO REGION the licensure process, direct line the state's economy." civilian workforce may be eligible for some specialized assistance through the California Department of Consumer Affairs' Bureau of Security and Investigative Services (Bureau). The Bureau has developed the Veterans Come First program for veterans who want to leverage their military training to become licensed as security guards, private patrol operators, firearms instructors, or other licensee of the Bureau.

Veterans will receive priority services including priority in

Veterans returning to the telephone numbers and email contact information, and email or phone notification as soon as their licenses are approved. They will also be assigned their own personal Bureau staff person to support them through the licensing process.

"Supporting veterans in their transition from military service to civilian employment is a win-win for California," said Department of Consumer Affairs Director Denise Brown. "They get back the civilian workforce quickly, and California reaps the benefit of their contribution to

Gas Prices **Keep Dropping**

SACRAMENTO REGION-Average retail gasoline prices in Sacramento have fallen 10.2 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.90 per gallon. This compares with the national average that has fallen 3.2 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.53, according to gasoline price website SactoGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Sacramento during the past week, prices were 9.6 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 35.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago. The national average has decreased 17.6 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 12.6 cents per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"I have a sneaking suspicion that the election in Greece may stir up oil prices this week, and we could see oil prices gain as markets feel more upbeat about the economic situation," said GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst Patrick DeHaan.

GasBuddy operates SactoGasPrices.com and over 250 similar websites that track gasoline prices at over 140,000 gasoline stations in the United States and Canada. In addition, GasBuddy offers a free smartphone app which has been downloaded over 20 million times to help motorists find gasoline prices in their area.

CARMICHAEL - Over 350 nature lovers supported the recent "Painting where the Wild Things are" gala in Carmichael. The

event raised funds for the Effie Yeaw Nature Center and the American River Natural History Association (ARNHA).

Held at the Nature Center, the al-fresco banquet offered food,

wine and nature-themed art, largely contributed by Sacramento Fine Arts Center members. VIP art donations came from Terry Pappas, Maria Winkler, Gregory Kondos and David Peterson. For

a late addition, the celebrity trio of Marcy Friedman, Pat Mahony and Boyd Gavin whipped up a river study that fell for \$2200.

In the shadows of Carmichael bluffs, the celebration has become an annual tradition for those who support the educational and leisure opportunities of our river parkway. The Nature Center's 70-acre preserve nestles in an area once know as Deterding Woods. The Nature Center is named for the beloved Carmichael naturalist Effie Yeaw, who protected wildlife and taught children to appreciate their natural environment. Her vision helped to establish the the American River Parkway, linked from nearly 30 miles of public reserves.

"For us, success is getting a job after passing the test," she explains, adding that the Stride Center assists students in getting job opportunities after graduation. The next class starts on July 16th.



5) CHOOSE YOUR BATTLES: There are times when we need to relinquish our need to be right in our conversations with our children, and choose closeness instead. We can choose to be close by identifying with our children's struggles and listening to their feelings.

6) BE CURIOUS: Be interested in your children's lives. Ask them how they are doing and what's new with them. By being curious, you give them the message they are important and you're thinking of them.

7) CONFER REGULARLY WITH YOUR INNER CHILD: When our children struggle, stop and think about what you wanted to hear from your father at that age. Let that compassion shape what you say and how you say it.

The good news that, as fathers, we received distorted messages in our own childhoods. But we can give our children the healthy messages denied to us. Tom's father gave him the message that if he made enough money, all his problems would disappear. Yet, in adulthood, he never

understood why he felt so sad when he witnessed a dad playing with his son, and why this created such sadness within him as an adult. He was grieving a childhood he never had, and he didn't want his children to be deprived of the childhood they deserved. As an adult, he learned to give his kids what his own father hadn't been able to give to him...their hero. He supplied guidance to his children when they needed it, but he also gave them a shoulder to cry on and an ear to hear their feelings and thoughts as well. Heroes can cry too, even if society tells them real men don't cry. Heroes let their children explore who they want to be, instead of imprisoning them in predefined roles... roles that we as parents want them to play.

The feats of the heroes he describes won't make the front page of the newspaper. But what love can equal the love and admiration seen reflected in the eyes of your own child? Thomas Gagliano sees that love and admiration in the eyes of his own children. Wouldn't you like to see the same thing? His book is called "The Problem Was Me." Have a wonderful Father's Day!!!





Another Year, Another Fake Budget

Budget assumes tax increase, contains no reform and increases total spending over \$12 Billion

SACRAMENTO -- Senator Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) and a bipartisan group of Senators voted against approving Governor Brown's state budget proposal Friday (June 15th).

The annual budget approved by a vote of 23-16, with two Democrats joining Republicans in opposition, increases spending by \$12.9 Billion over last year. Under the approved plan California will spend \$225.6 billion (including the general fund and special funds). "Business as usual continues in Sacramento today," said Senator LaMalfa. "Another year goes by and the legislature makes more pie in

the sky assumptions about magically appearing state revenue and the citizens wanting to tax themselves even more. Nothing in this budget reforms a state program, moves to eliminate waste or deals with pension reform. Bottom line, total spending increases and this year's budget becomes the largest in California history.'

Total spending has increased in California by \$31.3 billion since the onset of the recession in 2007-08. "This budget was designed with one objective in mind, to extort voters into supporting taxes while protecting the bureaucracy. When this

budget falls apart in a few short months there will be no threat to the vast amounts of administration and those who the public will never meet. Instead, teachers and public safety will be placed on the chopping block," continued LaMalfa. "It is a shameful tactic and one the voters will reject."

Senator Doug LaMalfa is a lifelong farmer representing the fourth Senate District including Shasta, Tehama, Butte, Colusa, Glenn, Siskiyou, Sutter, Del Norte, Placer, Trinity, Yuba and Nevada counties.

Dems Pass Budget Passed Without Transparency and Relies on \$8.5 Billion Tax Hike

SACRAMENTO - North State Assemblyman and Chief Republican Whip, Dan Logue (R-Marysville) expressed disappointment with the passing of the majority party's budget on June 15th, saying it shows how misguided the priorities are of Sacramento liberals. "Sacramento will not succeed in taxing California into prosperity – it has never happened anywhere," said Logue. The budget passed today by the majority party places the Golden State on the path to an economy and credit rating that, in my opinion will rival that of Greece. This budget serves only as a testament to how out of touch Sacramento liberals are with California's hard-working families."



My son is a freshman in college. Do you think he should work during his first year in school or focus all his attention on his classes?

Dear Ben.

I don't think there's anything wrong with either direction during their first year of college. But as a parent, I'd urge you not to fall into the trap of thinking that a kid's grades will go down if they work while in school. Research shows that kids who work while in college carry higher grade point averages than those who don't.

To me, the reason for this is pretty simple. If you're working and going to school at the same time, you have to learn how to manage your life and your time effectively. Lots of kids could pay their way through college, and not have to worry with student loans, if they just used the time they spend on social activities and watching television at a job.

I never required my kids to work during the school year. But they all have good work ethics, and they're definitely not bums. During the summer, though, there was no such thing

as sitting around. They had jobs. My youngest just finished his sophomore year, and he's already started a job. Being a vegetable for the entire summer is useless, and we don't do useless in our family.

But the philosophy of not wanting a kid to work so they can spend all their time studying is misguided. For the most part, kids who work while they're in school will make better grades and develop into more mature and well-rounded individuals. And besides, if they're working they can't waste all their time playing beer pong!

Dear Cameron,

So, you're looking at moving to California with \$2.500 in your pocket, a car payment, and

no job waiting. This is a disaster waiting to happen, my friend. Don't get me wrong. I want you to live your dream, but I don't want it turning into a nightmare.

There's no way I'd take a car payment to California. And you're going to need a lot more than just \$2,500, unless you have a job lined up. Even if there's work waiting for you, \$2,500 will disappear in about 20 minutes in Los Angeles.

Slow down and take your time. Plan a trip to the coast and figure out what your living arrangements and expenses are going to look like first. Then, line up a job that will pay you enough to cover your expenses. In the meantime, save up enough money to fix your car, or if it's in really rough shape, to buy a good, used one.

Once all this is done, then you make the move - without a car payment. Moving when you're broke with no job prospects and a car payment hanging around your neck is a recipe for disaster!

Servicing means the furnishing of electric current or energy for the operation or lighting of any improvements, and water for irrigation of any





A Case in Point



The necessity defense and its close relative, duress, are strategies used by criminal defense attorneys. The attorney concedes that the defendant committed the acts alleged by the prosecution, but then argues that the defendant was reacting to some imminent and grievous threat that left him or her with little choice.

To illustrate the necessity defense, let's examine the case of U.S. v. Lopez (1987). We pick up the story not in a courtroom, but in a jewelry store in Citrus Heights.

On November 15, 1986, the employees of Merskamer Jewelers, located in the Birdcage shopping center off Sunrise Avenue, noticed that a man and a woman had returned to the store. The couple wanted to know if the wedding rings they had ordered were ready. It was their third appearance at the store within a few days. Their behavior aroused the suspicion of store clerks they purchased more than \$5,000 of jewelry in less than 15 minutes, were unsure of their address and had no telephone. Fifteen federal marshals closed in and the couple was arrested. Inside the man's briefcase were a 9-mm Browning and a .357 Magnum.

The federal marshals arrested Samantha Dorinda Lopez, 37, and Ronald J. McIntosh, 42. Ten days earlier, McIntosh helped Lopez escape from a low-security federal prison in the East Bay town of Pleasanton., where Lopez was serving time for bank robbery. McIntosh, who had been convicted for running an \$18 million financial swindle, was also being sought by authorities after going AWOL during an unescorted prison transfer. The two felons met at the Pleasanton prison, which contained facilities

for men and women.

McIntosh and Lopez said they were deeply in love - although both were married to other people. McIntosh, who flew helicopters in Vietnam, chartered a private helicopter in San Jose, posing as a real estate developer who wanted to inspect some property. He hijacked the helicopter at gunpoint, released the frightened pilot, and landed the helicopter at the recreation yard of the Pleasanton prison, where Lopez ran out to join him. The two flew away as prison guards watched helplessly and inmates cheered. There was no trace of the fugitives until they surfaced at the jewelry store in Citrus Heights.

Court said of McIntosh.
"Women have been the downfall of a lot of great men
– and even some not so great."

At trial, Lopez's attorney wanted to present the necessity defense to the jury. Lopez, he claimed, was being abused and threatened by the warden and prison guards. Lopez feared that she would be murdered and her death made to look like a suicide. She had no choice but to escape, the lawyer asserted, and McIntosh gallantly offered to rescue her. Federal prosecutors sought to prevent the necessity defense from being included in the jury instructions (what the judge reads to the jury members just before they go into deliberations). The issue went before a federal court.

The court reasoned that the necessity defense "requires a showing that the defendant acted to prevent an imminent harm which no available options could

similarly prevent." The court ruled in favor of Lopez, saying that the necessity defense could be considered by the jury on all counts. As to McIntosh, the court allowed the necessity defense against the charges of aiding and abetting the escape, but blocked its use in relation to air piracy and use of a gun to commit a crime.

It is one thing to gain the right to make an argument, and another thing to get a jury to buy the argument. This jury was not persuaded. Both Lopez and McIntosh were found guilty as charged. Lopez was sentenced to an additional five years in prison, on top of her 50-year sentence for bank robbery. McIntosh was sentenced to 25 years in addition to his sentence for fraud.

Epilogue: Merksamer Jewelers is still in business in Citrus Heights. Many prisons have placed wires and netting over outdoor areas to prevent similar airborne escapes. These wires are known as "chopper stoppers."

Regarding the two defendants, I checked the Inmate Locator on the Web site of the Federal Bureau of Prisons. According to the data, Samantha Dorinda Lopez, aged 62, was released on April 20, 2010. There was no information on the status of Ronald J. McIntosh.


