Carmichael - In a weekend remembrance ceremony, Carmichael Park District and bereaved families honored fallen sons.

Central to Patriots Park (Palm Ave, near Dewey and madison) a Wall or Honor bears plaques naming local men who died in service to community or nation since the Carmichael Park District began. While there is provision for more names, no new plaques were added to the monument this year. Instead, a ceremony recalled the sacrifice of 12 Carmichael and Fair Oaks' heroes

**County Supervisor Susan Peters** paid tribute to the fallen and praised the monument's role. "For families in attendance today, we offer thanks," she said. "Patriots Park has been embraced by the community since it opened in 2008. We hope it is a source of continued pride and remembrance."

To some families, the Wall of Honor serves as a symbolic grave stone. During Operation Desert Shield, US Navy fighter pilot

Lt. David Warne was lost in the Mediterranean Sea. Though he is honored at Arlington National Cemetery, his body was never recovered. Still living in the same house where he grew up, the Warne family attended the weekend commemoration. Said David's father, Vietnam Silver Star recipient Col Evans Warne: "The Wall of Honor provides comfort that my son's sacrifice is recognized by people who come to this park."

Plaques represent men who wore the uniform of Army, Marines, Air Force and Navy. The CHP, Sacramento Sheriff's Department and Firefighters are also represented.

"In some ways, it's a wall of healing," said Jim Byrnes, whose brother

Robert was lost in Vietnam. "It enables us to talk about our loved ones and keep their memory going.'

Carmichael Park District allows more names to be added to the Wall of Honor each fall. Conditions apply. For nomination guidelines, call (916) 485-5322.

Footnote: Several of the Wall's honorees are also named on Carmichael's Vietnam War Memorial. Situated in the Earl Koobs Nature Area (5325 Engle Rd), the memorial will host Veterans' Day observances this Friday, November 11, at 11 a.m. Anvone may attend.

# Aerospace Museum of California Honors Veterans Day and Partners with "Support 4 Soldiers" to Help Wounded Warriors

Sacramento – The Aerospace Museum of California (AMC) (www.aerospaceca.org) announced a special tribute on Friday, November 11, in honor of Veterans Day from 9:00am to 5:00pm with a brief ceremony honoring all veterans at 11:00 a.m. The Air Force Sergeant's Association of Sacramento is hosting the Museum's Veterans Day event and the program will be held at the AMC's Memorial Plaza with a tribute to the flag, followed by the National Anthem, a wreath laying, and will conclude with remarks. Special Museum admission of \$5.00 per person (children under the age of five are free) will be available all day.

"We want to honor and thank

all veterans for serving this great nation," said Roxanne Yonn, executive director of the Aerospace Museum of California. "We encourage visitors to enjoy a day at the Museum, be inspired and give thanks to the men and women (both past and present) who served and sacrificed for the freedoms we enjoy today."

The community is also invited to donate much needed items to wounded warriors currently stationed in Afghanistan. The AMC has partnered with local non-profit organization, Support 4 Soldiers, and will serve as a drop off point for donations specifically for soldiers that have been injured in battle and are currently recuperating. Soldiers arrive straight from the battlefield and do not have anything with them. For this particular program all donations must be dropped off by November 11th.

Representatives for Support 4 Soldiers will be at the Museum all day on Veterans Day and will be on hand to collect donations and answer questions. Items needed are:

- Warm clothes such as hoodies, jackets, sweatpants, gloves, etc. - Shoes and flip flops (for shower shoes)
- Twin size bed sheets
- Blankets
- Sunglasses (black only)
- Snacks (candy, beef jerky, granola bars, sunflower seeds, etc.)
- Anything for entertainment

such as games, books, movies, music. etc.

Monetary donations will also be accepted and will be used to defray shipping costs and/or purchase additional requested items. Donations are tax deductible; for more information please visit Support 4 Soldiers. In addition, attendees can color pictures, sign cards and flags or just send their thoughts and gratitude to the troops overseas. The organization will also have information on hand regarding its holiday care package program.

Active duty military service members receive free admission to the Museum. To receive free admittance visitors must present a military ID. Admission for the

general public is \$5.00.



# **Senator Gaines Receives Perfect Score on 2011 Taxpayer Report Card**

Sacramento – Senator Ted Gaines (R-Roseville) recently announced that he has scored 100 percent on the California Taxpayers Association's (CalTax) 2011 Voting Record.

Gaines was one of only 30 state

legislators out of the 120 Assembly and Senate members to receive the top score. 



Recent cases of interest

CASE: Dejon Wayne Murray, Kenneth Oliver Owens Jr. & Maurice Edward Reed Jr. (10/20/11) **PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Kevin Greene** 

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Dejon Murray, Kenneth Owens and Maurice Reed were each convicted by three separate juries of first degree murder for the shooting death of Natomas High School Assistant Football Coach Salvador Heredia-Arriaga.

On March 26, 2010, Heredia-Arriaga went to visit his friends at an apartment in South Natomas. He was shot and killed by the defendants after he walked by as they were robbing a pot dealer.

Sentencing is set for November 18, 2011 in Department 19 in front of the Honorable Patrick Marlette.

#### CASE: Matthew David Riley (10/26/11)

**PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Chris Ore** 

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Matthew Riley was convicted by jury of two counts of first degree murder for the killing of his parents, Steve and Linda Riley. The jury also found true the multiple murder special circumstance.

In December 2008, Riley went to his parent's South Natomas home and stabbed them to death.

Riley faces a sentence of life without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for December 2, 2011 at 11:00 a.m. in Department 32 in front of the Honorable Gary S. Mullen.

#### CASE: Arthur Temblador (10/28/11) **PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Rob Gold**

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that 36 year-old Arthur Temblador was sentenced yesterday by the Honorable Gary Ransom to 4 years, 4 months in prison after pleading guilty to four felony charges involving sexual misconduct. He is also required to register as a sex offender for life.

Temblador was a coach for the Everton Soccer Club in Elk Grove. From the summer of 2010 through spring 2011, Temblador engaged in sexual misconduct with one of his players. The victim was between the ages of 15-16 years old at the time and the conduct occurred in four different counties.

#### **CASE: Sheila Caceres**

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that the charge of felony child endangerment has been filed against Sheila Caceres. Caceres operated Garden Daycare, a large daycare facility in Mather, in Sacramento County. On February 23, 2011, a two month old child, Avin R., died while at the facility. Caceres is also charged with a misdemeanor violation of fire safety regulations.

Caceres was arrested by Sheriff's Officers, booked into the County Jail, and released on a \$50,000 bail. Her arraignment is scheduled for November 4, 2011 at 10:30 a.m. in Department 8 of the Superior Court.

Since this is now a pending prosecution, the District Attorney will not be making any additional comment on the case

#### CASE: Anthony Medina, Brandon Morton & David Whitehead (10/27/11) **PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Andrew Smith**

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Anthony Medina, Brandon Morton and David Whitehead were convicted by jury for the first degree murder of Jason Fletcher with the special circumstance of attempted robbery.

Medina was also found guilty of two counts of first degree attempted murder with the use of a gun and shooting into an occupied vehicle driven by Angelo Granados and Miguel Ramos. Morton and Whitehead were also found to have personally used a gun during the commission of the crime.

On May 2, 2008, the three defendants were together driving down Florin Road when Medina fired several shots into a car driven by Granados. Each victim suffered a gunshot wound to the leg. Three days later on May 5, 2008, the three defendants met Jason Fletcher and two of his friends on Brookfield in South Sacramento. After a dispute over drugs, Morton shot and killed Jason Fletcher during an attempted robbery.

The three defendants are facing a sentence of life without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for December 9, 2011 at 9:00 a.m. in Department 26 before the Honorable Michael Savage.

#### CASE: Vicente Perez (10/28/11)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Michael Blazina, Real Estate Fraud Unit


District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that 40 year-old Vicente Perez of Sacramento pled no contest to demanding and collecting illegal advanced fees for loan modification services.

Perez was an employee of Turbo Mortgage Modification, which offered mortgage loan modification services. In 2010, Perez demanded and accepted illegal advance fees from three victims. Perez was placed on 3 years of probation, ordered to serve 30 days in county jail, and pay \$2,800 in restitution to the victims. He has also prohibited from engaging in any business activity involving real estate while on probation.

This matter was investigated and prosecuted by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office Real Estate Fraud Unit.



# **Chemical Castration:** Not the Best for Children

#### Commentary

The American College of Pediatricians (The College) is alarmed by the increasingly prevalent and unscientific trend to treat Gender Identity Disorder (GID) in children as an inborn trait rather than as the treatable psychological condition it is. GID in children is manifest as a strong desire to be the opposite sex, and/or the belief that he or she actually is the opposite sex.

The story of a California physician who prescribed hormone blockers to an 11 year old boy to delay the onset of puberty and allow him more time to "decide" his gender, recently made national headlines. The boy's lesbian parents now call him Tammy instead of Tommy, and allow him to crossdress. This is scientifically and ethically disturbing.

Puberty is not a disorder. Psychologically dissociating from your biological gender is. Hormone blocking agents induce a disease state (the absence of puberty) at a critical time in a child's physical, emotional and mental development. Sex hormones not only trigger the

development of secondary sex characteristics, but also influence the development of the adolescent brain. This likely explains why most GID children come to accept their biological gender during adolescence.

Children and adults with GID experience higher rates of psychological distress. However, when the impact of hormone therapy (HT) and sex reassignment surgery (SRS) was studied among adults, the individuals were found to be suffering from the same pretreatment mental health disorders. Consequently, Johns Hopkins University shut down its premier program. When asked about blocking puberty in children Dr. Paul McHugh, professor of psychiatry at John's Hopkins remarked, "[GID] is a disorder of the mind. Not a disorder of the body. Dealing with it in this way is not dealing with the problem that truly exists.'

Dr. Kenneth Zucker is Psychologist-in-Chief at the Center for Addiction and Mental Health, where he heads the Child and Adolescent Gender Identity Clinic in Toronto, Canada. Dr. Zucker has

treated over 500 children with GID. He has documented that therapy relieves psychopathology within the family and child, reduces peer social ostracism and results in the acceptance of the child's birth sex in the vast majority of cases.

Dr. Michelle Cretella, Vice President of the College stated, "Physicians and therapists who embrace HT and SRS for children promote a political agenda not scientific advance. This is obvious once the euphemisms are shed: Chemical castration and the surgical mutilation of children is not 'therapy.' It is cold, calculated, institutionalized child abuse at the hands of those charged with healing."





# Wall of Honor's Celebrated Heroes

*Carmichael* – Commemorated by the Wall of Honor at Patriots Park are 12 heroes who fell in service to their nation or community. All either inhabited or served the Carmichael and Fair Oaks areas; many graduated from local schools. They are:

**CHP Officer Ronald E. Davis**. Died 1962 on a Southern California highway, while enroute to a vehicle accident.

**Army Specialist James E. Schlottman.** Killed 1967, by a booby trap in Vietnam.

Army Leiutenant Robert S. Byrnes. Died 1968, after enemy confrontation in Vietnam.

Air Force Captain Olin E. Gilbert Jr. (Vietnam War Silver Star recipient). Died 1968, during a Florida air training mission.

Army Sergeant Larry H. Morford. Killed 1970, leading a patrol in Vietnam.

Firefighter Dean W. Rhoades. Died after fighting a 1981 Carmichael house fire.

US Navy pilot Lieutenant J. G. David A Warne. Missing in Action during a 1989 Mediterranean mission from the air craft carrier America.

Marine and firefighter Sergeant Brian E. Dunlap. Died 2005, after a Bagdad roadside explosion.

Army Sergeant Ronalt L. Coffelt. Died after a 2007 bomb explosion in Bagdad.

Army Specialist Raymond N. Spencer Jr. Killed 2007, when his combat patrol was attacked in Bagdad.



# A Case in Point The Case of the **Speedy Deejay** By David Graulich, Esq.

During the 1960's and 1970's, the king of AM radio in Los Angeles was a disc jockey named Don Steele. Known as "The Real Don Steele," he dominated his time slot by combining absurd comedy with Top 40 music and surfing tunes. Except for a stint at San Francisco's KEWB, Steele's glory years were with KHJ ("Boss Radio-93") in Los Angeles.

Steele had a running joke during his show. A pre-recorded woman's voice screamed, "Tina Delgado is alive! Alive!" (Looking back from a perspective of 40 years, I don't know why the line was funny. I suppose you had to be a teenager and live in Los Angeles to get the joke).

KHJ created a promotion in 1970, "The Super Summer Spectacular." Steele drove a speedy red car around Los Angeles and would pull over at an intersection or landmark. When KHJ announced his location, the first listener to see Steele's car and reach him won a cash prize and an on-air interview. Here are examples of what KHJ broadcast during the Summer Spectacular:

"The Real Don Steele is out driving – he could be in your neighborhood at any time and he's got bread to spread, so be on the lookout for him."

"The Real Don Steele is in the Valley near the intersection of Topanga and Roscoe Boulevard, right by the Loew's Holiday Theater, and he's standing there with a little money he would like to give to the first person to arrive....He's got twenty-five dollars to give away if you can get it..."

On July 16, 1970, two teenagers

– a male aged 17, and a 19-year-old female – were driving their cars when they heard on KHJ that Steele was arriving in Canoga Park. They got there a little late and caught sight of Steele's car on the freeway. Both young drivers began racing after Steele, reaching speeds of over 80 miles an hour.

When Steele's vehicle took the Westlake exit, both pursuers also exited at high speeds. The teenagers forced another car off the road and onto a center divider, where it flipped over. The driver of the overturned car, a man named Weirum, was killed.

The decedent's wife and children sued RKO General, the corporation that owned KHJ (Don Steele was not a defendant). The key issue was this: Was it foreseeable that the radio station's Summer Spectacular would induce teenagers to drive negligently?

At trial, a jury returned a verdict in favor of the Weirum family. RKO appealed, and the case went before the California Supreme Court.

RKO argued that Mr. Weirum's death was caused by third parties, not by the radio station. Did a broadcaster have to consider everything that it aired in terms of what it MIGHT stimulate a listener to do, because it had liability for the listener's subsequent behavior? That would put a chilling effect on free speech, in violation of the First Amendment.

The jury, RKO contended, had widened the scope of third-party liability to a ludicrous extent. What if a department store advertised a "while-they-last" sale, and shoppers

racing to the store caused an accident? Would a college sports team be liable to a fan who was trampled in a crowd's rush to buy Rose Bowl tickets?

The Supreme Court's decision: The jury got it right. RKO had liability to the Weirum family.

It was entirely foreseeable, said the Court, that idle teenagers during summer vacation would race after Steele to win prize money. It was foreseeable that some of those teenagers would drive recklessly. Unlike the department store or sports team analogies,

"the thrill of the chase" — a competitive scramble on public streets - was central to the radio station's contest, not incidental.

The Court also rejected the free speech argument: "The First Amendment does not sanction the infliction of physical injury merely because achieved by word, rather than act." KHJ could have entertained its listeners and increased advertising revenues by devising a contest format that didn't put the motoring public at risk, the Court said.

As for Don Steele, he continued to be successful in LA radio, converting from AM to FM stations and appearing in movies and TV shows. The Real Don Steele died on August 5, 1997 at the age of 61.

Duds. The so-called "Game of the Century" fell quite a bit short of that lofty presumption. The match up between the two top college teams, LSU and Alabama, was resolved in sloppy fashion in overtime. Mistakeprone Alabama failed miserably with its overtime possession, resulting in its fourth missed field goal of the game. That set the Tigers up for a short game-winning kick and a 9-6 victory that featured zero touchdowns.

The quarterbacks weren't worth a nickel. It may not have even been the best game of the day. The Oakland Raiders' defense

was the big dud Sunday in the NFL, allowing nearly 300 yards rushing to the visiting Denver Broncos, including 117 by rookie quarterback Tim Tebow. It was a disturbing return to form of recent years by the Raiders (4-4), committing 15 penalties for 130 yards in the 38-24 loss.

The Washington Redskins' offense filled the dud role in its 19-11 home loss to the San Francisco 49ers. The impotent hosts, who went scoreless the previous week, managed only a team-record 59-yard field goal on the final play of the first half and, finally, a touchdown with under three minutes left against "prevent defense" of sorts. Rodgers, every football fan's bud and stud these days, is following up his Super Bowl winning season with one in which he is on pace to break several all-time QB records. It will be mighty interesting if Rodgers and his Green Bay Packers (8-0) face a revived QB Alex Smith and the 49ers (7-1) in the playoffs. Drafted No. 1 over Rodgers in 2005, it would be the ultimate test for Smith, who will also be tested next week against the New York Giants (6-2), and in Baltimore, and against the Pittsburgh Steelers before season's end.

The baseball Giants traded pitcher Jonathan Sanchez for 27-year old stud outfielder Melky Cabrera of Kansas City. He will make plenty of buddies in S.F. if he duplicates last year's stats: .305 average with 201 hits, 44 doubles, 18 homers, 87 RBI and 20 steals.

A couple of other baseball buds deserve at least a tip of the cap -Matty Alou and Bob Forsch - who passed away last week.

Alou started with the Giants and once played in the all-brothers outfield with siblings Felipe and Jesus. He batted .307 over 15 years and won a batting title in Pittsburgh. I remember him beating out a bunt to start the ninth-inning rally that fell just short against the Yankees in the seventh game of the 1962 World Series.

Forsch, a native of Sacramento, was a respected mound presence over 16 seasons, going 168-136, with the Cardinals and Astros. He hurled two no-hitters and brother Ken pitched one; the only brother combo to do so. He batted .213 with 12 homers lifetime.


