Another Good Reason

More than 4.6 million Californians expected to travel

Californians have been hit hard this year with on-going high fuel prices, unemployment concerns and a sluggish economy. AAA's July 4th travel forecast survey reveals that these factors have helped to cause a decrease in overall travel plans for this upcoming Independence Day holiday weekend.

According to AAA, during the upcoming 4th of July celebration holiday weekend more than 4.6 million Californians are projected to travel 50 miles or more from their homes. This represents a 2.3 percent decrease compared to last year.

"Travelers are definitely feeling the budgetary squeeze this year," says AAA Northern California spokesperson Cynthia Harris. 'Although some Californians may be postponing their travel plans, many others are bucking the economic headwinds by opting for shorter vacations and by cutting back on travel expenditures in order to afford a weekend getaway."

The 4th of July marks one of the busiest national holidays. This year, AAA projects more than 3.6 million Californians will drive to reach their holiday destinations. That's a 2.9 percent decrease when compared to 2010. Air travel will increase by 1.7 percent, with more than 541,000 Californians expected to take to the skies to reach their holiday destinations. More than 430,000 state residents plan to travel by other modes of transportation, such as rail, buses and watercraft. This represents a decrease of 2.6 percent when compared to travel figures from last year.

Nationally, AAA forecasts just over 39 million people will travel 50 miles or more during the 4th of July holiday weekend, representing a 2.5 percent decrease compared to last year.

Independence Day holiday weekend airfares are expected to increase by 11 percent, with the lowest roundtrip rate averaging \$213 per ticket, to top 40 U.S. air routes, according to AAA Leisure Travel Index. Hotel rates at AAA Three Diamond lodgings are increasing by three percent this year, when compared to 2010. They're averaging \$147 per night. Weekend car rentals are also forecasted to increase by three percent, to an average weekend rate of \$56. A West Coast family of four is expected to spend an average of \$782 over the weekend, while the average road trip will cover 602 miles.

According to AAA's survey, the primary leisure activities for Californians celebrating the nation's birthday will be dining, visiting family and friends, traveling to the beaches and waterfront areas, shopping, and sightseeing. Approximately 30 percent of California residents said they will be traveling with family members.

For Independence Day vacation planning travelers may use AAA's digital eTourbook guides for smartphones and ereader devices. Along with the TripTik Mobile app, AAA offers iphone and Android versions of AAA Discounts and AAA Roadside. Using GPS technology, AAA Discounts displays nearby locations that offer AAA members a Show Your Card & Save discount and AAA Roadside transmits a user's location, and other details, related to a vehicle breakdown when they request AAA Roadside Assistance.

Recent California Grads at Top of Their Game Choose to Teach

At a time when education news headlines lead with layoffs and budget cuts, the 2011 Knowles Science Teaching Foundation (KSTF) Fellows from California are choosing to impact the future through teaching. Despite the increasingly negative rhetoric about teachers and education in the U.S., these highachieving recent grads are bringing their passion for science education into the nation's high schools. In a highly competitive selection process, KSTF, an advocate for new teachers and the teaching profession, has awarded these beginning educators from California fellowships in physical science, mathematics, and biology valued at up to \$150,000 over five years.

The 2011 California KSTF Teaching Fellows are:

• Jessica Scheimer, Physical Science Teaching Fellow

The Sacramento native will begin her teaching career at Jesuit High School in Carmichael, California. Ms. Scheimer is currently earning her teaching credential from the University of California Davis where she has conducted astrophysics research, taught labs, and mentored high school students enrolled in the university's research program.

• Johanna Langill, Mathematics Teaching Fellow

Ms. Langill discovered teaching

as a way to combine her love for mathematics and explaining things to others. She is earning her teaching credential from the University of California Berkeley. She has spent a year studying international perspectives on math education at Cambridge University and summers volunteer teaching in Central America. Johanna is from the Sacramento area.

• Monica Sircar, Biology Teaching Fellow, from the Bay Area. She is currently earning her teaching credential from the University of University of California Berkeley and will begin her teaching career in High Tech High Media Arts High School in San Diego.

• Carissa Filice, Chemistry Teaching Fellow, a Gilroy native, is earning her teaching credential from the Stanford Teacher Education Program and has worked in a national laboratory conducting research alongside scientists.

"These beginning educators are countering every negative public perception of teachers, including the naïve cliché of 'those who can't, teach," said Dr. Nicole Gillespie, Associate Director for Teaching Fellowships. "They are highly talented individuals who are committed to a career in science and mathematics education for the long term. This program exists solely to support them and other KSTF Fellows and invest in their development as masterful teachers."

The need for accomplished math and science teachers cuts across all states. A report published by the Business Higher Education Forum (BHEF) points to a projected national shortfall of more than 280,000 new mathematics and science teachers by 2015. The thirty-six incoming

excited about their prospects.

"I might personally touch only a handful of students each year, but if every teacher has such an impact on a few students, we are reaching a generation," said Ms. Scheimer.

KSTF empowers its Fellows to think critically and creatively about the teaching of mathematics and science. Explicitly designed to meet the needs of beginning teachers from the onset of the credentialing process through the early years of their careers, the KSTF Fellowship includes professional and leadership development, teaching tools and materials, and access to a network of like-minded colleagues nationwide.

"Nearly half of all teachers leave the field within the first five years, and the most highly qualified are the most likely to leave," said Dr. Gillespie. "KSTF is working to understand why this happens and what it would take to reverse the trend, particularly for high school math and science teachers. We believe that the key is developing

teacher leaders and advancing the national dialogue about the complexity and challenge of the teaching profession."

The 2011 KSTF Fellows are committed to reaching students from diverse backgrounds, with realworld approaches to teaching that make mathematics and science relevant to their students' lives.

"I envision mathematics classrooms


balancing procedural abilities with inquiry and discovery, said Ms. Director. "Students need to understand what is behind mathematics and

see its purpose in the real world." KSTF awarded its first four Teaching Fellowships in 2002. To date, there are 190 Teaching Fellows and alumni nationwide across 40 states. Since the program's incep-

tion, KSTF Fellows have impacted

more than 150,000 students.

The Knowles Science Teaching Foundation (KSTF) was established by Janet H. and C. Harry Knowles in 1999 to increase the number of high quality high school science and mathematics teachers and ultimately improve math and science education in the United States. The KSTF Teaching Fellowship, the Foundation's signature program, awards exceptional young men and women with a five-year early-career fellowship, empowering them to become master teachers and leaders in education. 





Why You Can't Afford Food and Gas

The Federal Reserve Is why!

The Federal Reserve is supposed to promote full employment and stable prices, yet its actions cause jobs to disappear and prices to rise. This should come as no big surprise, at least it shouldn't if you're not inclined to think government intervention is either desirable or productive. The Fed is government intervention at its purest: the central bank with the legal monopoly on the creation of new money.

The Fed has essentially one trick. It can legally conjure new money whenever it wants. With this one trick it manages to force interest rates down. Mainly it lends the new money to the U.S. government. That is to say, it buys government bonds.

The artificial demand the Fed creates by throwing billions of dollars at government bonds has a depressive effect on interest rates. But these lower interest rates are not a result of those free market forces we champion at the Whiskey Bar. Rather, they are the result of the machinations of a government-chartered bank with a monopoly on the issuance of currency.

The Federal Reserve's goal is to make borrowing more attractive because of the lower interest rates... but the boom that results is one built on debt that must eventually be serviced...and inevitably at higher rates.

The Fed also loves it when lower ates make lending money or putting it in interest bearing savings accounts less attractive to investors. People instead seek returns in other markets...like stocks. This is supposed to be a good thing. Notice Ben Bernanke points to a rising stock market as proof that his orchestrations were masterful.

But all he really did—all central bankers really ever do-is create new money and shovel it into circulation. Creating money to encourage mass indebtedness and speculative investing, however, isn't exactly a winning strategy. It's like taking up

smoking so the nicotine will help vour concentration when you're picking the ponies. Or something like that.

You'll notice that the stock market is responding less and less to the byzantine stimulus of lower bond yields. And people are up to their eyeballs in debt, and interest rates are rising despite the Fed's efforts. This is your classic "pushing on a string" scenario. It's rather like the point at which more alcohol starts shutting down the imbiber's autonomic functions instead of producing more drunken bliss.

The stimulus of treasury-buying with new money is now having the opposite of the intended effect. After the initial euphoric response, things are getting worse.

And then there's the matter of all that new money...

We're not sure why central bankers and so many economists believe that new money can be created out of thin air—without any corresponding increase in economic activity or actual wealth—and inflationary results somehow be avoided...as if the new money will conveniently behave itself and keep from being used to bid up general price levels!

There wouldn't be much of a problem if the Fed had only created just a few hundred new dollars... even thousands. Enough, say, to buy the legal counterfeiters cool new cars and some snazzy threads. But we're talking about the creation of billions upon billions of new dollars here. Those dollars are sloshing their way through the economy and they're going to show up more and more in the general price levels. (Their very creation also makes some of the other big holders of U.S. debt—like the governments in Asia—worried about being paid back with money that's worth far less in real terms.)

Those new dollars have to get spent into circulation to do their damage, but that's never a problem. Whoever gets them first will get to benefit before prices go up (and those prices go up at all because the new money is being spent in the first place!)

Call to

Cui bono? Why, those to whom the Fed hands the dough first. Traditionally that's meant the government whose debt the Fed buys with the money it wills into existence, but lately the Fed has seen fit to hand new money straight to banks, because after all this is a crisis. Apparently you fix crises you engineered in the first place by bailing

The government uses that money to pay the staff in its countless departments, contractors, military and others counting on a government check. The banks use the money to pay their senior members enough to keep them in million-dollar

ers to give us raises that keep up with this mysterious price inflation. But it's really not so mysterious. It happens as the first-users of new money drive up the prices on the things we all need...


The new money doesn't simply go into the prices that the Fed would like it to, like stocks. It gets all over the place. The least connected, the very poorest farthest away from the new money feel the effects first. In our modern global system, that means that a family in a "developing country" will find themselves paying around half of their meager daily income for the food that used to take only a quarter of it. Eventually they may find that they can't afford much

The typical middle class American only just barely feeling the pinch now, but there's a lot more pain to be felt. In 2010 Americans spent around 5% of their incomes on food. Things could be a lot worse. In fact, they likely will be soon enough. Increased food and energy prices are currently only a drag on consumer spending. Eventually, however, the essentials could get costly enough to

The threat of mass starvation tends to lead to all sorts of unpleasantness. Individuals can do prepare by saving in real money (gold and silver and copper-nickel), but that does nothing to remedy the discontent and likely rioting from the millions of others who will not be so prepared.

We can't say how much of this future woe is already baked in. We do know that more quantitative easing will just make a bad situation worse. It's not idle speculation. History shows again and again that unbacked money creation by governments and central banks only leads to misery.

The pundits are debating whether or not QE3 will follow anytime soon or if will even follow at all. Let them hash it out. In the meantime, if you can't or won't get out of the U.S. entirely, you might want to consider at least not being in the middle of any large population centers.







If not exactly American Idol, Sacramento's Best of Broadway series annually plucks talented artists from obscurity and drops them center-stage.






