Mira Loma High School Takes Top Honors

Wins the 21st U.S. Department of Energy National Science Bowl

Washington, D.C. – The Mira Loma high school team from Sacramento won the 2011 U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) National Science Bowl on May 2nd at the National Building Museum in Washington D.C.

Mira Loma High School defeated Montgomery Blair High School from Maryland in the high school national championship match by correctly answering a chemistry question.

The high school national champions will receive an all-expense-paid trip in July to the International Science School in Sydney, Australia. Members of the winning high school team are Russell Islam, Siddharth Trehan, Andrew Chen, Anish Khare, Sriram Pendyala and are coached by James Hill.

At the awards ceremony, Secretary of Energy Steven Chu spoke to the more than 500 students and 100 teacher/coaches about the importance of science education to the Nation's economic and technological future.

"These students represent the great promise and potential of America's next great generation," said Secretary Chu. "I have no doubt that the exceptional talent and hard work that earned them the Science Bowl championship will serve them well throughout their lives, as they help our Nation tackle the crucial scientific and engineering

challenges we'll face in the years ahead. America's future will always be bright when we continue to invest in and support the young minds who will be tomorrow's innovators, pioneers and leaders. That's what the science bowl is all about."

One hundred ten teams from 44 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S.

Virgin Islands competed in this weekend's national finals of the 21st annual DOE National Science Bowl. Earlier this spring, more than 14,000 students from across the country participated in regional Science Bowls. Sixty-nine high school and 41 middle school regional Science Bowl champion teams received all-expense paid trips to compete in the National Finals in Washington, DC.

DOE created the National Science Bowl in 1991 to encourage students to excel in mathematics and science and to pursue careers in these fields. DOE supports mathematics and science education to help provide a technically trained and diverse workforce for the nation. More than 200,000 students have participated in the National Science Bowl throughout its 21 year history.

The top 16 high school and 8 middle school teams received a cash prize of \$1,000 for their school's science department.

DMV Launches New Notification Application

Sacramento – The next time your phone rings, it could be the California Department of Motor Vehicles on the line. The DMV is reaching out to its customers with a new, innovative Telephone Appointment Notification application.

"We are always searching for creative ways to use the latest technology to improve our customer service," said DMV Director George Valverde. "We understand life can sometimes get a little hectic and by offering this friendly, personal appointment reminder, we hope doing business with the DMV becomes the easy part of your busy day!"

Here is how it works: Three days prior to the scheduled appointment customers will receive a call

reminding them about the date, time, field office location and type of appointment. If no one answers, a voice message will be left on the phone.

The state-of-the-art system will dial up as many as 16,000 customers a day to make sure they do not miss appointments dealing with issues such as driver license, vehicle registration, special drive or vision tests, oral tests, and commercial drive tests.

Carmichael Artist Installs Public Art in Fremont Park

Sacramento – Fremont Park, in the City of Sacramento, is now graced with two sculptures by Carmichael artist Stephanie Taylor, who was commissioned by the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission, Art in Public Places Program, with partial funding for the project provided by Capitol Area Development Authority (CADA).

Two eye-catching, intricately detailed and brightly colored sculptures in the shape of vessels, titled "Confluence", by Stephanie Taylor, adorn a shaded patio area in Fremont Park that faces passersby on 16th Street. Taylor, who calls herself a visual historian, has covered the vessels with a myriad of hand-cast, carved, and applied historic elements, including topographical maps of California marking John C. Fremont's exploration of the west in the mid-1800s. From native flora and fauna, to serene orchard rows, "monopoly houses", grain silos, water ways, and freeway traffic jams, "Confluence" tells the story of the accumulation, abundance and diversity of human and natural resources in California since Fremont's historic journey.

Constructed with a core structure of steel and cement, the 7'-6" high vessels are covered with specialty cement that provides the background for hundreds of hand-made and found objects applied to the surface. The vessels are connected to one another visually by a 28' expanse of stained concrete, scored with a decorative compass rose, which repeats the map theme Taylor has incorporated into the artwork.

Stephanie Taylor draws artistic inspiration by exploring the connections between location, history, and humans in the urban environment and between the past and the present. She has numerous projects all over the United States, France, and Japan. Taylor has created more than 14 exterior murals in the greater Sacramento region, the most well known of which may be the Crocker

residents and visitors. With a strong belief that a thriving community includes public art, the Friends of Fremont Park worked closely with Stephanie Taylor and the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission on the placement of the vessels. They have also worked closely with the City of Sacramento Parks and Recreation Department and the Capitol Area Development Authority to program and maintain the park. The Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission, Art in Public Places Program was established by the City and County of Sacramento to provide visual art experiences in public locations through a percent-for-art program which reserves a portion of construction dollars from City, County or Redevelopment projects for public art.

The Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission is devoted to supporting, promoting and advocating for the arts in the region. Although most of Taylor's artwork has been created for the private sector including the Disney Corporation, she has several local public art commissions including "Migration", at the Valley Hi Library in Sacramento. Taylor earned a Bachelor of Art Degree in History from the University of California at Los Angeles, and a Masters of Sculpture Degree from California State University Sacramento. Stephanie's unique artwork complements a revitalized Fremont Park, thanks to the Friends of Fremont Park organization, whose primary objective over the last three years has been to establish the Park as a safe and pleasant place for community

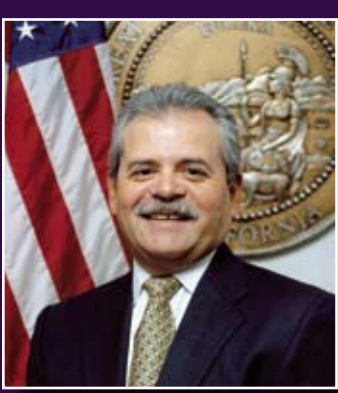

DMV: "Ask George"

Expert Answers to Common DMV Questions

Do you have questions about general driving related requirements like registration and insurance?

Are you unclear about laws and restrictions related to driving?

The California Department of Motor Vehicles has answers.

"Save Time by Going Online," at www.dmv.ca.gov.

Q: I've heard that California law requires me to turn on my headlights when it's raining, but my vehicle has daytime running lights. Isn't this sufficient?

A: No. The California Vehicle Code requires that you use your headlights - not just your daytime running lights - in several situations.

Your headlights must be turned on if it is cloudy, raining, snowing or foggy. If the weather requires that your windshield wipers be turned on, your headlights must also be turned on, as well as on frosty mornings when car windows are likely to be foggy, and on narrow country or mountain roads.

This is a safety measure that should be taken any time you have trouble seeing other cars - that means they probably have trouble seeing you! Using your headlights helps to avoid head-on collisions.

Q: I noticed an error on my driver license - my date of birth is incorrect. How can I have this fixed?

A: In this case, you'll have to apply for a correction of your driver license in person at your local DMV office and pay the applicable fees. However, you can save time by scheduling an appointment online at www.dmv.ca.gov. Bring your acceptable birth-date/legal presence documentation with you to your appointment, and be sure to double check and verify all personal information before submitting your forms to the DMV.

Q: I applied for and received my driver license several years ago at age 16. I am now 21 and have since grown several inches taller, and a few pounds heavier, than I was at

16. How can I have my driver license updated?

A: Height and weight changes can be common for many individuals. In this case, you must renew your driver license - in person and just be sure to fill in your new height and weight on the form. Review for accuracy before submitting your application, and the appropriate information should appear on your new driver license.

Q: I recently received a parking citation for parking in front of a fire hydrant, but the curb was not painted. Doesn't the curb have to be painted red to indicate no parking?

A: No. Unfortunately, your citation is valid. The California Driver Handbook clearly states that you are never to park within 15 feet of a fire hydrant, even if the curb is not painted. For future reference, please note that you cannot park within 15 feet of a fire station driveway, either. For more rules, regulations and other driver safety information, refer to The California Driver Handbook. You can easily download this document by going to www.DMV.ca.gov and clicking on the Publications tab.

Q: My license plate was recently stolen from my vehicle! How can I obtain a replacement, and how soon do I need to do it?

A: You must replace your stolen plate(s) either in person or by mail as soon as possible. (Note: this can be done by mail only if you are the registered owner of the vehicle and your address has not changed). If you'd like to replace your plate(s) in person, schedule an appointment with the DMV at www.dmv.ca.gov.

Additional information about the replacement process either in person or by mail is available at <http://www.dmv.ca.gov/pubs/brochures/howto/htrv11.htm>. Please plan on paying a replacement fee for your new license plate(s).

Q: I've heard that I can pay DMV fees online, but am concerned about identity theft. How can I be sure that my personal information will not be compromised?

A: The DMV makes every effort to keep your personal, confidential information secure. It is the DMV's job to protect your identity, and it has security measures in place to protect against loss, misuse, unauthorized access, or alteration of the information under its control. Information that is physically located within the Department is protected by various security measures as well.

There are certain legal situations in which your information might be released to law enforcement officers or federal agencies. To learn about these situations, you may visit <http://www.dmv.ca.gov/dl/authority.htm#protects>.

The DMV is a department under the Business, Transportation and Housing Agency, which is under the direction of Secretary Dale E. Bonner. The DMV licenses drivers, maintains driving records, registers and tracks official ownership of vehicles and vessels, investigates auto and identity-related fraud, and licenses car dealers, driving schools, and traffic violator schools. 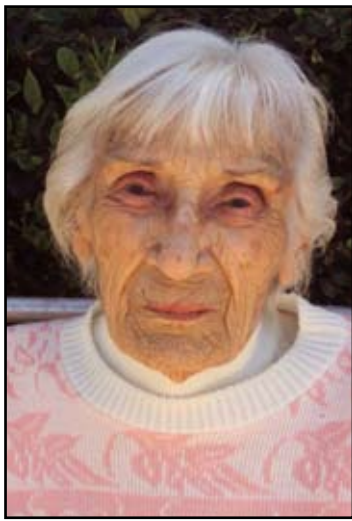

can down the street; not much traffic. That was lots of fun, and I belonged to Jobs Daughters.”

The family would spend their vacations in Santa Cruz, but didn’t travel much. “Cars weren’t all closed in, like they are now. You had to get out and put the side curtains on all around so the wind wouldn’t blow through the car.”

In 1942, while Marion was working for Metropolitan Life as administrative support, the Navy began recruiting for WAVES. “We’re starting a new phase in the war—women in the Navy.” She and her girlfriend signed up. “I was in the first group ever. I did training in Stillwater, Oklahoma, then, they stationed me in San Francisco. I was with the Sub Forces Commander of the South Pacific, stationed in the federal building. I was a pivotal person. When ships needed damage repair, our job was to find parts, and see that they got there the fastest way that we could to get the ships back in commission. That was very interesting. I did that for three years, until the war ended.”

Meanwhile, a cousin introduced Marion to her future husband. “He was a year ahead of me in high school. I knew who he was, but didn’t know

him. He was a real good dancer. We liked to dance. The college had dances all of the time. At one time, we belonged to a dance club – ballroom dancing.”

They had two children – a daughter and a son. “My folks and my husband’s family all helped with my babies. They taught me to feed them when they should be fed, laugh with them when they should be laughed with, attend sports activities with them, and all that.”

They spent their vacations in Santa Cruz. “One year, we went to Disneyland right after they opened, then over to Catalina Island. In Santa Cruz, we usually stayed in motels, but, eventually we had a cabin when the kids were a little older and spent our whole summer there. “

Widowed in 1973, Marion continued working for a credit union until her retirement. In approximately 1998, she moved to Carmichael to live with her son.

“I think I did a pretty good job with my children. They have good manners, respect everybody, show attention to their elders. You have kids and you never let them go. They’re still your kids always.”

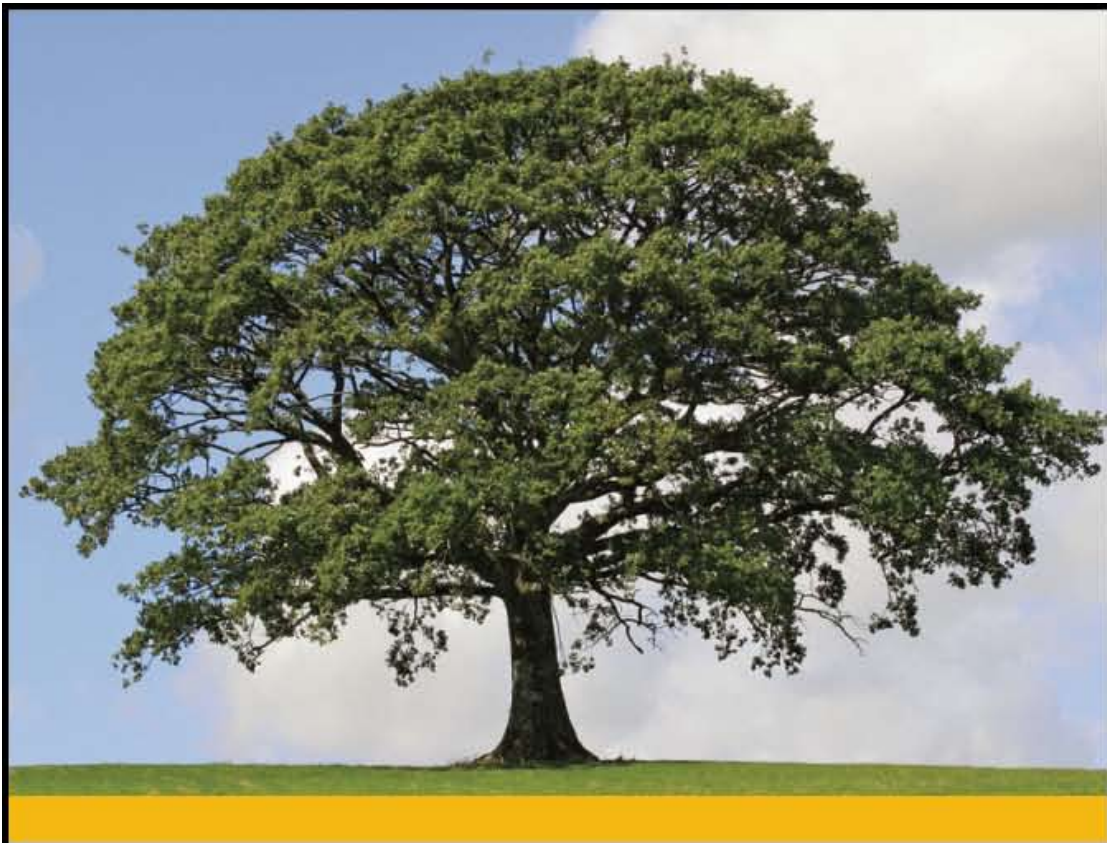

Two Redistricting Community Workshops to be Held Locally in May

Supervisor Susan Peters seeks public input at Open Houses in Carmichael and Arden Arcade

Sacramento County - The 2010 Census figures have been released showing a 16% increase in population for Sacramento County which will require district boundary adjustments for all five members of the Board of Supervisors. To seek input from residents about how the new district lines should be drawn, Supervisor Susan Peters will be hosting two open house community workshops during May in Carmichael and Arden Arcade.

Census data shows Sacramento County's population to be 1,418,788 which is 195,289 more residents than ten years ago. The Department of Voter Registration and Elections has prepared several plans for consideration to balance out the population in order to make each district as equal as possible while taking into account communities of interest.

To get the new districts ready for the upcoming 2012 election, the proposals are available for viewing at a number of community workshops

currently being held throughout Sacramento County. Residents can provide input on draft redistricting plans at those forums as well as learn more about the redistricting process.

Supervisor Susan Peters is hosting two open house community workshops in May. The first will be on Tuesday, May 17, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at the La Sierra

Community Center, 5325 Engle Road in Carmichael. The second will be on Thursday, May 26, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. at Swanston Park, 2350 Northrop Avenue in Arden Arcade. Information about other dates and locations are available online at elections.saccounty.net or call 875-5827.

"There has been a great deal of residential growth in the outer regions of the county while some older more established communities have experienced population decline. All this translates in big population swings affecting each district, said Peters. "For instance almost 40,000 people must be added to District 3 which poses a challenge when considering factors like communities of interest and natural borders."
