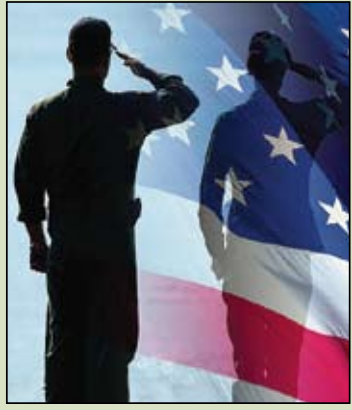

Spring Snowmelt Prompts Water Safety Warning



Outdoor Recreationists Should Take Precautions Against Cold Temperatures and Swift Currents When in or Near Water

Sacramento Region - The spring snowmelt has prompted a warning from Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) and the California Department of Boating and Waterways (DBW) urging outdoor recreationists to take precautions against cold and swift currents before entering the water.

The utility and state agency cautioned that snowpacks are slightly above normal for this time

of year. As warmer weather and longer days begins to melt snow in mountainous regions of the state, water temperatures will continue to drop and flows will continue to rise in waterways and reservoirs.

“Those planning outings near mountain streams, rivers, reservoirs and canals need to be extra vigilant and take appropriate safety measures,” said Alvin Thoma, director of PG&E’s power

generation department. “Water flows will fluctuate with the warming and cooling of the day so always be prepared for a change in conditions.”

“Snowmelt and resulting swift and cold river flows can create treacherous conditions for all recreationists – waders, swimmers, paddlers, boaters, anglers and even hikers cooling off at the water’s edge,” said DBW’s Interim Director Lucia C. Becerra. “Stay safe by

wearing a life jacket, avoiding alcohol and being aware of the current.”

Lakes and ponds are very attractive on warm spring days but are also cold. Rafters, kayakers, and canoeists should beware of fast river flows and cold water, and should exercise extreme caution by checking local conditions before undertaking their trip. Parents should also exercise caution with young children playing in or near the water.

Huber Reintroduces Bill to Stop Peripheral Canal without Legislative Vote

Sacramento - Assemblymember Alyson Huber (D-El Dorado Hills) and other Delta lawmakers joined with local representatives from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta communities this morning (April 26th) at a press conference to discuss legislation by Huber to prohibit construction of a peripheral canal through the Delta without a full fiscal analysis and vote of the state legislature.

Huber and others at the press conference, including co-authors Senator Lois Wolk and Assemblymember Mariko Yamada, stressed a critical need for legislative oversight that would be provided with the passage of Huber’s Assembly Bill 1594, set to be heard in the Assembly Committee on Water, Parks and Wildlife tomorrow at 9 a.m.

“We should not have an infrastructure project of this size without legislative oversight. The Legislature should do its job and give it an up-or-down vote once the full details and fiscal impact to residents of the state are penciled out,” said Huber, who grew up in the Delta and represents communities in San Joaquin and Sacramento counties.

The press conference, which was streamed live online so concerned Delta residents could participate, highlighted the fact that the new bureaucracy created in the Governor’s plan last year will decide whether to approve a peripheral canal and will set fees

for water users throughout the state. There will be no legislative oversight, limited input from the public, and no vote of the people on whether to build the canal.

AB 1594 prohibits the construction of a peripheral canal unless expressly authorized by the Legislature. It further requires the Legislative Analyst’s Office to complete an economic feasibility analysis prior to the enactment of a statute authorizing the construction of a peripheral canal.

The bill would also require that the construction and operation of a peripheral canal not diminish or negatively affect the water supplies, water rights, or quality of water for water users within the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta watershed.

A recent joint hearing of State Assembly and Senate committees on the funding and implementation of the 2009 legislative package on water raised many concerns about the Delta Stewardship Council and its ability to exercise its independent authority to develop the Delta Plan, in light of decisions being made by the Department of Water Resources and the Bay Delta Conservation Plan.

“This bill adds much-needed oversight to the existing process, specifically the actions of a group of unelected appointees many believe are likely to rubber stamp plans for a canal as suggested by the Governor and others,” concluded Huber.

Stanford Home for Children Receives Grants

Funding will support programs, including new art therapy center

Sacramento - In a year when grant funding has become increasingly competitive, Stanford Home for Children received three grants within six weeks to support its programs that ensure children are safe, healthy and connected to family. The gift from Rotary Club of Sacramento will be used to meet vulnerable Sacramento families’ most urgent practical needs so that they can focus on stabilizing their family. When children are in danger of being removed from their home, Stanford Home provides intensive, in-home counseling and support for the entire family. When necessary, Stanford Home provides essential necessities such as transportation, groceries, child care and clothing to help families focus on their treatment.

AT&T Foundation’s \$20,000 grant will fund a dedicated art therapy center for abused, neglected and mentally challenged children.

AT&T will be a founding partner in furnishing the center and training therapists with the tools to offer effective art therapy. The center is expected to open in late spring.

Vehicle Travels into Oncoming Traffic

On April 23, 2010, at approximately 12:54 p.m., Joshlynn Pendarvis, a 23 year old female from Sacramento was driving a red 1996 Ford Thunderbird on southbound Watt Avenue approaching the intersection of the eastbound I-80 off ramp in the #2 lane. As Pendarvis approached the intersection the light turned red and she proceeded through the intersection. She realized traffic ahead of her was stopped; she turned her vehicle to the left traveling across the #1 lane and striking the center median where her vehicle became airborne. The Ford traveled directly 3500 County Works truck that was traveling in the #1 lane of northbound

Watt Avenue. The front of the Chevy struck the passenger side of the Ford.

Pendarvis was transported to Mercy San Juan Medical Center with major head trauma and is listed in critical condition. Her 4 year old female passenger was transported to UCD Medical Center for precautionary reasons. She was sitting in the right rear position and properly restrained in a child seat. The driver of the County vehicle, Michael Caldwell, a 28 year old from Rancho Cordova was transported to Mercy San Juan Medical Hospital with moderate injuries. The northbound #1 lane of Watt Avenue was closed for approximately one hour. This collision is still under investigation.

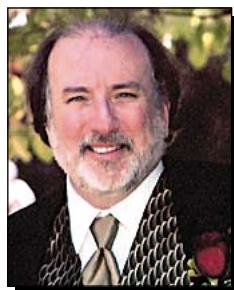

First 5 Sacramento Approves Funding for Enhanced Children's Medical Clearance Exams

Child Protective Services improved program will help identify medical needs and uncover hidden abuse in children under the age of five entering foster care.

Sacramento Region - The First 5 Sacramento Commission recently approved funding which will allow Child Protective Services (CPS) not only to provide medical clearance exams for children entering foster care, but to expand services into a comprehensive model of services for children ages zero to five who are placed in protective custody. Under the grant proposal drafted by CPS, the newly-titled "Health Exams, Assessments, Referrals and Treatment Services (HEARTS) for Kids" program will offer medical and dental screenings for children and home visitations to perform developmental screenings and prevention and education services. CPS's medical clearance exam program was suspended in October 2009 because of county budget cuts. Clearance exams help identify underlying health issues in children entering foster

care, including conditions which need immediate treatment. This is important because children under age five - CPS' most vulnerable population - often cannot verbalize medical problems or injuries. The exams also uncover abuse and neglect that could not be detected during a child welfare investigation. According to data from UC Davis Medical Center, which previously provided the service, 38 percent of all physical abuse injuries were found in children who were placed into custody for reasons other than physical abuse. "Clearance exams are not required by law, but CPS has offered them because it is a best-practice model which clearly benefits victims of child abuse and neglect," said Laura Coulthard, Director of Child Protective Services. "We were heartbroken to see the program go. In a year of bad budget news, First 5 Sacramento has given the community

something to cheer about." "Thank you to the Commission and CPS for being responsible with Proposition 10 funding to create a new program with substantial service enhancements," said Roger Dickinson, Chair of First 5 Sacramento and Chair of the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors. "A great collaboration has emerged that ultimately will improve the welfare of young children in Sacramento County," Dickinson added. The First 5 Sacramento Commissioners voted unanimously to provide \$743,281 for the new program, which will run from May 1, 2010 to June 30, 2012, at which time CPS can re-apply for funding. Total cost of the program is \$1.46 million, with half the costs covered by matching federal funds. Exams will be provided by Children's Specialists Medical Group of Sacramento at the Children's Receiving Home Clinic.

On May 14, 15 and 16, eight of these veterans and military family members will perform "Telling: Sacramento" at the Guild Theater, bringing their stories of life and the military to the eyes and ears of their home city.

"Telling: Sacramento" is the latest production of The Telling Project. The Telling Project works with groups of veterans to produce "Telling" an innovative theatrical production in which military veterans and their

family members, after extensive interviews, performance training and rehearsal, stage the 'telling' of their stories of life in the military for their communities. National Foster Care Month Highlights Need for Foster Parents

All children deserve a safe, happy place to call home. But for at least 75,000 children in California, there is no such place.

Each May, as we celebrate National Foster Care month, we salute the compassionate people who make a difference by serving as foster parents, relative caregivers, mentors, advocates, social workers and volunteers. Thanks to these unsung heroes, many formerly abused or neglected children and teens will safely reunite with their parents, receive care from relatives, or join a loving families through adoption.

Most communities across the country are urgently seeking more everyday people to help these youth overcome their troubled childhoods and realize their full potential. No matter what their age, every young person in foster care benefits from a meaningful connection to a caring adult who becomes a supportive and lasting presence in his or her life. But studies have shown that as many as 1 in 8 families have considered adoption, but don't know where to begin the process.

On May 15, we will host an event

at Arcade Church in Sacramento where these families can work with state and local foster care agencies, local adoption centers, law firms, child advocates, and courts to get information about the process and to understand the legal and financial issues involved in the process.

Many prospective families have been surprised to learn that adopting a child from foster care is virtually free and that adoptive families receive tax breaks for giving one of California's overlooked children a new, permanent home. The state also provides families and adopted foster care children assistance in creating a permanent, lifelong bond.

Statistics show that children in foster care who reach the age of 18 without the love and stability of a family or permanent connection are some of the highest at-risk children in the state. Within two to four years of leaving foster care, 50% of these foster children will be on drugs, homeless, in prison or dead.

However, when these kids are provided the love of a stable, caring family, they go on to thrive, becoming strong individuals who may become healthy, loving parents that break the cycle of neglect and abuse.
