Poll of Small Business Owners Shows Opposition to Tax Increases



Sacramento - Small business require employers to provide paid and mandatory paid sick leave, according to a poll released today by the National Federation of Independent Business/California.

Each year, the National Federation of Independent Business, America's leading small business association, polls its members on issues vital to their survival as entrepreneurs at both the state and federal level. When asked if California should

owners are strongly opposed to time off for employees' personal mandates requiring higher taxes illnesses or to care for a family member, more than 90 percent responded 'no', slightly more than 3 percent responded 'yes' and more than 2 percent were undecided.

> California small business owners also strongly opposed proposals to tax commercial property at a different rate than residential property. More than 86 percent said 'no', 3 percent responded 'yes' and more than 2 percent were undecided.

Finally, when polled as to whether California should replace the state sales tax with a Europeanvalue-added tax, more than 80 percent responded 'no'. Another 4 percent responded 'yes' and 13 percent were undecided.

"These numbers underscore Main Street concerns that now is not the time for new taxes, mandates or additional burdens to be placed on small businesses," said John Kabateck, NFIB/CA executive director. "Small business owners overwhelmingly oppose new and unanticipated costs as the way out of a recession and believe that government should be doing everything possible to provide incentives and support to create jobs."

Urban League Receives \$600K Recovery Act Grant for Employment Programs The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Grant

Will Help Put Area Residents Back to Work

Sacramento - The Greater Sacramento Urban League (GSUL) announced recently a grant award of \$591,217 from the California Recovery Task Force, funding from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) for employment training programs in the Sacramento area. GSUL plans to use the substantial grant amount to train workers for employment in the information technology sector. The award is part of nearly \$11 million in federal economic stimulus funding that California received to provide more than 2,100 Californians from a broad cross-section of the state with training in the skills they need to move from unemployment rolls to payrolls in a wide variety of industries throughout the state.

GSUL recently engaged in a Stride Center, a San Pablo based tech training agency, to offer a professional computer certification courses to the community. This funding allows the partnership to continue and expands the availability of professional development courses for dislocated or unemployed workers.

American Recovery Reinvestment Act will allow the Greater Sacramento Urban League to train workers in the Sacramento area for employment in the information technology sector," stated David DeLuz, President & CEO, Greater Sacramento Urban League. "Workers throughout the region will have the opportunity to learn the skills that employers need in today's rapidly changing workforce."

Gasoline Prices Drop in Sacramento Area

Sacramento – Average retail gasoline prices in Sacramento have fallen 3.7 cents per gallon in the past week, (February 15th) averaging \$2.81/g today. This compares with the national average that has fallen 2.9 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.62/g, according to gasoline price website SactoGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Sacramento during the past week, prices today are 44.6 cents per gallon higher than the same day one year ago and are 16.1 cents per gallon lower

than a month ago. The national average has decreased 11.9 cents per gallon during the last month and stands 67.6 cents per gallon higher than this day a year ago.

"Gasoline prices will begin to slowly rise across much of the country as colder than average weather results in rising oil demand as temperatures plummet in key areas that warm their homes using heating oil", says GasBuddy.com Senior Petroleum Analyst, Patrick DeHaan. "However, gasoline prices in the Midwest will buck the trend

as stockpiles swell in the Great Lakes area." He goes on to mention that stockpiles grew last week to the highest levels since March 2008 in that area, resulting in lower prices as supply greatly outpaces demand.



Sacramento Wins Several Grants that will Help Customers Save Money on Energy

Funds will help SMUD promote wide-ranging energy efficiency home improvements

Customers of the Sacramento House Performance program, Municipal Utility District (SMUD) will soon be learning a lot about improving the energy efficiency of their homes and businesses thanks to several government grants awarded today that total more than \$36 million, about one-third of the total award available for the entire state.

Each grant will provide funding to help SMUD custo-mers with significant energy efficiency improvements and realize lower energy bills. The grants will also help SMUD reduce system demand, resulting in grid reliability as well as provide environmental benefits by reducing the footprint associated with power plant emissions.

The awards are funded through the California Energy Commission's State Energy Program, which is funded by the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. The grants are intended to help communities like Sacramento develop, promote, implement, and manage energy efficiency and conservation projects and programs. Energy efficiency and conservation are the cheapest, cleanest and most reliable energy technologies.

"This is great news for SMUD customers and for our community," said John DiStasio, SMUD General Manager and CEO. "SMUD has been a leader in developing and implementing energy efficiency programs to help our customers save money and reduce demand. These grants will help us to accomplish an ambitious 1.5 percent annual energy-savings goal that surpasses

the state's goal by 50 percent." The most significant grant for SMUD customers is \$20 million awarded to SMUD to promote and implement a new way of improving energy efficiency the whole-house retrofit approach. SMUD on behalf of the Sacramento Regional Energy Alliance, a consortium of local governments, educational institutions, government agencies, non-profits and private companies, will use the funding to:

• Double the number of homes retrofitted through the Whole with each home seeking 30 percent average savings;

- Work with a Building America Grant recipient to implement a neighborhood approach to home retrofits. This entails selecting neighborhoods with groups of homes with similar characteristics and offering energy efficiency packages at volume-discount prices. At least one neighborhood will be in a Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency lower- income target area;
- Pilot a comprehensive multifamily retrofit model providing incentives to building owners with a goal of 20 percent savings. Moderate to low-income buildings will be targeted;
- Improve the quality of installations for low-income weatherized homes and Sacramento Housing Redevelopment Neighborhood Stabilization Program which focuses on low-income moderate to renovated foreclosed homes;
- Provide basic audits to select homes and encourage deeper participation in SMUD programs such as ENERGY STAR appliance pur-chases, building envelope sealing and air conditioning replacements;
- · Coordinate with Los Rios Com-munity College District to develop a SMUD green academy, training contractors in auditing skills, buil-ding performance science and more.

Customers will be able to start taking advantage of the program when it is implemented in early summer.

SMUD customers will also benefit from a State Energy Programgrantawardedtodaytothe County of Sacramento to facilitate developmentofpropertytax-based financing. It would allow SMUD customers borrow money to purchase energy efficiency retrofits to be paid back through property tax assessments by utilizing Assembly Bill 811 financing through a partnership with CaliforniaFirst.

CaliforniaFirst enables borrowers to make improvements to their home with no out-of-pocket costs. A homeowner not intending to own a property for the duration

of the loan payback period is assured that if they sell, the loan obligation goes with the property. For customers that do not want a loan tied to their property tax assessment, SMUD's loan program will continue to be available as an alternative for these projects. The property tax-based financing program will be implemented by the regional collaborative. SMUD hopes to have this program available to customers by this June.

SMUD business customers are also expected to benefit from State Energy Program grants awarded to several commercial consulting companies implement proven commercial building energy efficiency technologies.

The awards announced today are in addition to two more grants that will help SMUD customers implement significant energy efficiency technologies and lower their energy costs. Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency and Community Resource Project, Inc. received \$26 million in federal grant funding to rehabilitate or weatherize lower-income homes in SMUD's territory. Also, the cities of Sacramento, Elk Grove and Folsom and County of Sacramento have sub-granted to SMUD \$2 million to support whole-house retrofit incentives for SMUD customers in those jurisdictions. SMUD applied for this funding on behalf of all the cities and the county.

As the nation's sixth largest publicly owned utility, SMUD has been providing low-cost, reliable electricity for more than 60 years to Sacramento County (and a small portion of Placer County). SMUD is a recognized industry leader and award winner for its innovative energy efficiency programs, renewable power technologies, and for its sustainable solutions for a healthier environment. The utility is on track to become the first large California utility to receive 20 percent of its energy renewable resources.

ROCK DOC

On a couple of occasions in graduate school I stupidly miscalculated the effects of mixing strong acid and water - and then adding heat. There's nothing like the resulting exploding acid droplets quite near your face to give you pause.

The second time I managed to make the same, simple error I walked home, a journey of about 8 miles. As I strolled, I gave serious consideration to going into the law. But, after that long walk, I realized I didn't want to make a decision about the direction of my education based solely on fear. So I stuck with the sciences.

But my tale of lab explosions doesn't seem like much compared to two others I know, and they inspire greater fears in many members of the general public.

I work everyday with a chemist here at Washington State University who likes to say she is so radioactive she glows in the dark. That's not true, of course, but she did get a goodly dose of the highly radioactive chemical element called americium, which is a byproduct of plutonium. The tale goes back to when she worked 25 years ago at the Hanford nuclear site in Washington State.

Hanford is the place where America made plutonium during World War II for nuclear weapons. After that, it became a major installation for our production of nuclear weapons

in the Cold War. I know some people who are afraid even of the universal radiation symbol, but at Hanford it's almost as common on old signs as the tumbleweeds around the fences.

That day at work 25 years back, my colleague knew she was in trouble when the reaction container she and her boss were working with at high temperatures and pressure started to leak – spewing hot water with radioactive materials on her arms, her lab coat, and her shirt.

"But my boss and the folks in environmental health and safety were calm," she says, "and so was I. There were emergency showers. and of course I gave up my clothes, and then they scrubbed a layer of skin off my arms."

Twenty-five years later this cheerful chemist I work with goes in for medical checkups once every five years, but otherwise she lives fully in the clear. And she's had two healthy kids in the interval since her Hanford employment.

Harold McCluskey another Hanford worker who received a much greater exposure to radiological materials. A chemical reaction with the material he was working with showered him with americium about 500 times the occupational standard for exposure levels.

McCluskey likely have died but a doctor gave him an experimental drug that removed about 80 percent of the contamination. McCluskey had to remain in isolation – and I do mean isolation - behind concrete and steel until the treatment ran its course, but he then returned home. He was known as the Atomic Man here

in the Northwest. He died in his mid-70s, about 11 years after the accident that made him famous. He had never regained his full strength after the exposure, but he died of heart problems, not cancer.

Everything about plutonium and americium stirs up strong emotions. That's understandable. But not everyone is aware that technical people have been exposedtoradiationinmoderateto very high doses – and lived to tell the tale. Every day I'm reminded by the presence and hard work of my colleague that americium is not, in fact, necessarily the end of everything – or anything.

At some point in this century we Americans will have to decide if we want to seriously embrace nuclear energy or not. Nuclear power offers the hope of energy independence, and it can meaningfully address many greenhouse concerns. But, for some citizens, safety waste disposal issues those advantages. outweigh

What I hope is that the discussion about the nuclear issue can be made on the grounds of facts and rational discussion - and not just fears of chemical exposures. Like that day when I walked 8 miles to calm down, we need to be thoughtful as we make our decisions.

We owe ourselves people like my colleague, the chemist, at least that much.



Space Heaters Involved in 79 Percent of Fatal Home Heating Fires NFPA Urges Caution as Peak Time for Heating Fires Continues

While only 32 percent of home heating fires involve space heaters, they are involved in 79 percent of home heating fire deaths, according to the new report Home Fires Involving Heating Equipment released today by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). Heating equipment continues to be the second leading cause of home fires behind cooking and the second leading cause of home fire deaths behind smoking.

NFPA is urging caution and asking the public to practice safe heating behaviors as the peak time for home heating fires continues; half of all home heating fires occurred in December, January and February in 2003-2007.

"Half of fatal home space heater fires started because something was too close to the heater and ignited. Keep heaters and things that can burn at least three feet

vice president of communications. "Heating fires and the deaths they cause can usually be prevented with awareness and a few simple actions."

The leading factor contributing to space heater fires in general was heating equipment too close to things that can burn, such as upholstered furniture, clothing, mattress, or bedding. Other leading factors contributing to home space heater fires were failure to clean, which is principally related to creosote build-up in chimneys, and leaving an operating space heater unattended.

"Whether your chimney supports a wood or coal stove or just a fireplace, be sure to have it cleaned and inspected at least once a year to reduce your risk of having a fire," added Carli. "And always turn off a portable space heater when you

apart," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's go to sleep or leave the room."

In 2007, U.S. fire departments responded to 66,400 home structure fires that involved heating equipment. These fires killed 580 people, injured another 1,850, and were responsible for \$608 million in direct property damage.

'Open Primary' Designed to Open Your Wallet

Taxpayers, hang onto your wallets. The latest threat to your hard earned dollars is a ballot measure with the innocuous title of "Elections: open primaries."

The stated intent of the authors of the "open primary" -- now designated for the June ballot as Proposition 14 -- is to force the election of more "moderates," meaning those willing to "compromise" on the passing of a budget or the enactment of new state taxes. Currently, both actions require a two-third vote of each house. Proposition 14 was approved for the ballot by the Legislature as part of deal with Republican Senator Abel Maldonado to secure his vote for last year's tax increase, which, not coincidentally, gave Californians the largest tax hike in the history of all 50 states.

In fact, Proposition 14 does not "open" a primary; instead, it eliminates the primary-general election system as we know it. The measure would close the general election to all candidates other than the top-two voter getters in the first election. This means that in many districts voters could be faced with a final

choice between two Democrats or between two Republicans and candidates from smaller parties would be eliminated.

Although the loss of small party candidates could make elections less interesting and informative, it is another aspect of Proposition 14 that puts the taxpayer's wallet in serious jeopardy.

Here is how, under Proposition 14.thesystemcouldbemanipulated to elect more candidates likely to vote for "compromise" tax increases. If Proposition 14 is approved, it is highly unlikely that a fiscally conservative or anti-tax candidate will be voted in first or second place in districts within regions with long histories of supporting higher taxes such as San Francisco and Los Angeles.

In more conservative areas, however, the opposite is not necessarily the case. For example, in Orange County, government employee unions - the most powerful political force in the state - could easily mobilize behind a Republican candidate that has a prounion record and who they believe would vote for a tax increase.

With ample funds for mailers to Democrats and union households identifying who "their" candidate is, and with other mailers to GOP homes upholding the same candidate's Republican bona fides, it is simple to see how the system could be rigged to weed out fiscally conservative office seekers.

Supporters of tax and budget sanity, however, do not have the same funding and messaging apparatus as the government employee unions and would be unlikely to implement the same tactics in San Francisco or Los Angeles. So while Proposition 14 could result in electing a

slightly more moderate candidate in these areas, the chances that that candidate would be a strong fiscal conservative opposed to new taxes is small.

Unfortunately, Proposition 14 would only worsen the real problem, which is pro-tax groupthink on the budget and taxes that permeates most of Sacramento. Rather than confront the fact that our state spends more than taxpayers can provide, the legislative leadership prefers to simply continue to increase taxes, play budgetary tricks, declare the budget "balanced" and then kick the problem down the road to future leaders and taxpayers while crossing their fingers that the economy will recover despite the debilitating tax increases they have imposed. These same rogues are counting on Proposition 14 to bring in legislative reinforcements so they can continue to play what Howard Jarvis used to call the "tax, tax, tax, spend, spend, spend, elect, elect, elect" game at taxpayers' expense.

Taxpayer opposition Proposition 14 has been called "alarmist" by the usual "goo-goo" crowd. (Meaning those interests which have deluded themselves into thinking that what they promote is "good government.") However, when one considers that, in the near term, Prop 14's biggest beneficiary would be Abel Maldonado himself, taxpayers have more than enough reason to be alarmed. You Want to Win --Not Avoid Losing

Dare to Live Without Limits

Do you strive to achieve your goals or worry about losing what you have? Someone who feels they have nothing, is much more likely to reach out and take chances to get what they want than a person who has already attained something.

Many people live their lives defensively. They become limited, fearing loss of what they have. Their fear acts as an anchor that impedes forward motion. When faced with an opportunity, they weigh what they have to lose instead of assessing what they have to gain.

Often the statement, "I've got nothing to lose" precedes striving for something new. What this means is that people look for a zero risk situation before taking a chance. Those people who win the most do so because they free themselves from the fear of losing.

Fear of loss is strong. Of course no one wants to lose what they have. But growth involves risk. For example, in order for someone to start their own business, they have to invest startup money. There is no guarantee that their business will succeed.

Yet if they were concerned about losing their money they wouldn't risk starting a business, they would just keep their money in a savings account. The degree of acceptable risk is linked to the soundness of their business plan and the amount of effort one is willing to put in.

There is a big difference between a sound plan to win and gambling. Gambling leaves your success to chance and influenced by forces beyond your control. A winning plan is based on thought, planning, and hard work. Although is guaranteed, nothing planning to win enables you to accomplish more than you might initially think possible.

When you went to school, your passing wasn't insured, it was dependent on your effort. An Olympic skier doesn't leave the starting gate with a goal of not falling. Instead a skier visualizes and anticipates a perfect run.

Living involves risk. If a pilot wanted to ensure there would be no possibility of a mishap, he would never start the engines of his plane. Life involves constant judgement calls. On an ongoing basis, evaluate potential gain against potential loss.

Fear of losing is like always looking in the rearview mirror. A focus on winning is like looking out the front windshield. You wouldn't get very far without crashing if you only looked at what was behind you. Success means constantly making progress toward your destination.

In order to reach a goal, you have to direct your energy to winning. You have to free yourself from the fear of loss. How do you prevent this fear from limiting your growth? The first step is to

have desirable goals. want goals that excite and motivate you. An attractive destination will change your focus from what you can lose to how much there is to gain.

If your goals are important enough, your fear of loss will be minimized. On the other hand, if your goals aren't meaningful to you, you will have little interest in risking what you already have to work toward them.

There is little appeal in winning something you don't really want. It's hard to get excited about goals that aren't your own. There are many situations where someone has a goal that was imposed on them by someone else. In other circumstances, someone has a goal they feel they should have rather than one they sincerely want.

Develop goals you really want and you will willingly work toward them. If you find you are more concerned with not losing, you may not have suitable goals. Those that accomplish the most are the ones who devote their effort to winning.

PERCY JACKSON & THE OLYMPIANS: THE LIGHTNING THIEF (Rated PG)

Harry Potter is not the only kid with special powers who ends up at a unique boarding school that is unlike any of the fancy prep schools on the East Coast. The teenaged title character in "Percy Jackson & The Olympians: The Lightning Thief' is also capable of working some magic, but he doesn't know his own strengths. Oddly enough, nobody told Peter Jackson (Logan Lerman) that staying underwater in the school pool for more than five or so minutes at a time is a bit unusual. He has this fish-like ability to remain below the surface because it turns out he's the offspring

of Poseidon (Kevin McKidd). Even more unusual, and strangely coincidental at this particular time, is the title of "Percy Jackson & The Olympians," which sounds very much like a boy band that should be performing on the stage of the opening ceremony for the Vancouver Winter Olympics. But then, why quibble about a title, considering some of the weird names for the string of "Harry Potter" movies. Percy Jackson wants to emulate his British cousin, perhaps more in style and tone than is warranted for a movie that doesn't really measure up to the "Harry Potter" franchise's

LIGHTNING STRIKES FOR "PERCY JACKSON"

WITH FAMILY FUN imagination and innovation.

Let me dispel one fear that might nibble at the corner of the adult mind. If you have to take the kids to this movie, it's not really a bad thing. "Percy Jackson" proved more bearable and entertaining than I initially thought possible. The Greek mythology, not so commonplace in today's world, has a nice twist, particularly as it sets up a celestial battle between the fraternal gods Poseidon, the irritable Zeus (Sean Bean) and the annoying Hades (Steve Coogan). Zeus is upset that someone stole his lightning bolt, and he inexplicably blames Percy Jackson, the son of Poseidon, an absentee father if there ever was one.

Back on planet Earth, Percy lives with his all-too-human mother Sally (Catherine Keener) and a slovenly, abusive and creepy stepfather (Joe Pantoliano). Dealing with the mean streets of New York and unaware of his demigod status, Percy has one good friend in Grover (Brandon T. Jackson). On a museum field trip, a fury attacks Percy and his life is turned upside down. It turns out that best friend Grover is in reality a satyr who serves as the demigod's protector. The teacher confined to a wheelchair is actually a halfhorse centaur (Pierce Brosnan). For his safety, Percy is quickly whisked away to a secret location far away from civilization.

Deep in the woods on lakefront property, Percy comes to know other offspring of the gods and learns that he's arrived at a boot camp, where physical training

consists of fighting battles with swords as if they had all been transported in a time machine to ancient Greece. His eyes fall upon the beauty of Annabeth (Alexandra Daddario), daughter of Athena who proves to be a fierce warrior. Unlike the others, Luke (Jack Abel), the son of Hermes, is more interested in contemporary culture and plays a lot of video games in his quarters. A lot of other kids are running around the camp in sandals, but it is unclear as to whether they have demigod status as well.

Given an ultimatum to return the lightning bolt before the summer solstice, Annabeth and Grover join Percy in what amounts to a cross-country scavenger hunt to locate precious gems that allow them to safely enter the portal of the underworld to retrieve Percy's mom from the clutches of Hades. Along the way they have to battle the wily snakeheaded Medusa (Uma Thurman), overpower minotaurs guarding a museum in Nashville, and survive the seductive power of the Lotus Eaters in a Las Vegas casino. Fittingly enough, the entryway to hell is just below the Hollywood sign. If you've been to Los Angeles lately, this all makes sense.

"Percy Jackson & The Olympians" redeems itself with plenty of adventure and some great battle scenes. The violence appears almost tame when compared to video games. Percy and his friends are heroic figures in their quest to return the lightning bolt and avert a celestial war on Mt. Olympus. The overlay of Greek mythology is engaging, but may be lost on younger viewers. A "Percy Jackson" franchise, if it comes about, won't be giving the "Harry Potter" films any sort of lasting challenge at the box office, but this film is a lot more pleasant and entertaining than other recent efforts to tap into the Harry Potter formula.



I've been playing the lottery a bit lately. I'm a Christian, and I was wondering what your views are on this. We've been struggling financially, and it seems that a chance to win millions is worth a buck or two. Your advice and opinion on this would be cherished.

Dear Dawn,

do, but here goes. I'll tell you ahead of time—it's not going to be pretty!

Basically, you've told me that you're having money troubles and at the same time you're throwing money out the window. You can tell yourself that it's only a buck or two if you want, but that little bit of money represents a lot of financial irresponsibility in your life. You're thinking somebody has to win, right? Well, let me tell you something. You're more likely to be hit by lightning five times and survive than you are to win the lottery. Five times! How many people do you know who have been hit once by lightning and survived, much less five times?

You're not going to win, Dawn. Think I'm just being negative? No, I'm not. I'm being positive. I'm positive you're not going to win! Stop placing your hope in the wrong things.

Honestly, as a Christian, ask yourself if you believe God thinks this is a good use of your money. The lottery is a tax on poor people and people who can't do math. How do I know this? Because these are the only people who play the lottery!

Responsibility Leads to Wealth

Dear Dave,

Why is it that some people have enough money for pizza, lottery tickets, cable television and cigarettes, but they don't buy something as inexpensive as renter's insurance, and then they expect someone else to bail them out when a fire destroys their home?

Dear Keith,

This kind of behavior falls into the Stupid Tax category. It's an aggravating thing, but at the same time there's something about fire You're kidding. Do you really that elicits sympathy from me. want my opinion? I don't think you Even if there's stupidity involved

in what happened, it's such an emotionally devastating event. But I think it's important to talk about what you've brought up.

Let's put it another way. Why are there people who get mad at others for building wealth, or expect other people to bail them out after they've behaved irresponsibly? Ninety percent of America's millionaires are firstgeneration rich. They started with nothing, and instead of buying lottery tickets and smokes, they saved money and bought things like renter's insurance. They kept things like car insurance and health insurance in place, so that if they totaled their car or had to have an operation, they could pay for it instead of filing bankruptcy!

In other words, they were responsible. They stayed out of debt because they were mature enough and responsible enough to delay pleasure, and then after years of living this way, they looked up and discovered they were millionaires. That's how it happens. You delay bits and pieces of fleeting pleasure for a quality life in the future. Now, you don't trade away all momentary pleasures. You don't have to completely give up fun to win with money, but you trade impulsive, immature decisions and purchases for the reward of a better life later.

Most poor people delay none of the pleasures. They live only in the moment, and that's why they stay poor. If they want a better washer and dryer, they'll rent-to-own instead of saving up for a little while and buying a decent, used combo in the classifieds. I understand that bad things sometimes happen to good people, and you can end up broke that way, too. But I firmly believe that in most cases, it's not that they don't have the money, it's more a case of they don't have a vision for the future. They surrender a great life down the road for "Thank God it's Friday. Oh God, it's Monday!"

Niello Applauds Action by CARB to Give Regulatory **Relief to Off-Road Construction Equipment Owners**

Sacramento - Assemblyman Roger Niello today issued the following statement regarding the announced actions by the California Air Resources Board (CARB) that there will be no enforcement of the offroad diesel equipment regulations set to go into effect on March 1.

"I am encouraged that CARB has decided to take this action. California's economy is struggling to recover and the lack of construction activity has led to a dramatic decrease in diesel particulate matter anyway. It would have made no sense for the Board to enforce the March 1

compliance deadline, and I am glad that cooler heads prevailed at the Board," said Assemblyman Niello.

"I am also pleased that CARB will be holding a March 11 hearing to further evaluate modifications to the proposed rules on diesel regulations in light of the current economy."

Last fall, Assemblyman Niello led an effort of 52 members of the Legislature to call for a suspension of the on and off-road diesel regulations which will require truck and equipment owners to pay for expensive retrofits and replacements of diesel engines. The bi-partisan

letter sent to CARB stressed the fact that in this economic climate, it made no sense to impose these regulations on an industry that was having such a difficult time remaining viable.

"While this is a reasonable and sane step for CARB to take, my hope is that they would now also find the same sensibility in suspending the on-road diesel regulations per the letter from the Legislature last September."







Deficit Soars While Congressional Earmarks Continue Unabated

Deficit spending is skyrocketing. In December, a report was issued under the auspices of the Peter G. Peterson Foundation, the Pew Charitable Trusts, and the Committee for a Federal Budget, declaring that the U.S. is facing "a debt-driven crisis — something previously viewed as almost unfathomable in the world's largest economy."

This past year, the federal government ran a deficit of \$1.4 trillion. In 2009 alone, the public debt grew 31 percent, from \$5.8 trillion to \$7.6 trillion, rising from 41 percent to 53 percent of the gross domestic product (GDP).

The report was prepared by, among others, seven former

directors of the White House Office of Management and Budget, two former comptrollers general of the United States, and seven former directors of the Congressional Budget Office, as well as former chairman of the Federal Reserve System Paul Volcker. The report declares that, unless strong remedial steps are taken, the debt is projected to rise to 85 percent of GDP by 2018 and 100 percent four years later. By that time, they argue, the U.S. economy could be in ruins.

Alice Rivlin, formerly a director of both the Congressional Budget Office and the Office of Management and Budget and one of the authors of the report, noted that, "Previously, when we were worried about deficits, we could take comfort in the fact that the debt was not very high relative to the economy. But now the debt has shot up. The cushion is gone. If the same thing (a severe recession) happened again, we wouldn't be able to borrow to deal with it."

In the face of all of this, however, in the Congress -- among both Democrats and Republicans -- it is very much business as usual. In the last presidential campaign, both Senators Barack Obama and John McCain expressed their opposition to congressional earmarks -- the pet projects members of Congress slip into spending bills that have become a symbol of how Washington works and of its worst excesses. Yet such earmarks remain alive and well in the current Congress.

In December, lawmakers set aside more than \$4 billion in earmarks in the 2010 defense appropriations bill and watered down efforts to curb the practice of targeting spending for programs in members' districts. As usual, many of the top recipients of earmarks in the defense bill were high-ranking appropriators. Senator Daniel Inouye (D-Hawaii) got 37 earmarks totaling \$198.2 million. Senator Thad Cochran (R-Miss.) got 45 totaling \$167 million. On the

House side, defense subcommittee chairman John Murtha (D-PA) sponsored 23 earmarks totaling \$76.5 million, while ranking Republican C.W. "Bill" Young got 36 totaling \$83.7 million, according to Taxpayers for Common Sense.

The case of the software firm MobilVox is illustrative. When MobilVox wanted to break into the lucrative world of defense contracting, it expanded operations from its Northern Virginia base in Rep. James Moran's (D-VA) congressional district to Murtha's southwestern Pennsylvania district.

In addition to working with two of the most powerful members of a House subcommittee that controls Pentagon spending, the company hired lobbying firms that employed former top aides of the Democratic lawmakers and Murtha's brother. Company executives and their lobbyists donated thousands of dollars to the two congressmen. Soon, funds began to flow in the other direction.

Between 2003 and 2009, Murtha and Moran helped deliver \$12 million in earmarks to MobilVox. latest House spending introduced and pushed through by Murtha, includes an additional \$2 million earmark for MobilVox requested by Moran. The Washington Post notes, "MobilVox's success fits a pattern of doing business in Washington that ethics watchdogs deride as a 'payto-play' system -- one that became infamous during Republican years and continues to operate under a Democratic leadership that had promised to change a 'culture of corruption' in Washington." In one case, a \$100,000 earmark sponsored by Rep. James E. Clyburn (D-SC), the Democratic whip, to go to the library in Jamestown, South Carolina, ended up going instead to Jamestown, California -- 2,700 miles away and a town that does not even have a library. "That figures for government, doesn't it," said Chris Pipkin, who runs the one-room library in Jamestown, South Carolina, and earlier in 2009 requested \$50,000, not the \$100,000 that Congress designated, to buy new computers and build shelves to hold the books strewn across the room.

This library is just one of more than 5,000 earmark projects -totaling \$3.9 billion -- tucked away inside the catchall spending bill Congress sent to President Obama in December. He signed the \$1.1 trillion bill, which included such earmarks as \$350,000 for the Appalachian Mountain Club to study global warming's effects on NewHampshire's White Mountains; \$250,000 to replace bus shelters in Bal Harbour, Florida; and \$200,000 for outreach to and study of elderly Irish immigrants in New York.

Rep. Jeff Flake (R-AZ) went to the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives 48 times last year to offer amendments to strip porkbarrel spending projects from the annual spending bills. Each time he was defeated. Rep. Flake -- and other earmark opponents such as Senators John McCain (R-AZ) and Tom Coburn (R-OK) -- failed to win a single anti-earmark vote in the House and Senate for the fiscal 2010 spending year.

President Obama persuaded lawmakers not to add funding earmarks to the \$787 billion

stimulus package that Congress approved early in 2009. Not long after that, however, Congress approved a \$410 billion spending bill full of earmarks. The President avoided a fight by saying that the legislation was a holdover from the previous session of Congress, when Republicans were in control. At the time, he said, the legislation should "mark an end to the old way of doing business." We will see, as 2010 proceeds, if he is serious about making any real changes.

Recent polls show that the country is evenly divided about President Obama, but state governments are in disrepute and confidence in Congress is at an all-time low. Frank Newport of the Gallup organization noted in his year-end wrap-up, "Americans have less faith in their elected representatives than ever before." One important reason for this lack of faith is wasteful spending -- epitomized by the culture of earmarks. Allan C.
