All About Abandoned Vehicles

Ever wonder whose job is it to remove the old abandoned cars on the sides of the road? Of the nearly 13,000 Code Enforcement cases called in last year, more than 6,000 were for abandoned vehicles resulting in more than 400 vehicles being removed from public roadways.

The Sacramento County Code Enforcement Division administers the County's Vehicle Abatement program; their purpose is to remove abandoned vehicles on public right-of-ways roadways throughout the unincorporated area of Sacramento County.

An abandoned vehicle is defined as "the status of a vehicle when the vehicle owner has ceased to assert or exercise any interest, right or title to such vehicle." Code Enforcement is only responsible for abandoned vehicles on the public right-of-way; private roads and roads not maintained by the County are not subject to the Vehicle Abatement Program.

"The streets are not storage," said Code Enforcement Officer Jared Wickliff. "Residents must maintain their vehicles and keep them registered. Also, moving the vehicles around a few feet every couple of days does not work; the vehicles need to be driven. Same goes for boats."

Code Enforcement officers also want to remind us that the section of street in front of residents' homes is public right-of-way and can be used for parking by anyone. It's completely legal

If someone parks in front of a fire hydrant or is blocking a driveway, residents should contact the Sacramento Sheriff at 916-876-6642 or visit the Parking Enforcement site at the Sacramento County Sheriff's homepage at <http://www.sacsheriff.com> to file a complaint.

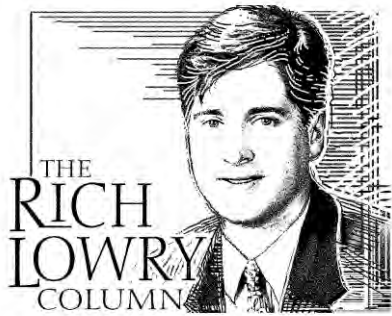

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McCain Should Take a Page From Hillary

Politically, John McCain should be a candidate for involuntary committal -- he's a danger to himself.

If McCain is going to have a chance, he needs to run an un-McCain-like campaign, more negative than he'd prefer, more focused on domestic policy and less freewheeling: Think of a Republican Hillary Clinton circa this year's Pennsylvania and Ohio primaries.

McCain surely would be more comfortable running a race emphasizing character, national security and a few pet causes such as earmarks. But he has to leave his comfort zone -- something he may resist because he labors under an outdated self-image.

McCain often seems to think of himself as he was back in 2000 during the glory days of the

"Straight Talk Express": a political phenomenon who was the fresh face on the national scene, beloved of the press. A conspiracy of circumstances -- most important, the passage of time -- has seen all his former star qualities (and then some) assumed by Barack Obama.

A McCain comeback has to begin in a deconstruction of Obama as too risky to be president, executed in a traditional, block-and-tackle campaign (of the sort McCain has never yet been able to run). The playbook is partly provided by Hillary Clinton, who found her voice in lunch-bucket appeals to working-class white and Hispanic voters.

She did not, of course, defeat Obama, but McCain ought to be encouraged by how close she came. She too was a plodding speaker,

drew much smaller crowds than Obama and was outspent and out-organized.

For a contemporary Democrat, Hillary ran a center-right campaign; she talked of blowing Iran to smithereens, downed shots of Crown Royal and appealed frankly to blue-collar whites. These mostly substanceless gestures conveyed a sense of toughness that endeared Hillary to her working-class voters and highlighted a vulnerability of the polished but aloof Obama.

McCain has a higher natural toughness quotient than Hillary. But he has never spoken persuasively to economic concerns, which -- for all the focus on the Middle East -- will predominate this year.

McCain's campaign needs a unifying theme, and one less abstract than "country first." Here again, he should take a page from Hillary, offering a conservative version of her occasional theme of a "fighter for you." In particular, he should be fighting for middle-class Americans against ineffectual government and tax-and-spend liberalism.

McCain has to give voice to the anger and frustration of the American

public. He has to complain that Washington is broken and argue that both parties have let voters down. In 2000, he was the feisty -- even angry -- crusader against Washington and the status quo. He needs to find that old populist mojo again.

The fighter theme would tap into the public mood of disenchantment with Washington and politics. It would suit McCain, who is at his best when expressing an outraged irascibility. And it would communicate a certain vigor, perhaps mitigating concerns about his age.

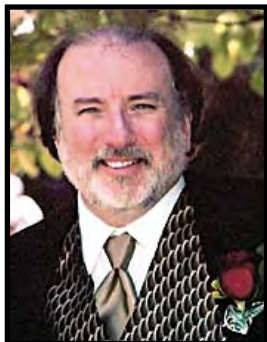
But it must be harnessed in a tight, hard-hitting campaign uncharacteristic of McCain. This year, simply letting McCain be McCain is a formula for failure.

Where: Discovery Park, Sacramento

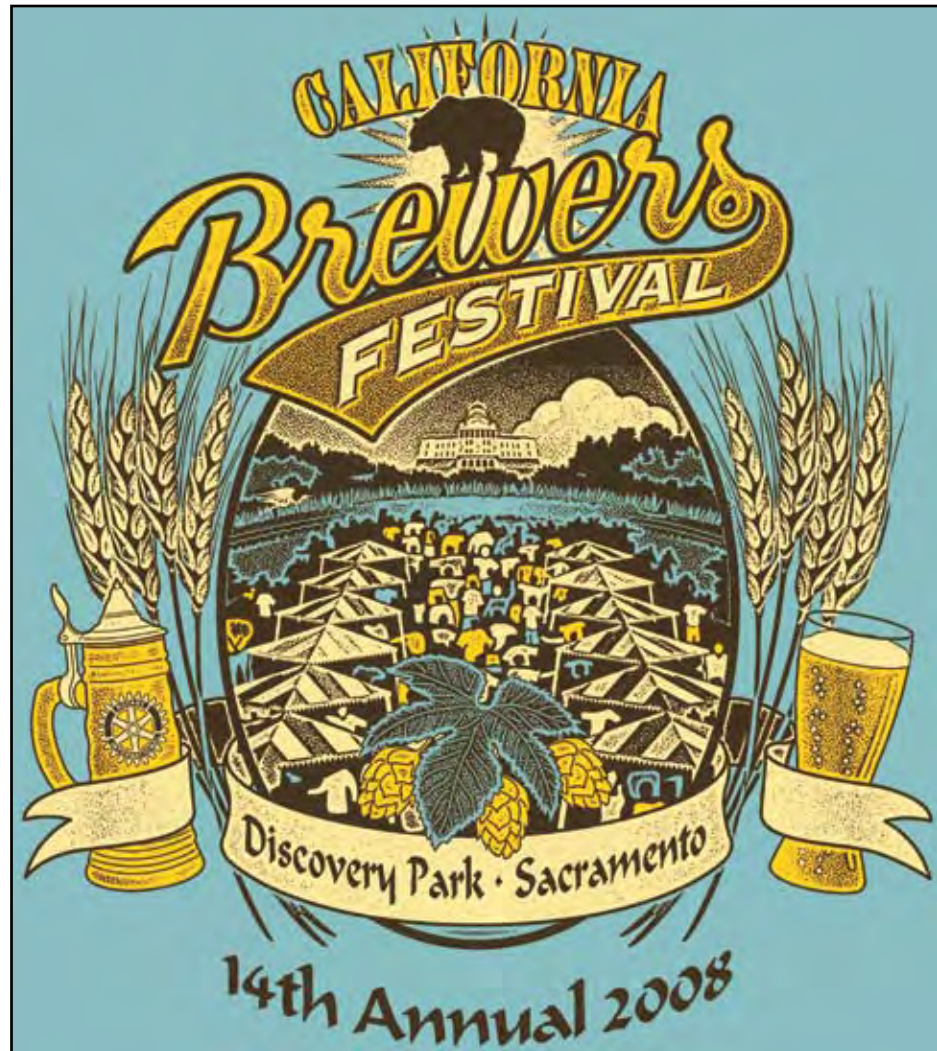

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County Offers Free Inspection...

...But fees will increase for those who won't play by the rules

On July 29, County Code Enforcement changed the way they do business when dealing with complaints about blight, junk, rubbish and general neighborhood nuisances to help property owners who have received complaints and increase compliance.

Effective September 1, when Code Enforcement receives a complaint, a letter will be issued to the property owner with details of what must be corrected and by when. If the property owner needs more information, or the complaint is complex, they may request an in-person visit by an officer at no charge. Officers will talk with the property owner, educate them about what needs to be corrected, take photos for documentation and let property owners know if the situation is not corrected there will be a \$470 fee on the next visit. If officer comes out a third time, and the situation is not corrected, there is an additional fee of \$335.

"We think this will do a better job of working cooperatively with residents to preserve neighborhoods and prevent blight," said Carl Simpson, Code Enforcement Chief. "And the higher fee will get people's attention as well as help cover our actual costs. This is about working together for the community, not about levying fees."

Go-Fast Parts for Early Pontiac

Q: Greg, I'd like to know if there were any aftermarket high-performance or racing parts made for the 1949 to 1954 Pontiac inline flathead eight-cylinder engine? Maybe some aluminum cylinder heads, cams or dual one-barrel intakes?
-- Jim A., Lexington, S.C.

A: Jim, I bought a 1951 Buick with the straight-eight inline engine in 1972, and in the trunk sat a two-one-barrel cast-iron intake, which I later sold with the car. This was a factory piece, as it had a GM part number on the intake, so I believe there has to be something out there.

I know GM did produce high-performance parts for this engine, because at age 6, my family and I saw noted GM designer Harley Earl's "Bonneville Special" concept car displayed at the Steel Pier in Atlantic City, N.J. It was equipped with a "Special-8" Pontiac inline, bored out with high-compression pistons and a high-lift cam.

Only two "Specials" were ever made, and both also had four Carter side-draft, single-barrel carburetors. Total output was the highest ever for the "straight eight," with an estimated 300-plus horsepower. Thus, we know GM made some speed parts for this engine, but the chance of your getting your hands on any is unlikely.

However, I spoke with my friends at Isky Cams in California, and there are two options available to you. Ed can re-grind a new cam for you, and Rod in the tech department said there may be some old high-performance stock in the backroom ready to go for your engine. Give Rod or Ed a call at 323-770-0930. 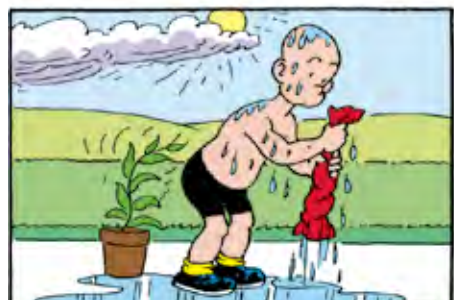
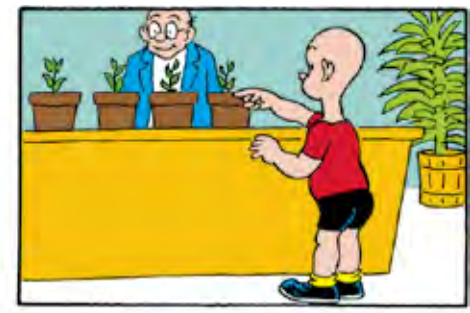
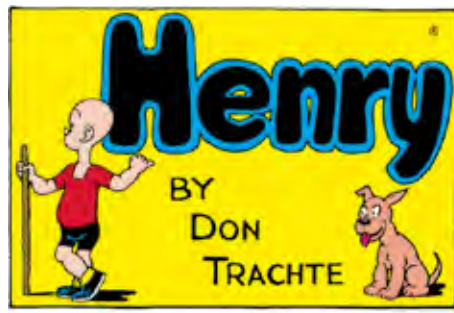

Special on CWTV

YOUNG WOMEN ARE THE FOCUS OF THE CW NETWORK'S TV PROGRAMS

Reading the tabloids is no longer necessary for knowing about former presidential candidate John Edwards' recent visit with his former mistress at a Beverly Hills hotel. The only reason to bring this up is that this meeting took place in the wee hours at the Beverly Hilton Hotel, on the penultimate day of the national TV critics press tour at the same location. Apparently, not one TV journalist caught wind of this rendezvous, thereby missing the biggest story to emerge from the scene of the summer TV press tour.

Instead, we had to endure the drone of TV executives talking incessantly about their wonderful slate of new shows for the fall season. One of the networks presenting its wares at the Beverly Hilton was the CW Network, which is known affectionately in some circles as the "love child" of two former networks, UPN and the WB. I know this union has nothing to do with a former North Carolina senator, but it seems too ironic to ignore altogether.

Before I digress any further, let's look at where we are now with the CW Network, which having dropped "WWE Smackdown," seems more firmly in the grip of its target demographic audience, namely younger adult women. Dawn Ostroff, President of Entertainment at the CW, told the gathering of TV critics that in assessing the appeal of its shows, the network doesn't look at households, but flatly stated that "what we go after is the 18 to 34 year-old woman." You can't argue with that point, when it's obvious that the biggest show on the CW is "Gossip Girl," one that I would not watch under gunpoint, which is about privileged teenage girls at an elite private school in the Upper West Side of Manhattan. Even the advertising for this show looks a little risqué, focusing on steamy sex scenes.

Adhering to its target demographic, one of the CW's new fall series is "Privileged," the story of one young woman navigating the treacherous waters of high society in Palm Beach. Twenty-three-year-old Megan Smith (JoAnna Garcia) has a Yale education in journalism she's putting to good use slaving away at a tabloid rag. Then, in one whirlwind day, she gets fired, meets cosmetics mogul Laurel Limoges (Anne Archer), and becomes the live-in tutor for Laurel's twin teen granddaughters in the swank Florida town.

"Privileged" has the CW Network written all over it, as our young heroine gets caught up in the heady world of wealth and power. The girls under her tutelage aren't too thrilled, but Megan enjoys the perks of a private suite, nice car and live-in chef. She catches the eye of Will Davis (Brian Hallisay), the super-rich dilettante who lives on the estate next door and just happens to be dating Megan's estranged sister Lily (Kristina Apgar). The plot is bound to thicken, and if you're an 18 to 34 year-old female, you may want to tune in to "Privileged."

Another new series to begin in early September is the edgy, contemporary spin-off of the iconic drama "Beverly Hills, 90210." The new show is titled simply "90210," because everyone who is hip knows this zip code belongs to that exclusive Southern California city with its pedigree of wealth and prestige. The new "90210" looks at life through the eyes of Annie Wilson (Shenae Grimes) and her brother Dixon (Tristan Wilds), whose first day at West Beverly Hills High School leaves no doubt they're not in Kansas anymore.

The Wilson family, including dad Harry (Rob Estes) and mom Debbie (Lori Loughlin), has relocated to this nice zip code to keep an eye on Harry's mother Tabitha (Jessica Walter), a feisty but faded former television star and a charter member of the Betty Ford Clinic. It's awkward for the new kids at school when their dad has taken the job of high school principal. Jennie Garth, an original student on "Beverly Hills, 90210," is now the beautiful guidance counselor Kelly Taylor. Kelly's former classmate, Donna Martin (Tori Spelling, another original student), owns a local clothing boutique. At the TV critics press tour, it was announced that Shannen Doherty's Brenda Walsh will guest star in multiple episodes as a successful theater actress returning to her alma mater as a guest director for the school's musical production.

Coming to the schedule at the end of October is a new reality show called "Stylista." Eleven aspiring fashion enthusiasts vie for a much-coveted editorial job with "Elle" magazine. The contestants work as assistants to the magazine's Fashion News Director, Anne Slowey, a demanding but well-respected fashion icon. The competitors carry out an assistant task and a fashion editorial assignment in each episode. Each week, Anne fires one person, until the last assistant standing gets "promoted" to the coveted real-life job opportunity. The grand prize includes a paid editorial position at "Elle," a paid lease on a great apartment in Manhattan, and a clothing allowance, all for one year, valued at \$100,000. "The Devil Wears Prada" should be considered required viewing for any prospective contestant.

During her remarks to TV critics, Dawn Ostroff announced a reality show called "13 - Fear is Real," which is described as "The Blair Witch Project" turned into a competition show. The participants get bumped off and are never seen again, at least on the show. To create a spooky climate, the filming takes place in the remote bayous of Louisiana. I believe the contest winner will get to live in a FEMA trailer in Plaquemines Parish.

August/September Twitt Walk Schedule

What's a TWITT you may ask? The dictionary describes the word TWIT as either a reproach or slang for a foolish, contemptible, little person. However, that's not what the Sacramento Walking Sticks walking club means when they call each other TWITT's. The acronym stands for the Twice-A-Week-Itinerant-Two-Timers and anyone is welcome to join in the fun they're having. Twice a week they like to travel within a radius of 50 miles in-and-around the Sacramento area to enjoy the sights and to walk 5K (3.1 miles) or 10K (6.2 miles) routes for fun, fitness and friendship (with food added in afterwards sometimes).

All walks from August thru September will begin at various times in the early morning. These walks are not timed and everyone will walk at their own pace. Children are encouraged to come; strollers are welcome as is the family dog (on leash with clean up). All walks are free unless people want to join the incentive program (New Walker Packets are \$5.00 each) which provides them the opportunity to track their events and mileage.

Volkssporting (which means sport of the people in German) began in Germany back in the '70's and the sport was brought to the US by the military families who enjoyed the events so much throughout Europe. There are 315 clubs throughout the US and the Sacramento Walking Sticks is the largest and most active club in California. Walking is something that most everyone can do and it's one of the best exercises you can do to stay healthy. People tend to walk faster and farther in groups and will find themselves wanting to repeat the process often because of the fun they're having. It's a great way to walk safely and meet other people, too.

The Sacramento Walking Sticks have a monthly

membership meeting on the second Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm. Meetings are held at the SMUD Customer Service Center, Timberline III Meeting Room, 630 S S St, Sacramento 95817. Borrowing Local Government Funds Not the Answer to State Budget Crisis

SACRAMENTO.--(BUSINESS WIRE)--The leaders of California counties, cities and special districts are joining together to make it clear to legislative decision makers that borrowing local government funds to close the state's \$15.2 billion budget deficit is not the answer and will only hurt local governments and California residents.

In a letter sent Tuesday (Aug. 5th) to the Governor, Senate and Assembly, presidents from the California State Association of Counties, League of California Cities and California Special Districts Association voiced their strong opposition to any budget deal that relies on suspension of Proposition 1A and Proposition 42.

"This is a fiscally irresponsible solution that does nothing to resolve the state's budget problem and undermines any effort to restore the state to fiscal stability," the presidents stated in the joint letter.

Passed in 2004, Proposition 1A prohibits the state from taking local tax property taxes except during true fiscal emergencies. Proposition 42, passed in 2002, requires revenues from the sales tax on gasoline to be used solely for transportation purposes. Both propositions were overwhelmingly supported by California voters.

In the joint letter, local leaders are also

reminding the Governor and Legislature that these voter-approved propositions required borrowed revenues be repaid within three years, with interest, "causing more debt and delaying real solutions."

In addition, local governments are facing their own financial difficulties due to the economic downturn and a drop in sales and property tax revenues. Most local governments have already adopted budgets and made tough decisions to come up with balanced plans. The state's borrowing of local revenues would only put holes in these budgets by requiring even deeper cuts at the local level.

The well-being of California's future requires lawmakers to address the state's fiscal challenges in a responsible manner. Local government leaders are eager to work closely with the Governor and Legislature to find a long-term budget solution for California.

Los Rios Places \$475 Million Bond Measure on November Ballot

The Los Rios Community College District has placed a \$475 million local bond measure on the November 2008 ballot. The measure, Measure M, will appear on the ballots of residents living in the District's service area including Sacramento, Yolo, and El Dorado counties as well as very small portions of Placer (233 registered voters) and Solano (28 registered voters) counties.

According to District officials the bond is needed to keep pace with enrollment growth that has exceeded all projections and to update and expand aging facilities. "This fall about 88,000 students will enroll in our colleges and that number is now projected to exceed 120,000 students in just eight years – a 37% increase," said Los Rios chancellor Brice Harris. "Our classrooms are already feeling the crunch and we must build and remodel facilities to continue to provide students access to the quality education they need to succeed in our highly technical work place."

If approved by voters, the bond measure would fund new classrooms and facility renovation at all four of the District's colleges – American River, Consumnes River, Folsom Lake and Sacramento City – as well as build and

expand education centers in Natomas, Davis, West Sacramento, Elk Grove, Rancho Cordova and Placerville.

Local general obligation bonds fund the repair, renovation and new construction of educational facilities and require a 55% majority vote for passage. If approved, Measure M would cost all property owners in the District's service area an annual average of \$9.10 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. By law, an independent citizen's oversight committee must be created to oversee expenditures of bond funds.

The colleges of the Los Rios District educate the majority of the Sacramento region's nurses, police, fire fighters, child care workers, dental hygienists and emergency medical technicians. Through its transfer of students to four-year colleges and universities, the District also plays a significant role in educating a host of other professional personnel including teachers, doctors, computer specialists, business managers, and architects.

About one of every 11 adults living in the greater Sacramento area who are 18 years of age or older attend a Los Rios college.

Sacramento County Sheriff Believes in the Power of Prevention

Donation will fund substance abuse prevention in the community

People Reaching Out (PRO) today announced a \$15,000 donation from the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department to support its youth substance abuse prevention programs.

The donation will provide resources for PRO After School, a unique youth-to-youth mentoring program that has grown to serve 16 school sites and gives local high school students the opportunity to mentor an elementary or middle school child. The funds will also allow People Reaching Out to offer free "Parenting for Prevention" classes and provide parents important tools to help steer their kids away from drug and alcohol use.

"We are very pleased to be able to provide this money to People Reaching Out," said Sacramento County Sheriff John McGinness. "Around 80 percent of the people that we book into the Sacramento County jail every year are under the influence of drugs or alcohol use or because of a dependency on alcohol or drugs - and they commit other crimes to support their habit. Programs like the ones offered by People Reaching Out impact kids early in their lives and can make the difference in the path they choose later in life."

The National Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration recently reported that the greater number of activities that youth are involved in significantly reduces the

rates of cigarettes, alcohol, or illicit drugs use. In Sacramento County, 12 years of age is the average age a child takes their first drink. People Reaching Out provides programs for youth that replace the temptations of drug and alcohol use and puts kids in a safe environment where they are taught and encouraged to make healthy choices for themselves.

"We are very grateful to the Sheriff's department for its donation," said Staci Anderson, executive director of People Reaching Out. "Funding is limited for prevention services and this money is critical to keeping our programs available for our kids. We appreciate the Sheriff's recognition of the value of prevention programs."

The funding is provided by the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department as part of a state program to donate 15 percent of all asset forfeiture money to community organizations that combat drug use and gang activity. Since 1999, the Sheriff's department has provided nearly \$300,000 to local groups and organizations.

People Reaching Out is a non-profit grassroots organization formed in 1981, providing substance use and violence prevention programs, free of charge for youth and their families.
