John DiStasio Chosen as New SMUD GM



John DiStasio

John DiStasio, assistant general manager for Energy Delivery & Customer Service, has been named to succeed Jan Schori as SMUD's general manager.

DiStasio, a 27-year SMUD veteran, verbally accepted the offer from the SMUD Board of Directors

Thursday night to fill the GM position after a national search. The appointment will not be finalized until a contract is signed and the Board issues a formal approval at its June 19 meeting. DiStasio would assume his new position June 20.

"By making their selection from among the internal candidates, I think the Board validated the excellent work of this organization and its employees," DiStasio said. "It's a recognition that we have really been able to step up and meet the challenges that confront us."

DiStasio said he intends to position SMUD for the future through building upon what has been accomplished in the past. "We will still be focused on the customer, the community and our employees," he said. "I want

Sacramento to continue to reap the dividends of having SMUD as a community-owned utility."

Larry Carr, president of SMUD's Board of Directors, said that after many interviews and much deliberation, DiStasio emerged as the best choice among a field of strong candidates. "Both internally and externally we had many highly qualified people to choose from," Carr said. "But it became clear that John was the best fit to take us to the next level."

DiStasio moves to SMUD's top post after serving as assistant general manager since December 2000. In that role he was responsible for overseeing SMUD's retail operations, including customer service, energy delivery, program development and communications, energy-efficiency and pricing.

During his tenure as assistant general manager SMUD won a string of customer service honors, including being named by J.D. Power and Associates in February as having the nation's highest satisfaction rating among business customers.

From 1997 to 2000, he headed Distribution Services, with responsibility for the SMUD energy delivery process. DiStasio joined SMUD in 1981 as a buyer for the District's purchasing department.

In addition to his duties at SMUD, DiStasio is an executive board member of the Sacramento Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce; vice-chair of LEED (Linking Education and Economic Development); president of the board of the Northwest Public Power Association; a board member of the North State Building Association; and a member of the Los Rios Foundation Board.

DiStasio earned a bachelor's degree in organizational behavior from the University of San Francisco.

County Adopts River Safety Ordinance

Children under 13 will be required to wear life jackets

Sacramento County Supervisors today (June 3rd) gave their unanimous support to the concept of requiring children ages 12 and under to wear life jackets when in public waterways. Parents would be held responsible for ensuring their children wear the jackets, or be subject to possible misdemeanor charges. The City of Sacramento is expected to consider a similar proposal for waterways within its boundaries. The County ordinance would apply to portions of area rivers in the unincorporated area of Sacramento only.

The ordinance was introduced today, and will be presented for final adoption to the Board of Supervisors on June 10. If approved, it will become effective that day as well.

Sacramento County Supervisor Roger Dickinson, who originally proposed the ordinance require life jackets for anyone under the age of 18, still viewed the vote as a step in the right direction. "I am pleased the Board has acted to protect children on our rivers from the tragedy of drowning. If one life is saved by this ordinance, it will be worth it," said Dickinson. Local fire officials plan to bring the concept to other cities in the county as well.

The award recognizes the agency's commitment to delivering the most effective, state-of-the-art services to children, youth and families, and honors River Oak's state-wide leadership in the successful implementation of evidence-based practices that dramatically improve the lives of children and families in the greater Sacramento community.

"This award is a tremendous honor for the 200 dedicated and hard-working River Oak employees whose tireless efforts bring hope to so many vulnerable children and their families," said Mary Hargrave, President and CEO. "River Oak is proud to be at the forefront of implementing best-practice model programs that produce lasting positive results in the lives of the children we serve."

River Oak is the only Sacramento-area non-profit organization providing five nationally recognized evidence-based practices that are proven by research to be the most effective in treating emotionally and behaviorally challenged children and youth. These programs are: 1) The Incredible Years, which teaches emotional and social skills to pre-school children and improves their overall kindergarten readiness; 2) Multi-systemic Therapy, which prevents out-of-home placements of youth with delinquency problems; 3) Multi-dimensional Treatment Foster Care, which provides services to foster children and youth with delinquency, behavioral, and emotional problems; 4) Teaching Pro-social Skills, which equips youth with emotional competencies; and 5) Functional Family Therapy, which strengthens families through intensive positive relationship building.

Established in 1966, River Oak (www.riveroak.org) has grown from an organization of group homes to an agency reaching 2,000 emotionally and behaviorally challenged children and their families annually through 12 programs and services operating at 4 sites throughout Sacramento. The agency's programs span from Early Intervention & Prevention Services for the youngest

children living at home or in foster care and teens with behavioral challenges, to Outpatient Counseling.

A demonstration of its commitment to safety and high quality of client care is the accreditation and Gold Seal of Approval™ awarded to the agency by the Joint Commission, an honor rarely bestowed on non-profit organizations not affiliated with large hospital systems.

Formed in 1980 by people who saw the need to focus attention on children's issues, CMHACY (www.cmhacy.org) has grown into a large and broad-based coalition of persons deeply concerned with the mental health needs of California's vulnerable children and youth. CMHACY is the only statewide voice for children's mental health in California. A champion for children in the legislative and public policy arena, CMHACY is frequently identified in legislation as an organization with whom policy makers should consult, and is increasingly included on task forces and work groups. Through public testimony, newsletters, position papers and an annual statewide conference, CMHACY strives to educate and influence decision makers affecting vulnerable children.

CHP Efforts Paying Off

The California Highway Patrol's (CHP) "Statewide Driving under the Influence (DUI) Reduction Effort" grant has concluded. A new grant-funded campaign is about to begin. Under this \$5 million project, CHP personnel were deployed on an overtime basis with the mission of removing impaired drivers from California's roadways. The grants were awarded by the state Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

During the project's enforcement period 233 DUI/Driver License Checkpoints and 66 DUI Task Force Operations were conducted, and nearly 40,545 overtime hours were expended providing proactive DUI Roving Patrol. As a result of these enforcement efforts, 2,971 DUI arrests were made by CHP officers.

The goal of the "Statewide Driving under the Influence (DUI) Reduction Effort" project was to reduce the number of people killed and injured in alcohol-involved collisions. Through the enforcement efforts this grant provided, the CHP was able to eliminate these DUI drivers from our roadways, keeping our highways safer.

The CHP is urging motorists to help reduce the incidence of DUI fatalities and injuries by not drinking and driving.

The CHP has received another grant for a similar anti-DUI campaign during the 2008-09 fiscal year.

CUDDLY ANIMATED "PANDA" MASTERS THE KUNG FU ACTION MOVES

KUNG FU PANDA (Rated PG)

Who doesn't love a cuddly, soft panda, the world's cutest animal and the best thing to come out of China since stir-fried noodles? Ironically, the lovable panda that stars in the animated "Kung Fu Panda" is a clumsy lug working in the family's noodle shop. Incongruous as it may seem, animation doesn't capture the essentially adorable and outwardly sweet-natured appearance of the giant pandas on display at the National Zoo ever since President Nixon made his historic 1972 trip to China. On the other hand, only a cartoon could give a giant panda the dexterity to become a master of martial arts.

Alternating between comedic elements and Jackie Chan-style action heroics, "Kung Fu Panda" is the story of a plump, drowsy, huggable black-and-white bear with a huge pot belly who has only one aspiration in life, namely to become an expert in a martial art that relies on agility, mental prowess and lightning-fast reflexes. The clumsy bear is named Po (voiced by Jack Black), a waiter at his father's noodle diner who displays none of the inherent abilities to become a kung fu master. And yet nothing will dissuade him from the foolish quest, not even his father, a goose named Mr. Ping (voiced by James Hong).

Eager to quit slinging noodle bowls, Po heads off to a public ceremony at an ancient temple where grand master Oogway the Turtle (Randall Duk Kim), acting upon prophecy, will anoint the new Dragon Warrior. This selection will have great consequence for the inhabitants in the mountainous Chinese village that is otherwise vulnerable to attack from hostile forces.

It is widely expected that the appointment of the Dragon Warrior will go to one of the members of the legendary Furious Five: Tigress (Angelina Jolie); Crane (David Cross); Mantis (Seth Rogen); Viper (Lucy Liu); and Monkey (Jackie Chan). All of these kung fu artists have been trained by the wily wolf Master Shifu (Dustin Hoffman). Literally stumbling upon the scene, Po drops in on the ceremony so unexpectedly that Oogway proclaims that the lovable panda is the new Dragon Warrior.

This turn of events does not sit well with the Furious Five, or with Master Shifu, who thinks Po is irredeemably incapable of being properly trained, if only because the panda is obscenely overweight and lacking any athletic skills. What Po lacks in ability, he more than makes up for in optimism and enthusiasm. And so the giant panda participates in a rigorous training program that is often very comical, because as expected Po is uncoordinated and maladroit.

Master Shifu's lessons, which will lead eventually to obtaining the powerful knowledge from the secret Dragon Scroll, take on a greater sense of urgency when the vicious snow leopard Tai Lung (Ian MacShane) escapes from the heavily-fortified and well-guarded prison where he has been chained up for years. With revenge on his mind for having been denied what he presumed was his rightful place as the Dragon Warrior, Tai Lung is set to wreak havoc on Po's isolated village.

For the final third of its run, "Kung Fu Panda" lurches quickly from the comedic tone to the full-bore action that requires much hand-to-hand combat. A furious battle erupts when the Furious Five confront Tai Lung on a precarious rope bridge over a deep ravine. This is the run-up to the showdown between the suddenly energized Po and the determined Tai Lung.

Chinese art and architecture lend themselves to a very colorful rendition in computer-generated animation. "Kung Fu Panda" realizes the essential beauty of the Chinese culture with masterful precision. This is a good-looking film where the visuals come off much better than the script. A younger audience is more likely to be impressed with the decent story and its actors that are easily outdone by the film's splashy art.

New Health Fad: No, Thanks

The March of Science continues. Backward. Case in point: blood-sucking leeches.

In one of the Sunday magazines, we had a smiling Demi Moore gushing about her latest health secret: leeches, placed in her belly button. Said Moore, "I'm feeling very detoxified!"

Yes, I might soon be feeling a little detoxified myself, because I think I'm going to throw up.

The sheer grossness of leeches used to be something on which all Americans could agree.

Here's how a movie Web site describes the famous leech scene in "African Queen":

"Rose spots leeches on his back; she screams, and he rips off his shirt, frantic and disgusted."

This has always been the sensible approach to leeches: panic and disgust.

Katherine Hepburn played Rose as tower of strength, unafraid of Nazis, alligators, Nazi alligators and Humphrey Bogart's morning breath.

But the leeches totally freaked her out.

If they ever remake this movie -- which they probably won't since it's not based on a comic book and it requires the sensibilities of someone over the age of 7 -- they'll have to rewrite the leech scene for the modern -- that is to say, insane -- audience:

Hepburn: Hey, lucky you! You've got leeches!

Bogart: Yeah, but they're on my back and legs, not on my belly button, where I like to put them so I can be detoxified! Could you help me out?

Hepburn: Yes, but I need to be detoxified first.

Bogart: Why?

Hepburn: Because if the leeches detoxify you first, they'll be falling down drunk.

Bogart: How about I get some more leeches so we can detoxify together?

Hepburn: Splendid!

The same article referred to them as "medicinal leeches."

Please. What do they do -- put little laboratory

coats on them and give them mini-clipboards so they look like health-care professionals?

But the question remains, will people actually fall for this health fad?

Of course they will. They're endorsed by Demi Moore, who's in her 40s and still poses in bikinis and who's married to younger man Ashton Kutcher, who just graduated from middle school.

Pretty soon leeches in the belly button will be as common as cell phones (which are placed in the ear, not the belly button).

And speaking of movies and comic books, British scientists are working to create a real-live Wolf Man.

That's not what they're saying, of course. It's generally frowned upon for scientists to announce, "We're creating strange, fantastic creatures that are designed to terrorize large urban areas."

(For a good treatment of this topic, please refer to "Werewolves of London" by Warren Zevon. According to this study, werewolves can be found even in the finer restaurants, as if we don't have enough problems already with screaming babies.)

What the scientists are saying is that they're creating half-human, half-animal embryos for research into various diseases.

Right. We've seen this movie before. The scientists come back to the lab and they're eaten by their creation.

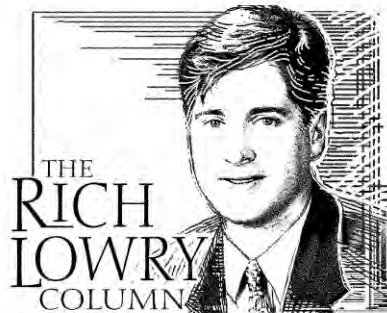

The Obama Rules

If Barack Obama gets his way, the Oxford English Dictionary will have updated its definition of "distraction" by the end of the campaign: "Diversion of the mind, attention, etc., from any object or course that tends to advance the political interests of Barack Obama."

After his blowout win in North Carolina, Obama turned to framing the rules of the general election ahead, warning in his victory speech of "efforts to distract us." The chief distracter happens to be the man standing between Obama and the White House, John McCain, who will "use the very same playbook that his side has used time after time in election after election."

Ah, yes, the famous distractions with which Republicans fool unwitting Americans. Ronald Reagan distracted them with the Iranian hostage crisis, high inflation and unemployment, gas lines and the loss of American prestige abroad. Then, the first George Bush distracted them with the notion of a third Reagan term, as well as the issues of taxes, crime and volunteerism. After a brief interlude of national focus during two Clinton terms, another Bush arrived wielding the dark art of distraction.

Obama must believe that most Americans suffer from an attention-deficit disorder so crippling that they can't concentrate on their own interests or values.

Obama has an acute self-interest in so diagnosing the American electorate. His campaign knows he's vulnerable to the charge of being an elitist liberal. Unable to argue the facts, it wants to argue the law -- defining his weaknesses as off-limits.

Here are the Obama rules in detail: He can't be called a "liberal" ("the same names and labels they pin on

everyone," as Obama puts it); his toughness on the war on terror can't be questioned ("attempts to play on our fears"); his extreme positions on social issues can't be exposed ("the same efforts to distract us from the issues that affect our lives" and "turn us against each other"); and his Chicago background too is off-limits ("pouncing on every gaffe and association and fake controversy"). Besides that, it should be a freewheeling and spirited campaign.

Democrats always want cultural issues not to matter because they are on the least-popular side of many of them, and want patriotic symbols like the Pledge of Allegiance and flag pins to be irrelevant when they can't manage to nominate presidential candidates who wholeheartedly embrace them (which shouldn't be that difficult). As for "fear" and "division," they are vaporous pejoratives that can be applied to any warning of negative consequences of a given policy or any political position that doesn't command 100 percent assent.

We could take Obama's rules in good faith if he never calls John McCain a "conservative" or labels him in any other way. If he never criticizes him for his association with George Bush. If he doesn't jump on his gaffes (like McCain's 100-years-in-Iraq comment that Obama distorted and harped on for weeks). And if he never says anything that would tend to make Americans fearful about the future or divide them (i.e., say things that some people agree with and others don't).

This is, of course, an impossible standard. Obama doesn't expect anyone to live up to it except John McCain.

To Voters, Proposition 13 Is Still a Winner

What has dominated political discussion in California for 30 years, been blamed for everything from the O.J. Simpson "not guilty" verdict to the Third World debt crisis, and yet remains as overwhelmingly popular as ever?

The answer is Proposition 13, Howard Jarvis' landmark tax limiting measure approved by nearly two-thirds of voters in 1978. A just-completed survey of California voters shows that, even after three decades, Proposition 13 enjoys overwhelming support.

The survey, conducted by Arnold Steinberg and Associates, reveals that if Proposition 13 were on the ballot today it would win by a margin of better than two to one. Perhaps even more amazing is that, in spite of the wild accusations against it, as voters learn more about Proposition 13 support reaches landslide proportions.

These results are consistent with other recent polls testing Proposition 13's popularity. From survey information and from thousands upon thousands of calls and letters we receive at the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association, we know that Californians clearly recognize that Proposition 13 benefits all homeowners -- whether they bought 20 years ago or last week -- by making taxes predictable. By limiting yearly property tax increases to no more than two percent, property owners no longer have to fear the nasty surprises -- surprises that forced many out of their homes in the 1970s. Wisely, voters jettisoned the prior "no limit" system in place prior to Proposition 13.

And it is not just the property tax reduction features of Proposition 13 that voters support. They also appreciate that, because of Proposition 13, they have the opportunity to vote on most new or increased taxes at the local level.

An additional bonus of Proposition 13 is that it actually helps stabilize government revenue -- with annual increases approaching double digits in good times, while still providing low single digit growth when the housing market turns down. However, this revenue stability is a two-edged sword. While eliminating the wild fluctuations that characterize sales and income tax receipts, this reliable source of government income makes Proposition 13 the target of short-sighted politicians and bureaucrats who would like to see the property tax rate increased, regardless of the negative impact on

property owners.

So if Proposition 13 continues to be as popular as sunshine with voters, who is opposed to it and why do we still hear shrill complaints and calls for changing the property tax system?

Those who do most of the complaining are the previously mentioned politicians, bureaucrats and others who rely on their relationship with government for their power and incomes. They continue to hatch schemes to raise taxes even though California governments at all levels, have more money, after adjusting for population growth and inflation, than then they did prior to the passage of Proposition 13, and this includes schools. For example, in inflation-adjusted dollars we spend 30 percent more per pupil than we did in what some advocates of taxing and spending wistfully refer to as the "golden age" just before Proposition 13.

It is easy to see why public employee union leaders reject any measure that limits revenue, and potential pay increases for union members, even though, according to the U.S. Census bureau we have the highest paid public employees in the nation. But opposition to Proposition 13 is not limited to those who receive a pay check directly from government.

There is a mammoth extended government infrastructure that includes contractors, bond brokers and businesses that prosper by selling goods and services to government. In short, anyone who profits from government spending is likely to oppose Proposition 13's reasonable limits on taxation.

Even with Proposition 13, California remains a high tax state. One can only imagine what it would be like for the average resident without Proposition 13.

This is why the dividing lines between support and opposition to Proposition 13 are so clear. On the one side are Proposition 13 backers who believe government's obligation is to serve the public. On the other side are those who see government's role is to serve itself. To the second group, a formidable and vocal minority, Proposition 13 is like sunlight to a vampire.

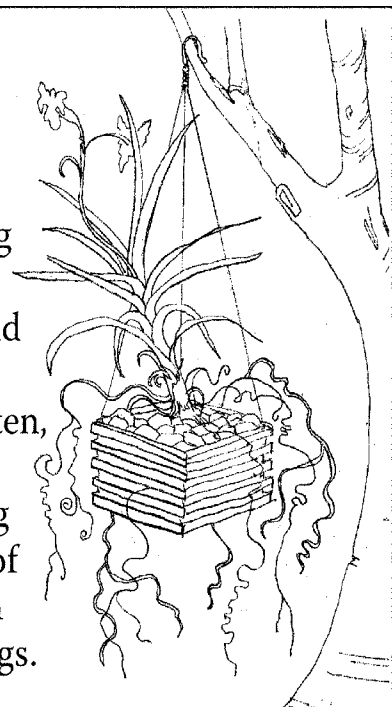
