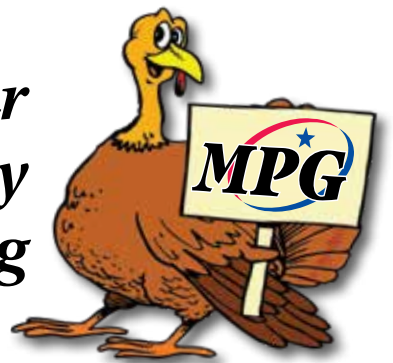

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Sprouts Farmers Market Opens

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Rancho Cordovans who have dietary restrictions or healthy eating habits may have a new favorite spot in their city as Sprouts Farmers Market recently opened a store in Rancho Cordova.

The new grocery store is located

at 10846 Bear Hollow Dr., right by the intersection of Zinfandel Drive and International Drive. A ribbon cutting was held bright and early on November 11 at 6:45 a.m. to christen the new location.

The night before the grand opening, Sprouts representatives held a “sneak peek” of the store for Rancho Cordova dignitaries and media to tour

the location. Among those in attendance were Rancho Cordova Vice Mayor Linda Budge, Deputy City Manager Micah Runner and City Council Members Garrett Gatewood and Siri Pulipati.

“It’s wonderful, it’s really a good-looking store,” Budge told the Grapevine Independent. “You can’t

California Faces \$25 Billion Budget Shortfall

When I last wrote about California’s state budget picture, Gov. Newsom was warning in his September veto messages about the state facing lower-than-expected tax revenues in the first months of the new fiscal year, and urging lawmakers to “remain discipline when it comes to spending.”

With ongoing inflation and economic problems, the state’s budget problem is growing worse by the day. The Department of Finance’s most recent Finance Bulletin, released in October, pegged the current deficit at \$6.967 billion through September.

Personal income tax cash receipts in September came in 22.9 percent lower than projected for the month, while estimated tax payments for the month were 42.3 percent lower. The Department notes that “September is a significant month of personal income tax receipts as many taxpayers pay their third quarter estimated payments.”

While the Governor’s budget won’t be released until January 10, we get a sneak preview of the budget debate every November when the non-partisan Legislative Analyst’s office releases their annual fiscal outlook for the year ahead. This year’s outlook, which was released on Wednesday, is pretty dire.

According to the LAO report, the state faces a \$25 billion budget shortfall in the 2023-24 fiscal year, which is primarily the result of lower revenue estimates than projected in the 2022-23 state budget. Over the three year budget period (2021-22 through 2023-24), the LAO estimates \$41 billion in lower revenue than projected in the enacted state budget. If the state enters a recession, which many economists believe is nearly upon us, the LAO says “revenues could be \$30 billion to \$50 billion below” their current estimates. The LAO also forecasts multi-billion-dollar deficits each year through the 2026-27 fiscal year.

Rising inflation makes the state’s budget problem even worse. The LAO estimates that the Legislature can meet the requirements of the voter-approved Proposition 98 minimum funding guarantee for education and provide an 8.38 percent cost-of-living adjustment. However, inflation adjustment isn’t built into the

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Congressman Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-07) recently took public transportation to the grand opening of the Rancho Cordova Youth Center (RCYC) on November 3.

Rep. Bera traveled to the event using the Sacramento Regional Transit District (SacRT)’s light rail system to the Mather Field/Mills station. He then hopped into SacRT’s “SmaRT Ride” on-demand micro transit program and used the service to shuttle nearly a mile down the road to the center

located at 10455 Investment Circle.

“I thought it was great,” Bera said about his ride to the RCYC opening. “If we’re thinking about how we want to live here and move around our region, we’re building this light rail infrastructure and now we’ve got that solution that gets you that last mile. It all worked very seamlessly.”

SmaRT Ride was launched by SacRT in January 2020 and is powered by software from Via, the global leader in TransitTech. Riders who don’t have smartphones can book a ride by calling (916) 556-0100, with wheelchair-accessible vehicles

available upon request.

“We want folks to use public transportation,” Bera explained Thursday. “But often if you live a mile away from the light rail [or] bus station, that becomes a challenge. Well SmaRT Ride solves that last mile issue. It allows you to get home from the light rail station or call a shared ride to get to the light rail station.”

“It really is a real smart solution to solving that, to get more folks to use public transportation.”

Funding for SmaRT Ride is provided by Measure A and a \$12 million grant from the Sacramento Transportation Authority, with a goal of expanding

into new communities throughout the region.

According to Rep. Bera’s office, the purpose of taking SacRT to the event was to “demonstrate the best of Sacramento County and what is possible when local, state and federal resources are directed towards improving the lives of families and children in the region.”

Bera has represented California’s 7th Congressional District in the United States House of Representatives since 2013. He is currently up for reelection against Republican candidate Tamika Hamilton. Bera is the leading vote-getter thus far, but the race is still too close to call. ★

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help but be impressed with the commitment to fresh food, to the organization of the store, to the fact that because they're so committed to health and wellness, that everything that you need for health and wellness is really located in an easily accessible place."

To help celebrate the opening, the Sprouts Healthy Communities Foundation awarded \$50,000 to Soil Born Farms, a local nonprofit farm that promotes urban agriculture, sustainable food systems and healthy food education. Soil Born Farms has received over \$300,000 since 2017 to support local school gardening programs throughout Rancho Cordova and Sacramento County.

"Sprouts is very thoughtful with the products they put on their shelves and offering a good mix of things that folks with different dietary needs [seek]," said Shawn Harrison, founder and co-director of Soil Born Farms. "Our mission as an organization is to try to teach people about how to do simple, delicious cooking and grow their own food and take care of the Earth. It's a perfect connection for us."

"Generally having more energy, folks

committed to health and wellness in our community can only be a good thing."

The Rancho Cordova Food Locker has partnered with Sprouts' Food Rescue program. The new store will donate groceries that are no longer fit for sale but remain edible and nutritious for consumers at the food locker.

"We're going to have to do some work to make sure that the older part of Rancho Cordova is aware that we have this new resource," Harrison explained. "With the work that we did on Zinfandel with Lowe's, more people are used to coming out to this direction, so it won't just be the newer residents who are coming into Rancho Cordova. I think [Rancho Cordovans] will receive it well."

DoorDash Delivery Available

Sacramentans who want to buy groceries from Sprouts but may not have enough time in their schedules have a new service available: DoorDash. According to Sprouts, more than 20,000 products from the store are available for delivery on the app.

Options include organic groceries, local farm-fresh produce, keto friendly, gluten-free, vegan and plant-based items. ★

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Don Nottoli Imparts His Last Thoughts as Supervisor

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Now that the election is over, Supervisor Don Nottoli is living his remaining days in office “reminiscing and reveling” on his long service and experience with the community in Sacramento County’s District 5. The Rancho Cordova Chamber of Commerce scheduled the retiring supervisor for the November 18 luncheon to show the community’s gratitude and allow him some parting thoughts.

“It’s the end of an era – the Nottoli era,” said Shelly Blanchard, Cordova Community Council executive director, as she presented Supervisor Don Nottoli.

Blanchard was referring to his 28 years of representing the 650-sq-mile area containing the cities of Rancho Cordova, Elk Grove, Galt, Isleton and the rural/agricultural areas of District 5.

Supervisor Nottoli’s years of public service spanned from 1995 to 2022, plus the 1979-1994 period in which Nottoli was chief of staff to his predecessor, District 5 Supervisor Toby Johnson, who passed away in 1994. Nottoli spoke highly of him, crediting Johnson with being “a patient teacher and mentor.”

“When I arrived in the Sacramento region, Folsom Boulevard was still the main thoroughfare between Sacramento and South Lake Tahoe and many of the main drives were non-existent,” retold the Supervisor, a native of Galt.

Nottoli remembered with many of the older community members present that

when he took office one of the prevalent, local concerns in the mid-90s was the predicament of military bases being shuttered in Sacramento County, including the Air Force Base in Mather in 1993.

Supervisor Nottoli said, “Three major military installations were going away: Mather, Army Depot and McClellan.”

Nottoli remembered meeting in those years with 600-700 people who were actively assigned to seeing the economic development of the areas affected by these former military facilities.

“My compliments to Rancho Cordova for the work that was done... as Mather would become an example of what can be done with a former military base in converting it to civilian use,” Nottoli said.

“Today, Mather stands as a shining example of former military bases... and

Mather Community Campus has now been recognized nationally for its achievement... We have made good use of these facilities.”

The period of political activity Nottoli spoke about (1979-2022) straddled both unincorporated and incorporated phases of Rancho Cordova as it grew and gained its cityhood.

He praised Rancho Cordova’s efforts towards

cityhood, which he witnessed first-hand during his terms.

He recognized the years and years of attempts and

remarkable. You’ve seen this community council flourish, the chamber of commerce, your civic organizations, schools and parks... your faith communities.”

He eulogized Rancho Cordova in how the community it serves has “blossomed and flourished,” and he also praised as “unique” the unity evident in “communities of faith, education, civic leaders and the work of the Cordova Community Council.”

Nottoli turned to homelessness in Sacramento County to impart some thoughts on “the issue that dominates conversation the most.”

“We are moving on the homeless front,” said the supervisor, “A lot of money is being devoted to this problem... [but] it’s not easy to have thousands of people unhoused. In a lot of cases, we have enough

funds, but we don’t have the housing... We also have tremendous challenges hiring people to get a workforce to provide services.”

“This week,” announced Nottoli, “the Board of Supervisors approved an additional \$17 million to the already approved \$23 million... totaling \$40 million, to buy and develop 13 acres for a Stay Safe Community in North Watt, which will have 130 beds.”

He said he was proud to report to the board that the eastern part of the county has been doing a great job dealing with homelessness for 20 plus years now.

“It’s the best kept secret,” said the supervisor, referring to 500 former homeless individuals being housed at Mather, which the board had a chance to visit recently.

In many cases he said, “We have found that balance of new housing, development and private and public investment.”

Supervisor Nottoli shared, “There’s a good portion of the homeless population that, believe it or not, are working but can’t afford a home.”

He tried to impart the need for patience, perseverance and hope about homelessness and the housing crisis associated with it.

“The work of a county supervisor is slow work and it’s a lot of work,” said the retiring Nottoli.

The supervisor said he plans to visit several national parks and spend some much-needed time with his family.

“My term ends in 45 days,” said Nottoli, “It’s a little bit surreal... [since] this has been a large part of my life.” ★

Feeding a Country During War

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

We all see on TV news about the war in the Ukraine. Most of us feel compassion towards what the citizens in that country are going through, but we really have very little idea of what it's really like. One local man, who is a baker by trade (specializing in making bread) decided that he wanted to do something to help them. For safety purposes, we will use only his first name – Shawn.

“Sometimes charity takes more than writing a check or waving a flag,” said Shawn. He joined a group out of Washington DC called World Central Kitchen. This organization is strictly a humanitarian organization with no political influence or agenda. They simply go where they are needed to help get food to those who need it. In fact, neither the organization nor the government supplied any support, of any kind, in the mission.

Shawn explained that even though the Ukraine usually has a good wheat production, other countries are sending them wheat now, but they didn't really know what to do with it. Businesses like bakeries are shut down or bombed. Those that aren't cannot follow their regular baking schedule because they are under martial law. No one is allowed outside from 10pm to 6am, except for military. Shawn knew he could help.

Shawn and three others went to the war-ravaged Ukraine this summer to do what they could to feed the Ukrainian people. Told ahead of time to bring a flak jacket and a Kevlar helmet, Shawn wasn't sure what he was getting into. He just knew that they needed help and this was something he could do. He didn't bring a jacket and helmet

because he thought it would raise questions in both our airports and theirs. Once he was there, he wished he would have.

“You can't go into a war zone armed unless you are part of the local militant system,” Shawn said, “I just went in looking like a normal American tourist.” Shawn and his friends arrived in the Ukraine with only their carry-on luggage. They were questioned why they were there. Any electronic devices were gone through thoroughly, including all text messages, photos, etc. Burner phones were purchased for the minimal communication that would be used. Russian spies and Pro-Russian Ukrainians had devices that lifted cell phone numbers when they crossed into the country. Those numbers were closely monitored while they were there. Photos were not permitted.

They traveled in different

modes while there, but no matter how they were traveling, they were regularly stopped (about every kilometer) and questioned by Ukrainian Security about why they were there and what they were doing. They especially focused on Americans. Men would board trains, buses, etc. armed with machine guns and AK47's to question passengers on their purpose of travel. Every time they focused a lot of attention on Shawn, often being the only American.

Ukrainian soldiers don't have many supplies on the frontline, so it was standard practice for people to take an SUV or some other vehicle and fill it with gasoline, food, socks and other supplies. They would then take these vehicles to the frontline and just leave them there. One of these vehicles was one of the modes of transportation that Shawn's group used to get to the next area.

Shawn and his group would arrive in a city and pull together whatever they could to set up. They would gather supplies from grocery stores that had been bombed, or restaurants that had been destroyed and occasionally they might get some food from suppliers. They would use whatever they could, often an oil drum to cook on. In one city they even used a burnt out tank to turn into a stove. They would gather big pots and set them on their make shift stoves to make soup or stew. Sometimes they made sandwiches. Occasionally they had bags of groceries to hand out.

When the air raid sirens go off, they go off across the country so you never know where the missiles were headed. Many people began to ignore them. Others would run for cover, taking safety in the underground bunkers that are

under most public buildings there (left over from WWII). There were missile strikes all around them, the closest being just a few blocks away. It was so close they could feel the rumble of the ground as the bomb exploded. In one town there was a missile that had hit the ground and was sticking out of the ground but had not detonated.

In the more rural areas, such as villages, people hid in their root cellars (a cellar that is designed for storage of potatoes and other produce). They would come out sheepishly at first, until they got to know them, then more people would come out. Sometimes the same people would make multiple trips to the same bunker. This was especially true in areas that were under heavy bombardment.

As people got to know the group, more people would come out to help. There was even a 15-year-old girl in a flak jacket and Kevlar helmet delivering bread. The group would come across schools being taught in bunkers because their school had been bombed. Shawn and his friends did what they could to get these kids school supplies.

“The hardest thing was the language barrier,” Shawn said, “But we brought a bunch of little hot wheels cars and John Deer tractors and handed those out. It was a great ice breaker, as many of them were farmers.” Shawn and his group spent three and a half weeks there and he spent around \$5000 out of his own pocket to fund the trip and supplies. They fed roughly 1500 people a day from their mobile kitchens, mostly women and children.

“It was an amazing experience. They were very grateful that we were there, and I would love to go back” Shawn said. ★

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Tax the Rich? Not So Much

Voting down Proposition 30 might seem a little off-brand for the California electorate.

These are the voters, after all, who showed no qualms just a decade ago about hiking income taxes on top earners and also hit up millionaires in 2004 to pay for mental health services. These are the California majorities who, as recently as June, told pollsters that they were either considering or had already purchased an electric car. Most named air pollution, wildfire and climate change as areas of major personal concern.

And yet the ballot measure that would have increased taxes on about 43,000 multimillionaires (on income above \$2 million a year) to fund electric car rebates and combat wildfires has suffered an unambiguous defeat. In the statewide vote count as of late Wednesday, 59% rejected the proposal.

At first glance, the fate of Prop. 30 may be the most compelling head-scratcher of the 2022 California election. But for the campaigns on both sides of the highly contested measure, and for many independent political observers to boot, there's an obvious answer to this electoral mystery — and its name is Gov. Gavin Newsom.

"You can't remove the governor from it," said Matt Rodriguez, campaign manager for No on 30. "He's a credible messenger on the opposition side, simply because I think a lot of people and a lot of Democrats take

their cues from him."

Newsom's decision to come out swinging against Prop. 30 in mid-September caught many political observers by surprise. That's both because his position seemed at odds with his reputation as a climate advocate in general and a booster of electric cars specifically, and because his opposition was so fervent. Of the seven measures on the state ballot this year, the governor only lent his likeness and directed his own campaign resources to two — the overwhelmingly successful Prop. 1 to codify abortion rights in the California constitution, and Prop. 30, a riskier political gambit.

That was a coup for the anti-Prop. 30 forces. Comparing polls taken before and after the governor cut his first "No on 30" ad, public support wilted — especially among his supporters.

"The drop among those who approve of Newsom was three times greater than those who were disapproving," said Dean Bonner, associate survey director at the Public Policy Institute of California. The No campaign found a similar shift in its private polling.

Mary Creasman, CEO of California Environmental Voters and a member of the campaign supporting Prop. 30, also said Newsom's role "100%" contributed to the measure's demise, though she also blamed the "No" campaign for what she said were "lies" about what the ballot measure would actually do.

Prop. 30 "had a record

number of billionaires against it, it had complete falsehoods thrown at it, and it had the most popular Democratic leader in the state against it," she said. "And we still got 40% of the vote."

Specifically, Creasman said the suggestion, made by Newsom and in many No on 30 ads, that Prop. 30 would have specifically benefited Lyft was false. In fact, though the measure could have helped the rideshare company meet some of the state's vehicle electrification mandates, it would have done so by subsidizing zero-emission vehicles and expanding charging infrastructure in general, not by providing money to Lyft directly.

Lyft, however, provided roughly 94% of the funding, nearly \$48 million, for the Yes on Prop. 30 campaign.

Creasman said she was especially puzzled by the governor's position, given his support for a state policy to phase out the sale of new gas-powered cars by 2035. The governor

and Legislature have committed \$10 billion on zero-emission programs and subsidies over the next five years. But Creasman argued that making the mandated transition will require more, and more reliable, public funding.

The failure of Prop. 30 puts the ball in the governor's court, she added.

"Where's the money going to come from?" said Creasman. "If the governor has some exciting, innovative new stuff that he can pull out of his pocket and say, 'Here's how we're gonna pay for it,' we are all in."

Both Creasman and Rodriguez cautioned against drawing any sweeping conclusions about California voters' policy preferences from the outcome of this single contentious proposition.

Will voters "still be progressive on tax policy? I think possibly," said Rodriguez. "Will they still be very progressive on climate? I think absolutely. I don't think any of that is gone. I just think that

voters weren't fooled."

David Vogel, author of "California Greenin': How the Golden State Became An Environmental Leader" and a UC Berkeley professor emeritus, agreed.

"I don't see it as a referendum at all on climate change or the environment," he said of Prop. 30. He pointed to the governor's opposition, the neutrality of some high-profile environmental organizations including the Sierra Club and the allegations of self-dealing by Lyft as top reasons for voter skepticism.

The Sierra Club's decision not to endorse was motivated by concerns that some of the money that the measure would have directed toward wildfire mitigation could have funded clear-cutting forests.

But that was only one of many dueling endorsements and non-endorsements in the Prop. 30 campaign that may have confused voters.

In opposing the measure, Newsom joined

traditional allies in the state's two largest teachers' unions, which warned that Prop. 30 could reduce state funding to public schools. But he broke with many Democrats and was on the same side as stranger political bedfellows, including the California Republican Party, the state Chamber of Commerce and the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association.

On the yes side, the Democratic Party, many environmentalists and trades unions joined Lyft, even though they battled the corporate giant just two years ago over its successful referendum to exempt the company's drivers from a state labor law.

The utter strangeness of those coalitions likely contributed to the defeat of Prop. 30 too, said Paul Mitchell, with Political Data Inc., an election analysis firm that works with Democrats.

"I don't think it was so much the governor's messaging, but it was confusing to voters. It was like, 'Wait, this is an environmental thing? It's a Lyft thing? The governor isn't for it?'" he said.

Mitchell pointed to the trend in California politics that ballot measures frequently lose support as Election Day nears. That's often because undecided and puzzled voters are driven by a "first do no harm" principle and, erring on the side of the status quo, vote "no."

"Confusion is the best friend of the 'no' side," said Mitchell. "You don't have to even win the argument, you just have to muddy the waters." ★

Another Step Toward Agreement on California's Water

For at least a decade, off and on, state water managers and local water agencies have pursued the holy grail of a master agreement to improve the environmental health of the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta by increasing its water flows.

At any given moment, California's water supply is a zero sum game. Therefore, increasing flows through the Delta to improve habitat for salmon and other species would require local water agencies, particularly those serving farmers, to take less from the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers and their tributaries.

That's not only a hard sell, but also could interfere with water rights, some of which stretch back to the 19th century. State officials have hoped that so-called "voluntary agreements" would forestall direct action that could touch off a legal donnybrook over those rights.

However, many environmental groups have pushed for direct and mandatory restrictions on water diversions, saying they don't trust agreements that lack the force of law and believe that water rights need to be reconfigured to match 21st century conditions, including the likelihood of semi-perpetual drought.

The pressure for

agreements ramped up in 2018 when the state Water Resources Control Board published its draft of new regulations to protect the Delta, indicating that roughly 40% of natural river flows should make it to the Delta, and most into San Francisco Bay and the Pacific Ocean.

Reaching that figure would require steep reductions in water diversions from rivers for farms and municipal users.

A few months later, newly inaugurated Gov. Gavin Newsom stressed the urgency of the situation in his first State of the State address, saying, "Our first task is to cross the finish line on real agreements to save the Sacramento-San Joaquin Bay Delta. We must get this done — for the resilience of our mighty rivers, the stability of our agriculture sector, and the millions who depend on this water every day."

Later that year, he vetoed a bill that would have adopted, wholesale, all of the environmental laws that existed in the federal government prior to Donald Trump's election as president because the Trump administration had loosened up on water diversions. Had the bill become law, Newsom was warned, it would have short-circuited the drive for voluntary water agreements.

In 2020, Newsom's Resources Agency released a framework for such agreements and earlier this year announced initial agreements with some major water interests that would forestall a legal clash.

However, there were holdouts, particularly agencies that draw water from the Tuolumne River, including

the City and County of San Francisco, which owns Hetch Hetchy Dam on the Tuolumne and transports its water to the city via pipelines. Tuolumne water diverters filed a lawsuit challenging the water board's right to impose diversion restriction and their offers for voluntary cutbacks were rejected as insufficient.

Last week, there was a breakthrough. San Francisco and two agricultural water agencies, the Modesto and Turlock irrigation districts, forged an agreement with the state to increase Tuolumne flows and enhance habitat.

"This collaborative approach holds the promise to do that (work) more quickly and holistically, while improving water reliability to communities, farms and businesses," the state resources secretary, Wade Crowfoot, said in a statement.

Does that mean that the Delta water war is over? Not necessarily.

Environmentalists still don't like the voluntary agreement approach and there still is another unresolved Delta issue: A Newsom-backed tunnel beneath the Delta to carry Sacramento River water to the head of the California Aqueduct near Tracy.

Tunnel opponents believe the flow-enhancing agreements are being sought merely to make the project, which would divert water from the Delta, more environmentally acceptable.

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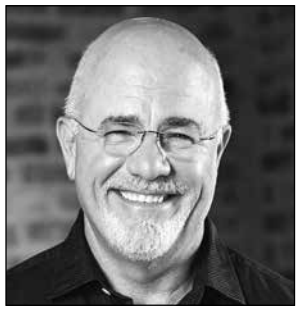
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Being Hounded Isn't the Issue

took money under agreements that you'd pay it back, and that means you need to pay it—both the old and new debts.

I'd start by running two debt snowballs. Let's do one for the car and any other active debts you have first since the collectors aren't after you about the old, dead debt. Then, smallest to largest, start knocking out the debt that's in collections. When it comes to these guys, reach out and get an agreement in writing detailing exactly how much you owe and the monthly payment amounts. Remember, do not give any of these folks direct access to your bank accounts.

There's no upside to not paying what you owe. It's an integrity issue, it's a legal issue, and it's a credit issue. Did I mention

it's an integrity issue, Mike?

You want this stuff out of your life. If you don't take care of it, I guarantee it'll come back to haunt you somewhere down the road!

rest of the budget. As a result the LAO notes that, "our estimate of a \$25 billion budget problem understates the actual budget problem in inflation-adjusted terms."

In one bit of good news, the state has amassed a significant rainy day fund reserve in recent year. The rainy day fund reserve, which became law in 2014 thanks to the efforts of then-Assembly Republican Leader Connie Conway, has required the state to save money in good times to blunt the impact of a massive budget shortfall like the state is facing this year. But the amount saved in the reserve — about \$22 billion — is roughly the same as the state's current shortfall.

Now that incoming lawmakers and the Governor have received the bad news, it's up to them to figure out how to respond. You can expect Newsom will propose a January budget that sounds fiscally conservative — suspending new programs, making cuts where they won't conflict with liberal priorities, and focusing on addressing the state's unfunded obligations, and cautioning lawmakers to focus on one-time spending.

What is unclear is how the Legislature will respond. Keep in mind that one-third of the Legislature is newly elected, and the new Democratic members are generally more liberal than the members they are replacing by any objective measure.

How will they respond if Newsom wants to suspend or repeal some of the new ongoing spending they have enacted in recent years? The LAO notes that recently enacted ongoing spending will grow to \$12 billion in new annual spending by the 2025-26 budget year and is a prime target for being suspended or cut.

Signaling a potential budget fight with Newsom, Senate President Pro Tem Toni Atkins, D-San Diego, said in a statement that, "we are prepared to hold onto the gains we've made and continue where we left off once our economy and revenues rebound."

Consider that the opening salvo in what will surely be one of the most challenging budget debates in Sacramento in more than a decade.

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In a Land Far Away and Long Ago

GOLD RIVER, CA (MPG) - “In a land far away and long ago...” is the opening line of many fairytale stories.

Those who have lived in Gold River have that sort of backdrop to our homes. We revere, and feel blessed to have, the iconic network of meandering trails and nature areas that lie along the American River.

The labyrinth of pathways that interlace the community is an opportunity to meet neighbors from “far-away lands” from Discovery to Mother Lode Villages. I’ve seen some of the same neighbors for the nearly 30 years we’ve lived here. Old friends, most of them nameless, but unforgettable people who greet each other like family.

One of the connectors trails our twin daughters used to call the “Secret Trail,” lies somewhat hidden amongst the shorter pathways, and has a special feature gracing one of the rest benches that have been added in the past few years by scouts and others.

Mr. Underwood has lived in Gold River for 40 years. You might have recognized him with his endeared companion “Dolly,” a full-sized bloodhound that he would walk several times a day; she would be seen pulling him in any direction she wanted to go, with Mr. Underwood at the other end of the leash at the mercy of her beckoning. Dolly passed away a couple of years ago, so he’s been busy with a little project.

Three years ago, he got the idea of building a rock monument around one of the benches. He started with an outline of river rock, eventually filling in the outline with larger rocks — some of them 35-40 pounds — finally filling it out to a graceful contour that looks like an architectural design contracted by an engineering firm. Actually, Mr. Underwood knows his rocks.

He worked for the US Geological Survey for 38 years and has been retired for nearly as much.

Through the journey of the three years, He hand-carried each rock from various locations within Gold River, one at a time to meet his design criteria, until his creation was completed. Mr. Underwood is 92 years old.

I tried lifting one of the larger rocks and felt immediate pain. He’s a spry older man with a kid’s heart that doesn’t seem to tire easily. His modest outlook is apparent. He doesn’t like to talk much about himself.

If you ask him why he wanted to build it, he’ll tell you: “It gave me something to do.” No longer married and children all grown, he wanted something to do to keep himself busy. He’s not a large man, and to take on the task of delivering over 500 rocks to his monument construction site is a bit emotionally stirring. One stands back and sees the detailed symmetry of the rocks, and immediate appreciation for the creator’s work is felt.

I’ve known Mr. Underwood for 15 years, usually a casual wave and smile on the trail. When I met with him this week, he was busy at his duty station doing what he calls “maintenance work,” realigning and smoothing the contours to his exacting specifications. “Kids see the rocks and like to climb on them, so I come every day to straighten them out and keep them looking nice.” He gets on his knees, visually scans the top line of rocks, adjusts them for an hour or so, then takes a break sitting on the bench to greet anyone who might be passing by.

You may see him sometime in your nature travels. Stop and say “hi.” He’ll be happy to spend some time with you but be forewarned. It will be a short conversation. He’ll see another rock that needs adjusting and correcting its course.

May his dream, however seemingly small, be appreciated by those who find it on the Secret Trail. ★

DIXON, CA (MPG) - First Northern Community Bancorp (the “Company”, OTCQB: FNRN), holding company for First Northern Bank (“First Northern” or the “Bank”), today reported net income of \$11.2 million, or \$0.80 per diluted share, for the nine months ended September 30, 2022, up 1.5% compared to net income of \$11.0 million, or \$0.77 per diluted share, for the nine months ended September 30, 2021.

Net income for the quarter ended September 30, 2022 was \$4.6 million, or \$0.33 per diluted share, up 1.3% compared to net income of \$4.5 million, or \$0.32 per diluted share, for the quarter ended September 30, 2021.

Provision for loan loss totaled \$300,000 for the three months ended September 30, 2022, compared to a reversal of provision for loan losses of \$1,800,000 for the same period in 2021. Provision for loan loss totaled \$900,000 for the nine months ended September 30, 2022, compared to a reversal of provision for loan losses of \$1,500,000 for the same period in 2021. The current period provision for loan loss is primarily due to current year loan growth. The prior period reversal of provision for loan losses was primarily due to a decrease in specific reserves on loans to one borrower.

Total assets as of September 30, 2022 were \$1.93 billion, an increase of \$8.2 million, or 0.4%, compared to September 30, 2021. Total deposits as of September 30, 2022 were \$1.80

billion, an increase of \$49.9 million, or 2.9%, compared to September 30, 2021. Total net loans (including loans totaling \$0.5 million made under the SBA's Paycheck Protection Program (PPP)) as of September 30, 2022 were \$971.2 million, an increase of \$145.6 million, or 17.6%, compared to total net loans (including loans held-for-sale and loans totaling \$72.0 million made under the SBA's PPP) of \$825.6 million as of September 30, 2021. The increase in net loans was primarily driven by originations of commercial real estate, agriculture, and residential mortgage loans, which was partially offset by payoffs, and the forgiveness and SBA reimbursement on loans made under the SBA's PPP.

Excluding PPP loans, net loan growth as of September 30, 2022 was \$217.10 million, or 28.8%, compared to September 30, 2021. The Company continued to be “well capitalized” under regulatory definitions, exceeding the 10% total risk-based capital ratio threshold as of September 30, 2022.

Commenting on the Company's financial results, President & Chief Executive Officer Louise Walker stated, “We remain focused on executing our strategic initiatives and are closely monitoring risks related to the continued impact of high inflation on both consumer and business clients. Given our strong capital, consistent earnings, solid credit portfolio and excellent liquidity, we believe that we are well positioned to help our clients navigate the challenging economic environment.” ★

Fish are a Jumpin'

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The 2022 Chinook run is in full swim.

Now cooled sufficiently for spawning, the American River is teeming with migrating salmon. Nimbus Fish Hatchery recently opened ladder gates and is harvesting eggs and milt for artificial fertilization.

The Chinook giants climb to the facility via a \$9.7 million ladder that replaced an antiquated weir system last year. "We've been pleased with its operation," notes hatchery education specialist Laura Drath, "The new ladder works for the fish. Its location opens up more spawning habitat in Nimbus Basin. It also eliminates danger to staff who had to work on the old weir."

Thirty-pound fish were already leaping as Nimbus technician Ryan Reed winched up ladder gates. Irresistibly drawn to water that courses down ladder steps at 25 cubic feet per second, 100 Chinooks completed the passage in the first hour.

Their weeks-long migration runs

the swimmers ragged. Ending a three-year life cycle, reproduction is now a final goal. Many spawn naturally and die in river shallows before reaching the ladder. But more than a century of river alteration means insufficient gravel beds remain to accommodate salmon and steelhead nests.

Much gravel restoration has been recently achieved; salmonids can be now seen breeding in augmented beds near Ancil Hoffman Park and Sailor Bar. The hatchery is nevertheless tasked to artificially fertilize about nine million eggs in mitigation for Nimbus Dam's impassable barrier. Salvageable fish meat is processed in Oregon for distribution at California food closets.

Eggs hatch in about six weeks. In spring, fry are released to begin their journey to the Pacific.

For now, the primal dance of death continues at Nimbus, as fish pitch ebbing strength at currents, rocks and ladder steps.

Salmon processing continues at Nimbus until mid-December. Anyone may visit the Fish and Wildlife department facility at 2001 Nimbus Road, Gold River. ★

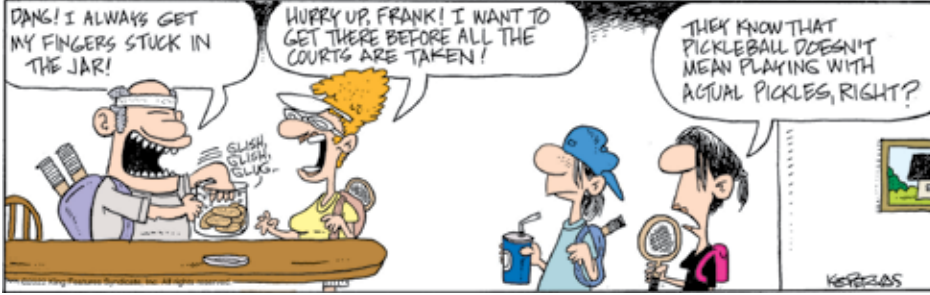

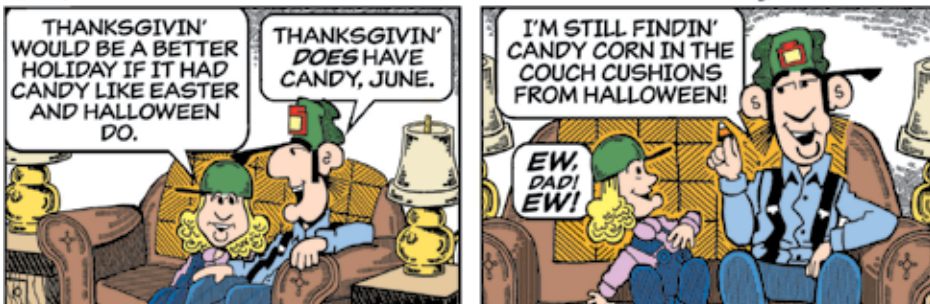

Big Sky Champs! Sac State Finishes Regular Season 11-0 with Win in Causeway Classic

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento State finished the regular season with a 27-21 win over No. 24 UC Davis to cap the first undefeated regular season in school history on Saturday in front of a school record 23,073 fans at Hornet Stadium in the 68th Causeway Classic.

The second-ranked Hornets earned their third consecutive Big Sky Conference title, completing the year with an 8-0 league record while winning their 19th consecutive conference game. The team earned the Big Sky's automatic berth into the NCAA FCS Playoffs and will find out its seed during the selection show on Sunday at 9:30 a.m. PT on ESPN.

Asher O'Hara rushed for two scores and threw another during the game to lead the offense. Sacramento State never trailed in the contest but saw its lead trimmed to 24-21 with 4:41 remaining following a 75-yard touchdown pass from Miles Hastings to Josh Gale.

Following the score, Sacramento State was able to drain nearly four minutes off the clock before Kyle Sentkowski made a 44-yard field goal. Needing a touchdown with only 32 seconds remaining and no timeouts, UC Davis quickly moved down the field with three completions to C.J. Hutton to move the ball the Hornet 45. Hastings then found

Trent Tompkins who was kept in bounds at the 33 as time expired.

Sacramento State scored the game's first points by driving 75 yards on a 10-play opening drive which was capped by a 2-yard shovel pass from O'Hara to Marcus Fulcher. UC Davis immediately answered with a 37-yard field goal from Isaiah Gomez and the Hornets closed the first quarter scoring with a 23-yard field goal from Sentkowski.

After both defenses dug in to start the second quarter, O'Hara scored his first touchdown of the game with a 19-yard rush up the middle. The Hornets needed only three plays during the series to cover 50 yards and move ahead 17-3. However, UC Davis had an answer with Ulonzo Gilliam finding the end zone on a 1-yard rush with just 18 seconds left in the half.

Both defenses came up with interceptions in the third quarter but neither offense could convert the turnovers into points. The only points in the period came from Gomez who made a 37-yard field goal with 9:39 showing.

Sacramento State again turned to O'Hara for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter. The quarterback cartwheeled his way into the end zone on an 8-yard rush to make the score 24-13. The drive was kept alive by a 20-yard run on a fake punt from Cal McGough.

Jake Duniway completed 14-of-22 pass attempts for 169 yards while O'Hara was 7-of-8 for 67 yards. Running back Marcus Fulcher led the team with six receptions for 50 yards while Parker Clayton had a team-high 73 yards on three receptions.

Marte Mapu, Jeremy Harris and Armon Bailey tied for the team lead with seven tackles each. Mapu had a pair of tackles-for-loss among his total and added three pass breakups. ★
