RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Ready to shake off the quarantine cobwebs? Did months in front of the television get you thinking that "there must

If so, you are not alone. Being cooped up by the coronavirus has made most of us yearn for some physical activity, friendly conversation and a chance to share skills. The Cordova Community Council is encouraging you to become a volunteer and chase the COVID Blues away.

"Things are beginning to open up and we're getting ready to have fun in our community again," said Marie Beckstaiger, Volunteer Coordinator for the Cordova Community Council. "And we would love to have you help us make it happen."

The Cordova Community Council has been organizing community volunteers for fun events for more than six decades. But the coronavirus era has made even the most ardent volunteers go underground.

"People volunteer for a lot of reasons," said Beckstaiger. "It makes you feel good, it gets you out of the house, it helps you meet new people and have fun being part of a team. But the number one reason people volunteer is that somebody asked them to volunteer. And we're asking."

Most Cordova Community Council event commitments are for activities held outdoors. The normal commitment is six hours. Volunteers are provided with water and snacks, any needed tools and other benefits which vary from event to event. Volunteers under the age of 18 are eligible with a signed parental permission form if they are serving as part of an adult-supervised organization or when accompanied by

- Stephanie McLemore Bray, president and CEO of United Way California Capital Region, will leave her position in mid-April as she transitions to her new role as chief engagement officer for Seattle Foundation in May. Amber Lovett, chief resource development and marketing officer at United Way California Capital Region, will transition to interim president and CEO on April 1 while the organization undergoes a nationwide search.

"It has been a privilege to lead United Way California Capital Region for the past seven years," Bray said. "I am proud of our work to end poverty, starting at school, by removing barriers to student success for lowincome children. Through our partnerships with nonprofits, government, school districts, donors and community members, we have helped many families move from crisis to thriving. Proposition 19. The Home Protection for Seniors, Severely Disabled, Families, and Victims of Wildfire or Natural Disasters Act, was passed by voters last November, enacting significant changes to California's property tax law. One provision of the measure – that concerning "parent-child" and "grandparent-grandchild" exclusions - triggered a massive property tax increase that took effect The landmark ballot ini-February 16.

While Proposition 19 has some serious shortcomings - increasing taxes on tens of thousands of California families and making it more difficult and expensive to pass on property and family farms to your children ther expands Proposition and grandchildren - it 13 benefits by allowing does offer noteworthy tax eligible homeowners to

benefits to homeowners who are nearing retirement, severely disabled or victims of natural disasters. Beginning April 1, 2021, qualified homeowners can transfer their low Proposition 13 tax base year value to a replacement home of any value, in any of California's 58 counties. Homeowners who want to downsize, move closer to family, or relocate for any other reason can blend the taxable value of their old house with the purchase price of a new, and possibly more expensive home, reducing the property tax burden they would otherwise face.

When voters overwhelmingly passed Proposition 13 in 1978, it was to rein in property tax rates that had spiraled out of control as county governments routinely raised property taxes, in many cases forcing families from their homes. tiative placed restrictions Unfortunately for on how much a homeowner's taxable value could increase every year, even if a home's market value grew substantially.

> California voters later 60, 90, and 110, which extended Proposition 13 protections to homeowners 55 or older and people with severe disabilities by giving them a one-time opportunity to retain their Proposition 13 tax base if they moved to a home of equal or lesser value within the same county or to one of the 10 counties with an intercounty agreement.

Proposition 19 fur-

transfer their base year value up to three times. It also gives property owners whose homes were damaged or destroyed by a wildfire or other natural disaster the ability to transfer their Proposition 13 base year value to a new home. These provisions of Proposition 19 take effect on April 1, 2021 and give homeowners two years to transfer their base year value to a replacement residence in any county.

I support the base year transfer provisions of Proposition 19 because they allow more homeowners to take advantage of Proposition 13 protections that continue to be widely supported by California voters. While some of Proposition 19's provisions hurt California taxpayers at a time when they need economic security the most, it's always nice to have a silver lining.

Disabled Americans Could Soon Face Healthcare Discrimination

Patients with disabilities are 11 times more likely to die from Covid-19 than their able-bodied peers. That's a sobering statistic. And it's why public health officials have prioritized these vulnerable patients for vaccinations.

Unfortunately, when it comes to non-Covid matters, society doesn't always show the same concern. In fact, many states and private insurers are pushing for a "reform" that could deprive Americans living with multiple sclerosis (MS), cerebral palsy, and other disabilities of life-saving medicines.

The reform relies on a metric known as a "quality-adjusted life year." These QALYs supposedly quantify the "cost effectiveness" of drugs by assessing the "quality" of an individual's life. The use of QALYs should concern every American, but especially those living with disabilities or battling chronic illnesses.

When this metric is utilized, a drug that delivers one year of "perfect" health receives one QALY. A drug that provides a benefit - but doesn't return a patient to "perfect" – receives a fraction of a OALY.

So, by design, QALYs devalue important treatments for chronically ill and disabled patients.

Since even breakthrough drugs will not restore perfect health in those patients, this puts them at a distinct disadvantage when it comes to accessing life-saving or lifeimproving drugs and medications. While there is no cure for blindness, MS, or cerebral palsy, new drugs can still dramatically improve patient well-being and longevity.

The British national health system regularly employs this tactic to deny coverage for advanced new therapies for chronically ill and disabled patients. Many other nations use QALY-like assessments to determine which medicines are available to patients.

The biggest advocate for their use stateside is the Institute for Clinical and Economic Review - or "ICER" - an influential Boston-based organization.

ICER's evaluations impose brutally simplistic categories on complex diseases. For instance, the institute splits patients with spinal muscular atrophy that have received treatment into three rudimentary categories: mobile, requiring ventilation, and

That classification is offensively reductive. Spinal muscular atrophy is an extremely challenging condition that involves several gradients of incapacitation. Drugs can deliver significant improvements to patients' well-being without moving them between those three categories.

Worryingly, the Institute has become very effective at getting large health insurers to utilize its metrics in their coverage decisions. And now New York health officials have begun using ICER metrics in their state-run Medicaid program, specifically to clamp down on access to advanced cystic fibrosis treatments.

ICER hasn't been the only group working to jeopardize disabled Americans' access to medication.

Shortly before President Trump left office, his administration announced a rule that ties the price of physician-administered drugs covered by Medicare to their cost in a select group of other developed nations. In doing so, then-President Trump imported the ruthless QALYs used abroad.

Countless Americans with disabilities rely on cutting-edge medications to live healthy, productive lives. Unfortunately, access to those drugs is now in jeopardy because of ICER and the Trump administration's rule. As we navigate the ongoing public health crisis, we must work to ensure these individuals have the tools to thrive, not simply survive.

To truly protect the health of the one in four Americans living with disabilities today, policymakers must work to ensure that those most deserving of new medicines are able to access them.

Three SmaRT Ride Zones Expanding Monday, April 5

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -

The Sacramento Regional Transit District (SacRT) is expanding three SmaRT Ride on-demand microtransit shuttle zones starting on Monday, April 5. The expansions will better serve residents of Arden, Carmichael, Folsom, Sacramento. With these new SmaRT Ride zone enhancements, SacRT will have eight SmaRT Ride zones, making it one of the largest mictrotransit services in the country operating with 45

electric-battery powered.

SmaRT Ride is SacRT's on-demand ride-share shuttle service where customers can use a smartphone app to request a ride that will pick up and drop them off within the service zone boundaries. The SmaRT Ride zone enhancements include:

Arden-Carmichael

Zone - The Arden-Arcade zone will merge with the Carmichael zone creating the new Arden-Carmichael zone, which will add stops to Kaiser Morse and American River College.

Folsom Zone - The Folsom zone will expand to serve the developing community of Folsom Ranch, south of Highway 50.

Natomas-North Sacramento Zone - The North Sacramento zone will

expand further into Natomas serving Arena Boulevard shops, Garden Highway, River Oaks, Gateway Oaks, Natomas and North the University Technical Institute and North Natomas Regional Park. This will become the new Natomas-North Sacramento zone.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, SmaRT Ride continues to be a lifeline shuttles, nine of which are for essential workers and

community members getting to essential services. SmaRT Ride has provided more than 130,000 trips since March 2020. The five other SmaRT Ride service zones include Citrus Heights-Antelope-Orangevale,

Downtown-Midtown-East Sacramento, Franklin-South Sacramento, Gerber-Calvine and Rancho Cordova.

SmaRT Ride customers can download the free SacRT SmaRT Ride app, which is available at Google Play and the App Store. Rides can also be requested by calling 916-556-0100 or by going online to ondemand.sacrt.com; however, trip requests must be made on the same day.

SmaRT Ride service is only available to travel within each designated service zone. SmaRT Ride shuttles cannot travel outside the service boundaries.

Your Covid-19 Vaccine Questions Answered: Is This True?

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - As more COVID-19 vaccine supplies become available and vaccination efforts begin to ramp up, the state will continue expanding who is eligible to be vaccinated, beginning with those who are most vulnerable. By the end of April, California hopes to make the vaccines available to every adult. In the meantime, Sacramento County Public Health, healthcare networks and pharmacies throughout the region continue to vaccinate people every week. The City of Rancho Cordova wants to answer your questions, point you in the right direction, and help you sort through the confusing chatter.

I've heard that the COVID-19 vaccine enters your cells and changes your DNA. Is that true?

No. The three COVID-19 vaccines available to us are designed to help your body's immune system fight the coronavirus. The messenger RNA (mRNA) from the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines does enter cells, but not the nucleus of the cells where DNA resides. The mRNA does its job to cause the cell to make protein to stimulate the immune system, and then it quickly breaks down—without affecting your DNA. In addition, the viral vector from the Johnson & Johnson/Jannsen COVID-19 vaccine uses genetic material to deliver important instructions to our cells to start building protection – without affecting your DNA.

Is the technology used to make the COVID-19 vaccine brand new?

The mRNA technology behind the Pfizer-BioNTech and Moderna COVID-19 vaccines has been in development for almost two decades. The viral vector technology behind the Johnson & Johnson/Jannsen vaccine has been in development since the 1970s. Vaccine makers created both technologies to help them respond quickly to a new pandemic illness, such as COVID-19.

I've heard that the COVID-19 vaccine was developed or contains controversial substances. Is that true?

No. The COVID-19 vaccines contain mRNA and other, typical vaccine ingredients, such as fats (which protect the mRNA), salts, as well as a small amount of sugar. The COVID-19 vaccines were not developed, as some false reports suggest, using fetal tissue, nor do they contain implants, microchips or tracking devices.

Can you die from the COVID-19 vaccine, like the person in Placer County?

During an investigation, the Placer County Sheriff-Coroner Division determined the person did not die because of the COVID-19 vaccine. The update is on their Facebook page here: bit.ly/placersheriffupdate.

Should I wait for the vaccine I want if it is not available?

No. All three vaccines are safe and highly efficacious. You should take the vaccine that is the most available to you. We need to get everyone vaccinated as quickly and efficiently as possible. Do you have more questions about COVID-19 vaccines?

Beware of 'Ghost' Preparers

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG) -The Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers to avoid "ghost" tax return preparers

whose refusal to sign returns can cause a frightening array of problems. It is important to file a valid, accurate tax return because the taxpayer is ultimately responsible for it.

Ghost preparers get their scary name because they don't sign tax returns they prepare. Like a ghost, they try to be invisible to the fact they've prepared the return and will print the return and get the taxpayer to sign and mail it. For e-filed returns, the ghost preparer will prepare but refuse to digitally sign it as the paid preparer.

By law, anyone who is paid to prepare or assists in preparing federal tax returns must have a valid Preparer or PTIN. Paid preparers must sign and include their PTIN on the return. Not signing a return is a red flag that the paid preparer may be looking to make a fast buck by promising a big refund or charging fees based on the size of the

Unscrupulous tax return preparers may also: Require payment in cash only and not provide a receipt. Invent income to qualify their clients for tax credits. Claim fake deductions to boost the size of the refund. Direct refunds into their bank account, not the taxpayer's account.

The IRS urges taxpayers to choose a tax return preparer wisely. The Choosing a Tax Professional page on IRS. gov has information about tax preparer credentials and qualifications. The IRS Directory of Federal Tax Return Preparers with Credentials

Tax Identification Number, and Select Qualifications can help identify many preparers by type of credential or qualification.

> No matter who prepares the return, the IRS urges taxpayers to review it carefully and ask questions about anything not clear before signing. Taxpayers should verify both their routing and bank account number on the completed tax return for any direct deposit refund. And taxpayers should watch out for preparers putting their bank account information onto the returns.

Taxpayers can report preparer misconduct to the IRS using IRS Form 14157, Complaint: Tax Return Preparer. If a taxpayer suspects a tax preparer filed or changed their tax return without their consent, they should file Form 14157-A, Tax Return Preparer Fraud or Misconduct Affidavit. ★

Ed Hanley, president of Hanley Investment Group, represented the seller, a private investor based in Santa Monica, California. The buyer was a private investor based in Stockton, California.

The sale of the vacant 26,520-squarefoot retail building built in 1975, and formerly occupied by Fit Republic, is situated on 2.41 acres at 2810 Zinfandel Drive and was the final transaction in the execution of four separate sales within Zinfandel Crossings. The vacant building sold for \$1.8 million.

"The sale represents a premium price for a vacant retail box sale in greater Sacramento," Fryman noted. "We utilized our proprietary database and network of industry relationships to procure a speculative investor off-market. We negotiated an accelerated seven-day due diligence period and a 14-day closing. The property represents an excellent value-add investment opportunity in the epicenter of all retail activity in Rancho Cordova, an affluent and growing Sacramento suburb."

The other three property sales that Hanley Investment Group executed at Zinfandel Crossings consisted of the 99 Cents Only-anchored center for a total of 54,000 square feet, a two-tenant retail pad building totaling 4,414 square feet, and a five-tenant pad building totaling 6,755 square feet.

According to Fryman, "The results of Hanley Investment Group's four separate property sales at Zinfandel Crossings is a great example of how the 'sum of the parts is greater than the whole.' The combined sales of the four individual properties sold at Zinfandel Crossings totaled approximately \$2.5 million more in value than if the seller had sold the entire shopping center as a single property."

"We were able to maximize value for the seller through individual sales to private non-institutional investors in a price range of \$2 million to \$4 million, a price point range that greatly appeals to the largest buyer pool in the retail investment industry," said Asher. "Buyers recognized that this shopping center and its location and demographics offered upside as well as stability. There are 216,000 people with an average household income of \$92,000 within a five-mile radius of the shopping center."

Zinfandel Crossings is located at the

dominant retail signalized intersection in Rancho Cordova at Zinfandel Drive and Folsom Boulevard with 44,000 cars per day. 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Is California Driving Business Away?

Is California killing the golden goose with taxes and regulations that drive businesses and their jobs to more hospitable states?

That question has been debated for years without a definitive answer, flaring up whenever there's a high-profile move out of the state.

With the recent relocation of several well-known firms to Texas, along with one famous billionaire, Tesla's Elon Musk, the question once again reverberates in political circles.

Musk first threatened to shift locales last year after his manufacturing facility in the Bay Area was hit with a pandemic shutdown order.

"Frankly, this is the final straw," he tweeted last May. "Tesla will now move its HQ and future programs to Texas/Nevada immediately."

"F*ck Elon Musk," Assemblywoman Lorena Gonzalez, tweeted in response. Gonzalez, a San Diego Democrat and the earners." Legislature's most outspoken proponent of scene not only as the perpetunionization, later added, "California has highly subsidized a company that has always disregarded worker safety & well-being, has engaged in union busting & bullies public servants. I probably could've expressed

my frustration in a less aggressive way. Of course, no one would've cared if I tweeted that."

In December, Musk announced his personal move to Texas and his plans to expand activities in that state.

Last week, the Center for Jobs and the Economy, an arm of the California Business Roundtable, offered new grist for the debate by launching "CaliFormers," a running list of companies that have relocated from California or expanded operations elsewhere.

"California policies have created the highest in the nation cost-of-living and strictest in the nation regulatory costs which have caused jobs in key sectors such as manufacturing to start-up, scale or relocate in other lower-cost states, sometimes iust across the border from California," the CaliFormers announcement declared.

"As we look to the future of our post-pandemic economy," it added, "the shift of the tech industry and the movement of its executives and investors will significantly impact the stability and solvency of our general fund since the state's progressive tax structure relies heavily on taxes paid by California's highest

CaliFormers arrives on the ual debate heats up again but as the Legislature considers a new spate of bills that would impose additional costs on business and/or levy new taxes on business or wealthy individuals such as Musk.

CaliFormers gives the perpetual debate a factual underpinning, but it also falls short of a muchneeded comprehensive analysis of the issue. Jerry Nickelsburg, who runs the Anderson Forecast, an economic research organization at UCLA, quickly criticized it for lacking context.

"The list does not sort by year or normalize by u-rate or employment,' Nickelsburg tweeted. "It does not track moves to CA. (e.g if a company adds 200 jobs in CA and moves 100 to TX it appears on the table as a move of jobs to TX). So, a nice graphic, but not very useful as an analysis."

Nickelsburg makes a valid point. Obviously the issue is an important one. California depends on a vigorous private sector to provide jobs and indirectly provide revenues for the services that Gonzalez and other politicians want to expand. In fact, those one-percenters at the very top of the income ladder, such as Musk, are paying half of the state's income taxes.

It's so important that it deserves far more serious analysis. Gov. Gavin Newsom and the Legislature have immense research capabilities at their command and should order up a comprehensive and independent examination of whether California is becoming toxic to vital business activity. It's time to settle the argument once and for all.

Why Are Medicare Part D Rules So Confusing?



Toni King

Hello Toni:

I received my payment invoice from the Medicare Part D plan I recently enrolled in, and I am simply confused. It shows for February, 2021 pre-

mium \$7.30 and February Late Enrollment Penalty \$7.60. I had enrolled in Medicare Part B after losing my job due to COVID-19 layoffs.

I applied for Medicare Part B with the Medicare form CMS-L564 "Request for Employment Information" signed by my HR department and to begin January 1st. My Medicare Part A began June 1, 2018 when I turned 65 and I have been covered with employer benefits including prescription drug plan until December 31, 2020 when my company insurance ended. I do not understand any of this!

 \sim Brad from Salt Lake City, Utah Brad:

America is not aware that Medicare Part D prescription drug plan's penalty date starts when Medicare Part A begins not when Medicare Part B starts. Brad your Part A started June 1, 2018 and that is when your Medicare Part D penalty began.

After you enrolled in your current Medicare Part D plan, you should have received a letter that requested you to inform that specific Medicare Part D plan what type of "creditable" prescription drug coverage you had from June 1, 2018 to January 1, 2021.

This letter explains what you should do to inform Medicare what prescription drug coverage you have had by either calling an 800 number or the letter has a form describing what type of coverage you had which you can mail back to the Medicare Part D plan you enrolled in.

Many fail to open this letter or understand the importance of notifying the Medicare Part D plan regarding what type of "Creditable" prescription drug coverage they were enrolled in.

I believe this is what happened to you, Brad because there is a specific time limit to respond, or you will receive a "Late Enrollment Penalty" not for one month but for as long as you are enrolled in a Medicare Part D plan.

The Medicare & You handbook states: "Creditable prescription drug coverage could include drug coverage from a current or former employer or union, TRICARE, Indian Health Service, the VA or health insurance coverage. Your plan must tell you each year if your non-Medicare drug coverage is "creditable coverage". This information may be sent to you in a letter or included in a newsletter from the plan."

Medicare does not acknowledge discount prescription drug cards or low-cost generics programs such as GoodRX as "creditable coverage" and enrolling in one cannot keep you from the "Late Enrollment Penalty".

Brad, your "Late Enrollment Penalty" may have been because you waited past the 63-day window to enroll in a Medicare Part D plan and was without creditable prescription drug coverage after leaving your company benefits. Maybe your company's prescription drug benefits (not health benefits) which you left last year was not creditable as defined by Medicare and that caused the "Late Enrollment Penalty". These are two different ways may have caused you to receive the Part D penalty listed on the invoice from February.

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UC Davis Research: 'Missing Link' Detected in COVID-19 Patients?


A newly published UC Davis research paper pinpoints what could be "the missing link" in why some COVID-19 patients recover and some don't.

A blood plasma biomarker discovered in hospitalized COVID-19 patients may not only predict the severity of adult respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS) but further research may lead to inhibiting the progression, a team of eight University of California researchers announced.

The UC researchers, primarily from the laboratory of UC Davis distinguished professor Bruce Hammock, found that four compounds in the blood of COVID-19 patients are highly associated with the disease. Their paper, "Plasma Linoleate Diols Are Potential Biomarkers for Severe COVID-19 Infections," is published as open access in the current edition of Frontiers in Physiology.

ARDS, characterized by fluid buildup in the lungs, is the second leading cause of death in COVID-19 patients, next to viral pneumonia, according to the National Center for Biotechnology Information.


"Different outcomes from COVID-19 infections are both terrifying from a human health perspective and fascinating from a research perspective," said UC Davis lead author and doctoral candidate Cindy McReynolds of the Hammock lab. "Our data provide an important clue to help determine what impacts the severity of COVID-19 outcomes. Initially, we focused on the immune response and cytokine profile as important drivers in severity, but considering what we now know from our study and others in the

field, lipid mediators may be the missing link to answering questions such as why some people are asymptomatic while others die, or why some disease resolves quickly while others suffer from long-haul COVID."

The compounds, known as leukotoxins and leukotoxin diols, originate from linoleic acid, the body's most abundant dietary fat, said Hammock, who holds a joint appointment in the Department of Entomology and Nematology and the UC Davis Comprehensive Cancer Center and directs the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) Superfund Research Program at UC Davis. "The leukotoxins (also called EpOMEs) are converted to the leukotoxin diols (also

called DiHOMES) by the soluble epoxide hydrolase we work on."

"The hypothesis advanced in this paper is that because the leukotoxins have been associated with serious illness and death in humans and dogs and the symptoms are those of adult respiratory distress syndrome, these compounds are biomarkers of pulmonary involvement in COVID-19," Hammock said. "We also think that it is the conversion of leukotoxin to the toxic leukotoxin diol that causes pulmonary and perivascular edema and this could be leading to the respiratory complications."

"So the leukotoxins and leukotoxin diols," Hammock said, "are indicators of respiratory problems in COVID-19 patients as plasma biomarkers. They also present a pathway for reducing ARDS in COVID-19 if we could inhibit the soluble epoxide hydrolase, a key regulatory enzyme involved in the metabolism of immune resolving fatty acids."

Professor John Imig, director and eminent scholar of the Medical College of Wisconsin's Drug Discovery Center, who was not involved in the study, said: "The COVID-19 pandemic has demonstrated that coronaviruses can have deadly consequences. Lung distress is a major reason for death in COVID-19 patients infected with the coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2). The findings of McReynolds et al. identified lipids called leukotoxin diols in the blood of COVID-19 patients that could act as a biomarker for lung distress. In addition, leukotoxin diols could be responsible for lung distress in COVID-19 patients. Excitingly, this suggest that therapies to lower leukotoxin diols could treat lung distress and prevent death in COVID-19 patients."

"The findings presented in this paper bring important attention to a role for oxylipin metabolites in COVID-19 infections," said Professor A. Daniel Jones of Michigan State University's Department of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology and director of the university's Research Technology Facility's Mass Spectrometry and Metabolomics Core. "Most notably, metabolites known as DiHOMEs which have been previously

implicated in lung inflammation show promise for their potential to pre-

dict outcomes in COVID patients and guide therapeutic, and perhaps dietary interventions beneficial to human populations." Jones, who was not involved in the study, serves as secretary of the Metabolomics Association of North America.

The UC Davis scientists used clinical data collected from six patients with laboratory-confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection and admitted to the UC Davis Medical Center, Sacramento, and 44 healthy samples carefully chosen from the healthy control arm of a recently completed clinical study.

In the introduction, the researchers wrote: "The pandemic coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19), caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2 (SARS-CoV-2), initiates an aberrant immunological response resulting in a wide range of disease severities ranging from asymptomatic cases to severe cases with rapid progression to acute respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS) and death. Patients with severe COVID-19 show evidence of hyperinflammation with increased release of inflammatory cytokines. The role of a cytokine release syndrome, or cytokine storm,

in COVID-19 has drawn much attention. However, recent reports demonstrate that, although pro-inflammatory cytokine levels are elevated in severe COVID-19 patients, they are lower than levels usually observed in non-COVID ARDS, suggesting additional factors leads to severe outcomes in some patients. One of the key pathways regulating the immune response to infections is the release of regulatory lipid mediators that have dual functions of driving inflammation [e.g., prostaglandins (PGE2)] or promoting resolution of inflammation and return to homeostasis [e.g., long chain epoxy fatty acids (EpFAs)]. Recent data indicate a role of dysregulated lipid profiles in COVID-19 and identified cytochrome P450 (CYP) metabolites of polyunsaturated fatty acids (PUFA) as potential biomarkers of disease severity.

The Hammock lab's 50-year research on soluble epoxide hydrolase (sEH) and its inhibitors led the professor to found and direct EicOsis Human Health, a Davis-based company that is developing a potent soluble epoxide hydrolase inhibitor for pain relief. Epoxy fatty acids control blood pressure, fibrosis, immunity, tissue growth, depression, pain, inflammation and other processes.

But more recently, the Hammock lab has turned its attention to using sEH as a means to resolve inflammation associated with COVID-19 and the fibrosis that can follow.

Lipid metabolism researcher Ameer Taha of the UC Davis Department of Food Science and Technology pointed out that linoleic acid is an essential fatty acid present in only small amounts in our evolutionary diets. "In addition to nutritional and structural roles of linoleate, minor linoleate metabolites including the leukotoxin diols (also known as DiHOMEs) regulate a number functions including body temperature, cardiac health and vascular permeability. This study cautions that now with dietary linoleate levels at an all-time high, in periods of high stress as with COVID-19, these regulatory functions may become detrimental.'

The paper is the work of Hammock, McReynolds and Jun Yang of the Department of Entomology and Nematology and EicOsis Human Health; Irene Cortes-Puch of the Department of Entomology and Nematology, EicOsis Human Health, and the Department of Internal Medicine's Division of Pulmonary Critical Care and Sleep Medicine; Resmi Ravindran and Imran Khan of the Department of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine; Bruce G. Hammock of UC Davis Department of Veterinary Medicine, Aquatic Health; and Pei-an Betty Shih of the UC San Diego Department of Psychiatry.

"This study resulted from an exciting collaboration with Imran Khan and Angela Haczku of the UC Davis School of Medicine to identify potential biomarkers for differentiating the severity of COVID-19 diseases," said Yang, the corresponding author.

The research drew financial support from several National Institutes of Health agencies: National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) Superfund Research Program and R35 grant, National Institute of General Medical Sciences (NIGMS), and the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH).
