Rebuilding with Hope

Nonprofit Revamps Homes for Those in Need

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - There is no question the Sacramento region is short on housing, specifically affordable housing. But what happens to existing homes for seniors and others in need when repairs are necessary but there are no resources to make them?

One leaky roof could put a senior on a fixed income into a financial spiral toward desperation and risk of homelessness. Same goes for low-income families with children, those living with disabilities and low-income veterans.

Enter Rebuilding Together, a Sacramento-based nonprofit organization that marshals the muscle of skilled labor, the heart of volunteers and the generosity of corporate and private donors to provide home rehabilitation services and programs to help individuals in need remain in their homes. Services include new roofs, paint jobs,

electrical upgrades, yard clean up, energy saving upgrades and other preservation programs.

"One thing we talk a lot about here is the issue of a lack of housing in our community," said Carrie Grip, who has served as the agency's executive director for nearly two decades. "But there's also the fact that we have many houses across our communities that are substandard and causing health and safety issues that, if not repaired or mitigated, threaten to put homeowners at risk of losing them."

One of the largest recipient groups of support from Rebuilding Together, says Grip, is seniors, who comprise the fastest-growing population nationwide. Many have lived in their homes for decades and are facing down challenges of getting older in their aging homes

Sacramento County Credit Rating Increased

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- As a result of Sacramento County's commitment to fiscal responsibility, major credit-rating company Standard and Poor's Rating Services (S&P) raised the County's credit rating two notches.

Following the Great Recession in 2008, Sacramento County diligently worked to strengthen the region's economy, financial flexibility and fiscal stability, providing more job opportunities and housing options while also implementing new budget processes and financial policies.

S&P raised Sacramento County's credit rating to the following:

- County Long Term Rating from "A" to "AA-"
- County Pension Obligation Bonds from "A" to "AA-"
- County Certificates of Participation from "A-" to "A+"

Additionally, the S&P's rating

report highlighted the following factors as areas of strength for Sacramento County:

- Strong economy, with access to a broad and diverse metropolitan statistical area
- Strong management, with good financial policies and practices under S&P's Financial Management Assessment methodology
- Strong budgetary performance, with operating surpluses in the general fund and at the total governmental fund level in fiscal 2017

S&P summarized Sacramento County's position in their annual report, stating that their rating "reflect(s) our view of the County's restoration of positive available fund balances, resulting in an improvement in the county's financial flexibility, as well as our opinion of the county's improved economy, as reflected in improved wealth and income indicators."

Women's Empowerment Graduates 1,500th Formerly Homeless Woman

24 Women Once Homeless Graduate From the Sacramento Job-Readiness Program

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Community members from across Sacramento witnessed Women's Empowerment graduate its 1,500th formerly homeless woman, Cynthia Miller of Citrus Heights, in mid-March. Miller joined 23 other graduates as they completed the comprehensive nine-week job-readiness program for homeless women.

Miller was homeless with her three young children when she was accepted into Women's Empowerment's job-readiness program.

"Women's Empowerment truly gave me hope and it boosted my confidence. It was so empowering because it made me realize how much I have to offer our community."

Miller's immediate goal is to attend college in the fall to obtain her Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) certificate and begin working at a senior living facility.

"My ultimate goal is stop this cycle of homelessness so my children don't have to grow up in it anymore. I plan on providing a stable home for them and enrolling them in a school where they can make friends for life. Having all of the support from Women's Empowerment helped me discover that achieving my dreams is possible."

Held at the VFW Post 67 in Sacramento, 100 graduation attendees heard each graduate's story and future plans. Each woman accepted their

from Intel, the California Assembly and Women's Empowerment. She received a new handbag filled with a day planner and other items designed to help her succeed from the generous employees of Dignity Health, and enjoyed a lovely reception sponsored by Kiwanis Club of Greater Sacramento.

"Our graduation ceremonies are a unique community event where women like Cynthia can be celebrated for their accomplishments," said Lisa Culp, executive director of Women's Empowerment. "At Women's Empowerment, we know that the most long-term solutions to truly ending homelessness. And today 24 formerly homeless women are re-joining our workforce, regaining safe housing and breaking the cycle of homelessness for themselves and their children. They are ready to achieve their dreams."

Women's Empowerment was featured on NBC's The TODAY Show in 2015 for offering the most comprehensive job-readiness program in the Sacramento area designed specifically for women who are homeless and their children. The award-winning

Light Up or Leave It Alone?

Employers Face a New Problem

- Sacramento employers are caught between a rock and a hard place as marijuana is now a legal recreational drug in California, but still outlawed by the Federal government. In many ways nothing has changed for regional companies with Federal contracts, transportation or safety issues in the workplace despite California voter approval of 'pot' use.

Pacific Staffing asked top regional companies if recreational marijuana use in the first three months of 2018 resulted in any issues in the workplace. While not all could or would answer twenty-seven percent (27%) of those responding said 'Yes'. Among the impacts noted by newly legal pot use were employees fired for keeping a 'stash' at work, more 'red eye' observed on the job, absenteeism, tardiness and one employer reporting a job injury from 'inattention'.

While state law allows recreational marijuana use, most employers say little has really changed in at-work policy as sixty-two percent (62%) reporting say they still pre-test for employment, thirty-six percent (36%) random test for safety while another thirty-six percent (36%) described their company as 'drug free' with eleven percent (11%) stating a 'zero tolerance' policy that remains in place. While many of those contacted directly by phone between February 27 and March 23, 2018 recognize state law has changed, eleven percent (11%) consider 'pot' use similar to alcohol and unacceptable

at work. For job applicants and current employees any use might become problematic as testing remains unable to pinpoint exactly how long it's been since marijuana was consumed.

One anecdotal comment noted, "Never, ever come to work drunk or high" as the best

Another HR contact said misunderstanding by applicants recently resulted in problems in hiring, as a recent driver position drew nine people with seven dropping out of the potential employee pool because they thought 'smoking pot' was now 'okay' and failed a drug screen.

Sixty-Five percent (65%) of regional companies surveyed will hire in the second quarter, with demand in April, May, June equally split between motivation for workforce expansion (46%) and attrition

General labor, entry level to skilled trades employers say applicants are in short supply in the Sacramento area. Sales, manufacturing, warehouse/ shipping, product assembly and a wide range of technical skills are in high demand. Companies also sought construction estimators, escrow experience, route/ delivery drivers and accounting/finance backgrounds.

Buzzed for a Good Cause

City officials, Residents Lose the Locks For Kid's Cancer Research



RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Getting "buzzed" took on a whole new meaning for Rancho Cordova city, law enforcement officials and others who became "shavees" March 28 as participants in the city's fourth annual head-shaving fundraiser to support Southern California-based St. Baldrick's Foundation, a leading supporter of children's cancer research.

"This is a great way to support one of the least-funded forms of cancer: children's cancer," said City Councilman Donald Terry. Terry, alongside his son Keaton, 7, took the stage at Claimstake Brewing Company, the site of the 2018 fundraiser, and let the ladies from Indie Salon in Folsom shave their heads in the name of finding a cure for the devastating forms of cancer that claim children's lives; one about every three minutes in the United States, it is estimated.

The city's St. Baldrick's headshaving fundraiser is one of more than 1,000 similar events held by various individuals, city departments, companies and community service groups each spring nationwide. Pledges for shaves, combined with individual donations, go directly to St. Baldrick's, who is considered the largest private provider of grants and funding for lifesaving childhood cancer research in the country.

These "bold acts of baldness," as they are called, began as individual fundraisers in 2000. The first head-shaving event was held a as a St. Patrick's Day party Jim Brady's pub in Manhattan. The group raised \$104,000 for research with 19 shavees participating. By 2004 there were enough events happening around the country to officially call the growing number of head-shaving events a movement. St. Baldrick's Foundation was formed



the largest donation of \$500 coming from the Sacramento Telangana

as a full-fledged non-profit organization, going strong ever since.

To date, St. Baldrick's has raised more than \$234 million to help kids' overcome cancer and provide a critical funding pipeline for specialists' to continue vital research for cures.

Today, the shaving events are held at various locations nationwide: restaurants, schools, churches, parks, firehouses, military and other locations, and, of course, breweries. Councilman Terry got involved four years ago when friend, Zak Ford, a member of the Folsom Cordova Unified School District, asked him to join him at a St. Baldrick's head-shaving event in

Terry, a former FCUSD board member himself, and Ford both

have known students at their children's schools who have either died from or experienced some form of cancer. The event is largely personal; the passion for the cause incomparable.

"I'd always wanted to do this after Zak introduced me to it," said Terry. "My son went to school with a kid who had cancer, which really brought this close to my heart. So I put a team together at the city to get our event started here in Rancho. This year, we thought it would be fun to have it inside a brewery. It gives a whole different meaning to the idea of getting 'buzzed.' I'm proud to be part of this and I know the rest of my colleagues are too."

The city raised a grand total of \$8,500. Councilman Terry

received roughly \$1,000 in pledges for the cause. He announced he would have the initials of his largest donor shaved into the back of his head "Until it, too, gets shaved off."

Just before he went completely bald, Terry had the initials S.T.A. artfully shaved into the back of his head for a photo op. S.T.A. stands for the Sacramento Telangana Association, which donated \$500 to Terry's team. The association supports local charities and the promotion of Telangana (an Indian State) culture, which dates back some 5,000 years. It has several chapters nationwide.

Terry was not the only Rancho official to take one for the kids. Councilman Garrett Gatewood, as well as his two sons, Garrett Jr., 10, and Jacob, 7, boldly went for the bald look together on stage. For Gatewood and his sons, the cause was also personal. Their mother, Cheryll Gatewood, who was in the audience, is a survivor of childhood cancer, Gatewood said. On stage, the kids said they were doing it for her, as well as the kids out there with cancer.

"This is a special event for us and of course one that is close to home," Gatewood said. "So my whole family is here tonight. It's a great cause and of course tonight we have people who are participating and those who are just watching. We're getting buzzed in more ways than one."

In addition to Gatewood and Terry, Rancho Cordova Police Department Sgt. Greg Saunders and Officer Jeff Wright also took the challenge and let their heads be shaved for the cause, as did several members of the community who either initially pledged or, perhaps after a few rounds of chocolate stout or one of the breweries other offerings, mustered up the courage to go bald for a cure.

officer, in the honor guard, and as a shift supervisor. His dream, though, was to come to the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department.

In 2000, Sacramento County was contracting with the City of Citrus Heights for police services and needed officers with experience in traffic enforcement. He had gained experience in Woodland in programs such as driving under the influence (DUI) and traffic collisions, and he was offered a position as a patrol officer, quickly transitioning to a motor officer.

"As a motor officer, you are an ambassador for the department as you interact with the community on a regular basis," said Officer Aubuchon. "Your role includes not just enforcement but educating the community through talks and safe driving practices."

Aubuchon joined the Rancho Cordova Police Department (RCPD) in 2005 as one of the first motor officers hired. He remembers a different city that started to provide resources towards public safety to make the community a safer place.

"I am most proud to have been part of the transformation that has taken place in Rancho Cordova," said Officer Aubuchon. "Rancho Cordova is a safer community because of the proactive policing programs that have been implemented. It's very fulfilling to know that I had a role in that."

For the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, Officer Aubuchon served on the Motorcycle Safety Committee, as well as the Committee on Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted. He participated in writing motor policy for the state, and determining the cause of death for officers in the line of duty to prevent further deaths from occurring throughout the state.

Officer Aubuchon was also instrumental in creating an inhouse training program that teaches RCPD officers to

investigate traffic collisions and respond to DUIs. The program was created in response to him and Officer Marcus James responding to these situations and noticing that their fellow officers might benefit from additional training to better serve the Rancho Cordova community.





RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) -At our City Council Meeting last night, Agenda Item #13.9 amended the Rancho Cordova Municipal Code regarding Chapter 23.719, Parking and Loading. The amendment deleted language stating that an RV, boat, or trailer could not be parked within the front and street side yard setbacks. Our vote on the ordinance amended the language that was modified last summer. We estimate there are hundreds of citizens who have been parking RVs, boats, or trailers on the driveway of their homes. There were 20 or 25 citizens at the last City Council Meeting who wanted to speak and keep their RVs, boats, or trailers parked in front of their homes, just as they have been doing for decades. The few who spoke thanked their Council for correcting the change in the ordinance. Many people

RV behind their fences, nor have the extra money it would cost to find a storage place. Those costs are estimated to have been from \$1,500 to \$5,500 or more a year.

A subcommittee of city staff and citizens is being formed to address issues identified with RVs, boats, and trailers parked in residential neighborhoods. That is about as far as I can say for now, since the subcommittee hasn't begun meeting. As for what the new rules may be, that is all speculation. The only thing that is sure is that our citizens can continue to park their vehicles at home. We will all be waiting to see what the subcommittee will be able to accomplish.

And another thing that is important will be the final approvals of the Community Enhancement Fund applications. When Measure H was passed in November 2014, we asked the citizens of the City of Rancho Cordova how they wanted their tax money to be spent. It was something of a shock to some people when their local government asked them how they wanted the government to spend their tax money. When we had 16 public meetings and really asked that question again, the people realized that we were serious about it. Millions of dollars have been spent on police, art, sports, and many other items that were and are important to the people. The applications that are sent to City Hall, studied by staff, and approved by the City Council, are the things that our citizens say are important to them. Thank you all for putting in the time you spent on your application.

Our citizens put in thousands of volunteer hours. Many of the wonderful people in Rancho Cordova do what they know needs to be done, and they move forward. "A ship in harbor is safe, but that is not what ships are built for." I couldn't find the author of that quote, but it is very fitting. Whether it is a ship in harbor or one at sea, some people must stay at home, while others are willing to face some of life's storms. And while they may crash when they try, they know it was worth the

with limited funds for making necessary and, in some cases, life-saving upgrades and repairs.

"Sacramento is not equipped to handle the growing senior population," said Grip. "There is no place for many seniors who lose their homes to go. So, it's a lot cheaper for them if we can fix a roof, a leaky pipe, paint the house or install safety bars and other things that will allow them to stay in their homes safely."

Originally called "Christmas in April," Rebuilding Together was launched in 1991 when roughly 70 volunteers joined forces to make repairs to the home of an elderly and disabled resident in Sacramento. They restored the roof, painted, rebuilt fences, made some electrical repairs and cleaned up her yard. Thus a movement was hatched.

Today, Rebuilding Together (the name was changed in 2001) is comprised of 160 chapter affiliates nationwide. The Critical Repair and Accessibility Program provides services all year long and, to date, has served hundreds of area homeowners. The Sacramento chapter is preparing for its signature event, the 2018 Rebuild Day, which actually takes place over two days, Friday and Saturday, April 20 and 21.

This year, 13 homes in the Rancho Cordova community have been identified for Rebuild Day. The organization has received a grant for \$150,000 from the city's community enhancement fund to support the event and ongoing services. A typical home fix, says Grip, can range from \$5,000 all the way up \$30,000, depending on the condition of the home.

"The money goes fast because the need is so great," said Grip.

Grip said her agency also has received roughly \$300,000 from the city's community development block grant program that will be used for other facets of

the organization's rehabilitation programs and services, which include the Safe at Home and Energy Conservation programs.

Other community partners include SMUD, the Regional Water Authority, UC Davis, the Sacramento Association of Realtors®' Foundation, as well as local service clubs—all of whom have volunteers who, by the way, says Grip, also show up for Rebuild Day.

"This is truly a collaborative effort," said Grip. "Our partners in the community are outstanding supporters and we are fortunate to have those relationships."

Rebuilding together also has an ongoing partnership with the Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency, which allows for continued work across the region. The agency, says Grip, plans to expand its services in 2019 and is currently seeking funding to do so. In addition, a new partnership with AARP is helping to create "Lifelong Home" outcomes through its "Home Fit" classes for seniors.

"The AARP provides a training program for seniors to show them how to make their homes more senior-friendly so they can avoid having to move as their needs change," said Grip. As we all know, allowing seniors to remain in their homes wherever possible, can make a huge difference in their health and wellbeing."

Low-flow and raised toilets, weather stripping for doors and windows and other conservation features, as well as grab bars for showers, hand rails and shower seats and wheel chair ramps are in high demand, and, says Grip, the need is growing, particularly in Rancho Cordova.

"The funding is here for us to do our work, so yes we are focused in Rancho Cordova for now, but it's also an area where we can make a significant impact," said Grip.





"SPLITTING UP" AND "ROSEANNE" **NEW AND OLD COMEDY ON ABC TV**

ATV Review by Tim Riley

"SPLITTING UP TOGETHER" ON ABC

The ABC television network is having a busy mid-season with a slew of new comedies and other series programming. For one new show, ABC has adapted a TV program from Denmark for its comedic inspiration.

Similarly titled as the Danish version, "Splitting Up Together" stars two recognizable television faces as a couple with three kids that decides to call it quits but for financial reasons decides to share, to some extent, the family home.

Jenna Fischer's Lena and Oliver Hudson's Martin, married for 12 years, apparently hit a dead-end long ago, and so they just matter-of-factly tell family and friends at a dinner gathering that they are "pulling the plug."

It would appear that Martin wanted to be the "fun parent" and shirked a lot of his marital responsibilities, from taking out the garbage to other small chores. When it was revealed that he didn't even dance with his wife at their wedding, you wonder how they even got this

Now the divided household requires each parent to live in the main house for a week, taking care of the kids, while the other takes up residence in the converted garage. Since they have an incredible Craftsman house, it's no wonder that neither party wishes to relocate.

As with most situation comedies, "Splitting Up Together" should rely on its lead characters being more than one-dimensional while uttering the occasional funny circumstantial

After all, Jenna Fischer in "The Office" and Oliver Hudson in "Rules of Engagement" had good runs in network comedies which demonstrated their abilities to be a perfectionist and a self-absorbed egotist respectively, traits that work for both in the new series.

The underlying theme of 'Splitting Up Together" appears to be whether this former couple, living in such close quarters, might actually reconcile their relationship and become a solid family unit.

If that's really the case, does this series have the ability to sustain a long run for the "will they or won't they" dynamic? I have no idea how this question was ever resolved, if at all, with the Danish program.

"ROSEANNE" ON ABC

After its initial TV debut nearly three decades ago, "Roseanne," a working-class family sitcom that ran for nine successful seasons, has been rebooted with most of the original cast in place on the ABC network.

The original program was innovative for its focus on the family dynamic where both parents were dealing with everyday problems while juggling work and parental duties to make ends meet.

Not much has changed in the Conner household in the intervening years, except that Roseanne Barr's Roseanne and John Goodman's Dan have settled into dealing with aging problems, such as taking a lot of medications and handling the usual family rifts.

The new series kickoffs with Roseanne waking up in bed with her husband Dan and saying to him, "I thought you were

dead" and he replies, "Why does everyone think I am dead?," which is apparently the quick and easy way to deal with the fact that he supposedly died in the original ninth season.

In the first episode, "Roseanne" also tackles the fallout of the 2016 election where friction remains between Roseanne and her sister Jackie (Laurie Metcalf), who shows up wearing a "Nasty Woman" T-shirt and the ubiquitous knit cap that was prominent in the Women's March on Washington.

Looking to tackle social and political issues appears at the initial glance as a way to involve the family in a wideranging discussion on issues from healthcare and jobs to oldest daughter Becky's (Lecy Goranson) desire to become a surrogate mother for a huge payday.

The Conner household has expanded to now include daughter Darlene (Sara Gilbert), now divorced and broke, with two children, the youngest one a precocious grade-schooler whose wardrobe is, well, a bit too unorthodox for his new classmates.

One thing for sure about the revived "Roseanne" is that the one-liners remain sharply funny. When asked about family medical history, Roseanne says, "All of your relatives died of alcoholism. The ones that didn't drink were killed by the ones who

Without keeping score, it would seem a lot of the good lines naturally go to Roseanne, but others definitely get in their licks. Not thrilled with Becky's plans for surrogacy, Roseanne retorts, "Don't have a yard sale in your uterus."



Remembering Martin Luther King, Jr.

Commentary by Dr. Gary S. Smith

Fifty years ago, on April 4, 1968, Martin Luther King, Jr. was killed when he stepped from his second-floor hotel room at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee, to speak to Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) colleagues standing in the parking lot below. An assassin's bullet ended the life of the 39-year-old activist who had helped advance the cause of African-American rights more in 14 years than it had progressed in the previous 350 years.

King's life and legacy are remarkable. His shrewd strategy of non-violent protest, charismatic personality, electrifying speaking ability, and soaring words mobilized the black community, challenged centuries of oppression, and changed America. Inspired by his faith, the Baptist minister helped

direct the Montgomery Bus boycott initiated by Rosa Parks in 1955, helped found and led the SCLC, organized numerous marches and sit-ins, and penned five books. His 1963 "Letter from the Birmingham Jail" and "I Have a Dream" speech delivered to 250,000 people at the National Mall in Washington, D.C. in August 1963 detailed the plight of America's blacks and helped reduced racial discrimination. His sermon "I've Been to the Mountaintop," preached at the Mason Temple in Memphis, the headquarters of the Church of God in Christ, the night before his death ranks with John Winthrop's "A Model of Christian Charity" and Jonathan Edwards' "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God" as among America's most famous.

King had initially planned to speak at Williston Senior High School in Wilmington, North Carolina, on April 4 to support Reginald Hawkins, a dentist

and civil rights advocate, who was the first African-American gubernatorial candidate in the state's history. King then planned to stump in other North Carolina cities on Hawkins' behalf. Instead King decided to stay in Memphis to support the strike of predominantly black sanitation workers who were protesting their low wages and deplorable working conditions. There he declared in his April 3 sermon, perhaps having a premonition of his death, and paraphrasing Moses, "[God has] allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the promised land. I may not get there with you."

On April 5, about 200 black Williston students peacefully marched to the downtown New Hanover County Courthouse to hold a prayer service in memory of King. Another group of students went to nearby New Hanover High School to demand that the white

school's American flag be lowered to half-mast.

Enraged by King's murder, blacks throughout the nation rioted. Violence erupted in more than 100 cities, killing 40 people and causing extensive property damage. One hundred thousand soldiers and national guardsmen joined local police to battle arsonists, looters, and snipers; thousands of people were arrested.

President Lyndon Johnson proclaimed a national day of mourning on April 7. In response to King's death, many schools, museums, public libraries, and businesses closed and the Academy Awards ceremony scheduled for April 8 and numerous sporting events were postponed. On April 8, King's widow, Coretta Scott King, her three oldest children, movie stars, religious leaders, and thousands of other Americans marched in Memphis to honor the slain activist and support the sanitation

King's funeral service, held the next day at the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta where both King and his father served as ministers, was attended by many prominent politicians and civil rights leaders, including Vice President Hubert Humphrey, Robert Kennedy, Richard Nixon, and Ralph Bunche. Benjamin Mays, the president of Morehouse College in Atlanta, from which King had graduated, gave the eulogy, declaring that King "would probably say" that "there was no greater cause to die for than fighting to get a just wage for garbage collectors." After the service, more than 100,000 mourners followed two mules as they pulled King's coffin on an old farm wagon

through the streets of Atlanta. King's accomplishments are well known. King's inspiring books, mesmerizing speeches, creative leadership of the SCLC, and direction of the civil rights movement won him the 1964 Nobel Peace Prize (the youngest recipient to that date). His work also helped pass the landmark Civil Rights Act

of 1964 that prohibited racial segregation in employment, schools, and public accommodations and mandated that voter-registration requirements be applied equally to all races.

What is less remembered about King is that his Christian convictions inspired his civil rights activism. The Baptist pastor's faith played the pivotal role in his fervent quest for political and social change. "Before I was a civil rights leader," King declared in a sermon, "I was a preacher of the Gospel. This was my first calling" and it "remains my greatest commitment." Everything "I do in civil rights I do because I consider it a part of my ministry."

King was especially motivated by the example of Jesus' selfless love and his charge to love others as we love ourselves. In accepting the Nobel Peace Prize, King asserted, "I believe that unarmed truth and unconditional love will have the final word." As we remember King's life and contributions and continue to combat racism, poverty, and violence, may we pray that truth and love

Game Plots

A Far Cry from Moral Responsibility

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Far Cry 5 promised something more than its series' classic formula of frightening villains and explosive gameplay. By taking a turn inward to the US and by casting its enemies as cult-indoctrinated American citizens, it powerfully hinted at a narrative that would comment on rural disenfranchisement, race, the role of religion in American culture, and the role of rhetoric in political polarization.

And at the end of the day, Far Cry 5 addresses none of those. It deftly steps around anything that could be considered social commentary (the cult is shockingly diverse for a rural Montana county, avoiding any ties to white supremacists, and the cult's reliance on bizarre mind-control means any commentary on religion becomes impossible). The facts that the "bad guys" are the friends and family of the "good guys," that neither side are some foreign dictatorship or terrorist group, and that all combatants are American civilians, are glossed over without the moral weight and consideration that they

This is a disappointing turn from the overall progress that Far Cry 5's developer Ubisoft has been making in recent years in its boldness to use big-budget games to touch on real-world issues. Assassin's Creed IV: Black Flag touched on corporate corruption with a fictionalized version of Ubisoft itself, Watch Dogs 2 embraced the diversity of San Francisco youth culture while

still criticizing Silicon Valley's exclusion of minorities, and despite continuing tensions in the Middle East and rising discrimination against those of Middle Eastern descent, Ubisoft allowed its major 2017 blockbuster, Assassin's Creed Origins, to star an Egyptian

However, in a time when the country is more divided than ever, Far Cry 5 takes an almost cowardly approach to the issues it hints at, trying its best never to take a stance or stir the pot. In its attempts at blandness, however, it only exacerbates our divisions, showing us that our fellow Americans cannot be reasoned with or convinced to moderate, and that the only real solution might be for us to start shooting each other.

This implication is obviously unacceptable, not in the least because America already has a painful history of civil war and violent internal conflict. It shows that Ubisoft is backing off from its ability to use its art as a tool for commentary, empathy, and contribution to social discourse. It need not lean to the left or the right to do so; there are plenty of issues (including and especially our

level of ideological fracturing) that Americans across the political spectrum are concerned about; one could argue it's already been successfully walking that apolitical line with the criticisms of corporate culture in Black Flag and Watch Dogs 2. As the review scores and commentary corroborate, Far Cry 5 isn't only being viewed as a failure as a story, but as a painfully mediocre game because of this massive oversight. Through its gameplay mechanics, the Far Cry series has always encouraged exploration, creativity, and boldness. Let's just hope that, in the future, its creators can continue to exhibit those same qualities.

Defendants Convicted of Shooting, Robbery in Marijuana Deal

DATE: March 14, 2018 CASE: Gerald Fernandez & Allen Chao (Case #15F06554)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Sam Alexander, Felony Prosecution Unit

Gerald Fernandez and Allen Chao were convicted by a jury of attempted murder and robbery. The jury also found true the allegation that the defendants personally used a firearm causing great bodily injury on both counts.

On February 12, 2015, Fernandez arranged a marijuana deal with the victim. When Fernandez and Chao met with the victim, Fernandez produced a .40 caliber firearm. Chao was also armed with a .25 caliber firearm. Fernandez and Chao shot the victim multiple times in the chest and stomach before fleeing the scene. The critically wounded victim was able to dial 911 and was transported to a hospital. After multiple surgeries, he remained at the hospital and a physical rehabilitation facility for months.

Detectives from the Sacramento Police Department worked through phone records and interviews to identify Fernandez and Chao as the shooters. In addition, the District Attorney's Crime Lab linked Chao to the crime through DNA and ballistics testing on the .25 caliber gun recovered during a separate Elk Grove Police Department investigation.

Both defendants face a maximum sentence of 34 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for May 4, 2018, at 9:30 a.m. in Department 25 before the Honorable Robert Twiss.

Defendant Convicted for Felony Real Estate Fraud

DATE: March 29, 2018

CASE: Alaric Donya Scott, Jr. (Case #16FE018514) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Ruth Young, Real Estate Fraud Unit

Alaric Donya Scott, Jr. was convicted by a jury of 13 felony counts of offering to file or filing false documents, two felony counts of perjury and two misdemeanor counts of failure to maintain notary books. The jury also found true a white collar crime enhancement for taking more than \$100,000.

Between July 2013 and May 2015, Alaric Scott filed fraudulent documents, including Mechanics Liens and UCC-1 Financing Statements, against multiple properties in Sacramento County. The fraudulent documents clouded the property titles, and Scott used the liens as leverage to try and obtain money from property owners to clear the titles. In one of the properties, the bank seller paid Scott to remove his fraudulent lien so they could complete the sale of the property.

Scott faces a maximum sentence of 16 years and 8 months in state prison. Sentencing is set for April 26, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 38 before the Honorable Sharon Lueras.

This case was investigated and prosecuted by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Real Estate Fraud Unit.

Defendants Convicted of Robbery, Kidnapping Charges

CASE: Crystal Graham & Joe Navarro (Case #16FE017331)



Christensen, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit Crystal Graham and Joe Navarro were convicted by two separate juries of robbery and multiple kidnapping related charges. The court also found that Navarro had seven prior prison

On August 28, 2016, Graham took the victim back to her motel room. Navarro was waiting in the room, assaulted the victim and stole his wallet and keys. He also forced the victim to give him his ATM pin number. Navarro bound the victim's hands and covered his face. Navarro and Graham then kidnapped the victim and drove him to multiple locations. During the course of the kidnapping the victim was able to loosen his hands, which caused Graham to panic and pull over on the shoulder of the highway. The victim was able to open the door and run towards oncoming traffic for help. Navarro was later found in Salinas and was returned to Sacramento. Graham was extradited to Sacramento from Nebraska.

Navarro's criminal history includes convictions for assault with a deadly weapon, vehicle theft, unlawful sexual intercourse with a child, sexual battery, failure to register as a sex offender, drug sales and possession of ammunition by a prohibited person.

Graham faces a maximum sentence of 12 years to life in prison and will be sentenced on April 20, 2018, at 11:00 a.m. Navarro faces a maximum sentence of 19 years to life in prison and will be sentenced on May 11, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. Both sentencings will be in Department 40 before the Honorable Raoul Thorbourne.

How do you sell a vehicle with a lien amount that's higher than the actual value of the car?

Dear Michael,

First, you need to find a way to cover the difference between the amount of the lien and what you can get for the car. Let's say the car is worth \$12,000, and you owe \$15,000. That would leave you \$3,000 short.

The bank holds the title, so unless you give them the payoff amount of \$15,000 you're not getting the title. The easiest and simplest way would be if someone buys the car for \$12,000, and you had \$3,000 on hand to make up the difference. If you don't have the money to make up the difference, you could go to a local bank or credit

\$3,000.

I really hate debt, but being \$3,000 in the hole is a lot better than being \$15,000 in the hole. Then, you could turn around and quickly pay back the \$3,000 you borrowed.

You'd give the total amount owed to the bank, they would give you the title, and you would sign it over to the new owner. Hope this helps!

Dear Leslie,

I'm glad you're paying attention to the finances around your house. Of course, there are some things you must have. We call these "necessities." Most things are not necessities, though. If your air conditioning breaks down, or you have car repairs, those are

union and borrow the remaining things you must spend money on to fix. Things like new furniture, vacations, and eating at restaurants are not necessities. They're things you might want, but they're not necessary — especially when you're trying to pay off debt.

I always recommend people take a hard look at their priorities, and remember there's a difference between wanting something and needing something to survive. It can be hard, and it may mean everyone has to go without a few things they want for a while. But if your parents are serious about getting out of debt, they'll do it. And it really won't take all that long.



Falcons Baseball Gets 20th Victory of Season



Red Door Escape Room Opens in Rancho

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Phones down, brains on. That's the order for getting the absolute most out of your experience at the newly opened Red Door Escape Room in Rancho Cordova's Nimbus Winery complex.

If you aren't familiar, Red Door is one of a handful of so-called "Immersive Entertainment Experiences" popping up nationwide, where you and a date, or perhaps a group of friends or a few colleagues choose from among a handful of games where you are locked inside a room from which you must escape using only a set of cryptic clues and interactive puzzles—all while the clock is ticking down.

These multi-sensor games are individually themed and aimed at varying skill levels and ages. A typical Red Door experience takes about an hour and a half, depending on how skilled you and your team are at deciphering your clues. You'll get 15 minutes for a briefing on your game scenario, an hour to get out and then another 15 minutes for "debriefing." In between, says Red Door Sacramento's General Manager, Jarick Collins, the most important thing to remember is to have nothing but pure, unalloyed fun.

"What we want to provide is a unique experience for everyone, no matter how old you are, where you turn off your phones, leave your muscle at the door, bring in your brains and get ready to have fun," said Collins.

The fee to play is \$30 a person. There are group and corporate packages available, as well. Each game or episode can accommodate between 2-6 or 2-8 players. You can choose from five uniquely themed episodes. (One, called "The Gift," is actually two identical games, situated side-by-side and intended to be played by two teams competing against one another).

Others episodes include "Prison Break," in which you and your teammates are taken hostage by terrorists somewhere deep inside a South Asian jungle and "Taken," in which you must infiltrate a hotel and rescue a victim of human trafficking. "Once Upon a Time," perhaps the most kid-friendly option, asks you to located stolen magical items from a kingdom far, far away.

Red Door also has a party room that can accommodate up to 50 people with a foosball table and a full kitchen for preparing your own food and drinks, or setting up a catered event, such as a birthday party, a family night out, or a corporate outing.

"Red Door is about an experience you go through with others, so our multisensory games make perfect options for group events, corporate outings and family nights out where your thinking skills and sense of enjoyment are about all you need," said Collins. The company was co-founded by Dan Huynh, his wife and a third partner in spring of 2015. Huynh got the idea after his first escape room experience to bring something similar to college students at his church in the Dallas suburb of Southlake. Students enjoyed the first game Huynh created so much they demanded more. In no short order it became clear a company was in the making, thus the Red Door Southlake

location opened with three episodes.

The company has been on a fast-track for growth since. By summer of 2016,

Red Door had clocked in 20,000 guests and the company's second location was opened in Plano, Texas. In 2017, Red Door doubled its reach to 40,000 guests. The Rancho Cordova location, which opened in February, marks the company's first foray into the Sacramento area. According to Collins, there is a fourth location planned for a spot just across the county line with a targeted opening for early 2019.

The company has a team of game designers, Huynh included, writers and onsite game-monitors, who track players via computer screens in a "back room," which is how, if you find yourself stuck and can't figure out the clues in time to escape, you can get a little help.

"You can ask for help anytime you're in a room and can't figure out a clue," said Collins. "We can watch players at every step and if they are stuck, we can guide them."

There's also a panic button in every room, just in case things get scary and someone just needs out in a hurry. But that doesn't happen often. Instead, says Collins, episodes tend to create a lot more excitement than worry.

"We are all about the customer experience here, and one of the best parts of that is the sound of people successfully getting out using their brains and their imaginations," said Collins.

Red Door is under no illusion that games can "age out" of popularity as technology and imaginations expand. Without revealing any details, Collins said the company is already working on new, longer, "innovative episodes" to add to its cache of escape experiences.

For those who just can't get enough, Red Door offers a loyalty program with rewards for each "level" or episode played. Get to level five and you play for free for life.
