

Obey the Law, Go To Jail CA is Officially Out of Control By MPG Staff

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - "We will prosecute those who violate the law," promised California Attorney General Xavier Becerra on Thursday, January 18th, as he threatened to fine employers, public or private, who voluntarily give information on employees, concerning their legal status to be in the country.

The State's Attorney General, willfully standing up for those breaking the law, warned that those who run business in California will be fined up to \$10,000 if they offer any assistance to federal immigration authorities.

Becerra's threats are designed to prevent employers, public or private, from voluntarily sharing confidential employee information without a subpoena and requiring employers to notify their workers before a federal audit of their employee records. It gives the attorney general and labor commissioner exclusive authority to enforce new provisions of state labor laws. It also prohibits employers from re-verifying information on employment verification forms, unless compelled to by federal law. The chief law officer for the State was blatant in his remarks, "It's important, to let people know, more specifically employers, that if they voluntarily start giving up information about their employees or access to their employees in ways that contradict our new California laws, they subject themselves to actions by my office."

Doing, Not Just Talking Mayor Budge Gives Overview to Chamber

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Mayor Linda Budge took a positive look into 2018 at the Rancho Cordova Luncheon on January 19. Budge agrees with previous mayor Donald Terry that Rancho Cordova is a city on the move. "We're actually proactively looking for solutions. We're not going to sit around and wait," Budge said.

Economic development is the most important priority. "Given the curious nature of California's constitution, all of our cities really need economic development in order to thrive," Budge said. Sales tax, which among other things supplies the community enhancement fund, is very important.

Statistics show that over 3,500 businesses have chosen to locate in Rancho Cordova, and over 55,000 talented people work in those businesses. "They're the reason for our thriving economy," Budge said. Though some of those are big business, the majority of the businesses employ 14 or fewer people. "A lot of it is our local homegrown talent," Budge said.

An important City goal has been to provide housing for these thousands of people who come to work in Rancho Cordova. The City has approved the Rio del Oro development, Capital Village is about to "build out," and Elliott Homes models across from Stone Creek Park will open in the spring. The executive apartments going up at Capital Village will

What Democrats Won't Tell You about the GOP Tax Cut and California's Lost Tax Breaks

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - In an effort to keep up with their self-described "resistance" movement, California Democrats



cuts for most Americans and Californians.

Ironically, these same Democrats who claim to be focused on the poor and needy are

engaged in non-stop howling over two provisions of the new tax law: a cap of \$750,000 on mortgage interest deductions, and a \$10,000 limit on the deductibility of state and local taxes (SALT).

In other words, they're complaining the new tax law doesn't do even more to help the wealthy - who also happen to be their constituents. In Rep. Nancy Pelosi's San Francisco district, the average home is worth a million bucks. In Rep. Ted Lieu's West Los Angeles district - the second wealthiest in the nation - home prices are even higher.

Sure, if you can afford to live in an affluent area of the state such as the Bay Area where the median home price has skyrocketed above \$900,000, there's a possibility you could be left with a higher tax bill. However, if you live in poorer areas of the state such as the Central Valley or an inner city, chances are you probably won't come close to needing to write off astronomical amounts of

mortgage interest. As a matter of fact, the median home price for the rest of the state rests well below elite coastal areas like the Bay Area. Average inland home prices are typically in the mid \$300,000s or lower.

Further, the mortgage interest deduction is a non-issue for the nearly half of Californians who don't own homes and are forced to pay the highest rents in the nation.

Oroville Dam's Senator Jim Nielsen Says DWR Must Do Better

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -The Oroville Independent Forensic Team released its final investigative report on what caused the Oroville Dam spillway failure in February

> 2017. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama), who represents Oroville and the surrounding communities, issued

the following Senator JIm Nielsen statement: (R-Tehama)

"From my initial review of the nearly 600 pages of the independent report, it confirms our suspicions. The most important factor exposed by the report is the need to change the culture of the Department of Water Resources. There must also be more transparency to build trust with our community."

"We have a sustained neglect of addressing problems that should have been anticipated such as the deficiency of the geological composition on which the spillway was originally laid."

"I am not opposed to giving DWR a license. But we must not give a 50 year license to a dam operator - DWR - until they have addressed the deficiencies at Oroville Dam and implemented changes in their organizational culture to ensure more transparency with the community."

"And it is clear that making improvements to the state's infrastructure was not a priority. There was insufficient oversight of the dam, and communications with the community and local officials was also insufficient."

"That is why I, along with Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) and Assemblyman Gallagher (R-Yuba City), asked that the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission delay the issuance of a new license for the Oroville Dam until the issues identified in the forensic report and our community's concerns are addressed."

"It is important to fully review the details of the report. It is more imperative than ever for FERC to delay the issuance of a new license until we understand the forensic team's findings and their implications moving forward. DWR must do better for our community."

County Supervisors Approve New Contracts for Homeless Outreach

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors has authorized the County to pool \$5,092,500 to support contracts with qualified nonprofit agencies for the provision of intensive case management services (ICMS) and property-related tenant services (PRTS), under the Flexible Supportive Rehousing Program (FSRP). The FSRP is a new approach and program adopted last year as part of the County's homeless initiatives and will support 250 people experiencing long-term homelessness transition to permanent housing and stability.

The goal of FSRP is to engage and support people who frequently use County systems, including County jail and Behavioral Health Services, but who have not been able to resolve their chronic or long-term homelessness. A preliminary study showed an average annual cost of more than \$42,000 for the top 250 individual most frequent recipients in Sacramento County. Success of this program

will be measured by the number of enrolled individuals who are housed and retain housing within one year of housing placement.

There are currently six agencies who have submitted to be part of the program and are qualified to offer services: Transforming Lives, Cultivating Success (TLCS), Wind Youth Services, Wellness and Recovery Centers, WellSpace Health Center, Volunteers of America (VOA) and Sacramento Self-Help Housing (SSHH).

"TLCS is excited to be a part of this collaborative cohort to provide intensive case management in partnership with our colleagues who will be focusing on finding appropriate housing for a vulnerable population of people experiencing homelessness." Said Erin Johansen, Executive Director of TLCS, Inc. "We appreciate the spirit of true partnership on behalf of Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance that values the expertise of community partners to build an efficient system for the people who need it most".

FSRP is modeled after Los Angeles County's Housing for Health Program, which permanently housed 890 individuals over two and half years. A recently concluded Rand Corporation study reported 96 percent retained housing for at least one year with a nearly 60 percent drop in the use of public services within that first year. LA County has pointed to the flexibility within service contracts to provide whatever it takes to engage and support re-housing participants as critical to replicating this success in Sacramento County.

"Knowing there are 18 to 24 year olds who are chronically homeless and are already frequent users of County systems is heartbreaking." Says Suzi Dotson, Executive Director of Wind Youth Services. "Intensive case management offered by our expert staff and the guarantee of housing is going to bring these young people back to where they should be: stability and community. Wind is excited to partner with Sacramento County as we embark on this journey together."

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Independent Forensic Team (IFT) recently released additional findings from its review of the February 2017 Lake Oroville Spillways incident. The report builds on the IFT's interim memo from September 2017 that identified physical causes of the incident. While DWR is in the process of fully reviewing this lengthy report, the Department intends to incorporate the latest findings into its ongoing efforts.

'We strongly supported having an independent assessment of the spillway failure and take the findings very seriously," said DWR Director Grant Davis. "This report is consistent with the independent team's initial technical findings from last May which were fully incorporated in the design of the reconstructed spillways. As we have done in the past, we will carefully assess this report, share it with the entire dam safety community and incorporate the lessons learned going forward to ensure California continues to lead the nation on dam safety."

DWR Responds to Latest Independent Report on Oroville Dam The Department has already made significant progress to bolster the dam safety program to include comprehensive re-evaluations of every spillway with attributes similar to

Lake Oroville's. These re-evaluations go far beyond the standard inspections to include extensive hydrologic, structural and geotechnical work and a thorough investigation of records.

In May, DWR began planning for a comprehensive needs assessment of the entire Oroville complex to understand what changes, if any, need to be made long term to bolster dam safety of the Oroville complex.

An evaluation of DWR's dam safety program is already underway, and as a result of the IFT's findings, DWR will also assess its existing organizational structures. DWR will continue to invest in resources to learn from other dam safety programs and plans to convene experts over the coming months to digest the findings and recommendations from this report to identify tangible actions in response.



In addition to identifying the combined causes that led to the incident, the latest IFT report also comments on decisions made as the spillway incident unfolded in February 2017.

"During the incident, our sole focus was protecting public safety," said Joel Ledesma, Deputy Director of the State Water Project. "DWR supported this independent assessment - so we can learn from the past and continue to improve now and into the future.'

DWR agrees with the IFT's conclusion that all dam owners need to reassess current procedures. As the report notes, "the fact that this incident happened to the owner of the tallest dam in the United States, under regulation of a federal agency, with repeated evaluation by reputable outside consultants, in a state with the leading dam safety regulatory program, is a wake-up call for everyone involved in dam safety. Challenging current assumptions on what constitutes 'best practice' in our industry is overdue."

open later in the year. "Right now, our city manager, Cyrus, is working with several home builders who actually want to start construction this year," Budge said. "These are projects that were delayed during the recession, and now they're very interested in making this happen."

Homelessness is a problem that every city in the United States is dealing with. Mather Veterans Village in Phase 1 has provided a home for many of the area's veterans. Phases 2 and 3 of MVV are going to construction later this year. "It's taken us seven or eight years to get to this point where we finally are able to provide another hundred homes for both our men and women veterans," Budge said. ". . . Perhaps we can't take care of all of the homeless, but we can at least house our homeless veterans."

Two full time police officers added to the City's homeless outreach team, the Homeless Navigator, police code enforcement, and a variety of nonprofit organizations add further resources to deal with homelessness. "Rancho Cordova is doing the things that we say, and not just talking about them," Budge said.

County Supervisor Don Nottoli, present at the luncheon, considers Budge to be a good friend and tremendous leader in Rancho Cordova and the broader community. "Her energy, enthusiasm, and efforts in the City, and collaborative work with regional partners," Nottoli said, "have been invaluable."

In 2017 the public works department completed \$17 million in improvements. The building out of Folsom Boulevard is one part of another \$17 million slated for 2018. The department will carry out sidewalk improvements, and repairs and resurfacing of roads and streets.

Budge went on to describe new Rancho Cordova businesses now

open and those coming soon, and the growing barrel district with craft beer, craft cocktails, and mead. She also mentioned the determination to maintain a balanced City budget.

"Whether you live, work, shop, play or just drive through Rancho Cordova, I want to leave you with a very important thought. You will always be proud of Rancho Cordova," Budge said. "I want to thank every one of you for your part in that."

Vietnam veteran and retired Air Force fighter pilot Dick Stultz of Fair Oaks attended the luncheon with his wife, Sandy.

They have known Budge since the 1980s. "When it involves anything in Rancho Cordova, Linda Budge is there," Dick Stultz said. "I thought that little presentation today was just an example of what a professional that woman is."

Budge has lived in this area for more than 40 years and was the only woman elected to a seat on the first city council when Rancho Cordova became an incorporated city. The council rotates the position of mayor through its members, and this is now her fourth year-long term as mayor.

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The program at the Rancho Cordova Library from 2-3:30 p.m. on Saturday, February 3, is titled Healing for Veterans. But it is meant to help anyone who's had trauma or extreme grief in their life, and everyone is welcome to come. Admission is free and no registration is necessary. "If you just want to talk, or share, or are ready for a big change in your life, come meet Chris Lambert," the program brochure states.

At the age of 18, in 1968, Lambert volunteered for the Marines during the Vietnam War. By the time he was 19 he had been wounded three times and was discharged. When he returned home, Lambert said, "If you just did something that in my perception you were in any way trying to go against me, I could turn on you in a heartbeat and hurt you." Married when he went into the service, his wife eventually divorced him, saying, "I married a sweet, kind, loving young man and you turned into an animal."

For 12 years he lost himself in alcohol and drugs. He learned to help others with their problems when he went into recovery, but didn't address his own combat issues until he retired. "I tucked Vietnam into a little private box after I got sober and I didn't open that box for anybody," Lambert said. Now 60 years old, married and retired with grown children, he may volunteer 50 hours a week, and presents his program around the country, all on a volunteer basis.

Though the primary function is for combat trauma, his program is not only for veterans. It includes others who have experienced guilt and terrible trauma, who need to forgive themselves and start the healing process. A lot of traumatized people want to run away when they see the doors opening within them. "But the longer you keep it in, it's going to pick up more momentum in the negative area and the harder it's going to be," Lambert said. "Kind of like avoiding a

cavity in your tooth, it just gets bigger and hurts more."

Groups tend to be more effective than one-on-one therapy, Lambert said. His goal is to let people see that they have opportunities for a better quality of life. He likes to keep his program down to an hour and a half. He has a break within that time, with an eight-minute movie in the middle about the combat experience. "If I do a good job we'll laugh and we'll cry, and you'll learn a bunch," Lambert said.

He focuses on combat veterans because many of the young kids today have never had any kind of adversity. "We've been so busy not hurting their feelings that they have no skills," Lambert said. "So you take a kid that for 21, 22, or 23 years has virtually seen almost no negative consequences. Then you train them for five, six, seven months, then you throw them into the worst place you could possibly be. And ask them to kill people." Worst of all is that there is nothing more exciting than a fire fight. "I think Winston Churchill said, 'The most exciting thing in the world is being shot at, as long as you're not hit.' Then you come home and that high is really hard to replace," Lambert said. "... You're with a great team, and all of a sudden you don't have a team."

Evelyn Figeroid, who helped open the Rancho Cordova Veterans Resource Center, discovered Lambert at a monthly meeting of Volunteers of America where he was presenting information about his program for veterans. Figeroid has since retired, but Rancho Cordova Library Branch Supervisor Jill Stockinger said of Lambert, "He's considered like a national treasure and he goes across the United States doing these talks. People say he is truly amazing. He really helps people heal."

Family members and friends are invited, as well. "In fact, it doesn't have to be about a war if you've got a trauma or you've got a pain," Lambert said. "I will talk about that when I start the presentation. Because we all have our own personal war." \star

CHP Offers Free "Start Smart" Class for Young Drivers

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The leading cause of death for Americans 15-20 years old is motor vehicle collisions. In an effort inform and to reduce motor vehicle collisions in California, California Highway Patrol (CHP) North Sacramento area will offer a free Start Smart class. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), mile for mile, teenagers are involved in three times as many fatal crashes as all other drivers.

Recent collisions involving teenagers in our area demonstrate the importance of these

types of classes. The classes are used to promote traffic safety to both parents and teens. We encourage both parent/caregivers and teens to attend the class.

The CHP's Start Smart program is a driver safety education class which targets new and future licensed teenage drivers between the age of 15 -19 and their parents/guardians.

The Start Smart class will cover collision avoidance techniques, driver responsibility, collision trends, distracted driving laws, alcohol related driving laws and the provisional license process. RCPD Launches Chronic Nuisance Program

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) -The city of Rancho Cordova and the office of the Sacramento district attorney have a strong message for repeat offenders of misdemeanor crimes in the community: take them up on an offer, if extended, to receive treatment and other services to mitigate the behavior, or go to jail.

No longer will repeat offenders be allowed to quickly cycle in and out of the system with a citation, as has widely been the case for some time, due, in part, to overcrowding in jails and prisons. Under the city's Chronic Nuisance Program (CNO), offenders of misdemeanors who have a history of 10 offenses in the same year will be arrested and processed for incarceration.

If they are eligible for the CNO program, they'll be given an opportunity to go to rehab, for example, should they have chronic drug and alcohol-related offenses on their record. For other issues, perhaps mental health related ones, they may be referred to any number of county and community agencies or programs to address their problems as an option to what will now be much harsher sentences for lowlevel crimes.

"The whole concept here is to break the cycle of offenses that often perpetrators have been allowed to get away with doing over and over again because of the lower punishments," said Deputy District Attorney Shauna Franklin. Franklin was assigned to the city of Rancho Cordova under the county's Community Prosecution Unit in summer of 2016. Her job is to work with the police department to implement the CNO program, among others, officially carving out a pathway for change for those who want it, or putting chronic offenders on notice that they face tougher punishments now.

"Many of the same offenders of these crimes would often not show up for court for the

current crime because it was just a citation," Franklin said. "Then later, the Rancho Cordova Police would see the same individuals out on the streets committing the same crimes and new crimes, and the process would start over again."

Franklin explained that in late 2017, RCPD partnered with the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office to launch the CNO program in collaboration with other agencies to address some of the causes and conditions typically found to be fueling the crimes, including drug and alcohol addiction, homelessness and mental illness. Those include Sacramento's County Alcohol and Drug Services and Steps Forward, a non-profit working to help the region's homeless population.

"If someone has been identified has having committed 10 or more offenses within 12 months, such as fighting in public, trespassing or low-level drug offences, they are going to get on my radar and the radar of the police department," said Franklin. "Then, once that happens, we'll put a tag on their screen and if they are stopped again, the officer will see the tag, arrest them and send them to court where stiffer penalties will be handed down. Or, they get an opportunity to change."

"If they want to participate, we will start a process with various agencies to go in and find out what, if anything, is going on with them that we might be able to help them deal with, whether it's drugs, alcohol, housing issues or all of the above," Franklin said.

So far, only one of the roughly dozen or so individuals who qualify for the CNO program has opted for it. Getting them to take the help as opposed to a tougher sentence is not as straight forward as one might think. Many simply don't want to get into recovery or make needed changes.

normal business processes so it's going to take time to build up," Franklin said. "Ultimately our goal is to stop using a tremendous amount of recourses on these chronic offenders. Our first choice is to get them treatment for whatever is causing them to re-offend and try to stem the behavior."

Franklin explained that with so many crimes related to underlying issues with drug and alcohol addiction, rehab is a commonly offered alternative to jail under the new program. But the nature of addiction, coupled with the inherent demands for accountability in most rehab facilities, present challenges.

"Generally speaking, for people with serious addiction issues, it takes a long time for them to reach that rock bottom place where they begin seeking and accepting the idea of change," Franklin said. "The option of rehab means they would be monitored and that is not an easy concept for them to work through."

Addicted or not, many offenders have complicated personal issues that also present barriers to change, including lack of permanent housing and employment training. But the CNO program does have access to resources to help from several angles at once. The offender, Franklin says, need only have a desire to accept that help.

"We are trying to make sure that even if they don't think addiction is their issue that they get the resources they need to address the problems," Franklin said. "In some cases it's homelessness, so they need rapid rehousing. In other cases, maybe they need job education training. In rehab, we can expose them to all of the resources we have for addressing these issues and many will need all of the above. I can't think of one of the individuals we've identified so far that does not have co-occurring issues."

With the majority of offenders opting for jail time, the question about overcrowding surfaces. But according to Franklin, the number of individuals processed under the CNO program is low.

"They (the offenders) are rarely if ever all being dealt with at the same time in the courts," said Franklin. "Maybe there might be two or three, or maybe none in custody on chronic nuisance crimes."

Franklin also stated that the sheriff's department is working with the various CNO program facilitators across the county to ensure spaces are set aside for CNO offenders.

"The other thing that is imperative is cooperation with the sheriff's department," Franklin said. "The (county) Sherriff needed to understand, and he does, that we need to address the issues of the revolving door. So he has allotted space for these offenders."

According to Franklin, approximately 60 other individuals have been identified as CNO candidates. They are being monitoring for inclusion in the program by the Rancho Cordova Police Department, she said.

RCPD Offers Vehicle Security Tips

The Rancho Cordova Police Department (RCPD) wants to offer its residents tips to help keep your vehicle secure, and how you can report vehicle burglaries. Most vehicle burglaries are crimes of opportunity that occur during the overnight hours when your vehicle is unattended.

Vehicle Security Tips

- Don't leave anything of value in your vehicle. Most burglars are simply looking for something of value to take. When parked at home, take valuable items into the house.
- Always lock the doors and close the windows of your vehicle. Many burglars simply check door handles, and move on if the door is locked.
- If your vehicle is equipped with a security system, use it. If your vehicle will regularly sit outside at home, consider getting an alarm system installed on your vehicle. The noise caused by the alarm will scare most burglars away, as you and your neighbors will be alerted.
- Use your garage to park your vehicle in. Keep your garage door closed and locked. It's not always practical, but a car in the garage is safer than a car on the street.
- If you can't use a garage, park your vehicle in your driveway or assigned parking space within your community. This is one more visible barrier to a burglar, as many simply walk down the street and check parked vehicles.
- Ensure adequate lighting on the vehicle, driveway and surrounding areas. Sensor lighting that comes on at dusk and off at dawn works best. Motion lighting can be defeated by a burglar with little effort.

Consider installing a video camera that will clearly record someone attempting to break into your vehicle or home.

- Please note: RCPD cannot take reports or dispatch officers via social media.

When you make a report, you help keep our community safe in these three ways:

- 1. RCPD regularly reviews reports and calls for service to address crime issues in the City of Rancho Cordova. When we determine that a crime series has occurred, we will allocate resources to address it based on information from reports, such as time, days, geographic location, etc.
- 2. RCPD can only arrest a suspect for the commission of a crime. If there is no report on file, we don't know that criminal activity occurred and can't arrest the subject for that incident.
- 3. RCPD can't read social media posts to any private groups, including Nextdoor. We only receive that information if a member of the group sends it to us. Posting criminal activity to social media doesn't get the information to RCPD and isn't actionable by itself.

By working together, we can continue to make Rancho Cordova a safe place for all. \star

It is a blessing in America



California Must Follow Trump's Lead and Cut Taxes Now

President Trump's federal tax reform held up a mirror to taxloving California politicians and they are afraid of what they saw.

At major issue to the panicked Progressive political class is the state and local tax (SALT) deduction, which, until now, has allowed taxpayers who itemize the ability to deduct their state and local taxes on their federal tax returns. The average California SALT deduction per claimant was nearly \$39,000 in 2015, but the deduction is now capped at \$10,000. California was the largest beneficiary of the now-reduced deduction, with tax filers claiming roughly \$100 billion in 2014. This deductibility has softened the blow of our state's punishing tax regimen and helped cover up the fact that our politicians have been shoving our taxes into the stratosphere.

With the capped deduction, coupled with California's skyhigh taxes, could California taxpayers lead another Prop. 13-like revolt and tear down the high-tax, high-spending edifice that so comfortably houses fat cat politicians and their political allies?

It's this fear that's led to the absurd, over-the-top howling about the tax bill, with embarrassingly apocalyptic rhetoric about this much-needed reform and the tired talking point that the Trump plan, by letting people keep more of their own money, was somehow "looting" the treasury. That would only be true if all money you earned belonged to the government and was doled back out to you by their grace. But that belief says much more about entitled legislators than the legislation itself.

The problem is not SALT deductibility, it's the taxes themselves.

California's top marginal tax rate of 13.3 percent is the nation's highest, by far. Our state's base sales tax rate of 7.25 percent is also the nation's highest, and local add-ons push it above 10 percent in some cities.

Even those punitive rates might be tolerable if California delivered first-class infrastructure or schools, for example, but our roads are crumbling and our schools hug the bottom of the achievement curve. What exactly have California taxpayers been getting for their money, whether it's deductible or not?

At the very least, SALT changes could spotlight the terrible bargain California taxpayers get and drag state legislators into an era of greater accountability.

But until then, California politicians will be working overtime

to figure out an end-around on the President's tax plan that will keep taxes high but allow continued SALT deductions, so they can pull the veil back over the people's eyes.

I have a better solution and I'm going to introduce a bill to make it happen: Cut California taxes. By lowering our income tax rates, we could help people in every tax bracket keep more of their paychecks, spreading prosperity throughout the state.

Instead of investing time and energy scheming a way around the Trump plan, let's take this opportunity to provide tax relief to California's citizens.

Instead of complaining about deductibility, let's take a page from the majority of states with far lower taxes and give Californians lower taxes themselves. Why not aim to add to the tally of the six states, including deep blue Washington, with no state income tax at all.

Letting people and businesses keep more of their money expands our economy and personal freedom. Trump knows this far better than California's leading politicians, who will fight tooth-and-claw to keep state taxes among the highest in the country.

Here's hoping they fail, and President Trump's tax cut becomes the catalyst for a tax cut in the Golden State.





Victory Puts Cordova in Three-Way Tie for First Place

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Joe Danielyan scored 15 points for the Cordova High School boys basketball team in a big Sierra Valley Conference home game on Tuesday.

Nine of those points came at the right time.

The Lancers' senior point guard was perfect from the free throw line in the final quarter. That helped Cordova shock defending conference champion Liberty Ranch 69-57 inside Lancer Gym.

The victory puts Cordova, Liberty Ranch, which has won back-to-back SVC championships, and Union Mine in

a tie for first place with 3-1 records. Last week, Liberty Ranch defeated Union Mine, which will host Cordova Friday.

Cordova (3-1 in the SVC, 10-9 overall) outscored Liberty Ranch 27-15 in the fourth quarter, with one-third coming off the shooting hands of Danielyan. The Hawks led 42-36 after the third guarter.

"The game was very exciting," said Cordova head coach Fletcher Johnson. "Liberty Ranch pushed tempo all night, and we prepared for a fast-paced game."

Danielyan finished his scoring in the fourth quarter with a three-pointer, which was a plus against a Liberty Ranch (3-1, 18-3) team that has averaged 78.6 points per game this season. The Lancers came up with a game plan to slow down the high-flying Hawks.

"We tried very hard to limit dribble penetration and open looks when on defense," said Johnson of the Lancers' game plan against the Hawks. "We hit some timely three-pointers and grabbed some big rebounds. Outstanding team effort."

Another perk for the Lancers is having guard Calvin Augusta back on the team. A senior, Augusta had been recovering from a broken bone near his knee from an injury he sustained while catching a pass for the Cordova football team last September.

"Gives us an all-league guard to handle the ball, freeing Joe to play shooting

Liberty Ranch guard Jalen Patterson led all scorers with 25 points, and Chandler Garcia and Jaime

Gonzalez finished with 10 points each.

"They're Still Our Boys"

Continued from Page 1 hero." The screen legend befriended the boys after he presented them with a "Guy's Choice" award in 2015. The irrepressible 22-year-olds suggested he should make a movie from their book. Eastwood read "15:17 to Paris" and struck a deal. His casting people considered many actors to portray the heroes but Eastwood liked Stone, Skarlatos and Sadler as is. "He loved the connection between them and felt it might translate well to screen," explains Hansen.

Gobsmacked, the boys asked if they should get acting lessons. "Clint said no," says Eskel. "He wanted them to be themselves. He took a risk but he was right; the boys did a great job. The way they interact on screen is exactly how they are together. They hardly had to act at all."

The 90-minute drama leaps from their childhood to August of 2015. Then Sadler was at college in Sacramento; Skarlatos was in the Oregon Army National Guard; Stone served the US Air Force at Travis. Spencer and Alek had been inseparable since grade school. They battled war games in Schweitzer Grove and played on the Del Campo High football team. "The script explains how they grew to trust each other; how they always had each other's back," explains Eskel. "Though Anthony Sadler and his family lived further away, the three boys had been friends most of their lives."

Carmichael scenes were restaged in an Atlanta neighborhood. Actors played the two moms and Anthony's dad, Pastor Anthony Sadler. "They never met us or got a chance to get to know us," says Eskel. "Heidi and I are always laughing. The two screen moms are so serious. But the movie's a drama and actors have to play the script they're given."

The reenacted train attack was painful for all the parents. "It brought back how August 21 could have been the worst day of my life," explains Hansen.

Watching the same scene, Pastor Sadler reached for his son's arm.

"I was aware of the violence from what the guys had shared with me," he said. "It was challenging to watch. I really felt how close we came to losing Anthony. Our pride in him is secondary to our gratitude to God for saving his life."

"The moment when the attacker lifted his gun to Spencer's face and pulled the trigger was overwhelming," says Eskel. "Even though I knew the gun malfunctioned. It was awful watching all the other weapons come out and seeing my son being slashed. It was a miracle everyone survived. I was worried when the boys told me they were taking that train to Paris. I was uneasy; I asked God to watch over them."

The morning after the film screening – as often before -- the young men attended Pastor Sadler's Shilo Baptist Church in Sacramento. All three were raised in Christian homes and have good reason to believe providence shaped their lives. Before Alek served his 10-month National Guard tour in Afghanistan, his mom invoked divine protection. "I prayed and felt God telling me Alek would be all right in Afghanistan," says

Hansen. "But He also told me that something very exciting was in store for him. I told Alek this.

"After the train attack, Joyce and I flew to Paris and met the boys at the American Embassy. I remember running up the embassy stairs, holding my son and saying: 'this is what God was talking about.' Alek just smiled."

Both now 25, Alek and Spencer are honorably discharged from military service. Alek placed third in Dancing with the Stars and Spencer bounced back after a stabbing incident outside a Sacramento restaurant; he now lives in Southern California. Alek has returned to Oregon and Anthony (also 25) has graduated from CSUS with a degree in sports medicine. All three are interested in acting careers and for now, are committed to weeks of promotional touring for their movie.

"They're living exciting lives and it's thrilling we get to share it," says Joyce. "But our sons are still the boys they always were. When they visit, they sleep in their own beds. I still tell Spencer to pick up his room."

"Alek leaves candy wrappers around," reports mom Heidi. "America may see them as heroes and movie stars but to us, they're just our boys." ★
