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Good Cop, Good Cop

From Internship to Retirement: A 27-Year Law Enforcement Career

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Rancho Cordova Police Officer Scott McCartney was the first officer hired at RCPD after the City incorporated. Now after a 27-year career in law enforcement with many roles and responsibilities and awards and accolades, McCartney has retired to pursue a different form of public safety.

It all began when McCartney was attending college at Oregon State University. An internship at Benton County Sheriff's Office showed him the life of a police officer. That experience, and having an uncle who served as a CHP Motor Officer, made McCartney want to pursue a career in law enforcement upon graduation.

When he graduated, McCartney moved to Sacramento. While he was staying at a motel deciding on next steps, an informal meet and greet with two Sacramento County Sheriff's Department deputies at a fast food restaurant guided him towards the Training Academy. Then, he became acquainted with a fellow gym-goer, who happened to be a Sacramento County Sheriff's Department Sergeant. McCartney credits Sergeant Larry Saunders with helping him go through and successfully

graduate from the Academy. And the rest is history.

McCartney's first job was with the Auburn Police Department. He won Officer of the Year, had the most DUI arrests, and ultimately discovered his passion for traffic enforcement.

"I definitely loved it and had a knack for it. Talking to people was easy for me," said McCartney.

McCartney was then hired by the Roseville Police Department where he served on patrol, as a School Resource Officer, and on the SWAT team. He also served as a motor officer for five years and discovered it was his favorite part of traffic enforcement.

McCartney's passion and skill as a motor officer led to him being hired by the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department in 2001. In this role, he helped develop a motor program for the Elk Grove Police Department, which involved training officers in DUI and accident investigation about how to ride motorcycles.

This experience led to him being asked to help start RCPD as the City of Rancho Cordova was incorporating. He helped write policies and procedures, secure grants, and even get commercial trucks, motorcycles, and other vehicles.

Once RCPD formed, McCartney was the first officer hired, and he was able to select the first motor officers to serve our community.

At RCPD, McCartney served in the traffic unit, patrol and Problem Oriented Policing (POP) Unit. He also helped develop the first traffic plan for the California Capital Airshow, and served as the Airshow's Traffic Chief and Public Safety Director. McCartney was recognized as the first Officer of the Month, received a Key to the City for his work for the Airshow, and received a Silver Star for his heroic act of rescuing three citizens caught in a house fire.

"One of my greatest accomplishments was working for RCPD because of all the things I got to help build and the people I got to work with," McCartney said. "It was the highlight of my career in the sense that the people I worked with, the citizens and the staff were so into the City and appreciated what we brought to the table as far as law enforcement."

In the last 10 years, one of McCartney's special assignments was to the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, Homeland Security Division where he served as Program Director for the California Large Stadium Initiative. His role was to

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CA Attorney General Sued for Public Records Release Already Shared with Green Activists

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Energy & Environment Legal Institute (E&E Legal) has filed suit under California's Public Records Act (PRA) against the state's Attorney General Xavier Becerra for withholding all but one email showing or mentioning its work with partisan and environmentalist activists to use law enforcement in going after opponents of the "climate" political agenda". Under Kamala Harris, California's OAG had participated in the since-collapsed "Climate-RICO" cabal organized by New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman, but kept its involvement off-screen. The new AG, Becerra, has since suggested that he has indeed been working with activists, correspondence to, from or discussing which E&E Legal sought in its PRA request.

Specifically, in July, E&E Legal requested records "concerning the Office of Attorney General's work with private outside parties to pursue, as targets of investigation, perceived opponents of a political and policy agenda shared by the Attorney General and these outside parties." The complaint specifies the public records sought, in the form of correspondence that was sent to, or received from, the Attorney General, or members of his Executive Office, and certain named parties or entities of interest because of their involvement in the AG Climate RICO scandal beginning roughly six-months prior to the request.

The OAG initially delayed its response, and then produced only a single document with little relevance to what E&E Legal sought. OAG withheld all other potentially responsive records claiming the records were 'privileged.' On the basis of E&E Legal's experience with other "Climate-RICO" AGs, as well as information and belief, E&E asserts this is likely baseless given the request encompasses documents shared with outside parties, and work with private, third-party political activists. No such privileges should apply to these records, unless AG Becerra will claim, as has NY's Schneiderman however implausibly, that he has 'deputized' partisan activists, donors and environmental pressure groups.

"As a California citizen and independent journalist, I have seen this act many times with the state government and their chosen third-party groups," said investigative journalist Katy Grimes, an E&E Legal Senior Media fellow and co-petitioner on the suit. "We ask the Court to confirm that the blindfold on Lady Justice reflects how our laws are to be applied equally to all citizens and groups, and not a tool for lobbying by those that elected officials deem sufficiently politically-correct."

In addition to California, E&E Legal is embroiled in similar lawsuits in New York and Vermont, home of the two co-ringleaders of the AG Climate-RICO scheme. The effort entailed a gathering of nearly twenty state-attorneys general, who were joined at their public announcement by climate "investor" Al Gore, vowing to use

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Girl Power: Girl Scouts STEM Center Opens in Sacramento

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Silly boys. Science and technology also are for girls, and the Girl Scouts Heart of Central California (GSHCC) is about to prove it to you.

On Wednesday, Nov. 8, the GSHCC will open the region's first STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) Center + Makerspace, an all-girl facility that will serve as a hub for innovation and exploration across the world of tech and science for girl scouts in the council's 18-county region.

The STEM Center + Makerspace, modeled on the Girl Scouts of the USA's other STEM Centers already operating in other parts of the country, will offer girls scouts in grades K-12 the region's first open structured learning and development space where they can unleash their curiosity and skills and explore and innovate through a broad range of activities that include a deep dive into the study of robotics, circuitry and programming, as well as the environmental sciences.

"Girl Scouts is uniquely qualified to offer support for girls to work creatively in a single-gender environment, where they can explore new interests and collaborate with other girls," says Dr. Linda Farley, GSHCC CEO. "The STEM Center + MakerSpace is an investment in the next generation of Go-getters, Innovators, Risk-takers and Leaders (G.I.R.L.s.), and will serve as a hub for girl innovation, exploration and discovery for Girl Scouts throughout our 18-county region."

The GSHCC serves roughly 30,000 girls and 10,000 adult Girl Scout members in counties across Sacramento, Stockton and the Modesto area. Its new STEM Center, sponsored in part by Intel Corporation, includes the MakerSpace, which encourages the use of design thinking and collaborative problem solving.

"At Intel, we are committed to opening doors to opportunity for girls here

in Northern and Central California, and we believe this STEM Center + Makerspace will inspire these girls and give them the skills they'll need to become future innovators," says Courtney Martin, Intel public affairs director.

A 'task force' of local female innovators and Girl Scout members will collaborate on the new STEM Center's formation and operations.

The Girl Scout's push for girl leadership and training in STEM is being fueled by the organization's drive to reverse what it points to as a decline in the country's number and efficacy of its STEM-related industries. Putting STEM in front of girls, first at the pre-college level, the organization hopes, will build on their interest and confidence in the fields of math, science,

technology and engineering. In turn, that knowledge and experience can be expanded at the college level, creating a pipeline of STEM-trained women ready to take their education on to build life-long careers.

According to the organization, America's status as the world's leading technology and science innovator appears to be slipping, pointing to a 2015 Pew Research Center report, which suggests that only 29 percent of Americans rated their country's K-12 education in STEM subjects as "above average" or "the best in the world."

Since 1912, Girl Scouts has served as one of the most widely supported, all-girl leadership development organizations in the world. There are currently 112 regional Girl Scout councils across the country

representing roughly two million members, where they focus on building courage, confidence and character, and yes, cookies.

But the creation of Girl Scout STEM Centers aims to ratchet up the impact of membership, specifically by working to fill the gaps in educational instruction in the fields of science, engineering and technology and give girls a chance to build careers across sectors that have, in some cases, remained out of reach.

"With our focus on mechanical engineering, biological and environmental sciences, programming and robotics, girls develop skills that have the potential to change their lives," Farley said.

Public Reminded to "Be Flood Ready" Before Winter Storms

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Water Resources (DWR) today commemorated California Flood Preparedness Week by encouraging residents to prepare for flood season.

"Extreme weather and natural disasters are a way of life in California," stated Jon Ericson, acting chief of the state's Division of Flood Management. "Taking the right steps now can mean all the difference to you and your family if flooding occurs."

More than 7 million California residents are at risk of flooding, and many don't realize it. Flooding happens throughout the state, from rural communities to urban areas, at the base of hills and along the coast. In fact, every California County has received a flood-related emergency declaration in the past twenty years.

This year many communities are at an extra risk for flooding because of wildfire damage. Flooding after wildfire is often more severe, as debris and ash left from the fire can form mudflows. These mudflows can cause considerable damage that is not covered by homeowner's insurance, however if the mudflows are related to flooding then NFIP flood insurance may cover the damage. Please check with your insurance provider for details.

Be Flood Ready by following these steps: Talk to your insurance agent about buying flood insurance, or contact the National Flood Insurance Program for information. 1-800-427-4661; Make an evacuation kit. Tips are available at: www.redcross.org/; Make an evacuation plan. Familiar routes may not be accessible during a flood; Stay informed during heavy storms; Don't walk or drive through flood waters. Just 6 inches of moving water can knock you down, and one foot of moving water can sweep your vehicle away.

DWR also cautions the public not to wait if they are told to evacuate, as first responders may not be able to reach residents later.

The state, through DWR's Emergency Rehabilitation Program, is coordinating with local, state and federal agencies to support repair and rehabilitation work on project levees damaged during the 2017 storm season. The state has committed \$80 million to repair 30 critical sites this year, prepare designs for 10 more future sites, and jointly prepare contingency plans for 100 additional sites in preparation for this year's rainy season.

What to Do When You Encounter a Wild Animal

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The City of Rancho Cordova has highly trained Animal Services Officers who provide field services, such as response to stray or lost animals, barking dogs, loose aggressive and dangerous dogs, injured animals, deceased animal removal, investigation of animal cruelty, and public education. If you need Animal Services, call (916) 851-8852. For emergencies involving immediate threats to public safety, call 911.



Always be vigilant and use your common sense in areas where wild animals might be present.

Here are a few tips from your city staff:

Always be vigilant and use your common sense in areas where wild animals might be present. Small pets and children should never be left unattended where wild animals might be present, and dogs should always be walked on a leash. Problems are more likely to occur when the animal is out of the owner's control. It can also be helpful to carry a noisemaker, such as an air horn or whistle, citronella spray, or pepper spray. Here are some tips on wild animals that you may encounter in the Rancho Cordova area:

- **Coyote/Wolf:** Use a loud and authoritative voice or make loud noises to frighten the animal. Throw small rocks, sticks, or other objects near the animal and become as big as possible. This will show your dominance and intimidate the animal. Remember, the intent is to scare and not to injure.
- **Snake:** Remain calm and still. If you are with your dog, keep him/her close to your side. Step backwards slowly, and only turn your back when you are more than six feet away from the snake.
- **Opossum:** They are usually docile and will not attack unless provoked or cornered. Keep your dog on a short leash and remove yourself from the area.
- **Deer:** They do not generally pose a threat unless they feel threatened themselves. Keep your dog close to you and walk past the deer. They should move along. If they make aggressive movements or sounds, turn away and leave the area. If you encounter a baby deer alone, do not disturb it. Mothers leave fawns alone while they forage for food and return to the fawn's original location.
- **Mountain Lion:** Most mountain lions will try to avoid a confrontation. Do not approach a lion or run from a lion. Running may stimulate a mountain lion's instinct to chase. Instead, stand and face the animal and become as big as possible. Talk calmly and regularly and back away. Do not turn your back, crouch down or bend over.
- **Bird:** If you encounter a baby bird by itself, it is usually best to leave it alone. If a bird appears distressed or injured, contact the Wildlife Care Association's wildlife care hotline at (916) 965-9453 for recommendations before attempting to assist the bird.

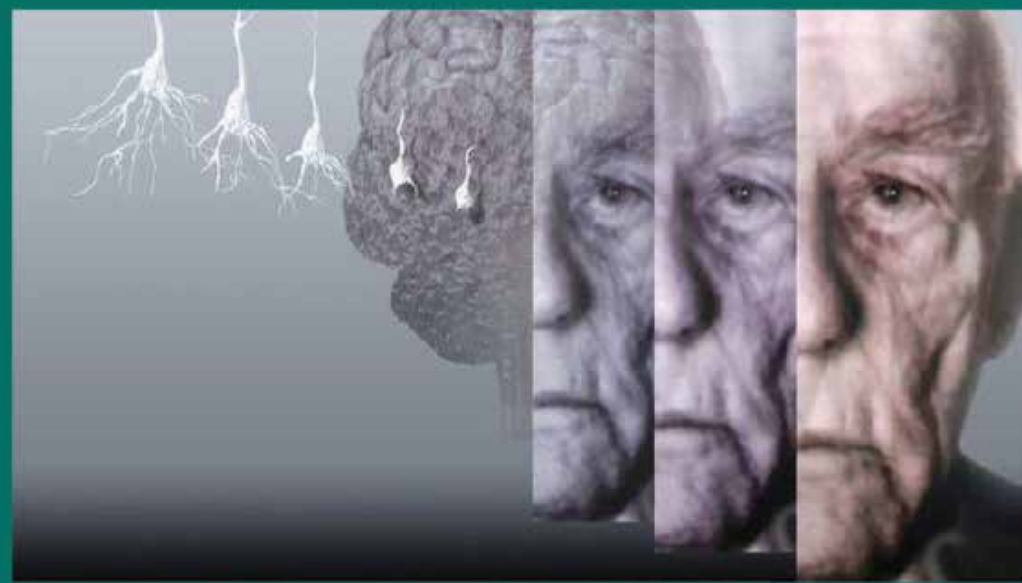

What do you do when wild animals pose a threat to public health and safety or cause damage to property or livestock? The City of Rancho Cordova has a contract with the Sacramento County Agricultural Commissioner's Office Wildlife Services, which is a cooperative program involving the United States Department of Agriculture, State Department of Food and Agriculture, State Department of Health, and Sacramento County. Wildlife Services is responsible for the control of non-domestic animals, such as skunks, opossums, raccoons, beavers, coyotes, and damaging birds that pose a threat to human or animal health and safety, or cause damage to property or livestock. A Federal Wildlife Specialist can be reached at 916-875-6603, Monday through Thursday 7:30 a.m. - 8:30 a.m.

What do you do for distressed or injured wild animals? If you see a distressed or injured wild animal, contact the Wildlife Care Association's wildlife care hotline at (916) 965-9453. The Wildlife Care Association is a volunteer-based nonprofit organization in Sacramento that is permitted by the California Department of Fish and Game and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to care for wildlife. Wildlife Care Association (WCA) rescues and rehabilitates wild animals that are dropped off by concerned citizens and public agencies. They do not provide a pick-up service, so call the wildlife care hotline or visit the WCA website (<http://www.wildlifecareassociation.com/found-animal/>) for tips on how to properly rescue a wild animal.

If you feel the animal is in need of immediate care or you are not comfortable waiting for a call or email back, please take the animal immediately to the WCA facility during their intake hours 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. seven days per week.

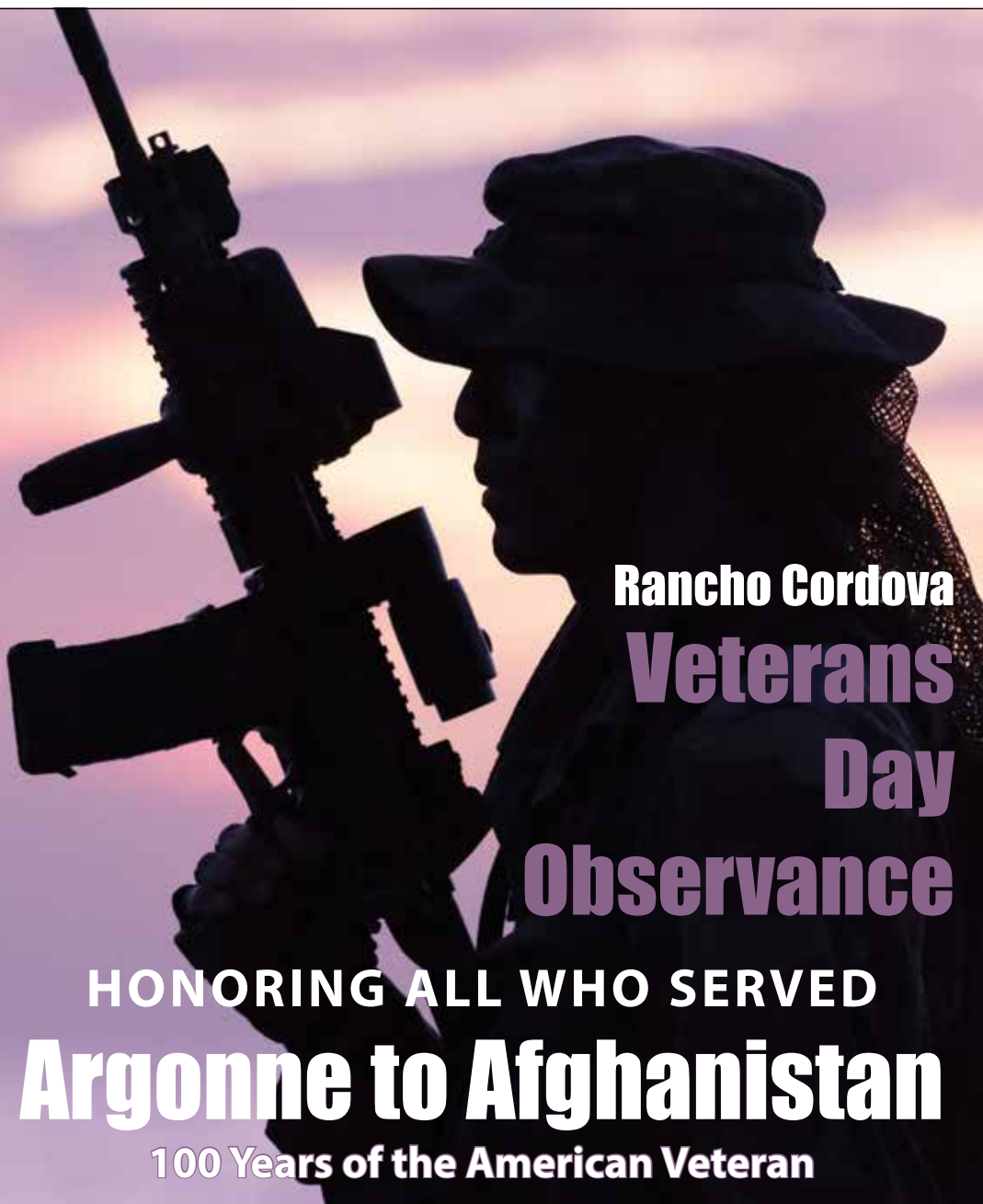

And Another Thing ...

May We All Find Our Fields to Make Mistakes, Correct Them, Grow and Mature

This week is a great example of how things can change from one day to the next. Weather is the best example. Just as the summer has turned to fall and before we know it, it is winter. That happens in what feels like only a second or two. Today the wind has picked up enough to begin blowing more of the leaves from the trees. The leaves are dropping faster because the temperature has fallen from a high for the day of 81 degrees to today with 69 degrees as a high. And Friday when you read this column, the rain will be falling and the temperature will be about 59 degrees, and the weekend will have highs in the low 50s. I am ready for the fall and winter to get here, as each of the seasons brings the beauty you will only find that time of the year. We will see if the people and the other creatures of the earth are able to find harbor and shelter from nature's beauty and its wrath, which we have seen in last winter's storms and from this fall's fires. At times, we do our best to protect ourselves and our families from the weather's fury and often what seems to be its anger.

As we look at what has happened to us yesterday, what is happening today, and what may happen tomorrow, we also look at some things that we learned from and about history. One hundred years ago, we were involved in World War I (WWI). Now up until just before the U.S. declared war on April 6th,

1917, the U.S. had desperately tried to stay neutral. Ties with Britain, propaganda, the sinking of ships by German U-boats, and Germany attempting through the Zimmerman Telegram to get Mexico to declare war on the U.S., pushed the U.S. to where it could no longer be neutral and it had to get involved. Eventually, its involvement helped the allies bring WWI to an end. There were many people who thought that was going to be the end of such wars. But as we have seen, mankind hasn't found it in its heart (or mind) not to involve itself in war. Hatred is an overwhelming power that some people like Adolf Hitler are controlled and consumed by. Next year, we will be looking at part of Rancho Cordova's history, 100 years ago, because that is when Mather Air Force Base opened.

I have been able to find some quotable quotes. At times from famous authors, to teachers, to philosophers, and the list goes on. I have also quoted past presidents of our country, and I have used their speeches or writings because they have been able to say what I wanted to say at the time very, very well. President Obama gave a speech in front of the Vietnam Wall at the Commemoration Ceremony of the 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War in 2012. What he said about Vietnam Veterans was very fitting for those veterans. But I have found that some of that speech applies to veterans and citizens, including young citizens, of all veterans and all wars. What all veterans have done can always be remembered. This is part of what President Obama said at the wall.

"It was towards the end of the day, and most of the tourists

and visitors had departed. And there it was -- a football helmet, black with white stripes, and a wristband. And with them was a handwritten note. And it was from a young man, still in high school. And mind you, this was more than two decades after Vietnam. That high school student was born years after the war had already ended. But in that short, handwritten note he captured the reverence -- the bonds between generations -- that bring us here today. The letter began, 'Dear Vietnam Veterans, here are two things from me to you that I think you should have.' He explained that it was his helmet from midget football and his wristband from his senior year. So today I want to close with the words he wrote:

"In those two pieces of equipment, I was allowed to make mistakes, correct them, grow and mature as a person. However, that was on my battlefield. You didn't get the chance to do that on your battlefield. Some of you were forced to grow up too fast; all of you died too soon. We do have many things in common, though. We both have pride, heart and determination. I'm just sorry you guys had to learn those qualities too fast. That is why I'm giving you what I grew up with. You are true heroes and you will never be forgotten."

That's from a high school kid, born decades after the end of the war. And that captures the spirit that this entire country should embrace. ... May God bless you. May God bless your families. May God bless our men and women in uniform. And may God bless these United States of America."

TV COMEDIES "YOUNG SHELDON" AND "ME, MYSELF & I"

A TV Review by Tim Riley

The long-running TV sitcom "The Big Bang Theory," starring Jim Parsons as Caltech physicist Sheldon Cooper, has now spawned a new prequel series that focuses on the socially awkward scientist in his formative high school period in "Young Sheldon."

Appropriately, the voice of Jim Parsons narrates the story of his 9-year-old self, a child prodigy living in East Texas with a normal family somewhat discomfited by his disturbingly precocious nature.

The year is 1989 and young Sheldon (Iain Armitage) is so advanced in his intellect, with an IQ that is off the chart, that he enrolls in the same high school in which his football-playing older brother Georgie (Montana Jordan) is enrolled. Even more problematic is

the fact that Sheldon's father George Sr. (Lance Barber) is the high school's football coach. Balancing things out is Sheldon's twin sister Missy (Raegan Revord), who may not share his awesome brain power but does have a practical worldview.

It's up to the mother, Zoe Perry's Mary who leans on faith and love, to help Sheldon navigate the challenge of being the youngest kid at school, letting him know that a good defense to bullies is a reminder that family ties to the sport of football negates his nerdy qualities.

We are supposed to find a pint-sized version of the older Sheldon, long familiar to a lot of viewers, a reassuring comic presence for his condescension. A similar quality in a kid just makes him seem more like an obnoxious brat. Young Sheldon knows he's

smarter than everyone else, especially some of his teachers, and that can be annoying. What's worse is how he alienates schoolmates because his obsession with the student handbook on rules of conduct leads him to rat them out on violations.

"Young Sheldon" likely will have its greatest appeal to devoted fans of "The Big Bang Theory," who may wish to explore and contemplate the seminal details of Sheldon's childhood that may not have been previously addressed.

The casting of Iain Armitage as the young Sheldon is a brilliant stroke, given that the diminutive actor has a striking resemblance in appearance, mannerisms and style to the familiar Jim Parsons version.

Another CBS network stab at a series comedy comes in the form of the uniquely structured "Me, Myself & I," in which each episode is similar to a time travel through the life of the main character, from the age of 14 to senior citizen in the future.

As a teenage boy in 1991, Alex Riley (Jack Dylan Grazer), a devoted follower of the Chicago Bulls obsessed with Michael Jordan, is uprooted from the Midwest by his single mom who is now going to marry an airline pilot and relocate to Los Angeles.

Jump to the present day, Alex (now Bobby Moynihan), a floundering inventor, is now 40 years old, and his world goes into a tailspin when he finds his wife cheating on him and his marriage falls apart. He ends up living in a friend's garage and spending time with his young daughter.

The future arrives in 2042 when the 65-year old Alex (John Larroquette) has established a successful business empire and yet a minor heart attack causes him to rethink his priorities, leading to a retirement that allows him to reconnect with his childhood crush.

The timing and pace of this show is so fluid that the action moves back and forth across the three time intervals at dizzy pace.

One moment Alex is prodded by his new stepbrother Justin (Christopher Paul Richards) to ask a girl for a dance, and then later he meets her in the future at a diner.

The girl becomes pivotal because the young Nori (Reylynn Caster) is the teenage dream, and then a half-century later she's now going by Eleanor (Sharon Lawrence) and connects with Alex at a chance meeting that involves an anecdote about a piece of mint candy.

Oddly enough, the 14-year old Alex looks nothing like the Bobby Moynihan adult version, while the middle-aged Alex looks nothing like John Larroquette. But then, Sharon Lawrence is so much younger than Larroquette that the idea they were classmates in high school is ludicrous.

The sum of three parts is often distracting and a jumbled mess, and this show seems to offer little hope that beyond its pleasant nature lurks a comedy that will be sustainable for laughs that are not contrived. ★

Trump Wants States to Pay More for Infrastructure

President Donald Trump has promised to spend a trillion dollars on infrastructure but he wants to leverage this money to provide the extra provided by states and cities to make their project possible, not pay the whole thing. This way he gets the most bang for the federal buck. Whether Trump understands the Constitution or not it leaves infrastructure to the states and cities, he seems to be working toward that end, at least having them pay much more for such, but he is likely to get resistance because they are used to handouts.

Three reasons justify this position. Residents are the primary users of what is built, thus should sustain its cost. Infrastructure, or anything like it, is not listed in

Article I, Section 8 as a function of the federal government, nor has it been added by way of amendment to the Constitution, and thus, is entirely a state, county and city function. Finally, the federal government is over \$20 trillion in debt, a debt that cannot be paid in a lifetime and even then not without quantitative easing of the currency, the process of inflating existing money.

Of course, the argument that the nation has been funding infrastructure for well over a century beginning with the transcontinental railroads after the Civil War, then the numerous construction projects of the Franklin Roosevelt era, then to the interstate freeways under Dwight D. Eisenhower, is a powerful argument. Still, going off the Constitution just once in 1869 to help the Union and Central Pacific Railroads complete the first transcontinental railroad justified going off it two more times the next twenty years for other transcontinental railroads expecting the same benefits. Every special interest group makes its case based upon what was given others. For this reason it is almost impossible to cease giving once started and get back to the Constitution.

When railroad tycoons realized that they could get the federal government to help pay for such, ensuring greater profits for them, other tycoons sought and expected the same benefits. James J. Hill

of the Great Northern Railroad crossed the continent without federal help, because he did not want federal control, proving that, sooner or later, it could be done without federal help and damage to the Constitution.

All of the vast federal infrastructure projects of the 1930's were also not constitutionally based. The federal government had no authority to finance infrastructure projects or job creation. Many also question whether these were absolutely necessary for economic survival. Others, including myself, believe that they prolonged the Great Depression to 12 years, instead of the usual two to three years, and that it was World War II that ended the Depression, not anything that Franklin Roosevelt did.

Federal job creation, formerly left entirely to the private sector, is now expected by voters as is a forced retirement plan called social security. Two new amendments to the Constitution would have authorized these drastic changes in the distribution of power and in authorizing such, but no amendments were even sought. We have had extensive national debt since.

Dwight D. Eisenhower, presumably troubled by the stark constitutional departures of his two predecessors, based his extensive interstate freeway infrastructure project on national

security. Why not make landing strips for military planes everywhere available by merely, when needed, closing down a section of the freeway to public travel? It has never been used for such.

It was a brilliant stretch of the Constitution but national defense is at least a federal government responsibility as it is empowered "to make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces." Still, given the cost and that its primary function was to promote interstate travel thus, in practice had very little to do with national security, Constitutionalists would have had us seek other ways of accomplishing the landing of jets, as for example, at military air bases and, in a real emergency, commercial airports.

Some have defended these huge constitutional departures by referring to interstate commerce. The Constitution reads, "The Congress shall have Power ... To regulate Commerce ... among the several States." Under the original interpretation, commerce among the states did not begin until goods commenced their final movement from their state of origin to that of their destination. It was to ensure that states did not impede commerce, the movement of things, by regulation. This had been a problem necessitating the Constitutional Convention. Who had authority at the border, more

especially when the border was a river moving commerce, as the Potomac between Maryland and Virginia? But there was never authority given to create the river or the road? Like postal delivery another itemized federal power, commerce would use existing roads.

Now the states are addicted to federal handouts. Rather than raise state taxes to fund even big projects, often referred to as TIGER grants, to which they have become accustomed, they do not mind federal slavery as long as the feds do not dry up their federal teat. Fifty years ago they would have resisted losing their independence from the federal

government. Now dependent they are likely to resist Trump's measure to be otherwise. Trump wants to stretch federal dollars to provide the extra percent to put the project over the top.

every legal tool at their disposal to shut down dissent on the 'climate change' issue and to seek a tobacco-style global settlement from ExxonMobil and other fossil-fuel companies. E&E Legal's public record requests and subsequent litigation in Vermont and New York, and other states, exposed this scandal, leading to most of the attorneys general to flee from the climate crusade.

"Once again we find ourselves having to litigate a routine public records request with a state's

attorney general," said E&E Legal President Craig Richardson. "Apparently when these attorney generals are required to follow the same laws they are elected to enforce, they hide behind legal smokescreens and stonewalls."

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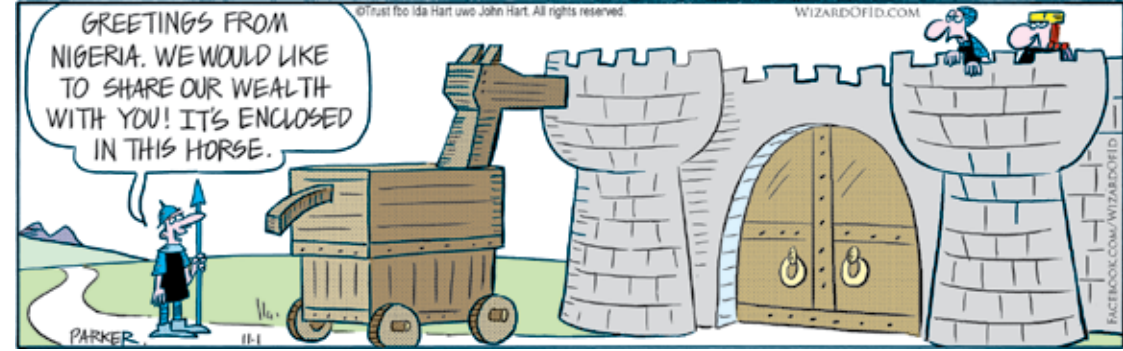
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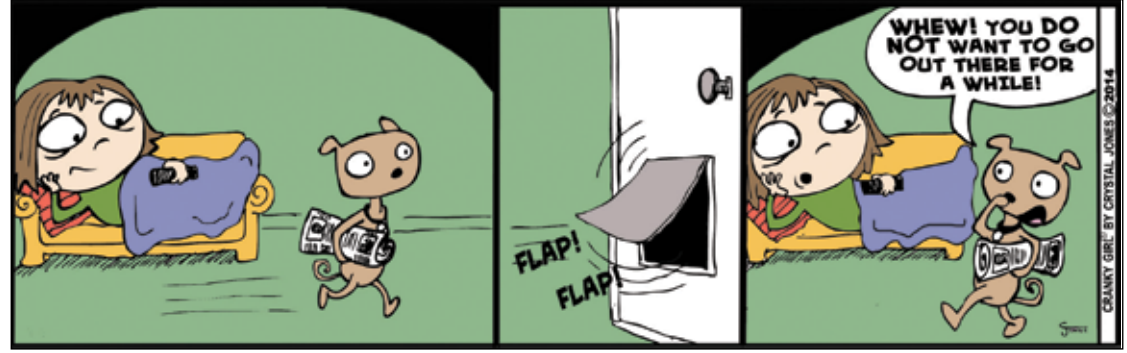
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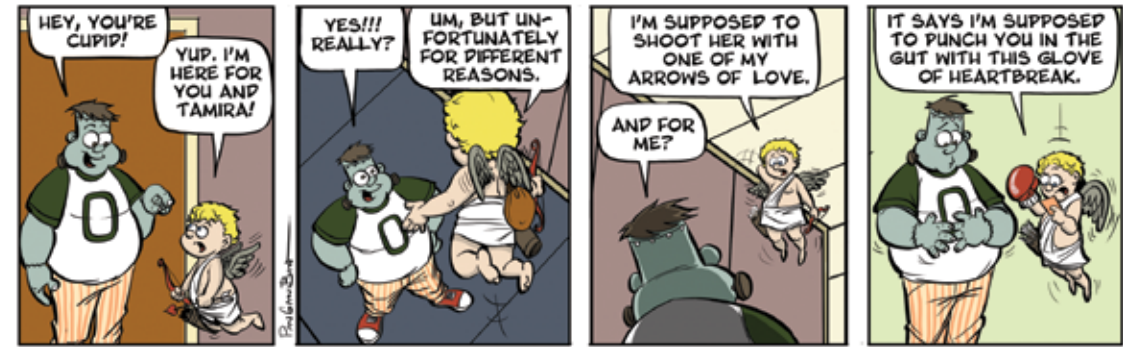
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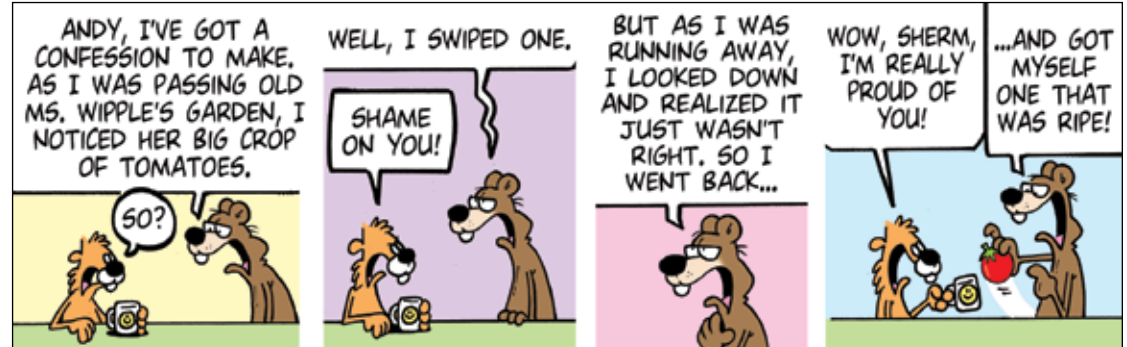
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Make It Fun and It Will Get Done! The Secret to Being Organized Pam Young's Corner A November Afternoon that Seemed to Stretch Forever

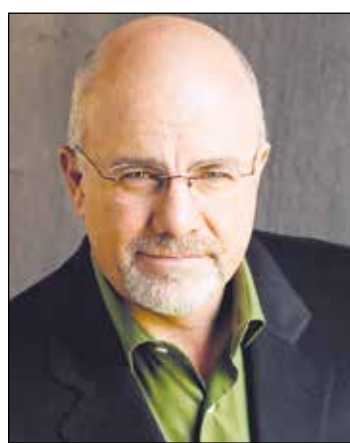

Dave Says

Rental properties? Baby Step 6

Dear Dave,
I have a rental property that I still owe some money on, and I've just begun Baby Step 2 of your plan. Should rental property debt be included in the debt snowball?

- Matt

Dear Matt,

No, it shouldn't. Baby Step 2 of my plan is where you use the debt snowball to pay off all debt — from smallest to largest — except for your home. This, of course, comes after Baby Step 1, in which you save up \$1,000 for a beginner emergency fund. I would include rental properties in the "home" category, and I urge people to get serious about paying off their homes a little further down the road in Baby Step 6.

To fill in the gaps, Baby Step 3 is going back and fully funding your emergency fund with three to six months

of expenses. Baby Step 4 is investing 15 percent of your household income in Roth IRAs and other pre-tax retirement plans, and Baby Step 5 means setting aside college money for the kids. Baby Step 6 is where you pay off your home, including any rental properties that weren't already paid for in cash, and Baby Step 7 is when you relax, build wealth, and give.

If it were me, I would pay off my primary home before taking care of the rental properties. That's simply a risk management perspective. However, if you owe just \$20,000 on your rental property but still have a \$3 million mortgage on your residence, you might go ahead and quickly knock out the rental property first.

Budgeting for taxes

Dear Dave,
I recently started my own business, and I know I'm supposed to pay taxes quarterly. How do I budget for those, and how much do I save?

- McKenzie

Dear McKenzie,
You should always establish a separate checking account when you open a business. All your business income, and nothing else, should go directly into that account. Nothing else goes in or out of that account except for business expenses. What you have left, by definition, is profit.

When you take that home, set aside 25 percent for your federal, quarterly estimates. In most cases — especially with a small, start-up business — that will put you pretty close to what you'll need. If you make more than \$60,000 to \$70,000 in profits, however, you may want to kick that percentage up a little bit. It's always better to save too much than too little.

Second Half Action Gives Cordova Win over Liberty Ranch

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Darren Nill and his Cordova High School football team have beaten four of five Sierra Valley Conference schools in his three years.

Now the Cordova head coach, in his third seasons, is perfect at 5-0.

Donning pink and black jerseys in honoring Breast Cancer Awareness against SVC foe Liberty Ranch at Lancer Stadium on Oct. 27th, the Lancers broke away to post a convincing 47-28 win over the Hawks.

"I didn't even think about it until I was walking across to share their (Liberty Ranch's coaches) hands (after the game)," Nill said. "One of the assistant coaches came up to me and goes, 'you guys aren't going to be around to revenge this. This is the first time you've ever beaten us.' We had a laugh and a hearty hand shake. Then it dawned on me that I got them all."

Liberty Ranch won last year's

contest in Galt, 7-6. On its way to winning the SVC title in 2015, Liberty Ranch knocked off Cordova 28-26, also at Lancer Stadium.

The win inches Cordova (3-1 in the SVC, 6-3 overall) closer toward a Sac-Joaquin Section playoff berth.

Cordova still has a chance

of winning a share of the SVC title. A win over rival Rosemont (2-2 in the SVC, 4-5) in Friday's SVC finale at Lancer Stadium, plus a Union Mine (2-2 in the SVC, 4-5) win over El Dorado (4-0 in the SVC, 7-2) would give the Lancers and Cougars a share of the title for a second straight year. Cordova, along with Liberty Ranch and El Dorado, were tri-champions last year.

Liberty Ranch (1-3 in the SVC, 2-7) led 22-20 at halftime. But the Lancers took a 26-22 lead with 10 minutes left in the third quarter when quarterback Johnle Sanders completed one of his three touchdown passes.

Cordova free safety Tyreke

Tate picked off a pass that went back to the end zone, which gave the Lancers a 34-22 lead with about a minute to go in the quarter.

Now in the fourth quarter, Liberty Ranch closed the score to 34-28 on a rushing touchdown. But in the final minutes of the game, Cordova added two more touchdowns for the final score. The first one came when Sanders hit Jordan Colvin on a 30-yard strike. Alvin Banks had a 50-yard run to the end zone to finish off the scoring.

The Lancers had chances to take advantage of Hawk mistakes in the first half. But that quickly changed in the second half.

"We talked about executing our offense (at halftime)," Nill said. "They (Liberty Ranch) had eight turnovers. We were able to capitalize on three of those eight turnovers. Basically, getting down to what we do, executing better."

Cordova running back Raymond Fite had a big night on the ground, with 146 yards on nine carries and a touchdown.

Sanders completed 10-of-22 passes for 156 yards and three touchdowns. Banks had four receptions for 75 yards, and rushed three times for 66 yards. He also had three interceptions in the game.

On defense, Lancer linebacker Jalen Jones led the team with 14 tackles, and outside linebacker Yusef Pugh 11. Turner and Elijah Jenkins, also a linebacker, had eight tackles each. Cordova's defense created four fumble recoveries.

The Rosemont-Cordova game is scheduled to kick-off at 7:30 p.m.

Although leaving the SVC for the new Greater Sacramento League when the 2018-22 league realignment goes into place next July, Cordova will continue to play Rosemont in non-league next year and 2019, Nill said.

The section is projected to release playoff brackets on late Saturday afternoon. On Tuesday, MaxPreps had projected Cordova to be in Division III. To view the brackets on Saturday, visit the section's Website - cifsjs.org. ★

The two teams played the first 70 minutes tied at 0-0, although both had their share of close chances. The strategy worked until the final minute, when Tiara Webb found Martinez at the top of the box. Andrea sent a long, bending left-footer that curled into the upper corner of the goal for her state-leading 21st goal of the season, preserving the Falcons' unbeaten streak of 17 matches. At 10-0-2, the Falcons are 8 points ahead of second-place Sierra, whom they'll face on Friday evening at FLC. ★

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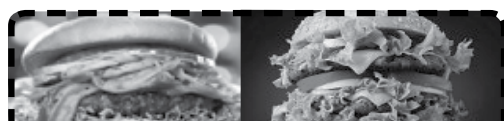
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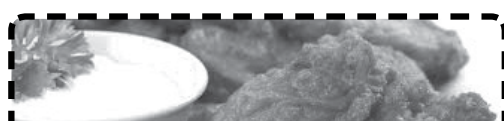


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Anything Goes! in Rancho Cordova Fine Art Exhibit

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Rancho Cordova Arts latest art show at Rancho Cordova City Hall is an open show, welcoming all media and topics. This year out of 180 works submitted, guest juror Pat Mahoney Getz selected 123 pieces by 63 artists to be displayed. The art will be available for viewing from now until January 21, 2018.

A lifetime artist, Brandi Pfeider has created gunpowder art for a year. The process is complicated, and she had a hard time buying gunpowder. "They thought I was some crazy lady that wanted to blow up my ex-boyfriend's mailbox or something," Pfeider said. "They wouldn't sell me gunpowder." She finally found a source and worked out her method mostly by trial and error. She emphasized her experience learning gun and fire safety as a youngster in Texas, necessary for this medium. Pfeider will be president of Northern California Artists next year, and has an all-gunpowder solo show going up this week in the Sacramento Fine Arts Center in Carmichael.

Cheryl Briggs has been doing fabric and needle-thread art since she was 7, when she won a blue

David Peterson is a multiple repeat participant in the Rancho Cordova art show at City Hall. "In high school I was going to be a famous artist and I was doing oil paintings in my garage," Peterson said. "After going on a church mission and going to Vietnam and meeting a beautiful woman and marrying her and raising some children . . . I came back into it, using watercolor, which was a surprise, even to me." He is a follower of the California style watercolor movement, following Ken Potter, Henry Fukuhara, Woody Hansen and George Post. "They painted from life, not from photographs," Peterson said. "Heaven forbid I would paint from a photograph."

A student at Riverside STEM Academy, 6½-year-old Shakthi Kondakindi's work has appeared at several City Hall shows. From memory, she made a picture depicting the Bathukamma, a Hindu floral festival, titled Mother and Daughter - Festival of Flowers. She worked it in mixed media: colored pencil, oil pastels, and watercolor. "My teacher helped me sketch out the lines a little bit, so it wasn't really hard," Kondakindi said, "but it was a little hard."

Plumes, in this show, is a needle and threadwork peacock with great detail and striking color.

Using oil paints, Allan Fornesa created a distinctive texture in his paired paintings Lotus I and

Lotus II. He has incorporated pointillism with a Buddhist, East Indian subject of the lotus flower, along with an Australian aboriginal influence. Hailing from the Philippines, Fornesa learned of Rancho Cordova Arts after seeing their flyer at iFest. This is his first time participating in a Rancho Cordova Artists activity.

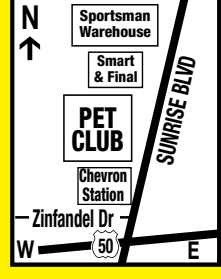
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
