

Suspect Attacks Officer, K-9, Causes Freeway Shutdown

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - A little after 6:45 p.m., May 8, 2017, the Sheriff's Communication Center received a 911 call regarding an assault that was occurring in the 10800 block of Olson Drive in Rancho Cordova. The caller stated the suspect was hitting and choking a female inside her vehicle, and attempting to pull her out of the vehicle.

A Rancho Cordova Police Officer responded and contacted the 32-year-old male suspect. The suspect walked away from the officer after repeated directives. The suspect began to physically fight with the officer when the officer attempted to detain him. The altercation continued across Olson Drive, and into a parking lot of a motel. During the struggle, the officer fell into a bed of river rock. The suspect picked up a river rock and struck the officer over the head, causing injury. The officer drew his firearm and fired at the suspect.

The suspect fled south towards Highway 50. He was located on the north side of the westbound lanes of Highway 50 by a Sheriff's K-9 Unit and a second patrol deputy. The K-9 was deployed at the suspect. The suspect struck the K-9 with a large rock, and then attempted to strike the deputies. Both deputies fired at the suspect. The suspect was struck by the gunfire. The suspect went to the ground and deputies detained him. They immediately began life saving measures on the suspect. Sacramento Metro Fire responded and transported the suspect to a local hospital. The suspect later succumbed to his injuries and was pronounced deceased at the hospital.


MATHER, CA (MPG) - Darcy Brewer, the director of the hugely popular California Capital Airshow (CCA), recently sat for Q&A that was a little unusual. Raley's and Sunridge Plaza Coming Soon, Finally

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - After years of waiting and drivers by reading a "Coming Soon" sign at the corner of Douglas Road and Sunrise Boulevard, the retail shopping plaza is well and truly on its way to opening. The commercial development known as Sunridge Plaza, located at the southwest corner of the intersection will offers shoppers around 92,000 square feet of retail and a 40,000 square foot Raley's.

The 13.5 acre site has never been developed before, so architects and builders worked in conjunction with City of Rancho Cordova departments to generate the right feel and aesthetics for the burgeoning neighborhoods that are also being created in the newer developing areas of Rancho Cordova. The project screeched to a halt due to the housing and economic bust that led to California's deep recession, but the City has seen significant turnaround as the economy has recovered and grown. Construction of Sunridge Plaza is well underway, but no opening dates for the Raley's and other parcel retailers have yet to be announced.

City Councilmember David Sander said, "Sunridge Plaza has also become a catalyst for new development. The City has seen significant movement in the nearby area as a result of the center's progress."

The lengthy process of development began in earnest with the public announcement of pending construction back in 2015. Grading plans, frontage and on site improvements *Continued on page 4* The Rancho Cordova Police officer was transported to a local hospital with head trauma, where he will be treated for his injuries. The K-9 dog was transported to a veterinarian to be treated for wounds incurred during the assault by the suspect.

The identity of the suspect in this case will be made available by the Sacramento County Coroner's office, after notification has been made to his next of kin.

The investigation into the incident will be conducted by the Sheriff's Homicide Bureau and Professional Standards Division, which is standard practice for any officer-involved shooting that occurs in the Sheriff's Department's jurisdiction. Independent review of the officer involved shooting will be conducted by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office and the Inspector General.

The officers involved in the shooting are 12 year, 11 year, and 9 year veterans of the Sheriff's Department. In accordance with the Sheriff's Department policies and procedures, the officers involved in the shooting will be placed on paid administrative leave pending the investigation. Tuskegee Airmen Encourage Personal Achievement

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Members of the Tuskegee Airmen, George "Spanky" Roberts Chapter, presented a program at the Rancho Cordova Library on April 29 to a standing room only audience. Perry Woods, vice president of the Chapter, and Vice Commander of American Legion Post 709, served as master of ceremonies. The group honored original Tuskegee Airman Boyd Taylor, 95, who was present with his wife, Gloria.

The Tuskegee airmen became the first black servicemen to serve officially as military aviators in the United States armed forces, in World War II. According to history.com, "The 996 pilots and more than 15,000 ground personnel who served with the all-black units would be credited with some 15,500 combat sorties and earn over 150 Distinguished Flying Crosses for their achievements." In 2007, President George W. Bush awarded the Tuskegee Airmen the Congressional Gold Medal, which is on display in the Smithsonian Institution.

"They not only overcame a lot, but they also gave a new dimension to the U.S. Air Force," said Rancho Cordova resident Bud Turner after attending the event. "Let's get these pages back in the history books!" As main speaker, retired Col. James C. Crump, Jr., USAF, told about the Tuskegee Airmen and added stories of his own experiences. In the early 60s as a student at Alabama State College, Crump was on his way back to college in Montgomery, Alabama, and found himself in front of Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., was pastor. When he saw King himself coming down the steps, on an impulse Crump asked King if he would give him a ride to the college. He fully expected a "no" from such a famous man. But King told him, "Yes, you can get a ride. Get in."

While King was driving, with only the two of them in the car, Crump asked him a question. "You don't really believe in that foolishness – nonviolence – do you?" Personally, Crump said, he would fight back.

Crump said that King answered him immediately. "Young man, I couldn't use you in the program, you stay right where you are. That is not the way we are going to accomplish the goals and objectives that I have in mind." Continuing, King told him why. "We're going to do that by not only getting most of the people in the United States on our side, we're going to get most of the world on our side. By being docile, by being passive, that's the way to do that, because we're outnumbered, and we're outgunned. If we did it your way, we would be annihilated." Standing at the podium in front of the group at the library, Crump said, "And he was correct."

Crump later actively demonstrated that belief in his own life and career when he encountered discrimination and hostility. The example of the Tuskegee Airmen taught an important principle, Crump said: not to believe when someone tells you that you are not capable of accomplishing something.

Several stories from Crump's own life served as examples. Though he was an enlisted man in the United States Air Force, through hard work and study he passed the test to be admitted to Officers Training School. "We were broken up into groups of 17 people," Crump said, "and they asked you to tell a little bit about yourself. In my class, people got up saying that they were a graduate of MIT, one guy had a PhD and so forth. When I introduced myself and said, 'I'm a graduate of Alabama State College,' they broke out laughing. I said, 'Well it took me 10 years to get here, and if there is one of us out of this 17 that's going to graduate in August, it's going to be me, because I don't intend to fail." And he didn't fail, though some of the others did.

The point, Crump said, is that you shouldn't quit because you feel you are too far behind others for whatever reason. "If you put the effort in it and it's God's will and you're not trying to do something illegal or immoral, you still can make it, and accomplish something."

Sunriver Neighborhood Celebrates New Par Course

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) -On Saturday, April 8th, the Sunriver neighborhood of Rancho Cordova unveiled a new fitness "par course" in its neighborhood park which now allows residents to exercise free of charge, year-round. Augmenting Sunriver Park, the par course features outdoor exercise equipment, including a health ladder, chin-up stations, push-up and sit-up stations, elliptical, leg press, captain's chair and parallel bar.

"The Sunriver community wanted to be able to exercise and socialize right in their own neighborhood, and now they can," said Mayor Donald Terry. "I am proud the City was able to fund this project, which will impact residents' health in a positive way."

The City of Rancho Cordova approved the Sunriver

Neighborhood Association's project proposal in fall of 2016 and awarded the project a \$60,000 grant through the City's Community Enhancement Fund, which is generated from Measure H, a half-cent sales tax approved by voters in 2014. Residents also received \$25,000 in design, materials, and project support from the Cordova Recreation and Park District (CRPD), as well as free trees from the Sacramento Tree Foundation.

"This project is a wonderful example of the importance of community partnerships and involvement," said CRPD District Administrator Patrick Larkin. "Thank you to everyone who worked diligently to bring this important amenity to Sunriver Park and the Sunriver community."

- Every school day countless children across the state count on meals provided by the public school system to stave off hunger. While that safety net is invaluable, it does not extend throughout the long hours of the weekends when food at home may be scarce or unavailable at all. To fill that gap, the nonprofit group Blessings in a Backpack was born.

Blessings in a Backpack (BIAB) provide back packs with food for students that might otherwise go hungry. One way the group does so is with an annual golf tournament. Local BIAB Coordinator JD (Janice) Davis recently shared some information about their upcoming event.

This is our 2nd year at doing our golf tournament and we had so much fun doing it the first year, and we raised funds to help us feed the kids! It will be Friday, June 2nd and tee time is 8 a.m., with registration starting at 7:15 a.m. It was so blasted hot last year that we all appreciated the earlier tee time. How may charity golf tournaments do you get to bowl a hole in? BIAB tournament will afford you that if you're willing to make a small donation at that particular hole with one of our junior volunteers. We now have an event sponsor [Parkwest Casino]!

This benefits students from 5 Rancho Cordova elementary schools that we feed each weekend. These are children that might otherwise have a shortage of food during those 65 hours they aren't in school. Our children receive free breakfast and lunch every school day of the year and we don't want them to worry about food over the weekends. A side benefit is that we also utilize a corps of junior volunteers to help us for this event which is great because kids helping kids creates kindness in our children.

We have a lot of friends and family that support our events, but our goal is to grow our program and to do that we must grow our support base. We invite any and all level of golfers out. We had six golfers last year that had golfed only a few times before and they had a blast and are already committed to coming back this year. We have room for 144 golfers and it would be a wonderful thing to fill up every slot.

We are ahead of where we were last year, which is always a great thing. We have 10 foursomes and 7 sponsors. There is plenty of room for many more of both!

For every event BIAB does our goal is to best what we did the year before. There were several things our golfers from last year asked us to leave so we are. Our goal is to be bigger this year with more golfers, which allows us to raise more funds to buy food to feed the kids. We will have a few different things going on for the luncheon and also we're offering our sponsors an opportunity to set

up a table at the golf tournament and market!

Every penny we raise is used to buy food for the kids right here in Rancho Cordova. We purchase the food and store it in our food locker at Unity of Sacramento. This is where our schools come and pick up their food every two weeks.


We spend, right at \$2.50 per child each weekend of the school year. When you multiply that by 250 kids and then every weekend of the school year, [equals] our money goes pretty quick. We are also hoping to adopt our 6th school as we start the new school year.

It was 3 years ago, April 25th, we sent home our first 30 food bags to Cordova Villa Elementary School and we would not have been able to grow the way we have without the support of our family, friends and our community. We are very appreciative of every Rancho Cordova business, church, nonprofit, etc. that has helped us to keep setting higher goals. We plan our events so everyone has a great time and wants to come back when we do it again! Thanks to all who have supported us and to all who will!

While reading about some of our country's history, it reminded me about a part of the history of Rancho Cordova that we were able to save a short time after we became a city. Initially, as many of you know, the City purchased the two story building that is our current Rancho Cordova Police Station, including the 13.5 acres of property next to the building.

The historical Kilgore Cemetery was owned by Jeremiah, the owner of the two story building, and he asked if the City wanted the cemetery too. For years the cemetery was taken care of by the Kilgore family and other families whose ancestors are buried there, but they could no longer take care of it, and the cemetery was overgrown by weeds and

tall grass. Some headstones were we were able to study the empty vandalized, and some of them disappeared. On occasion, there were scouts who would work on the cemetery, but unfortunately, unless you knew it was there, people would drive by it and not even know it existed. The City Council knew that we had to accept the offer and take on the responsibilities of caring for the cemetery. What an opportunity we were given of working on, repairing, and then being accountable and answerable for a historical site

like that. In places such as that, you can walk into history. After we carefully studied the cemetery, the work began. We rebuilt the sidewalks, the parking, its entrance, and more to make it safe for everyone. Visitors could then spend some quiet time there if they wished to do so. After a few years, the City began looking at the possibilities of using some of the empty property there. Our sub-committee went to other cem-

eteries to learn how they were taken care of, and how the property was used. While keeping total respect of its' historical areas,

City Councilman Dan Skoglund was layed to rest there on April 28, 2017. The burial services that were held at Kilgore Cemetery were wonderful. Anyone who goes by the cemetery today is able to look at it and see the reverence, the beauty, and the respect with which it is held.

had to be approved, followed by building permits and the selection and approval of initial businesses to occupy the space. Democrats Kill Another Berryhill Attempt at Meaningful Regulatory Reform

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Democrats this week killed a common-sense, regulatoryreform measure authored by Senator Tom Berryhill, R-Twain Harte, which would have started to unwind costly regulatory constraints placed on businesses and individuals in California.

B-181 would have required state agencies to identify and repeal two regulations for every new one created. The California Code of Regulations is 28,000 pages long.

The Berryhill bill would have placed the responsibility of identifying regulations for repeal with the agencies, instead of the Legislature, giving those agencies the freedom to use their regulatory expertise to implement the "one-in, two-out" rule

most effectively.

"Something needs to change in this state," Berryhill said. "Businesses are leaving California for friendlier environments, while individuals are frustrated by the government progressively chipping away at their freedoms and their incomes.³

Senator Steve Glazer, the Democratic chairman of the Governmental Organization Committee, opposed the measure as an abdication of the Legislature's oversight responsibilities, but graciously offered an olive branch to Berryhill for future attempts at bipartisan regulatory reform.

"It's a little bit of a meat cleaver approach," Glazer said. "I know that comes out of

frustration with how things have continued on a path that you're frustrated with. But I don't know if it's the most thoughtful way to look at each one, because each one does matter. I'd love to work with you on finding other ways in which we can deal with this problem. I thank you for your thoughtfulness and leadership on this issue."

Berryhill responded: "I appreciate the chairman's gracious comments and I am eager to work with him on this issue."

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

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
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

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wonderful when you do it right. Get out of debt first, pay cash, and find great bargains. When you get in a hurry, and do dumb stuff like go into debt or get mixed up with partnerships in the process, real estate's a horrible investment.

I admire your ambition, Adam. But I would advise you to follow my lead on this one. You'll be glad you did!

How late is too late? Dear Dave,

How late is too late to get life insurance?

Dear Anonymous, It's pretty easy to get term life insurance – the only kind of life insurance I recommend – up until around age 70. Depending on your overall health situation, there are a few affordable policies available past that point. But once you get into your seventies and beyond it can be difficult to find reasonably priced coverage. I recommend that most people have 10 to 12 times their annual income wrapped up in a good, level term life insurance policy. But honestly, you shouldn't need life insurance at 70 or older. If you've been wise with your money, and saved and invested, you should be self-insured by that point. This means having plenty of cash in the bank to cover burial expenses and enough for a spouse to live on after you're gone.

Less Toxic Alternatives for Pest Control

Now that we're getting into the "spring of things", are you seeing more bugs crawling in and around your home or garden? Although pesticides are commonly used to get rid of pests, they can pollute our creeks and rivers. Toxic chemicals in pesticides can be washed away by rain water or sprinkler runoff sending those pollutants into a nearby storm drain. Once in the drain, those toxins end up in a nearby creek or river, which is home to many plants and aquatic life.

Before you reach for that can of bug spray to defend your garden, please consider these less toxic steps to ward off pests:

o Know your Friends

Many bugs are not pests and may actually be beneficial because they control other bugs or pollinate flowers. For example ladybugs, both adults and larvae, are known primarily as predators of aphids. Parasitoid wasps are also keen hunters of aphids and caterpillars. You may not like spiders, but they can also be the best sentry to keep your plants safe. Knowing which bugs are friends or pests is the first step in managing pests wisely. The UC Statewide Integrated Pest Management Program (www.ipm.ucanr.edu) offers ideas about natural enemies to pervasive pests.

o Less Is More

Chemicals in your yard kill both good and bad bugs. For pest or weeds, use less-toxic or non-toxic methods to keep garden-friendly bugs on your side and unwanted bugs under control. The Our Water Our World Program offers simple ideas online at ourwaterourworld.org. You can also look for convenient eco-friendly options at your local garden or hardware supply store. The Our Water Our World Program partners with stores to help consumers find less-toxic products for use in their homes and gardens.

o Attraction is Essential

Attract and keep beneficial bugs in your yard and let them do the work for you! You should plant flowers and shrubs that attract good bugs to your garden. There won't be a need for chemicals when the good bugs can keep the "bad bugs" under control. Unwanted bugs will always be in your garden but a healthy garden filled with good bugs will minimize pests. The UC Statewide Integrated Pest Management Program (www.ipm.ucanr.edu) has dozens of ideas for finding the right plants to control pests around your home and in the garden.

o Choose Plants Wisely

Select pest and disease resistant plants as well as plants that attract good bugs to keep a healthy balance of garden friends close by. Plants like rosemary, zinnia and coyote brush make great additions to the yard. Plants that are native to your area will adapt best to the climate, making them stronger and healthier.

A: Delightful chaos. 18-20 hour days (for a more than a week, not just the two event days the public sees), media support begins around 4:30am, daily volunteer check-in, ramp inspection when daylight breaks and pilot briefings -- all prior to gates opening for our fabulous fans.

Q: What personal, professional and educational experiences prepared you for where you are now?

A: I can't imagine what could prepare anyone for the juggling act this project requires - much like many other unique career choices, you just have to jump in and figure it out. Although college gave me the educational foundation needed, I can look back from this vantage point now and see how important the guest experience training and work ethic learned from my jobs as a student have also played a key role.

Shortly after my college years, I went into the event management industry traveling internationally for decades then much later found my true place in the world when I merged the skills acquired from my first career with my lifelong passion for aviation. Of course being a pilot and vigilant with a checklist doesn't hurt with a project of this size and complexity. Who knew a job like this even existed?

Q: Do you fly?

A: I have been flying since I was 17 years old. I truly believe that you will find no greater sense of excitement, adventure, and personal accomplishment than the feeling of your first flight. I will never forget that day nor the encouraging voice in the tower. Finding a way to share this

excitement in my work, every single day - is a dream come true.

Q: What was it like for you when you were first hired for this position?

A: Delightful chaos again. There is no training manual for this job and there had never been an Executive Director before. All you can do is jump in, try your best to make good choices and figure it out. In fact, I can tell you I still encounter something new every day and I'm sure the lessons learned will likely never end. Work hard, do your very best, ask for help when you need it.

Q: How do you feel the airshow has changed since you took the helm?

A: Well, I'm not sure the major changes had much to do with me. Someone would have energetically led the team, but it was natural for the event to grow and we were fortunate to have the space to grow BIG. We live in an incredibly patriotic community with an enormous veteran population and deeply dedicated educators who clearly understand how what we do relates to science, technology, engineering and mathematics efforts in the classroom – and history, too.

The performances, interactive exhibits and displays and educational programs are designed to inspire young minds; spark imagination, teach students something that a book, classroom or museum cannot. This alone is a powerful example of how an Airshow can change the world, one kid at a time.



SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Aerojet Rocketdyne, Inc., a subsidiary of Aerojet Rocketdyne Holdings, Inc. (NYSE: AJRD), has successfully completed hot-fire qualification tests of an engine that demonstrates the ability to meet reusability requirements for Boeing's Crew Space Transportation (CST)-100 Starliner crew module propulsion system. The tests were conducted on Aerojet Rocketdyne's MR-104J hydrazine monopropellant engine in Redmond, Washington. For NASA service missions to the International Space Station, Boeing's Starliner spacecraft will carry up to four astronauts and time-critical scientific research.

"Our engineers have incorporated a unique design that will allow the MR-104 engine to be used on multiple missions, providing the reliability, costefficiency and reusability our customer needs to be competitive in the current commercial space environment," said Aerojet Rocketdyne CEO and President Eileen Drake. "We look forward to delivering the engines for the crew module and continuing our proud heritage of enabling astronauts to fly to the International Space Station from U.S. soil."

The Starliner crew module propulsion system will use 12 MR-104J engines for reaction control to orient the vehicle during re-entry into the Earth's atmosphere. Prior to re-entry, attitude control is provided by the Service Module Engines, also provided by Aerojet Rocketdyne.

The MR-104J, designed by Aerojet Rocketdyne, was developed and tested under the company's Commercial Crew Transportation Capability (CCtCap) subcontract to Boeing. Similar to other reaction control system engines, the MR-104J includes additional features to increase redundancy that meet critical requirements and improved strength to withstand multiple shocks at operating temperatures. The engine upgrades also provide reusability for Boeing as it certifies Starliner crew modules for

multiple missions.

Under the CCtCap subcontract to Boeing, Aerojet Rocketdyne will provide propulsion system hardware that includes Crew Module Reaction Control engines; Launch Abort Engines, Orbital Maneuvering and Attitude Control thrusters, and Service Module Reaction Control System thrusters. Boeing will assemble propulsion hardware into the Starliner spacecraft at its Commercial Crew and Cargo Processing Facility at NASA's Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

COLOMA, CA (MPG) - On May 20, 2017, California Pioneer History Day is coming back to Marshall Gold Discovery State Historic Park in Coloma. Admission is free, State parking fee is \$8 per car. IRS Tips on What to do After the Tax-Filing Deadline

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Tax day has come and gone for most people, but some taxpayers may still be dealing with their taxes. The IRS offers these tips for handling some typical after-tax-day issues:

Didn't File by April 18?

There is no penalty for filing a late return after the tax deadline if the taxpayer receives a refund. Penalties and interest only accrue on unfiled returns if taxes are not paid by April 18. Anyone who did not file and owes tax should file a return as soon as they can and pay as much as possible to reduce penalties and interest. IRS Free File is available on IRS.gov to prepare and file returns electronically through October 16.

"Where's My Refund?"

The "Where's My Refund?" tool is available on IRS.gov, IRS2Go and by phone at 800-829-1954. Taxpayers need specific information to use the "Where's My Refund?" tool. That information includes the primary Social Security number on the return, the filing status (Single, Married Filing Jointly, etc.) and the amount of refund.

Changing Withholding? Events – like a change in marital status – during the year may change the exemptions, adjustments, deductions or credits a taxpayer expects to claim on next year's return. Employees can use the IRS's online Withholding Calculator to figure and then adjust their withholding by filling out a

new Form W-4, normally with

the company's personnel office. Taxpayers who do not have taxes withheld from their pay or don't have enough tax withheld, may need to make estimated tax payments. Taxpayers who are self-employed normally need to make estimated payments that can be adjusted to avoid a balance due in the future.

Need to View a Tax Account Balance or Make a Payment?

Taxpayers who owe taxes can view their balance, pay with IRS Direct Pay, by debit or credit card or apply for an online payment agreement. Before accessing your tax account online, you must authenticate your identity through the Secure Access process. Several other electronic payment options are available on IRS.gov/payments. They are secure and easy and taxpayers receive immediate confirmation when they submit their payment. Need to Fix an Error on a

Return?

Form 1040X, Amended U.S. Individual Income Tax Return, must be filed by paper and is available on IRS.gov/ forms at any time. Do not file an amended return before the original return has been processed. Taxpayers should file an amended tax return to change the filing status, or correct income, deductions or credits. The IRS generally corrects math errors and mails a request for any missing documents. Use "Where's My Amended Return?" tool to track the status of your amended return. It will take up to three weeks after mailing the

return to show up in the IRS system. Processing can take up to 16 weeks.

Need Help Responding to an IRS Notice or Letter?

An IRS notice or letter will explain the reason for the contact and give instructions on how to handle the issue. Most questions can be answered by visiting the "Understanding Your Notice or IRS Letter," on IRS.gov. Taxpayers can call the phone number included in the notice if they still have questions. Taxpayers have fundamental rights under the law. The "Taxpayer Bill of Rights" presents these rights in 10 categories. This helps taxpayers when they interact with the IRS. Publication 1, Your Rights as a Taxpayer, highlights a list of taxpayer rights and the agency's obligations to protect them. If normal IRS channels don't solve the problem, the Taxpayer Advocate Service is available at 877-777-4778.

Watch Out for Scams

Aggressive and threatening phone calls by criminals impersonating IRS agents remain an ongoing threat to taxpayers. The IRS will never contact a taxpayer via e-mail, text or social media. Any e-mail that appears to be from the IRS about a refund or tax problem is probably an attempt by scammers to steal information. Forward the e-mail to phishing@irs.gov. The first IRS contact with taxpayers on a tax issue will be by mail. Source: Internal Revenue Service

Sacramento Area Businesses Begin Food Waste Recycling Program

Local restaurants and food providers get on board with WasteRight Sacramento to comply with new state law – Assembly Bill 1826

Local businesses are tackling greenhouse gas emissions with WasteRight Sacramento, a new program to help businesses recycle food waste. All business that produce four (4) cubic yards or more per week of organic waste are required to recycle this material. Businesses such as restaurants, bakeries, grocery stores, hotels, schools, and food distributors, are in some cases now regulated by this new law.

Organic waste, including food waste, are recyclable through composting, mulching, animal feed and by using anaerobic digestion to produce renewable energy. All of these methods to reuse organics contribute to a

strong and sustainable economy in the Sacramento region.

Annually, commercial waste haulers in the Sacramento area collect approximately 450,000 tons of commercial garbage. Organic waste, including food waste, makes up 15% of that amount, and is the largest single contributing source to landfills. As food waste decomposes in the landfill it releases potent greenhouse gasses, especially methane that contributes to climate change.

The California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery notes that 15 percent of America's food waste could annually feed more than 25 million people.



Berryhill's Fishing License Bill Unanimously Approved

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - A bill authored by California Senator Tom Berryhill, R-Twain Harte, to promote fishing for all Californians unanimously passed the Senate Natural Resources and Water Committee on Tuesday, April 25th.

Currently, fishing licenses are based on a calendar-year cycle, with no extra time or prorated rates given for purchases made later in the season. SB-187, which is supported by groups representing nearly every type of Californian, would make fishing licenses valid for 12 months from the time of the purchase.

"Fishing is important for so many Californians," Berryhill said. "From anglers who love the sport to people just trying to feed their families, this bill would improve the quality of life for our constituents."

have plummeted as rates have increased.

In 1980, when licenses were a reasonable \$5, California sold more than 2.2 million licenses. Today, the base price for an annual fishing license has skyrocketed to \$47.01, while the number of annual licenses sold has decreased a staggering 55 percent.

California has over 2.7 million anglers, yet there is a growing concern that the unprecedented decline in California's fishing sales will threaten funding for fishery and conservation programs, as well as millions of federal dollars tied to the number of licenses sold.

SB187 enjoys a broad coalition of support that includes sport, labor, business, tourism and citizen groups.

"This bill just makes sense," Berryhill said. "Any bill that unites labor unions, state and local chambers of commerce, anglers, tourism groups and everyday Californians is ready to become law."
