Vision Test for Pre-Schoolers

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The American Academy of Pediatrics reports that three-percent of children in the U.S. suffer from amblyopia (lazy eye). If not corrected by the age of four, it is often irreversible. The organization's survey further reports that only 25-percent of preschool children receive vision testing of any kind.

How do you check the vision of a small child who has not yet developed communication skills and has the attention span of a butterfly?

In 1975 Kiyoo Sato had tried everything she could find to test the vision of children from three to five-years-old. "Nothing was working," she said. "Nothing I could find on the market." The standard eye test uses letters preschoolers have not yet learned and images they may not be able to identify.

So the public health nurse took matters into her own hands. She invented the Blackbird Vision Screening System. Kiyoo's method starts out by the telling an interesting story about blackbirds swooping back and forth, up and down. Then she incorporates the animated tale with a series of flash

cards with the image of a blackbird in flight to determine whether a child has a vision deficiency.

The subject sits exactly 20-feet away from the tester. They wear cardboard glasses with flaps that allow them to see out of each eye separately. As the images shown get progressively smaller, the child indicates the direction the blackbird is flying: up, down, left or right. In that way the tester is able to determine whether the child needs corrective lenses.

Enthusiastic youthful bystanders often get

Mather Veterans Village Receives Regional Honor

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Mather Veterans Village in Rancho Cordova was honored with a Housing Innovation Award by the Sacramento Housing Alliance (SHA).

As the first permanent supportive housing development for homeless and disabled veterans in the Sacramento region, Mather Veterans Village will be home to over 150 veterans with access to a comprehensive support network.

The project would not have been possible without commitment and collaboration between Mercy Housing, Veterans Resource Centers of America, City of Rancho Cordova and other critical partners.

"Mercy Housing is honored to have been part of the team to be recognized by the Sacramento Housing Alliance for Innovation in Supportive Housing," said Stephan Daves, Regional Director of Real Estate Development, Mercy Housing. "As one of the leading voices representing and advocating for low-income communities across the region, SHA's recognition highlights the tremendous progress we are making toward ending homelessness as a community."

Phase I is nearing completion with a total of 50 homes - 44 one-bedroom and six two-bedroom permanent supportive homes for disabled and homeless veterans. Phases II and III are expected to be underway in 2017.

Rancho Cordova was built on strong military service with families serving at Mather Air Force Base and living in nearby neighborhoods. Though the base has closed, veterans still chose to call this All-America City home.

"The City of Rancho Cordova is a vibrant community valuing partnerships, a variety of housing options, and resources for our veterans," said Council Member Robert J. McGarvey. "No veteran should be without a home. We are honored to be recognized for this innovative project that provides essential affordable housing and wraparound services critical to ensuring that every veteran thrives."

SHA's annual fundraising dinner recognizes projects and individuals that have been integral to raising awareness about the need for affordable homes in healthy communities.

Sheriff Takes Aim at Criminal Justice Realignment

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - As guest speaker at the Rancho Cordova luncheon on June 17, Sacramento County Sheriff Scott Jones spoke bluntly. "In my entire career I have never seen the criminal justice system or public safety challenged as much as it is right now," Jones said. "It's been a sequence of events and mindsets that transitioned us to where we are."

Going back to realignment in the 2011 time frame, Jones said, the Supreme Court insisted the State prison system must reduce the prison population by a certain number by a certain date. "There are really only two ways to reduce prison population,"

Jones said. "You close the front door, or you open the back door."

The State's efforts to respond

felonies changed to misdemeanors, and prisoners were sent to County jails instead of State prisons. Opening the back door resulted in more criminals receiving early release. Titled the safe neighborhoods and schools act, Proposition 47 had nothing to do with safe neighborhoods and schools, Jones said. "I believe Prop 47 was the worst piece of public safety legislation in my lifetime. We're going to be feeling the effects of that for a long, long time."

Jane Taff, club growth director for Toastmasters International, agreed with much of Jones's talk. "We are not being told the whole truth about propositions that are placed on the ballot and the effects of (the Governor's)

Continued from page 1 into the procedure. "Up," shouts one youngster.

"It's Kaspar's turn," their teacher said. "You'll get your chance."

"The children have fun doing it," Kiyo said. "Also, they are trying to get my attention."

Indeed, Kiyo Sato has that special way of relating to young people. They like and trust her. "They know me as a friend and share personal things with me," she said. "There is an openness that is so remarkable and I enjoy that."

Of the 16 children tested at a recent session, two youngsters, or approximately 12-percent of the group, were found to suffer from amblyopia and would need medical attention to correct the lazy eye condition.

In the four decades since Kiyo's original inspiration she has used her system to test thousands of children.

As successful as the program has been in weeding out vision problems among the young, it has not attracted the interest of institutions such as the World Health Organization, which uses old standard testing programs that are ineffective for children as young as those who have benefitted from the Blackbird system. A letter in response to a recommendation to the agency about Blackbird said, "We are well covered for vision screening."

On this day, Kiyo Sato has set up at the historic Edward Kelley School on Bradshaw Boulevard in Rancho Cordova. The school was built in 1869 and has been in service ever since, although it

is now a pre-school facility.

Ironically, the school is where Kiyo, herself, got her early education. She attended from 1930 to 1937. "It was the best education I got in my whole life," she said, standing on the very stage where she received her eighth grade graduation diploma 79 years ago.

The years since have been a long, hard journey: Kiyo was incarcerated with all west coast Japanese-Americans during World War II, became a

registered nurse, raised four adopted children on her own, invented the Blackbird System, wrote a book about her family's imprisonment (Kiyo's Story: A Japanese-American Family's Quest for the American Dream), and continues, at the age of 92, as one of the oldest active nurses in the nation.

New Raley's Supermarket Under Construction

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - What had been a steep, sloping, weedy, 13.5-acre plot on the southwest corner of Sunrise Boulevard and Douglas Boulevard in Rancho Cordova is slowly transforming into a complex that will include a Raley's supermarket and assorted stores-to-be-named-later.

As far as what those other future stores will be, "It's premature," said Audrey Rhoads, Vice President of Marketing for Donahue Schriber, the Costa Mesa, California company developing the project. "We have a team working on it."

In the past month, monster earth moving machines have leveled the land in preparation for construction of a 40,000-square-foot supermarket under the West Sacramento-based corporation's Raley's banner.

"Who's in charge of the project," one yellow hard-hatted worker at the site was asked. "Not me," he said. "I'm the sewer guy. Try that guy over there in the white pickup truck."

"Not me," the pickup truck man said. "I'm the water guy. Try that guy up on the dirt pile. The one with the white hat . . . and the clean clothes."

Dirty clothes, it seems, is a badge of honor, and cleanliness is next to idleness.

The man with clean clothes was not the boss either. He was the storm drain guy.

The frustrating search for an overall supervisor to talk to about the project from among the 25-to-30 subcontractors employing hundreds of workers illustrates the enormous number of elements involved in developing something this large.

Rancho Cordova Public Works City Inspector Mike Robinson is at the site every day, making sure everything is up to code.

"Right now they're doing all the 'wet' projects: sewer, water and storm drains," Robinson said. "Next they will do the 'dry' work: gas, electrical, phone, etc."

Only when the infrastructure is completed will building begin.

Before the projected mid-2017 target date the project will have involved dozens of subcontracting companies and hundreds of workers. Not to mention the permanent employees after the stores are completed and staffed.

"Raley will provide about 50 new jobs,"

Audrey Rhoads said. "And that is an extremely conservative number."


The Walgreens drugstore that abuts the Raley's property stocks some groceries, although not on a scale . . . or at prices . . . that a full-blown supermarket will be able to offer. Currently, the nearest store for area food shoppers is many miles away, so Raley's will be perfectly positioned to dominate the market. It will be a convenience for residents of the adjacent Anatolia

housing complex and for commuters passing by on their way to and from Elk Grove, Sloughhouse, and Rancho Murieta. It will also bring a significant amount of real estate and sales tax money into the Rancho Cordova treasury.

The proposed grand opening next year depends, of course, on cooperative weather and if all the sub-contractors are able to complete their individual parts in the process on schedule. ★



We Need to Pay Attention to Our Urban Trees

this year. The City of Rancho Cordova has done a tremendous job educating our citizens about what they can do to preserve as many trees as possible during the drought. The lawns are easier to replace than trees of course, but even many trees that are being watered show quite a bit of stress.

As you drive into the Sierra's, the pine trees are dying by the millions according to the state experts. It is because of both the drought and the bark beetles that trees are dying. The stressed trees are weak because of the drought and the beetles love that. There has been massive amounts of death of pine trees in the Sierra's and the forests are turning into tinderboxes. If lightning struck anywhere in that area, the fire that could start would be frightening. Many mountain residents are facing the cost of removing trees close to their homes, and the U.S. Forest Service is being blamed by loggers for not allowing them to thin the forests. I think that even if the loggers began today, with the millions of trees that need to be removed, it will take many years to even make a dent in the danger of forest fires.

And another thing to think about is that summer is officially here, and even though we don't have the same dangers in the City of Rancho Cordova that they have in the Sierra's, we all have to pay attention to our urban forest. The trees in our city that show stress because of the

drought can be just as dangerous to your home as the dying pine trees are to the mountains and the people who live there. Take the time to look at the tree(s) on your property, and make sure they are watered well. You can receive free trees from the Sacramento Tree Foundation just by making a call. They helped the residents of Lincoln Village plant 100 new trees only a few weeks ago.

There has been a great partnership between the Sacramento Tree Foundation and SMUD to create the Shade Tree Program. Shade Tree Program customers can choose from over 30 deciduous trees that will provide shade in the summer and can also increase the value of your home. For all Rancho Cordova residents and businesses, please pay attention to the information you either have already received from your water purveyors, or soon will. executive orders," Taff said. Jones thought of running for Congress only after the 2014 murder of Sacramento Deputy Danny Oliver. The alleged perpetrator was in the country illegally, had been convicted in Arizona of selling drugs, and had been deported multiple times. Jones's video plea for immigration reform to President Obama went viral on YouTube. "I realized that I could throw rocks from afar as much as I want," Jones said, "but unless I get in the ring and actually get my knuckles bloody, then there's nothing I could do for Sacramento for the things that I wanted to change."

Rancho Cordova's Chief of Police, Michael Goold, said that Jones would bring a unique

viewpoint to Congress, "able to provide firsthand knowledge of the challenges we face on the local level and what we need to succeed in providing community based policing." ★

Grace M. Schick, a resident of Rancho Cordova, recently wrote a letter to the Sacramento Bee editor and said she is concerned about the trees on the corner of Lincoln Village Drive and Explorer Drive in Rancho Cordova. She said they are not being watered and are dying, and wondered if the City could do something about it. Unfortunately, the trees at those street crossings are on private property. Explorer Drive crosses Lincoln Village in two locations – the first place is very close to Bradshaw Road and is a commercial area, and the second place is in a residential area. There are quite a few trees in the commercial area, and the residential area is about half a mile from the first and doesn't have many trees.

Like many residents and business owners in our city, they have either stopped watering their landscaping completely or are only watering their trees. California American Water is the water purveyor for Lincoln Village and they, like other water purveyors, are looking at what they may possibly do differently

Bera Calls on Scott Jones to Reverse His Position on Terror Watch and Guns

ELK GROVE, CA - Today, (June 15, 2016) the Bera Campaign called on Sheriff Scott Jones to immediately reverse his dangerous opposition to legislation that would ban those on terror watch and no-fly lists from purchasing guns.

Jones stated his opposition to closing the loophole that allows suspects on the FBI terror watch list to buy guns during a January interview, where he claimed the bill has "numerous faults" and would only "make a few people feel better."

"Scott Jones' radical position against limiting gun sales to those on the terror watch list is dangerous, and puts him at odds with California law enforcement, the gun lobby, and even some Congressional Republicans," said Congressman Bera's campaign manager, Jerid Kurtz. "Taking steps to keep guns out of the hands of terrorists is a no-brainer, so Jones should immediately reverse his position and stop

playing politics with common-sense gun safety reforms."

The Bera campaign's call to Jones comes as members of the United States Senate filibuster in support of the "no-fly, no-buy" terror watch list gun reform bill, and the National Rifle Association (NRA) announces that they believe "that terrorists should not be allowed to purchase or possess firearms, period."

"I've been a strong supporter of preventing suspects on the FBI's terror watch list from buying guns, and I've co-sponsored legislation in Congress to do just that," said Representative Ami Bera. "I'm proud to co-sponsor the bipartisan bill to close the 'no fly, no buy' loophole, and it's a common-sense step forward in keeping our families safe that is long overdue."

Republicans other than Jones, including Donald Trump, Senators Pat Toomey, Angus King, Susan Collins, and John Cornyn, have

recently indicated a willingness to discuss efforts to close the gun loophole. Also, Republican Representatives Peter King, Robert Dold, Jr., and Daniel Donovan are sponsoring the no-fly, no-buy bill to close the terrorist watch loophole that Rep. Bera has been working to pass.

Today in a release, even the NRA stated, "Anyone on a terror watchlist who tries to buy a gun should be thoroughly investigated by the FBI and the sale delayed while the investigation is ongoing. If an investigation uncovers evidence of terrorist activity or involvement, the government should be allowed to immediately go to court, block the sale, and arrest the terrorist."

If so many people and groups can see the need for common-sense action to keep guns out of the hands of terrorists, why can't Scott Jones?

Sheriff Scott Jones Rejects Bera's Attack and Challenges Bera to Debate

Statement from Sheriff Scott Jones:

"As Sacramento County's top law enforcement officer, I have been on the frontline of protecting our communities. I host the Regional Terrorism Threat Assessment Center and sit as the Chair of the Central California Intelligence Committee. Our department works hand in hand with regional and federal partners to intervene in and prevent terrorist attacks right here in our region—nobody locally does more or feels more strongly about protecting our cities and neighborhoods from terrorism. My issue is not with keeping weapons out of the hands of terrorists, but rather my lack of faith that the federal government can develop and maintain a sufficient vetting system. There was a period of time when I myself was inexplicably on a list that precluded unimpeded air travel.

"I absolutely support giving our law enforcement and intelligence agencies the tools they need to prevent future tragedies and believe Senator Cornyn's legislation strikes the appropriate balance between security and privacy. Right now we need to put politics aside and seek common ground and it is incredibly disappointing that Congressman Bera would politicize the tragedy in Orlando just days after so many Americans lost their lives to yet another terrorist attack, especially when his record of decision-making globally has consistently placed more Americans at risk.

"Instead of politicizing a tragedy and lobbying attacks via press release, I challenge Congressman Bera to a debate focused on national security and counter terrorism issues.

"Congressman Bera's only official statement on the

terrorist attack in Orlando was an extremely weak press release that labeled it a mass shooting, not an act of terrorism. Bera's lack of leadership and apparent lack of understanding of the threat that our nation faces from Islamist jihadist ideology is one of the main reasons that community leaders came to Sheriff Jones and asked him to enter the race for Congress," said Jones consultant Dave Gilliard.

"Today, (June 16, 2016) Sheriff Jones sent a letter to Congressman Bera, challenging him to a debate on the issue of National Security and Counter-Terrorism. Congress will soon leave Washington for their annual summer recess, so there should be no problem finding a date when Congressman Bera will be in the district and available to debate," said Gilliard.

Sacramento County DA Reports

"Non-Violent Second-Striker" Early Prison Releases: MAY 2016 Update



The Sacramento County District Attorney's Office takes an active role in evaluating these cases and writes letters to the Board with an overview of the inmate's criminal history and current commitment offense, an opinion regarding the public safety risk posed by the inmate, and the appropriateness of an offender's early release.

As of May 31, 2016, 135 inmates sentenced from Sacramento County have been granted early prison releases. Given the number of violent offenders who continue to be granted early release, DA Anne Marie Schubert began monthly updates to provide the public with a sampling of the noteworthy criminals who appear to pose a risk to public safety, but are being granted early release into our community as 'non-violent second-strikers.'

In the month of May 2016, inmates granted early prison release include:

Curtis Marcellino – Marcellino has a prior 1982 strike conviction for residential burglary. In that case, a woman awoke in her home to find Marcellino climbing on top of her and naked from the waist down. Marcellino received a 1 year county jail sentence for that offense. In 1995, a woman reported Marcellino grabbed her, kissed and fondled her as she tried to push him away and told him to stop. Marcellino pled to misdemeanor battery in this case and was sentenced to 90 days Sheriff Work Project. In 2004, Marcellino was arrested for annoying / molesting a child under age 18 and battery. He received 3 years probation for battery in this case. In 2006, Marcellino went to his victim's house in violation of a restraining order. When she asked him to leave, he became angry and drove his vehicle towards her and her 18-year-old female friend,

forcing them to jump out of the way to avoid being struck. For this offense, he was convicted of felony assault with a deadly weapon and sentenced to 270 days in county jail. In his current offense, Marcellino was 50 years old when he picked up a 15-year-old girl he met earlier the same day on Craigslist. The victim's mother saw Marcellino drive away with her daughter and took down his license plate number before calling law enforcement. Officers went to the address associated with the vehicle and found Marcellino and the victim both naked from the waist down. The victim said she told Marcellino she was 18 years old, but admitted she was only 15. According to the victim, the two were having sex. When she repeatedly told Marcellino he was hurting her, he didn't stop until the victim pushed him off of her. Observing officers found it clear the victim was under the age of 18 based on her demeanor, attitude, mannerisms and the fact she was wearing a local high school PE shirt. Marcellino pled to unlawful sexual intercourse with a minor victim under the age of 16 years when he was over 21, admitted his prior strike offense and was sentenced to 4 years in state prison. In addition to these offenses, Marcellino has an array of other convictions and prison sentences for theft, drunk driving, welfare fraud and identity theft.

Christopher Moore – Moore has two prior 2007 strike convictions for robbery and assault with a deadly weapon, with the enhancement of personally inflicting great bodily injury. In that case, Moore robbed two victims at gunpoint. Moore hit one of the victims with the butt of a rifle, causing that victim to sustain a fractured jaw. Moore then chased down the other victim, who tried to run for safety, and punched and

kicked that victim several times in the head and body. Moore was still beating the victim when officers responded to the scene. He tried to run from officers and then lied about his identity when he was apprehended. Moore was sentenced to 6 years in state prison for this ruthless conduct. In 2005, Moore drove through the family room of an occupied residence as he tried to evade officers attempting to stop him for driving a stolen car. Officers located a handgun in that stolen car. Moore was injured in the collision and transported to the hospital. Due to his conduct, he was placed in leg shackles while awaiting medical treatment. Moore pretended to need to use the restroom, at which point he tried to again run from officers. In that case, Moore was convicted of evading officers with wanton or willful disregard for the safety of others and escaping from lawful custody of an officer for pending felony charges and sentenced to 300 days in county jail. In his current committing offense, Moore was involved in a hit and run collision where he brandished a firearm in an attempt to intimidate the driver of the other car. Moore was located several hours later and denied being the driver involved in the collision. Since Moore was on parole at that time, officers searched his car and found a 9mm handgun with a shaved off serial number and 10 live rounds of ammunition for that gun. Moore was convicted of being a felon in possession of a firearm, having a prior strike conviction and sentenced to 32 months in state prison. In addition to these felony convictions, Moore sustained numerous parole violations and misdemeanor convictions, including resisting police officers and driving under the influence of alcohol. ★

EPA FIVE-YEAR REVIEW OF THE AEROJET SUPERFUND SITE

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) began its first Five-Year Review (FYR) of the cleanup actions within the Aerojet Superfund Site (Site) in Rancho Cordova, California. The purpose of a FYR is to evaluate whether the cleanup actions for the Site are protective of human health and the environment.

THE REVIEW PROCESS
Superfund law requires EPA to evaluate the protectiveness of remedial systems every five years until the Site has been cleaned up sufficiently to allow unrestricted access to the property. Upon completion of the review, which is due by September 30, 2016, a copy of the final report will be placed in the information repositories listed below and online at EPA's web page at <http://www.epa.gov/superfund/aerojet>. The Site will continue to be cleaned up and monitored during the review, and the next FYR will be in 2021.

CLEANUP
The Site covers 5,900 acres near Rancho Cordova. Since 1953, Aerojet and its subsidiaries have manufactured liquid and solid propellant rocket engines for military and commercial applications, and, have in the process, formulated a number of chemicals. In addition, the Cordova Chemical Company operated chemical manufacturing facilities on the Aerojet complex from 1974 to 1979. Both companies disposed of unknown quantities of hazardous waste, including trichloroethene (TCE) and other chemicals associated with rocket propellants and various chemical processing wastes. Wastes were disposed of in man-made ponds, landfills, injected into very deep wells, rainfall and other sources mixed with waste in soil and move down to groundwater, and by open burning. In 1979, volatile organic compounds were found off-site in private wells, and, in 1983 the American River. In January 1997, perchlorate was found in drinking water wells off-site. The most prevalent contaminants in groundwater are TCE, perchlorate, and N-Nitrosodimethylamine. The Site was divided into eight sections, or operable units, to assist prioritizing the cleanup plan schedule for this Site. The Western Ground Water Operable Unit (OU-3), Perimeter Groundwater OU (OU-5) and Boundary OU (OU-6) have Record of Decisions in place. The remaining OUs where cleanup decisions will be made are OU-1, OU-4, OU-7, OU-8, and OU-9. This review will primarily cover any interim and present cleanup actions on the Site for Western Ground Water OU (OU-3) and Perimeter Groundwater OU (OU-5), which are the only two OUs with remedies in place.

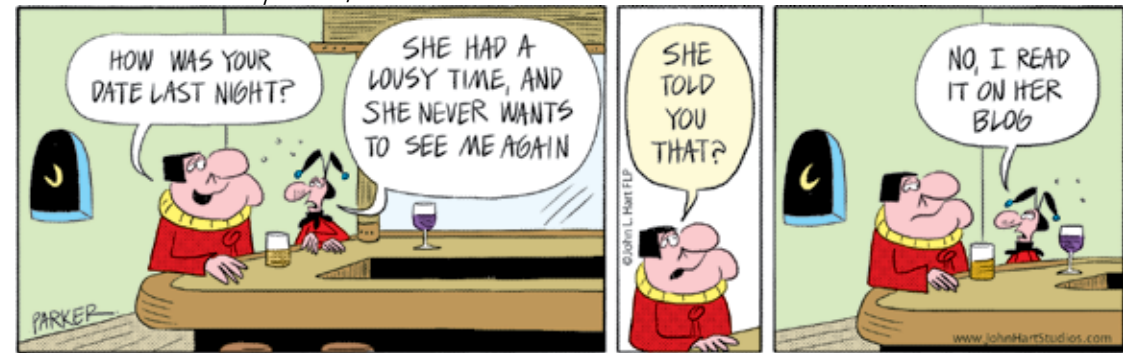

"Today, in protest of the Sacramento Democrats' all-time high spending package, I abstained to vote in order to highlight California's one party majority budget process which has once again led to historic and unsustainable state spending at the expense of hardworking Californian taxpayers.

"While the Governor has been touting 'fiscal restraint' since January, in a classic bait and switch, Jerry Brown and his Democrat colleagues today displayed the opposite. The 2016-17 record budget, at \$122.5 Billion, spends \$5 billion more than last year's record budget, despite estimates that California is bringing in \$1.9 billion less in tax revenue than forecast. Adding insult to injury, the Governor himself has forecasted a \$4 billion deficit within three years as California continues its

ever increasing spending spree.

"What is abundantly clear is that once again Democrats alone are intentionally overspending taxpayer money on a bloated state bureaucracy, high speed rail, expanded welfare programs, and Obamacare in order to create a false "fiscal emergency" that will lead to future calls for higher taxes and borrowing.

"One party domination in California has resulted in the nation's highest taxes, worst regulatory and litigation environment, and created our present day situation where Californians experience the nation's highest poverty rate and businesses leave our state in droves.

"Instead of business as usual and simply pushing the red button in California Republicans' traditional "no vote" on the budget, I abstained as a wake-up call to Californians: Sacramento

Democrats will come back, this November and in future years, to ask for ever increasing taxes, fees, and bond measures to pay for future expenditures ignored by today's irresponsible budget."

Senator Nielsen on Passing of Largest State Budget

The Legislature passed the state budget Wednesday afternoon on a 27 - 11 vote. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Gerber), Vice Chair of the Senate Budget Committee, issued the following statement:

"This budget is a steadfast attempt at fiscal restraint but not worthy of a yes vote. It is still the largest budget in the history of California; it does little to change how government does business.

"I compliment my colleagues and the Governor for their earnest effort but this budget does not go far enough to plan for a looming recession.

"I don't like the \$10 vehicle license fee increase to every car that will generate \$330 million a year for DMV, of which \$70-\$80 million will continue to be transferred to the General Fund instead of our roads.

"There are significant changes

to regulations and laws that will affect our daily lives including our water rights. These changes include special treatment for marijuana growers slipped into this budget, without public debate or transparency."

Senator Jim Nielsen represents the Fourth Senate District, which includes the counties of Butte, Colusa, Glenn, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter, Tehama and Yuba.

Senator Gaines Opposes Wasteful Budget

Senator Ted Gaines (R-El Dorado) today issued the following statement regarding the Democrat majority-vote budget bill:

"This massive budget spends a record \$122.5 billion out of the General Fund, an increase of \$6.9 billion from the prior year. While the budget plan does include a meager attempt to save for a rainy day and pay down debt, California still has an estimated \$330 billion in outstanding liabilities, and we need to be routing every single spare dollar towards paying it down.

"The Governor himself has

repeatedly warned that another recession is headed our way. Instead of heeding that warning, we are increasing spending by billions to pay for things like the absurd High Speed Rail project, a minimum wage increase and state government office building makeovers.

"No matter the problem, no matter the year, no matter the economy, the Legislative Democrat solution is always more spending. My constituents need tax relief, not more irresponsible government squandering that will be taken right out of their pockets."

"California's spending is growing at little over six percent, yet our economy is sitting at a projected two percent growth, this is clearly a ploy to remove the sunset of Proposition 30 and continue to increase taxes in the

state of California," said Chávez.

"This is made apparent by the very fact that we are increasing spending at an alarming rate that our economy simply cannot keep pace with. When the Department of Finance projects a four billion dollar deficit by 2019-2020, there is a problem and that problem is we are passing pork filled unbalanced budgets."

"While there are many things in this budget that are worthy of support: an increase of two billion to the rainy day fund, increased spending of Proposition 98 funds for education and 400 million

in funds for Early Childhood Education, it is a budget that is unsustainable and I fear, just as many Californians fear, a recession that could be worse than what we experienced in 2009," stated Chávez.

said. "Our lack of investment in these core, widely supported, government functions is truly disappointing."

'Finding Dory' Fun, but Flawed

The tears of joy and sorrow we shed for "Finding Nemo" are replaced by tears of laughter with "Finding Dory," a flawed, yet rib-tickling sequel to Disney's watertight, undersea treasure of 2003.

The animated fish tale continues one year after the young and disobedient Nemo was reunited with his understandably overprotective dad Merlin (voiced by Albert Brooks). (Yeah, I'm siding with the father - sue me.) Now it's time for Dory (Ellen DeGeneres) to find her long-forgotten parents. Suffering from chronic short-term memory loss, an affliction that caused her to separate from her family in the first place, the bubbly blue tang must rely on her instincts and friends both old and new.

Dory's quest involves more fish, sea birds and marine animals than what would be found in six Monterey Bay Aquariums. Excessiveness is a common sequel mistake, and it's a shame that even the talented filmmakers at Disney and Pixar can't help themselves. Other than the hilarity of a couple of rock-hording sea lions (Idris Elba and Dominic West) and a grumpy octopus (Ed O'Neill), the countless critters

thrown at us are superfluous.

Even more disappointing, too many animals require super powers besides the ability to speak English in order for Dory to meet her goal. It's one thing for a beluga whale (Ty Burrell) to have sensory powers enviable to Superman, but when a mollusk takes the wheel of a runaway truck on a busy highway, the term "jump the shark" becomes way too appropriate. It's one thing for aquarium fish to escape a dentist's office in Baggies, but an octopus hijacking a moving truck? This isn't a Saturday morning cartoon, people.

Despite the occasional sinking feeling of a story that loses its way at times like Nemo and Dory, "Finding Dory" floats

on fun. The rapid-fire gags and puns will require repeat viewing to catch them all, and even though "classic" status won't be attached to the "Finding Nemo" follow-up, anyone who doesn't laugh and laugh loudly watching this sequel is all wet. **3 1/2 of 5 Stars.**

Released alongside "Finding Dory" is an adorable 6-minute short, "Piper." The beach-set film centers on a hungry baby sandpiper learning to overcome hydrophobia. Get to the theater on time because late arrivals will miss some of the most realistic computer animation Pixar has ever done, meaning that the entire industry has ever done, along with a too-cute story sure to put everyone in a good mood for the main attraction. ★

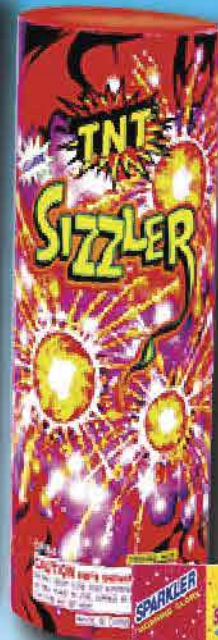

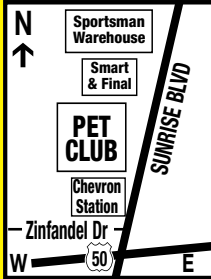
