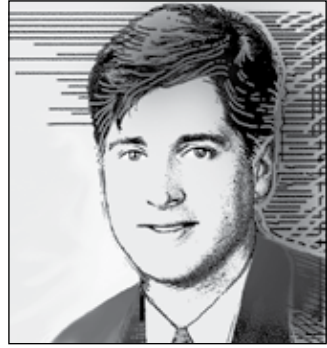

Run Salmon Run

Recent Rains Aid Seasonal Migration

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Recent rain was good news for late-running salmon and early steelhead trout in the American River.

As final chinook spawners of the 2015 season reached breeding grounds, they completed lives—and epic journeys—that included thousands of miles of river and ocean migration.

Hell-bent on reproduction, adult salmon left Pacific waters in fall and made the weeks-long upstream swim to revisit hatching places. Their piscine leaps were seen from Sacramento, Carmichael, Rancho Cordova, Fair Oaks, and Gold River outlooks. Nimbus Dam and man-made ladders to the fish hatchery near Hazel Avenue presented final obstacles. In mitigation for

dam construction, millions of juveniles are bred and released from the hatchery every year.

During a drought that reduced river levels, chinook weighing up to 30 pounds risked parts of the journey with bodies exposed above water. Using fins, tails, and entire bodies for projection, they struggled across riffles and exposed gravel bars.

“Their problems in getting here were not insurmountable,” concluded Nimbus Fish Hatchery Manager Gary Novak. “They still made it. When they leave the ocean, they stop feeding; their organs and immune systems break down. Their only purpose is to get upstream and produce eggs and sperm.”

Some mated and spawned in shallow gravel beds. Soon after, their carcasses drifted downstream to provide winter food for fish, birds, and parkway

mammals. Those fish that climbed hatchery ladders were relieved of eggs and milt and artificially spawned. Their flesh was shipped to Washington State for processing and supplying to non-profit users.

“To us, 2015 seemed like an adequate season,” reported Gary Novak. “We processed 9,000 salmon, compared to 8,000 last year.”

Artificial spawning began at Nimbus in November. After forty days, the fertilized chinook eggs started hatching. Nourished in hatchery ponds, these sac-fry will be big enough to begin their river-to-sea migration as smolts after spring. Because of the 2015 drought and dangerously warm waters, many of last season’s youngsters made their journey to Bay Area waters in trucks. The success of this emergency operation cannot be measured until

adult survivors swim upstream in two or more years. While returning veterans reflect the success of previous breeding seasons, said Novak, ocean temperatures and food supplies in the Pacific are other variables.

Operated by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, the Nimbus hatchery is now processing the annual steelhead trout run. This operation continues until late February. Rainbow hued, spotted, and sportive, these fish may spawn several times in their lifecycle.

“They face the same challenges as the salmon in getting upstream,” said Gary Novak. “But they make it. Their urge to breed is stronger than most obstacles that get in their way.”

Public Meetings on How to Spend \$2.5 Million Grant

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The City of Rancho Cordova needs your help in determining priorities for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program. In the next five years, we anticipate \$2.5 million in funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development towards the program.

We have been asking residents and people who work in our community to take a 15-20 minute survey to help us understand where you would like the money to be spent. The funding is limited to supporting public projects and services for youth, seniors, and principally low- and moderate-income persons in Rancho Cordova, whereas other funding opportunities like the Community Enhancement Fund can support a wider range of community priorities.

As part of this effort, the City is holding two public meetings to help answer questions and gather feedback about priorities for the CDBG program. Refreshments will be provided. Residents are invited to attend the following:

Individuals who can't attend the meetings are encouraged to take the survey before Feb. 5th, 2016. The City is also accepting applications from non-profit service providers for CDBG services and capital funding for Fiscal Year 2016-17. The deadline to apply is on Monday, Feb. 15th, 2016 at 5 p.m.

Mayor Sanders Optimistically Looks Forward

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Last Friday, Mayor David Sander addressed those in attendance at the first Rancho Cordova Luncheon of 2016.

Stepping up to the podium Mayor Sander had a commanding presence, but still was able to make the crowd laugh within the first few minutes, revealing his "man of the people" side.

He begins his speech by reminiscing on the past year, and noting that he is at a "great point in my life and it's a wonderful point in Cordova history."

With an optimistic air, Mayor Sander changes perspective and looks into the future. The rest of this speech outlines "16 great (albeit challenging) things that are going to happen in 2016."

1. Financially Stable. Rancho Cordova government will never exceed expenses. Every year the city has a clean audit, and every year there is a surplus. This, the Mayor says, will continue.

2. Community Enhancement Fund (Measure H). Grant opportunities return. The Mayor urged everyone to therefore get their applications in—by July 1st. He also added that Measure H funds will always go to special projects.

3. 30 Plus Ways to Have Fun in Rancho Cordova. "We have fun," said Mayor Sander, mentioning only a few of the highlights throughout the year: the Airshow, the Fourth of July celebrations, and other community activities see and be seen at.

4. Walk With the Mayor. The Mayor reminisced of past walks, and explained how he believes this helps make healthy neighborhoods, and so the walks will continue.

5. Construction Amps Up.

Mayor Sander informed of some big projects in the works, including the official word that Raley's on Sunrise and Douglas will be coming.

6. Colleges Grow to 13. Rancho Cordova will be adding another college. Not a great big one, not the kinds with a lot of bricks and mortar, but one that will repurpose an already established location into a health and science school.

7. Performing Arts Theatre Opens. This was the first applause the Mayor's list received during the meeting. This is set to open the spring of 2016. The Mayor said he foresees this having an enormous impact on the community and kids.

8. Startup in a Day. This is part of a national effort designed to allow entrepreneurs to start a business in one day. This promises to add kindly to the economic development of the city.

9. Philosophy of Government: Broker, Catalyst, and Facilitator. Mayor Sander explained that rarely can government solve everyone's problems, but the community solves its own ills. This philosophy embraces the concept of government in a partnership with the citizens.

10. Live in Rancho Cordova.

Currently, there are lots of homes for sale, more than ever before. "This is the city's dream," said the Mayor. "It is maturing and bearing fruit for us."

11. Homes for Veterans. This announcement received the second round-of-applause of the afternoon. Veterans Village at Mather, plans to open the end of March.

12. Neighborhood Beautification. For example, Blight Busters: a nationally award winning program will be coming back. The program is dedicated to neighborhood cleanup and education, and to raising the standards.

13. White Rock and Cordova Towne. The Mayor informed of road work occurring here, of re-doing the pavement, of residential street rehab.

14. New Sidewalks for Students. This item is not, however, just for students, but for the community as a whole. While there will be a great amount of attention paid to the sidewalks at Rancho Cordova Elementary, other areas will get attention as well, such as Folsom Boulevard, and the creation of bike trails over Hwy 50. The list is long.

15. Proactive Policy Ramps Up. As Mayor Sander explained, this means apps, social media, crimes units to stop crime before it happens, using Measure H funds for crime suppression and the like.

16. We Will Fail. Lastly the Mayor reminds everyone that failure will happen, and is a natural aspect of striving, quoting Thomas Edison: "I failed my way to success." Concluding his optimistic speech, the Mayor said: "The only way not to fail, is not to try. And we are trying in Rancho Cordova." ★

WINTER WATERING TIPS FOR OUTDOOR LANDSCAPING

- Install a weather-based smart irrigation controller and water-efficient sprinkler heads.

- * Irrigation restrictions do not apply for trees or edible vegetation watered solely by drip or microspray systems.

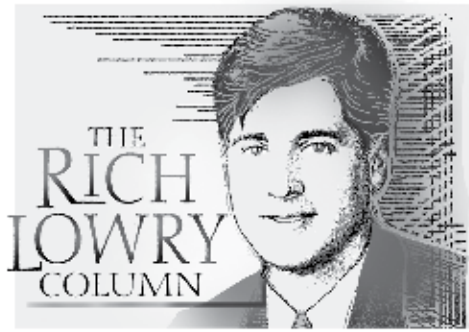
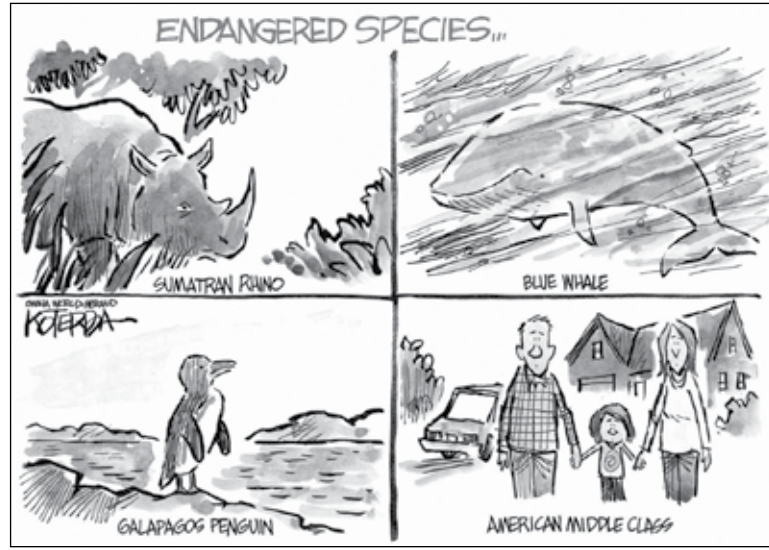

Ted Cruz Is Nixon, Not Goldwater

The lazy conventional wisdom is that Ted Cruz is the new Barry Goldwater, doomed to suffer an electoral landslide defeat should he win the Republican nomination.

Not only is this wrong about Cruz's general-election chances, it may compare Cruz to the wrong 20th-century Republican forebear. The better analogue for Cruz might be Richard Nixon, not in the crudely pejorative sense, but as another surpassingly shrewd and ambitious politician who lacked a personal touch but found a way to win nonetheless.

First, all the caveats. Obviously and most importantly, Cruz is not a paranoiac. He's more ideological than Nixon. And he has none of Nixon's insecurity, in fact the opposite. Nixon went to tiny Whittier College and

resented the Northeastern elite; Cruz went to Princeton and Harvard, and could be a member of the Northeastern elite in good standing if he wanted to be.

But Cruz is cut from roughly similar cloth. He wears his ambition on his sleeve and isn't highly charismatic or relatable. If Cruz wins the nomination, it'll be on the strength of intelligence and willpower. He'll have outworked, outsmarted and outmaneuvered everyone else.

Certainly, Cruz isn't ascending on the basis of warm feelings from his colleagues. Cruz portrays his unpopularity within the Senate as establishment distaste for him as a lonely man of principle. But it's a genuine personal dislike.

Not that Cruz cares. In fact, a key to what he has been able to achieve is his apparent immunity to the reflexive desire to be liked by people around you, a weakness to which almost all of us fall prey. Cruz is free of the peer pressure that typically makes all senators, at some level, team players.

Cruz is a Reagan Republican, although with considerable flexibility. When Rand Paul seemed to be on the ascendancy a couple of years ago, Cruz was a Reagan Republican with Paulite accents. When Donald Trump began to dominate, Cruz became a Reagan Republican with Trumpian tendencies.

Cruz penned an op-ed with Paul

Ryan last April that was a ringingly stalwart argument for trade-promotion authority. Two months later, when a brush fire erupted on the right over "Obamatrade," Cruz abruptly reversed course and came out against trade-promotion authority -- he cited procedural reasons -- and then opposed the underlying trade agreement as well.

Is all the effort on Cruz's part only in the cause of a 1964-style ideological blowout? No. The country's too evenly divided for another Goldwater-style landslide loss, and Hillary Clinton is a deeply flawed candidate.

But Cruz has major vulnerabilities. He's more ideologically defined than George W. Bush in 2000 or Barack Obama in 2008, and his current theory of the general election -- that he need turn out only conservatives -- is a comforting fable.

Marco Rubio and Chris Christie are both, in their own ways, more winsome, and it's easier to see how each of them could pick off Obama states. But Cruz has always understood that you have to win the primary to win the general. Whoever is going to beat him better know what he's doing -- because Cruz certainly does.

Toy Poodle Barks Almost Nonstop

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My 6-month-old toy poodle, "Jenks," is incredibly cute, but he has a sharp, loud bark for such a little guy -- and he barks almost non-stop when we're home. I know anxiety is an issue with many small breeds, and I'm wondering how I can best address this?
-- John, via email

DEAR JOHN: It's worth looking into. Contact Jenks' veterinarian to discuss the issue, as I'm sure you'll get a number of different suggestions ranging from behavior training to anti-anxiety medication.

Jenks is still pretty young. How much time does he spend alone at home? If you have to be out for eight hours or more, you may want to have someone -- a friend or a pet sitter -- come in to check on him,

take him out to pee and play a little bit.

You also should establish a routine that he can count on, one that includes plenty of time spent with him either playing or training. Both of these are times when he's getting your full attention and positive reinforcement, as well as a way to work off some of that puppy energy that's also behind the barking.

As your puppy matures into an adult, he may mellow out somewhat. But in the meantime, it's up to you to provide structure and training to reinforce the behavior you want in Jenks. If these efforts don't seem to improve the constant barking, talk with your vet about addressing his anxiety with medication.

The City Wants Your Input on Spending Federal Grant Money

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The City of Rancho Cordova (CRC) anticipates receiving \$2.5 million in Federal Funds over the next five years. The CRC will be receiving the funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. (HUD). They are coming from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program.

The CDBG is a Federal Grant Program managed by HUD.

But, before the funds can be allocated to the CRC, the city needs its residents and also the people who work in their community to help them to understand where they believe that the money should be spent. The community of Ranch Cordova can use these funds for infrastructure, neighborhood improvements, and other community planning and development programs. They will help with much needed services in the community, including programs for veterans, seniors and disadvantaged youth.

The answers that the people who live in the City of Rancho Cordova provide to their elected officials will have a lasting effect on their community. To determine where the CDBG funds are needed, the CRC has an online survey which is available in English, Russian and Spanish. It should take only 15-20 minutes to select the answers to various questions. The survey will only

be online until Feb. 5th. To participate in the survey, you can go to www.CityofRanchoCordova.org.

By reviewing the answers to the survey questions, the CRC will be able to understand what is important to the residents of the CRC. Services included in the survey are housing vouchers, money for food provided by WIC or CalFresh, Legal Aid and Translation Services, and Veteran Services. If you are concerned with Youth Services, After School Programs, or Single Parent Services, you can select that box on the online form. If you think that better public transportation or help with beautifying the streets is needed you can check that box. Do you believe that after school programs, aid for low-income families, Senior-Parent Services, or Mental Health Services need more attention, check that box.

Residents who do not have access to a computer can pick up a printed copy of the survey at locations in the community. These include: Folsom Cordova Community Partnership, Rancho Cordova City Hall, Neighborhood Services Center, and the Rancho Cordova Police Department. "We are really taking an all-inclusive approach to this campaign," stated Peter Ibrahim, the CRC Housing and Neighborhood Development Specialist. "We're also scheduling three in-person, public meetings in the hopes that we receive a lot of

feedback."

When I was researching this story I went out into the community and talked to the residents that I met on the street, at the library, and in the retail stores, schools and churches. Not one person who said they were residents of CRC knew about this funding, or the online survey. When I asked a city contact for more information as to where the local residents would have heard about the survey, he indicated that the CRC has published a public notice in this paper, and posted information about this plan on the CRC's website, and well as the city's social media and e-newsletter. The school districts were asked to spread the word also.

From my very recent personal experience I can only say that this method of communication is not working, nor is it adequate to notify everyone who lives in Rancho Cordova about the availability of these funds. The funds are very important to making positive changes in this community. Not everyone is online. Not everyone reads this newspaper. But everyone should be aware of this funding source and have a chance to express their opinions. I hope that before any final decisions are made that the CRC is certain that everyone has had a chance to tell them what is important to them. After all, it is their city. Senate Labor Says "No" to Flex-Work Week for CA Employees

Berryhill Flex-Work Week Legislation Killed in Senate Labor

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Senator Tom Berryhill (R-Twain Harte) announces the defeat of Senate Bill 368, the California Workplace Flexibility Act. SB 368 would have

given employees and employers the ability to adopt a mutually agreeable alternative workweek schedule. The Senate Labor and Industrial Relations defeated the bill on a party line vote despite testimony from multiple employers and Human Resource experts that the current system does not give employees and employers the flexibility to devise flexible work schedules.

"This small change in the law would make things so much easier for folks," said Berryhill. "SB 368 would have given employees more time with their families and a better balance between work and family life. Families are left juggling time between two working parents, school schedules, and family obligations. More flexibility just makes sense."

Under federal law, in California's bordering states, and in nearly every other state except California, it is simple for employers and employees to adopt "alternative workweeks" such as 4-10's, or 3/12's. Working a four-day workweek can provide for up to 50 extra days off each year for the average full-time employee. In California, however, the system is complicated, and requires employers to jump through multiple hoops designed to stymie any flexibility. Ultimately this process discourages any possibility of choosing schedule options such as flextime, part-time, job sharing, telecommuting, and compressed workweeks. "Job retention is just as

important as job creation," said Berryhill. "Hamstringing an employer from accommodating an employee's scheduling needs puts California employers at a disadvantage in comparison to neighboring states. Rejecting this measure makes it that much harder for California's businesses

to hang onto good employees."

Surveys have shown the biggest threat to their organizations' success is attracting and retaining the best employees. HR professionals believe the best way to recruit good talent is to provide flexibility in the workplace.

Michael Letizia, California Past State Director for the Society for Human Resource Management testified that CALSHRM and SHRM strongly support efforts to assist employees in meeting the dual demands of work and personal needs. He shared:

"Onerous and excessive requirements of the current wage and hour laws in California...are simply outside the scope of 'reasonable' for a majority of small to medium sized employers, and so those employees seeking help or accommodation in the private sector are consistently told 'NO.' We applaud Senator Berryhill for his continued efforts to advance work-flex legislation that would benefit thousands and thousands of lower paid, non-exempt employees in California."

The measure is supported by a broad pro-business coalition, including: California Chamber of Commerce, California Retailers Association, California League of Food Processors, Society for Human Resource Management, and the California Manufacturers and Technology Association. ★

The project will increase safety and accessibility in the area with newly paved roads, ADA compliant curb ramps, and larger drainage inlets.

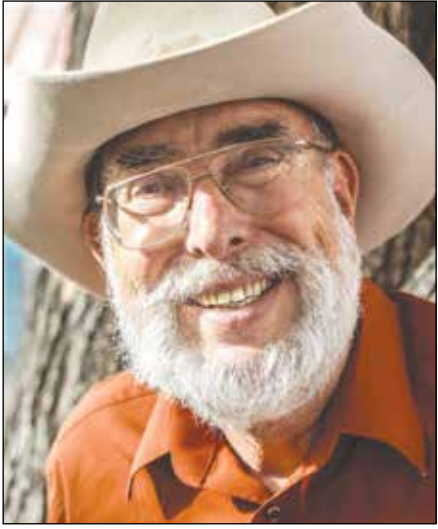

Good Week for Lancer Hoops

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - For most of their final non-league game of the season at San Juan High School last Saturday, the Cordova High School boys' basketball team was on target to slow down the backcourt shooters on the Bradshaw Christian squad.

But in the fourth quarter, the Lancers let their guard down—pardon the pun—that allowed the Pride to shoot from behind the arc. That led to a 78-67 loss as part of the one day Common Good Classic Tournament.

After three quarters, Cordova (11-9 overall, 3-0 in the Sierra Valley Conference) led 51-50. For most of the final quarter, the Lancers continued to put pressure on the Pride's offense. But with three minutes left in the game, Bradshaw Christian penetrated the Lancers' defense that led to five, three-pointers.

"I thought we did a great job holding them (in the first half)," said Cordova coach Fletcher Johnson, whose squad led 35-33 at halftime. "We had talked with the guys about not leaving shooters wide open. They weren't rotating at all (in the final quarter)."

In addition, the Pride canned 7-of-7 free throws that included two coming off a technical foul off a Cordova player with two minutes left in the game. The Pride outscored the Lancers 28-16 in the final eight minutes of the contest.

Lancer guard DeAnte Wilkins finished with a team-high 27 points. Ben Danielyan followed with eight points and Damion

Baldwin and Jason Novik followed with seven points each. Mike Brown had six points, Joe Gomez four, Najee Clark and Kyle Lorena three each and Slavik Demchuk two.

Cordova 54, Union Mine 45

On Jan. 15th in a home conference game, defense was also huge for the Lancers against the visiting Diamondbacks. While its offense erupted for 26 points in the first two quarters, Cordova held Union Mine to a combined 16 points.

"We played very intense," Johnson said.

Three Lancers scored in double figures; Baldwin and Novik had 13 points each and Wilkins had 12. William Moore followed with seven points, Danielyan six and Gomez three.

Conference Opener

On Jan. 12th, Cordova posted a 79-67 win over Galt to start SVC action.

Earlier this week, the Lancers hosted El Dorado in

another conference game.

Tonight, Friday, at 7 p.m., Cordova will take on the hottest team in both the conference and section in Liberty Ranch, which is 19-0, its best record of a boys basketball team since the school opened its doors toward the end of the 2000s.

Cordova ends the first round of conference play at home against Rosemont next Tuesday. Game time is also scheduled for 7 p.m. ★

Are You Ready to Rugby?

Sacramento Valley Rugby Foundation Set to Host The 32nd Annual "Kick Off Tournament" at Cordova High, Jan. 30th And 31st

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - What started from humble beginnings—an opportunity to get pre-season playing time for lots of young high school rugby squads—has blossomed into the largest Youth and High School Rugby Tournament in the United States (and likely the entire Western Hemisphere!).

The Kick Off Tournament, affectionately referred to as the KOT, is still run today by some of the pioneers who first took this on in 1984, when seven high school clubs were featured. Jerry Ahlin, Ray Thompson, Pete Deterding, Bob Luttrell, Joe Cavallero, Zack Finney, and a posse of their finest friends, come together in a massive volunteer effort to pull off quite a show, each and every year. They do so for the love of the game, and for the kids who love to play!

Many of the finest players, coaches, and rugby clubs in America have been featured over the years, including Jesuit High, many times over National Champions. Other top local clubs to have begun their season at the KOT, and gone on to compete that Spring at the National Championships include Cougars (Del Campo), Islanders (Burbank), Vacaville, Christian Brothers, and most recently Dixon, Granite Bay, and Sierra Foothills.

By 2005, the event had grown to 30 clubs, playing on three fields at Granite Park. The popularity of youth and high school rugby was beginning to explode at that time, not simply locally, but across the Bay Area and indeed America. In fact, a recent report from the Sports & Fitness Industry Association (according to the Maryland-based organization's U.S. Trends in Team Sports Report) reveals participation in tackle football fell 21 percent from 2008-2013, while rugby experienced the biggest gain of all youth and high schools sports, growing a whopping 81 percent during that time!

The KOT, a large, established structure on the game's competitive calendar, was uniquely positioned to help foster this growth. 2006 saw the addition of Girls play, while 2007 saw the event expand to two days and include a free Middle School clinic. For the past three years, now at Cordova High, seven to nine fields have seen play all day, both Saturday and Sunday, featuring an average of 130 sides playing a staggering 205 30-minute matches!

Clubs have visited the KOT in the recent past, seeking some warm California sun, and the chance to compete with locals, the likes of the Jesuit Marauders..., clubs from across the Bay Area (Santa Rosa to Morgan Hill), but also from as far

away as Oregon, Utah, Colorado, Washington, SoCal, and even several from Alberta, Canada.

Referees visit from even further, with several coming each year from Canada, but also Pittsburg, New York, Massachusetts, Idaho, Germany, and South Africa! In order for the KOT to grow, and to continue to provide quality matches, the word went out across USA Rugby, "Send us your refs!" Four brave souls answered the call in 2006, and more and more refs have come every year since.

As the KOT grew, however, the need to help produce and develop a local crop of refs came with the territory. So the KOT leveraged our wealth of sunshine and matches needing officials, to create a unique Referee Development Program. The KOT RDP features a free day of referee training Friday at Sac State, and two full days of valuable referee coaching throughout the event. Our own Raley's College Greens donates all the food for the ref tent!

As richly rewarding as hosting young stars of the game can be (many ruggers who've played at past KOTs have gone on to play for, and even Captain, USA National teams), there's no greater joy than watching U-8s and U-10s blossom into feisty U-12s and eventually become skillful, competitive middle schoolers!

It's at these junior levels that the popularity of rugby has finally taken off. Today, top high school rugby players have often grown to compete over six or eight seasons, and in some cases, played under the same coach, or program, the entire time. The quality at the top keeps growing finer each and every year.

So why rugby?

To some rugby is a muscular ballet with mud and blood, while to others it just looks like a brawl. A violent contact sport with no padding? In this day and age of heightened concerns over sports concussions? But to those who take the time to peel back the veneer and take a closer look, they see adults mentoring children; coaches who carefully teach players to respect themselves, their opponents and the game itself.

With top notch coaching, confidence and skills grow over time. Fitness reigns supreme. The head and neck must never be a part of the rugby tackle. Speed and power, choreographed teamwork, brilliant ball handling and precision kicking are often on display. But look closer still and you'll notice there are no timeouts. The coach, who runs practice, has little to no input once the match has started. The coach elects a Captain, who is the only conduit to the Ref. The Ref, in turn, tries to manage a fair contest between two sides through the Captains.

Rugby is certainly an interesting contradiction. Though the players seem to be trying to tear each other's head off, they help each other up off the ground, and cheer each other (and meet to shake hands) after every match. And players will always refer to the referee as "sir." While the ref is just trying to keep heads from being torn off, a good ref can bring a competitive match up to a boil, while never allowing it spill over. All players contribute, all get to handle the ball, and all shapes and sizes of players are welcome. Passion created from this game is measurable.

Why Sacramento Rugby?

Students of sports history know the oldest sport offered at Cal (UC Berkeley) is rugby, which started playing in the 1880s. Other local rivals, St. Mary's, Santa Clara and Stanford, all share long, rich rugby traditions as well, with St. Mary's having just won their first National Championship (in any sport), May 2014, at Stanford (featuring many local ruggers), and repeated in 2015!

As the First World War concluded, the Olympics embraced rugby, offering a Gold Medal (won by the USA) in both 1920 and '24. Graduates of these Universities combined, with rugby players from San Francisco's Olympic Club, to train, as they traveled by ship, and win these medals. Captaining the '24 team was Colby "Babe" Slater from nearby Woodland. But after the Gold Medal match in Paris, where unruly French fans nearly rioted as USA beat France, rugby was dropped from the Olympic program.

The tradition of rugby, however, lingered across Northern California. Though college and then pro football took over, 1953 saw a small rebirth of rugby when the first Monterey Rugby Classic was held. Clubs and tournaments popped up everywhere throughout the 1960s (UC Davis and Sac State have both recently celebrated their 50th year of rugby). In 1982, a sturdy group of Sacramento sportsmen travelled to Europe on a rugby tour. They went as players, only to return with a newfound desire to teach the game they grew to love. So a new high school rugby competition began in Sacramento, kicking off with our first ever KOT!

Most years, weather permitting, Sacramento offers a long winter/spring playing season, as local clubs draw upon a wealth of coaches, referees, and administrators to help develop young players and squads to enjoy the game, the same game played in Olympics of old. The size and depth of the local competition here remains unrivalled across American rugby's landscape.

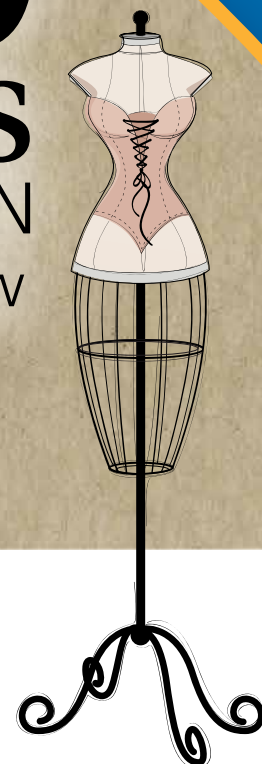
