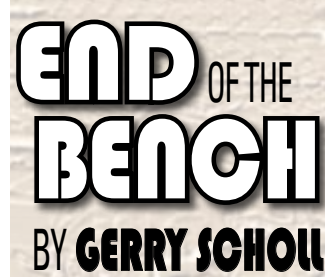

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - For the third year, the Cordova Meadows area of Rancho Cordova is holding an informal community "bring your own" picnic with live music provided. Organized by the group called Keep Cordova Meadows Beautiful (KCMB), the event is called Music in the Meadows. Cordova Meadows Elementary School at 2550 La Loma Dr. is providing the lawn for the picnic, which will be held 3:30 p.m. to 6 p.m., Sunday, October 18th.

Between 50 and 100 people enjoyed the event each of the past two years, and those attending are encouraged to bring lawn chairs, blankets, and their own picnic dinner. The bands Melting Pot and Purple Sky are supplying music for the afternoon, and the elementary school's PTA will be selling homemade desserts as a fundraiser.

"There's been discussion about having a food truck or hot dog vendor, or making food and selling it at the event," said Mary Nesel, one of the organizers of both the event and of KCMB. "Ultimately, we thought maybe somewhere down the road, but keeping it super simple is what makes it enjoyable both to plan and to attend." Others playing a major role are Katherine Cox, and Bob and Meada Cashatt.

The two bands will provide music throughout the afternoon. Melting Pot has played two previous Music in the Meadows events. "We do a little jazz, a little funk, a little R&B, classic rock, pop," said Rick Maness, the band's keyboardist and a resident of Cordova Meadows. "We just like to entertain people and especially to see them dance, and we like to play."

Don Kazama of Sacramento is a founding member of the band and plays lead guitar. He has been performing with bass and guitar for 25 years, playing with bands in some of Sacramento's top hotels and clubs, as well as in the San Francisco nightclub circuit and in Reno and Las Vegas casinos. Carrie Moore of Rancho Cordova is the vocalist. Drummer R.T. DuBose of Sacramento and bass player Dan House of Elk Grove used to perform together in the band that accompanied the CaIPERS Holiday Chorus, which was directed by Maness for 35 years. On keyboard and trombone is Albert DeLeon of Elk Grove. Bass guitarists Geno Lopes of Sacramento and Rodell Patman of Natomas provide rhythmic and harmonic foundation. Maness and Moore have both lived in Rancho Cordova for many years, two other members of the band grew up in Rancho Cordova and attended area schools, and

an additional member works in Rancho Cordova.

Melting Pot has played at many different venues in the Greater Sacramento area, at private parties, clubs, benefits, and special events. Maness said that the band Purple Sky has also played at Music in the Meadows in the previous years, and has re-formed this year with some of the same musicians and some different than those who played before.

"This event is at the school because Principal (Joseph) Piazza has let us know he's all for promoting our neighborhood activities. There's no charge and the grassy area is pretty large," Nesel said. All those interested in attending the neighborhood picnic day are welcome. School rules apply: no alcohol, smoking, or pets.

The Cordova Meadows neighborhood has been a part of Rancho Cordova since the 50s and 60s, and several programs have been undertaken to help organize the neighborhood and encourage residents to work and come together in caring for their area. To this end, almost four years ago the Keep Cordova Meadows Beautiful organization was formed. The community also participates in NextDoor.com, a private, online neighborhood social network. ★

Food Locker Aids Needy

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Cordova Community Food Locker (CCFL) has been serving the hungry in the Rancho Cordova area since 1987. A group of 11 local churches banded together to create and operate CCFL to help feed the area's most needy residents. The facility, located on the grounds of St. John Vianney Church on Coloma Road, is an entirely secular operation which distributes emergency supplies of both federally funded and locally donated food. The Food Locker is staffed entirely by volunteers and is open Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:30 a.m. to 1:20 p.m.

Since CCFL is a designated IRS 501(c) (3) non-profit charitable organization, donations are tax deductible.

Mr. Ed Evans, a CCFL founder, said the facility has provided food for over 15 million meals since its inception and now serves about 1,200 families per month. Last Thanksgiving, the Food Locker distributed nearly 1,400 turkeys and approximately 60 tons of non-perishable foods. The Christmas distribution was even larger. CCFL receives food from Sacramento Food Bank Services, as well as local businesses and private individuals. The KCRA Channel 3 annual Kids Can Food Drive also provides canned goods to regional food lockers.

CCFL operates mostly on donations from parishioners of local churches, and augmented by donations from residents of the local community. Mr. Evans said that the Great Recession of 2008 greatly increased the need for emergency food supplies. He also said, because we are able to purchase food for pennies on the dollar, CCFL gratefully welcomes tax-deductible donations of both cash and non-perishable foods throughout the year. Foods may be dropped off at CCFL during its operating hours and receipts are provided upon request. Monetary donations should be mailed to CCFL, 10497 Coloma Road, Rancho Cordova, CA 95670. Anatolia Fire Station Reopens

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - In his address to the Rancho Cordova September Luncheon at City Hall, Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District (Metro Fire) Chief Mark A. Wells announced that some Sacramento area fire stations (shut down previously due to the economic downturn) are now being reopened. This includes a reinstatement of Rancho Cordova's Anatolia Station 68. "We'll have three firefighters out there 24/7 again, and we're very glad to be back in the community," Wells said. "There has been a lot of growth out there and I think that community has been extremely supportive of Metro Fire."

Wells called Metro Fire an all-risk fire department, and, posing a rhetorical question, he asked, "What is an all risk-fire department? The answer to that is, I believe, we're in the emergency response business. We actually do go to fires, obviously. We go to grass fires, we go to house fires, commercial fires, high rise fires." The District is currently helping out federal and state partners at both the Valley and Butte fires. But they do more, Wells said.

Addressing remarks specific to the Rancho Cordova area, Wells said that there were 7,722 dispatches in the city of Rancho Cordova in 2014. Out of those, almost 6,000 were medical in nature, 241 were for fires and the remaining 1,800 calls were for a variety of things, such as hazardous materials, technical rescue, water rescue, or someone stuck in a confined space.

"We're basically in the 'helping people' business," Wells said. "I actually tried to rescue a parrot out of a palm tree one time. It turned out that the parrot flew up there, and it turned out it flew away when I got close. That is what I mean by all risk."

Wells spoke of the importance of wearing life-jackets in the water, emphasizing the dangers of river swimming, even for experienced swimmers. "We are trying to change the culture so that it's cool to wear a lifejacket," Wells said.

Another subject was the training site on 53 acres

off of Zinfandel in Rancho Cordova. It is part of all-hazard training held in cooperation with the State of California and the City of Sacramento. Props such as hazardous materials, technical rescue, confined space, trench rescue, and collapsed structure allow lifelike practice. "We're going to go out there, get our people to the exact closest simulation that you can from the real thing, multiple times, so that we do it well every time," said Wells.

Wells was appointed as Metro Fire's fifth Fire Chief on October 13th, 2014. He began his fire service career in 1987 in Citrus Heights and has been through the ranks from firefighter to assistant chief. He has served with Federal Emergency Management Agency, California Task Force 7, and Urban Search and Rescue Team and as the Metro Fire terrorism liaison officer. He has a master's degree in security affairs and homeland defense from the Naval Postgraduate School, a bachelor of science degree in health and safety, and an associate's degree in fire technology.

"I was just so impressed by his knowledge," said Chris Clark of Rancho Cordova, "how he basically came up and faced the challenges of being a new chief." Clark is on the Chamber of Commerce Board, and is Resource Development Manager for Folsom Cordova Community Partnership.

The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District provides emergency response services to over 700,000 people, covering a 417-square-mile area. It is the seventh largest fire agency in the State of California. The District encompasses the unincorporated areas of Sacramento County and the cities of Rancho Cordova and Citrus Heights.

Assistant Chief Pat Ellis accompanied Wells to the luncheon, along with other members of his staff.

"They had a lot of information and I'm glad that they were there to share it with the public," said Nick Barajas, who lives in Sacramento and works for Western Health Advantage. "It was good to find out—and it was interesting." ★

Jerry Brown Didn't do His Homework on Suicide Bill

A leading family values organization in California says vulnerable people will die before their time now that Governor Jerry Brown has signed the "assisted suicide" bill, ABX2-15.

"For all practical purposes, this bill will open the door to pressure the weak and vulnerable to die prematurely," said Randy Thomasson, president of SaveCalifornia.com, which promotes moral virtues for the common good, and which lobbied against the bill. "This is no victory, but a horrific defeat for a just and civilized society. People who otherwise could have fought to live or at least extended their lives will be 'helped' to die early, and that's shameful, even criminal. This will give California an awful legacy. The governor didn't do his homework. He misstates, for example, that it's a crime to commit suicide in California, which is simply not true."

"Jerry Brown overlooked that no witness at death, no requirement to self-administer, permitting forgery of a final attestation form, and a false cause of death on the death certificate sets up weak and vulnerable Californians to be killed off. It's true that this bill sets up the perfect crime."

- No witness at death: Nowhere in ABX2-15 is a witness required when the lethal drug is administered. How would you know if the person resisted or if it was really their choice to die that day?

- No requirement to self-administer: The bill suggests but never requires self-administration of the lethal drug. Elder abuse, already a huge problem, would be exacerbated by ABX2-15, which permits a legal heir—a person with a financial

self-interest—to help request and even administer the lethal drug. Section 443.1(b) says "the qualified individual may choose to self-administer"; likewise, Section 443.1(i) says "may self-administer," but nowhere in the bill does it say "must" or "shall" self-administer, thus another person could administer the lethal dose. If the prescribed patient hesitates or delays, what's to stop someone from dissolving the water-soluble drug and giving it to the unsuspecting patient to drink? Predators, even within the family, would be virtually exempt from law enforcement because no witness is required and the bill protects them from virtually all civil liability and criminal prosecution. For without a witness, how would anyone know whether a crime was committed or if there was resistance or a struggle?

- Permitting forgery of a final attestation form: The final attestation form within 48 hours prior to ingesting a lethal dose cannot be verified or enforced, so how can it be known whether the now-dead individual actually filled out the final form? And where is the penalty if the form wasn't even turned in? There is no guarantee that the person truly wanted to die that day; the bill provides no supervision or consequences for this step.

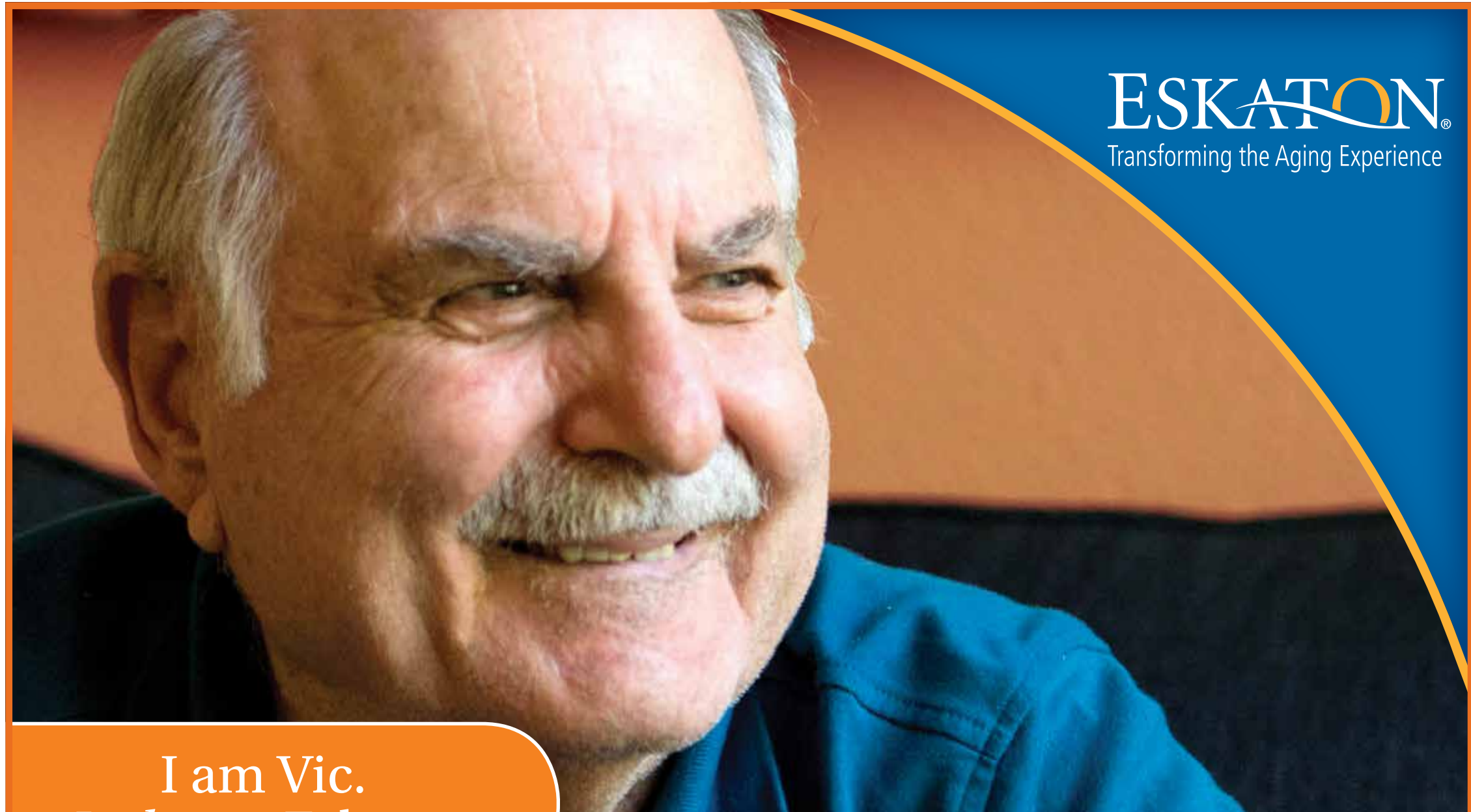
- False cause of death on death certificate: This bill also promotes medical deception by prohibiting doctors from writing "suicide" or even "physician-assisted suicide" on the death certificate as the cause of death. Likewise, ABX2-15 prohibits law enforcement from saying "homicide" or "elder abuse" occurred, even if there was overwhelming evidence. It sets up the perfect crime. As Margaret Dore of

Choice is an Illusion explains on page 18 of her analysis: "With the death required to be treated as 'Natural' simply because the act was used, a perpetrator who tricked the patient into taking the lethal dose, or who administered the lethal dose to the patient while he or she was asleep, or who directly killed the patient over the patient's vehement objection, cannot be convicted of murder. The Medical Examiner, the Coroner and the Prosecutor must certify the death as 'Natural.'"

"It's frightening how this bill would open the door for the state government, HMOs, and hospitals to steer people toward suicide," Thomasson said. "In Oregon, the state has sent letters that both reject medical treatment and suggest suicide. Is the California bill any different when it permits insurers to reject medical treatment in one letter and suggest suicide in a second letter?"

"ABX2-15 exempts doctors who prescribe these poison pills from any and all liability. Because 'undue influence' isn't defined in the bill, blanket immunity for physicians and nurses will result in unreported coercion that ushers in early deaths, which will save hospitals and insurance companies money. Because some patients are viewed as 'cheaper dead than alive,'

"With this terrible suicide bill needlessly signed, California is now telling young people that sometimes suicide is an answer to life's problems," Thomasson concluded. "Pandora's Box is open. Concerned families should make plans now to never allow sick family members to be alone in the hospital, and to rethink whether convalescent homes and hospices are safer elsewhere, in states that don't promote suicide, such as Nevada and Arizona." ★

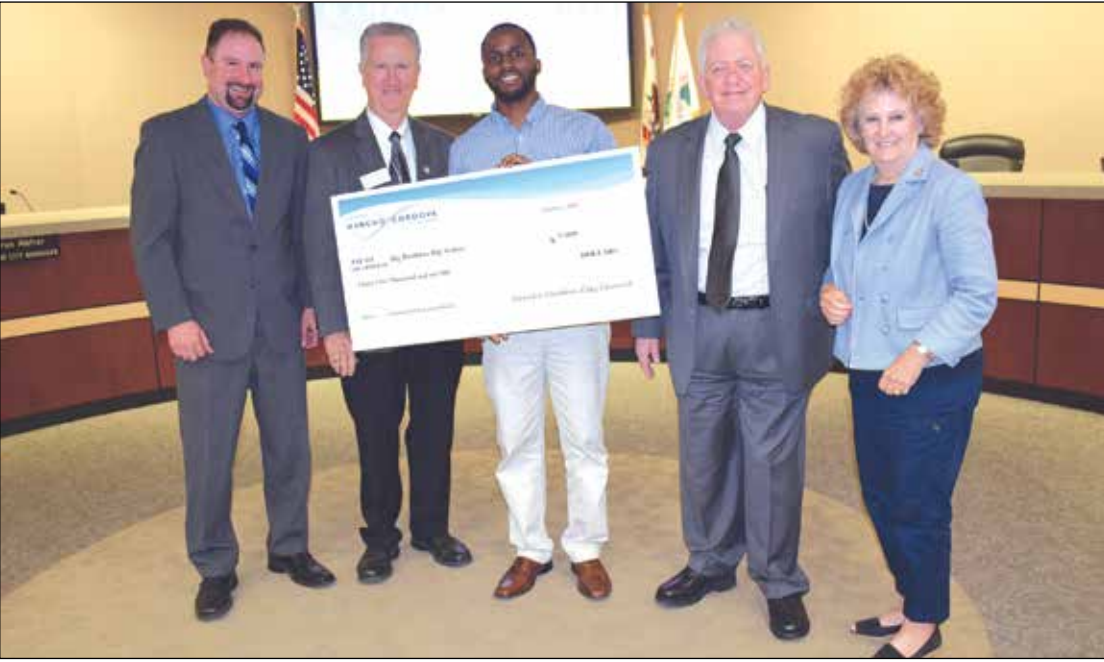

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - At the recent City Council meeting, the City Council presented seven checks to local organizations who received Community Enhancement Fund Grants.

The first check was presented to the Folsom Cordova Community Partnership. The Partnership will be offering youth incentive trip activities for at-risk youth participating in the Group Mentoring Program. Robert Sanger accepted the check.

The second check was for the Sacramento Children's Museum, Cultural Connections Trunk—on-the-go Program. The trunks feature lesson plans about a different culture's customs, traditions, and history. The trunks will be provided to up to 80 classrooms in Rancho Cordova free of charge. Sharon Stone Smith and Adam Ahmed accepted the check.

The third check was for A.M. Winn Elementary School. The funding is being used for their music program at the school to purchase musical instruments,

replacement parts, cases, and sheet music. Principal Michael Kast and Band Teacher Danielle Yeti accepted the check.

Feminists Should be Terrified of Carly

Carly Fiorina is a no-nonsense former business executive who is showing she can play -- and throw elbows -- with the big boys in the Republican presidential nomination battle.

Feminists have noticed, but their admiration is tinged with dread -- and it should be. An eloquent, fearless critic of abortion, the latest outsider to climb into the Republican race is a clear and present danger to what feminists hold most dear.

Even if she had said nothing else at the CNN debate, Fiorina would have stood out for her gut-punch of a statement about the horror of the guerrilla Planned Parenthood videos capturing the ghoulish organ harvesting that is an important side business of the organization (the main business, of course, is aborting babies).

The novelist Jennifer Weiner told The New York Times for a story about the conflicted feelings of feminists, "It's so weird -- she looks like one of us, but she's not." The managing editor of the feminist website Jezebel tweeted the night of the debate, "I'm in love with and terrified of her."

Yes, be afraid, very afraid. Fiorina already may be the most effective, high-profile woman that the pro-life movement has. At the debate, she captured the enormity of the Planned Parenthood scandal, for which there are almost no words, speaking of it in the harshly indignant terms that it deserves.

No sooner had she made her statement than the media fact-checkers got to work. Fiorina had described a video of a living fetus and a technician working to harvest its brain. This was wrong. The video was stock footage of a briefly living victim of an abortion that played while a former technician described -- in a different case -- her horrifying experience cutting an aborted baby's face open to preserve its brain for sale.

Fiorina should have been more precise, but her electric condemnation of Planned Parenthood has inevitably gotten the attention of the pro-abortion sisterhood. In Iowa, protesters chanted and threw condoms at her, even though Fiorina had said nothing about birth control.

At the same event, a woman accosted Fiorina to ask, "How can you as a woman not support our health care?" Fiorina probably left the woman determined never to try that again. "Oh, I support your health care," she shot back. "I don't support butchering babies."

Fiorina is so formidable because she has a tough-as-nails public persona, together with an ear for the music of public speech. At their best, her riffs are pungent, memorable -- and persuasive. "Liberals and progressives will spend inordinate amounts of time and money protecting fish, frogs and flies," she said after a visit to a pro-life pregnancy center. "They do not think a 17-week-old, a 20-week-old, a 24-week-old is worth saving."

Hillary Clinton's fans can be forgiven for wishing their candidate had some of Fiorina's flare as a communicator. A writer at Cosmopolitan lamented, "Carly Fiorina Is the Candidate I Wanted Hillary Clinton to Be." She and others ought to get used to feeling envious and chagrined. Even if she flames out as a candidate, in Carly Fiorina conservatives and pro-lifers have discovered a formidable champion.

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: My cat "Chester" has always been a big shedder with his long hair. I've pretty much kept up with it by brushing his coat every evening. But lately I've noticed a lot more hair deposited on the furniture and carpet, and when I comb him I have to clean out the brush several times. What could be causing this increased shedding? -- Cherie K. in Dubuque, Iowa

DEAR CHERIE: To start, make an appointment with Chester's vet for a complete physical exam. Excess shedding doesn't always have a concrete explanation, but it can signal a change in his health, especially if it wasn't a problem before. Excess shedding can have a cause as benign as changes in the season -- shedding in spring and fall, for example. Or it could be triggered by allergies to dust, pollen and molds, which can irritate his skin and make him scratch more. Skin diseases such as ring-

worm can be another cause -- it's something the vet will certainly check for, along with flea infestation or other irritants. Excess shedding also can signal much more serious conditions, such as diabetes or hyperthyroidism, something that a vet can diagnose. Ahead of the appointment, watch Chester's behavior: Is he drinking excessively? Does he seem agitated? Is he eating as much as he used to? Write down anything that seems unusual and shared it with the vet. If Chester has developed a health condition, the vet can prescribe the right medications and advise you on the best diet to feed him. If allergies or some unknown irritant is at work, the exam will rule out other possible causes so you can focus on finding a shedding solution.

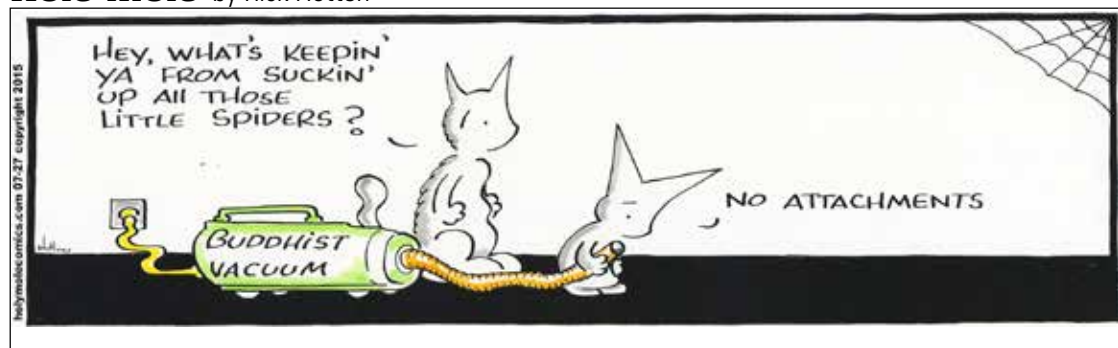

Animal Research Remains at Heart of Medical Progress

Scientists are on the cusp of potentially the greatest advance in cardiac care since the heart transplant. Federal regulators just approved a device that allows physicians to replace faulty heart valves without opening patients' chests up. The procedure could save the lives of countless patients who are unfit for surgery.

For their new lease on life, these patients can thank a few dozen pigs, who were the first animals to undergo the procedure and prove that it could be a life-saver. They stand out as only the latest

evidence that animal research is essential to medical advancement.

The procedure pioneered is called transcatheter aortic valve replacement. Doctors performing TAVR insert a tube holding a folded-up valve into the groin. They thread the tube into the heart and then open up the valve with a balloon.

Before TAVR, valve replacements required open-heart surgery. Many seniors in need of a new valve were too frail to survive such an operation. That was especially true of patients with aortic valve stenosis—a severe narrowing of the aorta.

Now that Americans are living longer, aortic valve disease has grown more common. Nationwide, its incidence has increased by 35% over the last decade. It kills 8,000 Americans each year. TAVR offers hope that this condition might no longer be a death sentence.

This breakthrough owes its existence to animal research. When Danish physician Henning Rud Andersen conceived of the procedure in 1989, he first tried it in pigs. Not long after, French cardiologist Alain Cribier attempted a similar procedure in sheep. These

tests proved it was possible to replace heart valves without surgery—an idea that, then, seemed preposterous.

TAVR isn't the first cardiac procedure that began with animal research. World-renowned surgeon, Michael DeBakey, performed thousands of cardiac operations using techniques developed in dogs—including the first successful heart bypass. Thanks to his research, doctors now perform over 500,000 of these surgeries in the United States annually.

Research involving dogs was also crucial to the development of everything from the pace-maker to artificial heart valves. Animal research is currently helping scientists understand other devastating diseases including Alzheimer's and Parkinson's. Identifying treatments for these diseases of aging will be more urgent as Americans live longer.

Yet some activists want to end animal research models. They claim approaches like computer modeling and cell cultures can substitute for animal research.

But it's hard to believe such techniques could have convinced a skeptical medical community—and regulators—that certain heart

procedures were safe for humans without first studying new procedures in animals.

Consequently, those who oppose animal testing are obstructing medical innovations that can add years to the lives of older Americans. Consider former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, who underwent TAVR last year. He said, "I am more energetic, people tell me I look better, and I feel much less tired." Without the procedure, his doctor told him he'd be in a wheelchair with only a fifty-fifty shot of living another year.

Similarly, film director Robert Altman, who received a new heart around 1995, continued to make movies until his death 11 years later. These added years of creativity were contributed to animal research.

Examples like these show the rewards that animal models provide. Activists who oppose this essential technique are seeking to deprive future patients—particularly seniors—of the many benefits animal research has to offer. And that's just heartless.

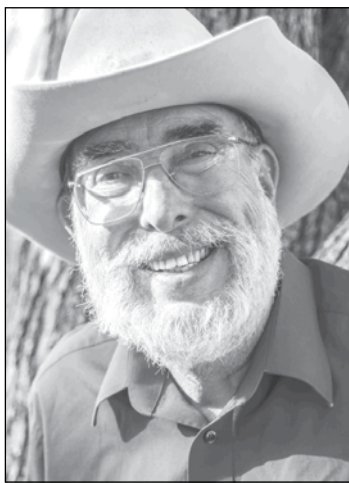

How Weather Affects Walleye Fishing

Spring thunderstorms will cause walleye to go deep or bury themselves in weeds. Big lake suspended schools of walleye may break up or move great distances during storms.

Cold fronts can cause them to hibernate. Bright days on clear lakes can also shut them off. When any of this happens, head for the nearest walleye river because they aren't affected as much by stormy weather.

The best times for walleye are when choppy conditions create current, diminish light penetration, and stir up shallow water causing baits to be more active. Windswept shorelines also will be especially good. A great time for big walleye is the three days before and after a new or full moon. When that happens, you need to be on the water.

Cordova Football Prepares for SVC Opener

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Season one is in the books for the Cordova High School football team.

Tonight, Friday, the Lancers kickoff the second part of their season on the road with the Sierra Valley Conference.

Cordova (3-2), which had the bye last week, travels to Galt, which is also 3-2. The host, Warriors, have won their last three non-league games, including last Friday's 48-12, pasting over Riverbank.

"We got to see the last two games that Galt played (on film)," said Cordova head coach Darren Nill of the Warriors' games against Riverbank and Mira Loma (Galt won 57-13). "They are playing with a lot of confidence. They've got the right people to play that offense (Wing-T). They are good at what they do."

The Warriors' offense is averaging 34.6 points per game this season. The Lancers' defense has given up an average of 21.4 points per game.

Cordova's offense has done significant damage this season as

well. The Lancers are averaging 37.8 points per game, second in conference behind El Dorado at 46.4 per game.

"I think our offense matches up very well with (Galt's) defense," said Nill, who notes the Warriors run a base 4-3 defense that includes plenty of

blitzing.

Leading the Lancers' offense is quarterback Unique Perez, who has completed 87-of-126 passes for 1,517 yards and 19 touchdowns in five games. He has also scored an additional three on the ground.

Another weapon for Cordova

is wide receiver Devin Baldwin, who has hauled in 38 receptions for 814 yards and 11 TDs. On the ground, running back Seth Trujillo has 60 carries for 344 yards and four TDs.

Cordova is one of four conference teams with 3-2 records;

Union Mine, and Rosemont join the Lancers and Warriors. El Dorado, which won the SVC title last year, is 4-1 and Liberty Ranch is 1-4. But all six teams' records are in the past.

"I think we have to take one game at a time because there's a lot of parity in our league," Nill said. "I think anybody can beat anybody...that's why we play the games."

The Lancers practiced only four days last week during their bye. That included fine tuning their offense.

"It was normal practice out on the field," Nill said.

Before the SVC opener, which is scheduled to kickoff at 7:15 p.m., the Cordova-Galt junior varsity game will take place. The JV Lancers enter conference play with a 5-0 record. ★

On Wednesday night, the Lancers continued SVC action with another home game against Liberty Ranch. Next Monday, Cordova will be back inside Lancer Stadium with another SVC home game, this time against Rosemont to close out the first half of conference action. Next Wednesday, the Lancers open the second round with another home game against conference leader Galt.

Bye, Bye, So Long, Farewell

The Autumn wind is a Raider Pillaging just for fun He'll knock you 'round and upside down And laugh when he's conquered and won.

The final stanza of "The Autumn Wind," a poem written by the late NFL films producer Steve Sabol and made popular as the Battle Hymn of Raider Nation by the profound voice of John Facenda through the years, may be making a comeback this fall if the Oakland Raiders continue to compete as they have thus far this season.

Finally, the Raiders are showing some life, and trying to say farewell to their losing ways and make a legitimate run at surpassing the 4-win barrier this season, something they haven't done the last three years.

The team didn't let a lopsided opening home defeat, 33-13, at the paws of the Cincinnati Bengals, keep them down. Behind the leadership of second-year quarterback Derek Carr, the Raiders rallied to defeat the visiting Baltimore Ravens, 37-33, and the Cleveland Browns on the road, 27-20.

Their revived more-aggressive style of offense, with top draft choice Amari Cooper (U. of Alabama) contributing greatly with 24 catches for 339 yards and two touchdowns through four games, had them on the verge of a third straight victory. But new head coach Jack Del Rio's squad backed off just a bit to settle for a field goal and a late lead, 20-19, with 2:05 to go. But that allowed the Bears to push downfield just enough to convert a 49-yard field goal for the win. Next time, maybe take a couple of shots at a decisive touchdown and force the opponent to match that.

The Raiders host Denver (4-0) in their next game, offering them a direct shot at gaining

ground on the division leader. Oakland's bye week follows, but viewing the schedule going forward it appears there will be some opportunities, as well as they are playing, for the Raiders to tell goodbye to their 12-year stretch of non-winning seasons. The best they have done during that era was 8-8 (twice), and have gone 56-136 through that dismal period. We haven't heard much of "The Autumn Wind" for a while, since the early 2000s when the Raiders were a playoff factor three straight years, culminating in a 48-21 loss to Tampa Bay in Super Bowl XXXVIII.

As the autumn winds pick up and the leaves continue to fall, across the Bay Bridge there seems to be another fall going on --- a fall from grace for 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick. Some people have been singing opening farewells to Kap, whose play has been in decline, particularly evident in three straight losses. Behind an unproductive makeshift offensive line, Kap has been operating at a distinct disadvantage and hasn't handled it well.

Usually, he's running for his life on most plays, frantically looking to make anything happen. His ability to have vision downfield has been greatly hindered, and when he has had openings he has been inaccurate on many occasions. A la Matt Cain, Kap is having trouble locating the fastball.

You have to wonder if he is beginning to go the way of Steve Sax or Chuck Knoblauch, second basemen that experienced a tough stretch when they developed an inability to field a ball and throw it accurately to first base. Kap is having trouble connecting on some of the simplest throws --- like former New York Mets catcher Mackey Sasser, who couldn't toss the ball back to the pitcher consistently. Or is Kap more like the Pittsburgh

Pirates pitcher in the 70's, Steve Blass, who experienced significant success (103-76, 3.63 ERA, All Star) before suddenly losing command --- 91 walks and 12 hit-batsmen in his final 94 innings?

Looking ahead at the 49ers' schedule, perhaps they will be the ones to finish with four wins this season. If so, the conquering Raiders might get a good laugh out of that. If that were to happen, that team-friendly contract of Kap's --- described by Yahoo Sports as "a contractual trap door under Kaepernick"--- might come in handy if the team brass determines he is no longer their guy.

The San Jose Sharks, ready to begin their NHL season this weekend, should decide that Raffi Torres is no longer one of their guys. Torres, an undeniable head-hunter, has been suspended for half the season after another blatant blow to the head of Jakob Silfverberg in a preseason game. Torres was out all of last season with an injury. He has had four suspensions, three fines and two warnings by the league over dangerous hits. Just tell the guy, "bye, bye."

It was a weekend to say "So long" in the final series for the Giants at AT&T Park this season. Moving farewell ceremonies were held before games for two retirees: Tim Hudson, who was the winningest active pitcher with 222 wins when he decided to hang 'em up, and Jeremy Affeldt, the Giants' reliever who did not allow a run in his final 22 postseason appearances --- a mark that is second only to Yankees star Mariano Rivera --- and was a key component of the Core Four of the Giants bullpen that won three World Series titles. Affeldt was the winning pitcher in Game 7 in 2014. ★

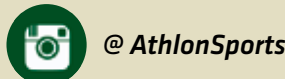
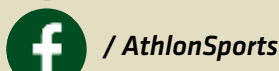
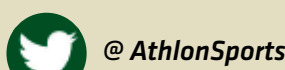

NUMBERS TO WATCH

30 Boston College is the only team in the nation that has not allowed a play from scrimmage of at least 30 yards. Aided in part by a weak non-conference schedule that featured two games against FCS opponents, the Eagles rank third in the nation in scoring defense (8.0 ppg) and first in total defense (140.0 ypg).

18 The California defense leads the nation with 18 takeaways through five games. Last season, the Golden Bears ranked 94th in the country in takeaways with 17 in 12 games.

100 Virginia Tech managed only 100 yards of offense in Saturday's 17-13 loss at home to Pittsburgh. It was the Hokies' worst offensive output since a 60-yard effort in Frank Beamer's first game at the school, a 22-10 loss to Clemson in 1987.

7-3 Clemson, which defeated Notre Dame on Saturday night, is now 7-3 against top-10 teams under Dabo Swinney. Notre Dame entered the game ranked No. 6 in the Associated Press poll.

HEISMAN RACE

1. **Leonard Fournette, RB, LSU** As expected, Fournette feasted on the overmatched Eastern Michigan defense, rushing for 233 yards and three TDs in the Tigers' 44-22 win. Fournette, who leads the nation in rushing, is the first SEC player ever to top the 200-yard mark in three straight games.
2. **Trevone Boykin, QB, TCU** Boykin toyed with the Texas defense, throwing for 332 yard and five touchdowns in the Horned Frogs' 50-7 win over the Longhorns. Boykin has thrown for 1,802 yards in five games and has 19 TDs and three interceptions.
3. **Nick Chubb, RB, Georgia** The Bulldogs suffered their first loss of the season – and it wasn't close (38-10 to Alabama) – but Chubb still managed to rush for 146 yards on 20 carries (though 83 came on one play with the game already well out of reach).

ALL EYES ON UTAH

Cal visits Salt Lake City for key showdown between Pac-12 upstarts

CALIFORNIA AT UTAH

These two teams were barely on anyone's radar before the season started. Now, California and Utah meet in the premier game in the nation in Week 6. Cal's rise to a fringe-top 25 team isn't that big of a surprise; we knew the Bears — who boast arguably the top quarterback in the nation in junior Jared Goff — had the potential to take a step forward if the defense made any progress. Utah's ascension to the Associated Press top five (and No. 1 in Athlon Sports' poll), however, is quite shocking. You can argue that Utah might not be one of the five best teams in the country, but it's tough to argue with the Utes' resumé: No team has two better wins than at home vs. Michigan and at Oregon (by 42 points). Still, there are reasons to doubt Utah as a legitimate CFB Playoff contender; the Utes were outgained on a per-play basis in wins over Utah State and Fresno State. True, they still won both games — and quarterback Travis Wilson didn't play against Fresno State — but you would like to see a more impressive effort on a consistent basis. *Utah 34-30*

NORTHWESTERN AT MICHIGAN

Michigan and its new coach Jim Harbaugh are stealing the national headlines, but Northwestern could stake the claim as the most improved team in the Big Ten. The Wildcats, who went 4-12 in the league in the last two seasons, are 5-0 overall on the strength of one of the nation's top defenses. Northwestern has allowed a total of three touchdowns in five games and limited Stanford, which has averaged 42.3 points in the last four games, to six points in Week 1. Michigan is also playing some impressive defense. Since losing at Utah 24-17 in Week 1, the Wolverines have allowed a total of 14 points in four games, including shutouts of both BYU and Maryland. Don't expect much offense in this one. *Michigan 17-14*

OKLAHOMA STATE AT WEST VIRGINIA

Oklahoma State remained unbeaten with a 36-34 win over Kansas State that was aided by a bizarre officiating mistake in which the Cowboys were erroneously awarded a first down late in the first half. Sophomore Mason Rudolph was superb in the win, throwing for 437 yards and three touchdowns. The Pokes' running game, however, continues to be a concern; they are last in the league with 138.2 yards per game and have averaged only 2.1 yards per carry in their two league games. West Virginia put up a decent fight in Norman but lost for the first time this season,

eventually losing by 20 points to Oklahoma. Quarterback Skyler Howard, who was so solid in the Mountaineers' three home wins, completed only 17-of-32 passes and was intercepted three times. WVU needs Howard to play well against Big 12 competition. *West Virginia 30-21*

FLORIDA AT MISSOURI

The two-time SEC East champs host the surging Florida Gators in a matchup that will feature two of the top defenses in the league. Missouri has allowed 20 points or fewer in all five games this season, but the Tigers don't appear to have the necessary firepower on offense to challenge for the division title. True freshman quarterback Drew Lock, who threw for 136 yards and two TDs in Saturday's win vs. South Carolina, will get the start once again. Florida is coming off one of the most impressive performances by any team this season, a 38-10 win over previously unbeaten Ole Miss. Jim McElwain is emerging as the favorite for SEC Coach of the Year honors. *Florida 24-14*

ARKANSAS AT ALABAMA

Arkansas finally looked like the team we expected to see this season on Saturday night in a 24-20 win at Tennessee. The Hogs rushed for 275 yards on 50 attempts while the defense held UT to only two field goals after the first quarter. The challenge this week, however, is immense. Alabama, fresh off a dominating win at Georgia, returns home with everything seemingly in place to make a run at the SEC West title. If Jake Coker continues to play well at quarterback, as he did in Athens, this is a team without a discernible weakness. *Alabama 30-17*

GEORGIA TECH AT CLEMSON

Georgia Tech opened the season with dominating wins against two over-matched opponents (Alcorn State and Tulane) but has since dropped three straight games, at Notre Dame, at Duke and vs. North Carolina. But this is still a dangerous team that is capable of getting on a roll at any point this season. The Jackets have scored 28 points or more in four straight games against Clemson and beat the Tigers 28-6 last year in Atlanta. Dabo Swinney's task at Clemson this week will be to get his team prepared to play the struggling Yellow Jackets after last Saturday night's emotional win over Notre Dame. Clemson is the better team, but Paul Johnson has made a career of beating teams with superior talent. *Georgia Tech 28-24*

PRIME TIME PLAYERS

Ezekiel Elliott, who closed the 2014 season on a tear, appears to be back on track after rushing for 274 yards and three TDs in the Buckeyes' tougher-than-expected 34-27 win at Indiana. ... Florida quarterback **Will Grier** was near-perfect in the Gators' 38-10 win over Ole Miss, completing 24-of-29 passes for 271 yards. His four TD passes were the most for a Florida QB since Jeff Driskel tossed four against South

Carolina in 2012. ... **Mason Rudolph** threw for 437 yards — the most by an FBS quarterback in Week 5 — and three TDs to help Oklahoma State post a 36-34 win at Kansas State. ... Baylor is known more for its passing prowess, but the Bears also boast a potent ground attack. **Shock Linwood**, the Big 12's leading rusher, ran for 221 yards and three scores in the Bears' 63-35 win over Texas Tech. Linwood

is averaging 9.4 yards per carry. ... **KaVontae Turpin**, a 5'9" true freshman, caught four touchdown passes in TCU's 50-7 win over Texas in Fort Worth. ... Arkansas State senior **Michael Gordon** rushed for a career-high 221 yards and scored three TDs to lead the Red Wolves to a 49-35 win over Idaho. ... In a 38-31 comeback win over Georgia Tech, North Carolina QB **Marquise Williams** completed 13-of-24 passes for

134 yards and rushed for 148 yards and two TDs on 15 carries. He also added a 37-yard touchdown catch. ... Linebacker **Eric Striker** led an overwhelming effort by the Oklahoma defense with a team-high 13 tackles, two sacks, three tackles for a loss and a forced fumble in the Sooners' 44-24 win over West Virginia. ... Houston QB **Greg Ward** accounted for 455 total yards and rushed for three TDs in the Cougars' 38-24 win at Tulsa.



4. **Derrick Henry, RB, Alabama** Henry rushed for 148 yards on 26 carries in adverse weather conditions in Alabama's 38-10 win over Georgia. The junior is averaging 6.1 yards per carry in 2015.
5. **Myles Garrett, DE, Texas A&M** Garrett led the Texas A&M defense with seven tackles (two for a loss) and one sack as the Aggies remained unbeaten with a 30-17 win over Mississippi State.

A Alabama was perhaps the most impressive team in Week 5, rolling past Georgia in Athens, 38-10, with surprising ease. Freshman wide receiver Calvin Ridley (five catches, 120 yards) and junior tailback Derrick Henry (26 carries, 148 yards) led the way for the Tide, who dominated every facet of the game.

V Nebraska's difficult 2015 season took another painful turn on Saturday. The Huskers, who lost to BYU on a Hail Mary in Week 1 and in overtime at Miami in Week 3, dropped a 14-13 decision to Illinois on Saturday after leading 14-0 heading into the fourth quarter. The Illini scored the game-winning TD with 10 seconds remaining.

A Left for dead after losing at Northwestern in Week 1, Stanford has emerged as a legitimate threat to win the Pac-12 after opening league play with wins over USC, Oregon State and Arizona by a combined score of 138-72. The Cardinal are averaging 46.0 points and 510.7 yards vs. Pac-12 opponents.

V It's safe to say that Al Golden's approval rating with the Miami fan base is not high after the Hurricanes lost at Cincinnati on Thursday night. Now in his fifth season at the school, Golden — who is 16-16 in ACC games — is showing no signs that his program is on an upward trajectory.

CASE: Michael Eugene Addson
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Thomas Asker, Homicide Unit

Twenty-seven-year-old Michael Eugene Addson was convicted by jury of first-degree murder during the commission of an attempted robbery.

Marc Zhuchenko was an employee at the O'Reilly's Auto Parts store on Elkhorn Boulevard. On January 9, 2014, Addson attempt to rob the store. Mr. Zhuchenko tried to fight him off and injured Addson, who then shot Mr. Zhuchenko. Addson left a trail of blood as he fled the store. Due to the vigilance of the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department and its homicide detectives, Addson was detained within two hours at the Methodist Hospital. Detectives were also able to locate the murder weapon. Analysis by the District Attorney's Laboratory of Forensic Services linked Addson's DNA and his gun to the crime scene.

The jury also convicted Addson of five counts of robbery with use of a gun based on three separate incidents at O'Reilly's and Autozone stores in July, September, and October of 2013. Those robberies were solved by Sacramento County sheriff's detectives following Addson's capture on January 9, 2014.

Addson faces a minimum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for October 16, 2015, in Department 16 by the Honorable Marjorie Koller.

CASE: Kareem AbdulMitchell
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Allison Dunham, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

Forty-three-year-old Kareem Abdul Mitchell pled no contest to two counts of oral copulation with a person under 18 years old and one count of committing lewd and lascivious acts on a child.

Mitchell was a choir director for the New Testament Baptist Church. During that time, he molested three male choir members between 2001 and 2012.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Mitchell will be sentenced to three years state prison and will be required to register as a sex offender for life. Sentencing is set for October 21, 2015, at 1:30 p.m. in Department 63 before the Honorable Michael Bowman.

This case was investigated by the Sacramento Police Department.

CASE: Randell Bryant
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Samuel Alexander, Career Criminal Prosecution Unit

The Honorable Marjorie Koller sentenced 28-year-old Randell Bryant to 10 years plus 75 years to life in prison. On July 2, 2015, a jury convicted Bryant of three counts of residential burglary. Bryant has three prior strike convictions, all residential burglaries from 2005, 2007, and 2008.

On September 3, 2013, two homes in Land Park were burglarized. A passerby heard the house alarms and gave police descriptions of four males walking away from the scene carrying property. Soon after, another burglary occurred in Greenhaven. Witnesses there also described four males fleeing the scene. The residences were ransacked for cash, jewelry, electronics, and other items. The total loss was more than \$30,000.

An iPad from one of the burglaries was traced to an address in north Sacramento, where more items taken in the burglaries were found. After further investigation revealed Bryant was living at that residence, he was arrested. Bryant was picked from a live lineup by a witness.

Co-defendants Koleon Crawford and Dominique Spruill pled no contest to three counts of burglary and both were sentenced to five years, four months in prison. The fourth perpetrator was a juvenile at the time of the crimes.

CASE: Gregory Wyrick
PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Maria Wilson, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

Thirty-five-year-old Gregory Wyrick was convicted by jury of six counts of sexual intercourse and/or sodomy with a child under 10 years old and six counts of committing lewd and lascivious acts on a child under 14 years old. The jury also found true a multiple victim enhancement.

From 2012 to 2013, Wyrick molested two victims multiple times when they were staying at his house. The victims were five and seven years old at the time.

Wyrick faces a maximum potential sentence of 150 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for October 9, 2015, in Department 33 before the Honorable Michael Savage.

This case was investigated by the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department. ★
