Mighty Menagerie at Nature Fest

Creatures Great and Smelly are Effie Yeaw Stars

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Raptors, marsupials, mammals, and reptiles paraded for visitors at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center's recent Nature Fest.

The event temporarily boosted American River Parkway animals with 1,100 wannabe naturalists. Up-close wildlife encounters were the main attraction. "It's fantastic to see raptors up close," enthused a bird watcher. "You see a golden eagle's talons and realize how she can catch a wolf."

A coyote pup called Cody was another crowd pleaser. Resident of Wild Things Inc., an animal refuge near Newcastle, the rescued baby provoked much oohing and aahing but proved a feisty handful for handler Gabe Kerschner.

All animal educators are deemed unreleasable because of injuries or imprintation on humans. "I love showing you this coyote but I'd rather see him running free in the wild," Kerschner told the pup's admirers. California Raptor Center (UC Davis) and the Nature Center provided other ambassadors.

"This event is central to our mission," said American River

FBI Announces Results of Nationwide Human Trafficking Operation

Local Operations Aid in Recovery of Five Juveniles and Arrest of Seven Alleged Pimps

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Officials from the FBI and its state and local partners (including the Citrus Heights, Rancho Cordova, Fresno, Fairfield and Sacramento Police Departments as well as Sacramento County Probation Department) recently announced that 149 underage trafficking victims were recovered and 154 pimps were arrested in a nationwide human trafficking operation last week. The initiative, dubbed

Operation Cross Country IX is a national program spearheaded by the FBI and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, along with state and local law enforcement partners across the country. The initiative targets the criminal enterprises responsible for the commercial sex trafficking of children.

"Human trafficking is a monstrous and devastating crime that steals lives and degrades our nation," said Attorney General Loretta Lynch. "As a result of the FBI's

outstanding coordination and exemplary efforts alongside state and local partners during Operation Cross Country, more children will sleep safely tonight, and more wrongdoers will face the judgment of our criminal justice system. The Department of Justice will continue to aggressively and persistently fight this heinous crime, and to hold its perpetrators accountable to the fullest extent of the law."

In the area served by the FBI's Sacramento field office, FBI officials announced the recovery of five underage victims and the arrest of seven pimps as part of the take-down. The FBI Sacramento field office and its law enforcement partners conducted multi-day operations in the area served by the FBI Sacramento field office focused on the metropolitan areas of Fairfield, Fresno, and Sacramento. These operations also resulted in the arrest of 90 adults for various offenses including probation violations and prostitution-related charges.

In Sacramento, the FBI's Sacramento Child Exploitation Task Force—that includes officers from the Sacramento Police Department—recovered two minors and arrested three alleged pimps; the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department recovered one minor.

In Fairfield, the FBI, Fairfield Police Department, Solano County Sheriff's Office, and Vallejo Police Department recovered one child and arrested two alleged pimps.

Fresno operations conducted by the FBI's Child Exploitation Task Force—which includes officers from the Fresno Police Department—the Fresno Sheriff's Office, and Tulare Police Department resulted in the recovery of one minor and the arrest of two alleged pimps.

Brown Signs Legislation Expanding Alternative Custody Program

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Monday morning, Governor Brown supported family reunification by signing SB 219, regarding the Alternative Custody Program, into law. Authored by Senator Carol Liu (D-La Cañada, Flintridge), the bill expands access to the Alternative Custody Program (ACP), which currently allows eligible incarcerated people to finish their sentences outside of prisons in order to care for their families.

Californians United for a Responsible Budget (CURB), a statewide coalition of over 70 organizations working to reduce the number of people in prison and the number of prisons and jails in the state, co-sponsored the legislation, with member organization Justice Now, a legal advocacy organization that works with people in women's prisons, leading the charge.

"I'm a personal testament that the Alternative Custody Program is effective in reuniting people with their families and communities," said Marianna Gray, a former ACP participant. "With the help of my son, Senator Liu, and dozens of advocates, I was able to participate in this program. There were many difficulties and disappointments I faced in my own journey towards receiving this program, so I

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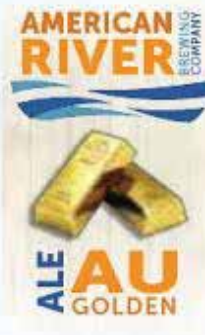
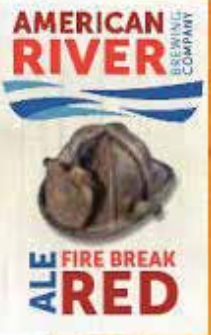


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Mixer Brings Attention to Homeless Plight

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - A fundraiser is being held at Rancho Cordova City Hall to help local homeless, particularly with the approach of the winter season which will further challenge their situation. The event, named Mix & Mingle, will inform concerned community members, businesses, and churches and bring forward plans for meeting the needs of the disenfranchised. The nonprofit Sacramento Self-Help Housing (SSHH), together with the Rancho Cordova Homeless Assistance Resource Team (HART), will serve wine and appetizers from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 22nd, at 2729 Prospect Park Drive. Planners of the event suggest a donation of \$30 for admission.

The event is led by John Foley, executive director of SSHH, and Karen Edwards, chairperson for Rancho Cordova HART group. As part of the program, a formerly homeless veteran will share the story of how he got back on his feet through his efforts and the services he received from SSHH.

Last winter season, Edwards said, due to logistical problems the 2015/2016 winter shelter program in Rancho Cordova provided shelter for only four weeks. Nevertheless, the results were encouraging. "Even though we probably only touched around 40 people total, I would say that at least 25% of those people were helped," Edwards said. "In other words, they're off the street now, and they are functioning."

This year the HART winter shelter program has already made progress over the previous year, having achieved its goal of a stable and central intake site. The shelter has expanded to cover eight weeks beginning the last week in December and continuing through the third week of February. "We've learned a lot

from some of the mistakes we made last year," Edwards said, "and we're looking forward to more success."

Sacramento Self-Help Housing addresses the problems of the homeless in the areas of Rancho Cordova, Elk Grove, Citrus Heights, and unincorporated areas of Sacramento County. Their program has a strong presence in Elk Grove. "They've been going for about five or six years, so they're a little further down the road than our Rancho Cordova HART," Edwards said. "They started first with a transitional house; their winter shelter program came later. We did it the other way because that was what...we had the resources to do."

The necessity for some type of transitional housing is especially important, Foley said. "When people have appointments that we set up to maybe go to see a doctor, or sign up for some kind of benefits, you need to get them to the appointment, and you need to tell them they have an appointment," Foley said. Without some sort of address, people often can't be found to provide the services.

"That's part of what the Mix &

Mingle is about," Foley said, "is helping people to start taking the power and capacity to make a difference right in town."

Through another process, in conjunction with a fair housing agency called Project Sentinel, renters can address renter/landlord problems by calling the Rental Help Line at (916) 389-1877 to get the advice of an attorney. For example, Foley told of one landlord who did not want to allow a renter to keep a service companion animal. The issue was resolved amicably. "The attorney worked there to show the landlord that you can't deny people that," Foley said. "It's kind of more educational than anything else." Sometimes the renter may be the one at fault, and would be informed of that.

"Especially for disabled and minorities, they've been able to really advocate for them," Edwards said. "Especially for people who are very poor and they have no other place to go."

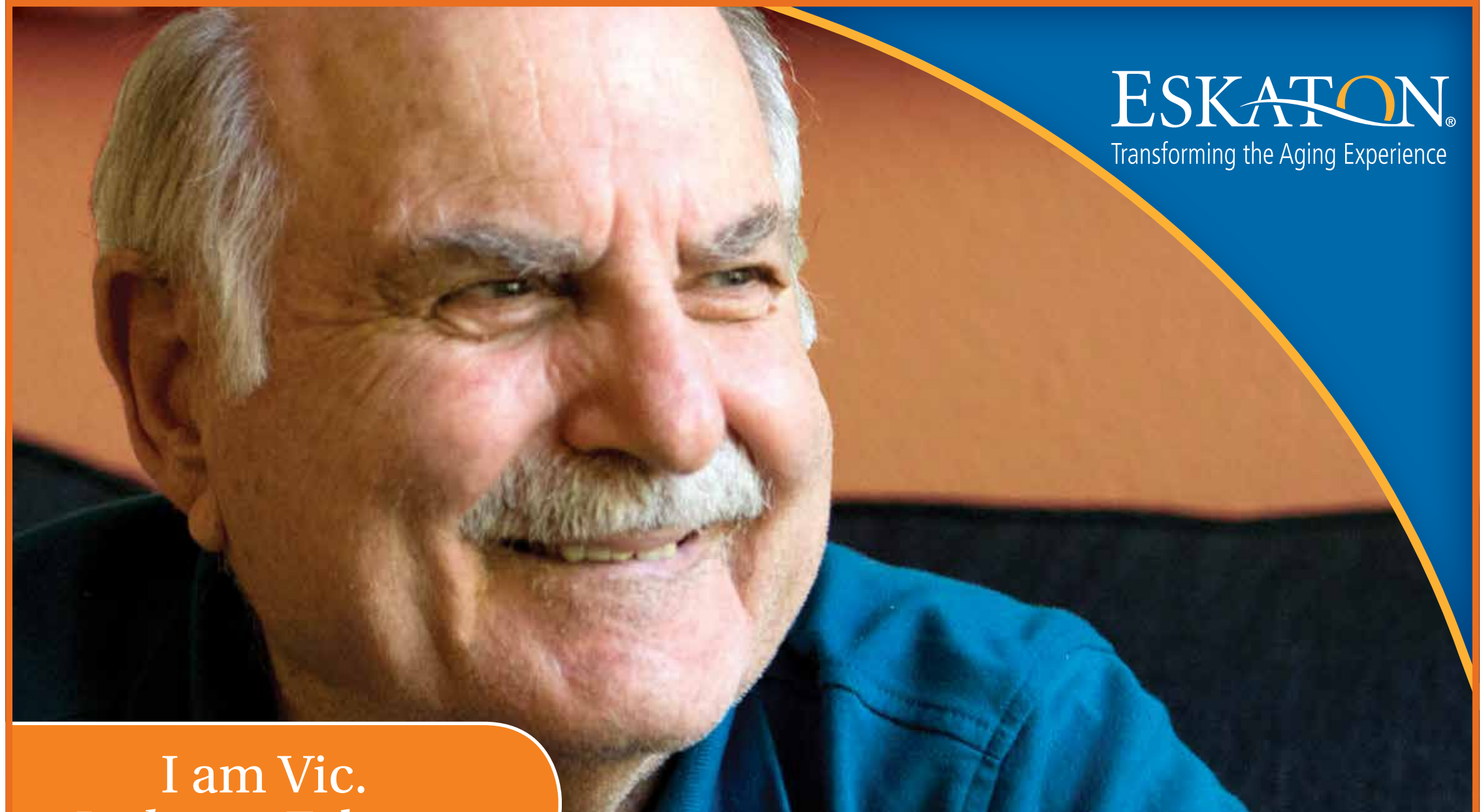

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Rancho Cordova Celebrates Sports Hall of Fame Unveiling

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The Rancho Cordova Athletic Association will inaugurate a new sports tradition this October with the first ever inductions into the Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame.

From the nationally recognized 1975 Cordova High School Football Lancers to high school baseball players Major League Baseball, the inaugural class of inductees reads like a "Who's Who" of Rancho Cordova sports heroes, including athletes, coaches, and "Heart of a Champion" supporters who have been central to building a remarkable sports legend.

The inductees will be honored during the 2015 Sports Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony slated for 6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 17th at Rancho Cordova City Hall. Tickets for the event are \$25 and will include an appetizer and cocktail reception and awards program. Tickets will be limited to 350, and the event promises to be a sell-out.

Online tickets will go on sale September 1st at www.cordova-council.org.

The event is organized by the Rancho Cordova Athletic Association in partnership with the Cordova Community Council.

"Rancho Cordova has a uniquely powerful history of youth sports achievement," said David Sander, a Rancho Cordova City Councilman and president of the Rancho Cordova Athletic Association. "Our Hall of Fame will acknowledge and memorialize that incredible history and inspire our current and future youth athletes as well."

The Rancho Cordova Athletic Association was formed in 2013 to foster lifelong values of good sportsmanship, teamwork and healthy active lifestyles through development of excellent youth sports facilities and organizations, positive coaching, and access to play for all.

To be elected to the Rancho Cordova Sports Hall of Fame, inductees were judged to have attained significant achievements in or contributions to athletics, as well as exhibiting high standards of character and sportsmanship.

"The history of Rancho Cordova is closely linked with some of the most talented athletes in the country," said Conrade Mayer, chairman of the Hall of Fame selection committee. "The time has arrived to look at this amazing sports legacy and allow it to inspire our entire community, especially our youth."

Rancho Cordova Sports luminaries to be inducted with the Inaugural Class include:

1975 Lancers Football Team:

Considered by many to be the best football team to ever come out of this part of the country, the '75 Lancers was the State Team of the Year and was close to being a mythical national champion. Cordova '75 is also widely considered to be the best team from a decade of dominance by the Lancers under head coaches Dewey Guerra and Ron Lancaster that was the best decade any NorCal school ever had until De La Salle emerged almost three decades later. Cordova went 102-6-1 in the 1970s, which was not only the best record in the state, but the best in the nation.

Guy Anderson: One of the winningest coaches in high school baseball history, Anderson led the Cordova Lancers team for 45 years as varsity coach. A National High School Hall of Fame inductee, Anderson piled up 927 wins, second most in California history. Under Anderson, Cordova produced some of the region's best teams and players. The Lancers were a power in the 1970s, 1980s, and into the early '90s, winning five section titles.

Chris Bosio: A Cordova High School baseball notable pitcher, Bosio went on to play Major League Baseball for the Milwaukee Brewers and Seattle Mariners from 1986 to 1996, including a no-hitter in 1993 for the Mariners against the Boston Red Sox. He is currently a pitching coach for the Chicago Cubs.

Christy Bowles: A multiple sport athlete at Cordova High School, Bowles was an area Hall of Fame softball catcher, a MVP field hockey player, and area Hall of Fame Female Athlete. She went on to play catcher at Chico State University.

Rod Connors: A Cordova High track standout, Connors was a State Meet 400 Meters winner. His 1975 USC freshmen mile relay record still stands.

Duane Fidel: A Cordova High wrestling standout, Fidel was a three-time Delta League and three-time Sub Section wrestling champion. He was a Sac-Joaquin Section Champion, qualified for the state tournament twice and was a medal winner. He went on to wrestle for Sacramento City College where he was a two-time state qualifier and team captain. He coached at Cordova High and now coaches at Folsom High.



Dewey Guerra: (Deceased) Considered by some to be the greatest high school football coach in the country, he was the head coach of the 1975 Lancers and led Cordova to 10 straight championships.

Doug Hawkes: (Deceased) The longtime Grapevine Independent newspaper publisher and sports writer, Hawkes' "Sports on the Eastside" column was a constant chronicle of Rancho Cordova athletics and sports history for decades.

Geoff Jenkins: A Cordova High School baseball standout who also played football and basketball, Jenkins was elected to the All State Baseball Team as a junior and senior before graduating in 1992. Following an outstanding career at USC, Jenkins was a first round draft pick for the Milwaukee Brewers and also played for the Philadelphia Phillies.

Helen Klein: A nationally-recognized senior ultra-marathoner, Klein was in the inaugural class of the Sacramento Running Association Hall of Fame. With dozens of ultra-marathons and records to her credit, Klein has been an inspiration to runners of all ages, having never run a step until she was 55 years of age.

Ron Lancaster: A coach who was also part of the 1970s Cordova High Football juggernaut, Lancaster's storied career began in Rancho Cordova where he went 59-3 and won four Section titles and was 1979 National High School Coach of the Year. He went on to coaching fame in the State of Oklahoma.

Randy Lerch: A Cordova High School baseball pitcher, Lerch played professional baseball for the Milwaukee Brewers, Philadelphia Phillies, Montreal Expos and San Francisco Giants from 1975 to 1986. On September 30th, 1978, Lerch achieved a rare bit of notoriety for a pitcher by hitting two home runs in a 10-8 win that

clinched the National League East Division championship for the Phillies.

Jerry Manuel: A three-sport star in football, basketball and baseball, Manuel (Cordova '72) put Cordova High on the national stage when he and Mike Ondina became the first pair of prep teammates ever to be drafted by MLB in the first round. Following a six-year MLB career he went on to coach, eventually managing the Chicago White Sox, where he earned "Manager of the Year" honors, and New York Mets. He now heads the Jerry Manuel Foundation, which is dedicated to bringing more African American players into the game of baseball and heads baseball operations for William Jessup University in Rocklin.

Clarke Massey: (Deceased) A longtime Cordova High School coach in football, track and cross country, Massey coached the defensive line of the 1979 champion football Lancers, and 10 straight track championships at Cordova High, going on to coach track at Sierra College and Sacramento State. The Clarke Massey Relays held annually at Cordova High are a tribute to his track coaching excellence.

John McCants: (Deceased) McCants was a legendary Cordova High School Coach in basketball, swimming and track, who helped launch girls' high school sports at Cordova High, particularly in the sport of softball.

Mike McCullough: Cordova High School grad McCullough earned a full ride basketball scholarship to Utah State and has risen to the top of the NBA's Miami Heat—not as a player, but as a businessman. Viewed as an extremely versatile and well-respected senior NBA business executive, McCullough sports a 27-year track record of establishing the best practices for sports marketing and employee engagement while producing highly effective marketing and results-oriented corporate partnership programs.

Max Miller: Miller coached for 28 years within the Sac-Joaquin Section, compiling a 254-90-4 record as the head coach. He was at Rio Americano from 1974-80, at Cordova High from 1981-93 and 1999-2007, and he was at Johnson from 1996-97. His 1985 Cordova team was a Sac-Joaquin Section championship winner and was the Section's first 14-0 football team. He is fondly remembered by many for turning Cordova football from a hot Saturday afternoon event to a cool Friday Night game. He was the defensive coordinator at Folsom in 2010, when the Bulldogs went on to win the Section D2 championship as well as the CIF State D2 championship bowl game.

Laurie Salo: Salo followed up her Cordova High softball career at UC Davis where she was named to the All Region First Team in both 1986 and 1987. She was the Dr. Hubert Heitman Female Athlete of the Year winner in 1987. Her achievements were noted again in 1993 when the Aggies named her to the UC Davis Athletic Hall of Fame.

Joel Smith: Smith is the most decorated Cordova High triple jumper in history, and still holds records at the high school and college level. Among his achievements: Top 3 All Time Performances at Sacramento City College (1988), Track & Field News All America Team #1 in the Triple Jump (1987) and ESPN's All Time California Track and Field Records, 9th in Triple Jump (1987).

Max Venable: A multi-sport athlete at Cordova High, Venable was a star of the 1975 Lancer Football team. While he excelled in all sports, he turned down football scholarships to sign with the Los Angeles Dodgers. He also played for the San Francisco Giants and other teams including the Montreal Expos, Cincinnati Reds and California Angels.

Seneca Wallace: Wallace lettered in football and basketball at Cordova High where he won multiple football honors. He moved on to Sacramento City College and then Iowa State at quarterback. He was drafted into the NFL in 2003, and has played for the Seattle Seahawks, the Cleveland Browns, New Orleans Saints, and San Francisco Forty-Niners. He moved to the Green Bay Packers in 2013 and was the first ever African-American

to start a game as quarterback for the Packers.

Gerald Willhite: Willhite is the best known football player never to have played for the Cordova Lancers. At Cordova High, Willhite was a wrestler, graduating in 1977, and who went on to play football for San Jose State and be drafted in the first round by the Denver Broncos, eventually playing for them in Super Bowl XXI against the New York Giants.

Kevin Willhite: A 1981-82 Cordova High track and football star, Willhite was one of the greatest running backs in California prep history, rushing for 4,901 yards and scoring 72 touchdowns. He was selected into the Sac-Joaquin section Hall of Fame and is listed #2 on the Sacramento Bee list of top area players in history. Also a great prep sprinter, as a junior he won the 200 meters at the California State track meet. He was named the California prep athlete of the year (for football and track) and was separately named the California prep football player of the year. After his senior football year, he also earned three national honors before moving on to University of Oregon. During the NFL strike season of 1987, Willhite became a replacement player for the Green Bay Packers.

Colette Winlock: From the Cordova High School Class of 1973, Winlock was an early standout among female athletes at the dawn of Title IX. She won a full ride track scholarship to California State Hayward (now East Bay) where she was a two-time All American in the long jump and 400 meter hurdles. She was inducted into the Cal State East Bay Sports Hall of Fame in 1996.

Larry Wolfe: Wolfe was a Lancer baseball star who went on to Sacramento City College and headed for Major League Baseball in 1971. A third baseman, he played for the Minnesota Twins and Boston Red Sox.

Reggie Young: A high school All American, Young was a three-year starter for legendary teams that went 35-1, including the 1975 Lancers where he played as a sophomore. Young is listed as #9 on the Sac Bee's list of all-time best players, though receiving some votes as No. 1. He played two years for the University of Oregon. ★

As a matter of fact, most adults don't really know what it is either. And why would they? While it is a necessity, it is definitely one of those "not in my backyard" things. The people who own and operate the current plant are looking for another location, but they know that moving a plant like that will not be something they can do in a hurry.

The original "Sacramento Reduction and Tallow Works" was founded by Al Koewler in 1913. It was located in a boggy area

on Riverside Boulevard south of Sutterville Road. But suburban development arrived, and in 1956, with complaints from residents and an attorney, they went to the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors. After the County court case directed closure of the facility, the company moved to its current location south of Mather A.F.B. That site seemed immune to suburban housing. But since the future is sometimes spelled CHANGE, Mather A.F.B. closed in 1993 and that opened the door for development.

The current company president Michael Koewler, great-grandson to Al Koewler, in 2013 said in an article in the Sacramento Bee, that the writing is on the wall. "Just past its 100th birthday, it's time for one of Sacramento's oldest businesses to move...again. Koewler hopes it will go smoother than last time. "Mr. Koewler, Sacramento County and the City of Rancho Cordova hope it will be smoother than last time too. But I think it will probably be more complicated than last time because codes and rules and regulations are much more complicated than they were in 1913 or in 1956.

The rendering plant is still in the unincorporated part of Sacramento County and is just outside the City limits of Rancho Cordova. Where the plant will eventually be placed is unknown, so I guess we will all have to wait until a location is found that will accommodate an extremely important and needed business like the "Sacramento Rendering Plant."

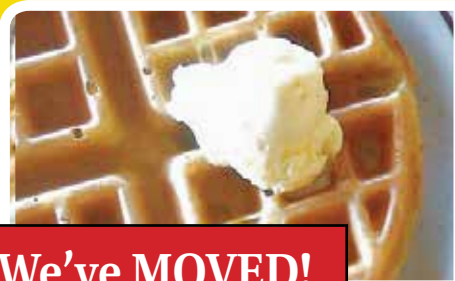

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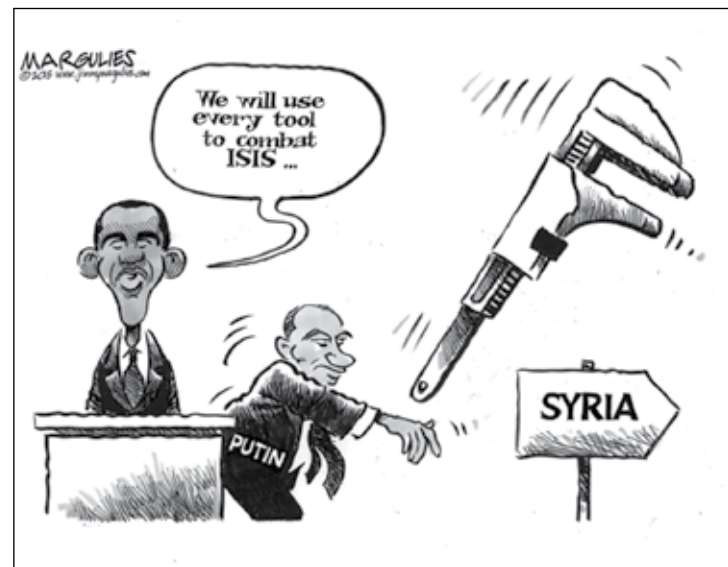
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Hillary's Gun-Control Non Sequiturs

Hillary Clinton has a new gun agenda that is the same as the old gun agenda.

We all are appalled and heartsick over the country's mass shootings, which aren't any less shocking for their routine occurrence. But that doesn't mean we know how to stop them. The Pavlovian Democratic reaction is to offer a raft of familiar gun-control proposals, whether or not they have any bearing on mass shootings.

Hillary's ideas are a testament to the essential sterility of the gun debate, no matter how much heat it generates. There is no way around the fact that marginal changes will do little or nothing to stop mass killers, while more sweeping changes -- even if they were practicable or wise -- run afoul of the Second Amendment.

Among other things, Clinton wants to renew the assault-weapons ban, which we had for 10 years before it lapsed in 2004. To review: A so-called assault

weapon is a semi-automatic rifle tricked out with frightening-looking cosmetic features. It is functionally indistinguishable from any other semi-automatic rifle.

Assault weapons might play an outsized role in crime in Hollywood productions, but not in real life. Rifles generally aren't used in shootings, let alone assault rifles. All rifles account for about 300 homicides a year. A Department of Justice-supported study of a possible renewal of the assault-weapons ban called its effect on violence "perhaps too small for reliable measurement."

Clinton wants to close the "gun-show loophole," which is one of the great cliches and myths of the gun-control debate. The loophole doesn't actually exist. Federally licensed dealers have to run a background check or otherwise ascertain that a purchaser has passed one, even if the dealer is selling at a gun show. Private sellers don't have to conduct one -- whether or not they are selling at a gun show.

The inordinate focus on gun shows might make sense if there were evidence of an epidemic of criminals using them to get their weapons. There isn't. A study in the journal Preventive Medicine of criminal offenders in Chicago found that most obtained their guns through personal connections. "Rarely," the study said,

"is the proximate source either direct purchase from a gun store, or theft."

Clinton also seeks to tighten up background checks. The problem is that very often the mass shooters don't have criminal records and haven't otherwise been adjudicated. This makes it impossible to use background checks to stop them from buying guns.

If it matters, none of this has anything to do with the Oregon shooting. The killer apparently used handguns to mercilessly shoot down his victims (although he also had a rifle, an AR-15). All of his 13 guns came from federally licensed dealers. He passed background checks. What Hillary has done is take a national tragedy and declared that it ought to catalyze us to pass a series of non sequiturs.

Her proposals aren't well-thought-out, because Democrats don't think when it comes to guns. They hold the same subrational belief that President Barack Obama expressed in his impassioned post-Oregon statement: that preventing mass shootings is easily within our power, with enough political will. Would that it were so.

* Choose a pet "god parent." Ask a reliable family member or friend if they would commit to caring for your pet should it become necessary.

* Look for pet-friendly senior care facilities. It may take a bit of searching, but some facilities allow well-behaved smaller pets.

* Contact a pet-friendly senior advocacy group. An advocate can help with some of the most emotionally charged aspects of senior care and end-of-life planning, including pet care. * Contact the pet's veterinarian. Advice and assistance often can be found at the vet clinic, before families must take the worst-case option of giving a pet to a shelter.

FBI Announces Results of Nationwide Human Trafficking Operation

Local Operations Aid in Recovery of Five Juveniles and Arrest of Seven Alleged Pimps

commitment to the difficult task of identifying, locating, and recovering children who have been exploited and ensuring that their traffickers face justice," said Special Agent in Charge Monica M. Miller of the FBI Sacramento field office. "While the arrest of the offender has an immediate result, only recovering a child can offer him or her an opportunity to begin to accept services necessary to begin the healing process and restore a sense of normalcy."

In addition to Operation Cross Country IX, the FBI and Fairfield Fresno Police Department, Clovis Police Department, Merced Police Department, Tulare Police Department, and Visalia Police Department completed Operation Summer Tour in August. The five-week operation focused on commercial sexual exploitation of minors primarily in Clovis, Fresno, and Merced. The multi-week effort resulted in the recovery of 11 children as well as the arrest of six pimps. Additionally, 105 adults were arrested for a variety of other violations including probation violations and prostitution-related charges.

Operation Cross Country IX is the largest in the nine-year history of the initiative, with 53 FBI field offices and 73 Child Exploitation Task Forces taking part in the operation in 135 cities across America, including Citrus Heights, Rancho Cordova, Fairfield, Fresno, and Sacramento. Nationwide, more than 500 law enforcement officials conducted both "in-call" and "out-call" operations in hotels, casinos, truck stops and in other areas known as frequented by prostitutes, sex-traffickers, and their customers.

"We're proud to partner with the FBI and provide support to both law enforcement and victim specialists in the field as they work to locate and recover survivors of child sex trafficking," said Linda Krieg, Acting Chief Executive Officer of NCMEC. "The number of children recovered and pimps arrested in this year's operation highlights the importance of these efforts today and every day in protecting our children from exploitation."

Operation Cross Country is part of the FBI's Innocence Lost national initiative, which began in 2003. Since the program's inception, more than 4,800 children have been recovered from underage prostitution and prosecutors have obtained more than 2,000 convictions, including at least 15 that have resulted in life sentences. know this bill is a step in the right direction."

SB 219 enacts a responsible timeline for ACP application review, provides applicants with an opportunity to appeal, and ensures that everyone eligible for acceptance into ACP are part of a more transparent and informed process. The bill also removes significant barriers for program entry by specifying that a person's existing medical or psychiatric condition not be the sole basis for exclusion from ACP. SB 219 also requires the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) to assist ACP participants with medical coverage enrollment.

"This program was always intended to support the reunification of incarcerated mothers and

their children," says California State Senator Carol Liu, the author of SB219. "Our recent victory to make this program stronger and more accessible will likely increase the number of people who apply, decrease the number of children in the foster care system, and reduce the destruction that incarceration causes among families."

Although the program has only been available to women, a court decision earlier this month ordered CDCR to expand the program to men. And last year, the Legislature encouraged the implementation of ACP at the county level.

"This is a major victory for people in prison with dependent family members. It supports family reunification. We know there are further ways to expand this


program," says Diana Zuñiga of CURB. "We want to use this momentum to push for people to be able to participate in the program regardless of conviction offense, and to push counties to implement family reunification strategies as well. Now is the time to continue working for incarcerated people and their children."

During the 2015 legislative session, Senator Liu supported several additional ways to reduce prison and jail overcrowding and recidivism reduction.

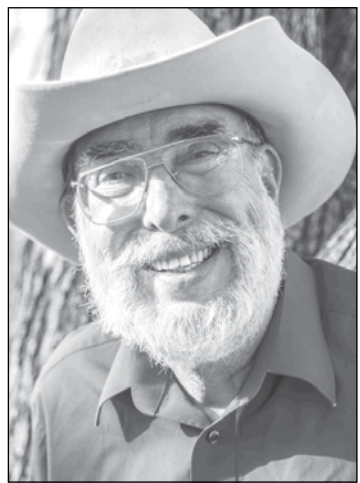

Tips for Catching White Bass

One of America's most popular gamefish is the white bass. The most exciting time to fish for them is during their annual spring spawning run up streams and rivers.

When water temperatures reach the low 50s, whites start moving upstream, out of the lakes and reservoirs, until they reach a dam or other obstacle that blocks their travel. Here they stack up and continually gorge themselves, waiting for the magic 55-degree mark to complete their spawn.

Hungry, aggressive white bass aren't too picky about what they will eat, but 1/8- to 1/4-ounce curlytail or hair jigs are most popular, with in-line spinners coming in a close second. White is usually best, but chartreuse, yellow, pink, and other bright shades will work, too.

I like using a lightweight spinning reel on a 7-foot soft-tip rod with a stout butt and 4- to 6-pound test line. What I like most of all, though, is frying up a limit of these good-eating fish.

Prior to Galt's final offensive drive, Cordova (1-0 in the SVC, 4-2) failed to put the ball into the end zone on its last offensive possession on loss of downs. Nill felt that if his Lancers had punched the ball in, the final 13 seconds wouldn't have been nerve racking for players, coaches, and fans on both sides of the stadium.

"We had 11 possessions and we scored on seven of them," Nill said. "Our defense wasn't stopping their run game and their defense wasn't stopping our throwing game. There weren't a lot of stops on either side. It was an offensive shootout."

Cordova led 28-21 at halftime. Galt scored on its first possession in the first quarter. As the first half continued, the Lancers' offense picked up steam that led to scoring on most of their offensive possessions.

"We have complete confidence in our offense to go out and get those

points back," Nill said.

Lancer quarterback Unique Perez completed 22-of-31 passes for 321 yards and five touchdowns. He also scored two more touchdowns on the ground, and led all Lancer rushers with 10 carries for 86 yards.

On the end of most of Perez's passes were wide receivers Devin Baldwin and Angel Garcia; Baldwin had seven receptions for 174 yards and three touchdowns and Garcia was 9-103. Isaac Black had two TD receptions for the Lancers.

Three Cordova players had double figures in tackles; defensive backs Aaron Giles had 15 tackles, Nate Williams 11 and Jason Johnson 10. Defensive lineman Clifford Bright and defensive back Terrill Johnson had nine each and linebacker Michael Gonzalez finished with eight. Galt had 463 of its 493 yards on the ground.

In the frosh/soph game, Cordova (1-0 in the SVC, 6-0) posted a 48-6 win.

Today, Friday, Cordova continues conference play at Lancers Stadium when Liberty Ranch, who knocked off defending SVC champion El Dorado 34-25 last Friday, pays a visit. The Hawks (1-0, 2-4) have won their last two games.

"Liberty Ranch is a lot like Galt," said Nill of the Hawks' offense, which relies on the run but blended with passing. "You can't fall asleep on Liberty Ranch."

Don't Take Me Out of the Ball Game

While seeking out and collecting reactions to "The Slide," and formulating our own thoughts and opinions on the topic, we were relieved to find that we were in line with former MLB second baseman and San Francisco Giants broadcaster Duane Kuiper, a voice of reason amongst the madness.

Kuiper's comments regarding Chase Utley's so-called slide into second base during the L. A. Dodgers' 5-2 playoff win over the New York Mets Saturday included, "It was a bad slide...it was very dangerous...dirty." Kuiper should know, acknowledging that he has his own list of ten or twelve "guys I won't forget." The unfortunate result of the play was a broken right leg for Mets shortstop Ruben Tejada.

To television analyst and Hall of Fame shortstop Cal Ripken, Jr., and all the others who rationalized that Utley's brutal maneuver was a case of "playing the game hard" and excused Utley's actions as "just part of the game," Kuiper offered up an emphatically dismissive, "Just stop, please!"

During the upcoming off-season it suddenly is likely that a new rule for similar plays around the bag at second base will be instituted by MLB --- "The Ruben Tejada Rule" --- along the lines of "The Buster Posey Rule," that was created for plays around home plate in the aftermath of the Giants' catcher's horrific injuries suffered in an unnecessary collision in 2011. The ultimate, hoped-for effects of these rules is to keep more players healthy and able to play.

A lot of the "tough" guys around the game defended Utley as a "gamer," calling his move "a legal play," "winning ball," and adding that he "had to

break up the double play." They say that it has always been that way --- "old school." But that doesn't make it right. Watching Mets third baseman and team captain David Wright as he stood over his injured teammate on the field --- he turned a "death stare" toward Utley in the Dodgers' dugout that told you what you needed to know --- it was dirty.

St. Louis Cardinals infielder Matt Carpenter reacted to the idea of a new rule, saying he is reluctant about "...changing the way the game is meant to be played." Tejada, Wright, the Mets and a lot of other people don't think that "dirty" is the way to play it.

"He didn't even start sliding till he was even with the bag," said Ripken's partner on TV, Ron Darling. "You don't think that's dirty, Cal?"

Ripken said, "It was a hard, clean play," but then contradicted himself when pressed by Darling, admitting the slide "definitely was late."

On a postgame show, HOF pitcher Pedro Martinez said, "He never had the intention of sliding and just breaking up the double play. He went straight after Tejada."

On Sports Center, former middle infielder Alex Cora was incensed. "It wasn't a slide. It's a tackle. (Utley's) back knee is over the bag. Give me (the fielder) a chance, so I can jump and get out of the way; I got a shot to be healthy," he said, with some quiver in his speech. "The way (Utley) did it, there's no place in the game for tackles like this. I hate the play. I consider this a dirty play."

And, lo and behold, there actually already is a rule in place, that is not enforced. Rule 509 (a) (13) calls for an automatic double play in this

situation if, in the umpire's judgment, the runner intentionally interferes. The stated objective is a penalty for "deliberate, unwarranted, unsportsmanlike action by the runner in leaving the baseline for the obvious purpose of crashing the pivot man..." Utley did not want to injure Tejada, but his purpose was clear and he never could touch the bag. There have been many years of poor judgment.

The macho men around baseball think their own "unwritten rules" should take precedent over the actual rules. Since you never want to be "out," and if Macho Man had his way, a runner that might be out on a tag at third could stop short, punch the third baseman in the chops and step safely on the base. On a close play at first, the runner could take the first baseman to the ground and beat on him until he dropped the ball. SAFE!

In football, a play similar to Utley's would draw a penalty flag for "a hit on a defenseless receiver." In college it would be called "targeting." In hockey, he would feel shame and go to the penalty box for "roughing." In basketball, it would be a "Flagrant foul-2" and an ejection. In soccer, Utley would draw a Red Card and an expulsion. In boxing, that's hitting below the belt. In everyday life, that's battery. What makes baseball so special? Play by the rules.

After all the research has been completed, it is clear that it shouldn't take an expert to evaluate the situation. Trust your eyes; don't over-analyze. A rose is a rose. If it looks like a duck, walks and quacks like a duck, it's probably a duck. Look out, though! Utley's coming in! You'd better duck! ★

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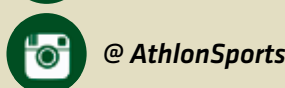
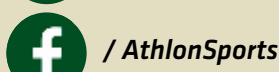
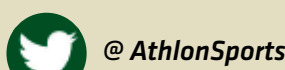

MICHIGAN STATE AT MICHIGAN

Michigan is emerging as perhaps the biggest story in college football this season. After losing at Utah by seven points in Week 1, the Wolverines have played as well as any team in the country. The defense has given up a total of 38 points in six games; for a point of reference, 13 teams in the nation are giving up more than 38 points *per game*. We all expected Jim Harbaugh to build a winner at his alma mater — very few of us believed it would happen so soon. This week, Michigan can take a big step toward reclaiming its spot as the best program in the state. Michigan State has won six of the past seven in this series, and has done so with a smashmouth brand of football that made Michigan so great in the Bo Schembechler years. Michigan State is 6-0 this season, but the Spartans have had some surprising struggles against inferior competition. *Michigan 24-14*

ALABAMA AT TEXAS A&M

The Alabama-Texas A&M rivalry lacks the tradition of many of its counterparts in the SEC, but the three games in recent years between the two schools have been eventful. Back in 2012, we witnessed Johnny Manziel's coming out party in the Aggies' 29-24 upset in Tuscaloosa. The following season, Alabama fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter before rebounding for a 49-42 win. And then last year, in one of the most surprising results of the season, the Crimson Tide overwhelmed A&M in a 59-0 victory at Bryant-Denny Stadium. This time around, Kevin Sumlin has what looks to be his most complete team since taking over at A&M. The Aggies feature star power on offense, as usual, and have made significant progress on defense. The arrival of a new coordinator (John Chavis) has helped, but it's also nice to have guys like Myles Garrett and Daeshon Hall on the defensive line. Alabama has been on a tear defensively since allowing 433 yards and 43 points in its home loss to Ole Miss. In the ensuing three games, the Tide have allowed 92 yards to ULM, 299 to Georgia and 220 to Arkansas. *Alabama 30-21*

back Brandon Harris will have to make some plays in the passing game against a good defense. Harris threw for a career-high 228 yards against South Carolina on Saturday, but the Gamecocks rank 12th in the SEC in passing defense (220.3 ypg), 13th in yards allowed per completion (7.3) and last in completion percentage allowed (70.0). LSU will be the popular pick, especially after Grier's suspension, but I think this is a good opportunity for Florida to steal one on the road. *Florida 21-17*

OLE MISS AT MEMPHIS

You can make a strong case that this is the biggest game in the history of the Memphis football program. Nationally ranked and undefeated, the Tigers host their regional rival from down the road in Oxford, a team that boasts one of the most impressive rosters in the nation. The Rebels feasted on another inferior non-conference opponent on Saturday, beating New Mexico State 52-3 to run their total against non-con foes to 3-0 by a combined score of 201-27. This will be a far bigger challenge. Memphis' Justin Fuente is already one of the most highly respected young coaches in the nation. A win over Ole Miss, a legitimate contender in the SEC, would vault Fuente to the top of every athletic director's wish list. *Ole Miss 38-21*

USC AT NOTRE DAME

The drama never stops at USC. In the latest plot twist, head coach Steve Sarkisian has been fired only five games into his second season at the school. Offensive coordinator Clay Helton, who has been with the program since 2010, will take over an interim basis. Helton inherits a difficult situation; USC has lost two of its last three games, including a 17-12 defeat at home last Thursday to a mediocre Washington team. The Trojans are talented enough to win the Pac-12 South, but they failed to play with the necessary focus under Sark's watch. Maybe that will change. Notre Dame, with only one loss, remains on the fringes on the College Football Playoff discussion. To remain in the hunt, the Fighting Irish need to win this game and hope that USC plays well the rest of the season. *Notre Dame 27-20*

UCLA AT STANFORD

Since its Week 1 loss at Northwestern, Stanford has outgained its next four opponents by a staggering 2.4 yards per play en route to four impressive wins. The Cardinal, dismissed by many after that lethargic loss in Evanston, now look like the best team in the Pac-12 North. Kevin Hogan is playing like a senior quarterback, and Christian McCaffrey is living up to his preseason hype as one of the league's top playmakers. UCLA has had a week off to regroup after its disappointing 38-23 loss at home to Arizona State. After rushing for 200-plus yards in wins over UNLV, BYU and Arizona, the Bruins were held to 62 in the loss to the Sun Devils. True freshman Josh Rosen has been solid at quarterback, but this team needs to run the ball with consistency to emerge from the muddled pack in the Pac-12 South. Paul Perkins has been held to 3.5 yards per carry in each of the last two games. UCLA needs more from its senior running back. *Stanford 31-24*

FLORIDA AT LSU

This game took an intriguing — and unfortunate if you are a Gators fan — turn when it was announced on Monday afternoon that Will Grier, Florida's starting quarterback, was suspended for the rest of the season for testing positive for a banned substance. Grier's absence thrusts sophomore Treon Harris into the starting role. A six-game starter last season, Harris has played sparingly in 2015 (though he did start one game), completing a combined 19-of-27 passes for 269 yards while adding 55 yards rushing against New Mexico State and East Carolina. He lacks Grier's polish as a passer but will provide a threat in the running game against an athletic LSU defense. The Tigers improved to 5-0 with a 45-24 win over South Carolina in an unexpected "home" game in Baton Rouge. This team will continue to lean heavily on All-America running back Leonard Fournette, the nation's leading rusher, but at some point quarter-

Washington State quarterback **Luke Falk** completed 50-of-74 passes for 505 yards with five touchdowns and no interceptions to lead the Cougars to an improbable 45-38 double-overtime win at Oregon. ... Iowa tailback **Jordan Canzeri** rumbled for a career-high 256 yards on a school-record 43 carries to help the Hawkeyes improve to 6-0 with a 29-20 win over Illinois. ... Boise State junior **Thomas Sperbeck** aver-

aged 35.6 yards on his five receptions (for a career-high 178 yards) in the Broncos' 41-10 win over Colorado State. Sperbeck scored on catches of 85 and 53 yards. ... **Devontae Booker** rushed for 222 yards and two touchdowns on 34 carries in Utah's 30-24 win over previously unbeaten Cal in a key Pac-12 showdown. ... Texas Tech's **Pat Mahomes** continues to thrive in the Red Raiders' Air Raid attack. On Saturday,

the sophomore threw for 428 yards with five TDs and no INTs as Tech rolled past Iowa State 66-31. ... five TDs in the Falcons' 62-38 win over UMass. ... **Derrius Guice**, best known as **Leonard Fournette's** backup at LSU, rushed for 161 yards on 16 carries in the Tigers' win over South Carolina. ... Tennessee quarterback **Josh Dobbs** enjoyed his finest game of the 2015 season, throwing for 312 yards and three touchdowns and rushing for 118 yards and two scores in the Vols' thrilling — and much-needed — win over Georgia.

STOCK REPORT

Michigan's rapid ascent back to national relevance under first-year coach Jim Harbaugh continued with a dominating 38-0 win over previously undefeated Northwestern. The Wolverines have won five straight games — by a combined score of 160-14 — and have posted three consecutive shutouts.

Just two weeks ago, Georgia was 4-0 and appeared to be the clear favorite in the SEC East. Now, the Bulldogs are 4-2 — after losing at home by 28 points to Alabama and blowing a 21-point lead at Tennessee — and have lost their best player (running back Nick Chubb) to a season-ending injury. These are not good times for coach Mark Richt.

No player had a better first half in Week 6 than Brandon Doughty. The Western Kentucky quarterback topped 300 yards and threw five TD passes in the first half alone in a 58-28 rout of rival Middle Tennessee. Doughty finished 28-of-36 for 359 yards with five touchdowns and an interception.

The fall for Oregon has been staggering. After a double-OT home loss to Washington State, the Ducks look like they might match 2009-10 Texas' feat of playing for a national title one year and missing a bowl game the next. Oregon (3-3) has lost three games before November for the first time since 2004.
