## Nature Fest Woos Wildlife

**CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG)** - Archimedes the owl, Spirit the bald eagle, an elk named Tule, and a lynx with the moniker of Mukluk, will journey to Carmichael's Effie Yeaw Nature Center on Sunday, October 5th.

Their sagas, along with those of bats, snakes, Radar the raccoon, and various raptors, will enlighten visitors during the Nature Center's annual Nature Fest event. The celebrity presenter will be Gabe Kerschner, a regular guest of NBC's *Tonight Show*. Kerschner runs Wild Things Inc., an animal sanctuary in Placer County. He and 60 species of rescued animals offer school programs geared to educate and entertain.

Nature Fest supporters will view a regional

cast of Kerschner's menagerie: an elk, a rattlesnake, a raccoon, and a lynx. The bald eagle is Alaskan, and with a 6.5 wingspan, it is larger than those normally found in California.

The 2014 Nature Fest will be a homecoming for another wild ambassador; Kerschner's great horned owl was rescued six years ago at American River College. "He broke a wing falling from a nest in the oaks on campus," says the naturalist. "We figured he must be an extra wise owl; he went to college. So we called him Archimedes." Kerschner's talks promote serious issues, but punch lines fly thick and fast. "A laugh keeps interest going," he says. "You want people to experience a full range of emotions; it makes learning memorable."

Out of town critters are not the only

educators billed for the 2014 Nature Fest. Effie Yeaw resident birds will interact with visitors. As a bracing *Game of Thrones* touch, West Coast Falconry handlers will send raptors flying over the heads of seated crowds.

The Ancil Hoffman Park facility is also a resource for Native American studies. Nature Fest demonstrations will include fine basketry and abalone pendant-making. Children's crafts and walks through the 80-acre wildlife preserve are supervised activities during the Nature Fest event. Food will be available for purchase. ★

## Like the Weather, Capitol Growth Cools off in Q4

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - Customer service, sales, manufacturing, and drivers are in high demand among Sacramento's top employers in October, November, and December. Making, storing, distributing, and selling products is driving hiring in the next Quarter. Truck drivers able to pass background, DMV, and drug tests can find work with bottling plants, regional distribution centers, materials suppliers, local delivery, and manufacturers.

Pacific Staffing has discovered that a robust hiring market in the last Quarter has maintained its pace into the last three months of 2014 among the region's top companies. One difference noted is the change in motivation for hiring as learned from direct phone contacts with regional companies between August 21 and September 12, 2014.

While seventy percent (70%) of top employers surveyed say they will hire in Q4, growth hiring among those firms has fallen from

Q3 levels. The Pacific Staffing Survey shows more Sacramento employers will seek applicants for attrition to replace openings in the existing workforce in October, November, and December than for continuing expansion.

Sacramento regional employers say forty-eight percent (48%) of Q4 hiring is motivated by the need for attrition. Hiring for replacements dropped slightly, from fifty percent (50%) in Q3, while employers motivated to hire for growing the workforce has fallen further as forty-three (43%) will

hire for growth in the last three months of 2014. While growth hiring has dropped by seven percent (7%) from last quarter it remains at a higher level than recent years for this Quarter.

**Skills Demand?**

Seasonal hiring was noted by eight percent (8%) of firms, and every retailer surveyed is hiring for the next three months indicating a likely increase in holiday help in stores. Drivers remain in short supply, as companies also sought sales, customer service, manufacturing, warehouse and general office help.

Finding qualified applicants and retention of workers trailed only concerns about increasing benefit costs for employees for open enrollments in this Quarter.

The demand among all companies for degreed professionals in information technology, software development, mobile networking and other proprietary technical skills like construction estimators is ongoing. Another shortage noted was for construction trades backgrounds with a high priority on skilled carpentry. Despite seasonal change, continuing dry, warm

weather will allow Construction/Property Development firms to work thru Q4 and most surveyed are hiring.

# Challenge Rancho Cordova on October 4th and 5th

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - The Challenge Rancho Cordova triathlon takes place on Saturday, October 4th, and Sunday, October 5th at Village Green Park, 3141 Bridgeway Drive in Rancho Cordova.

A Family Fun Run will be held on Saturday, October 4th at 9 a.m. The 1 mile run around Village Green Park is open to all ages. Registration for the Family Fun Run is open at challenge-rancho-cordova.com/family-fun-run for \$25 in advance and \$35 on the day of the run.

The triathlon takes place on Sunday, October 5th, and will consist of a 1.2 mile swim at Lake Natoma, a 56 mile bike ride, and a 13.1 mile run that ends at Village Green Park. Registration is open for individuals or teams to participate in the race at challenge-rancho-cordova.com.

Other festivities at Village Green Park on October 4th, and 5th will include live music and a DJ on Saturday from 5 to 7 p.m., and on Sunday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. A race expo, food, and other festivities will be available both days.

### Street Closures and Traffic Delays

On Saturday, October 4th, and Sunday, October 5th, Bridgeway Drive and Atherstone Drive near Village Green Park will be closed.

The triathlon course on Sunday, October 5th will create slight travel



delays from 10 a.m. until approximately 3 p.m. Intersections and nearby streets that will have travel delays are: Sunrise Boulevard and Douglas Road, Zinfandel Drive and North Mather Boulevard/Baroque Road, International Drive and Data Drive, International Drive and Zinfandel Drive, International Drive and Kilgore Road, White Rock Road and Prospect Park Drive, White Rock Road and Kilgore Road, and Kilgore Road and Trade Center Drive.

**Where to Watch the Race on Sunday, October 5th**  
Attendees can watch the start of the race in and around

the shoreline of Lake Natoma at the Nimbus Flat State Park, off Hazel Avenue north of Highway 50. The run course will take place in and around Village Green Park in Rancho Cordova. Attendees can see the race finish along Capital Village Lane and at Village Green Park.

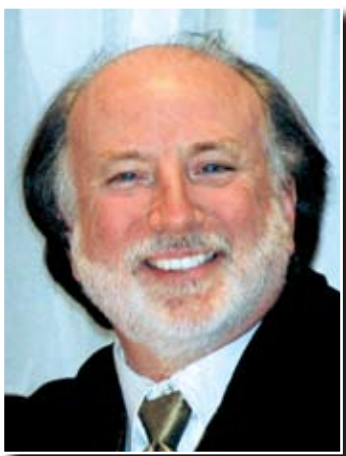

# "Give One Day" Suggested by Rancho Cordova Winter Shelter Initiative

**RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG)** - The Interfaith Rotating Winter Shelter, Rancho Cordova, has declared October fundraising month. Those directing the campaign hope to raise \$8,000 to be used for such necessities as sleeping bags and cots, insurance coverage for host sites, and transportation.

Central to the fundraising effort is the "Give One Day" campaign borrowed from Sacramento Steps Forward, a nonprofit organization addressing homelessness in the Sacramento area. Give One Day asks for individuals to give the amount spent on one day's mortgage or rent by dividing their monthly payment by 30.

"If every community did something like this, then wow!" said Karen Edwards of Sun River Church. "We could do so much more than just trying one big thing. Smaller chapters all over, I think, would be really helpful."

A number of local churches are playing a part in the undertaking, with three churches taking the lead: Sun River Church on Trinity River Drive, and St. John Vianney Catholic Church and Cordova Church of Christ, both on Coloma Road.

The three churches are offering host sites for the program, joined recently by Cordova Neighborhood Church on Coloma Road, the fourth to pledge a host site. The target is for eight host sites to cover a week each during December and January.

A number of other local churches are taking a supportive role.

First Covenant Church on Progress Court will be taking on the task of transportation from intake site to host churches each day, and the Cordova Food Locker will provide a truck for transportation of materials.

"The Church of Jesus Christ of

Latter-day Saints will be ready with volunteers for the shelter sites," said Wayne Langford, president of the Sacramento Cordova region of the Church.

For ten years, Grace Lutheran Church has participated in a program called Family Promise, a network of churches and synagogues that addresses the homeless situation in the Greater Sacramento Area, focusing on families.

"Our volunteers are pretty taxed when we do the Family Promise," said pastor Steven Krogh. "Our involvement will be more of a supportive, individual level, meaning intake people . . . things like that."

Staffed entirely by volunteers, the Rancho Cordova Winter Shelter would provide dinner, nighttime shelter, and light breakfast for a limited number of people. It is meant as a first step toward helping the homeless specifically in the Rancho Cordova area.

According to Larry Stafford, associate minister at Cordova Church of Christ on Coloma Road, there are hundreds more homeless besides those that are visible on the streets.

"In the Folsom-Cordova School District," Stafford said,

"we have just about a thousand kids that are officially listed as homeless."

Rick Johnson of Sun River Church will be contacting local businesses and civic groups in the area about how they can aid in the cause. For more information on how your business or organization can contribute, contact him at B&J Auto Body, (916) 635-4400.

Until it receives its own non-profit status, Interfaith Rotating Winter Shelter, Rancho Cordova, is working under the auspices of Sacramento Self Help Housing, and donations may be sent to Sac Self Help Housing/IRWS, c/o John Thompson, 11223 Trinity River Dr., Rancho Cordova, CA 95670.

# County Launches Emergency Notification System

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Sacramento, Placer and Yolo County have partnered with the California Office of Emergency Services in utilizing a state-of-the-art emergency alert system known as Citizen Alert. The system provides information to residents about emergency events quickly and through a variety of communication methods. Residents will only receive alerts that are critical and time-sensitive, including: flooding, levee failures, severe weather, disaster events, unexpected road closures, missing persons, and evacuations of buildings or neighborhoods in specific geographic locations.

The alert system currently includes all listed and unlisted landline telephone numbers in Yolo, Placer, and Sacramento counties that are serviced by AT&T and Verizon. To ensure emergency notices are received quickly both at work and home, residents are encouraged to log onto the Sacramento Alert Self-Registration Portal and provide phone numbers for both home and work, including land and cell phone numbers, email addresses, TTY device information and instant messaging information preference. All information in the Self Registration Portal will be kept

strictly confidential. Residents from all cities within the County and the unincorporated areas are urged to sign up at [www.Sacramento-Alert.org](http://www.Sacramento-Alert.org). The system, which uses Everbridge Alert and Notifications System, was made possible for all three counties by a grant from CAL Office of Emergency Services and supported by CA Department of Water Resources, Flood Operations Center through the Sacramento County Office of Emergency Services.

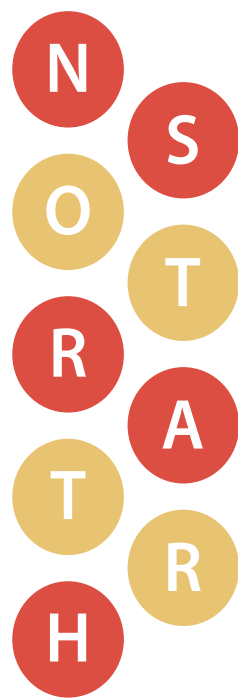

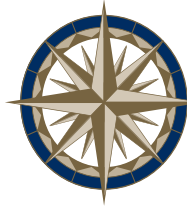

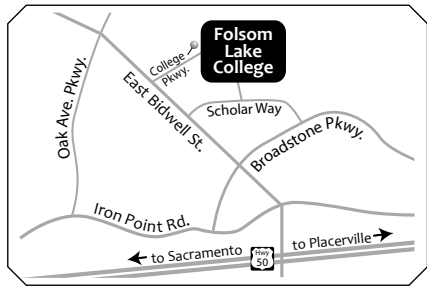

And one more thing, and one more thing, etc., etc., etc! For those who may have missed last week's Grapevine or information on some of our local radio stations on Friday, September 26th, a new program began at your Rancho Cordova Police Station, located at 2897 Kilgore Road. Five days a week – every week – this new program will enable you to get rid of old or no longer needed medications. We no longer will have to wait six months to get rid of those unneeded medications. Just bring them to our Police Station and get rid of them. There are three easy steps to follow:

1. At home, remove, scratch off, or black-out personal information on the container to protect your Identity.
2. Just before drop-off, remove pills from the original container, place them in a clear zipper bag, and recycle the container. Keep liquids and creams in original containers.
3. Bring the zipper bag and liquid/creams to the Police Station and place them in the bin.

It's that easy. I copied all three steps off of the website which is [www.DontRushToFlush.org](http://www.DontRushToFlush.org). A half page ad was on the last page of last week's "Grapevine" and I believe it will be there again this week. As it says in the ad,

being able to get rid of unused medications will keep them off the streets, out of the hands of children, and out of our waterways. Being able to dispose of old medications in a safe place like the Rancho Cordova Police Station is convenient and it's the only location like it in the eastern part of Sacramento County.

More things happened this last week and one of those happenings was the grand opening of the Smart and Final Extra store in Rancho Cordova on September 25th. Smart and Final Extra, located next door to Sportsman's Warehouse on Sunrise Boulevard, has groceries and many other things that the people in the Sun River neighborhood have been looking for. There was going to be a grocery store where Price Less used to be but it didn't work out. For Rancho Cordova residents who have been here for a while, one point of reference for the Smart and Final Extra location is that it's where K-Mart used to be on Sunrise. Pet Club will be opening in another couple of months next door to the new Smart and Final Extra.

And one more thing (the last one this time): in the September 19th Grapevine issue, I talked about two pieces of legislation, SB 69 and AB 1521, which were passed unanimously in the State Senate and in the State Assembly and sent to the Governor's desk. I was told today that the Governor vetoed both bills over the weekend. The Governor sent a generic letter for both as he vetoed them. They were two sentence letters that ended with: "While it is true that the State's economy has improved markedly, and significant progress

has been made in aligning revenues and expenditures, I do not believe that it would prudent to authorize legislation that would result in long-term costs to the general fund that this bill would occasion."

Exactly 93,235 residents in Jurupa Valley, CA; 53,668 residents in Eastvale, CA; 77,519 residents in Menifee CA; and 33,192 residents in Wildomar, CA have been watching their future. That comes out to be 257,614 residents in the four newest cities in the State of California, and these citizens should not have been placed in the positions they are in now by the State and the Governor. The time, the efforts, and the costs they all had to gather and put in so they could vote on cityhood, is being tossed out the window by the Governor. It was first taken away from them by the State in June 2011. Jurupa Valley lost 47% of its budget, two others lost 25% of their budget, and the last lost around 20%.

I have made some calls to see if there was a possibility of getting the Governor's veto over-ridden, but I was told that it is very difficult to have the legislators called back into session to get the vote from them that would be needed. The 93,235 residents of the City of Jurupa Valley would be the first to see their city dis-incorporated. I will let you know how well or how poorly those four cities are doing. Their future doesn't seem to be of much interest to the news media . . . but the marriage of a movie star is? Gimme a break!

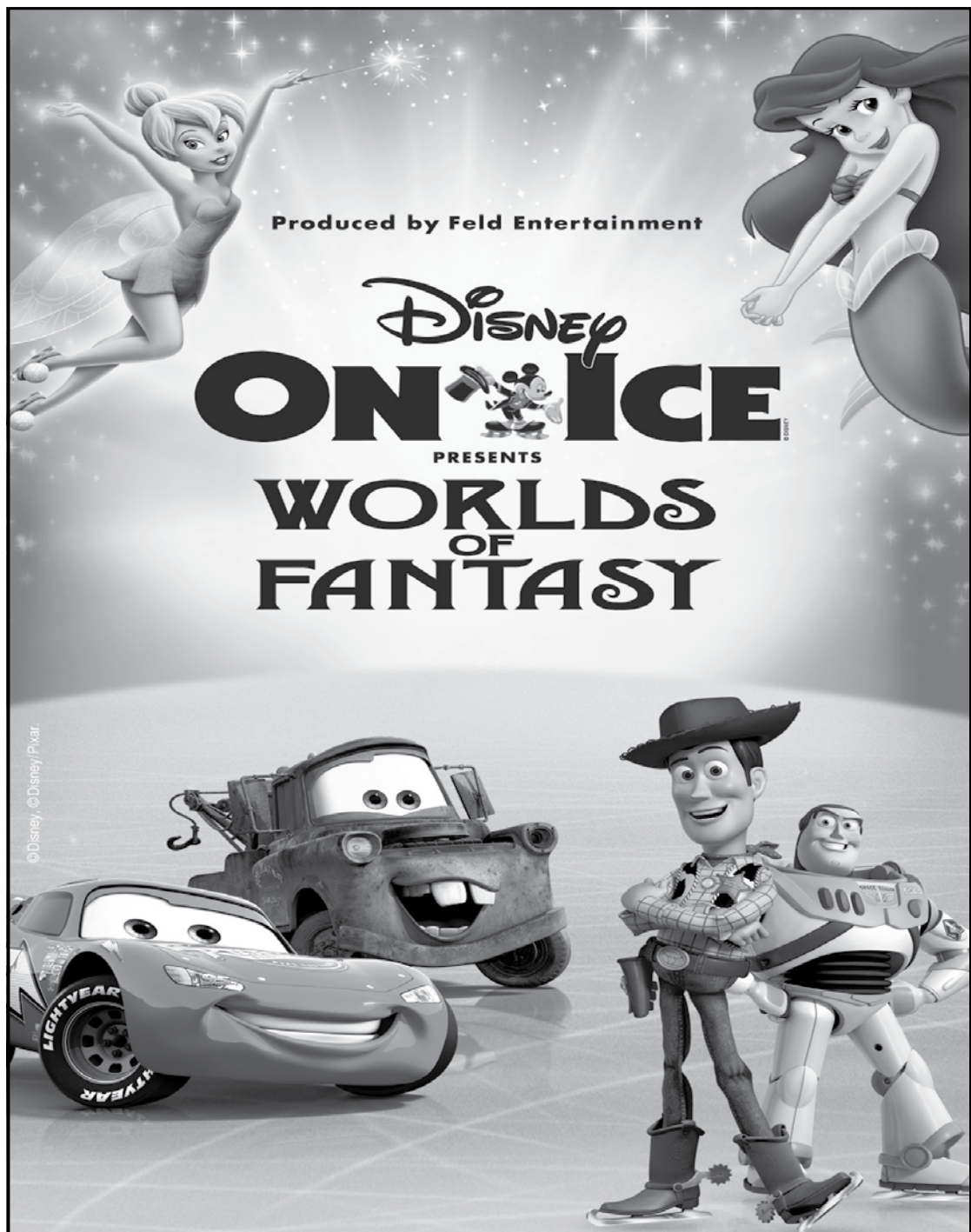

work out as well as Kino had hoped.

Good takes over in entire village. Thieves attempt to rob him. The pearl traders refuse to barter with him. His friends grow psychotically jealous. Kino begins to spend all his energies hiding and protecting his treasure. His wife, who sees how the new wealth is destroying their family, tries to get rid of the pearl, only to have Kino viciously attack her.

More robbers burn their house down. They are forced to run for their lives while would-be assassins mercilessly stalk the family like prey. Yet, Kino cannot let this pearl go. He cries out in desperation: "What can I do? This pearl has become my soul!"

In the end Kino loses everything: His home, his young child, his little canoe by which he made a living, his respectability in the village, and his ability to escape to a better life. He and his wife stand on the Pacific shoreline and heave the evil pearl back into the ocean.

The treasure he thought he wanted, in the end, breaks him. Thus, Steinbeck's little story is about far more than a poor Mexican diver. It is a tale of human nature; it is about getting what one wants, only to discover that the fulfillment of that desire is one's undoing.

We all enter this world with empty hands, open hearts, and restless spirits searching for some kind of treasure - something to fill the emptiness. The search is intrinsic, natural, and

good. Jesus spoke of this search in a way that Steinbeck later duplicated: We are searching for the "Pearl of Great Price," Jesus said, that invaluable treasure of the soul that is worth more than all the world. It is an acquisition of the soul - and only the soul - that satisfies our search.

The glitch in all of our pursuits is that many of the things we seek do not actually fulfill us. They are actually detrimental to us and to the world. My guess is that the majority of individual and cosmic suffering is the direct result of our improper and misguided searches.

The itchiness in our hands and in our hearts sends us looking for an emotional and spiritual scratching post, but we entrust ourselves to people and objects that simply cannot deliver the goods. To quote an old country song, we go "looking for love in all the wrong places." And when we go looking in all the wrong places, we end up with all the wrong outcomes.

But it's never too late to find the satisfaction we can't seem to corner. We just have to turn our attention to the true treasure of the soul, the Pearl of Great Price. We just have to search in the right place, and almost magically, we end up with the right results. ★

John Steinbeck was one of America's most prolific and insightful novelists. Renowned for his prize-winning works that most of us either enjoyed or endured at some point in our education (depending upon our perspective), one of Steinbeck's lesser known novellas is my personal favorite. It is a penetrating little book called The Pearl.

Steinbeck's story begins with a poor Mexican pearl diver named Kino. He happily ekes out a living for his wife and son with a little canoe and a thatch hut on the beach. When Kino's child is bitten by a scorpion, the wealthy doctor will not see the child, for Kino has no money.

Nor will the priest come to pray for the child, because Kino and his wife aren't properly married - again, because Kino can't afford to pay the church for a proper wedding ceremony. But through grace or ill-fated fortune, Kino discovers a pearl as big as his fist: The "Pearl of the World," the locals call it, the most incredible treasure the village has ever seen.

Now Kino will be rich. He and his wife will be properly married. His son will be healed. The family will get new clothes and a larger house. His life will be transformed. But, things don't

## Moratorium Lifted on New Grocery Stores for Women, Infants and Children Program

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Full-line grocery stores that have not previously participated in the California Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program will be able to apply for authorization to participate beginning today it was announced by Dr. Ron Chapman, California Department of Public Health (CDPH) director and state health officer.

"This positive step will help improve availability and access for the 1.4 million women, infants and children who participate in the California WIC program," said Dr. Chapman.

To address rising food costs in the California WIC program, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in 2012 continued a moratorium on the addition of new vendors into the program so that CDPH and USDA could develop and

implement strategies to contain costs and ensure program integrity. Today, USDA notified CDPH by letter that the moratorium can now be lifted for the additional stores.

In June, USDA partially lifted the moratorium to include additional locations for stores that already had a master contract with the WIC program. Since that time, 167 stores have been added to the program. It is estimated that an additional 100 stores will be added statewide in this second phase.

"USDA and CDPH continue to work together to ensure the strategies now in place are effective in containing food costs and comply with federal regulations and mandates," said Dr. Chapman.

The moratorium to add the remaining vendors will be lifted

by USDA in a third phase at a later date. California currently has approximately 4,400 authorized stores that participate in the WIC program.

California WIC provides access to healthy supplemental foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support, and referrals to healthcare and community services for the infants, children and pregnant or post-partum women it serves. WIC spends approximately \$86 million each month on food.

At the federal level, WIC is administered by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), and California's WIC Program is administered at the state level by CDPH. ★

## Cordova Football Ends Preseason Undefeated

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Friday, October 10th, the Cordova High School football team begins Sierra Valley Conference action against Galt at Lancer Stadium.

But on September 26th, the Lancers had one more non-conference game to complete against Foothill. Looking to fine tune all aspects of the game was on the Lancers' game plan that led to a

48-6 win over the Mustangs.

"We just wanted to tighten up everything we do with our basic offense, basic defense and special teams," said Cordova head coach Vance Mueller. "We're trying to get ready to go into league play and feel confident in our system, in what we're doing. I think we did that (against Foothill)."

Cordova (5-0) wasted little time in scoring on Foothill's defense in the first half. The

Lancers led 14-0 after the first quarter, then extended their lead to 35-0 at halftime. The Lancers scored a touchdown each in the third and fourth quarters. Foothill scored its lone touchdown in the final quarter to avoid a shutout.

Paving the way for the Lancers' offense was wide receiver Devin Baldwin, who had eight receptions for 196 yards and four touchdowns.

Lancers quarterback Unique

Perez threw 17 of 21 passes for 332 yards, and threw for five touchdowns that included four to Baldwin. For the season, Perez, a junior, eclipsed the 1,000 yards passing mark; he has completed 80 of 118 passes for 1,118 yards and 14 touchdowns.

Brandon Buck joined Jordan Richard and Isaac Black in scoring a touchdown each in the game for Cordova, which finished with 491 total offensive

yards.

On defense, the Lancers recorded 73 tackles. Defensive back Carlos Cuevas had 12 tackles in the game that included nine solo and three assisted. Following Cuevas in tackles were linemen Azat Kudbalayan and Amos Loto with nine each, David Domachuk eight, and Richard with seven.

"I would say our kids played a little tighter in this game," Mueller said. "Going back and looking at the film, we always say you never play as well as you think, and you never play as poor as you think."

Cordova was able to achieve what Mueller calls a "strong victory," but says there is still room for improvement. "It bolts very well with the effort that our kids are putting out," Mueller said.

This week, Cordova has the bye week, which comes at the perfect time, Mueller notes. "I feel we need to make sure we have our grades in order, give our kids a little bit of a rest," Mueller said.

In the junior varsity game, Cordova slipped past Foothill, 36-34. The JV Lancers finish their pre-season with a 3-2 record. ★

**OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS**

Bo Wallace and the Ole Miss Rebels host the nation's No. 1 team, Alabama

**ALABAMA AT OLE MISS**

It's the biggest football Saturday in Oxford in decades. Ole Miss, undefeated and ranked in the top 10 nationally, hosts the mighty Crimson Tide of Alabama. That's the main event. The pregame party, however, will be legendary, with ESPN's College GameDay setting up shop in the Grove for the first time ever. Assuming the tailgaters can find their way to Vaught-Hemingway Stadium, they will have an opportunity to witness the first of what should be many epic showdowns in the next two months between SEC West contenders. Alabama has ascended to the top of a few national polls on the strength of an offense that is averaging just a shade under 600 yards per game. Ole Miss currently leads the SEC in total defense, allowing only 3.7 yards per play and 248.0 yards per game — but the Rebels have played a relatively soft schedule. The bigger concern for Ole Miss coach Hugh Freeze is his offense; the numbers have been decent, but the Rebs have lacked consistency and have turned the ball over nine times in four games. *Alabama by 10*

Tommy Armstrong Jr. is doing a decent job in his first season as the full-time starting quarterback, though the staff would no doubt like him to increase his completion percentage (now at 53.9). The story on offense has been running back Ameer Abdullah, who already has rushed for 200-plus yards three times this season. Last year, Abdullah rushed for 123 yards on a 5.6-yard average in a 41–28 loss to Michigan State. The Spartans aren't quite as ferocious on defense in 2014, so don't be surprised if Abdullah has a big day. Michigan State has been better than expected on offense, averaging over 500 yards and 50 points per game. This could be a shootout. *Michigan State by 10*

**TEXAS A&M AT MISSISSIPPI STATE**

Any other Saturday, this likely would have been the Game of the Week nationally. But the Bulldogs are forced to cede the spotlight to their hated rivals to the (relative) north, the Ole Miss Rebels, who host Alabama. Still, this is a huge game between two undefeated teams with aspirations of winning the SEC West. Texas A&M survived a scare on Saturday, rallying from 14 down in the fourth quarter to beat Arkansas in overtime. The Aggies' offense is as explosive as ever, but the defense continues to be an issue. A&M has given up more than 400 yards in three of five games, including 484 to Arkansas on Saturday. Mississippi State passed its only test this season — and did so in impressive fashion with a 34–29 win at LSU two weeks ago. The Bulldogs are stout defensively and feature one of the most dynamic dual-threat quarterbacks in the nation in junior Dak Prescott. *Mississippi State by 3*

**NEBRASKA AT MICHIGAN STATE**

Nebraska makes to the trip to East Lansing in the first big game between two Big Ten teams this season. The Cornhuskers are 5–0 but only have one quality win on their resume, a 41–31 victory over Miami in Lincoln.

**OKLAHOMA AT TCU**

This is very quietly a huge game in the Big 12. We all know that Oklahoma is one of the elite teams in the nation, but TCU is 3–0 with lopsided wins over Samford (by 34), Minnesota (by 23) and SMU (by 56). Matt Joeckel, a graduate transfer from Texas A&M, was expected to take over at quarterback but wasn't able to beat out veteran Trevone Boykin, who has also seen significant action at wide receiver in his career. Boykin is thriving in the Horned Frogs' up-tempo attack, with 858 yards passing, a team-best 183 yards rushing and a TD-to-INT ratio of 8-to-1. As a team, TCU has 10 touchdown passes in 2014 after throwing only 14 all last season. Oklahoma's defense, however, will be by far the best Boykin and the Frogs have faced this season. *Oklahoma by 10*

**STANFORD AT NOTRE DAME**

The schedule hasn't been too taxing, but Notre Dame has been very impressive en route to its 4–0 start. Led by quarterback Everett Golson — who's improved after his year-long suspension — the Fighting Irish have scored at least 30 points in all four games. The challenge this week will be to find a weakness in a Stanford defense that has allowed only three touchdowns in four games. The Cardinal, despite the loss of coordinator Derek Mason (now the head coach at Vanderbilt) and standouts like Shayne Skov and Trent Murphy, might be even better on defense in 2014. They have been especially effective defending the pass, allowing only 74.0 yards per game and an astoundingly low 3.7 yards per pass attempt. This is a huge test for the Irish. *Stanford by 5*

**PRIME TIME PLAYERS**

Ohio State's **J.T. Barrett** is developing into a weapon for the Buckeyes. The redshirt freshman quarterback threw for 330 yards and four touchdowns to lead Urban Meyer's team to a 50–28 win over Cincinnati. ... Junior **Todd Gurley** was dominant in Georgia's

35–32 win over Tennessee, rushing for 208 yards and two touchdowns. ... The first true freshman to start for Clemson in 20 years, **DeShaun Watson** certainly made the most of his historic opportunity. The 19-year-old Gainesville, Ga., native completed 27-of-36 passes for 435 yards, an ACC-record-tying six TDs and one INT during a 50–35 win over

border-rival North Carolina. ... **Ishmael Adams**, a cornerback and return specialist for UCLA, was trending on Twitter nationally after a 95-yard INT return for a TD and 100-yard kick return for a score during a 62–27 win at Arizona State on Thursday night. ... Texas A&M quarterback **Kenny Hill** threw for 386 yards and tossed four touchdown

passes — including a 25-yard strike on the first play of overtime — to lead the Aggies' to a 35–28 comeback win over Arkansas in Arlington, Texas. ... Washington State rallied from a 21–0 deficit to beat Utah 28–27 thanks in part to a 417-yard, four-touchdown performance from senior quarterback **Connor Halliday**.

**STOCK REPORT**

- Jameis Winston returned to action after serving a one-game suspension and rallied Florida State from 17 points down to beat NC State 56–41. Winston threw for 365 yards and four scores to lead the Seminoles, who have now won 20 straight games.
- Michigan lost to Minnesota for just the third time since 1967, dropping a 30–14 decision to the Golden Gophers in Ann Arbor. The Wolverines have lost three games in September for the first time in program history. These are not good times for coach Brady Hoke.
- California snapped its 15-game Pac-12 losing streak by outlasting Colorado 59–56 in a double-overtime thriller. This was the first game in college football history in which both quarterbacks — Jared Goff (Cal), Sefo Liufau (Colorado) — threw for at least seven TDs.
- Vanderbilt managed only 139 total yards and did not score an offensive touchdown in a 17–7 loss at Kentucky. The Commodores, who won nine games in each of the past two seasons, dropped to 1–4 overall and 0–3 in the SEC under first-year coach Derek Mason.
