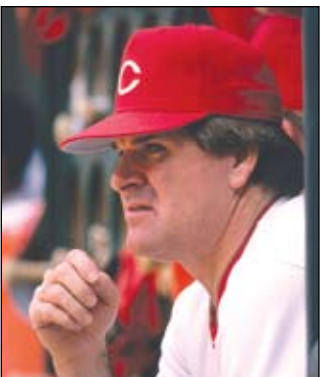

Over the Cliff at High Speed Another Looming Fiscal Train Wreck of a Budget

Given the experience of the recent recession, one would think that our state political leadership would have learned the dangers of profligate public spending. The most recent economic bust, and the dot com bust which preceded it, should have served as a stark reminder about the consequences of growing government faster than economic growth, and the failure of not planning for another downturn.

But this is California – the state with one of the lowest ratings for effective governance and efficient use of tax dollars. And, by the way, that's not just a disgruntled conservative complaining. By any objective criteria, including the respected Pew Center for States, California is a state where its citizens are taxed and regulated to a very high degree in return for a dismally poor level of public services.

On Sunday afternoon, just a few hours before the constitutional deadline for passing a budget, the leadership of the majority party almost broke their arms trying to pat themselves on the back for the budget deal they just completed. Thanks to Proposition 25 passed in 2010 – a measure which was sold to voters as increasing transparency and accountability – state budgets can now be passed with a simple majority vote of each house, meaning that the far more fiscally responsible Republicans are now wholly shut out of the process. And for that promised transparency? Virtually the entire budget was negotiated behind closed doors among left

leaning Democrats.

The result is not good for California taxpayers. First, state spending is projected to

skyrocket to over \$156 billion dollars. That is a huge increase over just last year.

Second, the budget envisions

significant increases in government program spending of an ongoing nature rather than

Whooping Cough Epidemic

**More than 800 New
Cases Have Been Reported
in the Last Two Weeks**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The number of pertussis (whooping cough) cases in the state has reached epidemic proportions it was reported this week by Dr. Ron Chapman, director of the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) and state health officer.

As of June 10th, there have been 3,458 cases of pertussis reported to CDPH in 2014, more than were reported in all of 2013. Over 800 new cases have been reported in the past two weeks.

Pertussis is cyclical and peaks every 3-5 years. The last peak in California occurred in 2010, so it is likely another peak is underway.

"Preventing severe disease and death in infants is our highest priority," says Dr. Chapman. "We urge all pregnant women to get vaccinated. We also urge parents to vaccinate infants as soon as possible."

Infants too young to be fully immunized remain most vulnerable to severe and fatal cases of pertussis. Two-thirds of pertussis hospitalizations have been in children four months or younger. Two infant deaths have been reported.

The Tdap vaccination for pregnant women is the best way to protect infants who are too young to be vaccinated. All pregnant women should be vaccinated with Tdap in the third trimester of each pregnancy, regardless of previous Tdap vaccination. In addition, infants should be vaccinated as soon as possible. The first dose of pertussis vaccine can be given as early

The Females Must Get Through Women Riders Honor Pony Express Legend

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - This year's re-ride marked the 154th Pony Express anniversary, and unlike the original Pony Express service, a majority of the riders are women. In 1860, Pony Express recruitment favored lean boys, preferably orphans. Carrying mail between Sacramento and St. Joseph, MO, riders galloped like the wind. Chances of being killed en route were great.

Despite the macho legend, annual reruns of the fabled ride now depend hugely on ladies. Staged by the Pony Express Association, the 2014 relay began last week. In early stages, most jockeys were female.

"These days, association could not exist without women," reports California president and ride Captain Rich Tatman: "Over 60 percent of our riders are female. They're accomplished

horse people and their passion is dauntless."

So it was that 72-year-old great-grandmother, Pat Fanelli, claimed precious mochila (mailbags) at H Street last week and thundered via Arcade and Carmichael toward the rider exchange at River Bend Park. She and her companion, granddaughter Jessica Sloat, crossed the American River at William Pond Park 20 minutes before schedule.

"It was an easy ride," she reported. "We had a nice delta breeze and flat ground; we could open up and gallop most of the six miles. That's what the horses love." A veteran of 13 annual reruns, the retired Sacramento District Attorney employee and 26-year-old gelding Sugar Dandy have not always enjoyed such serendipity. Where the old Brockliss Bridge once spanned the American River near Placerville, riders now transport

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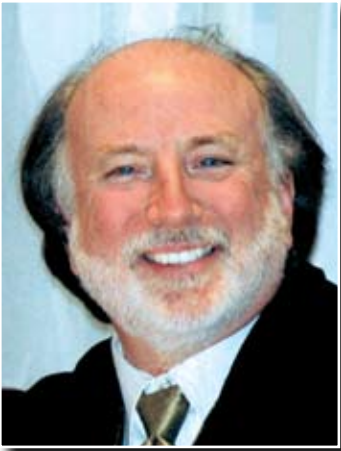
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The California Legislature

mochila via cable. “It was 1:30 a.m. and pitch dark,” recalls Fanelli. “Dandy did not expect the high-pitched cable scream and he freaked out. I ended up in a bush with two frightened horses wrapped around me. No one was hurt. It took time for us all to calm down.”

She likens participation in the annual run to wedding prep: “You do trial runs; you’re excited for weeks ahead,” she says. “Then you’re all done in 20 minutes. You relive the ride mentally over and over. These days, Facebook lets you share the experience so the thrill lasts longer.”

With social media, cell phones, partner riders, and a motor vehicle escort within miles of the trail, things have changed for the Pony Express. Lone 1860s riders galloped over rough trails for many miles, leaping from exhausted to fresh mounts. They carried Colt 45s and Bibles for protection. Fanelli, a volunteer with the Folsom Lake Trail Patrol, never rides alone. “Sugar Dandy looks after me,” she explains, “but I always ride with a companion, it’s a safety factor. You never know what you might meet on a trail.”

Round-the-clock, the 2014 Pony Express re-run galloped under scorching sun and moonlight—via mountain trails and beside busy highways—to cross the Nevada state line by Thursday morning last week. On Saturday, the mail was in Utah. Over 1966 miles, the path will transect eight states and weary 550 riders and mounts. Imprinted with the legendary Pony Express cancellation, mail will reach St. Joseph this Saturday.

Gender aside, couriers are seldom the slender teenagers preferred by Express recruiters of yore. “At 17, you leap into the saddle at a run,” marvels ride captain Tatman. “Some older riders need help. But once mounted, they feel they can do anything. My hat’s off to them.”

A financial disaster, the

19-month service failed in a cloud of dust when telegraph lines pierced the West in 1861. Still, the romance of its dauntless couriers lingers among urban cowboys. Says Tatman: “Everybody loves the aura of the American West. Part of everyone

wants to be a cowboy.” Or a cowgirl. ★

as 6 weeks of age.

Older children, pre-adolescents, and adults should also be vaccinated against pertussis according to current recommendations. It is particularly important that persons who will be around newborns also be vaccinated.

“Unlike some other vaccine-preventable diseases, like measles, neither vaccination nor illness from pertussis offers lifetime immunity,” says Dr. Ron Chapman. “However, vaccination is still the best defense against this potentially fatal disease.”

The symptoms of pertussis vary by age. For children, a typical case of pertussis starts with a cough and runny nose for one to two weeks. The cough then

worsens and children may have rapid coughing spells that end with a “whooping” sound. Young infants may not have typical pertussis symptoms and may have no apparent cough. Parents may describe episodes in which the infant’s face turns red or purple. For adults, pertussis may simply be a cough that persists for several weeks.

CDPH is working closely with local health departments, schools, media outlets and other partners to inform the general public about the importance of vaccination against pertussis.

Pertussis data, including the number of cases in each county, can be found on the CDPH website, and is updated regularly. ★

one time expenditures. As any Sacramento observer knows, this is a recipe for disaster. It is California's proclivity to expand government programs which gets us into such trouble when the inevitable downturn arrives. Moreover, building in higher levels of government programs will surely increase the political pressure for extending the Prop 30 tax hikes which gave California the highest income tax and state sales tax rates in America. But then, we suspect that is exactly the politicians' strategy.

While the particulars of the budget which reveal its foolishness are too many to list, two are illustrative of why California remains the fiscal laughingstock of the United States.

First, the budget proposes to spend \$250 million in "cap & trade" funds for the infamous High Speed Rail project. These dollars are forced exactions from California businesses and utilities under California's one of a kind "climate change" law. The exactions are clearly a tax – currently being litigated – ultimately borne by all California citizens in the form of higher energy costs and more

expensive goods and services.

As for the HSR project itself, earlier in the week, Congressional leaders in Washington as much as said that California will get federal funding when hell freezes over. Matching federal funds – and private investments – were what California voters were promised when they approved a bond for a much less expensive rail project years ago. But neither is forthcoming and this is but one reason the project is tied up in litigation.

The irony here is that an arguably illegal revenue stream is being used to fund an illegal public works boondoggle under the theory that the project will somehow reduce global warming. The ultimate absurdity though is that the Legislature's own analyst concluded that, at least for the first several years, the construction of the project will actually produce more greenhouse gases, not less.

The second insult to taxpayers is the expansion of universal preschool programs demanded by Senate leader Darrell Steinberg. The expansion of these programs – demonstrated to have no positive effects on future learning – will cost

taxpayers hundreds of millions. The irony here is that earlier last week, in a stunning ruling against California's grossly ineffective public school system, a judge found that the teacher tenure rules and seniority rules so disadvantaged school children that it violated their civil rights. The ploy by Steinberg to expand preschool had nothing to do with improving education. The sole purpose was to expand the rolls of union paying teachers. And yet this line item in the budget does nothing except increase the size and scope of a corrupt and ineffective bureaucracy.

It has been said that laws are like sausages – it is better not to know what goes into making them. Since the budget is the centerpiece of all annual legislation, perhaps that's why most Californians choose to remain unaware of what goes into it. But citizens remain ignorant at their own expense.

Cordova Football Begins New Season With 7-on-7

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - If Cordova High School football coach Vance Mueller gave his squad's first 7-on-7 practice on Monday evening, the letter B would be the grade but with more room for improvement.

The 37 players ran running and passing plays during their drills. Those players who weren't on offense played defense, while others rotated on both sides of the ball.

"I think the first real day of football, the depth chart is going into place, everybody is a little nervous," Mueller said. "I think there was a little bit of nerves today."

Positive attitudes were displayed throughout the team's first practice.

"You can see a whole different level of football knowledge, and the ability to compete," Mueller said. "The kids are doing an excellent job right now. They've really been fun to coach."

Another key factor for the Lancers this summer is the focus on football. In recent years, Mueller and his coaching staff dealt with player ineligibility, or moving out of the Folsom-Cordova Unified School District.

"I feel for the first time since we've been here, we're just coaching football," Mueller said. "We're starting to

understand what we need to start getting ready for."

Mueller likes the efforts put forth by the juniors, and expects most of

them to continue battling seniors in a friendly way in practices in upcoming weeks.

"Our juniors are very motivated,"

Mueller said. "They are also our first group, since our first year here that we've had as freshmen, sophomores and now juniors. They understand, and

they've bought into what we're doing. Some of those juniors are pushing some of our seniors. To me, it's a very healthy competition.

An additional six players were absent from Monday's first practice, but with good reasons.

"We have a group of kids who were on a mission, building houses down in Mexico for the poor, and they got delayed in LA," Mueller said.

Starting next Monday, Cordova will take part in a full-contact camp at Monterey Trail High School of Elk Grove. The camp, according to Mueller, is scheduled to run from 2:30 to 6:30 p.m. through Thursday, June 26. Schools scheduled to compete are host Monterey Trail, Inderkum, Burbank, Ripon and Vintage of Napa.

"We're looking forward to going back there," Mueller said.

The Lancers will continue their weight training and summer practices through July 20, when Cordova and the rest of the Sac-Joaquin Section schools will be in the dead period from July 21 to Aug. 10. Then on Monday, Aug. 11, the Lancers begin practices leading the way to their Aug. 29 non-league home opener against Pioneer of Woodland. ★

- Local Capital Crew Club high school rowers earned national honors today on their home course at US Rowing's Youth National Championships held at the Sacramento State Aquatic Center. They won their invitations to compete from the Southwest Region last month. The prestigious regatta brings the best American high school rowers into competition; this was the first time in its 18 years that it was ever held in the West, signaling the increase in popularity among college-bound high school youth.

It also has athletes and coaches who represent the area on the US national team, consistently sending boats to the US Nationals. The Club helps many students receive college scholarships into schools where they might not otherwise gain acceptance. Club members also see the benefits from the direction of Mary Whipple, an alumni who has won two Olympic gold medals and a silver in rowing. ★

• Last week, June 9-11, the Orioles took two of three from the Boston Red Sox, but allowed just one run in the series. Baltimore shutout the Sox in the first and third games and lost the middle tilt 1-0. Starting pitchers Bud Norris, Chris Tillman and Wei-Yin Chen stifled the Boston bats. The last time the Orioles allowed one run or fewer in a three-game series in Baltimore was Sept. 29-Oct. 1, 1995. The starting pitchers in those games were Kevin Brown, Ben McDonald and Mike Mussina as the Orioles ended the season with five consecutive shutouts, the final three over Detroit.

• All-World shortstop Derek Jeter reached another milestone last week. He joined Craig Biggio and Hall of Famer Rickey Henderson as the only players with at least 3,000 hits, 250 home runs and 350 stolen bases. Next up for Jeter, who has 3,380 hits, on the all-time list is Carl Yastrzemski (3,419), Honus Wagner (3,420) and Cap Anson (3,435). Tris Speaker with 3,515 hits is probably out of Jeter's reach.

• Sparked by youngsters such as rookie George Springer, the Houston Astros have been a tough opponent over the past several weeks. Prior to losing two of three to the Tampa Bay Rays over the weekend, the Astros had won or tied seven series in a row. The last time the Astros could claim that was back in 2006.

• On June 11, the Tampa Bay bats broke through with a four-spot in the fourth inning off of the Cardinals' Michael Wacha. That ended a streak of 31 innings in which the Rays were shutout. It also ended a streak of 30 innings of shutout ball by the Redbirds' pitching staff.

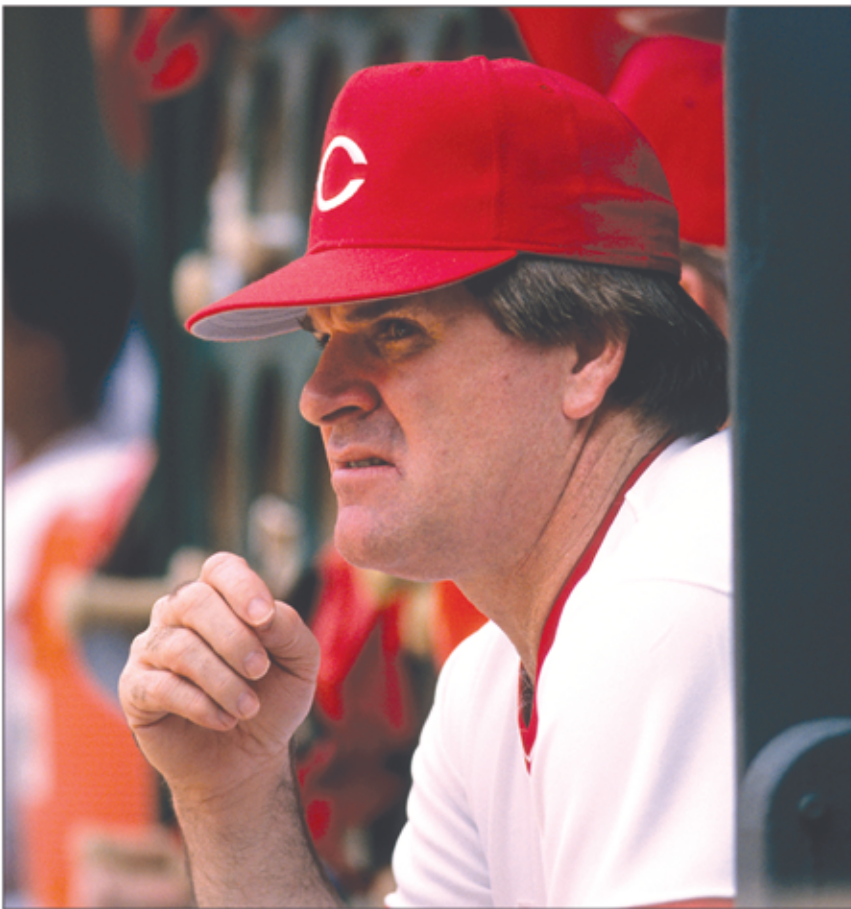

It's Time To Let Rose Back In

After 25 years of writing about how much damage Pete Rose did to baseball in the 1980s by betting thousands on baseball while managing the Cincinnati Reds to four consecutive second-place finishes from 1985-88, I am reversing my stance. For years I argued that since the 1920s, baseball really has one iron-clad rule posted in every clubhouse. Team personnel are strictly prohibited from any form of gambling, and the punishment is clear: Lifetime ban from the game. The stance that Commissioner Mount-ain Landis took in the wake of the 1919 Black Sox scandal, when players conspired to throw the World Series, was firm and clear. It may not be too much of a stretch to argue that rid- ding the game of the influence of bookmakers may have been the dif- ference between baseball becoming the national pastime versus being just another outlet for parimutuel gam- bling.

But now, my stance is reversed. Why? After all, no new facts have come to light about Rose's actions that led to a lifetime ban from the game in 1989. There are no changes in the long-standing rules prohibiting any form of gambling by players and managers. So why now? From a punitive standpoint, Rose has more than paid the price during his banishment from the game. For- mer mediocre players reap financial benefits from appearances, endorse- ments and autograph appearances. Rose has, for the most part, been de- nied that luxury. Yes, he has raked in a few bucks from publishers and busi- ness owners willing to attach their name to the all-time hit king, but that pales in comparison to what Hall of Famers command just by the HOF after their names. By this point, Rose's opportunities for capitalizing on Hall of Fame status have greatly

diminished. And realistically, Rose probably did less damage to the game in the 1980s than the PED Era inflicted in the 20 years that followed. Fans have become disenchanted with once hallowed records, and highly regarded statistical thresholds have become rather meaningless. You don't have to look far to see how this era scarred the game. There was no national hoopla as Barry Bonds (who never failed a drug test) chased (and eventu- ally broke) Hank Aaron's all- time home run mark. Home run and hit totals, once consid- ered a lock for the Hall of Fame, are no longer that cred- ible. Not long ago, either 3,000 hits or 500 home runs assured election to the Hall. But Rafael Palmeiro, compiler of 3,020 hits and 569 home runs, didn't receive enough Hall votes last winter to re- main on the ballot. Craig Big- gio and his 3,060 hits fell short as well. Sammy Sosa, with 609 homers, received just 41 votes, barely enough to keep the former Cubs slugger on the ballot. And the two poster chil- dren for the PED Era — Barry Bonds and Roger Clemens — didn't get enough votes com- bined to gain election. Clearly, who did what drugs and to what degree during this painful era has caused confusion among fans and the media. The era left a wake of dis- trust for fans to sort out. Allowing all these players in baseball and keeping Rose out doesn't make as much sense to me anymore. I have been on record multiple times saying that I believe the best

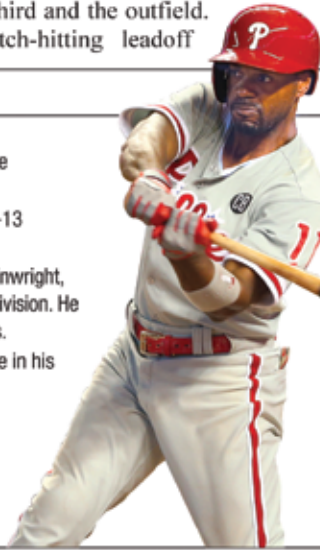

players on the field belong in the Hall of Fame. Even if that means electing cheaters. Not to beat the dead horse further, but we just don't know whose performances were enhanced and by how much. So with the "best players" argument, the all-time hits leader with more than 2,100 runs, 746 doubles and 1,314 RBIs should be included. He made the All-Star team at first, second, third and the outfield. The switch-hitting leadoff

hitter was the catalyst for the Big Red Machine in the 1970s, one of the greatest dynasties the game has seen. His on-the-field performance has never been in doubt. There have been hardened criminals sentenced to life who have served less than 25 years. I suspect the next commissioner will address this issue early in his term.

- 2,236** Career hits for **Jimmy Rollins** of the Philadelphia Phillies. The 15-year shortstop is now the all-time leader in Phillies history. Rollins, a former NL MVP, broke the record on June 14.
- 26-26** Houston's record with rookie **George Springer** in the starting lineup this season. The Astros were 6-13 when Springer made his debut with the team on April 16.
- 1** Career wins against the American League East for **Adam Wainwright** of the St. Louis Cardinals. Wainwright, who has 108 career wins, defeated the Tampa Bay Rays on June 10 for his only win against that division. He has never faced the Orioles, Red Sox or Yankees in the regular season, and is 0-1 vs. the Blue Jays.

Further proof that I was not born South of the Mason-Dixon: I ask, “Where did you get those shoes?” instead of “Where do you worship?” And I say things like “Oh, what a bummer,” instead of “Well, bless your little heart.” And I live on a “cul-de-sac,” not a “cove.” We Californians “barbecue.” The Southerners “*have a cookout.*”

When I have to void my bladder while dining in a restaurant, I usually say something like, “I

have to pee. I’ll be right back.” Southern women, on the other hand, are much more refined. I love the South, ya’ll. I think wisteria, magnolia and dogwood are beautiful. I know what kudzu is. I respect the fact that college football is a religion in Dixie. Well, unless you have the honor of being in Lexington, Kentucky, where basketball reigns supreme. I love the unique sound of cicadas on a hot summer night. I think it’s cool that in the South bad manners are not an option. I think collard/mustard/turnip greens and grits are delicious. And to me, Southern men, summer and seersucker go together splendidly.

The very things for which Southerners are sometimes ignorantly and unfairly lambasted, I believe, are what make them so special and charming. They are far from superficial or insincere. They have a glass-half-full attitude.

And the Southern Hospitality thing is legit, real and

wonderful. They readily open their hearts, homes and ovens. It’s families first for them, but not to the exclusion of us California strays.

I’m not a Dixie chick. But gosh do I try...

I mean, I personally don’t own anything that is monogrammed. But I now channel my inner wannabe Southern Belle self by gifting my friends and loved ones with monogrammed goodies as often as possible.

Sadly, I’ve never been to a debutante ball. I so regret not going to my niece’s coming-out fete in Memphis circa 2000.

But I do wear lipstick daily. I wear pearls frequently. I know every single word of Sweet Home Alabama and The Lord’s Prayer. I can keep up with the best of the Southern beauties when it comes to sipping on mint juleps or fireflies. So see? I am working hard on getting this Southern Belle thing down.

In reality, though, I’m a proud native California person through-and-through who has fallen in love with the South and its citizenry. And whether I go back to Charleston or Nashville again, or explore a new Southern gem of a town, I can’t wait to go again.
