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



Lancer Boys Hoops Clinch Share of Title

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Capturing a share of the Capital Athletic League title is secured for the Cordova High School boys basketball team. Playing at Antelope in a CAL contest on Valentine's Day, the Lancers (8-1 in CAL, 17-8) fell to the Titans (7-2 in CAL, 49-44). Despite the loss, Cordova can still win an outright league title if it won its league and home finale against Whitney on Tuesday. Antelope closes out its regular season at home against Rio Americano.

Against Antelope, Cordova was held to nine points in the first quarter. That helped Antelope, which jumped out to a 16-9 lead. "We just had a very poor shooting night," said Cordova head coach Fletcher Johnson, whose Lancers made only one of 14 three-pointers in the first quarter and less than 30 percent in the game.

Both teams combined for 15 points in the second quarter, but the Titans led 24-16 at halftime. Cordova outscored Antelope, 28-25, in the second half. But the Titans held on for the win.

"It wasn't so much playing catch up," Johnson said. "We cut it down to three to four points (in the third quarter)." Antelope made 20-of-28 free throws in the game, and Cordova was 12-of-20. "We were fouling them," Johnson said. "We didn't play good defense, and they were getting their shots outside the paint."

Winning, at least, a share of the title is a good feeling for the Lancers. "Going undefeated in league wasn't our goal; winning league was," Johnson said. Jordan Roberson led the Lancers with 23 points. Lamar Brewer, Chris Johnson and CJ Coles scored five points each, Marquis Bolden three, and Nathaniel

Top Volunteers Head Down the Yellow Brick Road

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - George Burnash, a longtime Rancho Cordova volunteer who has labored on everything from Rancho Cordova incorporation to Leadership Rancho Cordova will be honored as the "Rancho Cordovan of the Year" Feb. 28 during the 15th Annual Community Volunteer Awards.

"Rancho Cordovan of the Year" is something of a "lifetime achievement" award and in the case of Burnash, recognizes a lifetime of volunteer service in the Rancho Cordova community which started 40 years ago and continues today.

Burnash led the Cordova Community Council as president in the 1980s, PTAs at Rancho Cordova Elementary and Mills Middle School, has led Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, church organizations and more. He is a member of the Rancho Cordova Historical Society, American River Grange, Leadership Rancho Cordova's governing board and has served his city in many ways, ranging from early incorporation efforts to more recent interview panels for the Chief of Police.

"George is a citizen with interests a mile wide and a mile deep," said Shelly

Blanchard, executive director of the Cordova Community Council. "His knowledge and love for Rancho Cordova is unparalleled. He is a wonderful model of community involvement."

Burnash will be among 9 Rancho Cordova volunteers and organizations to be honored at the event, which will feature a "Wizard of Oz" theme and is open to the public. Good Day Sacramento anchor Ken Rudolph will host the awards, and Mayor Dan Skoglund is Honorary Chairman.

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College vs. High School- Viva La Difference!

Even as I write Cal State Sacramento, my alma mater, starts a new spring semester and for some a promise of graduation ceremonies in May signifying a long awaited milestone. As we Sacramento residents benefit from numerous colleges to choose from within reach logistically, some young people are unsure if college is the next best path in their life for various reasons. Of the biggest complaint I hear is that the high school experience left feelings of academic inadequacy and that college will be more of the same. These blanket statements break my heart! It is hard for me to hear a young bright mind shut doors before taking a peak at what the college experience can be and why college is so very different in enough ways to possibly make it the best decision of their lives.

College vs. high school is, in academic terms andragogy vs. pedagogy. "Say what?" Andragogy by definition is the art and science of helping adults learn. This is very different from pedagogy which is the art and science of educating children. Though volumes are written about the differences, a quick look at the two models reveal that adult learners are self directed and responsible for their own learning. In addition, the learning must be relevant to the needs of the learner. In pedagogy models the child is externally motivated by the

competition for grades and possibilities of failure. The children in the classroom are dependent on the teacher for all the learning and the students are told what to learn in order to advance. The adult learner is internally motivated to achieve based on their own needs and goals, the possibility of a higher quality life. This internal motivation puts you the college student in control.

The great news is adult learning models work great in high school settings and many K-12 schools do deploy these models. What potential college bound students who still have a bad academic taste in their mouths need to understand is that college is geared to adult learning. K-12 education is foundation building and gives children a chance to grow up with structure and guidance. College and beyond is not for children. It is for adults young and old to achieve personal goals for reasons you choose and you direct. Is college easy? Is college stressful? Is the college experience

perfectly crafted for adults? Yes and no apply. But what college is, is not high school. It is a place of higher learning that you define for yourself to meet your personal learning objectives.

The best news of all is that going to college is loaded with options never before available until the internet. On-line courses abound and they can be equal in high quality as sitting in the classroom. Many hybrid courses exist i.e. part online, part classroom time. There are courses, majors, and university specialties to meet the needs of countless student circumstances and aspirations.

If you are someone who feels unsure about an academic life beyond high school rest assure you are not alone. Take one class that appeals to your interests, hobbies or biggest dream. Test the waters one step at a time. The benefits far out way the risks! You may find that you are in the driver's seat, calling the shots as a customer of learning, with expectations of excellent customer service from your learning provider and not a child ridding the bus being told what to learn.

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

There's an Alternative to the Imperial Presidency

In his State of the Union speech to Congress last month, President Obama drew widespread attention for pledging to use his executive authority to advance his priorities. He insisted he intends to act with or without Congress, and listed well over a dozen actions he plans to take by executive order. "Wherever and whenever I can take steps without legislation to expand opportunity for more American families," he said, "that's what I'm going to do."

Plenty of people were happy about this. The speech was applauded by pundits who have given up on Congress and believe the only way to move forward is by strengthening the presidency. Our political system, they say, is weighed down by too many interest groups, too many checks and balances, and too few avenues for circumventing a Congress that is both polarized and highly susceptible to the wishes of its donors. The present government is paralyzed, they believe. A stronger presidency would get Washington moving again.

As you'd expect, others are alarmed by this approach. The President, they say, is trampling on the constitutional separation of powers, grabbing powers for himself that were meant to

be shared with Congress. They point out that the Constitution gives Congress a primary role in making policy.

The problem with this debate is that it's missing a key part of the equation. Yes, our system needs a strong presidency. But it also needs a strong Congress. We are best off as a nation when the two consult, interact, and work together as powerful branches.

In truth, every president in recent memory has expanded the power of his office and been accused of a power grab. They've had plenty of motivation to do so. The modern world demands quick, decisive action. Americans tend to support presidents who act forcefully. Congress is complex, convoluted, and hard to work with; it is far easier for an administration to act on its own. Even members of Congress often defer to the President, counting on him to address issues they don't want to tackle or can't agree upon.

And presidents have wielded executive orders to great effect. Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, FDR's Works Progress Administration, John Kennedy's Peace Corps, affirmative action under Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon, Ronald Reagan's enshrining of cost-benefit analysis as the key to regulatory review — all came about through executive orders.

Yet there are limits to this approach, because in the end there is no substitute for legislation. Presidents cannot write a budget, raise the minimum wage, or reform entitlements by themselves. Because executive orders lack the permanence and force of law, they can be hard to implement and can be summarily cancelled by a later president. They are more subject to legal challenge than legislation. And

most important, executive orders are a unilateral exercise of power and do not benefit from a process of consensus-building and consultation with voices independent of the President's.

Consensus-building can't happen in a vacuum, however. Without a strong Congress able to find its way effectively through the thickets of lawmaking, this President and his successors will surely continue to address the nation's challenges on their own. The question is, how far down that road can we go before Congress becomes irrelevant, with too much power — and too much potential for the abuse of power — in presidential hands? Like our founding fathers, we should be skeptical of the concentration of power.

Politico recently detailed a spate of executive orders planned by this administration, which would affect everything from how power plants operate to how we commute to how the environment will be regulated. Taken together, they will "push deeply into everyday life" for Americans, the article noted.

Whether a president oversteps his authority with these and other executive orders is inevitably colored by whether you agree with the proposed order. But my point is different. It is that the march toward presidential unilateralism, whether the president is a Democrat or a Republican, dangerously undercuts our constitutional system. Before we give up on the separation of powers, let's try strengthening Congress. This may not be the easy route, but if we don't take it, representative democracy itself is in doubt. ★

STRENGTH IN UNITY

For a moment life seemed surreal. It's Friday afternoon, my friend Greg and I are having coffee in Peet's coffee-shop on 19th Street in Sacramento. Yesterday, my wife was diagnosed with Stage III, Level C, ovarian cancer. Her surgery is scheduled for Tuesday. As Greg and I are talking, I share with him: (1) I know there are profound spiritual lessons in this for both my wife and me; (2) I have to do it differently this time; (3) I have to accept this and "let everything be as it is." The only thing I can do is be "consciously present with her."

After walking away from a fundamentalist church as a teenager, by age 40 I felt something missing from my life and started looking for answers. I started going to a small Unity church in Modesto and later Carol Ruth Knox, a guest speaker, delivered the Sunday talk. For the first time in my life, I heard a message that resonated to the core of my being. I knew this was Truth, capitalized, emboldened and underlined.

A few months after that first meeting, I bought a small busi-

ness in Walnut Creek, near her church. Over the next few years, her teachings on "Non-duality," "Progressing Spiritually from Victim to Victor to Vehicle," and "The Dark Night of the Soul" changed my life and the way I see God. This helped me see that my wife's cancer would have a profound spiritual impact on us both.

I had been a caregiver about 30 years before and it didn't go well. I tried to do everything myself and avoid the pain by "stuffing" my feelings and numbing out with alcohol. Part of "doing things differently" was to recognize I couldn't fix my wife. I could take care of many of her physical needs: cooking, driving her to doctor's appointments, buying groceries, cleaning house, etc. I realized this time I needed to take care of myself, if I was to remain strong enough to take care of her. I would ask for help or hire someone to do the routine chores.

The greatest gift I could give to her and to me was to remain conscious throughout the experience. I said to God, "Okay, I am going to

be present for all of this. I am going to feel it all." My promise to my wife was, "I will be consciously present with you and hold your hand throughout." As we move forward in time each of us will face a 'dark night of the soul,' a moment when we can feel alone in the Universe. How to find mental, physical and spiritual strength to cope, survive and assist those in need as a caregiver is just the beginning of finding strength in Unity.



I just received a call from Congressman Ami Bera's office, and the House passed a bill today that will repeal the cut on the COLA that was taking away from our Veterans', including disabled Veterans', part of the help and coverage they were promised by our Country. That cut was part of the budget that was passed at the end of 2013. By a 94-0 vote, the Senate passed legislation yesterday. Today (February 11, 2014), the House voted 326 to 90 to undo cuts from the military cost-of-living. There doesn't seem to be any problem getting the legislation to the President for his signature this week. It's nice that Congress has come to an agreement! Passing the legislation shouldn't have been a surprise like the rain was, but it is a nice surprise.

I am adding a few things to the column since last week's column didn't make it into the paper. I am writing this on Friday, February 14, 2014, and the legislation for the Veterans I mentioned above has been passed by both houses and is waiting for the President's signature. He is in Fresno today, talking to the Governor about the drought. Enough said.

A few dates have been given to us, and I'm passing them on to you. Panera Bread on the corner of Zinfandel Drive and International Drive will have its grand opening on March 3, at 3 p.m. Many people have been

asking when it will open . . . now you know.

The general public and representatives from Los Rios Community College District, Folsom Lake College (FLC), City of Rancho Cordova, several school districts, and many more will be at the Folsom Lake College campus groundbreaking ceremony at Paseo Drive and Folsom Boulevard on Wednesday, April 30th at 10 a.m. FLC's plan is to have phase one completed so that classes can be conducted at the new site by fall 2015. We have had FLC classes on Rockingham Drive for a few years but finally having the community college campus built (with the bond we passed in 2007) and in use will be great.

And the County will begin working on the extension of Femoyer Street from Mather to International Drive on May 1, 2014. It should be completed by the end of October. Then there will be two entrances into Mather and will give easier access to the VA Hospital and other businesses there.

Whether talking about Panera Bread or the college or a road, we can and do make a difference to others.

I heard this at a meeting at Folsom Lake College the other day: An old man walked up to a shore littered with thousands of starfish, beached and dying after a storm. A young man was picking them up and flinging them back into the ocean. "Why do you bother," the old man scoffed. "You're not saving enough to make a difference." The young man picked up another starfish and sent it spinning back into the water. "I made a difference to that one," he replied. Remember, you can make a difference every day. ★

CDPH Warns About Consuming Cactus Imported From Mexico

Special CDPH Report

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Director and state health officer Dr. Ron Chapman has recently warned people not to eat cactus imported from Mexico that were sold at specific retail and wholesale locations around the state due to the presence of unapproved pesticides.

A recent routine surveillance sample collected by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (CDPR) isolated as much as 5.8 parts per million of Monocrotophos, an organophosphate based pesticide that has been barred from use in the United States since 1989. CDPR immediately took action to remove all of the product it could locate from store shelves and distribution centers. It has been quarantined and/or destroyed so that it doesn't pose a threat to consumers.

The contaminated cactus was sold and offered for sale to consumers and wholesale customers locally at La Superior SuperMercados in Sacramento, Stockton, Woodland and Pittsburg between 2/6/2014 and 2/12/2014

Whole cases of the cactus purchased from the wholesale produce companies were likely labeled with a supplier sticker that stated "Comercializadora De Chiles, Selectos Nieto S. De R.L. De C.V." Product sold in the retail stores was sold in bulk bins without any specific branding or labeling.

No illnesses have been reported to date, but symptoms of acute poisoning may include sweating, headache, weakness, nausea, vomiting, hypersalivation, abdominal cramps, and diarrhea. Consumption of Monocrotophos can lead to neurotoxicity and permanent nerve damage.

CDPH and CDPR are working with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to identify the growers and importers responsible for shipping pesticide contaminated cactus into the United States, so that future shipments can be examined and verified that they are in compliance before making their way into the marketplace.

CDPH recommends consumers experiencing any ill effects after consuming cactus products consult their health care provider. Consumers that observe the product being offered for sale are encouraged to report the activity to the CDPH toll free complaint line at (800) 495-3232. For more information see www.cdph.ca.gov


gift," as every activity performed is a volunteer effort through the club."

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Prime Time Players

SCOTTIE WILBEKIN, FLORIDA

The Gators may have cleared the path to a perfect SEC season by conquering their toughest week of the campaign so far. Florida defeated Tennessee and Kentucky on the road for the first time in the same season since 1988. Wilbekin, the Gators' point guard, led the way with 23 points in a 69-59 win at Kentucky and 21 points in a 67-58 win at Tennessee. The senior was 21-of-24 from the free throw line for the week with no turnovers.

DOUG McDERMOTT, CREIGHTON

Dougie McBuckets continued to move up the all-time scoring list last week, passing Larry Bird on Sunday. SHABAZZ NAPIER, UCONN

Napier continued his case for American Athletic Conference Player of the Year honors with a huge effort against Memphis. Napier scored 34 points and added five rebounds, four assists and four steals in the 86-81 win over the Tigers in overtime Saturday.

DWAYNE EVANS, SAINT LOUIS

The Billikens took a major step toward a second consecutive Atlantic 10 title thanks to Evans' play in a key 64-62 win over VCU. Evans had 21 points and 10 rebounds against the Rams as the Billikens moved to 10-0 in the league.

KENNEDY MEEKS, NORTH CAROLINA

JORDAN BACHYNSKI, ARIZONA STATE

Arizona finally ran into a defensive force that could match the Wildcats. Bachynski had eight blocks in a 69-66 double overtime upset of the Wildcats on Friday night. The big man helped Arizona State on the offensive end with 13 points, including 7-of-11 free throw shooting.

JABARI BROWN, MISSOURI

The Tigers' guard kept Missouri in NCAA contention this week with key wins over Arkansas and Tennessee. Brown had 24 points in a 75-70 win over Tennessee on Saturday and 25 points in Thursday's 86-85 victory over Arkansas. Brown's basket with 12.2 seconds left against the Razorbacks clinched the win.

RAKEEM CHRISTMAS, SYRACUSE


KENNY CHERY, BAYLOR

Weekend on Tap

SATURDAY, FEB. 22

LOUISVILLE AT CINCINNATI

The Cardinals and Bearcats continue to battle for the American Athletic Conference title, and the final regular-season matchup between the two could be the key game. Cincinnati won the first meeting on the road thanks to Sean Kilpatrick's 28 points. Since then, Louisville has made easy work of the bottom half of the AAC. The Cardinals would like to get off to a good start in a stretch that includes road trips to Cincinnati, Memphis and SMU and the regular-season finale at home against UConn.

WISCONSIN AT IOWA

The Badgers have returned to their early season form, thanks to the inside-out duo of Frank Kaminsky and Ben Brust and an improved perimeter defense. Iowa remains one of the most consistent teams in the country, but the first meeting between these two teams was not one of the Hawkeyes' finest moments. Coach Fran McCaffery was ejected and subsequently suspended for a game due to an on-court tirade.

TEXAS TECH AT OKLAHOMA STATE

The game is notable for the return of Marcus Smart from his three-game suspension, oddly enough against the same team Smart faced during the spectator-pushing incident that drew national attention. Oklahoma State needs Smart to play like the All-American he was earlier in the season in the worst way. The Cowboys have been one of the most disappointing teams in the Big 12, both before and during his suspension.

ST. JOHN'S AT VILLANOVA

The Red Storm have come a long way from the team that lost to the Wildcats 74-67 back on Jan. 11. That version of St. John's opened Big East play 0-5. Since then, St. John's has played to its talent level to move into NCAA Tournament contention. D'Angelo Harrison, who was suspended at the end of last season, has been on fire for St. John's. Villanova, meanwhile, is looking to reassert itself in the Big East after losing to Creighton for the second time this season.

BAYLOR AT WEST VIRGINIA

A month or two ago, no one would have pinpointed this as a key game between NCAA Tournament bubble teams. Baylor went into a slump to start Big 12 play, while West Virginia has played itself into contention thanks to some major wins in conference play. A key battle will be between the two point guards. The Mountaineers' Juwan Staten is a high-volume scorer, while the Bears' Kenny Chery is a week removed from a triple-double against Kansas State.

KANSAS STATE AT OKLAHOMA

The coaching matchup alone provides two great stories, as Kansas State's Bruce Weber and Oklahoma's Lon Kruger have settled in nicely in the Big 12. Don't forget that both of these teams have been major surprises this season despite being led by freshman point guards. K-State's Marcus Foster gets overshadowed in the Big 12, but he's as productive as any rookie in the league. OU's Jordan Woodard has shown a nice ability to get the weapons around him involved.

MINNESOTA AT OHIO STATE

This game will be worth watching mainly due to the matchup between the best on-ball defender in the country in Aaron Craft for Ohio State and Minnesota's active guards DeAndre Mathieu and Andre Hollins. Minnesota is still a bubble team, but a win in Columbus would be key for the Gophers' aspirations to play in March.

SYRACUSE AT DUKE

Conference realignment has decimated traditions in college basketball, but a series between Syracuse and Duke is one of the pleasant developments for hoops fans. The Orange won the first meeting 91-89 in overtime in a classic in the Carrier Dome. Duke's fantastic freshman Jabari Parker spent most of the game in foul trouble, so he'll be looking to reassert himself in the rematch. Meanwhile, Syracuse point guard Tyler Ennis has established himself as the nation's most important freshmen in a year full of high-profile rookies.

TEXAS AT KANSAS

Texas started the week one game behind Kansas in the Big 12 race. Just being within striking distance of the Jayhawks is a major victory for the Longhorns this season. The Horns have the big men in Cameron Ridley and Jonathan Holmes to counter Kansas' frontcourt, especially if Jayhawks freshman Joel Embiid continues to be hampered by injuries.

SUNDAY, FEB. 23

MICHIGAN STATE AT MICHIGAN

The Michigan schools are atop the Big Ten, but that's hard to believe after both lost at home last Sunday. It's tough to figure whose situation is more dire. Michigan State remains beset by injuries and hardly looked the part of a Final Four contender in a 60-51 loss to Nebraska. Michigan has struggled to find offensive consistency, losing three of its last five. This is a marquee matchup in the Big Ten, and an important game for two teams hoping to get on a roll in the final weeks of the regular season.

Ask the Editors

Is Parker the best of the rest?

Assuming Doug McDermott will win National Player of the Year honors, who would be No. 2 on your ballot?

Mitch Light: This was very difficult. I went with Jabari Parker because he does so much for Duke. The freshman from Chicago quickly emerged as the Blue Devils' primary option, and he leads the team in scoring (19.5 ppg) and rebounding (8.5). Parker is Duke's only consistent threat on the low block, and he is also a weapon on the perimeter due to his ability to handle the ball and shoot from 3-point range. Mike Krzyzewski's team features some nice front-end talent but isn't loaded with future NBA players and lacks depth. Parker's presence makes Duke a threat to win the national title; without him, the Blue Devils would struggle to make the top 25.

David Fox: Good thing McDermott is a virtual lock for National Player of the Year because the rest of the race would be a jumble. I tend to favor players whose teams would be lost without them. That leads me to Sean Kilpatrick at Cincinnati. The Bearcats get perpetually overlooked because they play a soft non-conference schedule, and they're generally a low-scoring, defensive-minded team. Without Kilpatrick, Cincinnati would be lucky to be in contention for the NIT.

Braden Gall: Obviously, there really isn't a clear challenger to McDermott. Iowa State's Melvin Ejim was my first thought but one could argue (although I wouldn't) that he isn't the most important player on his own team. Sean Kilpatrick and Shabazz Napier carry their teams offensively for Cincinnati and UConn, respectively, while Russ Smith plays a similar role for Louisville in the American Athletic Conference. That said, No. 2 on my ballot will come from the winner of the Syracuse-Duke game in Durham this weekend. If the Orange complete the sweep over Duke, my vote would go to C.J. Fair — aka, the best player on the best team in the nation. If Duke can continue to surge up the polls and beats Syracuse, my vote would go to

Name a team that wasn't on the bubble two weeks ago that can make the NCAA Tournament.

Light: West Virginia still has some work to do, but it's quite remarkable that we are talking about this team possibly earning an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament. The Mountaineers have won four of their last six to improve their record to 15-11 overall and 7-6 in the very tough Big 12. They have four wins against top-50 RPI teams, highlighted by a 102-77 beatdown vs. Iowa State on Feb. 10. Nine of WVU's 11 losses have come against top-50 RPI teams, and the two that did not occur in November (Virginia Tech) and December (Purdue). Bob Huggins' team plays three of its final five regular-season games at home, including a

huge home game against Kansas on March 8. The opportunity is there for this team to make the NCAAs.

Fox: If Nebraska can continue its hot streak in the final month of the season, the Cornhuskers could make a late push for an NCAA Tournament bid. There's little room for error, though. This team lost to Creighton and UMass early in the season and then endured a six-game losing streak. But Tim Miles' team is one of the most improved in the country since then, defeating Ohio State and Indiana at home and then shocking Michigan State on the road. Terran Petteway has proven himself to be a 30-point player when called upon. He and the Huskers are capable of stringing together a winning streak against the lower tier of the Big Ten to set up a huge regular-season finale in Lincoln against Wisconsin.
