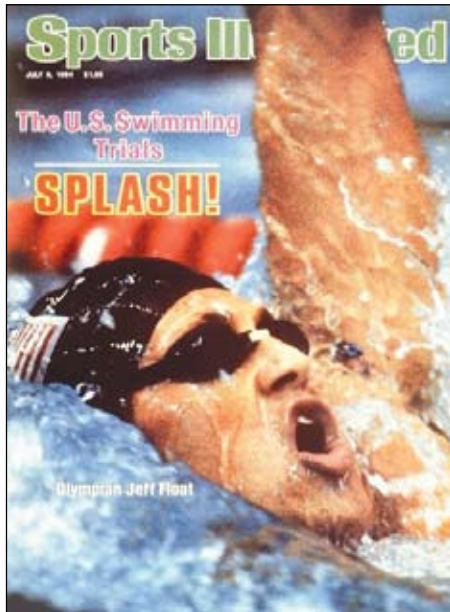

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Gold River Racquet Club's Aquatics Director/Head Coach Jeff Float was inducted into the Sacramento Sports Hall of Fame during a celebration held on Saturday, January 25th, at Thunder Valley Casino & Resort. Rancho Cordova Will Save Energy with New Street Lights

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - The City of Rancho Cordova has started replacing all existing 4,800 street lights with new light emitting diode (LED) lights.

LED street lights have three primary advantages. The lights save as much as 60% on energy costs and can last four times as long, reducing City maintenance costs by 80% or more. LED lights reduce light pollution and save around 500 tons of greenhouse gas emissions each year. The new LED lights can also project white light instead of orange or red light, allowing drivers and pedestrians to more easily see objects in their path and increasing traffic safety.

LED street lights are currently being replaced on all major roadways. Pacific Excavation crews began at the southern City boundary and will work their way to the north.

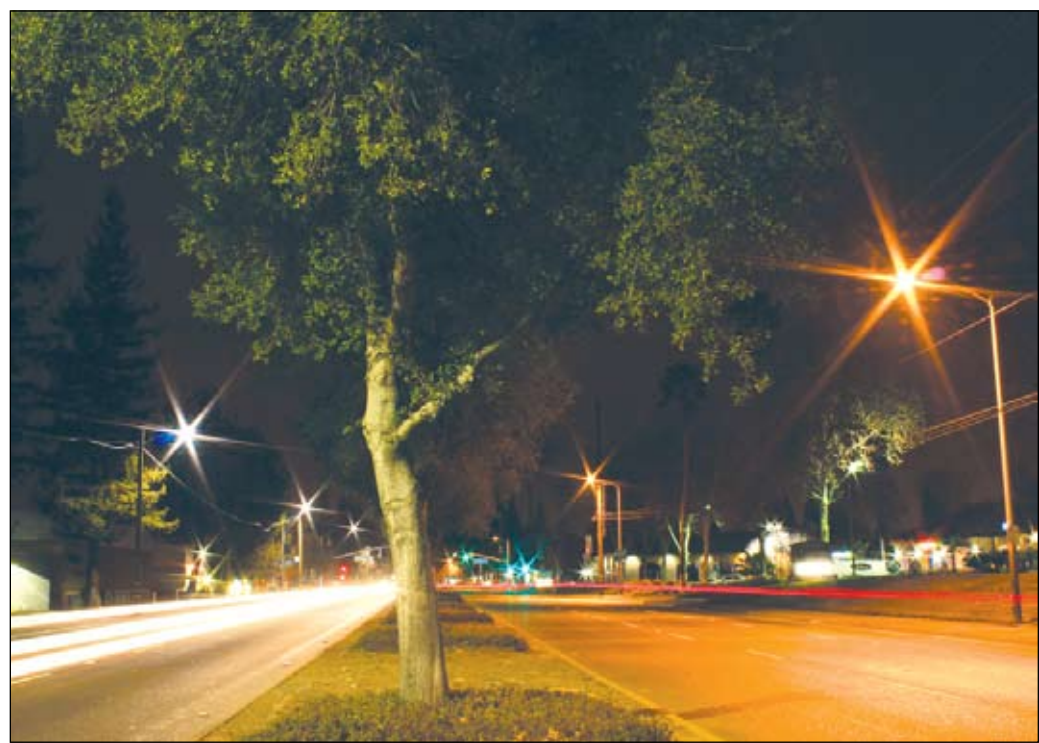
Following this work, two residential neighborhoods -- Sunriver and

Sunridge -- will serve as test locations to ensure that new lights provide adequate lighting and to receive resident feedback.

Work on major roadways and in test neighborhoods is anticipated to be completed by mid-February. Beginning in March, work will move to other residential neighborhoods. There should be little or no impact on traffic, but drivers are encouraged to decrease speeds and drive with caution when work crews are present.

The project is being funded with a \$1.8 million low-interest loan from the California Energy Commission (CEC) and more than \$100,000 in energy efficiency incentives from SMUD. The energy cost savings will pay back the CEC loan within 10 years.

Bera and Republican Colleague Offer “No Labels” Response to State of the Union Address

WASHINGTON, DC, (MPG) - Congressman Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-7) joined his fellow No Labels Problem Solver Republican Congressman Chris Gibson (NY-19) to deliver the No Labels State of the Union response, featured on Real Clear Politics.

Bera and Gibson wore orange lapel pins to the State of the Union to identify themselves as No Labels’ Problem Solvers, a group of more than 70 Members from both parties working across the aisle to build trust and find common ground. They have signed on to the No Labels campaign to create a national strategic agenda—a shared vision for this country that’s based on goals that both sides of the political divide develop together before the hard work of policymaking begins.

more than half a million citizens across the country, as well as 88 members of Congress -- Republicans, Democrats, and independents -- who are members of the No Labels Problem Solvers coalition. The congressional coalition, which meets regularly, is the only forum for bipartisan problem solving on Capitol Hill. No Labels has proposed numerous common-sense reforms and legislative initiatives including No Budget, No Pay, a version of which was passed by Congress and signed into law last year.

Congressman Ami Bera, M.D. represents Sacramento County. Born and raised in California, Bera is a physician and the only Indian American currently serving in Congress. 

suffered spinal meningitis that rendered him with a substantial hearing impairment. Partially due to sedentary speech lessons, Jeff exuded nonstop energy ... so much so that Arden Hills’ Olympic Coach Sherm Chavoor agreed with his parents: “The kid’s got potential!” Motivation, determination and distance training led to membership on the .80 Olympic Swimming Team bound for Moscow, only to be boycotted by US political Powers That Be. Jeff kept churning water, earned a spot on the .84 LA team and was named Team Captain by his peers. Touched out for the bronze in the 200m freestyle, the next day he and his 4x200m relay teammates were pitted against the indomitable West Germans. In what is known as “The Perfect Race,” our fierce foursome thrashed their way first to the wall ... and into Olympic history. Their astounding finish, by 4/100ths of a second, is far less than the blink of an eye. Jeff and his teammates then climbed atop the Olympic podium, accepted their Gold Medals, belted out The Star-Spangled Banner and proceeded with lives that were

changed forever.

From an exciting past to a rewarding future, “Coach” Jeff has been employed by Spare Time Inc. for nearly two decades. UCP Receives Grant From Bill Graham Memorial Foundation To Fund Music Project

SACRAMENTO AND PLACER REGION, CA (MPG) - UCP of Sacramento and Northern California has received a \$1,000 grant from Bill Graham Memorial Foundation to support its adult day program music project for adults with developmental disabilities. The grant allows UCP to purchase musical instruments that can be played with one hand, as well as sheet music, CDs, a karaoke machine and more.

“We have participants with developmental disabilities who can’t speak in sentences, but they can sing,” said Doug Bergman, UCP president and CEO. “Music is a universal language, and we are grateful to the Bill Graham Memorial Foundation for recognizing how much music can empower the people in our adult day programs to live life without limits.”

UCP’s adult day programs

serve hundreds of participants with developmental disabilities, many of whom also have a physical disability that requires additional support. The programs help participants develop skills and encourage individual choice. These skills promote an independent lifestyle and contribute to making the participant an active member of the community. Instruction includes personal choices, decision making and problem solving, communication skills and assistive devices, basic reading and math skills, financial management, cooking and nutrition, mobility, computer skills, physical health and well-being, wheelchair aerobics, community integration, social development, leisure activities, self-advocacy, access to community support systems and functional living skills.

UCP’s music project takes place at the North Highlands

adult day program, where 150 participants have been learning to play instruments and sing. This grant will help purchase additional equipment so the project can expand and eventually give participants the chance to perform for other people.

Each month, UCP of Sacramento and Northern California serves 3,800 children and adults with developmental disabilities and their families in Butte, El Dorado, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, Shasta, Sutter and Yolo counties. Programs include Saddle Pals, UCP’s Autism Center for Excellence at Sacramento State, adult day programs, independent living services, transportation and in-home respite care for families. EARLY HUNTING

Deer, duck, and upland hunting seasons are over and the spring turkey hunting season is still a number of weeks away. You can’t even go mushroom hunting yet, but you can go shed hunting.

From a practical standpoint, hunting sheds is a tremendous aid in hunting the deer that grew them. Finding shed antlers in your hunting area in February and March can tell you a great deal about the number and quality of bucks you are likely to see during next hunting season.

Look for sheds where animals are feeding and around water. Brushy ravines are also a good place to look. Be aware that some states classify sheds as animal parts that require a tag just as if you’d hunted them during open season, so check the game regulations in your state.

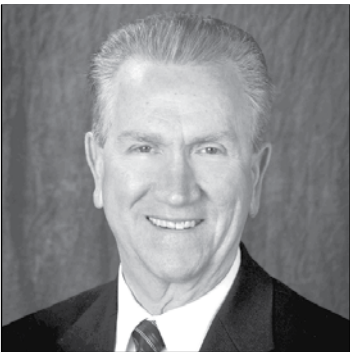

According to CNN, USA Today, and the Wikipedia Encyclopedia, the number of members of Congress who have an active duty military service background is down from 80% in 1977 to 19% today. Does that have anything to do with the way Congress is treating the members of our Military today? Personally, I have no doubt that it does.

According to the information I received from Congresswoman Doris Matsui’s office, December’s budget deal forged by Rep. Paul Ryan, R-Wis., and Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., reduced the cost of living adjustment (COLA) to military retired pay by 1 percent for retirees under 62. The COLA reduction is expected to save the federal government \$6 billion over 10 years but has met with strong

opposition from military advocacy groups, active duty, retired personnel, and many members of Congress.

The cuts were designed to affect only retirees younger than 62 and will be phased in slowly. After you reach the age of 62, the retiree’s pension goes up to what it was without the COLA reduction. Retired Veterans who are in their thirties and forties, I guess, don’t need to keep up with the cost of living until they are 62. The legislation affects Military Family Housing and Military Medical Facilities. Like all legislation, it is very long and time consuming, and rather than trying to put all of it into the “Grapevine Independent,” it will be easier for you to bring up the website address: <http://appropriations.house.gov>.

Our population today is 317,560,000, and the newest figure I have been able to gather so far is there were 22.1 million Veterans as of 2009, and that includes both active and retired Veterans. Part of the legislation I mentioned earlier, includes \$140

million that is supposed to help the Veterans Administration meet its goal of ending the disability compensation claims backlog by 2015. It is a nice goal and I hope for our Veterans’s sake it can be reached.

Congress also seems to be trying to save money by cutting some of the finances that in the past went to the Employment Development Department (EDD). That information came from Assemblyman Ken Cooley’s office and as of now, the State budget is in the process of coming up with State money to replace the EDD cuts. Cutting 300 employees from the EDD definitely doesn’t help them help the people who depend on unemployment while looking for a job.

Be sure to contact your federal and State “hired public servants” and let them know what is important to you. ★

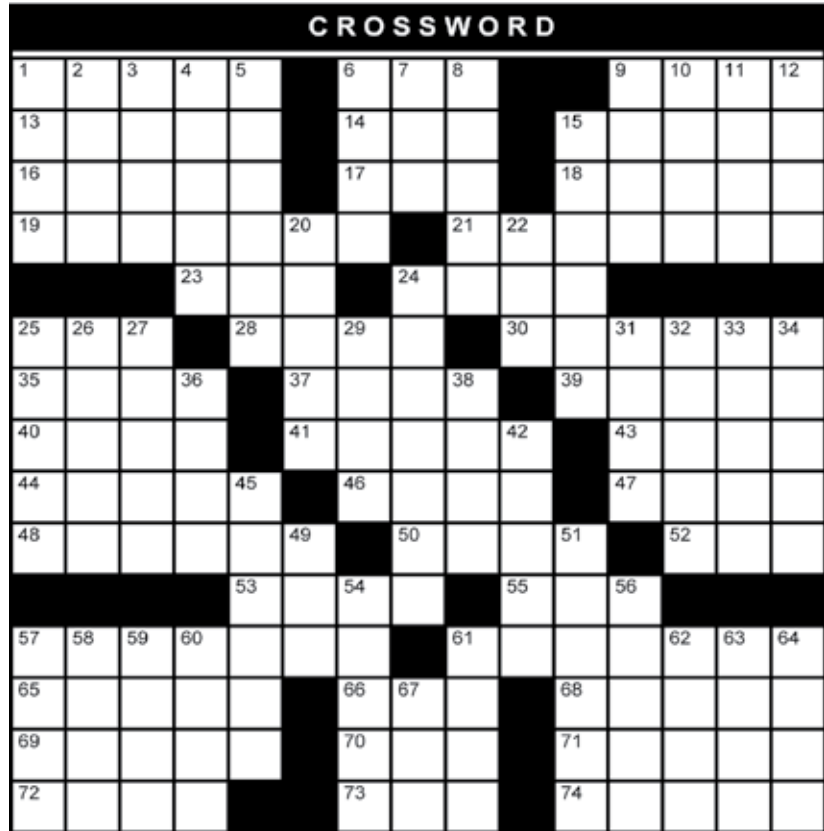

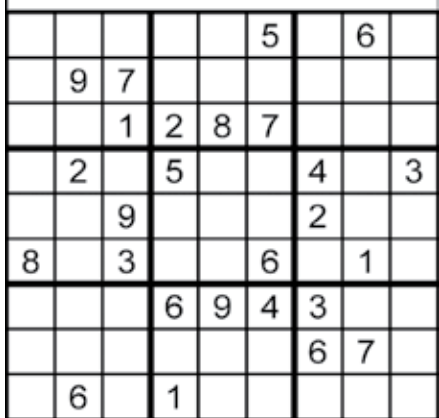

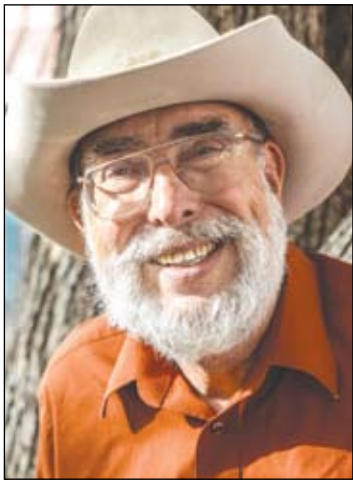

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - One Capital Athletic League game at a time is the motto for the Cordova High School boys basketball team.

The visiting Eagles soared to 39-34 scoring advantage in the second half to give the Lancers a scare.

“El Camino started playing a lot better in the second half,” Johnson said. “They had unforced

errors, throwing the ball away. In the second half, they came out ready to play.”

The key in the game was the Lancers’ athleticism, Johnson felt.

“We have a little more athleticism, but they have the size,” said Johnson of the Eagles’ roster.

Behind Roberson in scoring was guard Nathaniel Hendrix with 14 points, JaQuan Lewis nine, Alex Yakimchuk eight, CJ Coles seven, Chris Johnson and Marquis Bolden six points each, Nate Medina four and DeMario Newman two.

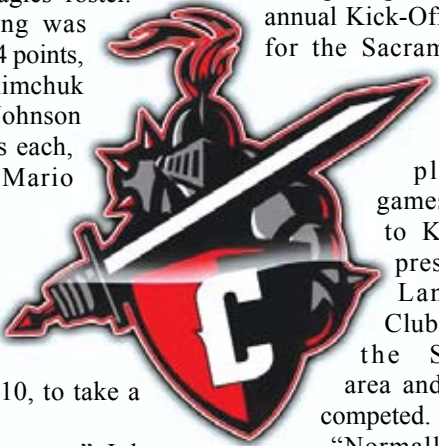
Cordova 71, Rio Americano 49

TREVEON GRAHAM, VCU

Graham scored a career-high 34 points and grabbed 12 rebounds to lead VCU to a 97-89 win over La Salle in double-overtime on Saturday in Philadelphia. Graham, a junior guard, sent the game into overtime by scoring the final six points of regulation, and he also scored six of the Rams' seven points in the first overtime. His 34 points are the most scored by a VCU player in the five-year Shaka Smart era.

JAMES SIAKAM, VANDERBILT

Siakam scored a career-high 22 points and tied an SEC career high with 10 rebounds in the Commodores' 66-55 win at Texas A&M. A junior forward from Cameroon, Siakam converted 6-of-10 from the field and 10-of-13 from the foul line to lead the Commodores to their first road win of the season. His previous career high in an SEC game was nine points in a win over Missouri two weeks ago.

ANDREW WIGGINS, KANSAS

Wiggins played perhaps the finest game of his young career, scoring 27 points — including 19 in the first half — as Kansas avenged a shocking loss at TCU last season by pounding the Horned Frogs 91-69 in Fort Worth. Wiggins, a potential No. 1 overall pick in the 2014 NBA Draft, connected on 8-of-13 from the field and 9-of-10 from the foul line, and added five points and five rebounds. Wiggins, often criticized for his lack of aggression, has attempted 22 free throws in his last two games.

ISAIAH TAYLOR, TEXAS

Taylor, a freshman point guard, penetrated through the Baylor defense time and again en route to a career-high 27 points to lead Texas to a 74-60 win over slumping Baylor in Austin. The Longhorns, coming off the first losing season of the Rick Barnes era, improved to 16-4 overall and 5-2 in the Big 12. They have won three straight games over a ranked opponent for the first time in school history.

NIK STAUSKAS, MICHIGAN

Stauskas is making a strong push for Big Ten Player of the Year honors. The sharpshooting Canadian averaged 22.5 points last week as Michigan posted huge wins against Iowa in Ann Arbor and Michigan State in East Lansing. A 6'6" guard, Stauskas hit 5-of-6 from 3-point range and scored 19 points in the Wolverines' comeback win over Michigan State on Saturday. He is averaging 19.0 points and shooting 44.4 percent from three in Big Ten games.

NIGEL WILLIAMS-GOSS, WASHINGTON

Williams-Goss poured in a career-high 32 points — on only 15 field goal attempts — to help Washington rally from 12 points down in the second half to beat Oregon State 87-81 in Seattle. A freshman guard from Oregon, Williams-Goss hit 10-of-15 from the field (including 3-of-4 from three) and 9-of-10 from the foul line.

JABARI PARKER, DUKE

Parker enjoyed a productive three-day stretch, averaging 17.5 points and 12.5 rebounds as Duke beat Florida State at home and Pittsburgh on the road. The freshman struggled from the field against Florida State (3-of-13 shooting) but contributed 10 offensive rebounds. He bounced back Monday night against Pitt by scoring 21 points.

TERRAN PETTEWAY, NEBRASKA

Petteway, a transfer from Texas Tech, scored a career-best 35 points on 10-of-15 shooting and added six rebounds and three assists in Nebraska's 82-78 win over Minnesota in Lincoln. A 6'6" swingman, Petteway is averaging 18.2 points and 5.4 rebounds for the Cornhuskers after averaging only 3.1 points as a freshman for Texas Tech two years ago.

RYAN SPANGLER, OKLAHOMA

Spangler transferred back to his native Oklahoma after a one-year stop at Gonzaga, and he played a huge role in the Sooners' 88-76 win over rival Oklahoma State. Spangler scored 15 points and grabbed a game-high 17 rebounds to lead OU to its sixth Big 12 win of the season.

BRUCE COTTON, PROVIDENCE

Surging Providence, winners of five straight games, is getting great play from Cotton, a senior guard who averaged 21.5 points and 6.5 assists (without committing a turnover) in the Friars' wins over Butler and Xavier last week. Cotton has played every minute of each of the last five games, including 50 in a double-overtime win at St. John's two weeks ago.

Stauskas thriving for Michigan

Who is your favorite player in college basketball to watch?

David Fox: Pretty much any of the top freshmen are appointment viewing because the week-to-week stock report for Jabari Parker, Andrew Wiggins, Julius Randle, Aaron Gordon — and now Tyler Ennis and Joel Embiid — is the story of the season. I'll tune in to watch Marcus Smart and Doug McDermott any chance I get since this is the last time for both to star in college. But perhaps the most fun player to watch in the last few weeks has been Nik Stauskas at Michigan. Stauskas wears his enjoyment of the game on his sleeve. In the absence of Marshall Henderson being the Marshall Henderson of old this season, I'll take the Canadian guard blowing kisses to the crowd after Michigan's signature win of the season at Michigan State.

Mitch Light: This one is a bit off the radar — Minnesota point guard Deandre Mathieu. Listed very generously at 5-9, Mathieu has been terrific for the Golden Gophers in his first year out of the junior college ranks. One of the quickest guards in the nation, Mathieu is averaging 11.6 points (while shooting over 50 percent from the field) and 4.3 assists for Richard Pitino's team. The Knoxville, Tenn., native basically went unrecruited out of high school and ended up at Morehead State as a walk-on. After one season with the Eagles, he transferred to Central Arizona College, where he earned first-team junior college All-America honors. Pitino, searching for quick guards to run his up-tempo attack, signed Mathieu in early May — a move that has worked out very well for both parties.

Braden Gall: There has been so much talk about the elite collection of freshman superstars this season — and rightly so, because it's fantastic. But the guy who might be the first player I would take to start my college (not NBA) team would be Oklahoma State's Marcus Smart. A powerful point guard who can defend any player in the nation if need be on one end of the court and can score/facilitate at will on the other is

the rarest of rare commodities. Smart is the guy I love to watch.

Name a team outside the top 25 that could make a run to the Sweet 16 or Elite Eight.

Fox: I'm going to pick a team that's done little to deserve anyone's vote of confidence in an office pool: Gonzaga. True, the Bulldogs have disappointed when it comes to March, no more than last season when the No. 1 seed Zags didn't even reach the Sweet 16. That said, I like the way Gonzaga has flown under the radar this season. The schedule hasn't been as tough as it's been in recent years, but the Bulldogs still look like a team ready for a late run this season. Gary Bell Jr. and Sam Dower are getting healthy, and Mark Few has a standout inside-outside duo in point guard Kevin Pan-

gos and Przemek Karnowski. In short, Gonzaga is due.

Light: The switch has flipped at Virginia. The Cavaliers were 9-4 overall after a shocking 35-point loss at Tennessee in late December. They proceeded to win six of their first seven games in the ACC, with the only loss by four points at Duke. Not surprisingly, this team is getting it done on the defensive end of the floor. The Cavs lead the ACC in defensive efficiency, allowing only 0.87 points per possession in league play, and they have been very good defending the 3-point shot. Offensively, Virginia's numbers aren't gaudy because it plays at a slow pace, but Joe Harris, Malcolm Brogdon and Justin Anderson are solid weapons who are capable of scoring 15 to 20 points in any given game.

SATURDAY, FEB. 1

OHIO STATE AT WISCONSIN

Ohio State played its way out of the Big Ten title race by losing four straight games in mid-January, but Thad Matta's team is still dangerous. Defensively, the Buckeyes are as good as any team in the league; it's on the offensive end of the court where they struggle. Wisconsin, on the other hand, has been terrific on offense and mediocre (at best) on defense. The Badgers need to win this game to remain a threat in the Big Ten.

KENTUCKY AT MISSOURI

After sweeping a three-game homestand with little difficulty, Kentucky must now prove it can win on the road with trips to LSU and Missouri this week. The Wildcats own a distinct advantage in the paint, but Mizzou boasts a talented collection of perimeter players. Jabari Brown, the SEC's leading scorer, will pose a challenge for Kentucky's young perimeter players.

BAYLOR AT OKLAHOMA STATE

It's time to panic in Waco. The Bears, who beat Colorado and Kentucky in non-conference action, dropped to 1-5 in the Big 12 with a loss at home to Texas on Saturday. This team is too good to be flirting with an NIT bid. Oklahoma State's situation isn't as dire as Baylor's, but the Cowboys have lost two of their last three games and struggled to beat West Virginia at home.

MEMPHIS AT SMU

It hasn't taken long for Larry Brown, now in his second season, to make SMU relevant on the national scene. The Mustangs improved to 16-4 overall and 5-2 in the AAC with a 75-68 win over Houston on Sunday. This visit from Memphis on Saturday figures to be the most anticipated home game for the program in decades. The Tigers have been inconsistent, but Josh Pastner's team has all the right pieces — talented young players, veteran leadership, solid guard play and quality big men.

MICHIGAN STATE VS. GEORGETOWN

Michigan State steps out of Big Ten play for a trip to Madison Square Garden to play a Georgetown team that has lost five games in row. The Hoyas, thought by many to be a legitimate Big East title contender, slipped to 3-6 in the league with a loss at home to Villanova on Monday night. When healthy, Michigan State is arguably the best team in the country. The Spartans, however, have not been healthy in weeks.

OKLAHOMA AT IOWA STATE

The Sooners extended their winning streak to four games with an 11-point win over rival Oklahoma State on Monday night. Iowa State has a difficult week ahead of it; before this date with Oklahoma in Ames, the Cyclones make the trip to Kansas to play the Jayhawks on Wednesday night.

KANSAS AT TEXAS

Texas continues to be one of the nation's biggest surprises. The Longhorns lost their top four scorers from the worst team of the Rick Barnes era, yet somehow find themselves among the upper echelon of the Big 12 with a 5-2 mark in league play. Kansas, of course, remains the team to beat. The Jayhawks, loaded with elite talent, are 6-0 in the Big 12 and appear to be getting better every game.

DUKE AT SYRACUSE

It's the first meeting for these two schools as members of the ACC, and it's the first trip for Duke to the Carrier Dome. The Blue Devils have the outside shooting to attack the Orange's zone defense, but the Blue Devils will have a tough time controlling Syracuse point guard Tyler Ennis. He's not the flashiest freshman — and he didn't arrive with the most hype — but Ennis might be the best freshman in college basketball this season.

ARIZONA AT CALIFORNIA

Arizona is 20-0 overall, and it's hard to find a potential loss in the final six weeks of the regular season. This trip to California, however, should be a bit tricky. The Golden Bears won their first five Pac-12 games before losing two straight last week at USC and UCLA. Mike Montgomery's team is solid on both sides of the court and has some nice veteran leadership in the form of senior guard Justin Cobbs and senior big man Richard Solomon. It would not be wise to pick against Arizona, but don't be shocked if this game goes down to the wire.

SUNDAY, FEB. 2

VIRGINIA AT PITTSBURGH

Virginia has been one of the most impressive teams through the first month of the ACC season. Pittsburgh has been piling up the wins, but the Panthers have yet to beat a team that is a lock to play in the NCAA Tournament. This is an important game for both teams.

MICHIGAN AT INDIANA

Michigan is fresh off one of the best eight-day stretches in school history. The Wolverines sandwiched wins at Wisconsin and Michigan State around a win at home against Iowa. This team is 7-0 in the Big Ten — and has done it without preseason All-American Mitch McGary. Indiana, treading water in the tough Big Ten, has a win over Wisconsin (at home) on its résumé, but the Hoosiers sure could use another quality victory to impress the selection committee.

Watt Avenue US-50 Interchange Project

Traffic Increase Anticipated - Starting in January

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Department of Transportation (SACDOT) is alerting motorists that there will be increased traffic at the Watt Avenue @ US-50 interchange beginning on Monday, January 27. It is anticipated that the volume of traffic using the interchange will increase as the new school year begins for California State University Sacramento. Motorists are advised to expect an increase in driving time through the interchange. In addition – because the interchange area is an active construction zone – motorists are advised to reduce speed and drive carefully through the construction area.

Since construction began in November 2012, much progress has been made on all phases of the interchange project. The following provides an update on major project elements:

- New Off-Ramps and Traffic

Signals: New freeway off-ramps have been constructed and new traffic signals at those off-ramps have been activated.

- Improved Traffic Flow: In mid-December the changeover to the new off-ramps initially caused an increase in congestion. Since then some project elements have been advanced to improve the flow of traffic through the interchange. These elements include: 1) Two new traffic lanes on northbound Watt Avenue; 2) One new lane on southbound Watt Avenue; 3) One new lane on the westbound off-ramp; 4) Retiming of the two new traffic signals; 4) The coordination of the two traffic signals; 5) Communications improvements to permit monitoring of traffic conditions and enable “real time” changes to signal operation to ease traffic congestion.
- New Center Bridge Structure: A new center bridge structure is now complete, and provides additional pavement area for

traffic lanes and a Bus-Rapid-Transit (BRT) lane.

- Bicycle/Pedestrian Pathway: Construction of a separated pathway for bicycles and pedestrians is underway. Two concrete undercrossings have been constructed, along with portions of the pathway.

Completed Project: The completed project will provide: a reduction in overall delay through the interchange; much easier and safer access on and off the freeway for all motorists; dedicated transit facilities; and, improved access and safety for bicyclists and pedestrians.

Anticipated Project Completion: It is anticipated that the project will be completed by midsummer, 2014.

Patience is Appreciated: The patience and cooperation of the traveling public is appreciated as work to construct the interchange project continues. ★
