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Back to 'Simpler Times'

Wooddale Way Block Party Unifies Neighborhood

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - On May 21, 2022, the Wooddale Way neighborhood off Old Auburn in Citrus Heights, came out in force once again for their 10th (nearly) annual 'block party.' The fact that Covid had forced a two-year break in the event disappeared as neighbors arrived as if no time had passed. Traditionally a July event, the date was changed this year to beat the hot weather. The neighborhood is located behind the former C Bar C Ranch on land that has seen several lifetimes of change in almost five decades.

Families living on the blocks surrounding the Fullmers arrived

bearing their favorite potluck dish to share with those they see every day, new friends they are about to meet, and those they have not seen for years. Thanks to bright name tags, many quickly picked up where they left off.

Lamar and wife Van, now both 80, have lived in their home on Wooddale since 1975. The block party tradition began in 2010, the result of a lifetime of living in Citrus Heights. Lamar had moved to Citrus Heights as a child in 1945. His family lived in a house on Greenback Lane. He attended kindergarten at the old Community Center (the old schoolhouse), Sylvan Middle School, and San Juan High School. He

remembered the simpler life when Greenback was a two-lane dirt road with huge oak trees forming an arch across the road. Sunrise was a gravel road which ended at Greenback.

When he and his wife retired in 2004, Lamar was looking for a way to recapture some of the simpler life he missed.

The first block party, with 10 families and 15 children, has grown to over 40 families with 32 children. All of their children have attended Woodside School. All ages, ethnicities and family structure are represented. This annual homecoming has brought their neighborhood together in ways that span the entire

New Wine, Spirits Bottle Recycling Bill Clears

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Senate voted on May 25, 2022, unanimously to approve legislation written by Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins,

Senate President pro Tempore Toni G. Atkins, D-San Diego, and co-written by Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, to add wine and distilled spirits bottles to California's recycling program.

"I am really pleased that so many of our Senate colleagues recognized the importance of this common sense bill that benefits our environment and consumers," Sen. Dodd said. "With SB 1013 we can increase the recycling rates of millions of bottles that would otherwise wind up in our landfills or be illegally discarded. I look forward to seeing this bill with all its benefits for California pass the Assembly and be signed by Gov. Newsom."

"SB 1013 is historic change that is 40 years in the making," Pro Tem Atkins said. "I want to commend the wine industry, distilled spirits industry, environmental advocates, and other groups who have come together to support this landmark proposal. We will continue working with stakeholders as the bill moves through the Assembly to make sure remaining concerns are addressed, and then, hopefully, 2022 will be the year we can pop a cork and celebrate this overdue improvement to California's recycling law."

The California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act, established in 1986, encourages consumers to recycle beverage containers by requiring them to pay a deposit for eligible bottles. According to a 2019 report, curbside programs received approximately \$172 million from the so-called Bottle Bill in 2017, including \$15 million that is annually provided from the Beverage Container Recycling Fund.

Although the program includes beer, it does not include wine or spirits. It is estimated that California generates more than 500 million wine and spirits bottles each year, with less than 30% being recycled and over 300 million wine and spirits bottles going into landfills. Under Senate Bill 1013, wine and spirits bottles would be added to the program, leading to more recycling, increased Continued on page 3

Council Identifies Priorities and Makes Plans for ARPA Funding

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - At the May 26 meeting of the Citrus Heights City Council, City Manager Ashley Feeney presented priorities and needs recently identified through outreach to citizens and community groups. These priorities were organized into four Focus Area Strategic Objectives that support the City's established Three-Year Goals-and which can be implemented within the next six months. The four focus areas are Community Image, Economic Development, Community Connection, Infrastructure a n d Maintenance.

The focus areas can be used as a work plan to help guide the allocation of the City's remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding. Feeney said the ARPA funding gives the City an "opportunity to fund some one-time investments that could really pay

dividends in the future." By investing now, the City could see "meaningful, immediate results and really turn the tide" on some challenges within the community, said Feeney.

Residents are concerned about Community Image, with homeless encampments and blight identified as major concerns. The City plans to seek greater enforcement jurisdiction to address blight and crime on private property, as well as applying for crime prevention grants to bolster their efforts.

A beautification crew could be implemented within the city, which would be dedicated to removing illegal encampments on public property and clearing debris and obstructions from public right of ways. Feeney said these actions will increase public safety and create an aesthetic benefit that will improve quality of life in Citrus Heights.

The City is also looking into pursuing legal

avenues, such as conservatorships to compel chronic nuisance offenders to seek necessary mental health or drug treatment.

Another aspect of the Community Image is ensuring a clean and welcoming city. Feeney said new signage and marketing to reinforce shared goals of community pride and cleanliness could help residents remember that they must also do their part to maintain their properties and avoid littering on city streets.

To increase Economic Development opportunities, Feeney said the City could consider funding a **Business Attraction Grant** Program as well as establishing a fund designated for low-interest loans for existing businesses. As the City looks at the revitalization of the Sunrise Mall, finding ways to bring down the financial risk would attract businesses to the area and incentivize the redevelopment.

After the isolation and

disconnection of the pandemic lockdowns, many residents are looking for Community Connection. Feeney said that encouraging public participation in events and activities will strengthen the city. The City can facilitate more participation in Council meetings as well as support neighborhood projects and community block parties.

Infrastructure
Maintenance will involve
improvements and modernization along the
city's roadways, such as
refreshing vegetation and
replacing old signage. The
City can also pursue infrastructure grants and use
ARPA funds for the matching funds.

Mesa Verde Boy's Volleyball Season **Ends in First Round of Playoffs**

Mavericks lose 3-1 to Vanden



FAIRFIELD, CA (MPG) - The 2022 Mesa Verde High School boy's varsity volleyball season came to an end on May 3 with a 3-1 loss at Vanden of Fairfield in the first round of the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division III Boys Volleyball Playoffs.

The Mavericks (14-13, 7-3 Golden Empire League) came into the postseason as big underdogs, matched up as the No. 14 seed with the No. 3 seeded Vikings (19-4, 10-0 Sierra Delta). However, that did not prevent Mesa Verde from winning the first set of the match. The Mavericks came out aggressive and were victorious in the first set, 25-19, surprising Vanden and

their fans. The Vikings stormed back in the second set, prevailing 25-10 in dominant fashion. Vanden completed the gentlemen's sweep by winning the third and fourth sets 25-17, respectively, to win the match. The Vikings were eliminated from the playoffs in the next round two days later after being swept by No. 6 seed Christian Brothers (10-11, 5-5 Capital Athletic).

Two Mesa Verde blockers, middle freshman Matthew Hernandez-Garcia and junior Gabriel Braga, tied for the team-high in kills with four. The Mavericks had 16 total kills combined. Braga had a majority of the team's serving aces with three out of five total. Braga also had most of the team's blocks with two out of three solo blocks and four out of six total blocks.

Freshman libero

the team in digs with 14 as one of three Mesa Verde players to tally digs in the double-digits. Jimenez was followed by senior defensive specialist Mikhael Wilson with 11 digs and Hernandez-Garcia with 10. Senior setter Jovoni Raya recorded 15 assists on 88 ball handling attempts with 11 errors. Jimenez and Braga dominated serve receptions, each with over 20. Jimenez tallied 27 receptions with two errors while Braga recorded 24 receptions with two errors.

The Mavericks will have most of their team returning for next season. Only three of 12 players will be graduating in the Class of 2022. The following seniors will be moving on to college in the fall: Defensive specialist Hoang (Doni) Nguyen, Raya and Wilson.

Kudos to coach Jessica Shoffner and her entire team on a successful season that concluded with a postseason appearance. ★

Continued from page 1 Area Strategic Planning Objectives to "clarify the mission."

Councilmember Jeannie Bruins commended Feeney for the comprehensive report. She said she would support the resolution "to focus and move forward our agenda. I think some of the creative ideas that have come out of this are going to be really well received by the public."

Councilmember Bret Daniels expressed his excitement, stating that Citrus Heights is "taking a turn." He said that while the issues "won't be fixed overnight," Citrus Heights is "about to make a dramatic change. ... We have a different path now. ... It's going to be a different city."

The resolution passed unanimously.

The Council also discussed some more specific ARPA funding recommendations to support those focus areas. The City was awarded a total of \$15.6 million, with \$5.3 million already allocated to restore Citrus Heights Police Department staffing positions and \$320,000 allocated to the Small Business Recovery Grant Program-but those total allocations have not yet been expended and some of that funding remains available. In total, the City has just over \$10 million left to allocate, which must be completed by December 31, 2024, and must be fully spent by the end of 2026.

Feeney explained that some ARPA funding can be quickly allocated to begin addressing the Strategic Objectives.

The Beautification Crew, which would preserve and enhance public safety, could be funded with approximately \$875,000. That would cover the cost of

a two-person crew, a truck outfitted with supplies, and operational expenses. They would address homeless camps, clean up illegal dumps, collect and return abandoned shopping carts, and perform trash removal from open spaces and public right of ways, as well as weed abatement and debris removal along sidewalks and roadways. These would be limited-term positions, funded just during the ARPA spending window, and then the City can revisit if the program is still needed and if any new funding sources are available.

For the estimated cost of \$50,000, a block party trailer could be fully outfitted with tables, chairs, audio, games, and coolers. The trailer would provide the essentials to host neighborhood parties and it would be available for community groups to rent.

Feeney said the CHPD needs vehicle replacements, estimated at \$1.4 million, and \$600,000 could be allocated to modernize the CHPD dispatch center.

Councilmember Daniels said they are moving in the right direction with these priorities by addressing important issues in the community.

Councilmember Steve Miller agreed that these suggestions are a good use of the ARPA funds.

Vice Mayor Tim Schaefer said that as the City takes steps to lead the way on beautification, he encourages residents to step in as well and help "rebuild" the vibrancy of the city.

Specific details on these ARPA funding recommendations will come before the Council as an action item at the June 23 meeting, and they will consider approval of these items at that time.

Continued from page 1 business for recycling centers and reduced processing costs. The expansion would also cut greenhouse gas emissions by almost 200,000 tons of carbon dioxide while reducing litter of wine and spirits containers, a visible and dangerous component of urban litter pollution.

SB1013 is supported by a number of groups including Californians Against Waste, Heal the Bay, California Association of Local Conservation Corps, Monterey Regional Waste Management District, National Stewardship Action Council, Northern

- Exterior walls of Sunrise MarketPlace became the ideal canvas over the Memorial Day weekend for three artists who participated in the annual "Wide Open Walls" festival mural project in Citrus Heights.

Over the Memorial Day weekend, artists, some suspended on aerial lifts, 30 feet in the air, put the finishing touches on their creations.

The "Wide Open Walls" project aims to "activate spaces in alleyways and buildings throughout the greater Sacramento region," according to its website.

The MarketPlace commissioned three new wall murals, two in the Marketplace at Birdcage, and the largest one at PetSmart which were completed last week, according to Kathilynn Carpenter, Sunrise MarketPlace executive director.

The annual Sacramentobased Wide Open Walls mural festival ran from May 12 to 22. To date, the annual festival has added 150 works of art to the central city and surrounding areas. The festival's footprint expanded this year to surrounding communities of Citrus Heights, Elk Grove and Roseville.

Behind PetSmart on 6434 Sunrise Boulevard in Citrus Heights, the emerging face of a 30-foot-tall silver American eagle is set against a background of burnt orange, and magenta.

The giant mural, which features the word "Destination" in giant white letters was painted by artists Michael Connors and John Hamrick of STUDIOXMC in Reno, Nevada.

"It's the largest mural we've ever done," said artist John Hamrick. "The word 'Destination' generally describes the human spirit, and the sense of community which we share."

Conners and Hamrick became the third mural team chosen by the "Wide Open Walls" project on short notice, with literally days to submit a sketch for approval and obtain materials. Started on May 18th, their giant mural took 11 days to finish.

In time, the mural will be much more visible along a new pedestrian trail behind PetSmart, leading to the rear of Mitchell Village Park which is under development by the Sunrise Parks and Recreation District.


In all, Connors and Hamrick estimated that they would use some 40 gallons to paint the background and nearly 600 cans of commercial spray paint to complete their mural.

Incorporating bright orange, yellow, light blue and green, artist Jolene Rose Russell was seen putting the final touches on her mural which features citrus and floral blossoms along the back wall of Jamba Juice.

A third mural which was painted by Sacramento artist Rachel Kerns along the length of an exterior wall of Bath and Body Works, is painted in bright yellow and features a mix of colorful stars and a pink mosaic arch which features gold foil inlay.

In an earlier interview, Kerns, who has more than 30 such mural walls to her credit, said she looked forward to people interacting with her art through photographs and selfies.

According to Kathilynn Carpenter, Sunrise MarketPlace executive director, the three new murals were funded by the Gerrity Group, Intercal, with a partial funding of \$5,000 given by the MarketPlace to each artist participating.

The formula for the party remains the same except with a little help from Marcy and Jennifer this year. Having just turned 80, Lamar finally admitted he could use a little help bringing the event together. Neighbors Marcy and Jennifer jumped in, leaving Fullmer to perfect his famous teriyaki tri-tip. The traditional dessert table is always much anticipated.

The Fullmer's own relationship with a family who moved here from Romania 16 years ago is a testament to the bonds formed on and around Wooddale. Over 16 years, Lamar has become an honorary grandpa to the family's six boys ages 11 to 20 years, teaching them to be honorable and productive young men. They have full use of the Fullmer's computer and game room in exchange doing their own

chores and important tasks that serve their neighbors. This relationship has benefitted both families and is ongoing. Lamar says, "We really care about each other." Two sons are now in college, and one graduates from high school this year. They continue to be mentored by Lamar and work for an allowance that helps them learn about and appreciate the value of

Shelly Barnes a neighbor of 32 years has seen many families come and go. He said the annual event brought together the east and west side of the neighborhood. His wife, a trauma nurse, is available whenever there is a need for medical help or advice.

More important than the annual get-together is what has come out of them: an unofficial neighborhood watch, and a new appreciation and caring for each other. Neighbors say more than just "Hi" to each other. They know your name and if you have a need they can fill, they are there. Lamar says, "We really care about each

Former Sacramento City Firefighter Convicted of Sexual Assault

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Christian Madrigal was convicted by a jury of assault with intent to rape and forcible digital penetration.

On April 13, 2015, the victim went out to celebrate her birthday with some friends. One of her friends was dating Christian Madrigal, who had just joined the City of Sacramento Fire Department. After their night out, the victim, the victim's friend who was dating Madrigal along with Madrigal went back to stay the night at Madrigal's apartment. While the victim was asleep on the couch, Madrigal

forced himself on her and sexually assaulted her for several hours that night. The next morning, the victim reported the sexual assault to law enforcement and underwent a sexual assault examination. In 2018, detectives reinitiated the investigation and interviewed all of the witnesses who were present on the night of the sexual assault and the District Attorney's Crime Lab found that DNA on the victim's underwear was consistent with Madrigal's DNA.

Madrigal faces a maximum sentence of 14 years in prison. Sentencing is set for June 30, 2022, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 42 before the Honorable Allen Sumner.

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SCPH Investigating Travel-Related Monkeypox Case

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Division of Public Health is investigating a case of monkeypox virus related to travel in Europe. Confirmation testing from CDC and CDPH is pending. Based on symptoms and preliminary testing, mon-

keypox confirmation is likely.

The patient is isolating at home and is not in contact with any other people. Risk to the general public is very minimal. The individual under investigation recently traveled to areas in Europe where cases of monkeypox have been confirmed.

Transmission of monkeypox virus occurs when a person comes into contact with the virus from an animal, human, or materials contaminated with the virus. The virus enters the body through broken skin (even if not visible), respiratory tract, or the mucous membranes (eyes, nose, or mouth). Respiratory droplets generally cannot travel more than a few feet, so prolonged face-to-face contact is required. Monkeypox is an

extremely rare diagnosis in the United States.

"This case appears to be related to recent travel to Europe," said Dr. Olivia Kasirye, Sacramento County Public Health Officer. "Public Health is working with CDPH to conduct contact tracing, and risk to the general public is extremely low."

Monkeypox does not occur naturally in the United States and cases in the US are very rare. US cases are related to international travel or importing animals from areas where the disease is more common.

Symptoms of Monkeypox include fever, headache, muscle aches, backache, swollen lymph nodes, chills and exhaustion. Within 1-3 days (sometimes longer) after the appearance of fever, the patient develops a rash, often beginning on the face and then spreading to other parts of the body. The incubation period (time from infection to symptoms) for monkeypox is usually 7–14 days but can range from 5–21 days. The illness typically lasts for 2–4 weeks.

UC Davis Health Clears Way for Construction on Hospital of the Future

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -UC Davis Health started

clearing the way today for what will be the region's most advanced hospital tower - the UC Davis Medical Center's California Tower.

Crews started demolition of multiple temporary buildings on the site of the future tower. It's a necessary step to make the site ready for a California Tower groundbreaking in 2023 and open to patients in 2030.

The \$3.75 billion tower is a replacement for existing parts of the hospital that must be closed due to state seismic laws. Approved by the UC Board of Regents in January, the tower will be added to the eastern side of the existing UC Davis Medical Center. It will feature a 14-story hospital tower and five-story pavilion, adding to a hospital complex that has been expanding eastward and serving the neighborhoods at this location for over 150

"This project incorporates lessons from the pandemic and those lessons will help us to deliver superior care for Northern Californians for the next 50 years," said David Lubarsky, CEO of UC Davis Health. "The California Tower will triple our ICU capability, making half of our patient rooms ICU-ready. This investment will be a cornerstone in the critical care we provide our patients and the region

moving forward."

The new additions reflect UC Davis Health's long-time commitment to education, research, patient care and community health. They complement the health system's mission of improving health for all. The project is also the result of state seismic safety mandates, which put a deadline on hospitals to either upgrade their existing facilities or construct new buildings.

The California Tower adds to the Medical Center's existing University and Davis Towers and will add approximately one million square feet of additional space. It will include operating rooms, an imaging center, an expanded pharmacy, additional burn care units, and about 400 single-patient rooms. The new rooms will replace others being taken out of service in older parts of the building. With 646 beds currently, the UC Davis Medical Center will continue to be the largest hospital in the Sacramento area. It will have a total of 675-700 inpatient beds when the project

is completed. More than 250 of the rooms are being designed for greater flexibility in the event of a patient surge such as during a pandemic, massive wildfire, radiation leak or other major event. These adaptable rooms will easily convert into intensive-careunit rooms with air isolation so that they could be used to care for patients of any level of hospitalization.

"As the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us, embracing the unexpected is a common theme in medicine," said Lubarsky.

"Having the adaptability of patient rooms to meet a critical care surge means these new facilities will be positioned to meet the region's needs for the next 50 years."

"This project will further harness the advantage of UC Davis Medical Center being one of Sacramento County's largest employers to increase community wealth-building and strengthen our surrounding neighborhoods," said Brad Simmons, chief administrator of UC Davis Medical Center. "This project will help improve health outcomes for area residents and ensure a robust health care safety net for historically marginalized populations, especially when it comes to providing specialty care hospital services."

The California Tower project is expected to create hundreds of construction jobs and thousands of new health care positions for the surrounding community, a benefit of being home to an anchor institution like UC Davis Medical Center. Anchor institutions are place-based, mission-driven entities like universities and hospitals that leverage economic power alongside human and intellectual resources to improve the long-term health and social welfare of surrounding communities.

New Study Finds Nearly 60% of Office Workers Staying at Their Jobs

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - Some 47 million Americans voluntarily left their job last year, as the COVID-19 pandemic ushered in what has become known as the "Great Resignation." As the debate continues as to whether this is a lasting workforce trend or just a blip on the radar, a new survey released last month by the data management platform Kizen shows that most office workers appear content with their current job.

According to the survey, 57% of so-called "knowledge workers," or those who use a computer for at least 2 hours a day in their work, said they have not quit or even considered leaving their current job in the past year. An equal percentage also believe that they work the right amount of hours. Conversely, 37% of respondents considered quitting and 6% said they left their job. Of those who have considered quitting, the survey found most are young adults, people in urban areas and those going into a physical office.

"Leaders are navigating a totally new paradigm for attracting and retaining team members, and so understanding what employees value and appreciate is key," said Kizen co-founder and CEO John Winner in a news release.

Kizen (www.kizen.com) uses a no-code data platform and an intelligent business assistant to help companies


While 24% of these workers reported no job dissatisfaction, top complaints among those who expressed some level of discontent included: workplace culture and pay (19%), issues with management and lack of opportunities to advance and recognition (16%) and lack of flexibility (12%).

Earlier this year, the Pew Research Center found that a majority of workers who quit their job last year cited low pay, no advancement opportunities and feeling disrespected at work as major reasons for leaving.

When it comes to achieving a worklife balance, the Kizen survey also found that outside of financial security and compensation, the benefits workers valued most included more flexibility for activities outside of work (15%), a sense of purpose and opportunity to serve others (12%) and having the opportunity to be around likable colleagues (10%).

"There's no one-size-fits-all approach to satisfying employees, who value different aspects of work depending on their interests and circumstances. But flexibility and a sense of purpose seem to be powerful tools for recruiting talent and building a fulfilled, happy work-

year, one new survey found that approximately one in five workers regretted the decision.







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
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Senator Pan Joins Public Health Advocates for the PublicHERO Initiative

- State Senator and Health Committee chair Dr. Richard Pan joined California Can't Wait, a coalition of public health officials, local public health leaders, frontline workers, and health equity advocates for a virtual press conference urging Governor Newsom and state lawmakers to dedicate a small fraction of the state's \$97 billion budget surplus to one-time Public Health Equity Readiness Opportunity (PublicHERO) initiative investments. The public health and equity advocates said on top of boosting the state's annual commitment to core, local public health services, California must dedicate one-time funds to recruit, retain, educate and train the next generation of public health workers to respond to existing and emerging public health threats.

"I want to thank Governor Newsom for his commitment for \$300M annually for public health departments for ensuring that we build our public health infrastructure. With the emergence of a suspected case of monkeypox in Sacramento County from an individual who recently returned from traveling abroad in Europe, it is a good reminder of the critical work that our public health and medical professionals do daily to keep our community safe and healthy from infectious

diseases," said Dr. Richard Pan, California State Senator and Chair of the Senate Committee on Health. "Beyond the \$300M the Governor is proposing, we need to also help shore up our existing workforce. Well-funded and fully staffed public health departments equipped with necessary viral surveillance and testing tools help us quickly identify emerging health threats, and isolate infectious individuals, helping protect life and treat people resulting in the best possible health outcomes."

The California Can't Wait Coalition stressed the urgency to rebuild California's local public health workforce after the pandemic exposed how a decade of disinvestment in local public health departments left them understaffed, under-resourced and underprepared to protect and save lives. Historic underfunding coupled with stress, burnout, and harassment during the pandemic has had a significant impact on the public health workforce and is projected to cause additional public health workers to leave their field. In fact, the recent de Beaumont Foundation and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey of nearly 45,000 state and local public health workers found that:

More than half of public health employees report at least one symptom of post-traumatic stress disorder; Many public health workers, especially executives, report bullying, threats, and harassment; and, nearly 1 in 3 public health employees say they are considering leaving their organization within the

On a call with news reporters today, Kim Saruwatari, Public Health Director of Riverside County, said her county has been unable to hire a public health lab director, preventing an expansion of crucial public health services to protect the health and well being of their communities.

"We do not have enough qualified public health lab directors to meet the demand that exists today let alone when we look forward to our aging workforce that may be retiring and moving on," said Kim Saruwatari, CHEAC President and Riverside County Public Health Director. "Our public health labs are critical and often unknown to the public. They play a critical role in our day to day operations and emergency response. We have to be able to recruit and retain lab directors, public health microbiologists, public health nurses, and all of our public health positions so we can protect and serve the public."

Dr. Karen Relucio, President of the Health Officers Association of California and Public Health Officer in Napa County said California is experiencing an exodus of public health staff that has gutted local public health and must dedicate resources in development of our public health workforce pipeline.

'Sixty-two local public health officials in California's cities and counties have left their positions since the start of the pandemic. This includes 21 health officers, 20 agency directors, and 21 local health department directors," said Dr. Karen Relucio. Public Health Officer in Napa County. "This great resignation has affected more than just senior leadership and has gutted the public health workforce from top to bottom. In order to sustain public health operations, it is more important than ever to invest in public health workforce pipelines and workforce development to attract future public health staff and future public health leaders and to retain the staff that we have."

Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California said the Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs Survey demonstrates why California must invest in the PublicHERO initiative.

"Nearly 1 in 3 public health employees say they are considering leaving their organization within the next year. This highlights why we need our PublicHERO initiative," said Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California. "We continue to call on state lawmakers and Governor Newsom to dedicate resources to our Public HERO

Initiative to develop our workforce pipeline to ensure local public health departments have the capacity to respond to public health threats and deliver on the promise of health equity."

The news conference took place a day after Sacramento County officials announced the first suspected case of monkeypox in California. Officials emphasized that while the disease presents a low risk to the public at this time, Sacramento County's swift response and work to educate the public illustrates why a robust public health workforce is essential. Public health response including testing and contract tracing as new communicable disease threats emerge keeps Californians safe.

In 2021,the California Can't Wait coalition successfully advocated for \$300 million in ongoing state funding to rebuild California's decimated public health infrastructure, a commitment that was kept in Governor Newsom's May Revision budget proposal this month. As scientists expect COVID-19 to become endemic and with the clear need to address the social determinants of health that led COVID to have such devastating impacts on communities of color, it's clear California must do more. The PublicHERO initiative would support the SMARTER plan to stay ready for future waves of COVID-19 and build the diverse pipeline of public health workers needed to address health disparities.

other orders 2. No-Contact Order: If there is no EPO, a no-contact order that is included in a restraining or protective order has precedence in enforcement over any other restraining or protective order.

3: Criminal Order: If none of the orders includes a no-contact order, a domestic violence protective order issued in a criminal case takes precedence in enforcement over any conflicting civil court order. Any nonconflicting terms of the civil restraining order remain

in effect and enforceable.

Family, Juvenile, or Civil Order: If more than one family, juvenile, or other civil restraining or protective order has been issued, the one that was issued last must be enforced

Certificate of Compliance with VAWA for Temporary Orders This temporary protective order meets all full faith and credit requirements of the Violence Against Women Act, 18 U.S.C. § 2265 (1994) (VAWA) upon

notice of the restrained person. This court has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter; the restrained person has been or will be afforded notice and a timely opportunity to be heard as provided by the laws of this jurisdiction. 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ALA Report Doesn't Tell the Full Story, Includes Misleading Data

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District, Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District, Placer County Air Pollution Control District, Feather River Air Quality Management District, and El Dorado County Air Quality Management District have issued a joint response to the American Lung Association's recent release of its annual State of The Air Report and the Sacramento Bee's coverage of the report on April 22, 2022.

The Air Districts address the report's ranking of counties based on air quality data that is skewed by extreme but short-term wildfire data and the increasing international transport of pollution that raises background concentrations, resulting in a misleading picture of air pollution emissions in the Sacramento region. The Bee's article omitted these factors as well. While air quality and public health are absolutely impacted by wildfires, to assign an "F" grade without naming the reason doesn't tell the full story. It also unnecessarily undermines public confidence and denies true progress.

Response From the Air Districts of the Sacramento Region:

"Thanks to innovative projects and programs by Sacramento region air districts and their partners, air quality has improved significantly over the past several decades and will continue to get cleaner in the future. Despite the challenges of wildfire and increasing transport of pollution, coupled with sharp increases in population and vehicle miles traveled, the Sacramento region has made great strides in moving toward and meeting strict state and federal healthbased air quality standards.

Although the counties in our region received poor rankings, these rankings are flawed and do not reflect the real, tangible improvements in air quality that have been made possible by the efforts of our districts and residents. While we value our partnership with the American Lung Association, we are extremely disappointed that the ALA report fails to recognize that the region currently meets federal health-based air quality standards for short-term particle pollution and is on track to meet similar standards for summertime ground-level ozone pollution within the next several years. That is no small feat and certainly worth a passing grade. We are equally disappointed that the Sacramento Bee article about the report did not acknowledge these factors or recognize the region's air quality accomplishments.

Our Districts are committed to combating climate change and improving air quality and public health outcomes for all residents, especially in our environmental justice communities. It is important for the ALA report to honestly reflect the significant challenges the region faces, while we continue to work together to find innovative new solutions to improve public health."

Historical Air Quality Data Shows Dramatic Air Quality Improvement in the Region

Between 2000-2022, the Sacramento Federal Nonattainment Area (SFNA) population grew 30.57% resulting in an increased number of vehicle registrations, and motor vehicles in the region. The SFNA is comprised of all of Sacramento and Yolo Counties, the eastern portion of Solano County, the southern portion of Sutter County, the western slopes of El Dorado and Placer Counties up to the Sierra crest and includes five local air districts.

Because cars, trucks and trains are the largest source of emissions in the region, Sacramento region air districts have developed creative and innovative strategies to ensure the region can continue to grow due to an increased population but at the same time reduce air pollution, combat climate change, stimulate economic prosperity and improve the quality of life for residents.

According to the state's historical data, the number of smoggy summer days that exceed the current 2015 ozone standard has declined from 81 days in 2000 to 47 days in 2020. Even with the 2020 data, which had high measurements due to summer wildfire smoke impacts, this shows a strong downward trend that is expected to continue over the next sev-

to reduce air pollution that impacts our health, environment, and local economy.

A few examples include: Infusing millions of dollars into the region each year to support and incentivize electric vehicle conversion and infrastructure builds for businesses, public agencies, school districts and residents. Requiring the use of the most stringent emission control equipment on major stationary sources, which means less pollution coming out of the stack. Working with both public land managers and private landowners on prescribed burn activities to reduce excess vegetation and restore fire resiliency to the land. On-going support for the utilization of forest woody biomass wastes to fuel electricity generation and reduce wildfire size, severity, and pollution.

Implementing mandatory or voluntary residential wood burning reduction programs. Creating clean, safe, and reliable transportation options by providing access to electric vehicles, carshare services, transit, and ride share for communities most in need in the region. Building out the region's zero and near zero emission infrastructure with the development of electric vehicle chargers, hydrogen fueling dispensers, and natural gas fueling stations.

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Birdcage Homicide Investigation Ongoing

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - On May 23, 2022, at approximately 10:55 PM, the Citrus Heights Police Department received numerous 911 calls regarding reports of shots fired in the area of 6000 block of Birdcage Street in the City of Citrus Heights.

CHPD officers quickly arrived and located a male subject suffering from multiple gunshot wounds in the walkway of an apartment complex. The 20-year-old male subject was transported to a local hospital in critical condition. Officers then located an additional male subject with multiple gunshot wounds inside a nearby apartment. That 20-year-old subject was

pronounced deceased at the scene.

The 6000 block of Birdcage Lane was closed off for several hours while Detectives and Crime Scene Investigators processed the scene.

CHPD Detectives are actively investigating the homicide. At this time, investigators believe this is not a random act; the parties involved likely knew each other. Preliminary information revealed that both subjects appeared to be shooting at each other.

New Report Finds Small Business Owners Fear Government Regulation of 'Big Tech'

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - According to the U.S. Census Bureau, a historic 5.4 million new business applications were filed last year, smashing the 2020 record. But while entrepreneurship appears alive and well, a report released last month by the Small Business and Entrepreneurship Council (SBE Council) warns of growing angst among new small business owners of possible government regulation of large technology companies.

According to the survey of small business owners who started their business during COVID-19, 61% of respondents say government regulations against technology companies will adversely impact their business, with 36% saying they are extremely concerned about such measures. Top concerns included the ending of free services; disruption in communications with customers and back-end support; diminished business visibility and ability to grow their customer base. The survey also found that 68% say they rely on established technology and platforms, like Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn, to run their business.

"It's clear that these new entrepreneurs appreciate the services large technology companies offer that enable them to affordably reach their customers. These owners worry losing access to these free or affordable services will interfere with how they run their businesses. Instead, our research found that these business owners largely want President Biden and Congress to focus on the urgent issues of taxes, inflation and supply chain challenges," said SBE Council President & CEO Karen Kerrigan in a press release.

Last July, President Biden issued an executive order calling for a crackdown of what the administration calls "the excessive concentration of industry," and "the abuses of market power" across a range of industries, including technology. The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) recently signaled their support for congressional antitrust legislation targeting "Big Tech."

When it comes to economic conditions and the prospects for aspiring entrepreneurs, SBEC found that 42% say the U.S. economy is conducive to helping new businesses prosper, while 32% say it is not entrepreneur friendly.

Kerrigan pointed out that not all business applications that are filed actually result in an enterprise being formed. And, for this reason, "aspiring entrepreneurs or almost entrepreneurs need as much encouragement as possible to take that next step toward launching a business," Kerrigan said.

SBEC advocates on behalf of entrepreneurs and small businesses and has more than 100,000 members, according to its website, www.sbecouncil.org.




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






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California Expands Infant Formula Options for WIC Families

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - To further support California families while supplies of infant formula remain limited, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) is adding a new flexibility by expanding purchasing options for the WIC (Women, Infants and Children) program. Effective immediately, families with WIC benefits have eight additional formulas, and a total of 13 options, they can purchase for their infants.

WIC families can find the latest updates at MyFamily.WIC.ca.gov or the California WIC App and should contact their local WIC office with questions on how these options work for infants. General information on the infant formula

shortage is available at cdph. ca.gov/formula.

"We are quickly doing what we can to provide our WIC families with as many infant formula options as possible during this challenging time," said CDPH Director and State Public Health Officer Dr. Tomás J. Aragón. "In the coming days we will also add more formulas to this list."

The state's action temporarily expands the existing (WIC) authorized product list to include additional infant formula options. These newer options will be removed once infant formulas are widely available again.

Safety Information for Families in Need of Formula

Many California families are feeling the effects of

the formula shortage. Safe formula preparation is vital to ensure infant safety.

Non-WIC parents and caregivers who face a shortage should call their health care providers first to help them navigate infant formula options when supplies are scarce.

Parents and caregivers are advised to NOT dilute formula or use homemade recipes for substitution as this can seriously harm a baby's health.

Babies usually tolerate alternative formula products except in the case of special therapeutic formula, and that's why it's important to consult with your healthcare provider first to get help or to discuss alternatives.


