Inflation and California Policies are the Grinch that stole Christmas

Are you ready for the most expensive holiday season in forever? Hold on to your wallets, because high inflation and wrongheaded California policies are the Grinch that stole Christmas, pressuring family budgets and diminishing our quality of life.

If you've gone to the grocery store or shopping mall, you've witnessed a spike in inflation like we haven't seen in decades. The consumer price index surged 6.2 percent from a year ago in October, the highest increase since 1990. But the story is actually worse. The October monthly increase was itself 0.9 percent, which would indicate an annualized increase of nearly 11 percent.

As famously put by Nobel Prize winning economist Milton Friedman, inflation is always a monetary phenomenon. When the federal government flooded the country with stimulus dollars without accompanying goods and services, inflation was entirely predictable.

What does this mean for the average working family? It means that every item on your holiday dinner table will cost more. Gifts for your children will cost more. Heating your house will cost more. Gas, hotel rooms, movie tickets, clothing, haircuts will all cost more. Inflation robs purchasing power from each and every dollar you make.

Workers may be seeing increased wages, but when they don't keep up with price increases, people become poorer even as they earn more.

As ugly as the picture is nationally, California is worse. Our state isn't responsible for the flood of dollars driving inflation, but it's stacking bad state policies on top of bad federal policies and making it tougher for families to make ends meet.

For example, so called "green energy" policies drive our residential

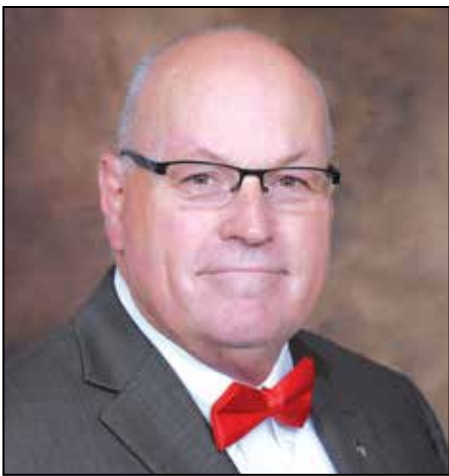

Council Fears Impacts of SB 9 Housing Law

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - At the December 9 meeting, the Citrus Heights City Council considered whether to adopt an Urgency Ordinance to put guidelines in place for new residential housing developments under Senate Bill (SB) 9: California Housing Opportunity and More Efficiency (HOME) Act. To address California’s housing crisis and encourage development of more affordable housing, Governor Newsom signed SB 9 into law in September, and it goes into effect on January 1, 2022. The new law requires the approval of urban lot splits and the development of two residential units on one lot.

SB 9 applies to properties zoned as single-family, generally RD 1 – RD 5, which are parcels that have between one and five houses per acre. Under the law, any single-family-zoned property (except those within conservation easements, floodways, or historic sites) can be split into two roughly equal parcels, and each parcel can have two residential units. The parcels must be at least 1,200 square feet and each residence must be at least 800 square feet.

Both sections of SB 1 can be applied, so one single-family property could be subdivided into two parcels, and then two housing units could be built on each parcel—creating a total of four housing units on the original lot. The units can’t be used as short-term rentals, and existing homes on these lots can’t be demolished unless there hasn’t been tenant in the last three years. Properties can only be split once, and if a lot is split, then the owner must live on one of the parcels as a primary residence for at least three years.

Because the goal is to increase housing, SB 9 implements less restrictive development standards. For example, the law decreases side and rear setbacks from the property lines to just four feet. It also states that no more than one parking space can be required per unit, and it allows for an exception to that requirement if the unit is within walking distance of reliable transit. It also specifies that new developments do not have to meet requirements for lighting, sidewalk, and street improvements.

If a proposed lot split or development meets SB 9 guidelines, it must be considered ministerially and approved without any discretionary review or public hearings. Proposals can only be denied if there is overwhelming evidence that it would cause specific adverse impacts.

But the law does allow local jurisdictions to impose their own objective standards, so City staff recommend ensuring parcels have easements for public services and facilities as well as direct access to public streets, either by direct access or a 20-foot recorded easement. Other standards the City wants to include are parking space minimum sizes and creekside setbacks. However, SB 9 states that objective standards cannot be applied if they would preclude the development of two 800-square-foot units on the property.

Councilmember Steve Miller expressed concern about adding more units onto

residential properties: “We’re quadrupling what goes on our land sites: water, sewer, power, gas. We’re going to be producing four times as much garbage out of these lot splits, and so that has a financial impact on us.” He also took issue with the lack of public hearings on these developments, pointing out that the first you would know of your neighbor building right next to your fence would be when the construction starts. “I don’t know if I can support this,” he said.

Councilmember Jeannie Bruins pointed out that SB 9 would be “foisted on us anyway,” so “having an ordinance in place puts us in a stronger position,” because the objective standards will “put a little bit of sense into a law that I think is going to be potentially harmful to Citrus Heights.” She said, “I don’t think any of us like this, but if we don’t take action, it will be worse.” Councilmember Bruins also added that property owners need to be advised that these splits and developments would lead to higher property taxes on their parcels.

Councilmember Bret Daniels called the new law “disgusting.” He said, “I don’t know if I’ve ever reacted to anything the way I’m reacting to this tonight and seeing what this is going to do to our communities, our neighborhoods, our city. We’re already the most densely populated area in the Sacramento region. ... This is going to destroy neighborhoods.” Daniels foresees fights and fires in the future, with so many people packed into small areas: “All I see is problems; I don’t see solutions at all.” He suggested imposing high development fees to discourage the development of these units.

The Urgency Ordinance was approved by a 4-5 vote, with Councilmember Miller dissenting.

The Council also heard a report from the Citrus Heights Police Department about the possibility of a future ballot measure to reinstate the Regional Sacramento Abandoned Vehicle Service Authority (SAVSA) fee. The \$1 fee is added to vehicle registrations, and the collected funds are distributed throughout the region to help with the cost of vehicle abatement programs Citrus Heights receives approximately \$50-\$60K annually from the fund. But the fee will end on April 30, 2022, because under current legislation it is considered a tax.

To be reinstated, the SAVSA fee must be approved by 2/3 voter support, and Sacramento Transit Authority wants to put the measure on the next ballot. Earlier this year, the estimated cost to the City to include this measure on the ballot was \$62,000, so at that time the Council did not support it. But recently, other jurisdictions in the region have signed on as well, and the estimated cost to Citrus Heights would be just \$12,000. The City now intends to support the measure.

If the measure passes, those funds will continue helping the CHPD recoup the costs of towing abandoned and non-operational vehicles off of public streets in Citrus Heights. ★

electricity costs more than 50-percent higher than the national average. California’s ‘Tort Wars’ Heating Up Again

One of the Capitol’s most enduring conflicts pits personal injury attorneys and their allies in consumer advocacy groups against corporate interests and their insurers.

The two factions clash incessantly over what events are deemed wrongful acts (torts), who can sue over those acts and what monetary damages can be awarded.

Dubbed “tort wars,” the conflict has raged for decades in the Legislature, in the courts and occasionally via ballot measures, each side depicting itself as the good guys and the other as rapaciously evil. Millions of dollars are spent each year on lobbyists, media strategists, political campaign advisors and other tools of the political trade.

The intensity of the war varies from year to year, and 2022 is shaping up as one its hotter periods as the factions propose dueling ballot measures. One would effectively undo a 1975 law that limits damages for “pain and suffering” in medical malpractice cases, while another would place a new limit on the fees that personal injury attorneys can claim.

That 1975 law, entitled the Medical Injury

Compensation Reform Act (MICRA) and signed by Jerry Brown during his first year as governor, limits non-economic damages for malpractice to \$250,000. Its passage was not only a big win for medical providers and their insurers but the opening salvo of the war.

The attorneys not only have tried — very unsuccessfully so far — to repeal or modify MICRA but have sought to expand opportunities to sue and collect damages and fees, such as allowing them to intervene in cases that ordinarily would be handled by local or state legal authorities.

Business groups and insurers, meanwhile, have not only attempted to blunt the attorneys’ expansive ambition but to carry the MICRA model of damage limits into other potential injury cases.

In 1987, 12 years after MICRA was enacted, the speaker of the state Assembly, Willie Brown, mediated extensive negotiations between the warring factions on a truce, culminating in the infamous “napkin deal” worked out in Frank Fat’s restaurant near the Capitol with Brown hopping from table to table.

Quickly ratified by the Legislature, it gave lobbyists for every interest involved something to take back to their clients, including a slight modification of MICRA and new protections for the tobacco industry from lawsuits by smokers for cancer and other illnesses.

The napkin deal truce lasted for a few years, but tort wars resumed in the 1990s and have been waged ever since on specific

issues, including several unsuccessful efforts to change MICRA. One subset of the conflict, involving roughly the same interests, has been perennial jousting over workers’ compensation, the employer-financed, multi-billion-dollar system that covers job-related injuries and illnesses.

A ballot measure that would indirectly but effectively repeal MICRA is already qualified for the 2022 ballot even though the anti-MICRA coalition has failed repeatedly in the past to undo what the Legislature and Jerry Brown wrought 46 years ago.

Meanwhile, the Civil Justice Association of California, an umbrella organization of business and insurance interests, has unveiled its own initiative measure that would limit lawyers’ contingency fees in personal injury cases to 20% of monetary judgments, sharply lower than the traditional one-third or more. The goal, obviously, is to make attorneys less willing to take on cases.

The stage is set, therefore, for the competing factions to spend tens of millions of dollars to persuade voters, which would be a tiny fraction of the many billions of dollars at stake in the outcome. And regardless of what happens next year, the immense stakes mean tort wars will continue to rage indefinitely.

The IOC Is a Craven Handmaid of Beijing

It should be a rule of thumb that the Olympic Games shouldn’t be held in countries that operate concentration camps.

If this strikes you as a reasonable demand, you aren’t suited to serve on the International Olympic Committee. The IOC has doggedly defended Beijing as the host of the 2022 Winter Olympics even as the Chinese Communist Party pursues its campaign of unrelenting barbarity against the Uyghurs.

The Biden administration just announced a so-called diplomatic boycott of the games, a gesture of disapproval that won’t dent the propaganda coup the IOC is handing the most dangerous regime in the world.

The IOC is the World Health Organization of sports. When China disappeared female tennis star Peng Shuai for the offense of making an accusation of sexual assault against a former high government official, the IOC happily assisted in the regime’s crisis PR, lest the shocking incident derail the games.

The president of the IOC, Thomas Bach, had a video call with Peng where she said all was well and Bach pretended to take her assurances at face value. Of course, Peng wasn’t free to speak her mind, but part of Bach’s job now is to look the other way at China’s

blatant abuses.

China has the great fortune to deal with international organizations — except the Women’s Tennis Association, which is suspending tournaments in China — that lack all self-respect.

The IOC is following in the well-trod footsteps of corporations, financiers and sports leagues that start out wanting to do business with China and end up complicit in the regime’s crimes by staying silent or explaining them away.

The difference is that the IOC claims to be acting in support of high ideals. Bach likes to quote the Olympic charter that says Olympism exists “to place sport at the service of the harmonious development of humankind, with a view to promoting a peaceful society concerned with the preservation of human dignity.”

Placing sport at the service of China does the opposite on all counts. China’s autocrat, Xi Jinping, has been open about the political importance of the Olympics, “Hosting an excellent 2022 Games is a major task of the Party and the country, and it is a solemn commitment to the international community.” Here, the interests of the CCP and the IOC — as well as the corporate sponsors of the games — coincide.

The last time China hosted the Olympics, the Summer Games in 2008, it used the opening ceremony to stage a gigantic and memorable regime-enhancing spectacle. Beijing promised reforms to get awarded the games and

then, true to form, engaged in yet more heavy-handed repression.

If the 2008 Beijing Games were ill-advised, next year’s Winter Olympics are a complete travesty. The atrocities in Xinjiang province are a matter of public record and the quashing of Hong Kong proceeds apace. No one who crosses the regime is safe from imprisonment or worse. China openly menaces Taiwan with an invasion. Indeed, China could conceivably be in a shooting war with the United States within a year or two of using the presence of our athletes, among others, to enhance the rule of its dictator-for-life.

Bach insists that the IOC must always be politically neutral. As Michael Mazza of the American Enterprise Institute points out, though, the IOC banned apartheid-era South Africa from the games. There is no such thing as neutrality when dealing with an all-encompassing police state for which politics is a life-or-death matter. The games aren’t being hosted by Switzerland or Norway — nice, law-abiding countries with good ski slopes — but a revanchist power that tramples on human dignity and is a clear and present danger to international peace.

The IOC could have taken an off-ramp from these games at any point. Instead, its attitude is going to be, “Enjoy the snowboarding, never mind the concentration camps.”



Board Approves Budget Priorities Based on Survey

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors, at its Dec. 8 meeting, approved the recommended budget priorities to be used in the development of the FY 2022-23 budget.

The budget priorities were a result of the County’s Community Engagement Plan to develop priorities for the budget based on public input and the results of a survey of adult residents of Sacramento County.

The recommended priorities for the use of General Fund discretionary funds in the FY 2022-23 budget are:

Complying with the County’s legal, financial, regulatory and policy obligations, including providing mandated services, ensuring collection of revenues, and complying with the General Reserves policy;

Maintaining existing service levels budgeted for County programs, improving effectiveness and efficiency where possible and limiting the extent to which reductions in categorical

revenue are backfilled with discretionary resources;

Funding new or enhanced programs that focus on the most critical and urgent needs, with the following priority focus areas identified in a survey of County residents: A Countywide focus area of addressing homelessness and its impacts, including housing, mental health and substance use; An unincorporated focus area of improving the condition of streets and roads.

In order to inform the development of survey questions, County departments conducted outreach with the County’s Advisory Boards and Commissions. All told, 59 boards and commissions provided responses, with key themes including affordable housing, homelessness, health and human services, safety, and parks and road infrastructure.

After a competitive bid process, the Board approved a contract award to FM3 Research (FM3) to develop a survey instrument and administer the public opinion survey.

FM3 conducted the survey of adult residents of Sacramento

County from Oct. 27 through Nov. 8, 2021. Surveys were conducted through telephone and online interviews with 1,153 respondents, compared to the target of 800 respondents, with a margin of sampling error of ±3.5 percent at the 95 percent confidence level. The survey was available in 10 languages, including English.

Of the 1,153 respondents surveyed, residents were drawn from communities in proportion to the population, represented the County’s adult population demographics by age and gender, and came from a mix of educational backgrounds and household income.

More than half of the respondents identified with a race or ethnicity other than white, and more than one-quarter indicated they speak a language other than English at home regularly.

More than two in five respondents personally experienced homelessness or knew someone who had, and more than half have lived in the County for more than 20 years.

Survey results highlights include:

County Context: The top

concern the survey respondents want the County to address, by far, is homelessness. Of the respondents identified, 53 percent reported homelessness as the most important problem. The second and third categories, affordable housing/rent and crime/public safety/drugs/violence, were far behind at 13 percent each.

Roads/infrastructure was the fourth category at 8 percent, and COVID-19/pandemic/mandates was fifth at 7 percent.

Homelessness and housing costs are the top issues across racial and ethnic groups, and street and road conditions are especially concerning for residents in District 3.

In homes where a language other than English is spoken, jobs are a slightly bigger concern.

Resident Priorities for County Budget: Low levels of homelessness and crime, child abuse prevention and reliable water are seen as key to quality of life. Residents also strongly value affordable housing and disaster preparation.

Residents were broadly satisfied with waste disposal, clean

water, parks and libraries. A majority of residents were dissatisfied with maintenance of County streets and roads.

Fully four in five residents are dissatisfied with the County’s efforts to prevent homelessness, and a number of key items that are more important to quality of life also have lower satisfaction ratings, including affordable housing, mental health services, child abuse prevention, job creation, planning for growth and drug use treatment.

Allocating the County Budget: Residents were asked to imagine they are in charge of the Sacramento County budget, and were asked how they would prioritize County spending in six broad areas.

On average, residents allocated more funding to public safety and homelessness than other areas. Residents in Districts 3, 4 and 5 assigned more of their funding to public safety, and white and Latino residents assigned greater shares to public safety as well.

Notably, those with and without ties to homelessness assign about the same amount to that priority. ★

Mandated Masks Again

Starting Wednesday, (December 15, 2021) Californians will once again be required to wear masks indoors in public places regardless of vaccination status, state health officials announced today.

The renewed masking requirement follows a 47% increase in COVID-19 case rates since the Thanksgiving holiday and the arrival of new variant, said Dr. Mark Ghaly, the state's health secretary.

The mask mandate will run through January 15 and is specific to public settings, not private gatherings. Nevertheless, health officials recommend people get tested ahead of holiday gatherings and consider better ventilation by opening windows or convening outdoors when possible.

The mandate will mainly affect about 50% of the state population that lives in counties that currently don't have their own mask mandate, Ghaly said. Los Angeles and several Bay Area counties already have mask mandates for public settings in place.

Along with renewed mask rules, the state will also require that attendees at mega events – those of 1,000 people or more – who are unvaccinated show

proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken within one day, if an antigen test, or two days for PCR tests. The state is also recommending that travelers get tested before and after trips.

The first statewide mandate was imposed in 2020 and lifted last June.

After the state's June 15 reopening, vaccinated people were allowed to return to grocery stores, retail and other public settings without a mask – at least under state rules. People who were not vaccinated still had to adhere to indoor masking. Telling

the difference, however, was tricky: Ghaly acknowledged today that throughout the pandemic enforcement of these rules has been a challenge.

Ghaly said state officials are not considering any further restrictions or capacity limits on businesses at this

time. "Is this the first step along the course we're familiar with...including closures? Absolutely not."

That's because, he said, despite concerns of the new Omicron variant and rising case rates, the state has effective tools at hand: vaccines and masks.

To date, 74,685 Californians have died from COVID-19.

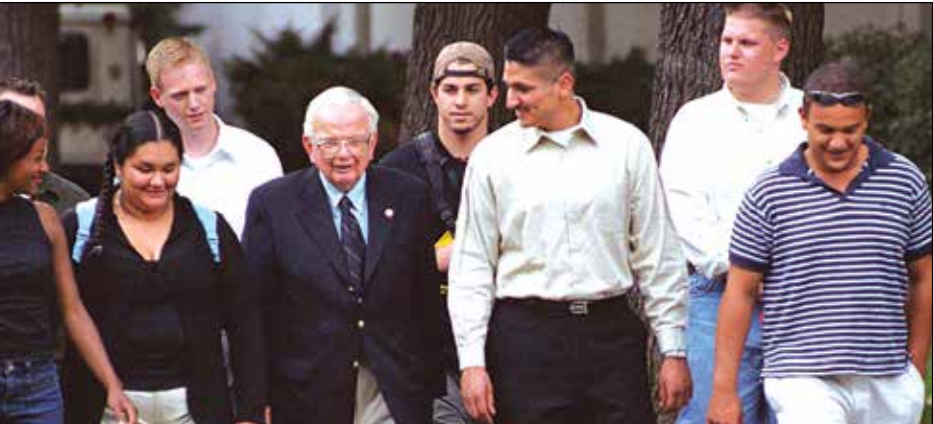

President Emeritus Donald R. Gerth Has Passed Away

It is with extreme personal sadness that I share that Sacramento State President Emeritus Donald R. Gerth passed away.

Dr. Gerth was Sac State’s longest-serving President, holding the position from 1984 to 2003. His impressive 45 years of service to the California State University began in 1958, when he joined San Francisco State as an associate dean. After serving in both administrative and faculty positions across several CSU universities, he became President of CSU Dominguez Hills in 1974, where he served until coming to Sacramento to lead our campus.

With the loving support of his wife, Beverly (Bev), who served actively alongside her husband, the Gerths transformed Sacramento State. Under Dr. Gerth’s leadership, enrollment grew from 22,000 to 28,000 students, doubling its number of Asian and Hispanic students. He led the establishment of the School of Arts and the Office of Research, Graduate, and Extended Studies. He oversaw nearly \$100 million in modernization of campus buildings and facilities, and added 1.2 million square feet of building to campus, including two parking structures. Dr. Gerth also established The Center for California Studies, which positioned Sac State prominently in state government and ensured that we are the Capital’s University.

After four-and-a-half decades of service,

Dr. Gerth continued to be a champion of Sac State and the CSU system during his retirement. In 2010, he published *The People’s University: A History of the California State University*. In 2018, the University renamed the special collections as the Donald and Beverly Gerth Special Collections and University Archives in recognition of their service and support of the Sac State and the CSU. That support included a gift of \$300,000 for the collections, which helped to modernize the archives, making them more accessible and useful.

President Emeritus Gerth loved Sacramento State and the CSU. His impact on our campus and the system as a whole is remarkable. It was my honor to call him a friend, and I will miss his wise council. Now is the time for the entire Hornet Family to rally behind and support his beloved wife, Bev.

I have spoken to Bev Gerth, who has asked that in lieu of flowers, donations be made to the President Emeritus Donald R. Gerth Memorial Scholarship Fund. Bev has asked that we wait until early next year to hold a celebration of life for Don. Details will be forthcoming.

I have been following your “Toni Says®” Medicare article in my local newspaper learning about Medicare. This week I was mailed information discussing different

If you are not working fulltime for a company with true group benefits or have an individual health insurance plan and wait later than 65 years old and 90 days to enroll in Part B, then you can receive a penalty of 10% for each 12-month period or year that you did not enroll in Part B. That penalty lasts for the rest of your Medicare life.

John since you are not working fulltime for the company you have retirement benefits when turning 65, I would advise you to enroll in both Medicare Parts A and B.

Toni Says®: If you or your spouse are not working fulltime with true company benefits be sure to enroll in Parts A and B by the time you turn 65. Wait 90 days past turning 65 and you will get a penalty.

• **Myth #2: Medicare is free. FALSE!!** The Medicare payroll tax that you have been paying for years is for Medicare Part A only! Part B has a premium which is means tested due to your income and your spouse’s income (if you filed jointly). Most on Medicare are paying the minimum required each month

for Part B, but 10% of Medicare beneficiaries meet the means tested income amount and must pay more for their Medicare Part B premiums each month. If you do not pay the Part B premium, you will not have any of the Part B benefits.

Toni Says®: Nothing is free!! You worked and paid taxes into the Social Security system.


• **Myth #3: Most baby boomers believe Medicare is just like group or individual health insurance plans. 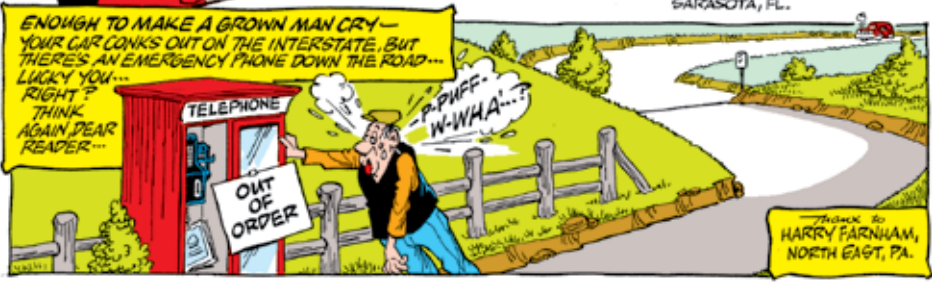

Bera Votes to Strengthen U.S. National Security

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - Representative Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-07) voted for the Fiscal Year 2022 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The NDAA, which passed the House of Representatives with strong bipartisan support and provides the annual budget for the Department of Defense, includes three key amendments authored by Bera. The Bera-supported legislation includes several critical provisions, including:

Providing a 2.7 percent pay increase for U.S. service members; and, making historic changes to the Uniform Code of Military Justice to better combat sexual assault in the military.

The bipartisan defense bill includes multiple Bera-led amendments, including:

Authorizing U.S. participation in the

Coalition for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), a public-private partnership developing vaccines for COVID-19 and other highly infectious pathogens (The House passed in July Rep. Bera's Securing America's From Epidemics Act, authorizing U.S. participation in CEPI);

Supporting Taiwan's ability to defend against PRC military provocations by further assisting Taiwan's defensive asymmetric capabilities; and

Requiring the Department of State and Department of Defense to report on the utilization of the Synchronized Predeployment and Operational Tracker (SPOT) data base to help expedite Special Immigrant Visa processing for our Afghan partners and allies.

Since arriving in Congress, Representative Bera has been a strong advocate for our military, service members, and veterans.
