Fallen Marine Laid to Rest

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Young families, school children and veterans lined much of Greenback Lane from Sunrise to Fair Oaks Boulevard on Thursday, Sept. 16, many holding U.S. and Marine Corps flags, as they paused to honor and remember fallen Marine Sgt. Nicole L. Gee, 23, of Sacramento, who was brought home and laid to rest at the Mount Vernon Memorial Park and Mortuary in Fair Oaks.

The Citrus Heights Police Department had encouraged the public to gather at the south end of Greenback Lane at the Sunrise Mall parking lot to show support as the public procession passed. The exceptionally large public turnout for the procession soon slowed traffic along Greenback Lane for more than an hour.

The procession, led by a motorcycle escort of the American Legion Patriot Guard, passed slowly under a large American flag which was

arched over Greenback Lane by two Metro Fire ladder trucks, their crews saluting, before then turning into the memorial park.

Sgt. Gee along with 10 additional Marines, one Navy corpsman and one soldier were killed August 26, the result of an enemy attack while supporting evacuation operations outside the Hamid Karzai International Airport in Kabul, Afghanistan. At least 169 Afghans were also killed in the bombing, as they struggled to

City to Impose Minimal Requirements on Short-Term Rentals

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - The Citrus Heights City Council recently held a Study Session to provide direction to staff regarding short-term rental (STR) properties within the city boundaries.

Alison Bermudez of the Planning Department explained that STRs are furnished units, either a room or a dwelling, that are rented out for durations less than 30 days. They are often used as either vacation rentals or as business accommodations for traveling professionals.

Industry wide, there has been a significant increase in these listings since 2011. While AirBnB is probably the most well-known STR platform, there are hundreds of other companies in the rental market offering these listings. Bermudez said that over the past year, STRs have even outperformed traditional hotels in certain markets. But as the number of these rentals increases, so has the number of complaints. Large parties held at STRs can result in noise disturbances, trash accumulation, and parking issues for the locals who reside in the neighborhoods.

Back in 2011, there were just five or six STR listings in Citrus Heights. In 2020, there were almost 60 – and that number has grown 24 percent since last year, with 72 available today. "That number is growing and continues to grow," said Bermudez.

That increase has brought more calls to the Citrus Heights Police Department (CHPD) to respond to disturbances at parties at STR sites. So far this year, there have been 11 of these calls, and four of those were deemed public safety concerns with known gang members and weapons violations arrests made at these locations. On two occasions when the parties were dispersed, individuals fled from officers, so the CHPD does view this as a growing problem.

Because these rentals offer temporary accommodations much like a hotel or motel, they technically should be paying a 12 percent Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) to the City. With a median rate of \$118 per night and an expected occupancy of 73 nights per year, Bermudez said the annual TOT from 72 STR units could total more than \$74,000. She explained, "That is due to us now, we're just not receiving it."

County Breastfeeding Program Receives USDA Award

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program has received a WIC Breastfeeding Gold Award of Excellence 2021 award from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This award recognizes the WIC agencies that provide exceptional breastfeeding promotion and support activities. Awardees serve as a model for other WIC agencies who want to strengthen their breastfeeding promotion and support activities through their Breastfeeding Peer Counseling Program.

The Sacramento County WIC Program has a history of program excellence. The Breastfeeding Peer Counselor Program first received this award in 2016, which remained current for four years. In 2021, Sacramento County WIC was only one of four local WIC agencies to receive the award in the western region, which includes

Alaska, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Guam, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands and American Samoa.

The Sacramento County WIC Program was able to pivot quickly when the pandemic started in 2020, finding new ways to connect with families remotely by providing services by phone and video. One of the highlights of the BFPC Program is its virtual prenatal class, which gives participants

an opportunity to meet their Peer Counselor and a Lactation Consultant who will be supporting them after delivery.

"Our Breastfeeding Peer Counselors have done a wonderful job being responsive to the changing needs of the families we serve throughout this pandemic, providing exemplary services while keeping families and kids safe and healthy," said Chevon Kothari, Director of the Sacramento County Department of Health

Services. "Their passion and dedication to supporting our families is exemplary and is what made receiving this award possible."

Breastfeeding is a practice that is proven to benefit both mothers and babies. It helps mothers recover more quickly from childbirth, reduces the risk of breast and ovarian cancers and may assist in losing weight after childbirth. Infants who are breastfed have a lower risk of developing asthma, ear infections, respiratory infections, gastrointestinal infections and other ailments. The long-term benefits of breastfeeding may lower the child's risk of obesity, type 1 diabetes and childhood leukemia. Breastmilk contains all the nutrients babies need to grow and protects the baby's immune system.

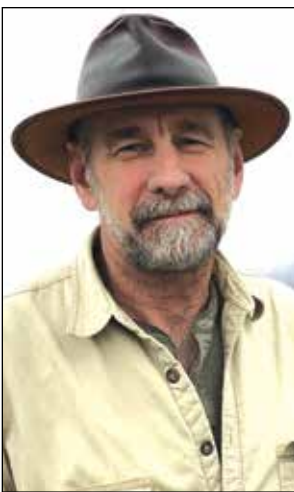

Sacramento Tall Club Rises to New Heights

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Members of the Sacramento Tall Club (STC), a social club of men and women in Rancho Cordova who share a special common attribute are looking to grow their membership.

Club members are once again meeting socially for lunch, dinners and “TGIF” events, while following state and social pandemic protocols.

Open to singles and couples, the STC is an active group of people who are tall and love getting together and having fun,” said their president, Bob Huggett. “Anyone at least 21 years of age may join if they meet the club’s height requirements.”

Women must be at least 5’ 10” tall, and men must be at least 6’ 2” (measurements are taken barefoot). Huggett said if you are a spouse of a regular STC member, you may still be an associate member if you

don’t meet the height requirement.

Huggett, a 6-foot-7-inch chief engineer at the California Department of General Services, describes what it’s like to be vertically gifted and the camaraderie he’s found since joining the STC.

“Well, advantages are, of course, being above the others, [but] you’re always looked at a little bit differently when you’re tall. Not every place is built for tall people. Not every airplane I get in has enough headroom and legroom and all that stuff,” Huggett said.

Huggett said STC members are looking at new ways through MeetUp and social media to attract younger members to join the group as the base age of club members is climbing.

“We want to share the fun and fellowship we’ve enjoyed through the years as club members as we welcome new people, and begin building new friendships,” Huggett said.

The STC is a member of Tall Clubs International (TCI). Established in 1982, the STC lists some 80 active members in the greater Sacramento region, and a few members from as far away as Reno and Stockton.

Huggett said he is especially proud that one of STC’s own, Folsom resident Rusty Bloomquist was honored with the 2021 Tall Clubs International (TCI) Frank Winker Lifetime Achievement Award this summer.

Bloomquist, who has

served terms as STC treasurer, vice president and sergeant-at-arms, was cited for his work as national TCI vice president during the pandemic to encourage national membership and providing advice to those seeking to launch new local TCI chapters.

The STC awards scholarships to eligible graduating high school seniors.

“They must meet our height requirements and write an essay on “What Being Tall Means to Me,” Huggett said. Local scholarship winners can go on to compete for a second national scholarship award.

“We put on all kinds of events which satisfy the variety of tastes of our club members. We try to have get-togethers at fun places such as bar and grills, interesting restaurants, night clubs, and whatever else we can think of that’s likely to be fun and enjoyable,” Huggett said.

“Without the height, we’re just normal people, and there’s nothing really different about us. In the club, that’s really the only common trait we have: We’re all tall,” Huggett said. “It costs nothing to attend one of our events and check us out.”

get into the airport and on flights out of the country.

The young Marine’s death hit home in Placer County, where she grew up and graduated from Oakmont High School before enlisting in 2017. Just days before her death, Sgt. Gee was one of several Marines seen cradling and comforting Afghan children prior to their evacuation from the country.

On August 21, Gee posted a photo of herself holding an Afghan child on Instagram.

“I love my job,” she wrote.

Gee, a maintenance technician with the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit from Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, was sworn into the Marines less than a year ago and was promoted to sergeant three weeks before the Kabul attack, according to posts on her Instagram account.

A memorial service was later held Saturday, Sept. 18th at Bayside Church Adventure Campus on Stanford Ranch Road in Roseville. ★

City to Impose Minimal Requirements on Short-Term Rentals

The City Council considered several options regarding the STRs in Citrus Heights, ranging from allowing their continued operation without any regulations to a comprehensive regulatory program outlining registration, operation, enforcement, and the collection of TOT.

Drawbacks of implementing a comprehensive program include the cost of buying the location data for all current STRs in the city, as well as the ongoing costs of administering such a program. A one-time payment for the current data could cost at least a couple thousand dollars, and the City wouldn’t be notified if new listings were posted for STR locations in Citrus Heights. Some municipalities use a third-party administrator, which frequently reviews and implements ongoing data as part of the program, but that can cost around \$20,000 annually.

Councilmember Bret Daniels said that while he’s heard of parties at STRs becoming major problems in some areas of the country, he doesn’t think 11 disturbance calls this year in Citrus Heights is particularly significant. He said the City can file a nuisance lawsuit if certain STR locations are the site of repeat disturbances: “So there is a remedy for going after a property owner who’s allowing these kinds of things to occur on their property.” He viewed the idea of imposing regulations on STRs as “a solution looking for a problem ... but I don’t even see a problem based on the numbers.”

And with the lack of affordable housing in the region, Councilmember Daniels also expressed concern that some people who rent their homes as STRs are doing so to bring in the income needed in order to afford to keep their homes. He worried that imposing additional costs like TOT collection and license/

registration fees would push more people out of their homes.

While Councilmember Jeannie Bruins agreed that STRs are used to create supplemental income, she said, “For the most part, it’s a business, and I think at least they should have a business license and at least they should pay a TOT.” She also supported a restriction on the maximum number of guests to cut down on the potential for wild parties disturbing the neighborhoods.

Councilmember Bruins acknowledged that some people would avoid registering or paying the required taxes and fees, but she said, “It’s really an enforcement issue.” She suggested that the CHPD should continue responding to disturbance calls, which would allow for the identification of property owners out of compliance. Then the City would have a mechanism in place to help the owners get into compliance by applying for the license and paying the tax.

Bruins also agreed with Councilmember Daniels that it’s not necessary to create a solution “to something that may not even be a problem.” She said, “So let’s be moderate, let’s be minimalistic, let’s do something that makes sense for us.” She said at this point it wouldn’t make sense for the City to invest in database purchases or costly third-party administrators.

Councilmember Tim Schaefer supported the three minimal requirements suggested by Councilmember Bruins. He agreed that those reasonable measures would “give City staff and law enforcement the ability to take action on these properties.”

Staff will move forward based on the feedback from the City Council and will begin drafting minimal requirements for STRs within Citrus Heights. ★

How to End California’s Homelessness Crisis

Homelessness is a growing problem in virtually every state. Nowhere is it more pressing than in California, which in the past three years spent more than \$13 billion, roughly \$30,000 annually for each homeless person, to address it. Tragically, its “housing first” approach is a colossal failure. Overall, says the state auditor’s office, California’s homelessness programs are disjointed and poorly managed.

Despite little progress, policymakers keep throwing more money at the problem. Rather than adopting California’s current government-centric approach, other states should learn from its mistakes by embracing reforms that directly tackle the core issues.

Many homeless suffer from mental illness and substance abuse struggles that require creating a pathway to recovery. Unfortunately, the legal precedent of *Martin v. City of Boise* is creating a “right to live on the streets.” Policy changes such as California’s voter-approved Proposition 47 have effectively discouraged the enforcement of shoplifting items up to \$950, creating a means for the addicted or mentally ill homeless to support their habits.

Instead of enabling homelessness, states should ensure appropriate punishment for those who violate the law. However, interactions with law enforcement should be viewed as opportunities to connect homeless individuals with the help and resources they need.

One innovative approach is homeless courts that “sentence” offenders to treatment,

then expunging their records once successfully completed, as proposed in the California’s Compassionate Intervention Act. At the same time, the developing “right to sleep on the street” needs to be challenged through legal channels.

To complement these efforts, states should partner with private nonprofits that have successfully helped many transition off the streets. Even President Barack Obama has acknowledged that “the private and philanthropic sectors are responsible for some of the best thinking, innovation, and evidence-based approaches to ending homelessness.”

Shelters to Shelters represents exactly what he was talking about. The Vienna, Virginia, nonprofit emphasizes job placement and housing based on the mantra that “the solution truly needs to be about both.” Another strategy initiates contact with the homeless by providing necessities, including bag storage, transportation, Internet access, and a sitting room. While offering these services, the Crossroads Welcome Center in Tennessee determines each client’s needs and tries to direct them to institutions for further care.

Given the severity of today’s crisis, the homeless need to be relocated with an urgency. San Diego’s use of large tents that serve as transitional housing for about 700 a night and cost roughly \$11.3 million shows how this can be done.

California’s infamous unaffordability problems are also a causal driver of homelessness. Policymakers nationwide should implement regulatory reforms that lessen excessive living costs to alleviate the economic pressures driving

too many people into the streets.

The California Environmental Quality Act, the biggest barrier to homebuilding, increases costs, and causes extended construction delays. It, as well as similar laws elsewhere, is overdue for reform.

States should pursue zoning regulatory reform to simplify multi-layered restrictions, speed up the building-permit process, and ease restrictions on building duplexes, triplexes, and granny flats in order to expand the stock of affordable housing. Eliminating rent control would also meaningfully expand the supply of housing and reduce costs, particularly in cities where housing is the most expensive.

Sustainably addressing the homelessness crisis in California and every state is a moral imperative and an economic necessity. Current conditions are the unintended consequence of policies implemented by state and local governments. Though the situation is dire in California, the good news is states can make a meaningful difference if they reject the Golden State’s ill-advised policies. Adopting the right policies should be at the top of every state’s legislative to-do list.

California’s ‘Corridor of Corruption’ Yields New Case

Six years ago, the HBO network aired an episode of “True Detective,” an anthology of complicated crime stories.

It was set in the fictional Southern California city of Vinci, a cesspool of corruption and crime obviously based on Vernon, once described as “the most corrupt five square miles in California.”

In addition to fictionalizing Vernon’s sordid history, the episode folded in California’s bullet train project, but it was deservedly flailed by critics as incoherent.

Vernon, unfortunately, is not an isolated example. The southeastern quadrant of Los Angeles County is rife with municipal malfeasance, and was once dubbed a “corridor of corruption” by state Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon. Numerous local officials have been charged with bribery, self-dealing and other transgressions.

Last week, the Los Angeles County district attorney charged four men, including former state Sen. Frank Hill, with stealing \$20 million that the City of Industry advanced to a company called San Gabriel Valley Water and Power LLC for a solar

power project that never materialized.

The case stems from a battle among several cities for control of a 2,500-acre cattle ranch called Tres Hermanos in the Chino Hills, which was to have been the project’s site.

Hill, a Republican who was snared in a federal investigation of Capitol corruption three decades ago and spent four years in prison, was a consultant on the project. Others facing charges are William Barkett, owner of San Gabriel Valley Water and Power, attorney Anthony Bouza, and former Industry City Manager Paul Philips, now city manager of Bell, the scene of another corruption scandal a decade ago.

Philips and Bouza allegedly handled the funds, which between 2016 and 2018 were routed to an account controlled by Barkett, according to the district attorney’s office.

“While some of the money was paid to other vendors, Barkett is accused of spending about \$8.3 million on personal items. He also allegedly falsified or altered invoices to inflate the amount,” the DA’s office said.

Barkett is no stranger to questionable financial dealings. As I wrote about the Tres Hermanos squabble nine months ago, “In 1993, federal authorities unsealed an indictment of him and eight other persons involved in what was described as a penny stock scheme aimed at defrauding elderly retirees.

“Two years later, the charges were dismissed by a judge, who cited

unreasonable pre-trial delays by prosecutors. A decade later, Credit Suisse, an international banking company, accused Barkett of misappropriating millions of dollars he had borrowed to launch a large farming operation in the San Joaquin Valley. The suit was later dropped after a confidential settlement.”

Barkett is the scion of a politically powerful Stockton family and in the interest of full disclosure, the head of the family sued me and the Sacramento Union for libel four decades ago after I wrote a column about his influence. We were exonerated by a San Joaquin County jury.

The City of Industry is also no stranger to corruption allegations. In 2009 the Los Angeles Times probed the city’s insular structure, revealing, as it noted last week, that “for years, the city government was headed by former Mayor Dave Perez, who owned trash-hauling and maintenance companies that racked up millions of dollars a year in contracts with the city...”

“An audit years later by KPMG found that Perez’s companies had made a fortune off the city, with contracts valued at more than \$326 million,” the Times reported.

Once again, the corridor of corruption yields a case of insider dealing, but it’s not the first and won’t be the last. The corridor’s surface has barely been scratched.

This Is Not about Freedom or Personal Choice

Today we have two contrasting quotations from world leaders. One said: “Mandatory vaccinations will never be allowed because [this] is a free country and its people are sovereign.” The other said: “This is not about freedom or personal choice.”

The first was by Vladimir Putin. Russia, a free country! The second was by Joe Biden. The U.S. is no longer a free country, and the people are not sovereign. Nor are the once-sovereign states. If state governors won’t cooperate with him, “I’ll use my power as president to get them out of the

way.” It is not clear exactly how he would accomplish that. Invade the state and occupy its capitol and its courts? Arrest the governor and perhaps the legislature and throw them into prison without bail like some January 6 demonstrators? Already, many states are suing – perhaps we will learn whether the Tenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution has any meaning.

Who would have believed that a U.S. President would ever say such things?

Biden claims jurisdiction over 17 million healthcare workers, especially if they work in a facility that gets funding from Medicare or Medicaid. “If you’re seeking care at a health facility, you should be able to know that the people treating you are vaccinated – simple, straightforward, period.”

Never mind if the alternative may be having *no* qualified person to care for you. Never mind if the unvaccinated worker, who cared for people before there were vaccines, got infected, recovered, and now has better immunity

than vaccinated people. Never mind that workers with 20 years of dedicated service will have their careers and their livelihoods ruined if they don’t obey the dictator. Never mind that some of the obedient servants die – just coincidentally? – a few days after the shot. Or that some experience heart damage or paralysis. The government with its sovereign immunity does not have to compensate them, and neither do the vaccine makers or administrators, who are protected under the mantle of government.

“This is a pandemic of the unvaccinated,” states Biden. This non-evidence-based assertion is false. The most vaccinated countries in the world, including Israel and Gibraltar, are having the worst outbreaks. Both vaccinated and nonvaccinated persons shed virus, get hospitalized, and die. In the UK, a majority of the COVID-19 deaths last month were among vaccinated people, with a death rate dramatically higher than a year ago, when there was no vaccine.

Why, besides vaccine failure, would public health officials be pushing for continued masking, distancing, and a “booster” injection a few months after a person is “fully vaccinated”?

Can we blame it on the Delta variant? Did unvaccinated persons make it? Or did the vaccine, with its narrowly targeted immunity, actually select out this variant, creating or worsening the problem? Dr. Robert Malone, an inventor of mRNA vaccines, talks about “escape mutants.” Could we be creating a “monoculture” immunity, which like monoculture agriculture, is disastrously vulnerable if a resistant pathogen comes along?

Not content with owning the bodies of healthcare workers and federal employees and contractors, Biden appeals to the private sector, such as employers of 100 or more persons, to exert his will on other Americans. “To those of you running large entertainment venues from sports arenas to concert venues to movie theaters, please require folks to get

vaccinated or show a negative test as a condition of entry.”

To “protect” children under the age of 12, who are at very low risk, Biden wants everybody around them to get the vax—teenage siblings, parents, caregivers. Children over 12, that magic threshold, should get vaccinated, Biden says, and he “strongly supports independent scientific review for vaccine uses for children under 12.” He adds: “We can’t take shortcuts of that scientific work.” So far, the scientific process has been anything but independent. Moreover, studies are not scheduled to be complete before the end of 2022, and studies on myocarditis, to which teenage boys may be most vulnerable, until 2027. Any shortcutting there? And how long would fertility effects take to show up in a child who is 11 when vaccinated?

The satirical *Babylon Bee* has dubbed the program: “Your body, my choice.” Are you pregnant, worried about a miscarriage? Hoping to

be pregnant? Aspiring to an athletic career? Do you have a history of allergies, but have not yet had anaphylactic shock from polyethylene glycol (PEG) or Polysorb 80?

The choice of what risks you have to take will be Biden’s. But the consequences will be all yours.

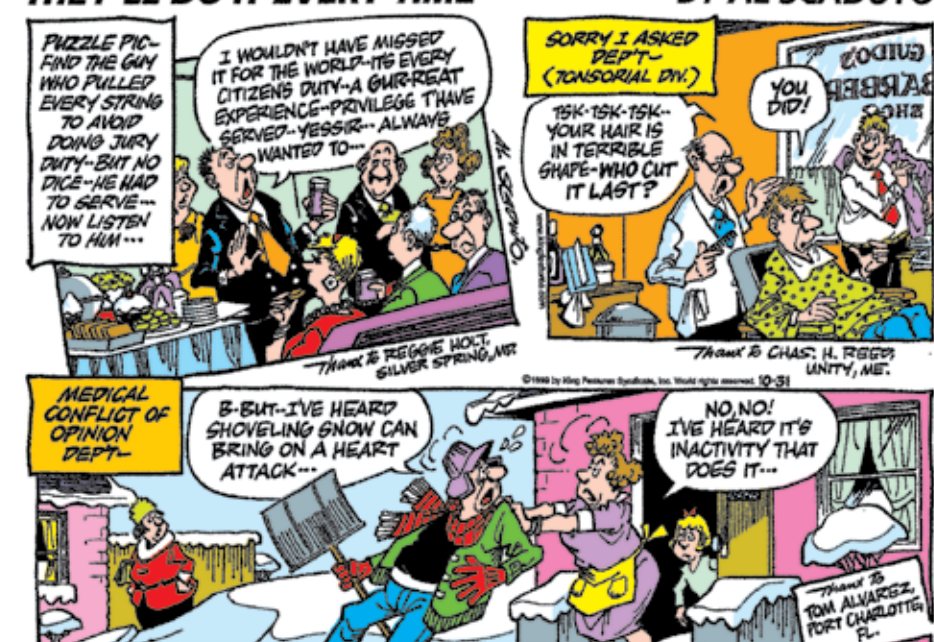

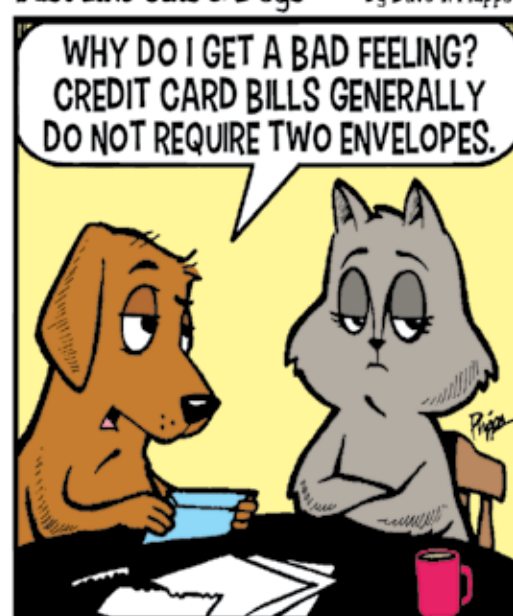
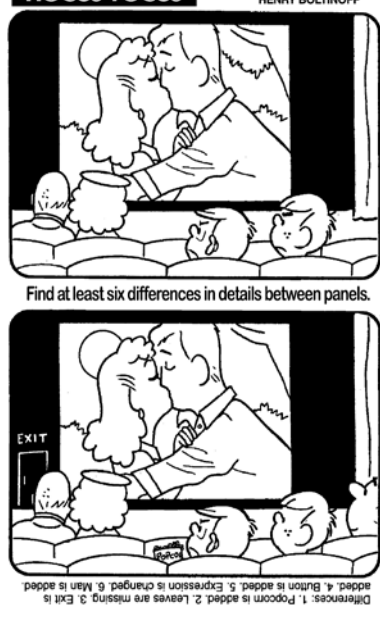

Every year that I have been on the Board of Supervisors, we have been able to support the invaluable work of nonprofits with funds generated by the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT), which comes from guests staying in hotels/motels. Through the TOT Grant Program, the Board of Supervisors awards a million dollars to nonprofits every year to help them enhance their impact on the community. I am thrilled that we are yet again launching the TOT Grant Program for the 2021-2022 cycle and the applications are open! For that reason, I thought that I would use this as an opportunity to increase awareness of the program and encourage as much participation as possible. Applications are located here: bdm.saccounty.net/TOTGrantProgram Applying organizations are required to be based in Sacramento County and must have specific programs they are requesting to fund. Programs can be for training,

events that support tourism, address community issues, or that reach underserved populations. Applications are reviewed and measured by subject area experts and are divided by the subject areas of arts and culture, community development, economic/workforce development, and health and human services. The more specific applicants can be, the better. The more information about how an organization and program have helped and will continue to help the community, the better. All applications must be submitted online and on time. I want to stress all of those points because we receive so many applications and I want every organization to maximize its chances of receiving funds. While the total amount of grant funds available is one million dollars, no single organization can receive that much. Grants can be no smaller than \$5,000 and no larger than \$50,000. Additionally, half of the total grant funds is available for the communal competitive pool. The other half is divided among each Supervisor to award to organizations in their district, meaning a minimum of \$100,000 is guaranteed to go to our Supervisorial District 4. I love seeing the organizations in our district submit their proposals and it is never easy to pick who gets funds, but we have always had great successes in each of the communities in our district. For example, in the past we have been able to secure over \$20,000 for the “Sunrise Christian Food Ministry” who was able to use the funding to increase the size of their food closet, as well as helped to fund a truck for the transportation of food. And last year we secured \$10,000 for “Citrus Heights HART” who provided rental assistance for Citrus Heights families who were in jeopardy of being evicted from their home due to unemployment as a result of COVID-19. Applications for the TOT Grant Program are due no later than Monday, October 11th at 5:00 pm. As I mentioned, applications must be submitted online and no late applications will be accepted. The nonprofit organizations of Sacramento County do great work and enhance the quality of life for countless people. Whether your nonprofit organization is seeking to provide school supplies for children, organizing a community clean up, or expanding access to the arts, I encourage you to pull together your team and put together the best application possible. And if you know someone who has a local nonprofit, please send this information to them. The TOT Grant Program is a rare opportunity for us to directly support nonprofit organizations and I hope that many qualified organizations will jump on the opportunity. Campus Commons Golf Course Closed through 2023

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Campus Commons Golf Course, owned and managed by the Golf Division of Regional Parks, is temporarily closed through Dec. 31, 2023, while erosion protection measures are put in place along the American River. These erosion protection measures must be put in place due to the significant risk of erosion along the riverbank that must be addressed in order to protect the levees and preserve the berm on which the Campus Commons Golf Course rests. “To all of our friends and families who have

been loyal players and users of our golf course throughout the years, we appreciate your patronage and thank you for your patience during this temporary closure,” said Greg Blick, Golf Division Manager. “We expect to be back open in 2024 with an improved and refurbished course for the community to enjoy.” The improvements will be constructed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, in collaboration with the California Department of Water Resources, Central Valley Flood Protection Board, and Sacramento Area Flood Control Agency. The construction may cause a temporary inconvenience for recreational

users, but the community will end up with safer levees, reduced flood risk and a complete restoration of the golf course that will include new greens, tee boxes, turf, irrigation systems and layout! Mom Inspires Girls’ STEM Event

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - A mom’s determination for girls to pursue STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) futures last weekend inspired a career day at the Aerospace Museum of California.

The event attracted hundreds of young women and their families. On-site role models included female professionals in medicine, dentistry, aviation and engineering – fields where women comprise only a quarter of the workforce. Museum advancement director Karen Jones promoted the day with the idea that girls often felt disconnected from technology. “And yet we’re surrounded by it and using it in most aspects of our lives,” she says. “A young girl who talked to a water resource engineer last weekend said she had no idea water management offered career possibilities. For lots of girls, the word “engineer” sounds a big thing to grasped.

“It’s been my dream for many years to help change that culture. STEM is the future. I want girls not to just consume technology but to produce it; I want them to lift their heads from their phones and solve problems using the technology that’s all around them. The idea is not to exclude boys, but girls need more encouragement in these fields. We have flight simulators at the museum, and I see little girls holding back, like it’s something for their brothers. STEM experience is for everyone.

The Gold River mom’s passion hatched while raising her own daughters. Now teenagers, Lauren and Morgan Jones did what other little girls did: “They played with dolls and did gymnastics,” notes their mom. “But they had had their dolls zip-lining in the backyard. They were always building and figuring how to move things around. As they got older, I wanted them to have more technical experiences. I became a Girl Scout Leader so

others could share the opportunities I wanted for my girls. Sure—my Girl troop did build-a-bear projects—but I also took them to Lego events and robot-building. They were lucky. My husband and I both work at the

Museum, so my troop got to meet astronauts, engineers and pilots. When my daughters wanted to join their school’s robotic team, I said, great! Having them excited about robots could lead to a ton of great opportunities.

“Lauren and Morgan had wonderful mentors. But I thought: what about young ladies who don’t?”

The idea of an event linking role models and young women hatched as Jones, Museum Vice President Linda Martin and SMUD Board Member Heidi Sanborn considered Rosie the Riveter’s iconic WW II image. Rosie moved mountains with her “we can do it” attitude; the Aerospace idea was to similarly inspire by modern example. “We wanted to spark girls’ interest by having them up close to women sharing STEM journeys,” says Jones. “We weren’t just offering career info; we asked mentors to talk about what inspired them. We want girls to be inspired, too. If they see themselves in these male-dominated jobs, they’ll think about pursuing technical fields.”

“We Can Do It” day dawned bright and sunny; with dozens of STEM mentors and activities spread across the museum tarmac. Desert Storm veteran and airline pilot Cathy Cook was a rock star attraction. “It would’ve helped me to have events like this when I was a teenager,” observed Captain Cook. “Back then, there were no females flying. When you encounter a real pilot, you realize: it’s just an ordinary person, doing something I could do. I was surprised how I often had a line of girls waiting to see me. They asked good questions: Was I ever in emergencies? Was I ever afraid? I told them you’re not scared, you’re prepared. You have training and judgement to figure out what to do. Your plane doesn’t know whether it’s being controlled by a man or a woman. So why not a woman?”
