A Small City in Itself

Draft for Sunrise Mall Specific Plan is Released

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)

- After more than 18 months of community engagement, the draft of the Sunrise Mall Specific Plan has been released for review. The plan will guide future redevelopment of the 100-acre Sunrise Mall site, with the goal of revitalizing the property into a vibrant heart of Citrus Heights and a premier regional destination.

The draft plan was introduced at a virtual community meeting on August 5, with more than 60 community members logging in to attend. Interim City Manager Chris Boyd said, “I’m so proud of how our community as a whole has

thought deeply, creatively on how to reimagine the heart of Citrus Heights.” He praised Citrus Heights as “a community that has always taken a very active role when it comes to civic engagement. The efforts presented here tonight are a manifestation of our community’s desire to steward in a brighter future.”

The plan’s development has been overseen by Gensler, an international architecture and planning firm. Midori Mizuhara, an urban planner with Gensler, said, “This is really a plan shaped by the community.” A robust public engagement process revealed the community’s priorities for the mall, resulting in the vision of a

21st Century Main Street: a mixed-use site with diverse shopping and dining options; interconnected plazas, green spaces, parks, and trails; office spaces, residential neighborhoods, and hotels; and community event space.

In recent years there has been a shift toward online shopping, and traditional retail has suffered as a result—leading to a reduction in Citrus Heights’ sales tax revenue. But the City was proactive in reacting to these changes, beginning the Specific Plan process back in 2019, well before the change in shopping trends was accelerated by the pandemic.

Gensler’s Project Manager Nate Cherry said that the mall in its current

form has “outlived its useful life” with a lot of excess surface parking and underutilized buildings. Cherry said that Citrus Heights’ “strong sense of community is something that’s always been a part of this effort, and so that creates a real opportunity to think about the future. And the City and the community has always been very results oriented, and so the result of that has really been co-authorship.”

The mall was always an integral part of Citrus Heights’ community and economy, and strategic redevelopment will allow it to become a new center of community life and an engine for economic growth. Redevelopment

CDPH Launches New Campaign to Combat Teen Vaping

- The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) launched a new advertising campaign called “Tell Your Story,” in response to the latest high school vaping data from its 2019-20 California Student Tobacco Survey. California has made progress in combating the youth vaping epidemic, but with kids going back to in-person learning, it is crucial we continue making progress.

The survey, which includes data from September 2019 to March 2020, revealed that California’s high school vaping rate is at its lowest in four years (8.2%) while the number of California teens trying to quit vaping more than doubled since 2018. During the same time, numerous youth and young adults were hospitalized due to the e-cigarette, or vaping product use-associated lung injury (EVALI) outbreak, sending a warning to young people across the state. California was the first state in the nation to respond to the deadly EVALI outbreak with a large-scale public awareness advertising campaign to protect young people, launched by Governor Gavin Newsom’s Executive Order on September 16, 2019.

As California was responding to the EVALI epidemic, the COVID-19 pandemic created another public health crisis that attacks the lungs, reinforcing lung health as a top priority. Smoking and vaping harms the lungs, putting Californians who vape at greater risk from COVID-19. Research has shown teens who have tried vaping are five times more likely to test positive for COVID-19.

“By addressing the dangers of vaping as part of our preparation for schools reopening, California is taking an even more proactive approach in protecting youth health,” said Dr. Tomás J. Aragón, CDPH Director and State Public Health Officer. “Returning to in-person learning could mean a spike in teen vaping use at exactly the wrong time. It’s critical young people know the facts about the dangers of vaping and have the support and resources they need to avoid use or quit.”

The “Tell Your Story” campaign features real stories from young people and highlights their journey to quit vaping. The campaign educates youth and young adults about the harmful health effects of vapes and connects them with evidenced-based resources to quit, especially as they’re exposed to increased social pressure in school environments.

- On Monday, August 2, at an informal gathering held in the concession lobby of the former Sunrise Mall Theatre, more than 70 business and community members met to hear Congressman Dr. Ami Bera along with local and county leaders talk about the past, present and future of Citrus Heights (CH).

Sponsored by the Citrus Heights Chamber of Commerce, the meeting provided a place for elected officials to meet and visit with business and community leaders to develop valuable relationships.

The chamber’s immediate past president, ilene Martzen, introduced the seven speakers. Each was

given three minutes to talk, making for a fast-paced informative half hour.

Congressman Ami Bera shared that he had secured almost \$600,000 in the

House to support construction of a new groundwater well in Citrus Heights for safe, reliable, clean drinking water. On that subject, Citrus Heights Water

District president David Wheaton also emphasized the importance of clean water saying, “Water is the substance of community

IRS Continues Unemployment Compensation Adjustments

WASHINGTON D.C. (MPG) - The Internal Revenue Service reported that another 1.5 million taxpayers will receive refunds averaging more than \$1,600 as it continues to adjust unemployment compensation from previously filed income tax returns.

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, which became law in March, excluded up to \$10,200 in 2020 unemployment compensation from taxable income calculations. The exclusion applied to individuals and married couples whose modified adjusted gross income was less than \$150,000.

Refunds by direct deposit will begin July 28 and refunds by paper check will begin July 30. This is the fourth round of refunds related to the unemployment compensation exclusion provision.

Since May, the IRS has issued over 8.7 million unemployment compensation refunds totaling over \$10 billion. The IRS will continue reviewing and adjusting tax returns in this category this summer.

The IRS effort focused on minimizing burden on taxpayers so that most people won't have to take any additional action to receive the refund. The IRS review means most taxpayers affected by this change will not have to file an amended return because IRS employees have reviewed and adjusted their tax returns for them. For taxpayers who overpaid, the IRS will either refund the overpayment or apply it to other outstanding taxes or other federal or state debts owed.

For this round, the IRS identified approximately 1.7 million taxpayers due an adjustment. Of that number, approximately 1.5 million taxpayers are expected to receive a refund. The refund average is \$1,686.

The IRS started with the simplest tax returns and is now reviewing more complex returns. The average refund amount is higher for this round because the IRS included an adjustment to the Advance Premium Tax Credit (APTC).

Most taxpayers need not take any action and there is no need to call

the IRS. However, if, because of the excluded unemployment compensation, taxpayers are now eligible for deductions or credits not claimed on the original return, they should file a Form 1040-X, Amended U.S. Individual Income Tax Return.

Taxpayers Should File an Amended Return If They:

- Did not submit a Schedule 8812 with the original return to claim the Additional Child Tax Credit and are now eligible for the credit after the unemployment compensation exclusion;
- Did not submit a Schedule EIC with the original return to claim the Earned Income Tax Credit (with qualifying dependents) and are now eligible for the credit after the unemployment compensation exclusion;
- Are now eligible for any other credits and/or deductions not mentioned below. Make sure to include any required forms or schedules.

Taxpayers Do Not Need to File an Amended Return if They:

- Already filed a tax return and did not claim the unemployment exclusion; the IRS will determine the correct taxable amount of unemployment compensation and tax;
- Have an adjustment, because of the exclusion, that will result in an increase in any non-refundable or refundable credits reported on the original return;
- Did not claim the following credits on their tax return but are now eligible when the unemployment exclusion is applied: Recovery Rebate Credit, Earned Income Credit with no qualifying dependents or the Advance Premium Tax Credit. The IRS will calculate the credit and include it in any overpayment;
- Filed a married filing joint return, live in a community property state, and entered a smaller exclusion amount than entitled on Schedule 1, line 8.

Taxpayers will generally receive letters from the IRS within 30 days of the adjustment, informing them of what kind of adjustment was made (such as refund, payment of IRS debt payment or payment offset for other authorized debts) and the amount of the adjustment. ★

It's Back-Tooth-School Season

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Healthy teeth not only help children eat, speak and sleep better, they also help them to perform better in school. With the beginning of the school year just around the corner, the Sacramento County Oral Health Program encourages parents and caregivers to make getting a dental check-up for their children a priority.

That's especially true for children entering kindergarten. California requires that all children have a comprehensive oral check-up by the time they are ready to enter public school. The "Kindergarten Oral Health Assessment" helps schools identify children suffering from

untreated dental disease. "Visiting the dentist before school starts should be at the top of every family's back-to-school checklist along with school physicals, vaccinations and school supplies," said Sacramento County Health Officer, Dr. Olivia Kasirye. "Regular dental check-ups allow dentists to identify dental problems early and allow children to receive preventive treatments, such as sealants and fluoride."

Cavities, which are largely preventable, remain the most common chronic childhood disease. In the Sacramento region, more than 46 percent of students have experienced tooth decay by third grade. To help address the issue, Sacramento County Oral Health Program is

partnering with Smile, California, the Medi-Cal Dental Program's campaign to help Medi-Cal members make use of their dental benefit, and the California Department of Public Health's Office of Oral Health, in a statewide Back-Tooth-School effort to raise awareness about the importance of children's dental health.

Schubert Calls for Withdrawal of Dangerous Petty Theft Legislation

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On July 26, 2021, former U.S. Senator Barbara Boxer became yet another victim of a violent robbery in California. This was a strong-arm robbery of an 80-year-old grandmother in broad daylight in Oakland's Jack London Square, which is in California Senator Nancy Skinner's district. Senator Skinner is currently proposing new legislation that would make this horrific crime, strong-arm robbery, a misdemeanor petty theft under Senate Bill 82.

Fortunately, the former senator was not seriously injured. While Senator Boxer is a prominent and household name, there are countless lesser-known victims who have endured similar attacks. To be clear,

these victims were subjected to a violent crime. It would be an injustice to minimize their trauma by calling it misdemeanor petty theft—a low-level offense that is eligible for diversion. SB 82 has nothing to do with justice reform – it is madness that only encourages lawlessness and victimizes citizens in counties throughout the state.

"The assault and robbery of former Senator Boxer is a stark example of the surging and brazen violent crime occurring across California," states Sacramento County District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert. "Senator Skinner's bill to reduce these violent crimes to a misdemeanor and eligible for diversion is a disgrace to victims' rights and dangerous for public safety. I urge Senator Skinner to abandon this dangerous bill." ★

Medi-Cal Members Can Get Help with Internet Costs

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)

- Registration is now open for an emergency broadband program that will help Medi-Cal members and other low-income residents receive up to \$50 a month to cover their internet costs. All Medi-Cal members qualify, and it will not affect their health coverage. Funds are limited, so act quickly.

The Emergency Broadband Benefit Program is a Federal Communications Commission (FCC) program that provides a temporary discount on monthly broadband bills during the COVID-19 pandemic for qualifying low-income households.

To qualify you must have:

An income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines or participate in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medi-Cal, or Lifeline;

Been approved to receive benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision in the 2019-2020 or 2020-2021 school year;

Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;

Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020 and the household had a total income in 2020 at or below \$99,000 for single filers and \$198,000 for joint filers; or

Met the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

The program will end once the program funds are exhausted, or six months after the Department of Health and Human Services declares an end to the pandemic, whichever comes first. ★

“Seeing the impact vaping had on my health and my family, after I got out of the hospital, I knew I had to focus on living a healthier lifestyle, and that started with quitting vaping,” said Blake Grey, a 20-year-old content creator and “Tell Your Story” campaign ambassador from Los Angeles. Grey underwent emergency surgery in 2019 when he was diagnosed with pneumomediastinum, caused by a vaping injury that burned a hole in his esophagus. “I’d tried quitting before, and it was easy to fall back into old habits. But with the support of friends and family, I was able to get into the best shape of my life and found myself in a much better place mentally as well without needing to vape.”

The “Tell Your Story” campaign promotes the “I Can Quit” text message program, an evidence-based quit vaping effort that helps support the quitting process and emphasizes how to develop and successfully practice coping strategies. The program is centered on a desired quit date and then adjusts the content and timing of the texts, so they are relevant to the users’ phase of quitting. The text program covers topics including motivation, planning, goal setting, seeking support, self-talk, withdrawal management, recovering from slips

and much more.

The annual student tobacco survey conducted by CDPH, in partnership with University of California, San Diego, assessed the use of and attitudes toward tobacco products among middle and high school students along with social and environmental exposure to various tobacco products and advertisements. Additional key findings from the report include:

Overall tobacco use (9.7%) among high school students was mainly driven by the rate of vape use (8.2%). Vape products were the most used tobacco product among students across gender, race/ethnicity, and grade; In 2020, 11.6% of LGBTQ+ identifying high school students in California vaped, compared to the overall California high school vaping rate of 8.2 percent; High school students who rated their mental health as poor had higher current tobacco use prevalence (16.1%) compared to those who rated their mental health as good to excellent (7.9%); The vast majority of teens who vape use flavored vapes (96.2%).

will create thousands of new jobs, through both the construction phase as well as new permanent jobs that will become available as new businesses thrive in the developed space. New office spaces will also attract growing industries like healthcare and technology.

The mixed use of retail, dining, offices, and events/entertainment will also activate the site throughout the day, ensuring maximum use and engagement. Cherry said that a main street of retail and dining, connected by walkable streets and an abundance of green spaces, will turn the 100-acre site into a small city in itself—a destination for both local residents and regional visitors.

The Sunrise Mall Specific Plan creates a framework outlining the policies, development standards, infrastructure, and implementation and administration that will guide development of the site, ensuring that the community’s vision becomes a reality. Because the mall site has a variety of owners, the plan splits the site into six planning areas, each with their own sub-areas. The plan outlines allowable uses for each area, as

well as building height standards, setback requirements, street standards, utilities, and more.

The plan allows for flexible development that can respond to the city’s changing needs in the coming decades, so development of the site can be phased over the next 20 years. Phase 1 includes the vacant Sears building and the parking areas along Sunrise Blvd. and the southern boundary of the property. These spaces are ready for immediate development to create new dining, retail, entertainment, open spaces, and some residential or hotel opportunities.

Phase 2 would encompass the area along Greenback Ln. and the eastern boundary of the property. This phase could include development of office spaces, a hotel, residential areas, a neighborhood park, and more retail and dining. Phase 3 would focus on development of the mall itself, creating a main street with walkable streets and flexible-use spaces for retail, dining, and a central open space for community events. The mixed-use plan would also allow for more office, residential, or hotel opportunities in this phase. Phase 4 includes development opportunities for

the current JC Penney and Macy’s Women buildings to create more mixed-use for retail, offices, residential, and open spaces.

Casey Kempenaar, Citrus Heights planning manager, said, “The city is 98% built out, so what that means is we don’t have a lot of land left, and what we do have we want to make sure it’s planned in a really comprehensive manner. So, this site is the single biggest redevelopment opportunity in the city ... This is our biggest opportunity to change the community and create economic development opportunities for the city and the region.”

The financial investment for the actual development will come from interested developers, and the approval of the Specific Plan is the first step in opening up the potential of the site. The Planning Commission and the City Council will both review the draft plan in depth later this year, along with more public hearings. If approved, the City could then begin marketing the site to developers by the new year.

PG&E Suspension of Service Disconnections Extended

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA (MPG) - Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) announced recently that it will extend the moratorium on utility service disconnections through September 30, 2021. The moratorium was put in place in March 2020 by the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC).

“We believe extending the service disconnection moratorium for all customers allows for additional relief efforts from the state to take shape while protecting our customers who are financially struggling,” said Marlene Santos, PG&E Executive Vice President and Chief Customer Officer.

As part of the company’s ongoing efforts to help customers manage their bills, PG&E will auto-enroll eligible customers in new extended payment plans by the end of September to coincide with the potential ending of the moratorium.

While the moratorium has been extended, other emergency customer protections put in place by the CPUC during the pandemic have expired.

Recertifications and Post-Enrollment Verifications for the California Alternate Rates for Energy (CARE) and Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA) programs have resumed. CARE/FERA customers whose program eligibility would have expired between March 4, 2020 and June 30, 2021 will be required to re-certify. Customers whose program eligibility expired on or after July 1, 2021 will be required to recertify within 90 days. The earliest a customer may be removed from CARE/FERA is October 1, 2021 after a series of direct mail and targeted email communications.

PG&E has helped almost 300,000 residential customers enroll in CARE since February 2020 providing income-qualified customers with a monthly discount.

In addition, Medical Practitioner Certifications for the Medical Baseline Program have resumed. Active Medical Baseline customers who have enrolled in the program under the consumer protections and customers with non-permanent medical conditions as designated by their medical practitioners will be required to recertify for their continued eligibility. PG&E will proactively communicate with Medical Baseline customers and remind them of their upcoming recertifications.

The transition coincides with the launch of PG&E’s new online Medical Baseline medical practitioner portal. This new portal will allow customers and their medical practitioners to complete the Medical Baseline certification/recertification process fully online. The new online application is accessible at pge.com/medicalbaseline.

In 2020, 192,000 customers were enrolled in PG&E’s Medical Baseline Program. As of June 2021, there are more than 256,000 PG&E residential customers signed up for Medical Baseline.

PG&E has proactively reached out to almost 400,000 impacted customers since the start of the pandemic and continues to partner with local Community Based Organizations to support customers.

PG&E is dedicated to helping customers as the company slowly moves back to more normal billing operations later this year. For more information log onto pge.com/covid19. ★

Hellish Heat

Sweltering heat is upon us, so I checked in with Nicolette Pace MS,RDN, CDE etc to give us some tips on how to stay cool and beat this hellish heat. She shared these ten tips with me on my POPPOFF Radio Show. We must prevent heatstroke. Nicolette emphasized that heatstroke is no joke. It's life threatening. Here's help to prevent a health disaster!

1. **DON'T GO OUTSIDE.** If temps are 91 degrees or greater avoid going outside for longer than necessary. Your body is trying to cool down in the heat, so your skin temperature can rise to 105 degrees. Seek areas that are either air-conditioned or are in dense shade preferably with a breeze.
2. **DON'T STAY IN THE SUN.** Umbrellas and shelters can help as does a cloudy day. However, this is not a license to tackle the heat and stay outdoors. Limit outdoors to one hour or less.
3. **DON'T EXERCISE OUTDOORS.** Physical activity increases heart rate and sweating and fluid loss raises body temperature. Combat this high risk category for heatstroke and exhaustion either by exercising indoors, targeting outside activity to either early AM, later PM, or when temperatures drop below 91 degrees.
4. **DON'T GET DRUNK.** Alcohol is the single worst beverage to take in the heat. Not only does it lead to more urination and dehydration, but it lowers alertness and contributes to mental confusion...a life threatening symptom of heatstroke. Never was it more mandatory to alternate alcohol with H2O and limit cocktails, straight shots, beer, and wine to health guidelines.
5. **DON'T DRINK SUGARY BEVERAGES.** Super sweet sugary drinks contribute to dehydration by displacing water in body tissues
6. **DON'T EAT SALTY SNACKS OR PROCESSED FOODS.** Like sugar, too much salt contributes to bloating and ultimately dehydration. It causes more thirst and urination, disrupting kidney hormones and the body's delicate electrolyte balance. It's wise to avoid excessive sodium.
7. **DON'T TAKE EXCESSIVE CAFFEINE.** A long known controversial contributor to fluid loss, caffeinated beverages can do more harm than good. Limit to 300 mg a day, especially if you're in the sun or heat.
8. **DON'T USE SUGAR SUBSTITUTES TO HYDRATE.** While guilt-free panacea is embraced, know small amounts of sugar helps hydration. Think hydration balanced sports drinks.
9. **DON'T USE SUNSCREEN.** Many people may not realize sunscreen is not a heatstroke preventer. Sunscreen is very very necessary for UV ray protection but it doesn't protect from heatstroke.
10. **DON'T WEAR TIGHT SKIMPY CLOTHES.** Fewer clothes help you lose more heat! Sweating is very important to cool down so tight synthetic fiber, polyester-type fabric lock in heat and raise body temperature. Wear light colors and loose fitting natural clothes.

Newsom, Facing Recall, Worries About Blackouts

Several factors propelled the 2003 recall of then-Gov. Gray Davis, but one of the most powerful was his clumsy handling of an electric power crisis that had resulted in rolling blackouts. The crisis resulted from the ill-conceived and misnamed “deregulation” of power supplies that the Legislature and Davis’ predecessor, Pete Wilson, had enacted seven years earlier. It virtually invited power suppliers such as Enron to game the system. When the system failed, Davis was governor and failed to deal with it quickly and effectively. As Davis dithered and power supplies dwindled, one major utility, Pacific Gas and Electric, declared bankruptcy and a second, Southern California Edison, came very close to insolvency.

The state finally stepped into the dysfunctional market and began buying power itself to prevent further blackouts, but the political damage to Davis had been done and the recall campaign was rolling.

This bit of history frames the emergency decree that Gov. Gavin Newsom, who also faces a recall election, issued last Friday.

With high temperatures driving power demand upwards, with drought curtailing hydroelectric generation and with the state more dependent on less reliable solar and wind power, California faces a looming supply shortfall that could force power blackouts. The state might be 3,500 megawatts short on hot afternoons this summer and as much as 5,000 megawatts short next summer if the drought continues.

Newsom wants the state’s energy regulators, the independent agency that operates the electric grid and the utilities themselves to go all-out in tapping whatever sources they can to avoid blackouts. That would include the natural gas-fired plants that the state wants to phase out and auxiliary diesel- and natural gas-powered standby plants in industrial plants.

Newsom suspends environmental clearances and other regulatory procedures to accelerate new power sources, including battery banks to back up solar and wind projects. He also directs utilities to pay up to \$2 per kilowatt-hour – many times the standard rate – to industrial customers for reducing their draw from the grid and shifting to backup generators, promising that the state will reimburse their outlays.

Newsom’s order declares that “conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property exist due to rapid, unforeseen, sudden, and severe energy shortages throughout California caused by these climate events...”

The key word is “unforeseen,” a not-so-subtle disclaimer of political

responsibility if blackouts occur. But in reality, he had plenty of warning that California was short of electric energy. Last summer, the state experienced brief blackouts during late afternoon and early evening hours as solar power production began its daily decline and the state could not procure enough backup power from the regional grid to cover the deficit.

It was a wakeup call about the state’s growing dependence on solar, wind and other emission-free sources that lack the dependability of more traditional generation –unless the state has sufficient battery banks or other ways to store and supply power when needed the most.

“These blackouts, which occurred without prior warning or enough time for preparation, are unacceptable and unbefitting of the nation’s largest and most innovative state. This cannot stand,” Newsom said at the time.

If Newsom had heeded the 2020 warning and done then what he wants to do now to improve resiliency, the state would have been better equipped to deal with the current shortfall. He has to hope that California will avoid blackouts in the six weeks between now and the close of voting on September 14, or that if the lights do go out, voters won’t punish him as they did Gray Davis 18 years ago.

Social Security Matters

I’m Terminal; What Are My Wife’s Options as My Survivor?

Dear Rusty: I’m 60 and my wife is 62. I have terminal Stage IV prostate cancer, but my wife is in pretty good health. If I draw at 62 would that affect my wife’s survivor benefits? When should she start to withdraw? Also, when I die what would she get? Would she get her SS and then something of mine? Or must she choose between keeping hers and taking my survivor benefit? Please assist - I don’t have much energy anymore. **Signed: Running on Empty**

Dear Running on Empty: Sorry to hear of your illness and I commend you for planning ahead for your wife. As your surviving widow, your wife’s survivor benefit will be based upon the amount you were receiving at your death, but it will also be affected by her age when she claims it. So, yes, if you claim at age 62 it will mean a smaller widow’s benefit than your wife might otherwise get if you waited longer. But there is also a special rule, known as the “widows limit” which will



affect your wife’s survivor benefit. The widow’s limit stipulates that the minimum benefit your wife will receive as your survivor is 82.5% of the amount you would have been due at your full retirement age (67). So even if you claim at age 62 and take a 30% cut in your own benefit, your wife will still get 82.5% of what you were entitled to at your full retirement age (FRA). However, as I said, your wife’s survivor benefit amount will also be based upon her age when she claims it, and she isn’t required to claim it immediately upon your death.

Your wife’s survivor benefit as your widow will reach maximum when she reaches her own full retirement age, and if she claims it prior to her FRA, it will be reduced 4.75% for each full year earlier than her FRA. But if her benefit as your widow will be more than her own SS retirement benefit, she can take (or continue to receive) her own SS benefit and wait until her survivor benefit reaches maximum at her FRA. Or alternatively, if your wife is not yet collecting her own SS benefit, she could choose to let her own benefit grow and reach

maximum at age 70 and take her smaller survivor benefit first. She will get whichever benefit is more - her survivor benefit or her own, and she will have a choice of which one to take and when to choose it.

Finally, depending upon the extent of your disability, you may wish to consider applying for Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits earlier than age 62. Advanced prostate cancer is on Social Security’s Compassionate Allowance List, and this would expedite processing of your SSDI application, resulting in a decision within a few weeks instead of a few months. Doing so would not affect your wife’s claiming options upon your death, and it may make her survivor benefit higher because your SSDI benefit would be based on your FRA benefit entitlement.

Slight Improvement in Latest Optimism Index

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The release of NFIB’s monthly small business Optimism Index showed an improving national Main Street economy, something the California state director for the association that took the poll said Gov. Gavin Newsom could greatly enhance by signing the budget trailer bill that includes Assembly Bill 150, which contains a new elective tax for pass-through entities that is a way for smaller businesses to work around the State and Local Tax (SALT) caps slapped on them by the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act.

From NFIB Chief Economist Bill Dunkelberg

“Small businesses optimism is rising as the economy opens up, yet a record number of employers continue to report

that there are few or no qualified applicants for open positions. Owners are also having a hard time keeping their inventory stocks up with strong sales and supply chain problems.”

Key findings include:

Owners expecting better business conditions over the next six months rose 14 points to a net negative 12%, an improvement but still in very negative territory; Earnings trends over the past three months improved six points to a net negative 5%; The net percent of owners raising average selling prices increased seven points to a net 47% (seasonally adjusted), the highest reading since January 1981.

CDC Recommends Face Covering for Indoors

California Department of Public Health

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The COVID-19 vaccines are effective in preventing serious disease. Unvaccinated persons are more likely to get infected and spread the virus which is transmitted through the air and concentrates indoors. About 15% of our population remains without the option for vaccination (children under 12 years old are not yet eligible) and risk for COVID-19 exposure and infection will remain until we reach full community immunity.

The purpose of this guidance is to provide information about higher risk settings where masks are required or recommended to prevent transmission to persons with higher risk of infection (e.g., unvaccinated or immunocompromised persons), to persons with prolonged, cumulative exposures (e.g., workers), or to persons whose vaccination status is unknown. When people who are not fully vaccinated wear a mask correctly, they protect others as well as themselves. Consistent and correct mask use by people who are not fully vaccinated is especially important indoors.

With the emergence of the more contagious Delta variant in California which now accounts for over 80% of cases sequenced, cases and hospitalizations of COVID-19

are rising throughout the state, especially amongst those that remain unvaccinated.

Despite ongoing outreach and improving COVID-19 vaccine access, as of July 27, 2021, a significant proportion of Californians throughout the state are not yet fully vaccinated. The Delta variant is two times as contagious than early COVID-19 variants, leading to increasing infections.

In California, unvaccinated persons continue to be required to wear masks in all indoor public settings. This guidance is an update, in light of review of the most recent CDC recommendations. To achieve universal masking in indoor public settings, we are recommending that fully vaccinated people also mask in indoor public settings across California. This adds an extra precautionary measure for all to reduce the transmission of COVID-19, especially in communities currently seeing the highest transmission rates. Local health jurisdictions may be more restrictive than this guidance.

In California, fully vaccinated people might choose to wear a mask in indoor non-public settings, particularly if they are immunocompromised or at increased risk for severe disease from COVID-19, or if they have someone in their household who is immunocompromised, at increased risk of severe

disease, not fully vaccinated, or not yet eligible for vaccination.

In workplaces, employees are subject to the Cal/OSHA COVID-19 Emergency Temporary Standards (ETS) or in some workplaces the Cal/OSHA Aerosol Transmissible Diseases (ATD) Standard and should consult those regulations for additional applicable requirements.

Masking Requirements

Masks are required for all individuals in the following indoor settings, regardless of vaccination status:

On public transit (examples: airplanes, ships, ferries, trains, subways, buses, taxis, and ride-shares) and in transportation hubs (examples: airport, bus terminal, marina, train station, seaport or other port, subway station, or any other area that provides transportation); **Indoors** in K-12 schools, childcare; **Emergency shelters** and cooling centers

Masks are required for all individuals, in the following indoor settings, regardless of vaccination status (and surgical masks are recommended):

Healthcare settings[6]; State and local correctional facilities and detention centers[7]; Homeless shelters[8]; Long Term Care Settings[9] & Adult and Senior Care Facilities[10].

Additionally, masks are required

for unvaccinated individuals in indoor public settings and businesses (examples: retail, restaurants, theaters, family entertainment centers, meetings, state and local government offices serving the public).

See State Health Officer Order, issued on July 26, 2021, for a full list of high-risk congregate and other healthcare settings where surgical masks are required for unvaccinated workers, and recommendations for respirator use for unvaccinated workers in healthcare and long-term care facilities in situations or settings not covered by Cal OSHA ETS or ATD.

For additional information on types of masks, the most effective masks, and ensuring a well-fitted mask, individuals should refer to CDPH Get the Most out of Masking and see CDPH Masking Guidance Frequently Asked Questions for more information.

Guidance for Businesses, Venue Operators or Hosts

In settings where masks are required only for unvaccinated individuals, businesses, venue operators or hosts may choose to:

Provide information to all patrons, guests and attendees regarding vaccination requirements and allow vaccinated individuals to self-attest that they are in compliance prior to entry; Implement vaccine verification to determine

whether individuals are required to wear a mask; Require all patrons to wear masks; No person can be prevented from wearing a mask as a condition of participation in an activity or entry into a business.

Exemptions to Masking Requirements

The following individuals are exempt from wearing masks at all times:

Persons younger than two years old. Very young children must not wear a mask because of the risk of suffocation; Persons with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a mask. This includes persons with a medical condition for whom wearing a mask could obstruct breathing or who are unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove a mask without assistance; Persons who are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication; Persons for whom wearing a mask would create a risk to the person related to their work, as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.

“We the Government”

“WE THE PEOPLE” begins the Preamble of the US Constitution ... signed September 17, 1787 and ratified June 21, 1788. The preamble is a brief introductory statement of the Constitution’s core purposes and guiding principles.

Thanks to the vision and sacrifice of the founders who established our constitutional republic - we have a nation which is founded on ideals and not personalities. There was no king, no tribal chief, no dictator, no military general, it was “We the People” ruling ourselves.

However, many of us do not consider the obvious next step is that “We the People” also means “We the Government”.

For many of us in our daily lives, we think of the government as a “them”. They are telling us what to do. They are taking our money through taxes. They are being fair or unfair. They are not doing enough or doing too much!

But actually, the government is us! We have nothing to complain about ... unless we are complaining about ourselves. We get exactly the government we deserve. If we do not like our government, it is our own fault. Now that may sound harsh and blunt ... but ultimately it is true.

Therefore, we cannot simply treat our government as something to sneer at, but rather we must treat it as something we own! Because we do. We own our government. And, we

must exercise our ownership over our governments – local, state, federal, and otherwise.

However, as owners, many of us have delegated too much authority to our employees – those employees being our elected officials. And, that is precisely what elected officials are – our employees. They are accountable to us, the owners, the citizens. We owe them courtesy and respect, as we should do with all people. But, they are our employees.

Moreover, while some have delegated too much authority; worse yet, some of us have abdicated our authority to these employees! We become absentee owners who in our minds have let the employees become our masters and we the servants. (Remember, we call them “Public Servants”.) But abdication breeds an erosive attitude of, “I am not responsible for my community or my life; they (the government) are responsible.” Personal responsibility becomes diminished and government responsibility is enlarged. As an elected official, how many people came to me to complain about this or that ... but when I asked them if they voted in the last election, their reply would be, “No, I was too busy.”

In light of this collective complacency, this ongoing “We the Government” column is dedicated to empowering citizens to exercise healthy ownership over their governments. And, being a responsible owner ... a responsible citizen means that we must care, be informed, be good decision makers, and be involved! And, I know that sounds like a lot of work and that we are all busy, but remember what we have to lose – liberty, choice, freedoms. We have a unique, remarkable society – the envy of much of the world.

Remember, left to its own, everything declines and dies. A rolling ball

on the ground stops. A flourishing business goes idle. A marriage fails. A government morphs into something hideous. Energy must be invested to keep the ball rolling, the business fresh, a relationship full of love, a government on track to be the servant of its citizens.

The good news is that our forefathers paid the biggest price to start our constitutional republic, and we only have to keep it going. The ball on the ground must be kicked hard to make it roll, but once rolling only a little more energy is necessary to keep it moving in the correct direction. And, as Helen Keller observed, “The world is moved along, not only by the mighty shoves of its heroes, but also by the aggregate of tiny pushes of each honest worker.”

We do not have to be a hero to keep our community sound, but all of us must work together with each of our “tiny pushes”. If you are interested in learning more about how to preserve our freedoms and become “We the Government,” I look forward to continuing our conversation in upcoming articles for this column.

I’ll be sharing information about local organizations, such as the Sacramento Taxpayers Association, that are empowering citizens locally; practical steps about how to hold our government leaders accountable; and lesser know political news that has major implications for our local freedoms. In the meantime, stay hopeful and keep carrying on our torch of liberty!

Unemployment Insurance Fund Debt Undermines Safety Net Programs

County Announces Watershed Stewardship and Education Grant

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Legislature has rejected efforts to begin to pay down even the smallest fraction of an estimated \$22 billion Unemployment Insurance (UI) Fund debt, undermining the long-term integrity of the program and guaranteeing that businesses of every size will be forced to pay higher taxes in an effort to pay off the debt.

“The UI Fund has been critically important during the recession, helping provide support for workers who lost their jobs due to government-mandated closures. But now the Legislature is refusing to provide the program critically needed funding that will help alleviate the \$22 billion – and growing – debt the fund has accumulated after the fifth-largest economy shut down for 15 months,” said Rob Lapsley, president of the California Business Roundtable.

Employers are paying higher taxes now and must be addressed now. While the state rates were on course to go down prior to the pandemic, the rapid deterioration of the state fund’s viability means these higher rates are now likely locked in for another decade or more.

In addition, federal taxes on employment will go higher as well. As a participant in the federal unemployment fund program, the state cannot carry a UI Fund debt for more than 34 months. If the state continues carrying the debt, businesses will automatically incur an

annual payroll tax increase until the fund debt is paid off. Because of the size of the current UI Fund debt, it is unlikely that the debt will be paid off before the next recession hits, creating a permanent tax increase on all businesses while ensuring this critical safety net will not be there to help workers in the next economic downturn.

The current UI Fund debt is slated to grow to more than twice the debt the fund incurred during the Great Recession. It took nearly 10 years to pay off that debt, with funds coming from an increase in businesses’ state and federal payroll taxes.

“California businesses already pay the highest unemployment fund tax rate, plus a 15 percent surcharge. Without a significant investment from the state to address the massive UI Fund debt, businesses are now on the hook to pay for debt that they didn’t create and cannot afford to pay back.

“There is no time to delay. This tax increase is hurting employment now, and even higher taxes will go into effect when the federal increases kick in as well. The troubling reality is that businesses will likely never be able to pay off this debt. The debt is so large that we will likely experience another recession before the current debt is paid, creating debt in the fund and erasing any progress businesses have made to pay off existing debt. Permanent insolvency of the state’s most critical safety net program is probable if the state does not intervene,” Lapsley concluded. ★

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Stormwater Quality Program is accepting applications for the 2021-22 Watershed Stewardship and Education Grant. Each year the Stormwater Quality Program offers schools, non-profit and community organizations up to \$2,500 for projects to help students understand the importance of keeping local creeks and rivers clean and healthy.

This is the 16th year the County is offering grants to help raise awareness about the need for protecting creeks and rivers. By collaborating with schools and non-profits over the years, the County has seen positive results from the community as they develop a better understanding of stormwater pollution. Along with helping the environment, many participants find completing a project like this can be a great team-building effort.

Thirty-five schools

have participated in the program over the years. Will Rogers Middle School is one of the original participants and has taken part in the program every year since it launched in 2005.

Past grant winners have completed 115 projects like creek clean ups; hands on education about Sacramento’s watershed, creeks, or rivers; creating eco-friendly gardens; water quality experiments to assess the health of a creek/river; and creating school-wide campaigns to increase awareness about stormwater pollution. Each year grant winners submit a report to the County on their projects; each showing many students in the program gain a better understanding of stormwater pollution and the environment.

To be eligible for this grant, projects must in some way protect or enhance local creeks, rivers, or watersheds. Projects will generally fall into one or more of the following categories:

Educational Projects - Projects that inform or instruct about the aquatic ecosystem, watersheds, or stormwater pollution prevention; School/Club Projects - Projects that can be organized by teachers, classrooms, or clubs; Community Outreach Projects - Projects that involve and inspire the community; Monitoring Project - Projects that measure water quality, species, or habitat; Restoration Projects - Projects that restore or enhance riparian habitats, wetlands, creeks, or rivers

Eligible projects must be implemented within the Stormwater Utility boundaries of Sacramento County or directly affect the residents of these areas. The application for the 2021-22 Watershed Stewardship and Education Grant is available on the Stormwater Quality Program webpage.

The application deadline is Sep. 30, 2021, and the grants will be awarded in October.

I am concerned that San Juan Unified School District is requiring all K-12 students to wear masks.

For the past 18 months, school-aged children have been subjected to haphazard distance-learning without the benefit of social interaction, the consequences of
