Sac County **Assists Transitional Aged Youth**

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Growing up isn't easy, even under the best of circumstances. Unfortunately, not everyone gets the support and guidance they need to take on life's adult responsibilities. For some transitional-aged youth (TAY) between the ages of 18 and 24, that steep learning curve can result in housing instability or homelessness.

According to a 2019 Sacramento County homeless population count, approximately 415 TAY - 8 percent of the total population - were experiencing homelessness. Of those counted: 59 percent were unsheltered and sleeping outdoors; 41 percent were staying in a transitional housing program, a hotel/motel or vehicle; 42 percent were experiencing long-term continuous homelessness lasting over

"There are so many different milestones that occur during that time frame and a lot of youth may not have the healthiest support system or they might not have any at all. That presents a great challenge in understanding how to navigate those new worlds they're entering at that age," says Angel Uhercik, Homeless Services Program Planner with the Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance. "That's where the guidance from our case managers and our Prevention and Intervention specialists is so key in helping them be successful."

Sacramento County's Prevention and Intervention Program offers housing and a hand up. Partnering with Lutheran Social Services, Waking the Village, Wind Youth Services and the Sacramento LGBT Community Center, they connect clients with housing, short-term financial assistance and services to help youth to navigate resources, including employment, education and anything else clients may need.

"The partners are really well resourced to bridge the access from Prevention and Intervention assistance to a lot of different groups in our community," Uhercik says.

Last year, Chardonnay Blakes, 24, a new mother and college student, found herself homeless. While she was able to couch surf with family, it wasn't sustainable.

"The apartment was way too small, it was a one-bedroom," she remembers. Continued on page 4

Citrus Heights Voters Do Not Adopt Measure M

City of Citrus Heights

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County election results have been finalized and Citrus Heights voters opted not to approve Measure M. If adopted, Measure M would have enacted a local one-cent sales tax increase to generate revenue to fund City services and community priorities, with a resident Oversight Committee and third-party financial audits.

"As always, City officials and staff take direction from our

residents," said City and prevention, school strategic objectives to Manager Chris Boyd. "City Council voted to place Measure M on the ballot to let our community make this important decision and the voters have shared their voice. We are grateful to the residents who participated in this unique election, and our dedicated staff will continue to work closely with the community as important budget decisions are considered. The City's extensive survey efforts demonstrated that our community prioritizes services like crime investigation

safety and security, street serve as benchmarks every maintenance and pothole repair, homelessness reduction programs, and local business and jobs support. As we head into strategic planning and budget updates, we will look to balance and align with what our community prioritizes."

The City's in-depth strategic planning process culminates in the City Council setting three-year goals which provide guidance for all City efforts. After the three-year goals are set, City staff establish

Stand Strong at the Crossroads

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - At-risk, outof-school young adults between the ages of 18-24 living in Sacramento County have until January 30th, 2021 to submit their applications to participate in the Crossroads Youth Employment Program (YEP), said Matthew Rosario, youth services case manager at the Crossroads Job Center in Citrus Heights.

The YEP program offers its participants an opportunity to build employment skills and gain first-time work experience.

Applications are taken first-come, firstserve, Rosario said. He recommends interested youth should call him at 916-676-2540, extension 322 to arrange to pick up an application packet.

"Once they contact the Sacramento Works Center, I'll send them the necessary forms by email to get them enrolled as quickly as possible," he said.

In partnership with the Sacramento Employment and Training Agency (SETA), Crossroads Diversified Services operates the Citrus Heights Sacramento Works Job Center at 7011 Sylvan Road, Suite A in Citrus Heights. The Youth Employment Program (YEP) is a year-round work experience program, funded by the federal Workforce Investment Act (WIOA).

"Right now, 17 positions are available, and the application deadline has been extended to January 30, 2021," Rosario said. The current pay scale is \$13.75 an hour for up to 200 hours of work, and the hourly wage will increase to the state's new \$14.00 minimum wage level in January

YEP applicants must be interested in giving back to their community, developing leadership skills, attending employment workshops, and completing up to 200 hours of paid work at a local business. Applications are accepted until all positions are filled, Rosario said.

The YEP program is specifically focused on at-risk youth who may not have internet or personal computer access. Program participants may be provided a laptop computer if needed.

"Many of the youth targeted by the (YEP) program are among our most vulnerable," Rosario said. "They have a variety of challenges they are trying to overcome."

supportive services who may lack the technology to participate in remote sessions," he said. "They just need to call our office to make the necessary arrangements."

The application process consists of completing the YEP application packet, an interview with a case manager and completion of a certification appointment at the job center to enroll into the program. Once the application is completed, all candidates complete a series of pre-employment work readiness workshops to help prepare them to be successful employees, Rosario said.

YEP program participants are expected to complete all required workshops, work experience at a local business, a pre and post-test assessment if applicable and obtain employment after completing the program and/or enroll into post-secondary education, Rosario explained.

The Crossroads Job Center's Citrus Heights branch has shifted its in-person operating hours to "by appointment only" due to the pandemic, Rosario said. The center offers job training and counseling assistance both online and by using Zoom video chat.

"When Covid hit, many local employers we had been working with significantly scaled back their hiring," he said. "That is starting to change as employers are looking again to hire. We chiefly work with employers to find entry-level positions "We're helping at-risk youth with where participants in our program can

build employment skills," he said.

"We're taking necessary steps to better prepare our applicants for work in this new job environment," he said. Additional training in workplace safety standards has been updated to reflect California social distancing standards in the workplace, he said.

What makes a successful YEP program

"A positive attitude and an ability to be able to act respectfully and professionally at all times," Rosario said. "We'll help them with communication skills and address any issues, concerns or workrelated problems to ensure their success."

The YEP application checklist includes right to work documents, proof of an employment barrier and federal Selective Service Registration for males over 17 years of age. Proof of an employment barrier can include low income, proof of disability, parenting, pregnancy, probation or homelessness. Youth in former or current foster care environments are also considered with a letter from a social worker or applicable court documents, he said.

Participants learn to navigate the world of work by identifying and exploring future career occupations, employment preparation, leadership development, networking, and skill development.

"Our goal is to have all the participants in the YEP program fully commit to the year-long program," he said.

"Participants must complete mandatory work readiness workshops before they are placed with an employer," Rosario said. "At this time all workshops are done remotely via online video chat or assigned with specific activities to be done by email and Microsoft Powerpoint."

"All of our workshop sessions are via one-on-one appointment and we've scheduled times which are flexible for our participants to attend," Rosario said. Individual workshops include resume writing, career exploration, job searching strategies, interview preparation and mock interviewing.

Once in the program, YEP participants must agree to arrive on time to all workshops, program meetings, and work shifts, Rosario said. "If they are late or cannot make their work shift, they are required to call their case manager or employer in advance."

YEP workshops also place emphasis on "soft skills" which Rosario said are especially critical to the success of new job seekers in the workplace. These include strengthening interpersonal communication skills, critical thinking skills and modeling professionalism in the workplace.

The Crossroads Job Center provides a host of resource services to assist individuals in finding, obtaining and keeping employment. Services include job seeker assessment tools, employment skills workshops, benefits counseling services, state Economic Development Department (EDD) Veterans Services referrals, state certified typing/data entry tests and "Ticket to Work" services.

The "Ticket to Work" program, a free and voluntary program which offers eligible job seekers age 18-64 who receive Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and/or Supplemental Security Disability Income (SSI) benefits which provides choices, opportunities and support needed to find and keep employment, building a path towards self-sufficiency.

"We're here to help," Rosario said.



Social Security Matters Should I Claim Social Security at 62?

Dear Rusty: I'm looking for information about retiring and starting my Social Security very soon at age 62. I'm not sure if I want to do it because I'm not sure if I can. Can you help me figure this out? Signed: Hesitant

Dear Hesitant: I know it can be daunting trying to figure out whether and when to claim your Social Security benefits. I'll give you some of the basics:

First, you should know that if you claim your benefits at age 62, your benefit amount will be considerably reduced from what it would be if you waited longer to claim. At 62, your benefit will be about 28% less than it would be at your full retirement age (FRA) which, for you is 66 years and 8 months. Your benefit will continue to grow by a fraction of a percentage point each month you wait, until it reaches 100% at your FRA. You can choose to delay even longer than your FRA, and your benefit will continue to grow up to age 70 when you reach your maximum benefit amount. For you, that maximum at age 70 would be about 28% more than you would get at your FRA and about 75% more than you would get at age 62. There is a considerable financial advantage to waiting to claim.

If you continue working, and you claim at age 62 (or



at any age before your FRA), you'll be subject to Social Security's "earnings test," which limits how much you can earn before they take back some of your benefits. Starting at age 62 and continuing until the year you attain FRA, there will be an annual limit to your earnings (the 2021 limit is \$18,960) and, if you exceed that, SS will take back benefits equal to \$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit. That could mean you will go some number of months without receiving benefits until Social Security recovers what you owe because you exceeded the earnings limit. Of course, if you fully retire from work now that is not a concern, but it may influence a future decision to return to work. Social Security's earnings limit no longer applies after you reach your full

Your marital status also comes into play. If you are married, and your benefit as a spouse will be more than your personal benefit will be, then there are some special considerations which might affect your claiming decision. Generally, if your spousal benefit will be more than your own benefit (from your lifetime work record), and your husband isn't yet collecting benefits, it's often wise to claim your own earlier and take the larger spouse benefit later. Of course, if you're not married you need only be concerned about your personal benefit from your own lifetime earnings record and waiting


retirement age.

for a larger life-long benefit, if possible, is often the most prudent choice.

Those are the basic things you should consider when trying to decide when to claim vour benefits. But your need for the money now, plus your health and life expectancy are also key to your decision. If you need the money earlier to make ends meet, and you won't be severely affected by the earnings limit, then claiming early can be your most prudent choice. Or, if you are not enjoying good health and have reason to believe that you won't live at least until today's average age for a woman (about 87), then that also suggests claiming early. But, if you are working and don't really need the money, and you are in good health and expect to live to a ripe old age, then waiting longer to claim a higher benefit is usually a better strategy.

The reality is that everyone's personal situation is different and there is no single answer to the question of when to claim Social Security. I hope the above gives you at least a starting point for your decision.

Biden's Radicalism on Immigration

One of Joe Biden's first priorities as president will be to risk stoking a new migrant

After much trial and error, President Donald Trump arrangements with Mexico and Central American countries that drastically diminished the pressure from asylum-seekers on our southern border.

Biden is pledged to overturn these policies, as well as undermine enforcement and boost immigration numbers across the board. The lie about Biden is that he's "a moderate," when the truth is that he's always been smack in the middle of his party, which is increasingly radical on immigration policy.

The new Democratic Party bristles with contempt for borders and the agents who police them, and its attitude will color everything Biden does.

The migrant crisis that had Trump adopt, then quickly abandon, a zero-tolerance policy that separated children from their parents wasn't of his making. President Barack Obama struggled with the same surge at the border, and many of the photos of

children in cages used to condemn Trump date from the Obama years.

Trump only got a handle on the border when he secured deals for help. Mexico agreed to allow migrants seeking asylum in this country to remain in Mexico while their claims were adjudicated. Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras, meanwhile, signed safethird-country agreements, meaning migrants seeking asylum could be sent to those counties to pursue their came up with cooperative claims rather than doing so in the U.S.

All of this was necessary to try to close effectively an open-border for migrants from Central America. Once they showed up and claimed asylum here, they were waived into the country and rarely, if ever, removed, even if their asylum claims ultimately failed (as the vast majority did).

Biden has promised a 100-day moratorium on deportations, a measure that will keep us from removing illegal immigrants even when they are released from jails after committing crimes. This is presumably a step toward re-instituting the Obama administration's policy of gutting interior enforcement.

He will restore DACA, the amnesty for illegal immigrants who came here as minors that Obama lawlessly imposed by diktat.

He will propose to Congress a broader amnesty for more than 10 million

Senate balks, as is likely, Biden will be tempted to follow Obama's (and Trump's) example and implement as much as possible through his own authority.

He will boost the number of refugees to more than 100,000 a year, the highest level in 30 years.

Trump's signature failure on immigration was missing the opportunity to pass significant legislation reflecting his priorities through Congress when Republicans controlled both chambers. But, as Steven Camarota of the restrictionist Center for Immigration Studies notes, the net growth of the immigration population still declined markedly.

Despite all of Trump's incendiary rhetoric, the upshot of his approach was entirely reasonable - levels of immigration shouldn't inexorably increase, and immigration policy should be subject to a rigorous test of national interest.

Biden represents a return to the old status-quo assumption that more immigration is, ipso facto, a good thing, at the same time he leads a party that is more zealous on the issue than

Democrats aren't much interested in immigration controls, and it's entirely possible that, soon enough at the border, it will again be uncontrolled.

"My brother also takes care of his little brother who is in high school so I had to sleep on the couch with my son."

She reached out to Lutheran Social Services for help. Fortunately, they were able to find her an apartment and connected her with County services. She was able to qualify for a housing voucher. Blakes says she's not only grateful for her new home but for the welcoming and nonjudgmental help she received.

"I'm going to school and I'm in housing and I feel like I've come a long way in a short amount of time," she says. "I've had ups and downs and I'm glad that I'm not struggling with my child. They made it easier for me and they eased my worries of being a new parent and doing it by myself."


Social Services, answers questions about the program: How do you help clients?

We tend to take a very individualized approach. The Prevention and Intervention Program itself is a collaboration between four agencies. Because we're a collaborative, we have the ability to leverage our collective resources and knowledge to work toward the best-fit services for vouth.

What are some of the biggest challenges your clients face?

Obviously, the high rent prices that we have here make it nearly impossible for someone who's just starting out in a minimum wage job to even afford an apartment. Even if they're able to get a job, they're having a hard time securing housing because of the large amount of rent they're being required to pay.

What do you enjoy most about your job? I do love the prevention aspect the most because I feel like it's important to be able to stabilize someone's housing whenever the circumstances allow for it because it minimizes the trauma.



Agents Raid Home in Maricopa County in Voter-Data Theft Investigation -Confiscate 8 Hard Drives, 3 Computers and a Bag of USB sticks | 06 Dec 2020 | On the morning of November 5, Arizona federal officials raided a home in the Fountain Hills area in Maricopa County. The agents confiscated eight hard drives, three computers, and a bag of USB sticks. The house belongs to 56-year-old Elliot Kerwin. The agents were looking for evidence of a cyberattack on an unnamed organization and stolen voter data.

Michigan GOP: Secretary of State Trying to Delete Election Data Amid Audit Calls | 04 Dec 2020 | The Michigan GOP on Friday raised concerns about a memo sent by Michigan Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson that "is pushing for the mass deletion of election data," although a spokesperson for the secretary's office later said the process is routine. The GOP said Benson's office told clerks in Michigan counties to "delete Electronic Poll Book software and associated files" amid calls to audit the election while flagging it was concerning. They were likely referring to a Dec. 1 memo from the Michigan Bureau of Elections, which is overseen by Benson's office, that states "[Electronic Poll Book] software and associated files must be deleted from all devices by the seventh calendar day following the final canvass and certification of the election (November 30, 2020) unless a petition for recount has been filed and the recount has not been completed, a post-election audit is planned but has not yet been completed, or the deletion of the data has been stayed by an order of the court or the Secretary of State."

Arizona Legislature Calls for Immediate 'Forensic Audit' of Dominion Voting Machines | 04 Dec 2020 | The Arizona House and Senate have called for an audit of the Maricopa County election software and equipment following allegations of fraud and other irregularities presented by President Donald Trump's team earlier this week. In a news release Friday, GOP leaders of the Republican-controlled legislature sought an independent audit of Dominion Voting Systems software – used in Maricopa County -called for the audit. State Sen. Michelle Ugenti-Rita, a Republican said that Maricopa County's Board of Supervisors "is supportive of conducting an independent audit of their voting software and equipment," adding: "It is important we maintain all of the voting public's confidence in our elections, and this is a positive step." House Majority Leader Warren Petersen, a Republican, said that "a significant number of voters believe that fraud occurred," citing "the number of irregularities" that allegedly occurred in Maricopa County and elsewhere in the state.

Voting Machine USB Drives Had Totals Altered Overnight, Witness in Nevada **Election Contest Alleges** | 03 Dec 2020 | A witness brought forward by the Trump campaign in its election contest in Nevada alleged that the memory disks used to store vote totals from election machines during the early vote period had the vote tallies unexplainably changed overnight, according to a presentation at an evidentiary hearing in Carson City on Dec. 3. According to Jesse Binnall, who presented the evidence on behalf of the Trump campaign, the witness, whose name is shielded by a protective order, said that the vote tallies were collected from the machine at the end of every voting day and stored on Universal Serial Bus (USB) drives overnight. "What they would do is they would log these disks in and out. Good practice. And the disks had a serial number on them. And numerous times that disk would be logged out with one vote total on it and logged back in the next morning during the early vote period with a different number on it. Sometimes more, sometimes less," Binnall said. "What that means is that literally in the dead of night, votes were appearing, and books are disappearing on these machines." Trump Team to File Lawsuit: 40,000 People Voted Twice in Nevada | 02 Dec 2020 | A lawyer for President Donald Trump's campaign said the team is preparing to file a lawsuit soon alleging that 40,000 people voted twice in Nevada, which, if true, could potentially erase Democrat presidential candidate Joe Biden's lead. Trump attorney Jesse R. Binnall, speaking to Fox Business on Dec. 2, said that they found evidence of "real voter fraud" including "thousands and thousands of instances" in Nevada that will be submitted to a court in the Silver State. "We have instances, for instance, of 40,000-plus people who have voted twice in the election,"

Michigan Poll Observer: Military Ballots Looked Like 'Xerox Copies,' All for Biden | 02 Dec 2020 | A woman who said she was a poll observer at the TCF Center in Detroit on Election Day testified in front of a Michigan State Senate hearing that she saw numerous military ballots that looked like "Xerox copies" and were all allegedly marked for Democrat Joe Biden. The woman, who only identified herself as Patty and said she has nine years' worth of experience, told the lawmakers that "military ballots...looked like they were all exactly the same Xerox copies of the ballot. They were all for Biden across the board; there wasn't a single Trump vote." "None of the voters [were] registered," and election workers "had to manually enter the names and addresses and a birth date of 1/1/2020, which would override the system and allow them to enter nonregistered voters, of which I saw several...throughout the day," Patty said.

Up to 280,000 Ballots 'Disappeared' After Trip to Pennsylvania From NY -Amistad Project Director | 01 Dec 2020 | As many as 288,000 ballots for the 2020 U.S. election "disappeared" in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, after being transported by truck from New York, according to Phill Kline, the director of the legal group Thomas More Society's Amistad Project. Kline, a former district attorney and Kansas attorney general, said he received evidence that between "130,000 to 280,000 completed ballots for the 2020 general election had been shipped from Bethpage, New York, before the ballots and the trailer in which they were shipped disappeared" on Oct. 21. Kline cited statements from a U.S. Postal Service subcontractor whom he described as a whistleblower. Kline also asserted in a statement that Postal Service workers were engaged in "widespread illegal efforts" to influence the election. At least one whistleblower said that they transported thousands of prefilled ballots across state lines, which, if true, would be a federal crime. His group made an "estimate" of the number of ballots that disappeared

There's nothing new about political jousting over shares of a limited but valuable resource.

For instance, Californians have been squabbling for decades over divvying up water supplies among agricultural interests, municipal consumers and the natural environment. The conflict never goes away but increases in intensity every time the state experiences one of its periodic droughts – and this so-far dry autumn may be a harbinger of another such dry spell.

The annual business of writing a new state budget is always an exercise in political rationing. Even in times of prosperity, when the state treasury is awash in tax money, there's never quite enough to satisfy all of the demands and expressions of urgent need. More for schools, more for health care, more for colleges, more for childcare or more for prisons?

Those who hire the most and best lobbyists, shower legislators with campaign contributions and wage lavish media campaigns tend over time to fare the best when Capitol politicians decide who gets how much cash.

The allocations of water

serious impacts on the contending parties, but usually they are not all-or-nothing situations. Even the losers generally wind up with something, even if they see it as not enough.

A new political free-forall is just beginning and this time it is all-or-nothing, potentially with life-ordeath consequences - who gets the very limited initial supply of vaccine against the potentially deadly coronavirus.

Gov. Gavin Newsom said last week that he expects California to receive an initial allocation of 327,000 doses of vaccine in mid-December. His administration wants to prioritize vaccinations of health care workers who are most in danger of being infected with the virus.

Few would argue with that intent, but the initital vaccine supply doesn't come close to covering everyone who falls into that general category. California has more than two million health care workers. and even within that group, there's a certain level of competition.

Organizations representing local-term care facilities, otherwise known as nursing homes, are pressing for first-tier priority, contending that their elderly clients are being disproportionately infected, often with fatal consequences.

However, another argument is being made for nurses, doctors and others who are directly caring hospitals.

Expanding vaccinations beyond health care workers will be even more *newspapers*.

and money obvious have daunting because no one knows when and how many additional doses of vaccine will be coming, other than sometime next year. After the implicit demand from health care workers is met, who's next?

Two state legislators are pressing for teachers to be placed near the top of the prioritization list, citing the sharp decline in educational achievement while students are confined at home and the urgent need for resuming classroom instruction.

Assemblymembers Jordan Cunningham, a San Luis Obispo Republican, and Patrick O'Donnell, a Long Beach Democrat, said in a letter to state health officials, "Interim reports from across the state show increasing rates of failure among students, especially those in lowerincome neighborhoods. ... Our state's children cannot afford to wait."

A recent national study estimated that lower levels of education among students forced to attend classes via the Internet could result in shorter life spans. Several recent articles, including one in CalMatters.org, have detailed how absenteeism has increased and learning has decreased, especially among poor students.

This is heavy-duty stuff. Deciding who gets - and who doesn't get - the vaccine in the earliest stages of the vaccination effort could be deciding who lives and who dies.



Nothing but "Blue Skies" Do I See SacRT Unveils Holiday Bus

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)

- A shuttered former auto repair shop at 7601 Greenback Lane at the corner of Mariposa Avenue opposite San Juan High School was given a refresh this spring with fresh coat of bright blue paint and a new name.

Blue Sky SMOG & Repair, a licensed drive-in smog check station by the California State Bureau of Automotive Repair by the Department of Consumer Affairs opened mid-spring, just as the Covid crisis began.

Since opening, the new automotive repair, which satisfies California required smog checks on vehicles 2000 and newer, is "building a reputation for service and quality general automotive repair work at an affordable price," said its owner Eric Bassett.

Bassett and his business partner, Andrea Kopecky, an environmental lawyer for the State of California, said they found the business listed for sale last January, contacted the property owner and made an offer. Bassett recognized the location's high traffic potential and realized the then-shuttered repair shop needed quite a lot of work.

"We had a challenging start, to say the least, but now our business is starting to grow, and we are getting an increasing number of firsttime new customers," Bassett said.

Once the site of a busy gasoline station dating back to the 1950s and a much narrower Greenback Lane, Bassett said its fuel tanks had long since been removed and its four fueling bays enclosed stalls.

Some \$75,000 in exte-

included new paint inside and out, smog equipment installation and the re-roofing of both buildings, Blue Sky SMOG and Repair opened its doors to the public in mid-March, just as the COVID-19 pandemic hit.

In all, Blue Sky SMOG and Repair has four service bays, two which are dedicated for smog testing and two for general automotive repairs.

"Andrea (Kopecky) suggested the new name, "Blue Sky", which reflects our philosophy to help do our part to make the skies of California clearer."

Access to Blue Sky SMOG & Repair is by Mariposa Avenue, where customers can drive in for a smog test or to schedule general vehicle repairs, Bassett said.

A refreshed customer reception area and service desk were created in the old station to welcome customers who wish to wait for their smog test or auto repairs to be completed, he said.

SMOG and Repair is a career to succeed in the months change for Bassett who before opening his automotive repair and smog testing facility pursued a professional career in informational technology.

A long-time mechanic on his own, Bassett welcomed the move, and with Kopecky's advice and support, sought to open an automotive repair business of his own.

"I've always enjoyed working on vehicles and it's a very rewarding and satisfying profession to help customers with their automotive repair needs," he said.

Bassett and Kopecky took by previous owners into a hands-on approach in cresmog and automotive repair ating the business's new look, as truckloads of debris from the previous ownrior renovations later, which ers were cleared from the

premises and overdue physical repairs to a leaky roof were completed.

The original service bays in the former gasoline station have been extended in length to handle repairs on largersized SUVs, and trucks customers may bring in.

If you have received a notice for a required state SMOG check for your 2000 or newer gasoline vehicle, the cost is \$39.75 plus \$8.25 for the certificate, or \$48.00," Bassett said.

"It generally takes about 15-20 minutes to complete the test while the customer is waiting in their car," he said. "Total cost for a diesel vehicle's SMOG certification is \$10 more, or \$58.00. The diesel test is more extensive and takes a bit more time," Bassett said.

Blue Sky SMOG and Repair is registered with the California Bureau of Automotive Repair and soon with the state Better Business Bureau, Bassett said.

"I am very hopeful that The opening of Blue Sky our business will continue ahead as more customers get to know us, and our reputation for quality work at a competitive, affordable price continues to grow."

In addition to performing vehicle inspections, Blue Sky SMOG and Repair offers its customers oil changes, suspension, engine, electrical, transmission, brake, and air conditioning service.

Blue Sky SMOG & Repair at 7601 Greenback Lane in Citrus Heights is open Monday through Saturday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. for drivein smog testing. 
