SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The lives of thousands of children, teens, adults with disabilities and seniors are touched each holiday season by the County's Gifts from the Heart Program. For more than 30 years, this annual holiday gift-giving program that runs from mid-November until early December provides gifts to community members being served by Child Protective Services and Senior and Adult Services of the Sacramento County

Alternatives to 9-1-1 for Mental Health Response



SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA

(MPG) - Sacramento County Behavioral Health Services is seeking community input on alternatives to calling 911 in a behavioral health or quality of life crisis. The public is invited to provide comments sharing their thoughts and suggestions in this online survey. The survey will be available online through Friday, Nov. 13.

The Alternatives to 911 pilot program stemmed from a Board of Supervisors discussion in September budget hearings. District Two Supervisor Patrick Kennedy directed Health Services staff to propose alternatives to law enforcement responses to quality of life issues that can be better addressed by mental health professionals.

"It's important to develop a more appropriate and robust system for both in the moment of

care for individuals in cri- crisis and long term."

sis," said Kennedy. "We need to meet the needs of people outside of the criminal justice system and take a public health approach to their quality of life issues,

The goal of the program is to increase mental health response to calls for service; decrease law enforcement need to respond to mental health distress, crisis or other quality of life issues; decrease unnecessary emergency department visits and psychiatric hospitalizations; and decrease relapse into crisis by linking to ongoing outpatient mental health services.

"The direction from the Board was very clear on this pilot program: to minimize law enforcement involvement and provide greater efficacy while responding to mental health crises in the community," said District One Supervisor and Board Chair Phil Serna. "It is important to get input from the community and develop a program based on that feedback, and I encourage people to provide their thoughts on the matter."

County staff will continue to obtain community input through December, review and analyze proposed models, assess cost and provide a proposal for a pilot program to the Board of Supervisors in February 2021. *

Members of City staff, along with project partners and other community stakeholders, formed the Naming Review Committee, which reached out to the public for name suggestions. The Committee reviewed 29 submissions and brought the top three names to the Council for a final vote.

Communications Officer Nichole Baxter said, "Thank you to everyone who submitted a name for this project. It's so exciting to have this citywide trail connecting to parks, schools, shopping opportunities and there were so many great ideas. We really had our work cut out for us, as a review committee, to try to whittle our way down to our top three submissions.'

The three names for final consideration were Solid Roots Trail, Arcade-Cripple Creek Trail, and Electric Greenway Trail. Citrus Heights residents

Marcus and Cynthia suggested Solid Roots Trail, using part of the City's motto for the name. They wrote, "To see that the City cares about the community by giving the community a new trail and regional park to enjoy is wonderful."

Bessie suggested Arcade-Cripple Creek Trail, writing that "both waterways are important to the region." Her name suggestion would give those waterways

regional recognition.

Electric Greenway Trail was suggested because it already has community recognition as the name of the project itself—as the trail will follow much of the SMUD electric transmission corridor and will travel through green spaces such as parks and other undeveloped land. However, SMUD representatives on the Committee did express concern that the name could lead to confusion that electric vehicle use is allowed on the trail.

Vice Mayor Steve Miller expressed disappointment that his favorite name suggestion - Seven Park Trail - didn't make it into the top three. He said, "It has a nice ring to it."

Councilmember Jeannie Bruins said that while Solid

Roots means something to those in Citrus Heights, it doesn't have meaning to others in the region. Bruins also said she'd like to avoid using the word electric because "it doesn't coexist well with nature." In contrast. Bruins liked "the natural element" of Arcade-Cripple Creek Trail. "I think it's sustainable," she said.

Councilmembers Porsche Middleton and Bret Daniels also preferred that name, so it moved forward for the final vote. The City Council voted unanimously to approve the name Arcade-Cripple Creek Trail.

The trail project is currently on track for completion of the design phase in spring 2021, with construction expected to begin in spring/summer 2021. ★

Property Owners Covering Delayed Rent Payments

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Rob Lapsley, president of the California Business Roundtable, issued the following statement in response to a recent study by the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia that shows an estimated 24,000 renters statewide are behind on their rent, totaling nearly \$1.7 billion in missed rent payments since the pandemic began:

"The Federal Reserve study is clearly defining the economic sacrifices made by private property owners that have allowed renters to stay in their homes, helping to prevent homelessness-all with little to no support from the state or federal government. This new report magnifies the urgent need to provide assistance that gives relief to property owners and tenants affected by COVID-related economic hardships.

"At the same time, the Legislature's shortterm eviction protections are expiring early next year. We cannot afford to prolong the crisis for property owners and tenants, especially as the governor toggles counties between COVID-mitigation tiers and its related impacts on the workforce. We look forward to working with the governor and Legislature to jointly address financial support for housing and small business recovery immediately."

The California Business Roundtable was one of the main proponents of AB 1482 (Chiu-Grayson), which enacted a balanced approach to modernizing the state's rental housing laws to increase protections for tenants while also encouraging the construction of new affordable housing. The Roundtable also took a neutral position on AB 3088, the current rental housing eviction freeze set to expire on February 1, 2021.

Social Security Matters About "Registering" for Social **Security and Medicare**

Dear Rusty: I have a big 65th birthday coming up mid-March and would like your advice on registering for Social Security and Medicare. I am now unemployed, but I am seeking another gig to get me to age 67 before taking Social Security. Signed: Wondering Senior

Dear Wondering: You do not need to "register" with Social Security in advance. You don't need to do anything with Social Security until you are ready to claim your benefits. Since you were born in 1956, your full retirement age (FRA) for Social Security purposes is 66 plus 4 months, and that is when you will be entitled to 100% of the benefit you've earned from a lifetime of working. But you can, if you wish, also wait beyond your FRA to get an even bigger benefit. For each month you delay after your FRA you'll earn Delayed Retirement Credits of .667%, which is 8% additional benefit for each year you wait. That can continue up to age 70 when your maximum benefit will be reached. is free if you're eligible *social-security-advisory*) In your case that would for Social Security. 29% more than your FRA benefit amount. But whenever you're ready, you can apply for Social Security online at www.ssa.gov/ retire (you must first create your "My Social Security" account to apply online).

Medicare is an entirely separate program and, unless you have "creditable" employer healthcare coverage from a new job, you should enroll in Medicare a bit prior to your 65th birthday ("creditable" coverage is a group plan with at least 20 participants). This would be during your Medicare Initial Enrollment Period (IEP), which is a 7-month window starting 3 months before the month you turn 65 and ending 3 months after the month you turn 65. If you don't enroll in Medicare during your IEP and enroll later, and if you didn't have creditable employer healthcare coverage after age 65, you will be subject to a late enrollment penalty, which will permanently increase your Medicare Part B (and Part D) premiums.

Medicare Part B is coverage for doctors & outpatient services, and Part D is prescription drug coverage, both of which require a premium; Medicare Part A is hospitalization coverage which foundation.org/programs/

coverage when you turn 65, you can simply delay enrolling in Medicare Part B until your employer coverage is about to end, or until after it ends during an 8 month Special Enrollment Period during which you can enroll in Medicare Part B without penalty. But for Part D prescription drug coverage, you must enroll in a private plan within 63 days of your 65th birthday, or the end of your employer drug coverage, or you will incur a Part D late enrollment penalty for enrolling later. And remember that Medicare late enrollment penalties never go away they are recurring for the rest of your life.

The bottom line is this: you don't need to preregister for either Social Security or Medicare. You can simply enroll when you are ready for benefits to start (keeping in mind that for Medicare, you must have "creditable" alternative coverage after age 65 to avoid late enrollment penalties).

The Blue Trickle

Ordinarily, it's not possible for a party to win the presidency and have a bad election night, but the Democrats managed it.

Pending the outcome of two Senate runoffs in Georgia, Joe Biden looks set to become a caretaker president who won't be signing any legislation that doesn't pass muster in Mitch McConnell's Senate first.

He isn't riding into the White House on the strength of a Blue Wave, as was so often predicted, but a Blue Trickle that saw Democrats fail to win control of the Senate (they need to win both Georgia seats in January to get to a 50-50 tie), suffer shocking setbacks in the House, and lose ground in state legislative races after investing heavily in them.

Biden clearly owes his victory (which President Donald Trump, of course, is still contesting) in large part to Trump's personal unpopularity. In races where the president wasn't on the ballot, in contrast, the weakness of the Democratic Party stood exposed and it

paid the price.

If the former vice president succeeded in making the presidential race a referendum on Trump, Republicans succeeded in making House races, in effect, a referendum on Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez and the woke socialism that animates Democratic activists and draws so much attention. (Nancy Pelosi posed for a cover of Rolling Stone with members of the Squad, and Ocasio-Cortez is on the cover of the latest issue of Vanity Fair.)

Bolstered by the media, Democrats were so certain they were riding the tide of history to inevitable pickups in the House that they didn't pause to take note of the unpopularity of their agenda and the left of their party.

Republicans took the socialist label and hung it around the neck of Democrats. It was especially devastating in South Florida, where voters from Cuba, Venezuela and Colombia came to the United States to flee socialism. Republicans knocked out incumbent Democratic Reps. Donna Shalala and Debbie Mucarsel-Powell in heavily Hispanic districts.

Ιn New York, Republicans used the most idiotic slogan of our times, "defund the police," and the state's law curtailing cash bail to pummel Democrats on law and order, and likely defeat two House incumbents. The GOP wielded the

Democrats' anti-fossil fuel agenda in the Southwest and Biden's tax increase in California to defend their seats and make pickups across the map.

When all is said and done, Nancy Pelosi's House majority may be the smallest in 20 years, and it will certainly be highly vulnerable in 2022.

It is usually the losing side that is beset by a bitter civil war after an election. Make no mistake, there is plenty of that to come in the Republican Party. But despite winning the White House, the Democrats will be riven by recriminations and fights over the path ahead.

It is always a danger for a political party to believe its own PR. That's a risk especially hard for Democrats to avoid when practically every instrument of the culture celebrates left-wing causes and works to create the sense that their triumph is inexorable.

This year, Democrats thought they were marching from strength to strength, when they were really on thin ice with an electorate that was prepared to reject Trump, but not to empower a party that has elevated socialists and outlandish ideas from defunding the police to the Green New Deal.



Refinance in Baby Step 2?

Dear Dave,

My husband and I are on Baby Step 2, and we've paid off about \$30,000 in consumer debt since March. We were wondering if we should refinance our mortgage. Our current rate is 4.875%, with 28 years remaining on the loan. We found a 15-year refinance at 2.5%, which would raise our monthly payments about \$200, but we can handle that. We have \$150,000 in equity in our home and about \$207,000 left on the loan. What do you think we should do?

Dear Raye,

You two have done a great job this year! I'm so proud of what you've accomplished and that you're looking to the future.

Baby Step 2 wouldn't be affected, except that your monthly mortgage payment will go up a little. I wouldn't pay the refinance costs out of pocket, though. I'd roll them into the loan. You'd be saving more than 2% by locking in this crazy-low interest rate, and

you're knocking the whole thing down to a 15-year loan. I love all that. It's definitely worth the extra \$200 a month to make it happen.

Think about it this way. You're going to be saving more than \$4,000 a year with the interest rate reduction. You're not going to see it in cash flow because of the \$200 increase in monthly payments, but over the scope of the loan, you're going to be charged between \$4,000 and \$4,500 less per year for interest. All that money is going toward paying back the closing costs and reducing the principal built into the move from 28 years to 15 years.

I just saved up my \$1,000 beginner emergency fund, and I'm looking at paying off my car and credit card debt – a total of 3,400 - bythe end of January. Before I started your plan, I took out a \$7,500 student loan to pay for my fall and spring semesters. I still have a year of school left, which will cost about \$10,000. Should I save up the money for my final year before attacking my student loan debt, so I don't have to take out another one, or go ahead and begin paying it off?

Well, it doesn't make much sense to pay off the current student loan, then turn around and take out another one. Your first goal - after you get the credit cards and car paid off should be saving cash to finish school. Once you've done that, start paying off the student loan.

Long story short, you've got to stop borrowing money. The idea of saving up to pay for things should be the default setting in your brain, Emma. Otherwise, you're going to spend the rest of your life with car payments and other debt hanging around your neck. That's not being responsible with your money, and it will keep you from saving for stuff that matters and becoming wealthy.

Stop. Borrowing. Money. I hope I haven't been unclear.

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More High-Dollar Ballot Measures in 2022

Much has been said and written about the hundreds of millions of dollars spent for and against the dozen statewide measures on this month's ballot.

was really just chicken feed, because the stakes in those ballot battles were infinitely greater.

Take, for instance, Proposition 15, a battle between a union-led coalition that proposed the measure, and a business coalition. Had Proposition 15 passed, it would have generated roughly \$10 billion a year for schools and local governments. That's about 66 times as much as the one-time spending for and against the measure.

Other than the scale, there was nothing unusual this year about the lopsided riskreward aspect of major ballot ballot, the Recology group measures, and it will fuel another round of conflicts two years hence. There are at least four high-dollar ballot measures headed for the 2022 ballot:

MICRA – In 1975, Jerry Brown signed the Medical Injury Compensation Reform Act or MICRA, placing a \$250,000 cap on damages for what were called "pain and suffering" in medical malpractice lawsuits.

Consumer advocates and

personal injury lawyers have attempted numerous times in the Legislature to modify the law, contending that it protects bad medical care providers and short-changes their innocent patients. Providers and their insurers have turned back each challenge, saying that removing the cap would raise medical costs.

A measure already qualified for the 2022 ballot would adjust the cap for inflation retroactively to 1975, probably increasing it to well over \$1 million, and eliminate it for "catastrophic injuries." Big money? Yes, but it The outcome could have multi-billion-dollar impacts and thus will mean multimillion-dollar campaigns.

> PLASTICS - A certainto-qualify measure would reduce or eliminate single-use plastic packaging through regulation and a tax.

California recycler Recology is the chief sponsor of the initiative, which would continue a crusade, also supported by environmental groups, that stalled in the Legislature thanks to fierce lobbying by a packaging industry coalition led by South Carolina-based Novolex.

As the battle shifts to the will portray plastic packaging, particularly items used for takeout food, as environmental despoilers. The industry will counter that using plastic packaging is cleaner than the alternatives, particularly during a pandemic.

SPORTS WAGERING - Another virtually certain 2022 ballot measure also continues a contentious issue the Legislature failed to resolve – whether legal

sports wagering should come to California and if so, who should benefit.

A legislative measure would have given Indian tribal casinos and some horse racing tracks authority to take bets on sporting events, but the politically powerful casinos opposed it because it would also have sanctioned new forms of gambling in non-tribal card rooms, impinging on the tribes' monopoly.

A tribal coalition's pending ballot measure mirrors the failed legislation except for its card room enhancements. It's uncertain whether the card rooms will try to mount an opposition drive but billions of gambling dollars will hinge on the outcome.

FLAVORED TOBACCO - Despite stalling on other issues, the Legislature did pass a ban on flavored tobacco products, which have been criticized as luring young men and women into tobacco use.

"It will be a point of deep pride and personal privilege as a father of four and as someone who's had many, many family members die at the hands of the tobacco industry to sign that bill," Gov. Gavin Newsom said.

The legislation was a defeat for the tobacco industry, which is fighting back with a referendum that would repeal the new law, just as this year's Proposition 25, sponsored by the bail bond industry, erased a law that eliminated cash bail for criminal defendants.

That surprise brought a commanding Trump lead of 300,000 votes for Michigan's 16 electoral votes into a 120,000 vote deficit after votes from Wayne County were counted. 

Turning 65 with Cancer ... Is Medicare Advantage Right for Me?



I am turning 65 this February and have no idea what I should do because I have lung cancer. Currently I am on a COBRA policy from my old employer with all

my medical bills now being paid because I have met my deductible.

Hi Toni.

I receive my care from a major cancer center in my area and my chemotherapy with my radiation treatments to start in December.

Do I enroll in Original Medicare with a Medicare supplement and get Part D, go with a Medicare Advantage plan, or stay with my current COBRA plan until it ends in about 15 months?

If you could help me sort this out, I would greatly appreciate your help.

Thanks, John from San Diego, CA Hello John:

Recently, I had a phone call from a frantic daughter, who was trying to help her father who had been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and he had chosen a Medicare Advantage HMO when he turned 65. Now her father must wait until Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period from October 15 to December 7 th to make a change back to Original/Traditional Medicare because MD Anderson is not in that Medicare Advantage plan's HMO network. She must hope that she can find a Medicare Supplement that will accept her father due to his medical condition. She is not sure if he will pass the medical underwriting.

I have great news for you, John, because you are turning 65 in January and there is a special enrollment time called Medicare Supplement/Medigap open enrollment. As I have said before, this is the best time for someone to purchase a Medicare Supplement/Medigap because the open enrollment lasts for a 6-month period beginning the first day of

the month in which you are 65 or older and have just enrolled in Part B for the first time.

During the Medicare Supplement/ Medigap open enrollment period, you may enroll in a Medicare Supplement/ Medigap Plan and not have to answer any health questions to be accepted by any Medicare Supplement Plan.

If you decide not to keep your COBRA plan, you do not have to worry about your medical care being taking care of with the Medicare Supplement/Medigap, but after the 6-month window, you will have to submit to a complete underwritten application for a Medicare Supplement. You may not qualify for a certain policy or it may cost more, if there are other health issues including the cancer after this 6-month window.

I have been advised by many healthcare professionals that some of the newest healthcare and cancer procedures are not readily approved by Medicare Advantage plans, but these procedures are generally approved with "Original or Traditional Medicare." These healthcare professionals must fight every day to get the care many desperately need when they have a Medicare Advantage plan. Talk to your medical professional who knows your health situation when making your Medicare plan choice, even if you are someone with a serious health condition, such as heart problems, Alzheimer, MS, end stage renal disease and the list could go on and on...always talk to those that know your health situation.

There are specific Medicare rules when changing from a Medicare Advantage plan to a Medicare Supplement.
