SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Public Health announced on May 25, 2020 that counties that have attested to meeting the criteria for accelerated re-opening may re-open hair salons and barbershops with modifications uch as mandatory face coverings for both barbers or stylists and clients. State public health leaders noted that Californians staying at home and exercising caution when out helped flatten the COVID-19 curve. Public health leaders acknowledge that today's announcement is also possible based on statewide indicators such as PPE, testing capacity, hospital surge capacity and hospitalizations.

Permitted activities include services that can be provided with both the worker and customer wearing face coverings throughout the service. These include haircuts, hair coloring, blowouts, weaves and extensions, braiding, lock maintenance, wig maintenance and hair relaxing treatments.

Salon activities that cannot be done with face coverings on both the worker and client – or that require touching the client's face - such as shaving, facial waxing, threading, eyelash services and facials – remain prohibited at this time in all counties. Likewise, nail salons remain closed.

"Together, Californians have limited infections in our state, and because of that work, many counties may make a decision to restart modified hair and barber services," said Dr. Sonia Angell, State Public Health Officer and Director of the California Department of Public Health. "However, COVID-19 is still present in our communities and we are still at risk. As we venture outside our homes, it is critically important to keep physical distance, wear face coverings in public, and wash hands frequently to help protect yourself and those around you."

Under the new guidance to reopen, salons and barbers must: Implement measures to ensure

physical distancing of at least six feet between and among workers and customers, except when providing haircutting and other close contact services; Provide temperature and/ or symptom screenings for all workers at the beginning of their shift and vendors, contractors, or other workers entering the establishment; Encourage workers and customers who are sick or exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19 to stay home; Screen customers upon arrival and be prepared to cancel or reschedule customers who indicate they have any signs of illness; Require workers and customers to use face coverings during the entire haircutting and other close contact hair services.

Newsom **Administration Claims another '\$1.831 Billion** Needed'

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In a last-minute call last Thursday evening, Department of Finance officials notified the Legislature that Governor Newsom is transferring an eye-popping \$1.831 billion to the Disaster Response-**Emergency Operations** Account to spend through the current fiscal year with

only limited details.

"The spending of billions of taxpayers' dollars must be reviewed and approved by representatives of the citizens of California. It is time for the Legislature to return to the standard separation and balance of power," said Vice Chair of the Senate **Budget Committee Senator** Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama). "There is too little transparency, oversight and accountability. The public deserves better."

Without sufficient evidence to support the need for this massive spending, the letter from the Department of Finance breaks down expenditures as follows:

\$1.3 billion to procure personal protective equipment; \$251.7 million to establish and support over 3,000 hospital beds; \$30 million for hotels for healthcare workers and support staff; \$159.4 million to cover costs for ongoing state response activities; \$98.4 million for statewide testing and contact tracing and tracking.

Californians have answered the call and slowed the spread of the virus. Hospitals are safe, and most have few, if any, COVID-19 patients. The U.S. Naval hospital ship Mercy has returned to the port in San Diego. The field hospital at Sacramento's Arco Arena will close at the end of the month after the state paid an outrageous \$1 million to house fewer than 10 patients.

Senator Nielsen said, "There is no surge in hospital demand in California."

CHP to 'Unleash' California's **Newest Canine Graduate Teams**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) is proud to announce the graduation and deployment of nine CHP canine teams, along with one canine team from the University of California, Davis Police Department. The certification of the new canine teams follows 400-600 hours

Due to the current health crisis, the traditional graduation ceremony and skills demonstration was not held, but the Department does want to acknowledge the hard work and commitment of the teams, while sharing the news of their successful certification with the public as they begin deploying to communities throughout the state.

"The addition of these highly specialized teams to our existing canine units is a win for the people of California," CHP Commissioner Warren Stanley said. "Sending more handlers and their canine partners to patrol throughout the state, following their intensive training, will undoubtedly make a positive impact on public and officer safety."

This is the second of two graduations in 2020 for canines trained in handler protection and narcotics detection, handler protection and explosive detection, or explosive detection only. The canine teams complete between 10 and 15 weeks of intensive training at the CHP Academy, depending on their specialty. The CHP officers represent seven different geographical regions, statewide.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. California Highway Patrol Canine Fact List:

Although a formal graduation ceremony

was not held due to the pandemic, eight Patrol and Narcotics Detection Canine (PNDC) teams and one Explosives Detection Canine; (EDC) team completed training and were certified by the California Highway Patrol; (CHP) on May 28, 2020. Additionally, one Patrol and Explosives Detection Canine; (PEDC) team from the University of California, Davis Police graduated with this class;

The PNDC teams go through 11 intensive weeks, or 440 hours, of criminal apprehension and narcotic detection training. The PEDC teams go through 15 weeks of intensive training, or 600 hours, of criminal apprehension and explosives detection training. The EDC teams go through 10 weeks of intensive training, or 400 hours, of explosives detection training. The canines are used to support the Department's mission of providing Safety, Service, and Security to the public;

Among the graduates were four Belgian Malinois (Mal-lin-wah), one Dutch Shepherd, four German Shepherd Dogs, and one German Shorthair Pointer;

All handlers are experienced officers with the CHP. The officers represent the following CHP Divisions: Northern, Valley, Golden Gate, Border, Coastal, Inland, and Protective Services;

The canines are trained to meet the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training canine team guidelines;

To maintain the canine's interest and skills at a high level for peak performance, and to expose the team to various situations likely to be encountered while working in the field, eight hours of weekly training is required throughout their career;

Following this graduation, the CHP will have 38 PNDC teams, six PEDC teams, and six EDC teams deployed throughout

SACRAMENTO REGION. CA (MPG) - SMUD is again stocking three Sierra reservoirs with rainbow trout. The fish planting starts in June and stock 25,000 pounds of fish at Union Valley, Loon Lake and Ice House reservoirs in El Dorado County.

Surveys say fishing tops the reasons folks visit the Crystal Basin Recreational Area and the trout plants enhance angling opportunities for the public. On average, the fish weigh almost two pounds, including some trophy fish.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The U.S. Census Bureau, in coordination with federal, state and local health officials, will begin to drop off 2020 Census questionnaire packets at front doors of nearly 150,000 households in Northern California that

do not have regular mail-

ing addresses, such as in

rural areas or households

that use post office boxes.

That delivery is called the

"Update Leave" operation, and it began March 15 before all fieldwork was suspended March 18 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Field staff have been trained to observe all social distancing protocols and will wear official government-provided personal protective equipment for their safety and the safety of the public. This operation is contactless and follows the most current federal health and safety guidelines.

People are strongly encouraged to respond promptly to the 2020 Census using the ID number included in the questionnaire packet. Responding with a census ID or the paper questionnaire helps ensure the best count of their community. People can respond online, by phone or by using the paper form in the packet.


Councilmember Daniels suggested that Item 6 be held until a later date so the Council could discuss the issue further after a review by the City Attorney regarding whether the changes might violate the Commissioners' First Amendment rights.

Mayor Jeff Slowey disagreed, stating that for most Planning Commissioners, "it's their first foray into any type of government action, and we have actually had some where they were talking to the media a couple instances where they were talking to the media prior to a measure coming before them ... and legally that can put the City in hot water. The other thing, when you talk about after, depending upon what's said, that could also ieopardize it as well, as it still has to come before the City Council."

Mayor Slowey said he views it as "our responsibility to put some guardrails around people that we appoint to a position, especially if they don't have that background. I don't look at this as affecting anybody's First Amendment rights. You know, when you're talking as a Planning Commissioner, you're talking as a Planning Commissioner. ... You have to understand what those rules are. I look at this as basically putting those rules - as the City sees them, as we see them - out there for them."

The Council voted on Item 6, and the updates to the Planning Commission Rules and Regulations passed 4-1, Councilmember Daniels

Over the course of the coronavirus quarantine, video games have taken on a new significance beyond an entertaining pastime. While last month I discussed their importance as a social tool, both to play with others in-person and as a way to connect with friends digitally, in the weeks since they've reintroduced a key element missing from all of our lives: freedom.

Three weeks ago I decided to start Fallout 4. Though the game was unbelievably popular on release, I've never had more than a meager interest in the series. Previous entries failed to capture my imagination, as the premise of exploring a post-nuclear sci-fi wasteland repeatedly confronted me with a dull color palette of brown, brown, more brown, and the occasional grey. The only reason I had my Fallout 4 disk in the first place was that I picked it up on a whim from a local GameStop over a year ago, for less than the price of a cup of coffee.

But this game that I had never had the time or motivation to try has suddenly become one of my favorite pastimes. Unlike its predecessors, Fallout 4 is vibrant and colorful,

and its delightfully cheesy writing. Unlike some open-world games that forgo freedom in favor of funneling the player from one place to the net, Fallout 4 encourages true adventure and exploration by hiding new stories behind every nondescript door. It took me three days to reach a destination only a mile or so away because of all of the distractions en route. Enter one door and I find a serial-killer cult, another, a pre-apocalypse lab with a mysterious experiment waiting to be finished, yet another, a "brothel" that doesn't sell



SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Sacramento Life Center. 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You Could Have an Uncashed Sac County Check

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Currently, the County has more than 11,000 uncashed checks, totaling more than \$3.2 million. How does this happen and could this be your unclaimed money?

If a Sacramento County issued check goes six months without being cashed by the rightful payee, the information becomes available in a PDF document on the Unclaimed County Warrants (checks) webpage. The data is also searchable on the County's Open Data portal.

Think you might have an uncashed check with Sacramento County? Here are quick and easy ways to find out:

From the Unclaimed County Warrants webpage, scroll through the check numbers on the Unclaimed Warrant listing PDF document (use the Find feature [Ctrl+F] to search names or other terms in the PDF).

Go to the Sacramento County Open Data portal. Once on the portal, click the "Finance" icon; click the "County Outstanding Checks" link; and click "Data" tab. Then click on the column "filter" coneshaped icons for specific value sorting, or the column headings for alpha/numeric listings to get ascending or descending sorts.

If you find your name or business on the data listing, go to the Unclaimed County Warrants webpage to find out about the documentation and information needed to validate that you are the rightful payee to receive the funds.

More Unclaimed Monies

The Department of Revenue Recovery (DRR) has unclaimed payments that are a result of not having a current address for the recipient. On the Open Data portal, under the Finance category, check out the Revenue Recovery Unclaimed Payments data and search for your name. If you locate a claim due to you, contact DRR at (916) 875-7815, and provide the following information:

Claimant's Name; Date of Birth; Address (Current and Previous); Phone Number; Amount of the claim; DRR Account Number; Court Docket Number; Date of Order; Defendant's Name; Proof of Identity (Driver's License or ID Card); Proof of Payment: Copy of check, money order receipt or credit card confirmation number; Information regarding the incident (case information)

Sacramento County makes this data easily available on its websites, Open Data Portal and other measures to ensure the information is accessible and the monies go to the rightful payees.

a good idea to attach a few strings to any cash. Don't make him jump through a bunch of hoops for no reason, though. I'm talking about teachable moment-type things that will help train and educate him to handle his finances in a more responsible and productive way.

There are lots of paths you could take. You might require that he start living on a written, monthly budget, that the two of you go over together for the first few months. Sitting down with a good financial coach – one with the heart of a teacher – is something you might consider throwing out there, as well.

In my mind, this approach is fair to everyone involved. It allows you to help him help himself, instead of just handing him something that may or may not be a blessing.
