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
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Giving Kids a Chance

SJWD Will Transition to Division-based Elections, but Not in Time for the 2020 Vote

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -

The law firm of Shenkman & Hughes, on behalf of the Southwest Voter Registration Education

Project, has alleged that the San Juan Water District's (SJWD) at-large elections violate the California Voting Rights Act (CVRA). To avoid litigation, the SJWD Board of Directors held a special meeting on a resolution to transition to division-based elections.

The Board originally planned to finalize the vote at the April 22, 2020, meeting but then delayed the vote until they could reach an agreement with

an extension to the 90-day statutory deadline initiated by Shenkman's March 26 letter to SJWD. The May 13 resolution outlined a timeline for the transition based on the agreement allowing a 90-day extension. Under the extended schedule, the District would not complete the transition in time for the 2020 election, but the division maps would be drawn May 13, 2020, to vote on and approved this year, by November 9, 2020.

Districts are significantly impacted by decisions made by the members of this Board. Moving forward, we want to ensure that the composition of the Board accurately represents serving," said Riehle.

Riehle also addressed comments by SJWD Board President Pam Tobin, in President Ted Costa at the addition to insinuating that April 22 meeting. President the Fair Oaks and Citrus Costa had criticized Riehle Heights Water Districts and other members of the Citrus Heights Water District Board of Directors for winning uncontested elections, claiming they "never stood election."

Although President Costa later clarified that his

Warmer Weather Will Speed Snowmelt, Increase River Flows | Spring Storms Not Enough

SAN FRANCISCO, CA (MPG)

- With temperatures forecast to increase this week, California's snowpack will be melting faster, potentially filling rivers and streams with dangerously cold and swift moving water.

As some counties begin to ease shelter-at-home restrictions, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) notes that California's stayat-home order remains in effect, and it's important to continue practicing physical distancing. Californians may walk, run, hike and/or bike in their local neighborhoods as long as they continue to practice physical distancing of six feet.

For those who choose to venture near or in water, PG&E encourages them to take extra precautions when in or near rivers, especially around hydroelectric facilities and dams, where water flows can change rapidly. Anglers also are encouraged to take precautions as trout season has opened for most California rivers.

Although California's snowfall is below normal. runoff is expected to continue into early summer.

"Public safety is our

highest priority. We encourage everyone recreating in or near water to plan at all times how they can quickly and safely escape in case of changing water flows and cold temperatures," said Jan Nimick, PG&E vice president of Power Generation.

Most California rivers are fed by snowmelt, making them cold even in summer. Simple actions such as recognizing if the water is too cold or swift, knowing your limits, wearing a life jacket and simply not entering the water when conditions are deemed unsafe can save a life.

Below are some water safety tips:

Stay Out and Stay Alive - Stay Out of Canals and **Flumes**

Recreating in PG&E canals and flumes is strictly prohibited. Stay off elevated flumes and out of these water conveyances, regardless of who owns them, as they are very dangerous due to slippery sides and fast-moving cold water. Be mindful of signs and warnings. Stay out of areas that are signed as restricted, fenced off or buoy-lined.

Know the Risks

Prevention is the best way to save a person from drowning. By the time a person is struggling in the water, a rescue is extremely unlikely and places the rescuer at risk.

Sudden immersion in cold water can stimulate the "gasp reflex," causing an involuntary inhalation of air or water. It can even trigger cardiac arrest, temporary paralysis, hypothermia and drowning. When faced with swift water, even the strongest swimmers can be easily overwhelmed.

Cold water entering the ear canal can cause vertigo and disorientation. This can confuse swimmers, potentially causing them to venture deeper into the water.

Cold water also reduces body heat 25 to 30 times faster than air does at the same temperature and causes impairment that can be fatal.

Learn About Self-Rescue Techniques

If you do fall into the water, here are some survival

Don't panic. Try to control your breathing; don't gasp. A sudden, unexpected fall into cold water causes an involuntary gasp (or torso) reflex. It takes less than one-half cup of water in a person's lungs to drown. If you remain calm, you have a greater chance of self-rescue; If you have a boat, stay with it. It will help you stay afloat

and will be seen more easily by rescuers. If it's capsized and a portion of the craft is above water, try to climb on top; Stay afloat with the help of a life jacket, regain control of your breathing and keep your head above water in view of rescuers; If possible, remove heavy shoes. Look for ways to increase buoyancy such as by holding onto seat cushions or an ice chest; If you're in the water with others, huddle together facing each other to help everyone stay afloat and keep warm; If you do fall into a river without a life jacket, keep your feet pointed downstream and turn onto your back; If you fall into the water with waders on, roll onto the shore. Wear a belt with waders.

Know your Limits

Swimming in open water is more difficult than in a swimming pool – people tire more quickly and can get into trouble; Many unseen obstacles can be lurking below the water's surface - this is especially the case during spring and early summer snowmelt. Rising water can make these obstacles even more treacherous. Guided trips for inexperienced paddlers are recommended;

Wear a Coast Guard -**Approved Life Jacket**

Conditions change quickly in open water and even the best swimmers can misjudge the water and their skills when boating or swimming.

Adult Supervision

Actively supervise children in and around open bodies of water, giving them your undivided attention. Do not assume that someone is watching them. Appoint a designated "water watcher," taking turns with other adults. Use the buddy system and never swim alone.

- The season's final manual snow survey at Phillips Station was conducted by the Department of Water Resources (DWR). The survey recorded 1.5 inches of snow depth and a snow water equivalent (SWE) of 0.5 inches, which is 3 percent of the May average for this location. The SWE measures the amount of water contained in the snowpack, providing a more accurate forecast of spring runoff than snow depth alone.

Measurements from the 130 electronic snow sensors scattered throughout the state indicate that the statewide snowpack's water equivalent is 8.4 inches, or 37 percent of the May average. The readings will help hydrologists forecast spring and summer snowmelt runoff into rivers and reservoirs.

"March and April storms brought needed snow to the Sierras, with the snowpack reaching its peak on April 9, however those gains were not nearly enough to offset a very dry January and February," said Sean de Guzman, chief of DWR's Snow Survey and Water Supply Forecast Section. "The last two

temperatures leading to a rapid reduction of the snowpack. Snowmelt runoff into the reservoirs is forecasted to be below average."

California's weather variability has been on full display this water year. Dry conditions in October and November were followed by precipitation in December that measured 120 percent of average. Very dry conditions returned to much of the state in January and February, with March and April storms leading to the snowpack peaking at just 66 percent of average on April 9.

In normal years, the snowpack supplies about 30 percent of California's water needs as it melts in the spring and early summer. The greater the snow water equivalent the greater the likelihood California's reservoirs will receive ample runoff to meet the state's water demand in the summer and fall.

The state's six largest reservoirs currently hold between 83 percent (San Luis) and 126 percent (Melones) of their historical averages for this date. Lake Shasta, California's largest surface reservoir, is 94 percent of its historical average and sits at 81 percent of capacity.



Riehle responded to those comments: "I believe it was wrong for an elected official to lecture customers and constituents. The Fair Oaks and Citrus Heights Water Districts are your largest wholesale customers. Everything San Juan does impacts the cost of our water and the cost we charge our customers. ... Customers and constituents always have the right to question their elected officials."

President Costa said, "We certainly recognize your rights to look at the books, to question anything that we do, and it's fine. But remember, you, you, Citrus Heights Water District, Fair Oaks, you created the San Juan Water District. You must have liked it because you created it! And we're doing exactly what you created us to do!" Addressing Riehle directly, President Costa said, "You haven't had any competition but, I guarantee you, next time you run you're going to have competition. All right? Just count on it. It's coming."

Caryl Sheehan, another director on the Board of the Citrus Heights Water District, said, "Whether or not Citrus Height originally created the San Juan Water District is not a reflection on what's going on currently." And she reminded President Costa that it's inappropriate to issue threats against a speaker during public comment: "This is a public meeting, and I just ask that you consider that there are a lot of people hearing what's on this call."

President Costa said, "Caryl, Caryl, I wish you'd check the record because on three separate occasions, your water district has run slates against the San Juan Water District. I have the newspaper clippings on that. ... Turnabout is fair play.

Citrus Heights Great Plates Delivered **Program: Home Meals for Seniors**

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG)

- The City of Citrus Heights is excited to announce its participation in the Great Plates Delivered program, which provides free meals to seniors and simultaneously helps support local restaurants.

"Our City staff remain committed to the health and safety of our residents, especially our at-risk population," said City Manager Chris Boyd. "Our goal with the City's Great Plates program is to serve 500 Citrus Heights seniors three meals a day from local restaurants and caterers."

The City is asking both seniors and restaurateurs to sign up for the program by visiting CitrusHeights.net/ GreatPlates.

Seniors may qualify if they are age 65 or older, or between 60-64 and have been diagnosed with or exposed to COVID-19, or are considered high risk by the CDC. This program is for those who are not already receiving assistance from another state or

Qualified seniors must also live in Citrus Heights, earn less than \$74,940 per year (or \$101,460 for a two-person household), and have difficulty accessing food resources

City staff estimate that restaurants registered to be Great Plates meal providers can make up to \$13,000 a week. This program is an opportunity to support the abundant food service industry in Citrus Heights, and the City is looking to work with 20 restaurants and caterers who are capable of preparing and delivering meals for 50 seniors a day. As a partnership between FEMA, the State of California, and the federal nutrition program, like City of Citrus Heights, the plates@citrusheights.net, or CalFresh or Meals on Wheels. CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Sunrise Marketplace Business Improvement District (SMP) completed wraps on more than 20 SMUD transformer boxes to display nearly 50 pieces of art throughout the business district. "MasterPieces in the MarketPlace" utilizes SMUD's Transformer Box Wrap Program, which is offered to qualifying SMUD commercial customers to help brighten our communities by enhancing the aesthetic environment while deterring graffiti. "With our area lacking in art opportunities, this project reimagines functional utility boxes into works of art and recasts our parking lots into vibrant public art galleries," said SMP's Executive Director Kathilynn

Transformer boxes are the green utility boxes seen along sidewalks, in courtyards and on business properties. They house high-voltage equipment for underground electrical service taking the higher voltage from SMUD's distribution system and transforming it to lower voltages appropriate for residential and commercial use. Because these boxes house electrical equipment, all the safety warning stickers and identifying markings will remain visible in their designated locations.

"This program allows us to partner with local agencies and the community to bring public art to a new canvas, often in high traffic areas," said Chief Energy Delivery Officer Frankie McDermott.

The "MasterPieces in the MarketPlace" boxes feature a variety of iconic art from 19th century Japanese Woodblock art, Impressionism and abstract art, and showcases famous artists such as Van Gogh, Degas and Renoir, as well as local muralists.

The program is open to commercial customers, homeowners' associations and local government agencies. If they've been in business five years or more, own or manage the property, then they can apply to sponsor, pay for and maintain the art wrap on a transformer. There are 20 approved designs to choose from, or a custom design can be submitted for consideration. The approved designs range from landscapes and local scenery, to unique perspectives, to textures and patterns. SMUD will work with each local agency to determine if the requested

art is appropriate for that specific location as each city has unique tastes, preferences and community spirit.

The Sacramento region is no stranger to art on utility boxes, but the art has been largely limited to the boxes housing traffic light controls through the "Capitol Box Art Project." In 2013, a SMUD transformer box was hand-painted by local artist Gale Hart and in March 2017 three transformer boxes near Tower Theatre received custom wraps. Sunrise MarketPlace will be the first to develop a themed installation at community scale. Each box will include a label with the name of the artist, art and date. A OR code on the label will direct viewers to a web page with more information on the art and artist, and a link to the museum where the art is displayed.

SMUD is utilizing only vinyl wraps for the program because they follow utility industry best practices. Vinyl wraps on transformers, instead of hand-painted artwork, are easier to install, maintain and replace. Also, vinyl wraps do not require the commissioning of an artist to work on location. Vinyl also has a life expectancy of five or more years and comes with a paint-repelling laminate which will further reduce the effects of any graffiti.

Sunrise MarketPlace is a collection of more than 400 retailers, restaurants, and professional businesses located in the heart of Citrus Heights, CA. The Shopping and Business Improvement District located along Sunrise Boulevard between Arcadia Drive (just north of Greenback Lane) and Madison Avenue, and along Greenback Lane between Birdcage Street and Fair Oaks Boulevard. SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Because of the public health crisis, the U.S. Census Bureau has extended the deadline for completing the census until Oct. 31, and the census has never been easier (or more important) to complete. You can respond online, by phone or by mail. It only takes a few minutes, so it's best to do so as soon as possible.



It has never been more important for households to complete the 2020 Census. Many emergency preparedness and public health programs rely heavily on census data for federal funding. Sacramento County is eligible for hundreds of millions of dollars in federal stimulus from the Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) based on population figures provided by the Census Bureau.

\$5 Million Allocated for Lead Testing in California Child Care Centers

State Water Resources **Control Board**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The State Water Resources Control Board has executed an agreement to provide approximately \$5 million in grant funds for testing and remediation of lead in drinking water at licensed Child Care Centers.

passage of The Assembly Bill 2370 in 2018 requires that all licensed child care centers constructed before Jan. 1, 2010 test their drinking water for lead and do so within a three-year window. Subsequent testing every five years after the date of the first test is also required. The testing requirement does not apply when services are provided in the home of the caregiver.

Lead is a naturally occurring toxic metal used in many products and found throughout the environment including air, soil and water. Children are particularly susceptible to lead exposure. Lead can slow down growth and development, harm a child's nervous system and impact brain development. Studies have found that even small amounts of lead exposure can make it difficult for children to learn, pay attention and succeed in school. Children under six years old are most at risk, particularly infants.

The California Department of Social Services regulates licensed child care centers and plans to issue directives to centers in early 2020 regarding the requirements for testing and remediation. Once issued, that information will be posted on the CDSS Provider Information Notices page.

A second 2018 bill, Senate Bill 862, appropriates \$5 million from the General Fund to the SWRCB and prioritizes centers serving infants and preschoolers. The bill gave highest priority for centers that serve infants, those that operate only one center and those with a majority of children receiving subsidized care. The Office of Water Programs at California State University, Sacramento will utilize the grant funds to implement a statewide program to assist priority centers, with support from the California Rural Water Association and the California Child Care Resource and Referral Network.

PG&E Crews and Contractors Inspecting Gas Meters in Counties

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As part of Pacific Gas and Electric Company's (PG&E) ongoing efforts to provide safe and reliable service to customers, utility workers will perform routine gas meter inspections in Fairfield, Sacramento, Suisun City, Loomis and Rocklin starting May 11. The inspections are expected to last throughout the month.

Safety is PG&E's most important responsibly. To help protect the health and safety of customers and employees during the COVID-19 pandemic, PG&E has taken precautions to maintain the recommended social distancing of at least six feet from customers when conducting routine safety inspections of gas

PG&E employees and contractors with Underground Construction will be conducting inspections on foot with a mobile tablet, Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. They will be wearing a hard hat, safety vest and carry photo identification, which they will present upon a customer's request.

If a person claiming to be a PG&E employee or contractor shows you his or her identification and you still feel uncomfortable, call PG&E's customer service line at 1-800-743-5000 to verify an appointment and/or PG&E's presence in the community. PG&E employees and contractors will walk up to the gas meters at homes and businesses but will not enter homes during these inspections.

During inspections, customers may see a PG&E employee or contractor on or near their properties as they access the gas meter. This work will not affect gas service. If we are unable to safely inspect the gas meter while maintaining a six-foot clearance from customers, we will contact you and schedule an appointment at a later date.

Expert Independent Review is Needed to Comb through PPE Contracts, Says Senate Budget Vice Chair

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Assembly Accountability and Administrative Review and the Assembly Governmental Organization Committees will host panel discussions on the state's failed contract with one company - Blue Flame. News reports have since exposed more troubling failures in administration contracting efforts. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama) who, along with a group of lawmakers, has requested a thorough audit through the Joint Legislative Audit Committee of the sole source contracting practices in these multi-million dollar legal commitments, issued the following statement:

"This hearing is a step in the right direction."

"But taxpayers deserve a thorough forensic audit of how the state signed contracts committing hundreds of millions of dollars to bring federally certified masks but failed."

"Lack of an independent, nonpartisan

audit by competent experts is not acceptable. Without a full investigation into the procurement process that transpired, there will be public mistrust."

PLEASE NOTE: As stated on its website, "The California State Auditor is the only state entity that is given full access to all records of state and local agencies, special districts, and school districts. General powers of the California State Auditor include the ability to subpoena records, take depositions, and administer oaths. In all cases, information obtained by the California State Auditor that is legally confidential must be protected from release from the public."

I met with your office in late 2019 for a Toni Says® personalized Medicare consultation. I have a question regarding travel outside the United States due to COVID-19. Once everything calms down and there is travel to other countries, I would like to plan a trip overseas.

A friend recently gave me Medicare advice that now has me very confused. She told me that some Medicare Plans give foreign travel medical coverage such as Medicare Plan F, but not Plan G, which was my choice. Is that true?

Medicare Alert! Your friend is giving Medicare advice and has no idea of what a Medicare Supplement covers. This is not the first time that a friend has confused someone trying to understand the maze of Medicare.

Medicare Supplement plans F, G and N cover the same limited amount of emergency foreign travel with illnesses such as COVID-19 and accidents. This is an extra perk

Medicare does not cover. The Foreign Travel plan has a \$250 deductible and \$50,000 lifetime maximum. The Medicare Supplement pays 80% to lifetime maximum of \$50,000 and the insured (you) pay 20% and amounts over the \$50,000 lifetime maximum.

Who knows what air ambulance from Greece will cost, but a big recommendation that I would suggest to you, Lee Anne is that you talk with your travel agent or explore online for true travelers insurance that will take care of your medical needs while traveling in countries around the world.

Remember that Original Medicare and Medicare Advantage plans only take care of medical and prescription drug expenses in the United States. Lee Anne be sure you have enough prescriptions while you are traveling overseas, or you will have to pay out of nocket.

Since your friend seems to be the Medicare Supplement Plan F expert, is she aware that starting January 1,2020 changes were made to Medicare Supplement Plan F. For those enrolled in a Medicare Part A prior to January 1, 2020, they can apply for Medicare Plan F. Those who enroll in Medicare Part A after January 1, 2020 are not eligible to apply for Plan F and can enroll in Medicare Supplement Plan G

Here is a big surprise for your friend because Medicare Supplement Plan G can be more affordable than Medicare Plan F.

Medicare Plan N will be the lesser premium plan with more out of pocket.

Let's discuss the differences in Medicare Supplements Plan G and Plan N:

- Plan G: offers lower rates and the same Medicare benefits as Plan F except the Medicare Part B deductible is not covered and will be paid for by the enrolled Medicare beneficiary. Medicare Part B deductible for 2020 is \$198 which is Medicare Plan G's out of pocket.
- Plan N: generally, has lower premiums than Plan G with generally more out of pocket. There is a \$20 co pay for a doctor visit with \$50 co pay for emergency room. Medicare Part B deductible is not covered, and Medicare Part B excess charges are not paid for by the insurance company which Plan G includes. Plan N can have more out of pocket cost than Plan G.

Costs for Demolishing Nuisance Building Charged to Owner

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - For many years, the City of Citrus Heights attempted to clean up a nuisance property located at 7210 Greenback Lane. Although the commercial building was originally slated to be used as a barbershop, no business license was ever filed for the location. In March 2008, it was reported that the property owner, Mr. George Petker, was illegally occupying the commercial building as a living space with a number of other tenants. The City attempted to investigate reports of building improvements conducted without proper permits, but Petker denied access to the property.

Over the years, the City grappled with various code enforcement issues at the property, including graffiti, overgrown weeds, accumulation of trash and debris, and many vehicles and motorhomes parked on the lot. Despite numerous violations, Petker refused to clean up the property. Greg Anderson, chief building official for the City of Citrus Heights, said, "He informed me multiple times he would never allow any City authorities inside the building without a warrant."

Eventually, Petker and the various tenants moved on, and the property was officially declared abandoned in April 2017. Reports of illegal activity on the property led to an inspection in May 2017. Inspectors found transients living inside the building, which was filled with trash and debris as well as human feces and urine. The City boarded up the building and posted a notice that the property was unsafe to occupy. But frequent break-ins, trespassing, and squatting continued, creating a hazard for neighboring properties.

The property was declared a public nuisance on May 21, 2019. Mr. Petker still owned the property and was informed he needed to correct the violations within 60 days, or the City would seek an Abatement Warrant, which gives the City the authority to clean up the property.

A fire on July 3, 2019, caused severe structural damage to the roof of the building, which partially collapsed. Anderson said, "It created a serious hazard." The building was then declared a dangerous

Petker did not respond to the notices and did nothing to improve conditions on

the property. So, on November 16, 2019, the City obtained an Abatement Warrant. When Anderson posted the warrant at the property, he found vagrants living inside and layers of debris everywhere inside and outside the building.

The abatement process took place between November 22 and December 10, 2019. As crews cleared the building, they found hypodermic needles mixed in with the debris, so they had to treat all the debris as hazardous waste. Finally, the building was demolished, weeds were cleared, and trees were trimmed — leaving a clean, open site.

On February 12, 2020, an itemized account of the costs of abatement was delivered to Petker, both in person at City Hall and through certified letter to his address of residence. He was informed he had 45 days to repay the costs before an itemized report and summary of all abatement expenses were submitted to the City

At a special meeting of the Citrus Heights City Council on May 14, 2020, the Council considered whether to confirm the report and order that the costs become a personal debt against the owner or be assessed against the property as a lien.

Citrus Heights City Attorney Ryan Jones said this was only the second time in the City's history that a hearing was held to recover abatement costs: "We only do this in the most challenging of cases when our standard code enforcement actions do not accomplish compliance. We have given the property owner a number of opportunities to comply, including notice to be present."

The total amount is \$105,783.53, which includes the costs of repeatedly boarding up and securing the structure, asbestos survey, arborist report, tree trimming service, debris removal, and building demolition. Also included in total are accumulated fines over the years for code violations, attorneys' fees, and labor costs of city staff who worked on the years-long abatement process. City Attorney Jones explained that the municipal code gives the City the power to recoup abatement costs: "You do have the authority to pass this resolution to recover all of these costs associated with this matter."

At least 10 days before the hearing, the owner was informed of the hearing Continued to next column
