SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A Water Lantern Festival at Gibson Ranch last weekend launched thousands of hopes, dreams and memories on the reserve's lake.

Organized by One World LLC, the event continued an international trend inspired by oriental tradition. At similar events hosted by hundreds of US locations, paying participants receive lanterns and marker pens. Sustainable rice paper is the canvas upon which messages of whimsy, emotion or hope are expressed. Illuminated by battery lights, the luminarias are then liberated to float in rose-hued armadas, carrying serenity and goodwill into the universe. The idea, say organizers, is to unite friends, families and strangers in celebrating life.

Promoted largely by social media, the Gibson Ranch celebration drew almost 5000 participants. Some travelled from the Bay Area and Nevada. Indian-born newlyweds Shivangi and Bhasker Dhaundiyal heard about the karma-fest in their Sunnyvale suburb celebrated the "perfect imperfection" of their marriage by lamplight.

Many luminarias were decorated with blessings of peace and serenity. Bereaved mom Ayrika Caeton dedicated her love-light to a lost infant son. Deceased pets, whales and unicorns were carefully drawn and launched. Before the launching ceremony, festival-goers were encouraged to meditate and share goodwill with

fellow attendees. Music played, merchandise was sold, food trucks did brisk business and thousands of selfies were indulged. With as much serenity as is possible in a traffic jam, festival goers later departed amidst clouds of Gibson Ranch dust. Once the music ended, a chorus of perplexed goose-honking continued lakeside melodies.

Council Approves New Contracts, Maintaining Park Safety and Continuing HazMat Services

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -At the Citrus Heights City Council meeting on April 25, the Council voted to approve a new supplemental police services agreement between the Sunrise Recreation and Park District (SRPD) and the Citrus Heights Police Department (CHPD). In order to enhance safety in and around the parks and open spaces in Citrus Heights, the SRPD and the CHPD have had a sup-

agreement since 2013. The contract specifies that the CHPD provide one overtime officer who patrols the parks for 10 hours each week, for a total of 40 hours each month. The contract was renewed

minor changes. The SRPD is requesting to renew the supplemental police services contract through the end of 2020.

The only significant change in the new contract is an increase in the hourly rate billed to SRPD. The contract rate will now be billed at up to \$95 per hour, which is a rate increase from \$85 per hour in the previous contract. The increase is due to the City's salary adjustments for CHPD officers.

Councilmember Bret Daniels stated the importance of having a police presence in the parks, and he said he would like to see the City "expand law enforcement functions." He suggested that at some point the Council should officer to patrol the parks. The Council also voted

to approve the list of 2019-2020 Citrus Heights projects that will be funded by Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) The Road Repair and Accountability Act.

SB 1 was passed in 2017 to address transportation deficiencies and maintenance needs throughout California. Recipients must meet SB 1's transparency and accountability requirements in order to SB 1 funds, the City must adopt a resolution approving the proposed projects and submit an annual ble what they could afford expenditure plan to the California Transportation Commission.

The City of Citrus Heights expects to receive

consider funding a full-time approximately \$1,452,092 in funding to complete the following residential street resurfacing projects: Blowing Wind Way, Carol Ave., Celestial Way, Covewood Ct., Creekmont Way, Flaming Arrow Dr., Forbs Way, Glass Slipper, Hatfield Ct., Maidstone Way, Picnic Ct., Scribner Ave., and Sudden Wind Ct.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On April 19, more than 100 young men participated in the Tim Brown 9-1-1 Playmakers Camp, sponsored by retired Oakland Raider and NFL Hall of Fame player Tim Brown and the 9-1-1 for Kids Foundation. The California Highway Patrol (CHP) hosts the annual event at their training academy in West Sacramento, and CHP officers serve as some of the mentors to the youth as they interact through football training drills.

Coach Shannon Sauers coached with Coach Roz right out of college and, years later, he is still incorporating what he learned from Coach Roz in his own coaching: "He was the first one who taught me that character was the most important aspect of coaching. He taught me that it's really about developing young men."

Lorenzo Walsh, one of the Playmakers mentors, has 15 years of coaching experience, and he strives to get underprivileged kids fed, educated, and involved in youth football. Walsh said he knows all too well how difficult it is to grow up without the support and encouragement of a male role model, so he wants to provide that support to as

many kids as possible. Walsh said that bringing kids to participate in Playmakers is a way to

"expose these kids to experiences and people they'd never have otherwise. I want to let them know that big dreams can be achievable."

Football players from Rio Americano and El Camino - high school teams whose bitter rivalry ended last season with a brawl — served together at the camp as coach's helpers, supporting the kids through the sports drills while teaching about character development.

When asked how his players were feeling about working with the rival team, El Camino Head Coach JP Dolliver said, "At the end of the day... they're just kids playing football.... They shook hands. And this year's going to be a different experience because of it."

"I think it's just a great experience for the kids to give back to the younger kids.... It shows the importance of the leadership aspect of being a student athlete," said Dolliver. "It's good to bring them out here, and I think it's going to make them better football players themselves."

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Each year, the second full week of April is dedicated to the men and women who serve as Public Safety Telecommunicators. On Saturday, April 6, 2019, the Organization of Public Safety Telecommunicators (OPST) hosted the 22nd annual Dispatcher Awards Banquet to recognize and honor police and fire 9-1-1 dispatchers, call takers and supervisors for their exemplary performance and contributions to the community.

OPST is comprised of call takers, dispatchers, supervisors, and managers from 9-1-1 Public Safety agencies in Placer, El Dorado, Nevada, Sacramento, and Yolo Counties, including state agencies.

Each year many Citrus Heights Police Department (CHPD) dispatchers are nominated for the annual Dispatcher of the Year Award, and this year Dispatcher Scott Kermgard was selected as the CHPD awards recipient.

Scott joined the CHPD Communications team shortly after the inception of CHPD in 2006. During his tenure, Scott has served in a variety of training and leadership roles and is looked upon as a veteran member and mentor of this team.

On December 27, 2018, Scott received a frantic 9-1-1 call from a woman who had just been struck by a drunk driver while riding her skateboard. Scott remained on the line with the victim for over 20 minutes while he, his partners, and responding officers attempted to identify the caller's location. During that time, Scott demonstrated incredible calm, compassion, and encouragement, and the victim was successfully located and transported to the hospital with critical injuries.

For many the story ends here; but not for Scott. He and his partners would later visit the victim in the hospital to show their care, concern and compassion towards those we serve.

The above example is just one of many reasons Scott is deserving of this award. In department-wide nominations, he was recognized for his consistency, reliability, expertise, professionalism, and compassion. Scott is a consummate professional and has earned this award for his ongoing compassion in representing the dispatch

Citrus Heights has contracted with the County for these services since 2006. Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District operates HMRT as part of the Special Operations Division; the team is staffed by seven specialist-level personnel and is administered by a manager who is on call 24/7.

In the case of serious hazardous incidents, HMRT would provide assessment, victim rescue, identification of hazardous material, containment of hazardous material, management of the incident, mitigation recommendations, management of emergency response activities, and coordination of cleanup and restoration of affected site.

The cost of HMRT service for the 2018-2019 fiscal year was \$59,771.74, which was included in the CHPD budget. For 2019-2020, the cost increased by 3%, for a total of \$61,564.90. The contract amounts for upcoming increase per year based on anticipated increases in

Vice Mayor Jeff Slowey questioned why the contract price will increase with the cost of living. Assistant Chief of Police Gina Anderson stated that the increase was estimated based on the cost of services, training, and equipment. If costs don't increase as much as expected, the City can renegotiate the contract at the end of the three-year term.

Vice Mayor Slowey compared the contract to hazardous material insurance, acknowledging that a major incident could cost the City much more than the yearly contract price if they had to mitigate the incident on their own. He asked that HMRT provide a report each year detailing hazardous materials incidents from the past year of

Disenfranchised Parents Unhappy with SJUSD's Controversial Curriculum

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - More than 250 unhappy parents showed up at the San Juan School Board Meeting on Tuesday night April 9th, to ask the board to not adopt the district staff recommended and proposed History and Social Science curriculum for elementary-aged students. This was the first of the last two SJUSD board meetings before they would vote on whether or not to adopt the curriculum as proposed. The loudest objection aimed at the school board coming from the many parents who spoke at that meeting, came from a group of aggrieved moms and dads who claimed that they were intentionally left out of the discussions that would have allowed them to help shape the recommendations to the board on the matter that could have provided options that would both comply with SB48, and that would meet concerns of parents on both sides of the controversial curriculum issue: The issue of teaching about a person's sexuality and the subsequent classroom conversations regarding sex and sexual preferences of people who have made contributions in some form to society. The discussion these parents say they were left out of was the one about what material would be used, at what age level would it be appropriate, and how it ning table. would be taught.

board meeting, Chelsy Erickson, one of the large number of parents in the district feeling disenfranchised, told the board "nothing has shocked or disappointed me more than the lack of inclusion of the parents by not giving us a seat at the table so we could have a voice." She continued, "invitations were buried in a flood of 'general informational' emails and robo calls, but there was no specific information telling parents that there would be sensitive or controversial material involved." Erickson told the board that this crucial specific information was left out of district communications to parents until the eleventh hour when it was finally added only because a concerned mother challenged San Juan School District staff and insisted that the notifications specifically mention the LGBT inclusion items in the curriculum being proposed. These parents contend that there was neither a robust nor truly transparent effort by the district to inform parents of the extraordinary content in the new curriculum and that the crucial information was not fairly or appropriately highlighted in notices until January of this year; thirty months into a thirty-six month timetable, effectively giving concerned parents no time to organize and demand they be given a seat at the plan-Larry Gilmore, par-

He told the board that they violated their Professional Code of Conduct in that they allowed misrepresentation and distortion of facts during public discussion. In his examples he cited EC 35160.1 (Education Code) where the Legislature found and declared that "school districts have the flexibility to create their own unique solutions" which can be "liberally construed to effect this objective". He also cited SB 48 and the HSS Framework law that state "while mandatory in regard to its implementation, it falls to the teacher and the local school and district administration to determine how the content is covered and at which grade level(s)."

Gilmore asked the board why, knowing this was didn't give more complete information, or invite parents to explore options that under the law would be a more acceptable solution for all involved. He urged the board to delay adoption until parents can fairly be given this opportunity.

Becky Milton stood before the board saying, "I respectfully ask that you do not adopt this new curriculum in its she is a firm believer in SJUSD for over 10 years. "This is too much too soon," she said, "the complex nature of sexuality and gender identity are not appropriate topics to discuss with elementary age children at school". Quoting the Fair Act (SB 48) she too stated that the board could choose to push back the curriculum and to focus the fair act at the more appropriately aged high school level.

Milton asked that rather than making a decision that would divide the district, all parents and educators be allowed

The boards concluding remarks in this meeting did not acknowledge or address the complaints cited, or the sincere requests of parents asking for a postponement and opportunity to fairly participate and work together. Their remarks did, however, with the exception of one, indicate that each of them had already decided to vote for adoption of the proposed curriculum at the next board meeting.

This time a board member and the superintendent did acknowledge the request from parents for postponement but said that it would not change the fact that they were required by the state to adopt the proposed curriculum, and that they had no choice but to vote for it.

It is important to note here that other school districts including Capistrano Valley Unified School District and Clovis Unified School District have intentionally not adopted the state approved History and Social Studies curriculum in an effort to cooperate more with concerns of all district families and communities. These two districts have joined with at least 24 other school districts in California, including Orange County School District, who are using the flexibility built into the law, and working with parents to come up with solutions that work to meet the important needs of the children and families in their districts.

The pleas of the disenfranchised parents had no impact on the outcome. In the end, as predicted from the meeting two weeks earlier, the school board voted unanimously to adopt the new curriculum provided and approved by the state. \star

- 5. A network drive is a good destination for backups and can be used routinely.
- 6. Consider backing up to the cloud or a remote server in another physical location from your system. This is a big plus if you are considering a more complete disaster recovery.
- 7. In addition to the backup systems built into the computers operating system, you can purchase pretty cheap software that does everything automatically.

The Mac provides Time Machine which is a complete backup solution. On Windows 10 you can do a backup using "File History" or use the Control Panel's "Backup and Restore (Windows 7)" which lets one backup everything on a schedule. Of course, more full featured backups can be had for either platform by purchasing thirdparty software. There are so many, I am reluctant to recommend one in particular, but I've seen great apps for as little as \$20.00 bucks.

When you put it all together, a regular backup will cost you next to nothing except a little bit of time and will ensure that your files are safe and recoverable no matter what happens!

Watch Dogs 2 is what **Ubisoft Should Strive For**

SACRAMENTO REGION. CA (MPG) - When it was first released in 2014, Ubisoft's Watch Dogs was met with middling reviews and abundant mockery. People made fun of the completely unnecessary underscore in the title (is it actually part of the title? Is it just embellishment? People couldn't tell), of the protagonist's "look at me, I'm edgy" revenge story, and of its awkward attempts to be both "cool" and "serious." Though its central premise of a vigilante capable of hacking everything around him was both fun and timely, it reeked of the type of corporatism and soullessness for which giant studios like Ubisoft had come to be known.

Enter 2016's Watch Dogs 2. As major developers Electronic Arts, Activision, and, yes, Ubisoft, have continued their money-hungry ways to the detriment of the quality of their games, Watch Dogs 2 is a bizarre anomaly in how carefully crafted and incredibly high quality every aspect of its experience is. In the midst of Ubisoft's release of Far Cry: New Dawn (a re-skin of Far Cry 5 barely worth the additional cash) and Electronic Arts's continued bafflingly greedy approach to game making (which, fortunately, has backfired as a result of low-quality products), Watch Dogs 2 shows us what triple-A development could be, and what it occasionally has been in the past: a pathway towards using enormous budgets to make gloriously-realized

worlds a reality.

WatchReplaying Dogs 2 over the past few months, I'm struck by its stunning its vision of San Francisco. Beyond the clear technical prowess at play, Ubisoft has captured the vividness of San Francisco's streets and culture. Colorful graffiti and murals line the buildings, small business storefronts look lively and soulful, and the bold, simplistic Silicon Valley aesthetic always seems appropriately at war with the glorious messiness of the San Francisco streets.

Though it occasionally borders on caricature, Watch Dogs 2 captures SF's diversity of cultures, while also highlighting the distinctly west-coast/hippie-esque aesthetic that defined it for decades.

And the premise of hacker vigilantes feels far more at home embedded within the Bay Area's culture than in the original Watch Dogs's gloomy Chicago. The new hacker crew of DedSec aren't grizzled fighters looking for revenge, but plucky twenty-something misfits trying to stick it to the man. They're diverse, lively, and dress in hip clothing, and they decorate their secret hideout with a distinctly tech-punk aesthetic. Few things are as satisfying in video games as when a protagonist is having as much fun as you are, and playing as Marcus Holloway feels more energetic and impassioned than playing as the original's grumbling Aiden Pearce. While Aiden would walk around in his "inconspicuous" trench coat,



hands in pockets, Marcus puts in earbuds, queues up some rock or electronica, and leaps over fences and between buildings with acrobatic flourish.

And those acrobatic

flourishes are indicative

of exactly what makes Watch Dogs 2 so special. Most triple-A games feel like factory products: most aspects lack artistic merit, feeling tailor-made by a team of developers at the mercy of corporate overlords. But just as Watch Dogs 2 is a game about taking on corporate America, so too does it feel like the developers' rebellion. The game is full of tiny details that they never had to put in, and that hardly contribute to the corporate goal of maximizing profit, but that, as a whole, make the experience infinitely better (one particularly cheeky mission has Marcus hacking into Ubisoft's headquarters to leak footage of an unreleased game). And it should serve as a lesson to other triple-A studios: Watch Dogs 2 wasn't a sales record breaker, but it still made plenty of money, largely due to positive word-of-mouth in the weeks after release. And that positive reception is, and should be, predictable, when developers are given the freedom to create a labor of love rather than a soulless wannabe.



I'm Listening!

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - In the 1990's there was a television sitcom named "Frasier" about a radio psychiatrist who greeted his callers with the phrase "I'm listening." Although it was a comedy, the show did focus on real-life topics and relationships and often the discussions led to one question: what is the root cause of your issue?

Suicide is a very real issue in this country. We hear that a person "seemed just fine to me," but that was only on the surface. To be quite frank on why I am writing about this subject is easy - I have posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and I can relate to all the buildup and emotions on why someone would take their life.

Suicide, the act of intentionally causing your own death, is listed as a top ten cause of death in the United States, according to a 2017 Center for Disease Control report. So, I ask, are you listening when the person who committed suicide remained silent up to the end?

Recently, California State University, Sacramento hosted the Send Silence Packing national tour, a program of the Active Minds organization that brings awareness to college students who take their own lives. Founded by Alison Malmon when she was a junior at the University of Pennsylvania following the suicide of her older brother, and only sibling, Brian, Alison started the Active Minds organization. According to the organization's website, Active Mind's purpose is "to reflect the organization's focus on action and student advocacy in mental health." They have been doing this since 2003.

Each year, as stated on the Active Minds website, Send Silence Packing visits 30-40 schools and communities. The all-day exhibit raises mental health awareness, inspires action for suicide prevention, connects viewers to mental health resources, and jump starts action.

Send Silence Packing catalyzes conversations in a way that contributes to a community's overall positive climate for mental health. Suicide is the second leading cause of death for college students. The Active Minds website, www.activeminds. org has a simple, and yet very powerful message: "Are you listening?"

I spoke with Barbara Gillogly Ph.D., a Developmental Psychologist and licensed Family Therapist, about her experiences with clients who discussed suicide. "I cannot tell them not to do it (suicide), but I can listen and validate their feelings." Dr. Gillogly continued, "People just want to vent and be heard, and not be judged. I listen to the emotion behind the words and find people just want to talk."

I asked Dr. Gillogly what she tells someone who has lost a loved one or friend to suicide. "Go to a support group because they have been there." It is not pretty to go through the grieving process regarding suicide as this is the toughest guilt for the survivors: could I have done something to help?"

I asked Barbara if there are any signs that are tipping points to someone taking their own life. "A person may start to give away their personal items, or they slowly start retreating from life in general" she said.

My initial thought after interviewing Dr. Gillogy was that I wanted to find out more about local support groups. As it turned out, I found a person who has actually been to one, and provided me with a personal and tragic story.

Sharon Ruffner lost her brother Eddie to suicide many years ago. Sharon told me that Eddie struggled with his addiction to prescription drugs and had been in some trouble with the law. Sharon told me, "Eddie was brilliant; he was a gifted pianist, artist and scientist."

Although Eddie struggled in his life, his sister never stopped loving him and when Eddie would call and blame Sharon for an array of problems she did not create, Sharon always told her brother, "I love you and if you need help I am here for you." It was soon after that Eddie overdosed on the prescription drugs. One question haunts Sharon: "Did Eddie really mean to do this or just happened to take extra pills by mistake?"

As with my interview with Dr. Gillogly, Sharon agreed that when a family member or friend commits suicide it is difficult to comprehend. "What signs did I not recognize?" is a question that Sharon replays over and over. One piece of advice Sharon gives to other people in a similar situation is that you "never get over it; you just travel through the grief."

Eddie's mother, Norma, went into a deep depression which Sharon described as "having her right arm cut off." Although her Mom felt this way, Sharon said to me "I never felt devastation; I just tried to help my Mom."

I asked Sharon what kept her going after Eddie took his life. "I kept myself busy by taking some classes and learning some professional skills. It eventually led to a career position with the San Juan Unified School District." Sharon did tell me, "you need to allow people to help you, and that grief is an incredible personal journey. You do need to take your time to grieve."

In order to help ease the pain, Sharon said that she copes to this day by taking piano lessons to honor her brother. She also goes to Pacifica Beach in the San timeshares, and the free Francisco Bay Area and throws a rose into the water because "it was one of Eddie's favorite places to go."

Sharon presented me with a newsletter from the Friends for Survival, a nationwide non-profit organization with a Sacramento chapter. The mission statement says, "We are dedicated to providing a variety of peer support services that comfort those in grief, suicide grief support, encourage healing and growth, foster the development of skills to cope with a loss and educate the community regarding the impact of suicide."

In addition, the organization states, "The loving outreach of Friends for Survival can bridge the gap between despair and renewed hope. Those whose loss is recent can lean upon the shoulders of those who have made progress in the difficult task of working through grief after a suicide death.'

Personally, I came away from this story not with an ending, but a beginning. There is so much the general public needs to understand about this very real societal issue. I intend to continue writing more about this subject in the future with the goal of helping one person or one family. It is that important!



Lions Donate \$150k STD Awareness: to Society for the Blind Prevent, Test, Treat

Funds to expand the Low Vision Clinic

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Society for the Blind recently received a Vision 2020 campaign donation of \$150,000 from the Northern California Lions Sight Association (NCLSA) and the Lions Clubs International (LCIF) to support the expansion of the group's Low Vision Clinic and training space for people who are blind or have low vision.

NCLSA donated \$75,000 to purchase equipment and vision testing devices for the clinic and secured an additional matching grant of \$75,000 from LCIF to add an indoor orientation and mobility course.

"Lions Clubs across the world have a long history of supporting organizations that help people with vision loss, so we are deeply honored that the Lions chose to invest in Society for the Blind here in Sacramento," said Shari Roeseler, executive director, Society for the Blind. Roeseler continued: "As the only comprehensive vision rehabilitation center in the Sacramento region, Society for the Blind is a critical resource for people who are blind or have low vision. The generosity of the regional and international Lions means

that more people across California who are experiencing vision loss will have access to critical assessment and treatment."

Society for the Blind's Low Vision Clinic is one of the longest running community-based clinics in the region. The Low Vision Clinic provides care, vision rehabilitation, low vision devices and transportation assistance to more than 375 people each year.

Clinics are staffed by three optometrists with special training in low vision eye care and serve patients with cataracts, glaucoma, age-related macular degeneration, diabetic retinopathy and other congenital and degenerative eye diseases.

Clinic staff includes a vision rehabilitation therapist who works with patients with some functional vision, teaching them techniques to use their remaining vision safely and effectively and providing training on assistive devices.

"It's in our Lions Club DNA to help organizations like Society for the Blind," said Douglas Wight, governor, Lions District 4-C5. "Across the world, we work to bring greater stability and independence to people with vision loss by providing services and supporting organizations that do this work."

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Three common STDs – chlamydia, gonorrhea and syphilis – are surging across the United States, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and especially hard-hit are those between 15-24 years old, which are estimated to account for half of all new sexually transmitted infections each year.

Sacramento County is no exception. In 2017, there were 5,581 reported cases of chlamydia, 1,174 gonorrhea cases, and 97 syphilis cases reported among this same age group.

"Looking at the issues that can threaten the health and well-being of our children, families and communities, the Sacramento County Public Health Division works to raise awareness of critical health issues and provides the information and tools to help prevent chronic diseases and infectious disease outbreaks," said Sacramento County Public Health Officer Dr. Olivia Kasirye.

The consequences of STDs are especially severe for young people. Chlamydia and gonorrhea often have no symptoms; therefore, many infections go undiagnosed and can lead to lifelong repercussions for a woman's reproductive health, including pelvic inflammatory disease and infertility.

Early detection through testing is key to avoiding these consequences, yet research has shown many young people don't talk with their health providers about sexual health issues at all during annual health visits.

All but eradicated 20 years ago, syphilis is making a comeback. In 2017, California was reported to have the second highest syphilis rates in the U.S. by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; And Sacramento County last year saw three times the number of cases than in 2015.

Although syphilis is treatable with antibiotics, for those who aren't treated, the infection can be dormant for years and lead to neurological or cardiovascular complications. Mothers with untreated syphilis can transmit the disease to their unborn babies with dire consequences – including blindness, developmental delays, physical deformities, and death.

Another trend the Department of Health Services has become aware of is the overlap of syphilis and meth use. The divisions of Public Health and Behavioral Health's Alcohol and Drug Services are working together and this issue will be a topic for

the upcoming May 9 Sacramento County Methamphetamine Coalition Meeting.

Sacramento County Director of the Department of Health Services Dr. Peter Beilenson said, "Meth use can increase risky behavior, which increases the odds of contracting sexually transmitted infections. To preserve health and prevent the spread of disease to others, it is important to know your risks, learn how to prevent STDs, get tested for STDs and get treated."

The total reported in Sacramento County for all ages in 2017: 9,803 Chlamydia cases; 3,344 Gonorrhea cases; 454 Syphilis cases (primary/secondary/early latent)

STDs: Prevent, Test, Treat

To prevent the spread of STDs, the Sacramento County Division of Public Health's HIV/STD Prevention Program provides residents with a variety of STD/HIV prevention and education services including: STD/HIV education and prevention information and condom distribution; Chlamydia and gonorrhea screening; HIV antibody testing and risk reduction counseling; Linkage to HIV and STD treatment; Community involvement through the Sacramento Workgroup to Improve Sexual Health and the HIV Health Services Planning Council; Other STD/HIV outreach activities and social marketing campaigns.

In addition, the Sacramento County program funds and promotes other local community organizations and HIV/STD testing sites, provides free home chlamydia/gonorrhea tests for women and promotes local pharmacies that provide non-prescription sale of syringes to reduce the spread of blood-borne diseases.

Getting tested for STDs is one of the most important things a person can do to protect their health, but it's not the only thing. There are several ways to prevent STDs.

The most reliable way is to not have sex, but there are many options if you are sexually active: talk openly with partners and healthcare providers about your sexual health; get testing for STDs including HIV; use latex or polyurethane condoms correctly and each time you have sex; and know the sexual histories of your sexual partners.

If you test positive for an STD get treated right away – and be sure your partner is also treated to lower the risk of getting infected again. And finally, if you are a parent, talk to your kids about STDs and their sexual health.
