California Wildfire Relief By Red Cross

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - More than 90 wildfires are raging around the country. In Northern California, devastating fires are burning across more than 110,000 acres, forcing residents from their homes. The American Red Cross is there, providing shelter and comfort for those affected.

One of several large wildfires in California, the Carr Fire near Redding, California, is now ranked as one of the top 10 most destructive wildfires in California's history. It is only about 23 percent contained. The fire has destroyed more than 1,000 structures and is threatening just over 4,000 more. Mandatory evacuations were ordered throughout the region, where conditions are unpredictable due to variable winds and blazing temperatures. Steep terrain is also challenging firefighting efforts. The city is home to as many as 92,000 people and is located about 100 miles south of the border with Oregon.

More than 1,000 people sought refuge from the inferno overnight in 11 Red Cross and community run shelters in California. Along with community partners, the Red Cross is providing hot meals and distributing comfort kits to impacted families. Red Cross disaster workers have identified additional shelters, and have numerous cots and shelter items on stand-by to be able to respond quickly to provide more help if needed. The Red Cross is working closely with state and local officials to expand the relief response if necessary to make sure people get the help they need.

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - Citrus Heights Police Activities League last week wrapped up a debut "Extreme Sports Camp" at San Juan High School. Aged from 7 to 15, kids from Citrus Heights, Carmichael and Orangevale matched athletic skills for four days. Police staffers coached teams for karate, basketball, soccer, dance and cheer-leading. Aimed to aid community relations, the PAL program enticed 70 students back to school during the hottest days of their summer break. "We created a fun atmosphere," said camp director Lt. Jason Russo. "We also included sessions to promote good life decisions and leadership."

Priced at \$50 per athlete, a four-day curriculum included meals and culminated in a graduation day pancake breakfast. For this event, Assemblyman Ken Cooley provided cooking grills and flipped hundreds of flapjacks. Joining the VIP chef, uniformed police officers were quickly batter-splattered by the process. "Police work can get messy," conceded an officer. "Fortunately, we have a great drycleaner."

The camp's final afternoon included displays by SWAT, motorcycle and K-9 units. In 100-plus heat, Sacramento Metro Fire Department contributed the best diversion: an invitation for kids to run through gushing fire hoses. "Some of our officers *Continued on page 3*

Alice Cooper: Rock's Super Villain

A Paranormal Evening with the Godfather of Shock Rock

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - "You can't shock an audience anymore - that died a long time ago," said Alice Cooper. One of the originators of shock rock, Cooper understands that times have indeed changed since he spearheaded a movement in the early 70s but that hasn't stopped him from continuing to embrace his role as the bad guy.

Rock's villain began playing out his own dark vaudeville in the earliest days of his career. "That started from the very beginning; that was always with us," said Cooper. "I think because we were art students and that was something I saw as being essential for rock and roll. I would see all these bands - that were great bands - and they were all heroes and I just kept thinking, 'Where's the villain?""

That's when Cooper took it upon himself to become that villain and change rock and roll forever. "Every parent in America did not want their children to see this character," said Cooper. "People would make things up...by the time you got into town you were the worst person ever. We found that funny."

In a life well before the internet and social media, the stories took on lives of their own. "The more of the misinformation, the bigger we got. The parents hated us so much that the kids liked us."



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Child Support Awareness: "Take a Leap of Faith"

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -August is Child Support Awareness Month. The California Department of Child Support Services theme for 2018 is: "They Don't Need Perfect, They Just Need You." This August, the Sacramento County Department of Child Support Services ("Sacramento County DCSS") would like to recognize parents who support their children in every way. As parenting coach Sue Atkins says, "There is no such thing as a perfect parent, so just be a real one."

Sacramento County DCSS encourages parents to collaborate with their staff to gain understanding regarding child support establishment, modification and enforcement. Children benefit financially and emotionally from the participation of both parents. Financially, a parent's support can provide housing, food, health insurance, transportation, day care, and for extra-curricular activities. Emotionally, a parent's active involvement in their child support case can improve a child's feeling of stability and peace of mind.

The Sacramento County DCSS staff are available to assist both parents paying support and parents receiving support with all aspects of the child support process. In the last federal fiscal year, Sacramento County DCSS staff have managed over 76,000 cases and collected over \$119 million in support.

To recognize and celebrate parents for Child Support Awareness Month this year, Sacramento County DCSS Caseworker Janae K. interviewed obligor Vinny V. regarding his experience throughout his child support case, which opened in 2013. He described himself as closeminded and in denial when his case first opened. Over time, his mindset changed and he has been able to successfully manage his case ever since, which has led to a positive co-parenting relationship with his child's mother. He encourages others to "take a leap of faith" and collaborate with Sacramento County DCSS on their cases. Here is his story:

reaction to being served?

Answer: I was happy that at least things were moving forward. [It gave me] an opportunity to show that in some way, shape, or form I can take care of my daughter. At that time, I didn't have any custody or visitation, so I was hoping child support would help the relationship with my child's mother.

Question: In what ways do you wish you had received more support or guidance?

Answer: In the beginning, a lot of *my questions were about where the* money was going and how it was being spent. Now I understand that that doesn't really matter as long as my child is being taken care of. It's great that [Sacramento County DCSS can] help us as parents avoid the constant debate and power play that goes with money.

Question: What would you tell a parent who thinks his or her child support order is unfair for some reason, such as not being able to see the child or afford the order?

Answer: Take a leap of faith - this works! At first I wanted immediate results, but it doesn't work that way. Life doesn't work that way. When I finally put my faith in the system, I started to understand that this is not for the parents, but for the kids. [Sacramento County DCSS] is automatically the enemy because [it is] taking licenses away and attaching wages, but I learned [Sacramento County] DCSS isn't trying to take sides. They're just there to do what's best for the child. Take a leap of faith.

Question: How has managing your child support case successfully changed your life for the better?

Answer: I have a much better relationship with my daughter's mom now. When you're trying to convince the opposing side that you're serious..., you've got to put your money where your mouth is. When [Sacramento County DCSS] makes sure the payment is made **Question: What was your initial** every month on time, then the other

person can't argue with that, they don't have a leg to stand on. When [my daughter's mom] saw that I was paying on time every month and offering her more beyond that, that made her a believer. She could see I changed my ways.

Question: Do you have any tips for working with Sacramento County DCSS to get through challenges?

Answer: Honesty, willingness and open-mindedness. A lot of people are in denial about their situation with the [other parent] and you've got to get honest with yourself about what happened and why you have to pay this money now. [Being] openminded [lets you] see that child support is for your child, it's not a weapon used by your ex to get at vou.

Sacramento County DCSS provides the following benefits to those who open a child support case:

- Research to locate absent parents • Establishment of parentage, including free genetic testing when appropriate
- Customer education regarding court processes, calculation of child support, and child support enforcement actions
- Accurate accounting
- · Automated enforcement, including wage garnishment, tax intercepts, liens, and license suspension
- Modification of child support orders when appropriate
- Preparing stipulations for court approval when the parents agree upon a support amount

(MPG) - Unemployment often feels like a maze. It can be hard to know where to turn – for CalWORKsrecipients; the Career Connections Job Club is there to help.

Offered through the Department of Human Assistance's Employment Services Division, Career Connections Job Club is an interactive employment training program that provides strength-based skills training and an enthusiastic support team to help clients get back on their feet. After being assessed by their caseworker to determine employment barriers and overall eligibility, participants referred to Career Connections Job Club receive child care and transportation assistance, interview practice, resume rewrites, guidance in pursuing specialized certificates and learn innovative strategies for competing in today's job market. Job Club staff work with participants to demystify the process and keep them on track with clear, achievable goals.

The journey to self-sufficiency can be particularly difficult for those without a strong support network. Before they even walk through the door participants have often already tackled a number of challenges that day – finding safe and affordable childcare, navigating public transit or arranging a ride,

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA coordinating their schedule to fit an eight-week course. Career Connections Job Club staff know this and work hard to ensure participants receive the encouragement they need. This often comes from other participants as well and many leave with valuable friendships as well as outside resources to help them stay focused.

In the words of a Job Club veteran, "I have truly grown so much since I first started over one year ago...what once was a laissez faire attitude of mine has been taken over with a whole new amazing outlook on life. I feel great. This is exciting and honestly I would not be where I am today without you." Another participant wrote to say, "I felt so down until you all believed in me, my courage then grew and miracles happened."

By the end of the nearly two-month training, participants feel differently about themselves. In addition to having one-on-ones with Workforce Coordinators, Vocational Assessment Counselors and Social Workers, participants receive any necessary referrals for services such as wellness counseling and homeless assistance to help tackle any personal barriers they may be facing. Participants found this approach so helpful that 96 percent of all survey respondents said they would recommend the program to

family and friends Career Connections Job Club is one of several opportunities offered through DHA's Employment Services division. Participants, through their case worker, can locate a community volunteer opportunity to build work skills, access a job matching tool that connects participants with opportunities through DHA's subsidized employment providers and direct hire program. Participants who meet the criteria of a job are referred to the employer and scheduled for an interview. This provides employers with pre-screened candidates and CalWORKs

families with quality jobs.

Employment is about more than just a paycheck. It provides purpose and drive, opens up new social communities and future possibilities. It's crucial not only because it pays the rent but because of the self-confidence it fosters. For parents in particular, finding employment has a lasting ripple effect on their relationships with their partners and children. For these reasons and more, Career Connections Job Club is just one of many employment assistance programs offered by the Department of Human Assistance for Welfare to Work participants. DHA strives to provide clients with every opportunity to overcome obstacles and improve their lives.

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Sacramento County's Department of Waste Management and **Recycling** would like to remind residents to be careful when disposing of fireworks, hot coals or hot ashes from summer-time backyard bar-b-ques.

Coals, ashes, and fireworks may continue to be hot and smoldering long after the celebrations are over. They still have the ability to start a fire. If these items are not properly cooled prior to disposal, they can easily ignite a garbage cart, a garbage truck, or even the facility they are brought to.

How you can help!

- Hot coals, ashes, or fireworks, should NEVER be placed in your garbage, green waste or recycling carts.
- Cool coals, ashes, and spent fireworks for several days by placing in a grill, a fireplace, or a non-galvanized metal container.
- Never place used coals, ashes or fireworks in plastic, paper, or wooden containers.
- Do not place other combustibles in the cart with these items.
- Soak charcoal, ashes, and spent fireworks in water before disposing in your garbage cart.
- Place cooled items in a non-galvanized metal container with a tight lid before disposing in the garbage cart.

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Goodwill for Fashion: Who Knew? employability, and a source of Goodwill lends itself to exper-By Andrew Rose

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Goodwill Industries in the Sacramento area hosted Style with a Purpose at the Alta Arden Goodwill location last weekend. Though this particular event had a *Back to School* theme, it was fun for all who attend. According to Goodwill representatives, the goal was to make fashion accessible to everyone, to break down the stigma attached with thrifting, to promote eco-fashion and to have on-hand style advice for shoppers free of charge. Regional Manager for Goodwill Industries, Hope Pearson, expressed her excitement. "It's not your average thrift store," Pearson maintains. "Our quality is much higher than most thrift stores."

The happening on August 4 featured a number of fashion experts in the Sacramento area and welcomed men, women and children to get their fashion groove on. Stylists pre-selected clothing items for people of all sizes, and other items were also showcased. During the event, guests were able to browse "style stations" where stylists offered personalized fashion advice. This was Goodwill's second stylists event in the Sacramento area. The first one, held on April 28, was a rousing success. In the process, Goodwill attracts new shoppers to its organization by pointing out how people can, through a little hunting, acquire amazingly inexpensive ways to enhance their wardrobe.

While Style with a Purpose is designed to be a fun event, it supports a serious cause. Each purchase to Goodwill helps improve lives of people who

use the organization's services. All purchases of merchandise from Goodwill's stores benefit the nonprofit's mission of helping people with disadvantages achieve selfsufficiency. In 2018 alone Goodwill Sacramento Valley and Northern Nevada provided more than \$20 million worth of resources to those in need. Some community organizations benefitted are Next Move Homeless Services, Francis House Center, Wind Youth

Services, People of Progress, and Community Link Capital Region. "Our business wouldn't be possible without donations from our community," Pearson asserts. What's more, Goodwill is instrumental in helping people in the community rebuild their lives with its job assistance programs. Goodwill was founded in

1902 in Boston by Methodist minister Rev. Edgar H. Helms. Helms enacted the progressive idea of collecting household items and clothing in upper class sections of the city. These goods were resold or given to people in need. Thus, the Goodwill credo of not charity, but a chance was put into place. Helms' simple vision is now a nonprofit organization with assets of more than \$5.5 billion. Helms described Goodwill Industries as an "industrial program as well as a social service enterprise... a provider of employment, training and rehabilitation for people of limited

temporary assistance for individuals whose resources are depleted."

Goodwill Industries gets results. In 2017, more than 38.6 million people utilized in-person and technological services from the organization to build their professional lives. Also last year, the organization's Good Neighbor program, which provides emergency assistance on a referral basis to agency clients, directly served 72,937 people across 35 countries.


More than a century after Goodwill's founding, events such as Style with a Purpose help perpetuate the success of the organization by bringing in a new, often younger clientele. Betsy Appleton, who puts together the blog goldwilldigger.com, reminds people that dressing snappy is affordable, thanks to Goodwill. On the blog, Appleton describes herself as "a 20-something navigating the waters of adulthood with champagne taste on a beer budget." As a guest on NewsChannel 5's Talk of the Town program in Nashville, Appleton provided frugal fashionistas with a few tricks of the trade. When asked about her best tip for going through the racks, Appleton advised that it's a different experience than walking to a rack in a department store. In fact, she claimed, some elbow grease is required. Appleton explained the digging in being a Goldwill digger. "One is to be patient," she asserted. "Things aren't going to jump out at you. You have to spend time there, be patient, and be persistent."

Appleton added that the reduced monetary investment in clothing bought from imentation. A recreational fashion designer can feel free to take the scissors to alter a Goodwill garment, because it didn't cost a lot of money. "There's no harm in doing a little DIY with Goodwill pieces. You don't have a lot invested in them to make them unique and fit you." Appleton was awarded Goodwill of Middle Tennessee's 2016 Ambassador of the Year.

Heather Donaldson, creator of Style with a Purpose, received her inspiration for this event from a similar happening in Nashville, in which her sister Elisabeth participated. A critical care nurse, Heather Donaldson started thrifting out of financial necessity, and now keeps doing it for fun and with a sense of social consciousness. "When I was musician living in Los Angeles, I never had any money but needed clothing that would make me look like a star. Goodwill quickly became my best friend," she reflects. "I could find unique items made of rich fabrics that were often hardly worn. Now that my pocketbook is not as tight, I don't thrift out of necessity, I thrift because I worry about this planet and the effects of fast fashion on the environment. I still find beautiful clothes for a fraction of retail prices and I use what I save to travel and enjoy life."

Donaldson served as a stylist for the event along with Caitlin Alfstad, Dev Anglin, Hagen, Keia Mae, Tuyen, Vince Vicari, and Xochitl. Each stylist offered unique advice to shoppers and those in attendance.

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
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Dear Dave,

Why do you think all debt is bad? Aren't some kinds of debt, like a mortgage or student loans, good? *-Nathan*

Dear Nathan,

It sounds like you're letting me know you think some kinds of debt are okay, instead of really asking for my opinion. When you ask a question that's really a statement, it's called a passive aggressive question. That's okay. You and I will now argue as best we can in a newspaper column.

It's not necessarily a question of what I think. I'm really just the aggregator of information we've gathered while walking with people through their financial issues. I've worked with tens of thousands of folks over nearly 30 years, everyone from billionaires and millionaires to broke people, and those in between. In the process, we've collected a lot of data through formal research projects — I'm talking about a huge stockpile of statistics, facts, and figures. And all that data shows debt is the biggest roadblock between people and wealth. I'm also a Christian. Having read the bible, and what it says about money, I can tell you there's not one place where it says debt is a good idea.

So, all that information leads me to one conclusion. Debt is not a positive thing. The only kind of debt I don't beat people up over is mortgage debt, as long as it's a 15-year, fixed rate loan. Don't cash out retirement

Dear Dave,

I owe \$18,000 on my only car, and the payments are killing me. I'm also upside down on the vehicle by about \$4,000. I'm 31, and I've got exactly \$18,000 in my 401(k). Should I cash it in to pay off the car? - *Monty*

Dear Monty, If you use your 401(k) they'll charge you a 10 percent penalty, plus your tax rate. That means you'll probably lose anywhere from 25 to 50 percent to the government. I don't know about you, but I think they already get too much of our money.

I love the fact that you want to get rid of your car payment, but I don't want you to cash out your retirement plan to make it happen. If you can pay off the car in 18 months or less, I'd advise living on a strict, written budget, and throwing as money as possible toward the car debt until it's out of your life forever.

If it would take longer than 18 months to pay it off, I'd get rid of the car. To do this, you'd have to sell it for as much as you can get, then go to a local credit union for a small loan to cover the difference. If it's your only car, you'd need to ask for an extra \$2,000 to \$3,000 to buy a little beater to drive until you can save up and get into something better.

I hate all kinds of debt, Monty. But being \$5,000 to \$6,000 in the hole is a lot better than having \$18,000 in debt hanging over your head! —Dave

High-Speed Rail? What About High-Speed Public Safety?

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The unbelievable devastation wrought by the Northern California fires of 2017 has given way to an inspiring rebirth. Santa Rosa, ground zero for the damage, is alive with the sound of skill saws and the constant rapping of hammers, as homeowners – by the thousands – rebuild their lives and homes.

Those fires are mercifully out, but their effects will be far reaching and spread across the entire state. In their aftermath, another set of problems is smoldering in Sacramento, challenging utility ratepayers, the insured, and taxpayers for years to come.

The legislature has established a committee to look at a bill offering solutions

and the costs and liabilities for fire damages. That sounds good until you remember this is the same legislature that didn't invest in adequate forest management, even as the state's general fund grew by tens of billions of dollars in the past six years. That sounds good until you remember that this legislature is fixated on plastic straw banning and a thousand other trivialities. That sounds good until you remember that Governor Brown, who will ultimately sign any committee-generated legislation, is more concerned with preventing .0001 degree fluctuations in global temperature 100 years from now and European popularity than he is with the actual pressing issues affecting Californians.

With that in mind, here's one easy prediction from the committee: Your costs are going up.

You will pay, one way or another. Your electricity rates – already about 60-percent higher than the rest of the nation – will go up, as the state lets the utility responsible for the fires pass costs along to you.

Your insurance rates – already skyrocketing for

> Your taxes, already the highest in the nation, will only push higher as the committee and Governor decide that what has really been fueling our fire epidemic is taxpayers keeping too much of their money. Look for some surcharge or other way to milk taxpayers as a "solution" to California wildfires. Maybe even a reintroduction and expansion of the illegal fire tax that was supposed to help with wildfires in the first place (how did that work out?).

In California, every problem is an opportunity to put more fees, charges, and other costs on the backs of the people working harder than ever but falling farther behind.

This state took in billions of extra, unanticipated revenue this year alone. Governor Brown has an obsession with the High-Speed Rail, which will burn billions of taxpayer dollars in perpetuity. That's real money that could do good if it isn't wasted by irresponsible Sacramento politicians. So here's a novel idea: Put our existing resources where they will actually count.

Instead of High-Speed Rail, how about High-Speed Public Safety? Governor Brown and the committee members should commit to providing CalFire every resource it needs to quickly implement the California Fire Plan, a ready-to-go, comprehensive roadmap to slashing California's fire risk for Fall of 2018. This plan shows that CalFire already knows what to do, it just doesn't have the resources to do it. This project should be paid for with existing money, to protect every Californian from the infernos that too-often wreck property and steal lives.




Other firsts happened over at Papa Murphy's Park, which included concerts and being the new home of the CA State Fair Cornhole Championship on the final day of Fair. The S.M.O. Tour, Kidz Bop Live 2018 and ZZ Top with special guest George Thorogood and The Destroyers were the first three concerts held on the sports field during the CA State Fair's 17 day run. Before his July 26 performance, ZZ Top's Billy Gibbons toured the fairgrounds and got up-close to some of the CA State Fair's furriest animals.

Food and drinks saw their share of firsts too. There were six new food vendors for Fairgoers to enjoy. The Speakeasy Whiskey Lounge was a new site that was home to live music and a chance to use a secret word (hence the term "speakeasy") to get a special drink made. Defendant Sentenced for Child Sexual Assault PROSECUTOR: Deputy DATE: July 23, 2018

CASE: Kristopher Jordan (Case #16FE018631) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Brian Morgan, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

The Honorable Stephen Acquisto sentenced Kristopher Jordan to 50 years in prison. On June 15, 2018, a jury convicted Jordan of seven counts of committing a forcible lewd act on a child.

In 2014, Jordan started sexually assaulting an 11-year-old male family member.

Gang Members Convicted for Multiple Murders

DATE: June 29, 2018

CASE: David Javier Jaimes & Alex Martinez Camacho (Case #14F01928)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Morgan Gire, Gangs & Hate Crimes Unit

David Javier Jaimes and Alex Martinez Camacho were convicted by a jury for the first-degree murders of Gladis Quinteros and Enrique De La Cruz as well as attempted murder. The jury also found true the special circumstance that both defendants committed multiple murders. Enhancements for personally discharging a firearm causing death and committing the crimes for the benefit of a criminal street gang were also found true.

On May 21, 2013, Jaimes and Camacho were in a car with fellow North Sacra Norteño ("NSN") gang members. While driving on Birdcage Street, they saw who they believed was a rival Sureño gang member talking with another man and woman. The defendants got out of the car and shot the victims multiple times. The victims died at the scene. The defendants fled and the case went unsolved. A month later, Jaimes and Camacho were again in a car with other gang members. The defendants mistakenly believed they saw Sureño gang members in a truck and followed them. While stopped at the intersection of Arden Way and Morse Avenue, one of the gang members in the car opened fire on the truck, critically wounding the passenger. A nearby sheriff's deputy heard the shots and pursued the suspect vehicle. During a highspeed chase, a handgun was thrown from the vehicle and was later recovered.

An examination of the handgun revealed a connection to the murders on Birdcage Street. It was also linked to a series of shootings in Sacramento and Citrus Heights. Further investigation showed Jaimes and Camacho were responsible for the vast number of those shootings.

Jaimes and Camacho each face a maximum sentence of life without the possibility of parole plus an additional 180 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for September 21, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 12 before the Honorable Maryanne Gilliard.

Defendant Convicted of Foothill Farms Murder DATE: July 26, 2018 CASE: Robert Gene McCormack (Case #16FE012920)



Robert Gene McCormack was

convicted by a jury of the second-degree murder of Kert Lackey and for being a felon in possession of a firearm. The jury also found true the allegation that McCormack personally discharged a firearm causing death. The Court found true that McCormack has a prior 1998 strike conviction for assault with a deadly weapon.

Robert McCormack and his girlfriend invited her ex-boyfriend, Kert Lackey, to their house for dinner. That night, McCormack overheard a loud conversation between his girlfriend and Mr. Lackey. McCormack struck Mr. Lackey twice in the head with an aluminum bat. When Mr. Lackey attempted to fight back, McCormack barricaded himself in the house. Mr. Lackey walked down the driveway toward his car, McCormack exited the house with a loaded 9mm semi-automatic handgun and shot Mr. Lackey seven times. Mr. Lackey died immediately at the scene.

McCormack faces a maximum sentence of 60 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for August 17, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 34 before the Honorable Pamela Smith-Stewart.

DV Offender Convicted of Attempted Murder, Child Endangerment **DATE:** July 30, 2018

CASE: Randy Wallace (Case #17FE015903) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Allison Dunham, High Risk Domestic Violence Unit

Randy Wallace was convicted by a jury of attempted murder with the allegations of premeditation, personal use of a firearm and personal discharging of a firearm causing great bodily injury found true. Wallace was also convicted of two counts of willful child endangerment and making criminal threats.

Wallace and the victim had just ended their relationship. On August 28, 2017, the victim was with her two young children doing errands. When she ran into Wallace on the street, the two got into a verbal altercation. Wallace told the victim he was going to shoot her. He then went into a nearby house, came out holding a gun and shot at the back-rear door and window of the victim's car where her children were sitting at the time. One of the children received a number of cuts and scrapes from the glass window shattering in his face, including a laceration to his eye. Wallace then shot the victim in the chest, stomach and back of the leg. He hit the victim in the head with the back of the gun before fleeing the scene. Wallace was apprehended on October 5, 2017. The victim suffered life-threatening injuries, but she survived. Wallace has a history of domestic violence and was on active probation at that time of this offense.

Wallace faces a maximum of 38 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for August 17, 2018, at 1:30 p.m. in Department 15 before the Honorable Laurel White.

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California Burning Thanks to Obama-Era Environmental Regulations

The largest wildfire burning in California has now claimed the lives of seven Redding residents. More than 38,000 Shasta County residents have been evacuated because of the Carr Fire.

Cal Fire estimates there are more than 300 fires burning across California as of Sunday morning.

"Since 2012, according to state emergency management officials, there has not been a month without a wildfire burning — a stark contrast to previous decades, when fire officials saw the fall and winter as a time to plan and regroup," the New York Times reported last week about California's wildfires

Many are asking why there are so many fires burning again in California.

What's the significance of 2012?

It is interesting that the New York Times mentioned the 2012 date, but only attributed the wildfire increases to "the recent historic drought," and "rising temperatures," caused by climate change. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Obama-Era Eco-Terrorism Enviro Regulations

Under Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack, "The Obama administration finalized a rule governing the management of 193 million acres of national forests and grasslands, establishing a new blueprint to guide everything from logging to recreation and renewable energy development," the Washington Post reported in 2012. "The rule will serve as the guiding document for individual forest plans, which spell out exactly how these lands can be used."

These Obama-era regulations introduced excessive layers of bureaucracy that blocked proper forest management and increased environmentalist litigation and costs. This is the result of far too many radical environmentalists, government bureaucrats, leftist politicians and judicial activists who would rather let forests burn, than let anyone thin out overgrown trees, or let professional loggers harvest usable timber left from beetle kills, or even selectively cut timber. Forests are the ultimate natural renewable resource.

In a 2016 Townhall column, Paul Driessen explains:

"Eco-purists want no cutting, no thinning – no using fire retardants in "sensitive" areas because the chemicals might get into streams that will be boiled away by conflagrations. They prevent homeowners from clearing brush around their homes, because it might provide cover or habitat for endangered species and other critters that will Hotter, drier, longer forest fires we are witnessing today have nothing to do with 'dangerous manmade climate change. get incinerated or lose their forage, prey and habitats in the next blaze. They rarely alter their policies during drought years."

"The resulting fires are not the "forest-rejuvenating" blazes of environmentalist lore. They are cauldron-hot conflagrations that exterminate wildlife habitats, roast bald eagle and spotted owl fledglings alive in their nests, boil away trout and trout streams, leave surviving animals to starve, and incinerate every living organism in already thin soils ... that then get washed away during future downpours and snow melts. Areas

recover their arboreal biodiversity for decades."

Government Incineration

In the early 1990's the Clinton administration embraced the Forest Stewardship Council following the Rio Earth Summit. The FSC was created "to promote environmentally sound, socially beneficial and economically prosperous management of the world's forests."

Yale 360 contributor Richard Conniff explained: FSC was to work with the timber industry "to set standards covering the conservation and restoration of forests, indigenous rights, and the economic and social wellbeing of workers, among other criteria. For industry, FSC certification promised not just a better way of doing business, but also higher prices for wood products carrying the FSC seal of environmental friendliness."

It was an epic fail. All industries using timber-related products were extorted into becoming "FSC Certified." Paper products, furniture, construction, cabinets, power poles, and hundreds of industries use timber. "A quarter-century later, frustrated supporters of FSC say it hasn't worked out as planned, except for higher prices: FSC reports that tropical forest timber carrying its label brings 15 to 25 percent more at auction," Conniff reported. "But environmental critics and some academic researchers say FSC has had little or no effect on tropical deforestation."

Prior to FSC Certification, environmentalists refused to acknowledge that timber had

incinerated by such fires don't been prized as a renewable, recyclable natural resource, and the timber industry prioritized proper care of forests.

Fast forward to the George W. Bush administration: "In June 2009, a federal judge sided with environmentalists and threw out the Bush planning rule that determines how 155 national forests and 20 national grasslands develop individual forest plans, governing activities from timber harvests to recreation and protecting endangered plants and animals. Clinton appointee, Judge Claudia Wilken of the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of California ruled that the Forest Service had failed to analyze the effects of removing requirements guaranteeing viable wildlife populations (Greenwire, July 1).

By 2012, the Obama administration issued a major rewrite of all of the country's forest rules and guidelines.

In 2015, Washington D.C. District Court Judge Ketanji Brown Jackson, an Obama appointee, rejected claims from a coalition of timber, livestock, and off-highway vehicle organizations that the Obama sustainability provisions in the 2012 Planning Rule would cause an economically harmful reduction in timber harvest and land use and an increase in forest fires. 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The Espresso Book Machine: A Savory Vehicle for Sacramento Area Authors

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Three hundred eighty authors and counting have published their works through I Street Press at the Sacramento's Central Public Library. On the second floor one will find the Espresso Book Machine (EBM). This isn't a venue for selling lattes to local bookworms. On the contrary, the EBM is state of the art machinery, and is budding writers' self-contained means of making their work known.

The first EBM was unveiled at the New York Public Library in 2007. Now more than fifty such contraptions exist in such far flung locations as Johannesburg and Abu Dhabi. Sacramento's unit, installed in 2011, is one of only two EBM's in California.

The machine occupies the space of two storage freezers one might have in their garage. But it's a heck of a lot more interesting to watch. Witnesses marvel as a book is molded and formed before their eyes. This includes binding the text to a cover with hot glue. Watching the EBM, one is reminded of the Everlasting Gobstopper machine from Willie Wonka and the Chocolate Factory. A 300-page volume takes about five minutes to print. Like the Everlasting Gobstopper, a single, self-contained unit comes out at the end. It's literally hot off the press. Wonka's magical candy was designed

the I Street Press as a one-person operation. While each book on the EBM is printed the same way, Ward recognizes that every author's needs are different. Some are accomplished writers, while others come to the I Street Press with merely an idea. No matter where one is in the writing process, Ward is happy to encourage the writer's endpoint of holding their very own book in his/her hands.

The initial librarian's consultation is free of charge. After assessing the would-be author's needs, Ward will point the individual in the right direction to get started on their book. This might include hiring an outside editor or taking a writing class. Ward states, "Whether 40 or 700 pages, there is a \$6 charge per book and 3 cents per page." The writer may complete a proof copy as part of the package. The fine-tuning process continues until the final copy is completed. The end product is an actual published book, complete with ISBN, copyright, and bar code. Additional fees for set-up and revisions are arranged between Ward and the author. The I Street Press is a nonprofit organization. Fees paid by authors using the EBM are contributions to the library to help maintain its services.
