Citrus Heights Man Honored by City Council for Saving Life

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) - The Citrus Heights City Council recently honored a local hero for his life saving actions, serving as a friendly reminder of how precious life can be.

On the morning of February 10, Roy McAlister was volunteering at the veterans center on Sylvan Road. "I had no idea what was in store that day," explained

At 10:15 that morning

there was quite a commotion outside among the workers as one of the volunteers shouted for someone to call 9-1-1. McAlister ran outside to find Jerry Castanon lying motionless on the ground. "When I checked his pulse there was nothing there," explained McAlister. "I rolled him over and immediately started compressing."

McAlister explained to the heavily attended city council meeting that he tended to Castanon for about eight minutes while speaking to the 9-1-1 operator until the medics arrived at the scene

and eventually took him away to the hospital.

After hours of uncertainty. at 2:30 in the afternoon word had finally come out that Castanon had survived. One of the medics told McAlister, "He just came out of surgery. He had two stents put in and the doctor said he's going to be okay. Whoever did compressions on him saved this man's life."

Mayor Steve Miller awarded McAlister his "Mayor's Pin" in recognition of his life saving heroism. Assemblyman Ken Cooley was also on hand and spoke highly of his valiant efforts before honoring him with a certificate. "Martin Luther said that he had two days on his calendar - today and that day," said Cooley. "And I want to live today for that day."

"Something like this, when it occurs to you, you can understand life and you can see that it's so precious so enjoy every morning when you wake up...it's great just to be here," said a grateful Castanon. "I want to just say thank you, Roy. Roy McAlister is a fine example for Citrus Heights."

Citrus Heights Police **Commander Daman Christensen Retires**

Korea and World War III - Almost

- Recently there has been high tension and talks of a possible confrontation and even a nuclear war with North Korea. But this is not the first time we have been in this position with

In the early 1970s, as a Captain in the US Air Force, I was assigned to Kunsan Air Force Base on the west coast of South Korea. This was an old US Air Force Base from the Korean War days, in the 1950s. At that time, I was the Air Force Chief of Aircraft Maintenance at the base, and part of my job was to prepare our assigned F-4 Fighter/Bombers for emergency launch with nuclear weapons, if the situation required it.

The F-4 twin jet Fighter/ Bomber was, at the time, was one of the fastest and best aircraft ever built. My job required that I have a Top Secret Security Clearance, because I was required to brief the Wing Commander on the status of all our assigned aircraft, and sit in on all Top Secret briefings about the status of the North Korean armed forces and their preparations for War. I remember well, as if it was yesterday. It was one of the most important briefings I had ever attended. It was the early 1970s, and by the time the briefing was over, I knew that we could be at war at any minute.

The North Korean forces, according to the briefing, were moving their fighters, bombers, tanks, military equipment, and soldiers up close to the border between North and South Korea. This would put them just minutes flying time from our aircraft at Kunsan AFB. This had never happened before and I remember thinking, at the time, that our base may not exist after the next few days, or sooner.

That night I walked down to the flight line where our F-4 Fighter/Bombers were stationed and ready for war. My job was to check with the airmen

assigned to repair and prepare the aircraft, and to have them all ready for launch if the orders were given by Headquarters. We were an inch away from World War III and I could feel it in the air.

That night, I talked to my maintenance airmen assigned to the aircraft. They didn't know, at the time, how close we were to war and I couldn't tell them. There wasn't a need at that time for them to know, but they were ready. All the F-4 aircraft that were flyable were loaded with bombs and ready for immediate takeoff to their assigned targets. I remember thinking that night on the flightline that this could be it.

I enjoyed my job and all the assigned men were great to work with. Being that I once flew jets myself in the Air Force, I knew how the pilots must have felt - that they may never see their families again - if we went to war. This was the real world and possibly the end of our beautiful planet as we knew it. I had a difficult time sleeping that night. It's hard to tell someone who hasn't been stationed on the front lines with nuclear weapons involved what it feels like. But that's what we were trained for - and we all knew what was at stake.

Fortunately, we all survived

or I wouldn't be writing this article. For some reason the North Koreans began to remove their jets, tanks, equipment, and troops back from the border, and I never heard why. At that time, Chinese and Russian troops were supporting the North Korean communist troops and maybe their leaders realized that once a nuclear war started in Korea that it could speed to their countries and it wouldn't stop until everything was gone.

We may never know what happened, but events in today's news are a reminder to me of that time when I was there, and I saw how close we came. I believe that cooler heads in China, Russia, and North Korea prevailed. They knew we had a very large number of nuclear weapons and would use them if threatened, but China and Russia had them as well.

I believe the fact that we did have nuclear weapons and advanced aircraft to deliver them was possibly the reason why we didn't go to war. What's interesting to me is that at that time, and even now, the world didn't know how close we came to World War III, but I was there!

May GOD continue to bless this beautiful planet and let's do everything we can to keep it special and alive! ★

\$10 Million in Refunds Claimed Across Region Through United Way's Help

Tax Help for Late Filing to Continue Through Summer

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Nearly 8,500 households in the Sacramento area took advantage of United Way-led free tax help programs for the 2017 tax year, resulting in more than \$10 million in money claimed through the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), other credits and refunds. The in-person Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, led by United Way California Capital Region with support from Citi Community Development, helped 7,422 local households, and United Way's MyFreeTaxes.com helped 1,066 users file taxes. Thanks to two-year funding from Citi Community Development, free tax help was significantly expanded across the region in Amador, El Dorado, Placer, Sacramento and Yolo counties this year, increasing the number of households helped by more than 2,500 and resulting in more than a \$3 million increase in refunds for the region compared to last year.

A limited number of appointments are still available this summer for households looking for help with late filing and which earned \$54,000 or less in 2017. IRS-certified volunteers will provide free basic tax return preparation with electronic filing and will help local households claim tax credits, including federal and state EITC, Child Tax Credit, and Credit for the Elderly or the Disabled. This year, more households are eligible to earn up to \$6,500 in federal and state EITC, including those who are self-employed. To make an appointment, call 2-1-1 in Sacramento, or (916) 498-1000 if living outside the city, Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

"This free tax help is crucial to ensuring our local families are financially healthy, and we are grateful to our funders and partners and 433 volunteers who have already served more than 16,000 hours to help local families," said Stephanie Bray, president and CEO, United Way California Capital Region.

enabling United Way California Capital Region to increase the capacity and reach of the local VITA program to meet additional need and demand this year and next. The funding is helping to expand the number of sites offering free tax preparation and to increase the number of volunteer tax preparers.

"Nearly 20 percent of households in the Sacramento region are living on low incomes, and nearly half lack the savings to sustain an unexpected shock to income," said Vicki Joseph, Northern California market manager for Citi Community Development. "By expanding access to free tax preparation services, United Way is enabling more families in need to benefit from this vital tax credit and helping to build their financial resiliency."

Local households that made \$66,000 or less in 2017 were eligible to file state and federal taxes online for free at MyFreeTaxes.com, sponsored by United Way Worldwide. The site provided households with free tax help so they could maximize refunds and credits and save an average of \$200 in preparer fees, guiding users through federal and state filing with software powered by H&R Block.

Other sponsors of United Way's 2018 free tax preparation programs include the U.S. Internal Revenue Service, SAFE Credit Union and SMUD. For a list of collaborating partners, visit

SMUD Invites Public Input on Proposed Rate Action

No Rate Increase Included in Proposal

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The SMUD Board of Directors is holding two public workshops and a public hearing to discuss proposed rate changes. The proposal does not include an increase in rates. Instead, it recommends changes to encourage regional economic development, a change to the System Infrastructure Fixed Charge for residential customers transferring service, and some other changes.

The Chief Executive Officer & General Manager's Report and Recommendation on Rates and Services, released by SMUD CEO & GM Arlen Orchard, outlines the proposed changes. The report includes:

- A proposal to increase and extend the Economic Development Rate (EDR) discount and remove some of its eligibility restrictions in an effort to attract, retain and help businesses expand in the region. SMUD's Board will consider a 10-year contract period for the EDR, options for disadvantaged communities and removing restrictions on qualification for the rate.
- A proposal to offset the fees charged to businesses to extend SMUD's infrastructure to provide their business with electricity.
- A proposal to prorate the System Infrastructure Fixed Charge for residential

customers on bills with less than 27 days of service. By prorating, customers will pay only for the number of days their home received power from SMUD.

• A proposal to change the language of the Hydro Generation Adjustment to account for fluctuations in precipitation.

Employment Trends Report: Talking Sex at Work?

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

Sacramento employers demonstrate concern in preventing potential sexual harassment on the job. News of workplace sexual harassment, assault and worse occupy conversation across society as part of the #MeToo movement and employers are on guard against workplace problems. Pacific Staffing asked top regional employers about sexual harassment and how often they provide employee training in direct phone contacts between May 29 and June 22, 2018.

Anecdotally, top companies said, 'zero tolerance' policy, reinforced 'at need' training and access to online resources were employed to help workers understand how serious this issue is taken in the Sacramento workplace.

Forty-eight percent (48%) of Sacramento employers polled say they offer sexual harassment training annually, with most also outlining workplace rules on hire for all employees. The required

CA standard for supervisory personnel is every two years, and nineteen percent (19%) of companies say they follow that standard in training their workforces. While some contacted would not or could not discuss the question, another four percent (4%) report a higher standard of training twice to four times a year for workers on sexual harassment and appropriate conduct at work.

Workforce Challenge? Third Quarter hiring rose by one percent since last Quarter with sixty-six percent (66%) of of companies reporting they will hire for attrition, or replacements, in their existing workforce. Many say retention of skilled workers is an issue. Fifty percent (50%) are motivated by growth in Q3 with ten percent (10%) also citing seasonal demands for some hiring.

Sacramento regional employers surveyed reporting planned hiring in July, August and September. One notable change has sixty-percent (60%) of companies reporting they will hire for

attrition, or replacements, in their existing workforce. Many say retention of skilled workers is an issue. Fifty percent (50%) are motivated by growth in Q3 with ten percent (10%) also citing seasonal demands for some hiring.

Forty-one percent (41%) of Sacramento employers say the greatest challenge in the present market is applicants for open positions, especially skilled trades, equipment operators and ten percent (10%) report demand for a wide variety of Information Technology/Digital IT jobs. A continuing issue across industry sectors is route and delivery drivers able to pass license and drug screen requirements.

SB 1246 will speed up the process to allow the county to simply pay the taxpayer what is owed when an overpayment or refund is discovered without the time-consuming paperwork required under current law.



Early Prison Releases: New 2018 Update

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - As of June 29, 2018, 329 inmates sentenced from Sacramento County have been granted early prison release.

Many of the offenders who are granted early prison release have violent and lengthy criminal histories. District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert feels it is important for the public to be aware of the so-called "nonviolent" offenders being released early from prison into our neighborhoods. Press releases are issued to provide the public with a sampling of recent noteworthy offenders, including:

Gang Member Convicted of Robbery, Possessing Firearm (Montreal Curry -Case #16FE021608) - Curry was a validated Meadowview Bloods criminal street gang member. In 2008, he was convicted of robbery and received a 4-year state prison sentence. In his current 2016 commitment offense, Curry was driving with his girlfriend when police stopped them for a vehicle code violation. Curry handed an American Arms .22 caliber folding revolver to his girlfriend. This firearm was very small, very concealable, and very dangerous. Curry then exited the vehicle, against officer commands, to give his girlfriend a distraction and time to stash the revolver. Curry continued to ignore officer commands until he was handcuffed and detained. The revolver was eventually located during a consent search of his girlfriend's purse. His girlfriend stated that Curry gave the revolver to her to hide because he was on probation at the time. Curry was convicted of being a felon in possession of a firearm and was sentenced to 3 years and 8 months in state prison. Curry's past robbery conviction, his continued desire to arm himself and his association with gangs is a dangerous combination. The Board of Prison Hearings found this inmate to be a nonviolent offender who does not pose an unreasonable risk of violence to the community and granted

a Deadly Weapon (Joseph **Sanchez – Case #17FE001117)**

release on March 29, 2018.

- In 2005 and 2009, Sanchez was convicted of assault with a deadly weapon likely to produce great bodily injury. In 2013 and 2014, he was convicted of first-degree residential burglaries. The 2013 burglary conviction is intertwined with his 2009 conviction for the felony assault. In that case, the victim broke up with Sanchez after a brief relationship. During the relationship, Sanchez committed violent acts against her. The victim contacted police and Sanchez's parole agent to inform them of the crimes. As a result of the victim reporting the crimes to authorities, Sanchez broke

into her house and threatened to kill her. He then proceeded to punch her in the face multiple times and choked her until she was unconscious. Sanchez imprisoned the victim in her own home and she was only able to escape when her friend came over the next morning. The victim's eyes, nose and ears were swollen and bruised from the attack. Sanchez served three years in prison for this attack, but his prison sentence was not the end of the terror for this particular victim. Sanchez's violent behavior towards this victim continued in 2012 after he was released from prison. Sanchez broke into the victim's home again and ransacked it, stole items, urinated on her bed and spray painted on her wall, "[Victim] is a fake ho." He was sentenced to four years in prison for that offense. In his current case, officers stopped Sanchez for driving a stolen vehicle with his 10-month-old daughter in the back seat. He was convicted of vehicle theft and sentenced to 44 months in prison. Sanchez's criminal history includes six felony convictions. He also has multiple misdemeanor convictions, including battery, and parole and probation violations. The Board of Prison Hearings found this inmate to be a nonviolent offender who does not pose an unreasonable risk of violence to the community and granted release on May 22,

Inmate with History of Offenses, Parole and Prison Violations (Joseph Duckett - Case #11F07674) - In 2001, Duckett was convicted of robbery and attempted carjacking and was sentenced to 71 months in state prison. In that case, he accosted a 52-year-old woman at gunpoint and demanded she give him her car keys. Fearing that she would be shot, the victim gave the keys to Duckett. As he attempted to start the victim's car, the victim fled into a bar and called for help. In 2008, Duckett was convicted of possession of a controlled substance. While serving his second prison sentence for this Career Criminal With conviction, he was convicted of Convictions for Assault with possessing a weapon at Folsom State Prison in 2011. In that case, Duckett tried to evade a corrections officer and was later found to have an inmate manufactured weapon in his sock. He has also had a number of prison violations, including mutual combat, disobeying orders and conduct that could lead to violence. Duckett has been convicted of a crime or been in state prison every year since 1997 when he was 21 years old. Additional convictions include domestic violence, resisting arrest, carrying a concealed weapon, providing false ID to police and possession of marijuana for sale. The Board of Prison Hearings found this inmate to be a nonviolent offender who does not pose an

unreasonable risk of violence to the community and granted

release on May 29, 2018. Early Prison Release Laws &

In January 2015, the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation began a new parole determination process after a federal court ordered California to reduce prison overcrowding. As a result, inmates characterized as "nonviolent second-strikers" (NVSS) became eligible for early parole. In November 2016, Proposition 57 was then passed with the promise that "nonviolent" inmates who "turn their lives around" in prison could also earn early parole under a new "nonviolent parole review"

Qualifying NVSS and NVPR inmates must not currently be serving a sentence for a crime legally categorized as a violent felony and must not be required to register as sex offenders. NVSS inmates must have served (or be within 12 months of serving) only 50 percent of their sentence, while NVPR inmates may be paroled after serving the base term for the principal offense and may earn additional conduct credits.

The Board of Prison Hearings (BPH) determines whether NVSS or NVPR offenders would pose an unreasonable risk of violence to the community based on a paper review of prior criminal history, facts of the current commitment offense, behavior in prison, rehabilitation efforts, whether the inmate has any medical condition which might affect the ability to re-offend, and written statements.

Unlike parole hearings where the prosecution, defense attorney, and victim may appear - there is no public hearing for these BPH administrative reviews. Additionally, no evidence-based risk assessment is conducted prior to consideration of early release to indicate an inmate's safety risk.

The Sacramento County District Attorney's Office takes an active role in evaluating NVSS and NVPR cases. For inmates who appear to pose a danger to the public, the office writes opposition letters to BPH with an overview of the inmate's criminal history and current commitment offense, and an opinion on the public safety risk if an inmate is granted early release. NVPR cases are especially concerning since prosecutors are denied access to records of the inmate's behavior behind bars, which is critical to rehabilitation, and do not have a right to appeal an early parole decision.

Recreational Waters and E. Coli

The Central Valley Water Board Will Be Conducting a Year-Long Study on the Lower American River to Determine the Primary Sources of E. Coli

- Every natural water body can be a conduit for pollution, trash, bacteria, algae and microorganisms. Sacramento County and the Sacramento Area Sewer District are collaborating with the California Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board (Central Valley Water Board) to fund their weekly E. coli water sampling at nine sites on the American River.

Most E. coli strains are harmless and do not cause human illness. They are the helpful bacteria found in the intestines of mammals - humans, pets, wildlife and birds. Increased levels of E. coli does not necessarily equate to an increased exposure risk for swimmers. E. coli are generally found in all recreational waters.

The Central Valley Water Board will be conducting a year-long study on the Lower American River to determine the primary sources of *E. coli*. The study will begin this summer and is designed to more fully understand the primary sources of E. coli and any increase exposure

risk to those recreating in the Lower American River.

The County Public Health Officer is the local authority in determining if a recreational area needs to be closed. Closures would be considered for a known communicable disease outbreak or a known sewage release. There have been no water-related illnesses for our rivers and streams reported to the Sacramento County Public Health Division. E.coli-related illness cases are required by Title 17 law for medical providers and labs to report *E. coli*-related cases to County Public Health. County Public Health investigates every reported case of E. coli-related illness to identify the source and stop the spread of the disease. If the County Public Health Officer decides there is a risk to the general public, a pub-

lic notification is sent out. Anyone enjoying public waterways should always follow healthy swimming habits:

 Do not drink recreational water or use the water for cooking.

- Do not enter the water if you have cuts or open sores, as these are pathways for bacte-
- ria to enter your body. Avoid algae blooms (brightly colored water) and trash in
- Wash your hands or shower after swimming.
- Pay attention and follow any warning signs and postings. Do not access a water body if posted warnings indicate it is not safe to do so.
- Contact your healthcare provider if you have concerns regarding your health after swimming in recreational waters.





Insurance after diagnosis

Dear Dave,

I started looking at life insurance policies after my wife and I had our daughter. During the screening process, I found out I had testicular cancer. I went through treatments, and the doctors have officially declared me to be in remission. Still, I can't find a life insurance company that will work with me. I have a small policy through my employer, that is equal to double my salary. Do you have any suggestions for finding additional coverage?

Dear Nate.

It's great news that you're in

remission. I'm really happy for you, buddy. I know your wife is thrilled, too.

I would advise conducting a search of every "guaranteed issue" company and policy out there. The term, guaranteed issue, means they don't do a medical check. The problem is these policies generally run 10 to 20 times more per thousand than those where you qualify medically. So, you're not going to get a lot during this time.

Check at work, and see if you can buy more and add it to the coverage they already provide. Some employers provide a double-up option if you're willing to pay for the additional coverage. If you can, and the price is reasonable, do it. If you have a mortgage, call the mortgage company and get mortgage life insurance. It's gimmick insurance — and something I don't normally recommend — but many times you can get it without medical clearance.

Once you get past that

three- to five-year window where many insurance companies will work with you again, try to find a good, level term life insurance policy with coverage that's 10 to 12 times your income, and drop all this other stuff. In the meantime, pick up anything else you can find even if it's those little \$10,000 policies banks sometimes attach to your checking account for \$20. Pile up those little odds and ends, until you get as much coverage as you can within reason. God bless you and your family, Nate.

Game Plots

The Popular Apocalypse

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

The video game industry is rarely labeled as "original," and this year's Electronics Entertainment Expo (E3) illustrated exactly why. Video games' largest publishers showcased Metro: Exodus, Dying Light 2, Days Gone, The Last of Us Part 2, Rage 2, Gears 5 and Fallout 76. Their common thread? Every one of these flagship, multi-million dollar titles is a postapocalyptic action game, usually with some sort of zombie or zombie-like enemy. 2018's store shelves will be utterly saturated with games in the vein of Mad Max and 28 Days Later, and yet despite the saturation, every one of them will likely sell exceptionally well.

Video games have an utter obsession with the post-apocalypse going back decades, to an extent not reflected in any other popular media. The two seem to be a match made in heaven; a primary allure of video games is the ability to escape one's own life and do anything they desire. When a developer is tasked with contextualizing utter freedom in terms of a logically coherent, immersive game world, where better to turn than an anarchic wasteland? Without the binding ties of society and rule of law, the player can believably do whatever they want without the logical necessity of some in-game police coming down on their heads. Even linear, cinematic experiences with little real player freedom benefit from the narrative shortcuts a post-apocalypse allows. Why are we killing thousands and thousands of zombies/people? Easy, this world is kill or be killed in a battle for survival, so further moral justification for Mass violence seems, from the writer's perspective, otherwise unnecessary.

Such justification feeds into why the trend is stronger now than it's ever been. Developers leveraged the computing power of the new generation of consoles not to create photorealism, but to create massive, living worlds in which players can roam free. Open worlds became "stylish" as franchises that were once linear began to expand with huge environments to explore.

And as video games began to lean more and more into their most unique artistic asset, the ability to create a sense of player freedom, the need for justifications for such complete freedom spiked upwards. As a result, we have E3 2018, where game after game resorts to the post-apocalypse as its narrative shortcut.

This is hardly a criticism; because video games aren't primarily a narrative medium, narrative shortcuts are easily excused if they accommodate exciting gameplay and interesting worlds, both of which post-apocalypse games often excell at. And even then, video games have occasionally used post-apocalyptic settings not as writing crutches but as tools to explore the complex moral questions of survival and freedom; 2013's The Last of Us did exactly that, and is widely considered the best-written game ever made (though its incredible-looking sequel may be looking to snatch that title from its predecessor). There's a reason why, despite the saturation, the industry is showing few signs of fatigue. The post-apocalypse both literally and figuratively, remains extensively unexplored, and video games are uniquely positioned to trek into the lawless wilderness.

A Treetop View of Maintaining Our Roads



The SACDOTTree and Landscape division is responsible for maintaining County-owned roadway frontages, medians, pedestrian walkways, soundwalls, bike lanes, and overpasses.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - With the summer construction season underway for the Sacramento County Department of Transportation (SACDOT), you can expect to see crews out on the roads, and sometimes in the trees, working to fix or maintain thousands of miles of roadway within the unincorporated areas of Sacramento County.

Part of this road maintenance to improve the public travel-ways involves protecting and maintaining the vegetation along the right-of-ways for driver and pedestrian safety. The SACDOT Tree and Landscape division is responsible for maintaining County-owned roadway frontages, medians, pedestrian

walkways, soundwalls, bike lanes, and overpasses.

The SACDOT crews create aesthetically pleasing landscaped areas while also providing a safer environment by removing hazardous limbs and dead vegetation. This summertime maintenance work also helps reduce the potential for storm related problems when the rain and high wind season hits. Of course, these Tree and Landscape crews are out later in the year to tackle storm-related emergencies, as well.

The Tree and Landscape crews also focus on removing encroachment violations in Sacramento County. This includes trees and shrubbery growing upon private property that are lower than 13.5 feet over the roadway or obstructing the visibility of an intersection or a traffic control device, such as a stop sign. When these issues occur, the SACDOT Right-of-Way Management section works with property owners to correct violations. SACDOT contracts some of the work to ensure the maintenance is completed in a timely fashion.

If you're out and notice vegetation issues on or near right-of-ways in the unincorporated areas of Sacramento County, the public is encouraged to contact SACDOT by calling 311 or reporting issues online at www.311.saccounty.net.

Defendant Sentenced for Multiple Child Sexual Assaults

DATE: June 19, 2018

CASE: Andrew G. Young Jr. (Case #13F07569) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Brian Morgan, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

The Honorable Steven Gevercer sentenced Andrew Young Jr. to 440 years to life in prison. On May 17, 2018, a jury convicted Young of 7 counts of committing lewd and lascivious acts on a minor under the age of 14, and one count of committing a lewd and lascivious act on a minor under the age of 14 with force. The jury also found true that Young had suffered a prior conviction for committing a lewd and lascivious act on a minor under the age of 14.

The victim was a family member who was between the ages of 12 and 13 when the sexual assaults were occurring.

Chiropractor Sentenced for Practicing Medicine without License, Grand Theft

DATE: May 30, 2018

CASE: James Joseph Martin (Case #16FE010473) PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney David Brown, Consumer & Environmental **Protection Division**

The Honorable Patrick Marlette sentenced James Joseph Martin to 1 year in jail and 5 years felony probation. Additionally, he was ordered to pay restitution to all victims named in the complaint, required to surrender his chiropractic license and prohibited from portraying himself as someone who practices functional or pastoral medicine.

On February 9, 2018, Martin pled guilty to three counts of felony practicing medicine without a license, four counts of felony grand theft by false pretenses and misdemeanor charges of illegally using 'MD' and 'physician' in advertisements.

Martin regularly appeared on a local television program, Sac & Co. His infomercials were designed to look like an interview. Martin, a licensed chiropractor, portrayed himself as a functional neurologist who practiced metabolic or pastoral medicine, specializing in treating conditions of the thyroid, neuropathy and other health conditions. Many of Martin's patients thought he was a medical doctor.

Martin was prescribing over the counter supplements and then selling them at a significant mark up.

Defendant Pleads to Murder, Sexual Assault of 6-Year-Old Girl

DATE: June 20, 2018

CASE: Juan Rivera & Lisa Burton (Case #15F03256) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Chris Ore, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit

Juan Rivera pled guilty to murdering 6-year-old Jadianna and the special circumstance he committed the murder while engaged in committing a lewd or lascivious act on her. He also pled guilty

to committing lewd acts with a child under 14 years of age.

Juan Rivera took custody of Jadianna after he convinced her mother to leave Jadianna for medical reasons. On May 27 and 28 of 2015, Rivera sexually assaulted Jadianna and inflicted blunt force trauma on her, which resulted in her death. Rivera then drove to Glenn County, where he burned Jadianna's body. When he returned to Sacramento, Rivera feigned a seizure before notifying the police that Jadianna had gone missing. Rivera's mother, Lisa Burton, aided her son after the killing by providing him with a stolen vehicle to transport Jadianna's body.

On April 21, 2017, Burton pled guilty to being an accessory after the fact to murder and vehicle theft. She was sentenced to 3 years in prison.

Rivera will be sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for August 17, 2018, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 21 before the Honorable Steve White.

Defendants Convicted of Attempted Murder, Conspiracy

DATE: June 28, 2018

CASE: Devonta MacDonald & Brittany Gibson (Case # 17FE002558)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Allison Dunham, High Risk Domestic Violence Unit

Devonta MacDonald and Brittany Gibson were convicted by a jury of attempted murder and conspiracy to commit murder with allegations of premeditation and deliberation, use of a firearm, discharging of a firearm and causing great bodily injury found true.

On February 7, 2017, the victim was walking home from a convenience store in South Sacramento when it appeared his girlfriend, Brittany Gibson, drove up and pulled over alongside of him. When he approached the car, he saw Devonta MacDonald was driving the car with Gibson in the passenger seat. MacDonald is Gibson's ex-boyfriend. After Gibson nodded her head to signal "yes," MacDonald produced a gun and shot the victim six times before driving off. MacDonald then backed up and shot the victim three more times. The victim survived, but suffered life threatening injuries and was hospitalized for more than a month.

An allegation that MacDonald suffered a prior strike conviction for robbery will be determined at the sentencing hearing.

MacDonald faces a maximum sentence of 50 years to life in prison. Gibson faces a maximum sentence of 25 years to life in prison. Sentencing for both defendants is set for August 24, 2018, in Department 29 before the Honorable Geoffrey Goodman.

This case was prosecuted by the District Attorney's High Risk Domestic Violence Unit through a grant funded by the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services and the Violence Against Women

The award recognizes the hospitals' commitment to ensuring stroke patients receive the most appropriate treatment according to nationally recognized, research-based guidelines based on the latest scientific

evidence.

Dignity Health Hospitals New Study Blames Prop 47 for California's "Smash-and-Grab" Crime Wave

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Many Californians had high hopes for Proposition 47, a ballot initiative passed in November 2014 with 60 percent voter approval. The measure aimed to reduce penalties for some crimes, including certain drug violations, and to help relieve the overcrowding of state prisons.

While Prop 47 succeeded

in meeting those objectives, it also triggered a major unintended consequence: It set in motion a wave of "smash-andgrab" motor-vehicle burglaries and a surge of retail shopliftings. For this reason, Prop 47 has earned the dishonor of receiving Independent Institute's fifth California Golden Fleece® Award, recognition given quarterly to state or local agencies that swindle taxpayers or break the public trust.

The main reason Prop 47 spurred an epidemic of theft and property destruction was its weakening of criminal penalties: By raising the monetary threshold for a felony theft to \$950 in property value, up from \$500 before the measure passed, Prop 47 lowered thieves' expected cost of getting busted.

"By reducing penalties associated with car break-ins, shoplifting, and other property crimes—and by making it more difficult to issue felony sentencing—Prop 47 de-prioritizes justice for California residents and businesses, who are now increasingly victims of vandals and thieves operating with near impunity," writes

Independent Institute Senior Fellow Lawrence J. McQuillan, in his new report, California's Petty Crime Surge: Unintended Consequences of Proposition 47.

Among the report's findings and recommendations: · Californians have been reporting significantly more vehicle break-ins than would be expected had crime trends continued on their pre-Prop

47 path. In 2015 and 2016, reported vehicle break-ins were up 21 percent and 27 percent, respectively, from the earlier trend line. In 2017, vehicles break-ins surpassed previous records, with a 24 percent increase above 2016 levels.

• In San Francisco, where the

smash-and-grab epidemic is worst, on average one vehicle break-in was reported every 20 minutes. Overall, the arrest rate is below 2 percent, and the consequences for apprehended criminals are mere citations. People would likely report more crimes if they had greater confidence that law enforcement would secure arrests, prosecutions, and convictions.

- In 2015, the first year of Prop 47's relaxed sentencing requirements, shopliftings rose statewide nearly 11 percent above the previous five-year average, amounting to about 11,000 additional shopliftings. Organized crime gangs are involved.
- Policymakers and the courts could reduce vehicle break-ins and shopliftings by lowering the felony threshold from property valued at \$950 to an amount closer to the pre-Prop 47 value of \$500. When sentencing a thief, courts should be allowed to consider the total combined value of all stolen or damaged property across multiple incidents.
- Law enforcement should make property crimes a higher priority, pursuing arrests even for small crimes, so that records of criminal activity are established.
- Property owners, businesses, and concerned residents should step up their use of security technology, community involvement (including through social media), and police reporting. Ultimately, people will help by reporting more crimes when they gain more confidence that law enforcement is taking the problem more seriously.

"Property crimes produce real victims, and Californians deserve a legal system that pro-

July 1 Brings Higher Interest Rates on New Federal Student Loans

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

July 1 was an important date for students and families: it's when most changes to federal student aid - both loans and grants - went into effect. For the year starting July 1, 2018, the maximum Pell Grant became higher, and new federal loans for undergraduates, graduate students, and parents now have higher fixed interest rates than loans taken out the year before. To help inform college borrowing decisions, we have a new, easy-to-read chart with 2018-19 interest rates, loan amounts, and other useful information for the most common types of federal loans.

The coming changes include: On July 1, the maximum Pell Grant increased to \$6,095, up from \$5,920. Pell Grants help 7.5 million low and moderate income students pay for college and reduce how much they need to borrow.

- o Even with the increase, the new maximum Pell Grant for 2018-19 will cover less than 30% of the cost of attending a public fouryear college, the smallest share in over 40 years.
- On July 1, the fixed rates for new federal loans became higher than the rates for loans issued last year.
 - o Stafford loans for undergraduates, subsidized and unsubsidized: 5.05% for loans issued in 2018-19 (up from 4.45% for loans issued in 2017-18).
 - o Stafford loans for graduate students: 6.60% for loans issued in 2018-19 (up from 6.00% for loans issued in 2017-18).

- o Parent and Graduate PLUS loans: 7.60% for loans issued in 2018-19 (up from 7.00% for loans issued in 2017-18).
- On October 1, origination fees will decrease slightly for new federal loans.
 - o For loans issued October 1, 2018 through September 30, 2019, fees will be 1.062% of principal for all Stafford loans (down from 1.066%) and 4.248% for all PLUS loans (down from 4.264%).

What We Have to Lose When NIMBYism Gains a Foothold

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

There are 23 million Americans in long-term recovery from their alcohol or drug abuse, and I imagine that many of them of them lived in "sober livings" or recovery housing as they learned how to navigate life without drugs or alcohol. Today, sober livings are under siege as NIMBYism ramps up. I'm hearing rumblings about legislative movements to shuttle sober living homes off to industrial zones, or to shut them down entirely. It's particularly disturbing because, as a result of their brain disease, our residents are classified as Americans with Disabilities, and their protections are threatened

by the growing storr

Where would we be without recovery housing? Let's
ask some notables who might
have stepped inside those very
doors as they embarked on
their own recovery. That long,
long list includes President
G.W. Bush, Olympic champion
Michael Phelps, prolific author
Steven King, Astronaut Buzz
Aldrin and actor Daniel Radcliff
(AKA "Harry Potter.") I hardly
consider them a blight on the
landscape of humanity.

You'll also find some unfamiliar faces among the millions in long-term recovery. Let's listen to some of their voices:

"Clean & Sober Transitional Living (CSTL) has given me a safe place to live and a great group of people who share the journey... I know that I am able to enjoy the life I have now because I managed to get here, managed to follow the few simple rules, and now choose to stay and surround myself with the people who understand me and share the same challenges of living a sober life. I'm truly grateful for everything I have learned here and that I found my tribe." (Muriel)

"Clean and Sober Transitional

Living is an amazing place if you're trying to do something different with your life....... not only does it help you get clean and provide meetings but also helps you with all the aspects of living life on life's terms....... from the social part of living on a block with others fighting a similar fight...... honestly there is absolutely no comparison to anywhere else." (Ross)

"I never knew there was a better way to live. Clean and Sober gave me that. Amazing food. Amazing structure. Meetings every day. This place saved my life." (Heather)

"If you want change in your life this is a great place to start. This is a beautiful place of healing and love." (Eric)

I'll close on that note, with a simple request that people pay attention to the effort to ostracize recovery housing, and then let your support for recovery housing be heard.
